BASIC ANTENNA AND CABLE CONNECTIONS

Your home's signal input might come from a single (75 ohm) round cable, a converter box or from an antenna. In either case the connection to the TV is very easy.

If your Cable TV signal or Antenna signal is a round cable (75 ohm) then you are ready to connect to the TV.

If your antenna has flat twin lead wire (300 ohm), you first need to switch the antenna wires to the screws of a 75 ohm adapter.

If you have a Cable Converter Box : Connect the Cable TV signal to the Cable Signal IN(put) plug on the Converter.

Connect the Cable TV cable or Antenna cable (or 300 to 75 ohm adapter) to the 75Ω plug on the TV.

If you have a Cable Converter Box : Connect the OUT (put) plug from the Converter to the 75 Ω plug on the TV.

HELPFUL HINTS

After using the Auto Program Control, press the CH+ and - buttons to scroll through all the channels stored in the television's memory.

BASIC TV AND REMOTE CONTROL OPERATION

Press the POWER button to turn the TV ON.

Press the VOLUME + button to increase the sound level, or the **VOLUME - button** to lower the sound level.

Pressing both buttons at the same time will display the on-screen menu. Once in the menu, use these buttons to make adjustments or selections.

Press the CHANNEL UP + or DOWN button to select TV channels.

Point the remote control toward the remote sensor window on the TV when operating the TV with the remote.



REMOTE CONTROL

To load the supplied batteries into the remote :

Remove the battery compartment lid at the back of the remote.

Place the batteries (2-AA) in the remote. Be sure the (+) and (-) ends of the batteries line up correctly as marked on the inside of the case.

CABLE BOX CONNECTIONS

f your cable signal uses a cable box or decoder, follow the steps below to complete the connection.

Cable Box (w/Audio/Video Outputs) :

Cable Box (w/Audio/Video Outputs):

- Connect the Cable Company supplied cable to the signal IN(put) plug at the back of the Cable Box.
- 2 Using a RCA type Video Cable, connect one end of the cable to the Video (or ANT, your cable box may be labeled differently) Out jack on the cable box and the other end to the AVI Video Input on the TV.
- 3 Connect one end of the Audio Left and Right Cable to the left and right Audio Out L & R jacks on the cable box. Connect the other end to the AV In Audio L & R Input jacks on the TV.
- **NOTE :** Use the **AV** button on the TV remote control to tune to the **AV** channel or the cable box signal. Once tuned, change channels at the cable box, not the television.



AV (AUDIO/VIDEO) INPUT CONNECTION

The TV's audio/video input jacks are for direct picture and sound connections between TV and a VCR (or similar device) that has audio/video output jacks. Follow steps below to connect an accessory device to the AV In Input Jacks located at the back of the TV.

Connect the VIDEO (yellow) cable to the VIDEO AV In jack on the back of the TV.

Connect the AUDIO (red and white) cables to the AUDIO (left and right) AV In jacks on the rear of the TV.

Connect the VIDEO (yellow) cable to the VIDEO OUT jack at the back of the VCR.

Connect the AUDIO (red and white) cables to the **AUDIO (left and right) OUT** jacks at the rear of the VCR.

Turn the VCR (accessory device) and the TV on.

Press the AV button on the remote control to select the AV Channel. AV will appear on the upper left corner of the TV screen.

With the VCR (or accessory device) ON and a prerecorded tape (CD, DVD, etc.) inserted, **press the PLAY** ► **button** to view the tape on the television.



SIDE AV CONNECTIONS

Audio and Video side inputs are available for a quick connection of a VCR, Video camera, gaming device. Use the **CH+** or **CH-** button on the remote control to tune these inputs.



S-VIDEO (S-VHS) INPUT CONNECTIONS

The S(uper)-Video connection on the rear of the TV can provide you with better picture detail and clarity for the playback of accessory sources such as DBS (Digital Broadcast Satellite), DVD (Digital Video Disc), video games and S-VHS VCR (video cassette recorder) tapes than the normal antenna picture connections.

NOTE : The accessory device must have an S-VIDEO OUT(put) jack in order for you to complete the connection on this page.

Connect one end of the S-VIDEO CABLE to the S-VIDEO jack to the back of the TV. Connect one end of the Audio (red and white) CABLES to the AV In AUDIO L and R (left and right) jacks on the rear of the TV.

Connect the other end of the S-VIDEO CABLE to the S-VHS (S-Video) OUT jack on the back of the VCR. Connect the other end of the AUDIO (red and white) CABLES to the AUDIO (left and right) OUT jacks on the rear of the VCR.

Turn the VCR and TV on.

Press the AV buttons on the remote control to scroll the channels until SVHS appears in the upper left corner of the TV screen.

Now you are ready to place a pre-recorded video tape in the VCR and **press the PLAY button**



COMPONENT VIDEO (CVI) INPUT CONNECTIONS

Component Video inputs provide for the highest possible color and picture resolution on the playback of digital signal source material, such as with DVD players. The colour difference signals (Pb, Pr) and the luminance(Y) signal are connected and received separately, which allows for improved color bandwidth information (not possible when using composite video or S-Video connections).



AV OUTPUT CONNECTIONS

he Audio/Video Output jacks are great for recording with a VCR or used to connect to external audio system for better sound reproduction.

AUDIO SYSTEM CONNECTION :

- **Connect one end of the R(ight) and L(eft) AUDIO** jacks on the TV to the R and L audio input jacks on your amplifier or sound system. Set the audio system's volume to a normal listening level.
- 2 **Turn the TV and audio system on.** To adjust the volume of the audio system, you will need to change the volume at the external audio system, **not the television**.

SECOND VCR CONNECTION :

NOTE : Refer to page 8 for the proper hookup of the first VCR. Follow the instructions on how to tune to the AV1 channel to view a pre-recorded tape.

The following steps allow you to connect a second VCR to record the program while watching it.

- Connect on end of the yellow Video Cable to the AV Out Video plug. Connect the other end to the VIDEO IN plug on the second VCR.
- 2 Connect one end of the red and white Audio cable from the AV Out AUDIO L and R plugs on the TV to the AUDIO IN plugs on the VCR.
- **Turn the Second VCR ON**, insert a VHS tape and its ready to record what's being viewed on the TV screen.

HOW TO USE THE LANGUAGE CONTROL

For French and Spanish speaking TV owners an on-screen LANGUAGE option present. With the LANGUAGE control you can set the TV's on-screen menu to be show in English, French or Spanish.



HOW TO USE THE TUNER MODE CONTROL

The TUNER MODE control allows you to change the TV's input signal to either ANTENNA, CABLE or AUTO mode. It is important for the TV to know which type of signal to look for (Antenna or Cable). In the AUTO mode, when the AUTO PROGRAM feature is activated, the TV will automatically choose the correct mode.



When CABLE is selected, channels 1 - 125 are available.

When ANTENNA is selected, channels 2 - 69 are available.

When AUTO is selected, the TV will automatically set itself to the correct mode based on the type of signal it detects when the AUTO PROGRAM feature is activated.

AUTO PROGRAM

You can auto install programs on your TV. This makes it easy for you to select only the TV stations in your area when the CH+ or CH– buttons are pressed.

NOTE : Ensure that the Antenna or Cable signal connection has been completed before AUTO PROGRAM is activated.



HELPFUL HINTS

When CABLE is selected, channels 1 - 125 are available.

When ANTENNA is selected, channels 2 - 69 are available.

When AUTO is selected, the TV will automatically set itself to the correct mode based on the type of signal it detects when the AUTO PROGRAM feature is activated.

CHANNEL EDIT

hannel Edit makes it easy for you to **ADD** or **SKIP** channels from the list of channels stored in the TV's memory.

Press the MENU button on the remote control to show the on-screen menu.

Press the CURSOR \land or \lor to scroll through the on-screen menu until the word **INSTALL** is highlighted.

Press the CURSOR > to display the **INSTALL** menu features.

Press the CURSOR \land or \lor to scroll through the Install features until the word **CHANNEL EDIT** is highlighted.

Press the CURSOR > to select CHANNEL EDIT options.

With the CHANNEL EDIT options displayed, and CHANNEL NO. highlighted; you can use the CURSOR > OR < to scroll through all available channel that you wish to ADD (skipped OFF) or SKIP (skipped ON) from the TV's memory. You can also use the NUMERIC buttons to go directly to a specific channel that you want to add or skip. Or, you can use the CH+ or CH- to scan through the channels that have not been skipped.

Using the CURSOR V, scroll the menu to highlight the word SKIPPED.

Use **CURSOR > to toggle between ON or OFF.** If **ON** is selected the channel is skipped when scrolling channels with **CH+** or **CH-.** If **OFF** is selected the channel is not skipped when scrolling with **CH+** or **CH-.**

When finished, press STATUS / EXIT button on the remote control to remove the menu from the screen.

HELPFUL HINTS

An "X" appearing in front of any channel will indicate that channel has skipped ON. When the CH+ or CH- buttons are used, those channels will be skipped.



PICTURE MENU CONTROLS

To adjust your TV picture controls, select a channel and use the Picture Menu Controls listed below. Your selection is stored as **Personal**.

Press the MENU button on the remote control to display the onscreen menu.

Press **CURSOR** \land or \lor until the **Picture menu** feature is highlighted.

Press **CURSOR** > or < to adjust

<u>**Brightness Control**</u> - until the darkest parts of the picture are as bright as you want.

<u>Color</u> - to add or remove color.

<u>**Picture**</u> - adjust until the lightest parts of the picture show good detail.

<u>Sharpness</u> - to improve sharpness in the picture.

<u>**Color Temp**</u>- to select Normal, Cool, or Warm picture preferences. For Normal, whites will maintain their whiteness; Cool will make the whites bluish; and Warm will

make the whites reddish.

<u>Contrast +</u> - when set to **On**, the Contrast + control helps to "sharpen" the picture quality. The black portions of the picture become richer in darkness and the whites become brighter.



AUTO PICTURE

Whether you're watching a movie or a sporting event, your TV has automatic video control settings to enhance your current program source or content.

Press **AUTO PICTURE** button on the remote control. The current Smart Picture setting will display on the screen.

Press AUTO PICTURE repeatedly to select either Personal, Movies, Sports, Weak Signal or Multimedia picture settings.

NOTE: The way you choose to set the Picture Menu Controls will become your Personal setting.



SOUND MENU CONTROLS

o adjust your TV sound controls, select a channel and use the Sound Menu Controls listed below. Your selection is stored as **Personal**.



AUTO SOUND

he Auto Sound feature allows the listener to select between four different pre-set sound options.

THE 4:3 EXPAND FORMAT CONTROL

any times while watching movies from a DVD player, the image is shown in "letterbox" format. This is the format shown in movie theaters. When shown on TV screen, the image will have areas of black on top and bottom of the screen.

Press MENU button on the remote control to display the onscreen menu. Press **CURSOR** \lor until **Features** is highlighted. Press **CURSOR** > to display the **Features menu** options (AutoLock or Format). Press **CURSOR** \lor to highlight **Format**. ✓ Format Press CURSOR > or < to select one of the two options 4:3 or Expand 4:3. 4:3 - Standard format for the TV. **Expand 4:3** - Enlarges the picture to fill out the entire screen area, eliminating the "letterbox" effect. 4:3 When finished, press **STATUS / EXIT** button on the remote control to remove the menu from the TV's screen.

NOTE : The Expand 4:3 and can also be activated using the **CURSOR** \land **or** \lor when the onscreen menu is not being displayed. Pressing these buttons will toggle between Standard 4:3 and Expand 4:3.

UNDERSTANDING AUTOLOCK CONTROLS

AutoLock is a feature that lets the TV receive and process data sent by broadcasters or other program providers with program content Advisory. When programmed by the viewer, a TV with AutoLock can respond to the content advisory and block program content that may be found objectionable (such as offensive language, violence, sexual situations, etc.). This feature is useful for adults to prevent certain types of programs from being viewed by children.

AutoLock offers various BLOCKING controls to choose from:

Access Code - An Access Code must be set to prevent children from unblocking questionable or censored programming set by their parents.

Channel Block - After an access code has been programmed, you can block individual channels including the A/V inputs.

Clear All - Lets you clear all channels being blocked from your viewing set with the Channel Block Control.

Block All - Lets you block ALL channels including A/V inputs.

No Rating - ALL programming with no content advisory data can be blocked if NO RATING is set to ON.

Movie Ratings - Certain blocking options exist which will block programming based on ratings patterned by the Motion Pictures Association of America (MPAA).

TV Ratings - Like the Movie Ratings, programs can be blocked from viewing using standard TV ratings set by TV broadcasters.

Unrated - ALL unrated programs based on the Movie Ratings or Parental TV Guidelines can be blocked if UNRATED is set to ON.

MOVIE RATINGS

G: General Audience - All ages admitted. Suitable for all ages.

PG: Parental Guidance Suggested - Contains material unsuitable for younger children.

PG-13: Parents Strongly Cautioned - Contains material unsuitable for children under the age of 13.

R: Restricted - Suitable for adults above 17 years of age only.

NC-17: No one under the age of 17 will be admitted.

X: Adults Only - Contains one or more of the following: very graphic violence, very graphic and explicit or indecent sexual acts, very coarse and intensely suggestive language.

TV RATINGS

TV-Y: Designed for a very young audience, including children ages 2-6

TV-Y7: Appropriate for children age 7 and above who have acquired the development skills needed to distinguish between make-believe and reality.

TV-G: Suitable for most audiences. Contains little or no violence, no strong language, and little or no sexual dialogue or situations.

TV-PG: Contains material unsuitable for younger children. Could contain Moderate violence (V), some sexual situations (S), infrequent coarse language (L), or some suggestive dialogue (D).

TV-14: Contains some material unsuitable for children under 14 years of age. Contains one or more of the following: intense violence (V), intense sexual situations (S), strong coarse language (L), or intensely suggestive dialogue (D).

TV-MA - Viewed by adults and therefore may be unsuitable for children under 17. Contains one or more of the following: graphic violence (V), explicit sexual situations (S), or crude indecent language (L).

SETTING UP AN ACCESS CODE

Ver the next few pages you'll learn how to block channels . To get a better understanding of the rating terms for certain programs refer to page 21.

Let's start by learning how to set a personal access code :

1

Press MENU button on the remote control to display the onscreen menu.

Press **CURSOR** \land or \lor until **Features** is highlighted.

Press **CURSOR** > to display the **Features menu** options (AutoLock or Format).

Press **CURSOR** \land or \lor until the word **AUTOLOCK** is highlighted.

Press **CURSOR** > and the screen will read, "ACCESS CODE - - - - ."

Using the **NUMBERED buttons** enter **0 7 1 1**. "**XXXX**" appears on the Access Code screen as you press the numbered buttons.

"**INCORRECT CODE**" will appear on the screen and you will need to enter 0 7 1 1 again.

The screen will ask you to enter a "New Code". Enter a "new" 4 digit code using the NUMBERED buttons on the remote control. You will be asked to CONFIRM the code. Enter the new code again "XXXX" will appear when you enter your new code and then display the AutoLock menu options.

BLOCK CHANNELS

A fter your personal access code has been sent (see previous page), you are ready to select the channels or the A/V inputs you want to block out or censor. Once you've entered your access code and the AutoLock features are displayed on the screen :

Press the CURSOR \land or \lor until the words **BLOCK CHANNELS** are highlighted.

Press **CURSOR** > to turn blocking **ON** or **OFF** for that channel. When **ON** is selected the channel will be blocked.

Press **CH+ or CH-** to select other channels you wish to block. Repeat step 2 to block the new channel.

To Unblock a channel, use the CH+ or CH- to scroll to the channel you wish to unblock. The screen will show a message telling you that the channel has been blocked by AutoLock and you have to Enter your Access Code to unblock the channel.

Use the NUMBER Buttons, key in your Access Code. The Blocked channel will be UnBlocked.

When finished, press the **STATUS / EXIT** button on the remote control to remove the menu from the screen.



BLOCK/CLEAR ALL CHANNELS AT THE SAME TIME

This is a continuation of the previous page. After blocking specific channels there may come a time when you want to block or clear all the channels at the same time.

Once you've entered your access code and the AutoLock features displayed on the screen;

Press the CURSOR \land or \lor to select either **CLEAR ALL** or **BLOCK ALL**.

If **CLEAR ALL** is selected, press **CURSOR** > to clear all blocked channels. All channels will be viewable. Now all blocked channels can be viewed.

If **BLOCK ALL** is selected, press **CURSOR** > to turn the control **ON** or **OFF**. When **ON** is selected, ALL available channels will be blocked from viewing.

When finished, press the **STATUS/EXIT** button on the remote control to remove the menu from the screen.



MOVIE RATINGS

The AutoLock feature can block programs based on the Move Industry ratings.

Once you've entered your access code and the AutoLock features are displayed on the screen;

- Press **CURSOR** > button to display the **MOVIE RATING** options (G, PG, PG-13, R, NC-17, or X)
- Press **CURSOR** ∧ **or** ∨ to highlight any of the Movie Rating options. When highlighted, all these options can be turned **ON** (*which will allow blocking*) or **OFF** (*which will allow viewing*).
- Use **CURSOR** > to turn the rating option **ON** or **OFF**.



TV RATINGS

The AutoLock feature can block programs based on the TV Industry ratings.

Once you've entered your access code and the AutoLock features displayed on the screen;

- Press CURSOR ∧ or ∨ to highlight any of the TV Rating options. When highlighted, all these options can be turned ON (which will allow blocking) or OFF (which will allow viewing).

NOTE : Some TV Rating options also have sub-ratings. The ratings of TV-Y7, TV-G, TV-14, TV-MA can be customized to block V (violence), FV (fantasy violence), S (sex scenes), L (coarse language), or D (Suggestive dialogue).

- Press **CURSOR** > to turn the TV-Y or TV-G rating **ON** or **OFF**. Or, press **CURSOR** > to enter the sub-menus for the TV-Y7, TV-PG, TV-14 or TV-MA ratings.
- If the TV-Y7, TV-PG, TV-14 or TV-MA sub-menu is accessed, press **CURSOR** \land **or** \lor to select one of the options (Block All, V, S, L, D or FV).
- Press **CURSOR** > to turn the option **ON** or **OFF**.

NOTE : If you forget your code, key 0 7 1 1. This is the factory default. Enter this code to create a new access code.

BLOCKING OPTIONS

AutoLock offers the viewer other blocking options as well. With these Blocking options, the censoring can be turned ON or OFF.

Once you've entered your access code and the AutoLock features are displayed on the screen;

NO RATING : All programs with NO content advisory data can be locked if it is set to ON and the BLOCKING feature is set to **ON**.

CLOSE CAPTIONING

Close Captioning (CC) allows you to read the voice content of television programs on the TV screen. Designed to Chelp the hearing impaired, this feature uses onscreen "text boxes" to show dialogue and conversations while the TV program is in progress.



SLEEPTIMER

The SleepTimer feature allows you to set a timer to automatically turn the TV off after a period of time you choose - 15, 30, 45, 60, 90, 120, 180 or 240 minutes.

- Press **SLEEP** button on the remote control to display the sleeptimer menu.
- Press **SLEEP** button on the remote control to select the amount of time (15, 30, 45, 60, 90, 120, 180 or 240 minutes) before the TV automatically switches Off.

NOTE: An onscreen countdown will appear during the last minute before the TV switches Off. If any button is pressed during the last minute of the countdown, the Sleep Timer setting will be cancelled.



QUADRASURF

The QuadraSurf control allows you to setup four different personal channel Surf lists using the colored buttons (on the remote control). Each colored button can hold up to ten channels in its quick viewing list.

GLOSSARY

4:3	4:3 is an aspect ratio of traditional squarish National Television Systems Committe (NTSC) TV screens; it stands for four units of width for every three units of height.
Aspect Ratio	The ratio between the width and height of the TV picture on the screen. In a normal TV set the aspect ratio is 4 to 3 (4:3).
Audio Video (A/V)	A term often used when discussing a channel on a TV receiver or on video equipment, which has been especially designed to accept VCR audio-video signals. This channel automatically activates special circuitry within the TV set to prevent picture distortion and skewing. It is also used for audio-video processors, which handle both types of signals.
Cable Converter Box	A device that allows your television to receive the expanded number of channels provided by broadcasters. Some of these programs provided by the broadcast may not be free, you'll have to pay to view them.
Coaxial Cable	Coaxial cable is a copper cable used to connect cable signal coming from Cable TV Company to the TV.
Composit Video Input Connection	An analog encoded video signal that includes vertical and horizontal synchronizing information. Since both luminance (brightness) and chrominance (color) signals are encoded together, only a signal connection wire is needed. A composite video jack is usually a single RCA-type.
Component Video Input Connection	Provides the highest possible color and picture resolution on the playback of digital signal source material like DVD players. The color difference signals (Pb, Pr) and the luminance(Y) signals are connected separately which allows for improved color bandwidth information (not possible when using composite video or S-Video connections).
Letterbox	Letterbox refers to the image of a wide-screen picture on a standard 4:3 aspect ratio television screen.
Luminance	The brightness or black-and-white component of a color video signal. Determines the level of picture detail.
NTSC	National television system committee. The organization that developed the analog television standard currently in use in the U.S., Canada, and Japan. Now generally used to refer to that standard. The NTSC standard combines blue, red, and green signals modulated as an AM signal with an FM signal for audio.
S-Video	Separated video. An encoded video signal which separates the brightness from color data. S-Video can greatly improve the picture when connecting TVs to any high quality video source such as digital broadcast satellite (DBS) and DVDs.

CLEANING AND CARE

WARNING Concerning Stationary Images on the TV Screen:

Do not leave stationary or letterbox images on screen for extended periods of time. This can cause uneven picture-tube aging.

Normal use of the TV should involve the showing of pictures that contain constantly moving and changing images that fill the screen. Be careful not to leave nonmoving images on screen for extended periods of time, or to display the same images on screen too frequently, because subtle ghost images can be left on the picture tubes. Sources of stationary images may be DVD disks, laser disks, video games, CD-i disks, videotapes, digital television boxes, broadcast channels, cable channels, satellite channels, and others. Here are some examples of stationary images (this is not an all-inclusive list; you may encounter others in your viewing):

- DVD menus—listings of DVD disk content
- Letterbox black bars—shown at the top and bottom of the TV screen when a wide screen (16:9) movie is viewed on a TV with standard (4:3) aspect ratio.
- Video-game images and scoreboards
- Television station logos—present a problem if they are bright and stationary; moving or low-contrast graphics are less likely to cause uneven aging of the picture tube
- Stock-market tickers—presented at the bottom of the TV screen
- Shopping channel logos and pricing displays—bright and shown constantly or repeatedly in the same location on the TV screen.

Placement of the TV

- To avoid cabinet warping, cabinet color changes, and increased chance of set failure, do not place the TV where temperatures can become excessively hot; for example, in direct sunlight or near a heating appliance.
- Be sure to allow a free flow of air to and from the perforated back cover of the set.

Cleaning

- To avoid possible shock hazard, be sure the TV is unplugged from the electrical outlet before cleaning.
- Regularly dust the TV with a dry, nonscratching duster to keep the TV clean.
- When cleaning the TV, take care not to scratch or damage the screen surface. Avoid wearing jewelry or using anything abrasive. Do not use household cleaners. Wipe the front screen with a clean cloth dampened with water. Use even, easy, vertical strokes when cleaning.
- Gently wipe the cabinet surfaces with a clean cloth or sponge dampened in a solution of cool, clear water and a mild soap or detergent. Use a clean, dry cloth to dry the wiped surfaces.
- Occasionally vacuum the ventilation holes or slots in the back cover of the set.
- Never use thinners, insecticide sprays, or other chemicals on or near the cabinet, as they might cause permanent damage of the cabinet finish.

Check this List of **Symptoms** and **Suggested Steps To Take** before requesting Service. You may be able to solve the problem yourself. If you face problems connecting the TV to external devices, please refer to the User Guide of the external device or call their service centers for help. With some of these discs, this problem is inherent and does not require a service call.
