

#### **CAUTION**

The plug has one prong wider than the other and will fit only

#### Note to CATV system installers in the USA

This reminder is provided to call the CATV system installer's attention to Article 820-40 of the NEC, which provides guidelines for proper grounding, and, in particular, specifies that the cable ground shall be connected to the grounding system of the building, as close to the point of cable entry as practical.

#### **Precautions**

#### **Installing your TV**

- Place the TV on the floor or on a sturdy platform. The mounting surface should be flat and steady. If you install the TV on a soft floor, make sure that the floor is not damaged by the weight of the TV.
- Place the TV far enough away from the walls to allow proper ventilation. This will prevent the TV from overheating and avoid possible damage to the TV. Avoid dusty areas too.
- Damage may occur if you leave the TV in direct sunlight or near a heater. Avoid areas subject to extremely high temperatures or humidity, and temperatures of 41°F(5°C) or lower.

#### **Using your TV**

- Do not stand or climb on the TV.
- Do not put any heavy object on top of the TV.
- Do not place containers with liquids such as drinks or cosmetics on the TV. If any foreign material or water leaks into the TV, unplug the AC cord and contact your dealer.
- If the room temperature suddenly rises, condensation may occur on the lenses resulting in picture distortion or color fading. In such a case, simply wait a while (with the power on) and the condensation will evaporate.
- Avoid displaying stationary images on your TV screen for extended periods of time. Stationary patterns generated by a picture-out-picture (POP) display, computer displays, video games, stock market reports, etc., can become permanently engrained on the picture tube. This damage is not protected by your warranty because it is the result of misuse. If you wish to use your TV to display still images, reduce brightness and contrast settings. Never leave a POP, computer, or video game display unattended.
- Sit approximately 10-25 feet away from the TV. Sitting too
  far to the left or right of the screen will cause the picture to
  appear dull as will direct sunlight and room lights. Turn the
  TV off to check for reflections on the screen. Then remove
  the source of any reflections while viewing.

#### **Cleaning your TV**

 Clean the TV with a soft, dry cloth. Never use strong solvents such as thinner or benzine which might damage the finish of the cabinet. If the cabinet is very dirty, use a damp cloth to wipe the cabinet clean, then finish with a dry cloth.

#### Introduction

#### **Welcome to Toshiba**

Congratulations! You have purchased one of the finest projection TVs on the market. The goal of this manual is to guide you through setting up and operating your Toshiba TV as quickly as possible.

This manual applies to models 42H81, 50H81, 57H81, and 65H81. Before you start reading, check the model number on the back of the TV.

Instructions in this manual are based on using the remote control. You can also use the controls on the TV if they have the same name as those on the remote control.

Please read all the safety and operating instructions carefully, and keep the manual for future reference.


#### **Exploring your new TV**

You can operate your TV using the buttons on the front panel or the remote control. The back panel and front panel (behind the door) provide all the terminal connections you will need to connect other equipment to your TV. See "Connecting your TV" on page 5.

#### **Please Note**

On some models, the SET UP menu automatically appears on-screen the first time the TV is turned on.

To change the menu settings, see "Setting Up Your TV" on page 17.
To close the menu, either press EXIT or turn off the TV.

#### **Connecting your TV**

If you have not connected electronic equipment before, or you have been frustrated in the past, you may wish to read this section. (Cables are not supplied.)


- A coaxial cable is the standard cable that comes in from your antenna or cable converter box. Coaxial cables use "F" connectors.
- Audio and video cables are usually color-coded according to use: yellow for video, and red and white for audio. The red audio cable is for the stereo right channel, and the white audio cable is for the stereo (or mono) left channel. On the rear panel of the TV, the terminals are color-coded in the same manner as the cables.
- S-video cables provide better picture performance. S-video cables can only be used with S-video compatible components.
- ColorStream<sup>TM</sup> cables come in sets of three and provide the best picture performance. ColorStream cables can only be used with ColorStream compatible components.

#### **Connecting a VCR**

This connection allows you to watch local channels and video programs, play or record on the VCR while watching TV, and record from one channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- one pair of audio cables (one single audio cable for a mono VCR)
- one video cable (one S-video cable for an S-VHS VCR)

#### Caution:

Do not plug the TV in until you have finished connecting all of your equipment.

#### Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable. If you have an S-VHS VCR, use an S-video

cable (in the S-video jacks) instead of the regular video cable.


Do not connect a regular video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time.

#### Connecting a cable converter box

This connection allows you to watch basic and premium cable channels.

To use the TV's features, select ANT-1. To view premium channels, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels. You will need:

• two coaxial cables




#### Connecting a cable converter box and VCR

This connection allows you to watch and record basic and premium cable channels, watch videotapes, and record one channel while watching another channel. To use the TV's features, select ANT-1. To view premium channels or record with the VCR, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels.

You will need:

- three coaxial cables
- one pair of audio cables (one single audio cable for a mono VCR)
- one video cable (one S-video cable for an S-VHS VCR)



#### Note:

When you use a converter box with your TV, the remote control will not operate some features, such as programming your favorite channels, labeling channels, and locking channels.

#### Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable. If you have an S-VHS VCR, use an S-video cable (in the S-video jacks) instead of a regular video cable. Do not connect a regular video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time.


When you use a converter box with your TV, the remote control will not operate some features, such as programming your favorite channels, labeling channels, and locking channels.

# Connecting a DVD player or satellite receiver and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD/satellite, VCR, and TV programs, and record one TV channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- two pairs of audio cables (one single and one pair of audio cables for a mono VCR)
- one video cable (between the TV and VCR)
- one S-video cable (between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver)



#### Note:

For the highest possible picture quality from a non-ColorStream DVD player/satellite receiver, use an S-video cable between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver. (If your DVD player or satellite receiver is ColorStream-compatible, see page 8).

Do not connect both an S-video cable and a regular video cable between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver at the same time. Doing so will distort the picture.

Do not connect the DVD player/satellite receiver and VCR to the same video channel on the TV. (See the illustrations, which show the DVD player/satellite receiver connected to Video-1 on the TV, and the VCR connected to Video-2 on the TV.)


# Connecting a DVD player (with or without ColorStream™) and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD, VCR, and TV programs, and record DVD and TV programs. You can record from one source while watching a program from another source.

Your TV has ColorStream (component video) inputs. Connecting your TV to a ColorStream-compatible DVD player (such as a Toshiba ColorStream-equipped DVD player) can greatly enhance picture quality and realism.

#### You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- three pairs of audio cables (two single and one pair of audio cables for a mono VCR)
- two video cables
- one set of ColorStream video cables (one S-video cable for a non-ColorStream DVD player; see notes at right)



#### Note:

For the highest possible picture quality, use ColorStream video cables between the TV and DVD player. You can connect the ColorStream cables from the DVD player to either ColorStream jack on the TV (HD1 or HD2).

The ColorStream HD1 and HD2 jacks can be used with Progressive (480p) and Interlace (480i, 1080i) scan systems.

If your DVD player is not ColorStream-compatible, use the S-video connections (both audio and video) instead of the ColorStream connections. Do not connect both S-Video and ColorStream cables between the TV and DVD player at the same time.

To record from the DVD player, set the VCR to Line IN. To monitor recording from the DVD player, set the VCR to Line IN, and set the TV to Video-1.

#### Caution:

The unauthorized recording of television programs, videotapes, and other materials may infringe upon the provisions of copyright laws.


# Connecting a DTV receiver/set-top box (with or without ColorStream™) and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DTV (digital TV broadcast), VCR, and TV programs, and record DTV and TV programs. You can record from one source while watching a program from another source.

Your TV has ColorStream (component video) inputs. Connecting your TV to a ColorStream-compatible DTV receiver can greatly enhance picture quality and realism.

#### You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- three pairs of audio cables (two single and one pair of audio cables for a mono VCR)
- two video cables
- one set of ColorStream video cables (one S-video cable for a non-ColorStream DTV receiver; see notes at right)



#### Note:

For the highest possible picture quality, use ColorStream video cables between the TV and DTV receiver. You can connect the ColorStream cables from the DTV receiver to either ColorStream jack on the TV (HD1 or HD2).

The ColorStream HD1 and HD2 jacks can be used with Progressive (480p) and Interlace (480i, 1080i) scan systems.

If your DTV receiver is not ColorStream-compatible, use the S-video connections (both audio and video) instead of the ColorStream connections. Do not connect both S-Video and ColorStream cables between the TV and DTV receiver at the same time.

To record from the DTV receiver, set the VCR to Line IN. To monitor recording from the DTV receiver, set the VCR to Line IN, and set the TV to Video-1.


The unauthorized recording of television programs, videotapes, and other materials may infringe upon the provisions of copyright laws.

#### **Connecting two VCRs**

This connection allows you to record (dub/edit) from one VCR to another VCR while watching a videotape. You can also record from one TV channel while watching another TV channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- two pairs of audio cables (two single audio cables for mono VCRs)
- two video cables (two S-video cables for S-VHS VCRs)



#### Caution:

The unauthorized recording of television programs, videotapes, and other materials may infringe upon the provisions of copyright laws.

#### Note:

If you have S-VHS VCRs, use S-video cables instead of regular video cables. Do not connect both a regular video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 or Video-2 at the same time.

Do not connect the same VCR to the output and input jacks on the TV at the same time. To dub or edit, VCR 2 must select Line IN, and the TV must select Video-1.


- \* The Video OUT jack does not output the POP picture.
- \*\*The Audio OUT jacks can output the sound of either the Main or POP picture (see "Selecting the Audio OUT sound" on page 47).

#### Connecting a camcorder

This connection allows you to watch video materials recorded on a camcorder.

You will need:

- one pair of audio cables
- one video cable (one S-video cable for an S-VHS camcorder)



#### Caution:

If you have an S-VHS camcorder, use an S-video cable between the S-video jacks on the camcorder and TV. Do not connect both a regular video cable and an S-video cable at the same time.

#### Connecting an audio system

This connection allows you to use an audio amplifier to adjust the audio level. This also allows you to use external speakers.

To control the audio, turn on the TV and the stereo amplifier, and turn off the built-in speakers (see "Turning off the built-in speakers" on page 47).

You will need:

• one pair of audio cables

#### Note:

To hear sound when using an external audio amplifier, the volume of both the TV and the amplifier must be set above 0 (zero).

For example, if the volume of the TV is set to 0, you will not be able to hear any sound, even the volume of the amplifier is at its highest level.


#### Connecting an A/V receiver

This connection allows you to use an audio/video (A/V) receiver to enhance your TV's sound.

If you have a system with Dolby Pro Logic® surround sound, you can add to the realism of the sound by using the TV's internal speakers as center channel speakers.

You will need:

- one pair of audio cables
- one single audio cable for the audio center channel
- one video cable




#### Note:

Refer to the instructions provided with your A/V receiver for details about your surround sound system.

When the Audio Center Channel ON/OFF switch is in the ON position, the TV speakers will function only as center channel speakers.


Adjust the volume for the center channel speakers using the center level control on the A/V receiver.

To use the TV speakers as normal speakers, set the Audio Center Channel ON/OFF switch to the OFF position.



#### Caution:

To avoid damaging the speakers, turn the TV off before connecting or disconnecting the Audio Center Channel audio cable.

#### Using the remote control


#### Preparing the remote control for use

With the remote control, you can operate your TV, most VCR models, and cable TV converters together, even if they are different brands. If you will be using your TV with a Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter, your remote control is already programmed and ready to use. If you own different brands of VCRs and/or converters, you must program the remote control. (See "Programming the remote control for use with a non-Toshiba VCR or a cable TV converter" on page 13.)


#### Installing the remote control batteries

To install the batteries:

1. Slide the battery cover off the back of the remote control.



2. Install two "AA" size alkaline batteries. Match the + and - signs on the batteries to the signs on the battery compartment.



3. Slide the battery cover back on to the remote control until the lock snaps.

# Using the remote control with a Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter

To control a Toshiba VCR:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the VCR position. The shaded buttons shown at right will then control the VCR. The unshaded buttons will operate the TV as usual.

If you own different brands of VCRs, program the remote control to recognize the brand of your VCR. (See "Programming the remote control for use with a non-Toshiba VCR or a cable TV converter" on page 13.)

To control a Toshiba cable TV converter:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the CABLE position. The shaded buttons shown at right will control the cable TV converter.

#### Note:

Your TV's remote control may not operate certain features on your VCR, cable TV converter, or other electronic device.

Refer to the owner's manuals for your other devices to determine their available features.


If your TV's remote control does not operate a specific feature on a device, use the remote control that came with the device.

#### Caution:

- Dispose of batteries in a designated disposal area. Do not throw batteries into a fire.
- Do not mix battery types or combine used batteries with new ones.
- If the batteries are dead or if you will not use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries to prevent battery acid from leaking into the battery compartment.

#### Note:

 Battery life expectancy is about one year with normal use.




# Programming the remote control for use with a non-Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter

The TV remote control is pre-programmed to operate Toshiba VCRs and cable TV converters. To use the remote control to operate a non-Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter, follow the steps below to program the remote control.

- 1. Refer to the "VCR code table" or "Cable TV converter code table" on pages 14–15 to find the corresponding code for your VCR or cable TV converter brand.
  - If more than one code is listed, try each one separately until you find the one that works.
- 2. If you are reprogramming the remote control to operate your:
  - VCR: Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to VCR.
  - Cable TV converter: Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to CABLE.
- 3. White holding down the RECALL button, press the Number buttons (0-9) to enter the three-digit code for your VCR or cable TV converter.
- 4. Point the remote control at the VCR or converter and press POWER to test the code.
  - If the VCR responds, you have entered the correct code. If the VCR or converter does not respond, you may have entered the wrong code. Repeat steps 1–4 using another code.
- 5. Reset the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to TV to control the TV.

#### Note

- Each time you replace the batteries, you must reprogram the remote control.
- Some newer VCRs are capable of working on either of two remote codes. These VCRs have a switch labeled "VCR1/VCR2." If your VCR has this kind of switch and does not respond to any of the codes for your VCR brand, set the switch to the other position (VCR1 or VCR2) and reprogram the remote control.







#### Learning about the menu system

After you have installed the batteries and programmed the remote control, you will need to set some preferences on the TV using the menu system. You can access the menus using the buttons on your TV or remote control.



To program channels automatically:


#### Adjusting the color convergence

This projection TV uses three separate TV tubes: red, green, and blue. The red, green, and blue images are projected onto the screen where they converge to form a full-color picture. You can see a clear picture only when the three images converge correctly. Convergence may drift over time or if you move the TV. If you can see clear images on your TV screen, skip this procedure.

Make this adjustment after the TV has been on for at least 30 minutes.

To use the TOUCH FOCUS (auto convergence) button:


Press TOUCH FOCUS on the TV once. The TV will enter the auto convergence mode and correctly adjust convergence automatically.



When the adjustment is complete, the normal picture reappears. If the error message "Touch Focus Error" appears, retry the TOUCH FOCUS adjustment or adjust the convergence manually, as described below.



#### Switching between two channels

You can switch between two channels without entering an actual channel number each time.


The POP (picture-out-picture) feature splits the screen into a double window that allows you to watch two programs at the same time. The POP program can come from a TV broadcast or an external source, such as a VCR.

1. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight CLEAR ALL, and then press ▶ or ◀.



#### **Locking video inputs**

With the VIDEO LOCK feature, you can lock out the input sources (Video 1, Video 2, Video 3, ColorStream HD1, ColorStream HD2) and channels 3 and 4.

You will not be able to select the input sources with the TV/VIDEO button or Channel buttons unless you clear the setting.

To set up the video lock:

- 1. From the LOCKS menu, select VIDEO LOCK.
- 2. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the level of video locking you want (Video, Video+, or Off), as follows:


VIDEO: Locks Video 1, Video 2, Video 3, ColorStream HD1 and HD2.




#### Using the front panel lock feature

Lock the front panel buttons to prevent the buttons from being pressed accidentally (by children, for example). When the front panel lock is in ON mode, all control buttons on the TV front panel (except POWER) do not operate.

To lock the front panel:

- 1. From the LOCKS menu, select FRONT PANEL LOCK.
- 2. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight ON.








## Saving new preference



## Using the ALS (Automatic Light Sensor) feature

ALS senses the room ambient light and automatically adjusts the picture contrast for varying light conditions. For example, when the room is dark, the ALS will automatically reduce the contrast (which reduces eye strain). ALS is energized when the ALS menu is set to ON.

To activate the ALS:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press  $\triangle$  or  $\nabla$  to highlight ALS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight ON. The CONTRAST setting changes to AUTO, and is not adjustable while the ALS feature is on.





## Selecting the cinema mode




# **Selecting the video input source**

Press the TV/VIDEO button on the remote control or TV to view a signal coming from another device connected to your TV, such as a VCR or video disc player (see illustrations below). You can select ANT 1, VIDEO 1, VIDEO 2, VIDEO 3, ColorStream HD1, ColorStream HD2, or ANT 2, depending on which input jacks are used for connecting the devices (see "Connecting your TV" on page 5).



Pressing TV/VIDEO on the remote control displays the current signal source (press TV/VIDEO again or 0–6 to change)

#### Note:

- When ColorStream HD 1 or HD 2 is selected, the video OUT jack does not output a signal. To receive a video OUT signal, use a video or S-video IN connection instead of a ColorStream connection.

# Using the closed caption feature


The closed caption feature has two options:

- Captions—An on-screen display of the dialogue, narration, and sound effects of TV programs and videos that are closed captioned (usually marked as "CC" in TV listings).
- Text—An on-screen display of information not related to the current program, such as weather or stock data (when provided by individual stations).

To view captions or text:

- 1. Tune the TV to the desired program.
- 2. Press C.CAPT to select a closed caption mode (C1 through C4, T1 through T4, or OFF).

Note: Every time C.CAPT is pressed, the closed caption mode will change.




• To view captions, highlight C1, C2, C3, or C4 (C1 displays translation of the primary language in your area).

**Note:** If the program or video you selected is not closed captioned, no captions will display on the screen.




• To view text, highlight T1, T2, T3, or T4.

**Note:** If text is not available in your area, a black rectangle may appear on your screen. If this happens, turn the Closed Caption feature OFF.



 To turn off the Closed Caption feature: Highlight OFF in step 3.



#### Note:

A closed caption signal may not display in the following situations:

- · when a videotape has been dubbed
- · when the signal reception is weak
- · when the signal reception is nonstandard

# **Setting the sleep timer**

To set the sleep timer to turn the TV off automatically:

1. Press TIMER to set the length of time until the TV turns off.



Every time you press the button, the time display will increase by 10 minutes, up to 180 minutes.





# Setting the clock

To set the clock:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the SET UP menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight CLOCK SET.
- 3. After the number position starts to blink, press the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter the correct time. The clock operates on a 12-hour cycle.
- 4. Press ENTER to start the clock.



To display the amount of time left until the TV turns off automatically, press TIMER once.

If the TV's power source is interrupted (the power cord is unplugged or a power failure occurs), the clock must be reset.

# Adjusting the sound

## Muting the sound

Press MUTE to temporarily turn off the sound. While the sound is off, the screen will display the word "1/2 MUTE" or "MUTE" in the lower right corner. Every time you press the button, the mute mode will change in the following order.

When you select "MUTE" mode, the closed caption feature is automatically activated. To deactivate this feature, press MUTE again. This feature works only when the closed caption mode is set to OFF. See "Using the closed caption feature" on page 42 for more information.


## Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts

The multi-channel TV sound (MTS) feature allows you to listen to high-fidelity stereo sound while watching TV. MTS can also transmit a second audio program (SAP) containing a second language, music, or other audio information (when provided by individual stations).

When the TV receives a stereo or SAP broadcast, the word STEREO or SAP appears on-screen every time the TV is turned on, the channel is changed, or the RECALL button is pressed.

The MTS feature is not available when the TV is in VIDEO mode. To listen to stereo sound:


- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight STEREO.




You can leave your TV in STEREO mode because it will automatically output the type of sound being broadcast (stereo or monaural). The word "STEREO" or "SAP" displays in yellow in the menu when the TV receives the signal.

If the stereo sound is noisy, select MONO to reduce the noise. To listen to SAP (if available):

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press  $\triangle$  or  $\nabla$  to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight SAP. You will hear the station's second audio program (if available) from the speakers, while viewing the original program's picture (see note at right).





#### Note:

A second audio program (SAP) can be heard only on those TV stations that offer it.

For example, a station might broadcast music as a second audio program. If you have SAP on, you will see the current program on the screen but hear music instead of the program's normal audio.

However, if you have SAP on, and the station you are watching is not currently broadcasting a second audio program, you will see the picture but not hear any sound. If this happens, put the TV in STEREO mode so you can hear the station's normal audio.

### Using the SRS 3D surround sound feature

The SRS 3D surround sound feature expands the audio listening field wider and deeper to create exceptional sound quality from the TV's speakers. The feature uses stereo signals from a TV broadcast or video input.

To turn on the SRS 3D surround:

- 1. Select STEREO mode (see "Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts" on page 44).
- 2. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the THEATER menu appears.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight SRS 3D.
- 4. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight ON.



To turn off the SRS 3D surround:

Highlight OFF in step 4 above.


In general, you can leave your TV in ON mode because it will automatically produce the type of sound being broadcast (surround stereo or monaural).

## Adjusting the sound quality

You can change the quality of your TV's sound by adjusting the bass, treble, and balance.

To adjust the sound quality:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press  $\triangle$  or  $\nabla$  to highlight the item to adjust.




- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to adjust the level.
- ◀ makes the sound quality weaker or decreases the balance in the right channel, depending on the item selected.
- > makes the sound quality stronger or decreases the balance in the left channel, depending on the item selected.

#### Note:

When the SRS 3D surround sound feature is selected, the StableSound™ feature is automatically turned off (see page 48).

If the broadcast is monaural, the SRS 3D effect does not work.



## Resetting audio adjustments



To reset the audio adjustments:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight RESET.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶. The menu displays "DONE."




## Using the sub-bass system (SBS)

The sub-bass system allows you to enhance bass performance, even when the volume is low.



- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight SBS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight ON.







## Turning off the built-in speakers

Use this feature to turn the TV speakers off when you connect an audio system (see "Connecting an audio system" on page 11).

To turn off the built-in speakers:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight SPEAKERS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight OFF.



To turn on the built-in speakers:

Highlight ON in step 3 above.

# **Selecting the Audio OUT sound**

This feature allows you to select the sound source (MAIN or POP) that is output from the Audio OUT jacks.

This is useful when amplifying or recording the POP sound with external equipment while hearing the sound of the main picture through the built-in speakers.

To select the Audio OUT sound:


- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight AUDIO OUT.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to select MAIN or POP.



- MAIN: Outputs the sound of the main program.
- POP : Outputs the sound of the POP program.

#### Note:

Make sure the volume control of your audio amplifier is set to a moderate listening level.



## Using the StableSound™ feature

When the signal source is changed, the StableSound feature limits the high volume level to prevent extreme changes in volume (for example, to prevent the sudden increase in volume that often happens when a TV program switches to a commercial).

To turn on the StableSound feature:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight STABLE SOUND.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to select ON.




# Selecting the background of the menu display

You can change the background of the menu display by selecting from two preset types: shaded and solid (gray).







# Viewing the demonstration mode

The demonstration mode is an option available in the MENU button on the TV front panel that will demonstrate several of your TV's features.

To start the demo:

Press and hold the MENU button on the TV front panel for 4 seconds.

To stop the demo:

Press RECALL, EXIT, or POWER.

# Understanding the auto power off feature

The TV will automatically turn itself off after approximately 15 minutes if it is tuned to a vacant channel or a station that completes its broadcast for the day. This feature does not work in VIDEO mode.

# Understanding the last mode memory feature

If the power is cut off while you are viewing the TV, the Last Mode Memory feature turns the TV on automatically when the power is resupplied.

If the power is going to be off for a long time and you are going to be away from the TV, unplug the power cord to prevent the TV from turning on in your absence.

# **Troubleshooting**

During this period, TACP and THI will repair or replace a defective picture tube at their option, with a new or refurbished picture tube, without charge to you, except that if a defective picture tube is replaced after one (1) year from the date of the original retail purchase, you pay labor charges involved in the replacement.

#### **Rental Units**

The warranty for rental units begins with the first rental or thirty (30) days from the date of shipment to the rental firm, whichever comes first.

#### **Commercial Units**

Products sold and used for commercial use have a limited ninety (90) day warranty for all parts, labor and picture tube.

### **Owner's Manual and Demographic Card**

You should read this owner's manual thoroughly before operating this product. You should complete and mail the enclosed Demographic card within ten days after you., or the person who has given you this product as a gift, purchased this product.
