Power requirements

This product requires an electrical supply of 220-240 volts, alternating monophased power, excluding IT installations defined in standard EN 60950. In case of power failure, the communication can be lost.

Warning ! The electrical network is classified as hazardous according to criteria in the standard EN 60950. The only way to power down this product is to unplug the power supply unit from the electrical outlet. Ensure the electrical outlet is located close to the apparatus and is always easily accessible.

Redial list, mute key & Softkey Back

- In idle mode, short press to access the Redial list.
- In talk mode, to mute/ unmute the handset microphone.
- In edit mode, to cancel last digit.
- In phonebook mode, to view number and name.
- In Call log to switch from name/number to time/date.

Navigation keys

2 Paging key 🕥

The paging key enables you to locate a missing handset if the handset is in range and has charged batteries. Press the key until the handset starts to ring. Once retrieved, press paging key again to end paging. The display gives information about the operation of your telephone. Following icons can be shown in the headline of the display:



When being used for the first time, it is sometimes necessary to wait until the battery is sufficiently charged before the icons appear on the display.

When ON the battery is fully charged. **When blinking**, this symbol indicates that the battery needs to be charged.

An external call is in progress. When blinking, this symbol indicates that there is an internal call in progress or that the line is already busy.

New message(s) on your voice mailbox. When blinking, this symbol indicates that there is one or more new message(s) on the answer machine.

New Call log records or Call log records are being reviewed.

Phonebook is accessed.

The alarm clock is activated.

The handset loudspeaker is activated.

The ringtone is deactivated.

The handset is registered and in range of the base. When blinking, this symbol indicates that the handset is not registered to the base or out of range.

OK Turn ON when entering Menu mode. In Phonebook mode to enter next menu level.

Back Turn ON when entering Menu mode. In Phonebook mode to return to higher menu level. In editing mode to delete the last digit/character entered.

Indicates further options are available.

Installing the base station

Place your product close enough to the telephone and mains power sockets so that the cables will reach. To properly install the base station, plug the line cord and the power cable into the base station. Plug the cord and the cable into the wall. If you have a broadband DSL Internet connection, please make sure you have one DSL filter plugged directly on each line socket used in the house and check the modem and the phone are plugged in the correct filter slot (one specific for each).

Warning ! The electrical network is classified as hazardous according to criteria in the standard EN 60-950. The only way to power down this product is to unplug the power supply from the electrical outlet. Ensure the electrical outlet is located close to the apparatus and is always easily accessible.

Please take care that the power supply and telephone line are connected to the correct sockets as incorrect placement could damage your equipment.

Warning ! Always use the line cable provided with the product otherwise you may not have a dialling tone.

Installing the batteries



Installing and replacing the batteries in the handset

To insert the batteries, open the battery cover, place the batteries as indicated and then replace the battery cover. When the battery icon is blinking, charge is needed. Allow 24 hours for the batteries to fully charge. On first use it may be necessary to wait for a few minutes before seeing symbols on the display.



Warning : the base station must always be plugged into the mains when charging or when in use. Always use rechargeable batteries.

The warranty does not apply to the batteries and any other components which have a limited lifetime or are exposed to wear.



Warning ! Always use the line cable provided with the product otherwise you may not have a dialling tone.

Batteries should not be disposed of with general household waste.

Battery life and range

Optimal battery life is reached after 3 cycles of complete charging & discharging. When reaching the range limit and the conversation becomes crackly, move closer to the base. To reach optimal range, place the base station away from electrical appliances.

Using GAP standard compliance

The GAP standard guarantees that all DECTTM GAP handsets and base stations comply with a minimum operating standard irrespective of their make. Your CD 135 handset and base station are GAP compliant, which means the minimum guaranteed functions are : register a handset, take the line, receive a call and dial. The advanced features may not be available if you use another handset than a CD 135 with your base station.

To register and use your CD 135 handset with a GAP standard base station of a different make, first follow the procedure described in the manufacturer's instructions, then follow the procedure described on page 31.

To register a handset of another make to the CD135 base station, place the base station into registration mode (page 31), then follow the procedure in the manufacturer's instructions.

Chain Dialing

If you have entered in your phonebook for example only the main number of a company without the extension, this feature allows you to add the subnumber (extension) of a particular person and to dial out this number.

The default value of dial mode that is preset in your CD 135 should be the best suited for your country network and therefore you should not need to change it.



To set or change Call Barring

This menu allows you to limit the use of your phone to specific calls by barring parts (prefix) of outgoing numbers. You can set 4 different barring numbers.





Advanced settings

- 5. Scroll $\stackrel{[]}{\underline{\Box}}$ to select the barring number location **I**, **2**, **3** or **4** and press $\overline{\Box}$.
- Enter the barring number ⁶⁵⁶/₆₆₆ (the maximums for the barring number is 4 digits) and press to confirm.

Note: For example if you want to bar international calls, enter the barring number 00.

To activate / deactivate Call Barring



To set or deactivate the prefix number

This feature allows you to set the phone to use the cheapest operator prefix. The maximum length of the prefix is 5 digits. Once the prefix number is set, it is automatically inserted at the beginning of each number dialed out.



until "----" (blank prefix number) is shown on the screen and press to confirm.

To set or change an SOS number

The SOS number feature allows you to enter 3 SOS phone numbers, which can be dialed out although the call barring is activated. The maximum length of an SOS number is 4 digits. The PIN code is required when modify the SOS number.



To register a handset

Up to 5 handsets can be registered to the base station.

If you have inadvertently unregistered your handset, you can register it again. Additional handsets must be registered to the base before use.

Warning: If you wish to register non Philips handsets to the CD 135 base station, make sure that this handset is GAP compliant otherwise it will not operate properly (see page 11).

To register a handset, first press the paging key () on the base for approx. 5 seconds when the base is in idle mode. Then carry out the following steps on the handset within one minute :

Press and press Down to reach ADVANCE SET.
 Press and press Down to reach REGISTRATION.
 Press react, enter the PIN code is 0000) and press reaction to confirm.

If the registration was successfull, a long confirmation tone is heard and the handset number (1 to 5) will be assigned by the base automatically.

The CD 135 includes an answer machine that records unanswered calls when it is activated. The maximum recording time is 15 minutes, outgoing messages and memos included

The answer machine is accessible via the handset that has a dedicated keypad allowing to access to the answer machine functions (by default handset 1). There is also a menu to set the answer machine options.

To switch the answer machine ON



Press (R/E), then (R/E) on the handset to switch the answer machine ON.

In answer machine mode, the handset screen shows on the left side : \Box , when the answer machine is activated

When the answer machine is ON, it will answer the call after a certain number of rings depending on the setting (see page 37). After answering the call, the answer machine will play your welcome message and record the message left by the caller, if any.

To switch the answer machine OFF

Press $\mathbb{R}^{\mathbb{R}}$, then $\mathbb{P}^{\mathbb{R}}$ on the handset to switch the answer machine OFF.

In answer machine mode, the handset screen shows on the left side : $\underline{\ell}\underline{V},\underline{\ell}\underline{V}$, when the answer machine is deactivated.

Saved messages

To listen to new message(s)

When new messages are recorded on the answering machine, then the icon is flashing on the handset display and the LED on the base blinks until the messages are played.

 Press (R/EI), the loudspeaker on the handset is automatically activated and the display shows under the icon in the number of new messages, i.e. 03 and the time

when the last message has been recorded, i.e. 16:25.

Then the newest message is played automatically on the speakerphone. During message playing the date and time of recording will be shown alternating on the handset display.

Note: Messages are always played in chronological order, the newest message first.

The message can be played back on the receiver instead of the speaker : Press

Once all the new messages have been played, the icon $\begin{tabular}{ll} Stops blinking and stays steady indicating there are old messages not deleted on the answer machine. The message counter indicates the number of old messages on the answer machine and the time when the last one has been recorded.$

Note: If there is no more memory left, the base LED is blinking very fast, the CD 135 will switch to "Answer only" mode and no new message can be recorded. Delete old messages (see page 36) to free space for the new on.

Adjusting the loudspeaker volume during message playback

Press (5 loudspeaker volumes are available).

Delete current message

- 1. Press R/E to enter answer machine mode.
- 2. Press to start message playback.
- Press 5[×] to delete the current message. A long beep confirms deletion of the message and the next message is played. Repeat step 3. to delete further messages.

Note: Messages deleted can not be recovered.

Answer machine settings

Use the answer machine menu via the handset to change the settings of the answer machine.

To select the answer mode

By default the answer machine is set in "Answering & recording" mode (messages can be left by the callers), this can be change in "Answer only" (no messages can be left by the callers).

Press and press Down to reach ANS MACHINE.
 Press , ANSWER ONLY is shown.
 Press , scroll to select the appropriate setting (ACTIVATED or DEACTIVATED).
 Press to confirm.

Note: When **ANSWER ONLY** / **ACTIVATED** is selected, then the associated outgoing message is automatically set, i.e. "This is an answering machine, please call back later".

When **ANSWER ONLY** / **DEACTIVATED** is selected, then the associated outgoing message is automatically set, i.e. "This is an answering machine, please leave your message after the tone".

The voice language for the default outgoing messages depends on the country selected in Welcome mode, see page 2.

To set the number of rings before answering

You can set the answer machine to start playing the outgoing message after a given number of rings (3, 5 (default setting) or 7).



To activate / deactivate the remote control

By default the remote control of the answer machine is deactivated. You can activate this function, this allows you to remotely access your answer machine via any telephone and check your messages.





To activate / deactivate call screening

You can activate (default setting) or deactivate the call screening on the handset loudspeaker so that you can choose whether to hear or not the callers leaving a message and to decide whether or not to take the call.



Personal outgoing messages

You can record one personal outgoing message. This personal outgoing message will replace the default ones. Only if you delete your personalized welcome message the default welcome messages will automatically be restored. You do not need to delete your previously recorded welcome message to record a new one. Once you record a new welcome message, the old one will be overwritten.

To record your personal outgoing message

- I. Press R/E on the handset to enter answer machine mode.
- Long press util you hear a beep. Speak into the microphone of the handset after the beep.
- 3. Press 📳 or 📧 or 🧾 to stop recording.

Note: If you want to have the default outgoing message back, repeat steps ${\sf I}$ and

2 and press . within I second to stop recording. The answer machine will restore the default outgoing message.

To playback personal or default outgoing message

Depending on the answer mode setting "Answer & record" or "Answer only" (see page 37) the appropriate default outgoing message will be played. If you have recorded a personal outgoing message only this welcome message will be played.

- I. Press (R/E) on the handset to enter answer machine mode.
- 2. Press until outgoing message playback starts.

Note: If you are not satisfied with your personal outgoing message recorded, repeat the steps in section "To record your personal outgoing message", page 38 and the old welcome message will be overwritten.

If you want to have the default outgoing message back perform a reset, see "To reset to default settings (base station and handset)", page 32.

Record and listen to a memo

This feature allows you to leave vocal messages for your family on the answer machine. Memos are stored in the answer machine memory and affect the recording capacity.

To record a memo

- I. Press R/ED on the handset to enter answer machine mode.
- Press , RECORD MEMO is shown on the handset screen. Speak into the handset microphone after the beep.
- 3. Press R/B or distop recording.

The LED on the base and the handset icon $\begin{tabular}{ll} $$ blink to indicate that there is a new voice message. \end{tabular}$

To listen to a memo

- Press (R) B (100), the loudspeaker on the handset is automatically activated and the display shows under the icon in the number of new messages, i.e. 03 and the time when the last message has been recorded, i.e. 16:25.
- Then the first new message is played automatically on the speakerphone. During
 message playing the date and time of recording will be shown alternating on the
 handset display.

Note: Messages are always played in chronological order, the newest message first.

The message can be played back on the receiver instead of the speaker : Press

. To delete old memos, see "Delete current message", page 36.

Once all the new messages have been played, the icon \boxdot stops blinking and stays steady indicating there are old messages not deleted on the answer machine. The message counter indicates the number of old messages on the answer machine and the time when the last one has been recorded.

To remotely control your answer machine

WARNING : For security reasons the remote control of the answer machine is deactivated by default. You must activate this function on your CD 135 phone, see page 37, to be able to remotely access your answer machine.

You can access your answer machine when you are away by using any tone dialing phone.

To remotely access your answer machine

- I. From another phone dial home.
- 2. If your answer machine is ON, during or after the outgoing message press the

key (#) on the external phone ;

If your answer machine is OFF, you will hear a beep after 10 rings, then press the

<u></u> key (#).

- 3. Enter your PIN code.
- 4. If you have new messages after the beep they will be automatically played.
