

On Timer automatically turns the TV ON at a preset time, and channel.

Sleep-Timer automatically turns the TV OFF at preset times.

SmartLock feature allows you to block the viewing of certain channel or external audio/video connections were you might not want your children viewing inappropriate material.

Smart Picture allows you to set the picture color, tint, contrast, etc. for various types of programming such as Sports, Movies, Multi Media (Gaming), or Weak Signals with the push of one button.


Smart Sound controls the sudden volume changes that occur when changing programs or when a commercial break comes on. It eliminates the peaks and valleys in the TV's sound with one pleasant listening level.

Picture-In-Picture (PIP) allows you view to different programs (or picture sources) on the TV screen at the same time. PIP will also let you swap the pictures, move the PIP picture to any of the four corners, and even freeze the picture until you shut it off.

NOTE: This owner's manual is used with several different television models. Not all features (and drawings) discussed in this manual will necessarily match those found with your television system. This is normal and does not require you contacting your dealer or requesting service.

HOW TO ADJUST THE TV PICTURE

To adjust your TV picture controls, select a channel and follow the steps shown below:

- Press the MENU button on the remote to show the on-screen menu.

- Press the CURSOR RIGHT

 button and the menu will shift to the right to display an adjustment bar in front of the BRIGHTNESS control.

SMART HELP

Remember, when the bar scale is centered, the control settings are at normal mid-range levels.

BRIGHTNESS Press the ▶▶ or ◀◀ buttons until darkest parts of the picture are as bright as you prefer.


<u>COLOR</u> Press the ▶▶ or ◀◀ buttons to add or eliminate color.

<u>PICTURE</u> Press the ▶▶ or ◀◀ buttons until lightest parts of the picture show good detail.

<u>SHARPNESS</u> Press the ▶▶ or ◀◀ buttons to improve detail in the picture.

<u>TINT</u> Press the ▶▶ or ◀◀ buttons to obtain natural skin tones.

COLOR TEMP Press the ▶▶ or ◀◀ buttons to select NORMAL, COOL, or WARM picture preferences. (NORMAL will keep the whites, white; COOL will make the whites, bluish; and WARM will make the whites, reddish.)



SETTING THE TV'S CLOCK

Your television comes with an on-screen clock. During normal operation the clock appears on the screen when the STATUS/EXIT button is pressed or if the Timer DIS-PLAY control is turned ON.

(BEGIN)

- Press the MENU button on the remote to show the on-screen menu. PICTURE will be highlighted.
- 2 Press the CURSOR DOWN
 button twice to select the FEATURES menu.
- Press the CURSOR RIGHT

 button and the menu will shift to the left to display the TIMER controls.
- 4 Press the CURSOR RIGHT
 ▶ button again to shift the display left and highlight the TIME control.



Just like an alarm clock you can set the TV to turn itself on at the same time everyday.







Once the television clock has been set, you can use your television as a clock. The Timer DISPLAY control allows you to permanently display the time in the upper right corner of the screen.

(BEGIN)

 PICTURE will be highlighted.
- Press the CURSOR DOWN button twice to select the FEA-TURES menu.
- Press the CURSOR RIGHT



USING THE SMART LOCK (SETUP CODE) CONTROL

Smart Lock allows parents to block out, or "censor" any channels they think children should not watch. A channel blocked by the Smart Lock control cannot be viewed until a correct access code is used to unlock the channel for viewing. First let's set your Smart Lock access code:



USING THE SMART LOCK (BLOCK CHANNEL) CONTROL

A fter your personal access code has been set (see previous page), you are now ready to select up to 5 channels or inputs to block out or censor.

 PICTURE will be highlighted.
- Press the CURSOR DOWN button twice to select the FEATURES menu.
- Press the CURSOR RIGHT

 bb button and the menu will
 shift to the left, then CURSOR

 LOCK control.
- Press the CURSOR RIGHT


 button again to shift the display left, the BLOCK CHANNEL control will be highlighted.

Note: You can also block out the use of the A/V external inputs on the rear of the TV. This stops the viewing of VCR, DVD, etc., programs which can be shown through the A/V Input jacks. Select AV 1, AV 2, or SVID-R, MM1, MM2, MM3, and select block.



UNBLOCKING CHANNELS

Access the blocked channel directly by using the number buttons on the remote control.

Enter your four digit access code.

All blocked channels will be viewable until the TV is turned off. When the TV is turned back on, the blocked channels will not be viewable.



TURNING ON THE NOISE REDUCTION (PICTURE) CONTROL

Due many reason such as poor cable reception, the picture can sometime appear slightly "speckled" (noise in the picture). The NR (Noise Reduction) control can help eliminate this type of interference and improve the quality of the picture.



The Contrast + feature helps to "sharpen" the picture quality. The black portions of the picture become richer in darkness and the whites become brighter.



USING THE CLOSED CAPTION CONTROL

Closed Captioning (CC) allows you to read the voice content of television programs on the TV screen. Designed to help the hearing impaired, this feature uses onscreen "text boxes" to show dialogue and conversations while the TV program is in progress.

(BEGIN)

- Press the MENU button on the remote to show the on-screen menu.

 PICTURE will be highlighted.
- 2 Press the CURSOR DOWN
 button twice to select the FEATURES menu.
- Press the CURSOR RIGHT bb button and the menu will shift to the left, TIMER will be highlighted.
- 4 Press the CURSOR DOWN to highlight the CLOSED CAP control.
- button again to highlight and choose either CAPTION MODE or TEXT MODE.
- 6 Press the CURSOR RIGHT

 ▶ button again to highlight the CAPTION MODE or TEXT

 MODE options area.
- 7 Press the CURSOR UP ▶ or CURSOR DOWN buttons to select the CLOSED CAPTION option you want.


CAPTION MODE: CC1, CC2, CC3,CC4, CC MUTE, or OFF -dialogue (and descriptions) for the action on the captioned TV program shows on-screen.

TEXT MODE: TXT1, TXT2,TXT3, TXT4, or OFF

-often used for channel guide, schedules, or bulletin board information for CC programs.

USING THE SLEEP TIMER CONTROL

Have you ever fallen asleep in front of the TV only to have in wake you up at two in the morning with a test pattern screeching in your ears? Well, your TV can save you all that trouble by automatically turning itself off.

BEGIN

Press the SLEEP button on the remote control and the SLEEP timer on-screen display will appear in the lower center of the display.

Press the SLEEP button
repeatedly to pick the amount of time (15 minutes to 2 hours ahead) before the TV will turn itself off.



USING TREBLE, BASS, AND BALANCE SOUND CONTROLS

Besides the normal volume level control, your TV also has individual sound adjustment controls. The TREBLE (high frequency), BASS (low frequency), and Speaker BALANCE may all be used to adjust the sound playback of TV programs.



How to Set the TV for Stereo Programs

Your TV can receive broadcast stereo TV programs. The TV has both an amplifier and twin speakers through which the stereo sound can be heard.

(BEGIN)

- 1 Press the MENU button on the remote to show the on-screen menu. PICTURE will be highlighted.
- Press the CURSOR DOWN

 button to select the SOUND

 menu.
- Press the CURSOR RIGHT

 button and the menu will
 shift to the right to display an
 adjustment bar in front of the
 TREBLE control.
- Press the CURSOR DOWN


 button to select the STEREO control.
- or RIGHT ▶▶ buttons to select STEREO or MONO. With STEREO selected the television will reproduce any stereo broadcast signal it receives.



SECOND AUDIO PROGRAM (SAP)

SAP is an additional part of the stereo broadcast system. Sent as a third audio channel SAP can be heard apart from the current TV program sound. TV stations are free to use SAP for any number of purposes, but many experts believe it will be used for foreign language translations of TV shows (or for weather and news bulletins.)

If a SAP signal is not present with a selected program, the SAP option cannot be selected. Also, if SAP is selected on a channel (with SAP) and you select another channel, when you return to the original channel SAP will be OFF (and you will have to reselect the SAP feature.)



USING THE INCREDIBLE STEREO FEATURE

The Incredible Stereo feature adds greater depth and dimension to both monaural (MONO) and stereo TV sound. With the control turned ON the TV's speakers can add even wider sound separation to normal broadcasts.

(BEGIN)


Press the INCREDIBLE
STEREO button on the remote to turn the Incredible Stereo feature
ON.

When the TV signal is being received in STEREO, the on-screen display will read **INCR. STEREO.**

When the TV signal is being received in MONO, the on-screen display will read **SPATIAL.**

Both will give increased TV sound performance when watching movies or musical programs.





USING THE TV VOLUME BAR CONTROL


Use the Volume Bar control to see the TV's volume level settings on the TV screen. The Volume Bar will be seen each time the VOLUME buttons (on the TV or remote) are pressed.

(BEGIN)

Press the VOLUME (+) or (-) buttons on the remote to show the VOLUME bar display on-screen.

Press the VOLUME (+) **or** (–) **buttons** again to adjust the television's sound level.





USING THE TV SPEAKER CONTROL AND AUDIO OUTPUT JACKS

Would you like to hear TV programs through your audio hifi system? The TV's Audio Output jacks and TV Speaker On/Off control work together to offer you this TV sound option.

BEGIN

- Connect the R(ight) and L(eft) AUDIO OUT jacks on the TV to the R and L Audio Input jacks on your amplifier or sound system. Set the audio system's volume to normal listening level.
- ON. You can now adjust the sound level coming from the audio system with the VOLUME (+) or (-) buttons on the TV or remote.
- To hear the TV sound from only the audio system speakers.


Press the MENU button on the remote to show the on-screen menu. **PICTURE** will be highlighted.

- Press the CURSOR DOWN button to select the SOUND menu.
- button and the menu will shift to the right to display an adjustment bar in front of the TREBLE control.

- DOWN buttons to select turn the television's speakers OFF. You should now only hear TV sound coming from the audio system speakers.

Remember, the audio system may have to be in AUX(iliary) mode to play sound from the TV.



How to Use the Audio/Video Input Jacks

AUDIO/VIDEO INPUTS

The TV's Audio/Video Input jacks are for direct picture and sound connections between the TV and a VCR (or similar device) that has Audio/Video Output jacks.

(BEGIN)

- **1** Connect the VIDEO (yellow) **CABLE** to the VIDEO IN jack on the back of the TV. Then connect the AUDIO (red and white) CABLES to the AUDIO (left and right) IN jacks on the rear of the TV.
- **2** Connect the VIDEO (yellow) **CABLE** to the VIDEO OUT jack on the back of the VCR. Then connect the AUDIO (red and white) CABLES to the AUDIO (left and right) OUT jacks on the rear of the VCR.
- Turn the VCR and the TV ON.
- 4 Use the A/V button on the remote to select the AV 1 chan-

With the VCR ON and a prerecorded tape inserted, press the **PLAY button** to view the tape on the television.









S-VIDEO INPUT

The S(uper)-Video connection on the rear of the television can give you better picture detail and clarity, for the playback of S-VHS VCR tapes, or Digital Video Discs than the normal antenna picture connections.

Note: The VCR (or Digital Video Disc player) must have a S-VIDEO OUT(put) jack in order for you to complete the connections shown on this page.

(BEGIN)

1 Connect the S-VIDEO

CABLE to the S-VIDEO input jack on the rear of the television, then the AUDIO (red and white) to the AUDIO IN (IN 2) jacks on the rear of the TV.


- Cable to the S-VIDEO output jack on the accessory device.
 Then connect the red and white AUDIO CABLES to the AUDIO (left and right) output jacks on the rear of the accessory device.
- Turn the VCR (or Digital Video Disc Player) ON.
- Press the AV button on the remote to tune to the SVID-R channel. You are now ready to view the tape or disc on the TV.



SMART HELP

The S-VIDEO and VIDEO IN-2 Inputs are in parallel. The S-VIDEO input is dominate when in use. If seperate video signals are connected to the S-Video and the VIDEO IN-2 Inputs, the signal from the VIDEO IN-2 input will be unuseable.

If you have added SVID-R to the TV's channels memory, just press the CHANNEL + or – buttons to select the S-VIDEO mode.



USING THE SMART PICTURE CONTROL

Whether you're watching a movie or a video game, you TV has automatic video control settings matched for your current program source or content. The Smart Picture feature quickly resets your TV's video controls for a number of different types of programs and viewing conditions you may have in your home. Each Smart Picture setting is preset at the factory to automatically adjust the TV's Brightness, Color, Picture, Sharpness, Tint, and Color Temperature levels.



A re you tired of the sound of commercials following you into the next room or all through the house? Smart Sound allows you to preset a desired volume level that the TV sound will not go above. This makes for an even, more consistent sound by reducing the peaks and valleys that can occur during program changes or commercial breaks.





AVL CONTROL

Note: SMART SOUND is the same feature as AVL within the SOUND on-screen menu controls. When SMART SOUND is changed, the AVL control will also change (and vice versa).



USING THE TV'S CHANNEL SURF CONTROL

A "list" or series of previously viewed channels can be selected with the SURF button on your remote control. With this feature you can easily switch between different TV programs that currently interest you. The SURF control allows you set up to ten channels in its quick viewing "list".



SETTING THE REMOTE CONTROL TO WORK WITH OTHER DEVICES



Your remote control is set to work your TV and many infrared remote (IR) control VCRs, Cable Boxes, Satellite Systems, DSS, DVD, etc. However, an easy onetime step may be necessary before the remote will work your VCR.

Try this initial check to see if going on to the following section is necessary.

BEGIN

- Place the TV/VCR/ACC
 Mode Switch in the proper position.
- Point the remote control at the device and press the POWER button.
- Does the remote turn the device ON?

If YES, stop and try other function buttons on the remote. If they also work the device, then the remote is ready and no further steps are needed.





SETTING THE REMOTE CONTROL TO WORK WITH OTHER DEVICES



Search Method

Your TV remote can be set to work various external devices such as VCRs, Cable Boxes, Satellite Receivers, Dss, DVD, etc. by what is called the search method of remote control programming.

If the "Remote Code" number method shown on page did not set your remote to work your external device, then follow the easy steps listed below.

Please read steps 1-4 before beginning.

BEGIN

1 Press the POWER button on the device your are attempting to program to turn it ON.

2 Place the TV/VCR/ACC | Mode Switch in the proper position.

Press the VCR RECORD and the SMART SOUND buttons simultaneously and hold them down.

The device will begin to change channels after the remote identifies the correct code. When the channels start to change release the VCR RECORD and SMART SOUND buttons. The remote should be ready to operate the device.




SMART HELP

This method can take up to two minutes to preform.

Don't let the device scan up more than five channels. If you do the remote may pass up the right code and another two minute search cycle will have to be repeated.

If no channel change happens within two minutes, repeat steps 1-4. Should a channel change still not occur, the remote will not work the desired device.

USING THE REMOTE'S VCR BUTTONS

with a VCR, first make certain it is set to control your VCR (by the REMOTE CODE or SEARCH method).

(BEGIN)

Set the TV/VCR/ACC mode switch to VCR on the remote.

Point the top of the remote toward the front of the VCR (remote sensor window) when pressing the buttons.



VCR SYSTEM SWITCH

Set in the VCR position to send remote commands to the VCR.

PLAY BUTTON

Press to begin playback of a video tape.

REWIND BUTTON

Press to rewind tapes. For some VCR's the STOP button may have to be pressed first, then REWIND. In playback mode hold down the button to view picture moving rapidly in reverse.

STOP BUTTON

Press to stop the motion of a tape in playback, rewind, fast forward, etc.


VCR RECORD BUTTON

Hold the VCR/RECORD button down to begin a VCR recording.

SMART HELP

Remember, the VCR buttons on the remote will not operate your VCR if those features are not found on your VCR remote control.

Note: All VCR functions (particularly Search, Rewind, Fast Forward, etc.) will operate the same as with the original VCR remote control provided with the VCR.



NOTE: The functions of the buttons described on this page are for VCR use only. (Please make sure the TV/VCR/ACC switch is in the VCR position.)

POWER BUTTON

Press to turn the VCR ON and OFF.

NUMBER BUTTON

Press buttons for direct VCR channel selections.

PAUSE BUTTON

Press to temporarily stop the tape during a playback or recording. Press again to release Pause.

FAST FORWARD BUTTON

Press to rapidly advance the tape. For some VCR's you may need to press the STOP button first, then the FAST FORWARD button. In playback mode hold the button down to view the picture moving rapidly in the forward direction.

<u>CHANNEL + & – BUTTONS</u>

Press to scan up or down through the VCR channel numbers.

(CLOCK) TV/VCR BUTTON

Press to the VCR position (VCR indicator on the front of the unit will light) to view the playback of a tape, watch a program while recording it, or to watch a TV broadcast using the VCR CH (+) (–) or Number buttons. Press again to place in the TV position (VCR indicator light will go off) to view one program while recording another program.

Hooking up PIP

Dicture in Picture (PIP) is the **F** showing of two pictures on the screen at the same time. (One main screen picture and a smaller inset picture, or PIP).

Note: the PIP picture must be supplied by a VCR (or other accessory device equipped with a VIDEO OUTPUT jack).

The following is a basic PIP hookup using a VCR to supply the secondary picture.

(BEGIN)

1 Connect the VIDEO OUT iack on the VCR to the VIDEO IN (yellow) jack on the rear of the TV.

Also connect the AUDIO OUT (Right and Left) jacks from the VCR to the AUDIO IN jacks (red and white) on the TV.

Also be sure that there is a normal Cable or Antenna signal hook from the VCR to the TV.



CHOOSING THE PIP SOURCE

The picture for the PIP window can come through either the ANT/CABLE or any the the external Audio/Video connections at the rear of the TV. PIP Source simply tells the TV which one of these sources it is to show in the PIP window.

(BEGIN)

- 2 Connect the ANT OUT jack on the rear of the VCR to the ANT "A" input on the rear of the TV.
- from the VIDEO OUT jack on the VCR to the VIDEO IN jack on the TV (labeled VIDEO IN-2). Then, connect the red and white Audio Cables from the AUDIO OUT jacks on the VCR to the AUDIO IN jacks on the rear of the TV (labeled AUDIO L & R/MONO IN-2).
- from the VIDEO OUT jack on the Digital Video Disc Player to the VIDEO IN jack on the TV (labeled VIDEO IN-1). Then, connect the red and white Audio Cables from the AUDIO OUT jacks on the Digital Video Disc Player to the AUDIO IN jacks on the rear of the TV (labeled AUDIO L & R/MONO IN-2).

Note: When selecting the PIP SOURCE, the Digital Video Disc Player will appear on the AV 1 channel, and the VCR will appear on the AV 2 channel.

CAUTION: A video source (such as a video game, Compact Disc Interactive - CDI, or TV information channel) which shows a constant non-moving pattern on the TV screen, can cause picture tube damage. When your TV is continuously used with such a source the pattern of the non-moving portion of the game (CDI, etc.) could leave an image permanently on the picture tube. When not in use, turn the video source OFF. Regularly alternate the use of such video sources with normal TV viewing.

- Check the TV power cord. Unplug the TV, wait 10 seconds, then reinsert plug into outlet and push POWER button again.
- Check that outlet is not on a wall switch. Be sure fuse is not blown on AC Power strip.
- Check to be sure the system mode switch (TV/VCR/ACC) is in the correct position when using the remote control to power the set ON.
- Check antenna connections. Are they properly secured to the TV's ANT/CABLE plug?
- Check the TUNER control for CABLE or ANTENNA setting.
- Press the AV button on the remote to make sure the correct signal source is selected. (AV 1, AV 2, SVID-R or MM 1, MM 2, MM 3)
- Check the VOLUME buttons.
- Check the MUTE button on the remote control.
- Check the SPEAKER on-screen control. OFF position will eliminate sound at the set.
- If attempting auxiliary equipment hook-ups, check audio jack connections.
- (If Applicable) Check Audio Receiver for correct operating mode.
- Check TV/VCR/ACC "System" switch on the remote. Move the switch to the TV position to operate the television.
- Check batteries. Replace with AA Heavy Duty (Zinc Chloride) or Alkaline batteries if necessary.
- Clean the remote and the remote sensor window on the TV.
- Check the TV power cord. Unplug the TV, wait 10 seconds, then reinsert plug into outlet and push POWER button again.
- Check to be sure TV outlet is not on a wall switch.
- Repeat channel selection.
- Add desired channel numbers (CHANNEL control) into TV memory.
- Check to be sure the TUNER control is set to the CABLE option.

• Check CLOSED CAPTION in menu and turn TEXT Mode OFF.

Cleaning and Care

- To avoid possible shock hazard be sure the TV is unplugged from the electrical outlet before cleaning.
- When cleaning the TV screen take care not to scratch or damage the screen surface (avoid wearing jewelry or using anything abrasive). Wipe the front screen with a clean cloth dampened with water. Use even, easy, vertical strokes when cleaning.
- Gently wipe the cabinet surfaces with a clean cloth or sponge dampened in a solution of cool clear water. Use a clean dry cloth to dry the wiped surfaces.
- Never use thinners, insecticide sprays, or other chemicals on or near the cabinet, as they might cause permanent marring of the cabinet finish.

GLOSSARY TO TELEVISION TERMS

Alternate Channel * Then using the A/CH button on the remote control, toggles between the last two channels viewed.

Auto Programming * When activated, this feature automatically scans for all available channels-from regular antenna or cable signals and stores only active, broadcast stations into the TV's memory.

Channel Edit * Add or delete channels from the sequential tuning cycle to develop a customized list of channels you want to watch. Editing makes it easy to limit the number of channels when scanning the Channel up and down buttons or expand the number of channels available to suit your preference.

Coaxial Cable * A single solid antenna wire normally matched with a metal plug (F-type) end connector that screws (or pushes) directly onto a 75 Ohm input found on the Television or VCR.

Closed Caption * Broadcast standard which allows you to read the voice content of television programs on the TV screen. Designed to help the hearing impaired this feature uses onscreen "text boxes" to show dialogue and conversations while the TV program is in progress.

Audio/Video Inputs * Located on the rear of the TV these connectors (RCA phono type plug) are used for the input of audio and video signals. Designed for use with VCRs (or other accessories) in order to receive higher picture resolution and offer sound connection options.

Identify* Method by which a remote control searches and finds an operating code for another product (such as a VCR or Cable Converter). Once the code has been "identified" then the TV remote can operate and send commands to the other product.

On Screen Displays (OSD) * Refers to the wording or messages generated by the television (or VCR) to help the user with specific menu feature controls (color adjustment, programming, etc.).

Menu * An on-screen listing of feature controls shown on the Television screen that are made available for user adjustments.

Multichannel Television Sound (MTS) * The broadcast standard that allows for stereo sound to be transmitted with the TV picture.

Programming * The procedure of adding or deleting channel numbers into the Television's memory circuits. In this way the Television "remembers" only the locally available or desired channel numbers and skips over any unwanted channel numbers.

Remote Sensor Window * A window or opening found on the Television control panel through which infrared remote control command signals are received.

Second Audio Program (SAP) * Another or additional audio channel provided for in the Multichannel Television Sound (MTS) broadcast standard. The most frequently proposed use for SAP is the simultaneous bilingual broadcast of TV program material.

Status/Exit * Allows the user to quickly confirm what channel number is currently being viewed. Status/Exit can also be used to clear the Television of on screen displays or information (rather than waiting for the displays to "time out" or automatically disappear from the screen).

Twin Lead Wire * The more commonly used name for the two strand 300 Ohm antenna wire used with many indoor and outdoor antenna systems. In many cases this type of antenna wire requires an additional adapter (or balun) in order to connect to the 75 Ohm Input terminals designed into the more recent Televisions and VCRs.

Incredible Stereo * Pseudo-acoustic management of the audio signal produces a dramatic expansion of the wall-of-sound engulfing the listener and heightening overall viewing pleasure.

Smart Lock * Prevents young children from accessing particular broadcast channels (or using audio/video inputs) by electronically locking them out. Undesired channels are blocked out by entering a unique four-number code, which you choose when programming the feature. Blocked-out channels are just as quickly restored with the same process.

Smart Clock * An accurate digital clock that's always right. By monitoring the vertical blanking interval of PBS broadcasts, TVs equipped with Smart Clock can automatically set the right time of day and maintain it through brown-outs, power failures, and even daylight savings time adjustments.

Two-Tuner PIP * This TV has two separate tuners (and two separate tuner inputs) which allow you to watch one show with one tuner, while scanning other channels with the second tuner in the PIP window.



From 90 days to one year from the day of purchase, all parts will be repaired or replaced free, but you pay for all labor charges. From one to two years from the day of purchase, you pay for the replacement or repair of all parts except the picture tube, and for all labor charges. After two years from the day of purchase, you pay for the replacement or repair of all parts, and for all labor charges.
