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1. Getting started

WARNING

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture and low temperature.
- · Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.

HANDSET RANGE

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

SIGNAL STRENGTH

When out of range of the base, the screen shows Searching.... If you are on a call, the line will hang up. Move back within in range. The handset will automatically re-connect to the base.

Setting up

The base must be plugged into the electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord into the wall jack until the handset is fully charged. Only use the power adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

WHICH POWER ADAPTER

The power adapter with the smaller round pin plug is for the base unit and the power adapter with the bigger round pin plug is for the charger unit.



Connecting the base



- Plug the power adapter with smaller pin plug & telephone line cord into the base. Power adapter with bigger pin plug is for charger (for multi-handset pack only).
- 2. Plug the other end of the power adapter & telephone line cord into the wall jack.
- 3. Always use the telephone line cord provided in the box.
- 4. Use only the provided power adapter.

Install and charge the handset battery pack



- 1. Slide out the battery compartment cover.
- Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, with the battery connector plugged in, as shown.
- 3. Slide the battery compartment cover back.
- Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 24 hours. When the handset is fully charged the i will indicate that it is fully charged.
- 5. Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided.



BATTERY LOW WARNING

If the **T** flashes in the display, you will need to recharge the handset before you can use it again. During charging, the **T** will scroll in the display.

BATTERY PERFORMANCE

In ideal conditions, a fully charged battery pack should give up to 10 hours talk time or up to 160 hours standby time on a single charge.

Note that new battery packs do not reach full capacity until they have been in normal use for several days.

To keep your battery packs in the best condition, leave the handset off the base for a few hours at a time.

Running the battery packs all the way down at least once a week will help them last as long as possible.


The charge capacity of rechargeable battery packs will reduce with time as they wear out, giving the handset less talk/standby time. Eventually they will need to be replaced.

After charging your handset for the first time, subsequent charging time is about 6-8 hours a day. The battery pack and handset may become warm during charging. This is normal.



2. Getting to know your phone

Overview of your handset



1 Scroll up/ Volume up

In menu mode: press to scroll up. In editing mode: press to move cursor to the left. During a call, press to increase volume. Calls list/phonebook/redial list entry: press to scroll up the list. In answering machine mode: press to increase volume.

2 Right soft key (Menu/Select)

In idle mode: press to access menu list. In menu/editing mode: press to confirm and save the settings. During a call: press to hold a call.

In phonebook/calls list entry: press to access the sub-menu list.

3 Right/ Calls list

In idle mode/during a call: press to access calls list. In editing mode: press to move the cursor to the right.

4 Scroll down/ Volume down/ Redial list

In idle/pre-dial mode: press to access redial list. In menu mode: press to scroll down.

In editing mode: press to move cursor to the right.

During a call, press to decrease volume.

Calls list/phonebook/redial list entry: press to scroll down the list. In answering machine mode: press to decrease volume.

5 Talk off/ Back

In menu/editing mode/phonebook entry: press to exit to previous level.



In pre-dial mode/calls list/redial list entry/answering machine mode: press to exit to idle.

During a call: press to end a call.

6 Alphanumeric keypad

In idle/pre-dial/editing mode/during a call: press to enter characters/numbers. Long press to activate speed dial.

7 #/ Pause/ ABC/ Format

In idle/pre-dial/number editing mode/during a call: Press to insert a "#", press and hold to insert a pause. In name editing mode: press to toggle ABC/Abc/abc. In calls list entry: press to toggle Caller ID display format between 7, 8, 10 and 11 diaits.

8 Intercom

In idle mode/during a call: press to initiate an intercom call.

9 Microphone

10 Speaker

In idle/menu/pre-dial mode/during a call: press to turn on/off the speakerphone.

Calls List/phonebook/redial list entry: press to make a call with speakerphone.

In answering machine mode: press to toggle the message playback via earpiece/speakerphone.

11 */ Ťone

In idle/pre-dial/editing mode: press to insert a "*".

During a call: press to switch from pulse to tone dialing

temporarily if pulse mode was selected before. After the call is ended, the dial mode will change back to pulse.

12 Talk on/ Flash

In idle/menu/pre-dial mode: press to make a call. Calls List/phonebook/redial list entry: press to make a call to the selected entry.

During a call: press to make a flash.

During ringing: press to answer a call.

13 Left/ Phonebook

In idle mode/during a call: press to access the phonebook. In editing mode: press to move the cursor to the left.

14 Left soft key (Answering machine/Mute/Clear)

In idle mode: press to play the voice prompt of answering machine main menu.

In menu mode: press to exit to previous level.

In pre-dial/editing mode: press to delete one character/digit. Long press to delete all characters/digits.

During a call: press to mute/unmute the call.

In calls list entry: press to delete the entry.

In phonebook entry: press view entry or add new entry when phonebook is empty.

In answering machine mode: press to delete the current message playback.



Overview of the base



1 FIND

Press to find/page all registered handsets.

2 Charging LED - Green

Steadily ON: When the handset is put into base cradle for charging.

3 In Use LED - Red

Steadily ON: During a call or when an extension phone (another registered handset) or the built-in answering machine is off hook.

Flashing at a rate similar to the incoming ring pattern: During an incoming call.

Flash at a rate of 0.5s on and 0.5s off for 2 minutes: During paging / Registration.

4 VOLUME +

Increase the loudspeaker volume by one level (0 to 8) in idle, during message playback or during call screening.

5 PLAY/ STOP

In message playback mode: Press to playback or stop playing messages.

6 SKIP FORWARD/ MEMO

Press to skip to play the next message.

In Idle: Press and hold to hear a voice prompt for recording a memo and then start to record a memo. Release key to stop recording memo.

7 DELETE

During message playback: Delete the current message. In Idle: Press and hold to erase all read messages (applicable only when messages in answering machine are all read, new message(s) will not be deleted.)

8 VOLUME -

Decrease the loudspeaker volume by one level (0 to 8) in idle, during message playback or during call screening.

9 SKIP BACKWARD

Press twice or press once within 4 seconds, counting from the beginning of date/time stamp, to playback the previous message.

Press once after 4 seconds, counting from the beginning of date/time stamp, to replay current message from the beginning.

10 ANNOUNCE

In Idle: Short press to play the current announcement. In Idle: Press and hold to hear a voice prompt of how to record the personalized announcement of the current answer mode, release key to stop recording.

11 ANSWER ON/OFF/ ANSWER MODE

Press to toggle answering machine mode between Answer Off, Announce Only and Annc & Record mode.

2-digit 7-seg Behavior Base display

- -

- Answering machine is OFF.
- Image: Image state
 Steadily ON: No voice messages in answering machine.
- 29 Flash in idle: Indicates the number of answering machine messages and that there is an unread message. (e.g. there are 9 answering machine messages in total. Total number of messages is from 1 to 59.)

Flash during message playing: The selected answering machine message is being played.

Steadily On: All the new messages have been read and there are 9 answering machine messages in total.

- F Flashing: Answering machine memory is full.
- Flashing -: Time is not set and there are old voice messages kept in the answering machine memory only (no new voice messages).



- E ≡ / 0.9 Blinking between ≡ ≡ / 0.9: Personalized announcement or memo is being recorded. The numbers (e.g. 0.9) indicate the total number of messages in answering machine when playing announcement.
 - In Flashing: Indicates an incoming call / recording of an incoming call.
 - Represents Announce Only mode.
 - *L R* Flashing: Line Remote access is in progress.
- LR/09 Blinking between LR/09: Remote access is in progress and the numbers (e.g.09) indicate the total number of messages.
 - L 3 Steadily ON: Indicates the base speaker volume level is 3. Nine volume levels from L0 to L8 are provided (L0 means ringer off). L 3 disappears after 3 seconds.

Paging is a useful way of finding lost handsets.

- 1. Press 🔊 on the base.
 - All handsets ring.
- 2. To stop the paging call, press 🐵 again, or place the handset on the cradle or press any key on the handset.

Navigating the menus

1. Press 💽

2. Press 0 to scroll through the menu.

3. Press) to open a sub-menu or validate an option.

Press 🖾 to go back to previous menu level or cancel an action.

If you do not press any button on the handset for 30 seconds the display will automatically return to standby. It will also return to standby when the handset is placed on the base or charger.

3. Using the phone

3.1 Calls

3.1.1 Make a call

- 1. Press 🖍 or 🖽.
- 2. Enter the phone number (maximum 32 digits). If you make a mistake, press ⊡ to delete a digit.

3.1.2 Predial

- **2.** Press \mathbf{x} or \mathbf{x} to dial the phone number entered.

3.1.3 Dial one touch numbers 1 to 9

Press and hold a key from to until the number is displayed and dialed.

NOTE

You need to set the one touch number first.

- If no number is stored, you hear a beep.

3.1.4 Call from the phonebook

- 1. Press \odot . The first entry in the phonebook is displayed.
- 2. Scroll 💿 to the entry you want.

3. Press s or et to dial the number.

TIPS

Instead of scrolling to browse the phonebook entries, press the numeric key corresponding to the first letter of the entry you wish to locate. For example, pressing $2^{\pm\pm}$ will show the entries starting with A. Pressing $2^{\pm\pm}$ again will show the entries starting with B, etc.

3.1.5 Call from the calls list NOTE

You need to subscribe to your network's Caller ID service to be able to see the caller's number in the calls list. See section "5. Caller ID" for more details.

- **1.** Press \bigcirc . The first entry in the calls list is displayed.
- 2. Scroll (a) to the entry you want.
- 3. Press or dial the number.

3.1.6 Call from the redial list

The last five numbers called are saved and can be redialed later.

- 1. Press O. The first entry in the redial list is displayed.
- 2. Scroll (a) to the entry you want.
- 3. Press or dial the number.



3.1.7 Answer a call

- 1. When the phone rings and flashes in the display, press

WARNING

When the phone is ringing, avoid holding the earpiece too close to your ear as it may damage your hearing. Handsfree activation can suddenly increase the volume in the earpiece to a very high level. Make sure the handset is not too close to your ear.

TIPS

If Auto Talk mode is on, simply lift up the handset from its base to answer the call. The default setting is Off.

NOTE

An incoming call has priority over other events. Whenever there is an incoming call, other operations in progress such as phone settings, menu navigation, etc. will be ended.

3.1.8 Adjust volume

- 1. During a call, press (a) to adjust the earpiece or loudspeaker volume.
 - The level is shown in the handset display.

3.1.9 Mute

Mute the microphone so that you can talk to someone else in the room without your caller hearing you.

- 1. During a call, press $\overline{\cdot \cdot}$.
 - The microphone is muted.
- 2. Press 🖸 again to turn the microphone back on.

3.1.10 End a call

1. During a call, press 🖾 or put the handset on the cradle. After you hang up, the duration of your call will display for around 2 seconds.

3.2 Intercom

This feature is only available when there are at least 2 registered handsets. It allows you to make internal calls, transfer external calls from one handset to another and use the conference option.

3.2.1 Call another handset

- 1. Press 🔄
- Press (a) to the handset you want to call.
- **3.** Press) to call the handset.
- 4. Press 🖾 to hang up.

NOTE

If the handset is not within the valid operation range, this function may not be available.

3.2.2 Transfer an external call to another handset

- **1.** During an external call, press .
 - Your caller is put on hold.
- 2. Press <u>i</u> to the handset you want to call.
- 3. Press : to call the handset.
- When the other handset answers by pressing b or
 , press f to transfer the call. If the called handset does not answer, press f to talk to your caller again.

3.2.3 Three-party conference call

- 1. During an external call, press or end on the other handset to join the conference call.
- **2.** Press $\widehat{\square}$ or put the handset to the cradle to hang up.

3.3 Voicemail

Voice Mail Waiting Indication **1** is an indication given to you when a new voice mail message is waiting on the network service provider. This feature is available if you have subscribed to the voicemail service from your network service provider.

3.3.1 Clear voice mail indication

- 1. Press 🖸 and 💿 to select Reset Settings.
- 2. Press 🕑 to select Clear Voice Mail.
- 3. Press : to select Yes.
- 4. Press 🕑 to clear voice mail indication.



4. Phonebook

The phonebook memory can store up to 100 names and numbers

NOTE

Numbers can be up to 24 digits long and names up to 16 characters long. Entries are stored in alphabetical order.

View an Entry 4.1

- Press it to the entry you want.
- Press i to view the entry.

NOTE

If the number is more than 16 digits, the phone will display the next page of remaining digits after 2 seconds.

4.2 Add an Entry

- 1. Press (••)
- If the list is empty, Phonebook is Empty will be displayed. Press 7 to select Add.

If there are entries in the phonebook, press (a) to the entry vou want. Press \. to select Add.

- 3. Press) and enter the number
- Press) and enter the name.
- 5. Press) and (a) to select a melody.
- 6. Press) to save settings.

Enter a pause

If your phone is connected to a switchboard, you may need to enter a pause in a stored number. This gives the switchboard time to get an outside line. A pause is normally stored after the switchboard access code (e.g. 9).

 When storing a number, press == twice to input a pause and the display will show P. You can then continue storing the phone number.

4.3 Edit an Entry

- 1. Press 💿.
- Press <u>i</u> to select the entry you want.
- 3. Press i and i to select Edit.
- 4. Press ` and edit the number.
- 5. Press i and edit the name.
- **6.** Press \sum and \bigcirc to select a melody.
- 7. Press i to save the entry.

NOTE

Press 🗹 to delete a digit/character or press and hold 💽 to delete all digits/characters.

4.4 Delete an Entry

- Press
 ●.
- 2. Press it is select the entry you want.
- 3. Press 🖸 and 💿 to select Delete.
- **4.** Press $\overline{}$ to delete the entry.

4.5 Delete all Entries

- 1. Press 💽.
- 2. Press i and i to select Delete All.
- 3. Press : Delete Entire Phonebook? will be displayed.
- **4.** Press $\overline{}$ to delete all the entries.

4.6 View Phonebook Capacity

- **1.** Press <u>.</u>.
- 2. Press 🖸 and 💿 to select PB Capacity.
- 3. Press 🕑 to view.

4.7 Store a Phonebook Entry as a One Touch Number

- **1.** Press 💿.
- 2. Press $\overline{}$ and $\overline{\underline{\circ}}$ to select Speed Dial.



- **3.** Press $\underline{)}$ and $\underline{\bigcirc}$ to select the speed dial key 1 to 9.
- **4.** Press $\underline{\bigcirc}$ and $\underline{\bigcirc}$ to the entry you want.
- 5. Press 🕑 to save.

4.8 Change the Phonebook Entry in a One Touch Number

- 1. Follow steps 1 to 3 in "4.7 Store a Phonebook Entry as a One Touch Number".
- **2.** Press $\underline{)}$ and the stored number will be displayed.
- **3.** Press $\underline{)}$ to edit the entry.
- 4. Press $\underline{)}$ and $\underline{\circ}$ to select the entry you want.
- **5.** Press) to save the entry.

4.9 Delete a One Touch Number

- 1. Follow steps 1 to 3 in "4.7 Store a Phonebook Entry as a One Touch Number".
- **2.** Press $\underline{)}$ and the stored number will be displayed.
- **3.** Press \mathbf{b} to delete the stored number.

4.10 Copy Phonebook Entry to Another Handset

- Press (2).
- Press <u>i</u> to select the entry you want.
- Press <u></u> and <u></u>
 to select Copy Phonebook.
- I. Press i and i to select another registered handset.
- **5.** Press) to start transferring phonebook entry.
- Accept Phonebook Entries From Handset X? will be displayed on another handset where X denotes the number of handsets. Press in on another handset to accept.



5. Caller ID

If you have subscribed to Caller ID, and if the identity of the caller is not withheld, the number of the caller will be displayed together with the date and time of the call (if provided by the network).

NOTE

- If the telephone number is not available for incoming calls, the handset will display Unavailable.
- If the incoming call is from a withheld telephone number, the handset will display Private.
- Information about incoming calls will vary by country and network operator. Some operators may charge a subscription for their Caller ID service.

5.1 Calls List

The calls list contains details of missed and received calls. Details include the date and time of the call. Entries are displayed in chronological order with the most recent call at the top of the list.

NOTE

- When the calls list is full, a new call replaces the oldest in the list.
- The received and missed calls log holds details of up to 30 calls.
- If you receive more than one call from the same number, only the most recent call is kept in the calls list. When you have missed calls (incoming calls that you haven't answered) the transition will be displayed in the display on all handsets registered to the base. If one handset is used to view the calls log, the icon on the other handsets remains on (For multi-pack use only).

5.1.1 View the calls list

- **1.** Press \odot to enter the calls list.
- 2. If the list is empty, Call log is Empty will be displayed.

If there are entries in the calls list, press $\fbox{}$ to scroll through the calls list.

NOTE

When reviewing an entry from the calls list, press == repeatedly to display the number in a different format.



For example, if a caller number is displayed as 888-331-3383, the various formats will be:

331-3383

- 1-331-3383
- 888-331-3383
- 1-888-331-3383

You can choose the desired number format for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving it into the phonebook.

The <u>New</u> icon is removed once the new call has been viewed.

5.1.2 Save a number from the calls list to the phonebook

- 1. Press 💮 to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press 🙆 to the entry you want.
- 3. Press 🕑 to select Save to PB.
- 4. Press i and edit the number.
- **5.** Press) and enter the name.
- **6.** Press \sum and (a) to select a melody.
- 7. Press 🕑 to save.

5.1.3 Delete a calls list entry

- 1. Press 💮 to enter the calls list.
- Press <a>

 to the entry you want.
- **3.** Press $\overline{\cdot}$ to delete the entry.

5.1.4 Delete entire calls list

- 2. Press \sum and a to select Delete all.
- 3. Press 🗋 and Delete All Calls? will be displayed.
- 4. Press 🖸 to confirm and all entries will be deleted.

5.2 Redial

Your phone lets you redial any of the last 5 numbers called. Numbers can be up to 32 digits long.

5.2.1 View the redial list

- 1. Press (2) to enter the redial list. The last number dialed will be displayed.
- 2. Scroll (a) through the redial list.



5.2.2 Copy a redial number to the phonebook

- 1. Press (a) to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press (a) to select the entry you want.
- 3. Press i to select Save to PB.
- 4. Press i and edit the number.
- 5. Press i and enter the name.
- **6.** Press \sum and \bigcirc to select a melody.
- 7. Press 🕑 to save.

5.2.3 Delete a redial list entry

- 1. Press (a) to enter the redial list.
- 2. Press it select the entry you want.
- **3.** Press \cdot to delete the entry.

5.2.4 Delete entire redial list

- 1. Press (a) to enter the redial list.
- Press i and i to select Delete All.
- 3. Press ` and Delete All Redial Numbers? will be displayed.
- 4. Press $\overline{}$ to confirm and all entries will be deleted.

6. Personal Settings

6.1 Set Date & Time

Providing you have subscribed to your network's Caller ID service, the date and time is set automatically for all handsets every time a call is received. The date and time is recorded with each answering machine message you receive. If you do not have a Caller ID service you can set the date and time manually.

- 1. Press 💽 to select Date/Time.
- Press ∴ and edit the time in 12 hour format. Press to toggle AM/PM settings.

TIPS

You can press O to move the cursor to toggle the input fields Hour and Minute.

3. Press $\overline{}$ and edit the date.

TIPS

You can press O to move the cursor to toggle the input fields Year, Month and Date.

4. Press) to save the settings.

When the phone is ringing, avoid holding the earpiece too close to your ear as it may damage your hearing.

6.2.1 Set the ringer tone

- 1. Press 🗋 and 💿 to select Setup Handset.
- 2. Press 🗋 to select Ringer Tone.
- 3. Press ⊡ and ^(©) to select a ringer melody. The current ringer melody is played for around 5 seconds.
