

INTRODUCTION

This tool has many features for making its use more pleasant and enjoyable. Safety, performance, and dependability have been given top priority in the design of this product making it easy to maintain and operate.



WARNING:

Some dust created by power sanding, sawing, grinding, drilling, and other construction activities contains chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. Some examples of these chemicals are:

- lead from lead-based paints,
- crystalline silica from bricks and cement and other masonry products, and
- arsenic and chromium from chemically-treated lumber.

Your risk from these exposures varies, depending on how often you do this type of work. To reduce your exposure to these chemicals: work in a well ventilated area, and work with approved safety equipment, such as those dust masks that are specially designed to filter out microscopic particles.

GENERAL SAFETY RULES



WARNING!

Read all instructions. Failure to follow all instructions listed below may result in electric shock, fire and/or serious injury. The term "power tool" in all of the warnings listed below refers to your mains-operated (corded) power tool or battery-operated (cordless) power tool.

SAVE THESE INSTRUCTIONS WORK AREA SAFETY

- Keep work area clean and well lit. Cluttered or dark areas invite accidents.
- Do not operate power tools in explosive atmospheres, such as in the presence of flammable liquids, gases or dust. Power tools create sparks which may ignite the dust or fumes.
- Keep children and bystanders away while operating a power tool. Distractions can cause you to lose control.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY

- Power tool plugs must match the outlet. Never modify the plug in any way. Do not use any adapter plugs with earthed (grounded) power tools. Unmodified plugs and matching outlets will reduce risk of electric shock.
- Avoid body contact with earthed or grounded surfaces such as pipes, radiators, ranges and refrigerators. There is an increased risk of electric shock if your body is earthed or grounded.
- Do not expose power tools to rain or wet conditions. Water entering a power tool will increase the risk of electric shock.
- Do not abuse the cord. Never use the cord for carrying, pulling or unplugging the power tool. Keep cord away from heat, oil, sharp edges or moving parts. Damaged or entangled cords increase the risk of electric shock.
- When operating a power tool outdoors, use an extension cord suitable for outdoor use. Use of a cord suitable for outdoor use reduces the risk of electric shock.
- Use battery only with charger listed.

PERSONAL SAFETY

Stay alert, watch what you are doing and use common sense when operating a power tool. Do not use a power tool while you are tired or under the influence of drugs, alcohol or medication. A moment of inattention while operating power tools may result in serious personal injury.

- Use safety equipment. Always wear eye protection. Safety equipment such as dust mask, non-skid safety shoes, hard hat, or hearing protection used for appropriate conditions will reduce personal injuries.
- Avoid accidental starting. Ensure the switch is in the off-position before plugging in. Carrying power tools with your finger on the switch or plugging in power tools that have the switch on invites accidents.
- Remove any adjusting key or wrench before turning the power tool on. A wrench or a key left attached to a rotating part of the power tool may result in personal injury.
- Do not overreach. Keep proper footing and balance at all times. This enables better control of the power tool in unexpected situations.
- Dress properly. Do not wear loose clothing or jewelry. Keep your hair, clothing and gloves away from moving parts. Loose clothes, jewelry or long hair can be caught in moving parts.
- If devices are provided for the connection of dust extraction and collection facilities, ensure these are connected and properly used. Use of these devices can reduce dust-related hazards.
- Do not wear loose clothing or jewelry. Contain long hair. Loose clothes, jewelry, or long hair can be drawn into air vents.
- **Do not use on a ladder or unstable support.** Stable footing on a solid surface enables better control of the power tool in unexpected situations.

POWER TOOL USE AND CARE

- Do not force the power tool. Use the correct power tool for your application. The correct power tool will do the job better and safer at the rate for which it was designed.
- Do not use the power tool if the switch does not turn it on and off. Any power tool that cannot be controlled with the switch is dangerous and must be repaired.
- Disconnect the plug from the power source and/or the battery pack from the power tool before making any adjustments, changing accessories, or storing power tools. Such preventive safety measures reduce the risk of starting the power tool accidentally.
- Store idle power tools out of the reach of children and do not allow persons unfamiliar with the power tool or these instructions to operate the power tool. Power tools are dangerous in the hands of untrained users.
- Maintain power tools. Check for misalignment or binding of moving parts, breakage of parts and any other condition that may affect the power tool's operation. If damaged, have the power tool repaired before use. Many accidents are caused by poorly maintained power tools.
- Keep cutting tools sharp and clean. Properly maintained cutting tools with sharp cutting edges are less likely to bind and are easier to control.

GENERAL SAFETY RULES

■ Use the power tool, accessories and tool bits etc., in accordance with these instructions and in the manner intended for the particular type of power tool, taking into account the working conditions and the work to be performed. Use of the power tool for operations different from those intended could result in a hazardous situation.

BATTERY TOOL USE AND CARE

- Ensure the switch is in the off position before inserting battery pack. Inserting the battery pack into power tools that have the switch on invites accidents.
- Recharge only with the charger specified by the manufacturer. A charger that is suitable for one type of battery pack may create a risk of fire when used with another battery pack.
- Use power tools only with specifically designated battery packs. Use of any other battery packs may create a risk of injury and fire.
- When battery pack is not in use, keep it away from other metal objects like paper clips, coins, keys, nails, screws, or other small metal objects that can make a

- connection from one terminal to another. Shorting the battery terminals together may cause burns or a fire.
- Under abusive conditions, liquid may be ejected from the battery, avoid contact. If contact accidentally occurs, flush with water. If liquid contacts eyes, additionally seek medical help. Liquid ejected from the battery may cause irritation or burns.

SERVICE

Have your power tool serviced by a qualified repair person using only identical replacement parts. This will ensure that the safety of the power tool is maintained.



WARNING!

To reduce the risk of injury, user must read instruction manual.

■ When servicing a power tool, use only identical replacement parts. Follow instructions in the Maintenance section of this manual. Use of unauthorized parts or failure to follow Maintenance instructions may create a risk of shock or injury.

SPECIFIC SAFETY RULES

- Wait for the cutter to stop before setting the tool down. An exposed cutter may engage the surface leading to possible loss of control and serious injury.
- Use clamps or another practical way to secure and support the workpiece to a stable platform. Holding the work by hand or against your body leaves it unstable and may lead to loss of control.
- Hold power tools by insulated gripping surfaces when performing an operation where the cutting tool may contact hidden wiring or its own cord. Contact with a "live" wire will also make exposed metal parts of the tool "live" and shock the operator.
- Know your power tool. Read operator's manual carefully. Learn its applications and limitations, as well as the specific potential hazards related to this tool. Following this rule will reduce the risk of electric shock, fire, or serious injury.
- Always wear safety glasses with side shields. Everyday glasses have only impact resistant lenses. They are NOT safety glasses. Following this rule will reduce the risk of eye injury.
- Protect your lungs. Wear a face or dust mask if the operation is dusty. Following this rule will reduce the risk of serious personal injury.
- Protect your hearing. Wear hearing protection during extended periods of operation. Following this rule will reduce the risk of serious personal injury.
- Battery tools do not have to be plugged into an electrical outlet; therefore, they are always in operating condition. - Do not place battery tools or their batteries near fire or heat. This will reduce the risk of explosion and possibly
- Do not crush, drop or damage battery pack. Do not use a battery pack or charger that has been dropped or received a sharp blow. A damaged battery is subject to explosion. Properly dispose of a dropped or damaged battery immediately.
- Batteries vent hydrogen gas and can explode in the presence of a source of ignition, such as a pilot light. To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, never use any cordless product in the presence of open flame. An exploded battery can propel debris and chemicals. If exposed, flush with water immediately.
- Do not charge battery tool in a damp or wet location. Following this rule will reduce the risk of electric shock.
- For best results, your battery tool should be charged in a location where the temperature is more than 50°F but less than 100°F. To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, do not store outside or in vehicles.
- Under extreme usage or temperature conditions, battery leakage may occur. If liquid comes in contact with your skin, wash immediately with soap and water, then neutralize with lemon juice or vinegar. If liquid gets into your eyes, flush them with clean water for at least 10 minutes, then seek immediate medical attention. Following this rule will reduce the risk of serious personal injury.
- If the power supply cord is damaged, it must be replaced only by the manufacturer or by an authorized service center to avoid risk.

 Before using battery charger, read all instructions and cautionary markings in this manual, on battery charger, battery, and product using battery to prevent misuse of the products and possible injury or damage.



A CAUTION:

To reduce the risk of electric shock or damage to the charger and battery, charge only lithiumion or nickel-cadmium rechargeable batteries as specifically designated on your charger. Other types of batteries may burst, causing personal injury or damage.

- Do not use charger outdoors or expose to wet or damp **conditions.** Water entering charger will increase the risk of electric shock.
- Use of an attachment not recommended or sold by the battery charger manufacturer may result in a risk of fire, electric shock, or injury to persons. Following this rule will reduce the risk of electric shock, fire, or serious personal injury.
- Do not abuse cord or charger. Never use the cord to carry the charger. Do not pull the charger cord rather than the plug when disconnecting from receptacle. Damage to the cord or charger could occur and create an electric shock hazard. Replace damaged cords immediately.
- Make sure cord is located so that it will not be stepped on, tripped over, come in contact with sharp edges or moving parts or otherwise subjected to damage or stress. This will reduce the risk of accidental falls, which could cause injury, and damage to the cord, which could result in electric shock.
- Keep cord and charger from heat to prevent damage to housing or internal parts.

- Do not let gasoline, oils, petroleum-based products, etc. come in contact with plastic parts. They contain chemicals that can damage, weaken, or destroy plastic.
- An extension cord should not be used unless absolutely necessary. Use of improper extension cord could result in a risk of fire and electric shock. If extension cord must be used, make sure:
 - a. That pins on plug of extension cord are the same number, size and shape as those of plug on charger.
 - b. That extension cord is properly wired and in good electrical condition; and
 - c. That wire size is large enough for AC ampere rating of charger as specified below:

Cord Length (Feet) 25' 50' 100' Cord Size (AWG) 16 16 16

NOTE: AWG = American Wire Gauge

- Do not operate charger with a damaged cord or plug, which could cause shorting and electric shock. If damaged, have the charger replaced by an authorized serviceman.
- Do not operate charger if it has received a sharp blow, been dropped, or otherwise damaged in any way. Take it to an authorized serviceman for electrical check to determine if the charger is in good working order.
- Do not disassemble charger. Take it to an authorized serviceman when service or repair is required. Incorrect reassembly may result in a risk of electric shock or fire.
- Unplug charger from outlet before attempting any maintenance or cleaning to reduce the risk of electric shock.
- Disconnect charger from the power supply when not in use. This will reduce the risk of electric shock or damage to the charger if metal items should fall into the opening. It also will help prevent damage to the charger during a power surge.
- Risk of electric shock. Do not touch uninsulated portion of output connector or uninsulated battery terminal.



FEATURES

KNOW YOUR HAND PLANER

See Figure 1.

The safe use of this product requires an understanding of the information on the tool and in this operator's manual as well as a knowledge of the project you are attempting. Before use of this product, familiarize yourself with all operating features and safety rules.

CHIP EXHAUST

The dust bag attaches to the chip exhaust of the planer to keep the work area free of debris. A 1-1/4 in. vacuum hose can also be attached for chip collection.

DEPTH ADJUSTMENT KNOB

The depth adjustment knob selects 0-1/16 in. planing depths, in increments of 1/64 in.

EDGE GUIDE/RABBET GUIDE

The edge guide may be attached for planing edges and making rabbet cuts.

AUTOMATIC REAR STAND

The automatic rear stand allows the planer to sit on a workpiece or table without damaging the workpiece or the blades.

LOCK-OFF BUTTON

The lock-off button locks the switch trigger in the **OFF** position when the switch is released.

SPIRAL CUT BLADE

The blade is attached to a cylinder-shaped blade holder for spiral cut action that creates a smooth finish.

ASSEMBLY

UNPACKING

This product has been shipped completely assembled.

- Carefully remove the tool and any accessories from the box. Make sure that all items listed in the packing list are included.
- Inspect the tool carefully to make sure no breakage or damage occurred during shipping.
- Do not discard the packing material until you have carefully inspected and satisfactorily operated the tool.

INSTALLING/REMOVING THE DUST BAG

See Figure 2.

The dust bag located on the right side of the hand planer provides a dust collection system. Wood particles are drawn up through the base and collect in the dust bag during operation. For more efficient operation, empty the dust bag when half full.

To install, slide the dust bag adaptor onto the dust port on the planer. To remove the dust bag, grasp the adaptor and pull the dust bag away from the planer. **NOTE:** For secure installation of the dust bag, align the slot on the neck of the dust bag with the alignment tab on the bottom of the chip exhaust.

ATTACHING THE PLANER TO A VACUUM

See Figure 3.


The chip collection system of the hand planer has a 1-1/4 in. port for inserting a vacuum hose.


- Remove the dust bag.
- Attach a vacuum hose to the chip exhaust.
- Connect the vacuum to a power supply.



WARNING:

When the tool is not connected to a vacuum, always reinstall the dust bag back onto the tool. Failure to do so could cause dust or foreign objects to be thrown into your face or eyes, which could result in possible serious injury.







WARNING:

Do not allow familiarity with tools to make you careless. Remember that a careless fraction of a second is sufficient to inflict severe injury.



WARNING:

APPLICATIONS

You may use this tool for the purposes listed below:

- Planing the surface of a piece of lumber
- Planing the edge of a piece of lumber
- Making rabbet cuts in a piece of lumber

CAUTION:

If at any point during the charging process none of the LEDs are lit, remove the battery pack from the charger to avoid damaging the product. DO NOT insert another battery. Return the charger and battery to your nearest service center for service or replacement.

CAUTION:

Charge in a well ventilated area. Do not block charger vents. Keep them clear to allow proper ventilation.

NOTE: Charge only RIDGID lithium-ion batteries on the RIDGID lithium-ion charger and RIDGID nickel-cadmium batteries on RIDGID nickel-cadmium chargers. These batteries and chargers are not interchangeable.


THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS ARE FOR RIDGID 24V LITHIUM-ION BATTERY PACKS AND THE 24V RIDGID LITHIUM-ION CHARGER.

CHARGING THE BATTERY PACK

NOTE: New 24 Volt lithium-ion battery packs will not work without first being charged. Before first time use, charge the battery pack to activate it.

It is not necessary to drain the battery pack completely before recharging. Lithium-ion battery packs have no "memory" and can be recharged at any time. It is therefore possible to charge the battery pack before extended usage even if the battery pack is not completely drained of charge. Use the charge level indicator to determine the amount of charge in the battery pack.

Lithium-ion batteries deliver fade free power for their entire run time. 24 Volt lithium-ion tools will not gradually lose power due to decreasing battery charge. Instead, power from the battery pack will drop from full to zero once the full charge has been drained from the battery. Once this happens, the tool's power drops from full to zero, and recharging of the battery is required



TO CHARGE

A fully discharged battery pack with a temperature between 32°F (0°C) and 150°F (65°C) will charge in about an hour.

- Charge the 24 Volt lithium-ion battery pack only with the charger provided.
- Connect the charger to a power supply.
 NOTE: If needed, the charger can operate with most generators and inverters rated at 300 Watts or higher.
- Attach the battery pack to the charger by aligning the raised ribs on the battery pack with the grooves in the charger, then slide the battery pack onto the charger. See Figure 4.
- Do not place the charger in an area of extreme heat or cold. It will work best at normal room temperature.
- After charging is complete, the continuous green light will come on and the charge level indicator lights on the battery will go off.
- The charger will keep the battery pack fully charged if left on the charger.

CHARGE LEVEL INDICATOR

See Figure 5.

The charge level indicator shows that the battery is charged at 1/4, 1/2, 3/4, or full capacity. To display the amount of charge left in the battery, press and hold the charge level indicator button.

NOTE: When the battery pack contains less than 10% charge, the 1/4 charge level indicator will flash.

CHARGING A HOT BATTERY PACK

If the battery pack is above normal temperature range, the red LED will begin flashing and the green LED will be off. When the battery pack cools down to approximately 150°F (65°C), the charger will automatically begin fast charge mode.


NOTE: Refer to **CHARGING THE BATTERY PACK** for normal recharging of batteries. If the charger does not charge the battery pack under normal circumstances, return both the battery pack and charger to your nearest repair center for electrical check. For the location of your nearest repair center, please call 1-866-539-1710.


CHARGING A COOL BATTERY PACK

If the battery pack is below normal temperature range, the red LED will begin flashing and the green LED will be off. When the battery warms to a temperature of more than 14°F (-10°C), the charger will automatically begin charge mode.

COLD WEATHER OPERATION

The lithium-ion battery pack can be used in temperatures down to -4°F. When the battery pack is very cold, it may "buzz" for the first minute of use to warm itself up. Put the battery pack on a tool and use the tool in a light duty application. After about a minute, the pack will have warmed itself up and begin operating normally.

THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS ARE FOR RIDGID NICKEL-CADMIUM BATTERY PACKS AND CHARGERS.

Battery packs for this tool are shipped in a low charge condition to prevent possible problems. Therefore, you should charge the pack until the light on the front of the charger changes from flashing green to continuous green.

NOTE: Batteries will not reach full charge the first time they are charged. Allow several cycles (operation followed by recharging) for them to become fully charged. This is normal for nickel-cadmium batteries.

TO CHARGE

- Charge the battery pack only with the charger provided.
- Make sure the power supply is normal household voltage, 120 volts, 60 Hz, AC only.
- Connect the charger to a power supply.
- Attach the battery pack to the charger by aligning the raised ribs on the battery pack with the grooves in the charger, then slide the battery pack onto the charger. See Figure 7.
- The battery pack will become slightly warm to the touch while charging. This is normal and does not indicate a problem.
- Do not place the charger in an area of extreme heat or cold. It will work best at normal room temperature.
- For average charge times, refer to the chart on the following page.
- When the batteries become fully charged, unplug the charger from the power supply and remove the battery pack.


CHARGING A HOT BATTERY PACK


When using the tool continuously, the batteries in the battery pack will become hot. You should let a hot battery pack cool down for approximately 30 minutes before attempting to recharge. When the battery pack becomes discharged and is hot, the green LED will be off and the red LED will begin flashing.

When the battery pack cools down to approximately 104°F (40°C), the charger will automatically begin fast charge mode.

CHARGING A COOL BATTERY PACK

If the battery pack is below normal temperature range, the red LED will begin flashing and the green LED will be off. When the battery warms to a temperature of more than 41°F (5°C), the charger will automatically begin fast charge mode. **NOTE:** Refer to **CHARGING THE BATTERY PACK** for normal recharging of batteries. If the charger does not charge your battery pack under normal circumstances, return both the battery pack and charger to your nearest repair center for electrical check. For the location of your nearest repair center, please call 1-866-539-1710.

WARNING:

Battery tools are always in operating condition. Therefore, the switch should always be locked when not in use or carrying at your side.

STARTING/STOPPING THE PLANER

See Figure 9.

- **To start:** Push the lock-off button from either side, and then depress the switch trigger.
- To stop: Release the switch trigger.

TO INSTALL BATTERY PACK

See Figure 10.

- Make sure the lock-off button is in the center position.
- Slide the battery pack into the tool.
- Make sure the latches on each side of the battery pack snap into place and the battery pack is secured in the tool before beginning operation.

TO REMOVE BATTERY PACK

See Figure 10.

- Make sure the lock-off button is in the center position.
- Locate the latches on the side of the battery pack and depress to release the battery pack from the tool.
- The battery pack will automatically disconnect in the direction to be removed when the buttons are depressed.




AUTOMATIC REAR STAND

See Figure 11.

The planer has been equipped with an automatic rear stand that will prevent the blade from contacting the workbench when not in use. As you begin your planing operation, the stand will automatically retract as it passes over the edge of the workpiece. When setting the planer down on your workbench, the rear stand will automatically pivot down to prevent the blade from making any contact.



WARNING:

Make sure the automatic rear stand operates freely at all times and that the area surrounding the stand is clear of debris. Failure to do so could result in serious personal injury.

PLANING DEPTH

See Figure 12.

Always work from a rough cut to a finish cut. The approximate setting for rough planing is 1/32 in. For finish planing use a setting of approximately 1/64 in. Make test cuts in scrap wood after each adjustment to make sure that the planer is removing the desired amount of wood.

To set the planing depth:

- Make sure the lock-off button is in the center position.
 NOTE: The switch automatically locks when the lock-off button is not depressed to the left or the right.
- Turn the depth adjustment knob to the desired setting.

NOTE: To protect the blades during storage, transporting, etc., set the depth adjustment to 0.




OPERATING THE PLANER

See Figure 13.

Clamp the work securely.



WARNING:

Work moving during a cut could result in loss of control of the planer and cause serious injury.

- Support the work so that the operation is on your right.
- Adjust the planing depth.
- Hold the planer with both hands. Hold the front handle with your left hand and the rear handle with your right hand.



WARNING:

Always use two hands on the tool for any operation. This assures that you maintain control and avoid risk of serious personal injury. Always properly support and clamp the work so that both hands are free to control the planer.

- Place the front shoe on the edge of work to be planed. NOTE: Make sure the blades are not touching the work.
- Apply pressure to the front handle so that the front shoe is completely flat on the work.
- Start the planer and let the motor reach maximum speed.
- Hold the planer firmly and push it forward into the work, using a slow, steady motion.
- Apply downward pressure toward the rear handle as you reach the end of the planed cut. This helps keep the rear section of the planer base in contact with the work and prevents the front of the planer from gouging the cut.




WARNING:

Be careful to avoid hitting nails or any other foreign objects during planing operation; this action could nick, crack, or damage blades.

NOTE: We suggest that you always keep an extra set of blades on hand. As soon as the blades show signs of becoming dull, replace them.

Plane slowly and empty the dust bag often.

NOTE: Using a battery in a low charge condition will cause chip build-up and clogging of the chip exhaust. This will also affect the quality of the cut. Keep a freshly-charged battery available and replace the discharged battery when you notice a decrease in performance.



CAUTION:

Planing too fast results in a poor finish and increases chip build-up in the chip exhaust. Chip build-up restricts air flow and can cause motor overheating.



WARNING:

Do not attempt to clear a blocked chip exhaust until the blades stop and you have removed the battery. Failure to heed this warning can result in serious personal injury.

CHAMFERING

See Figure 14.

The planer is designed with a chamfering groove in the front shoe to chamfer edges of boards as shown. Before making a cut on good lumber, practice cutting on scrap lumber to determine the amount to be removed.

- Clamp the work securely.
- Hold the front handle with your left hand and the rear handle with your right hand.
- Place the chamfering groove on the surface to be cut.
- Start the planer and let the motor reach maximum speed.
- Hold the planer firmly and push it forward into the work, using a slow, steady motion.
- Apply downward pressure to keep the planer flat at the beginning and the end of the work surface.


PLANING EDGES AND MAKING RABBET CUTS


The planer comes with an adjustable edge guide for precision edge planing and rabbet cutting. Attach the edge guide to either side of the planer for planing edges. Attach the edge guide to the left side for making rabbet cuts.

ATTACHING THE EDGE GUIDE FOR PLANING EDGES

See Figure 15.

- Remove the battery pack from the tool.
- Attach the bracket to the desired side of the planer using the knob bolt.
- Attach the edge guide to the bracket using the knob nut and the carriage head bolt.
- Tighten the knob nut, knob bolt, and carriage head bolt securely.
- Reinstall the battery pack.





PLANING EDGES

See Figure 16.

Follow the directions in the "Operating the Planer" section earlier in this manual. Hold the edge guide firmly against the edge of the work surface.

ATTACHING THE EDGE GUIDE FOR MAKING RABBET CUTS

See Figure 15.

- Remove the battery pack from the tool.
- Attach the bracket to the left side of the planer using the knob bolt.
- Attach the edge guide loosely to the bracket using the knob nut and the carriage head bolt.
- Adjust the edge guide to the desired width for the rabbet cut
- Tighten the retaining knob securely.
- Reinstall the battery pack.

MAKING RABBET CUTS

See Figure 17.

Follow the directions in the "Operating the Planer" section earlier in this manual. Hold the edge guide firmly against the edge of the work surface.

The depth of the rabbet is determined by the depth of the cut and the number of passes made along the work surface. The maximum depth of the rabbet cut is 1/2 in. Cuts should be made in 1/16 in. passes, or less, to reach the desired depth. The width of the rabbet cut may be adjusted by moving the edge guide.




MAINTENANCE



WARNING:

When servicing use only identical RIDGID replacement parts. Use of any other parts may create a hazard or cause product damage.



WARNING:

Always wear safety goggles or safety glasses with side shields during power tool operation or when blowing dust. If operation is dusty, also wear a dust mask.



WARNING:

To avoid serious personal injury, always remove the battery pack from the tool when cleaning or performing any maintenance.

GENERAL MAINTENANCE

Avoid using solvents when cleaning plastic parts. Most plastics are susceptible to damage from various types of commercial solvents and may be damaged by their use. Use clean cloths to remove dirt, dust, oil, grease, etc.



WARNING:

Do not at any time let brake fluids, gasoline, petroleum-based products, penetrating oils, etc., come in contact with plastic parts. Chemicals can damage, weaken or destroy plastic which may result in serious personal injury.

Only the parts shown on the parts list are intended to be repaired or replaced by the customer. All other parts should be replaced at a RIDGID authorized service center.

BATTERIES

This tool will accept 24V lithium-ion batteries or 18V nickelcadmium batteries. Length of service from each charging will depend on the type of work you are doing.

The batteries for this tool have been designed to provide maximum trouble-free life. However, like all batteries, they will eventually wear out. Do not disassemble battery pack and attempt to replace the batteries. Handling of these batteries, especially when wearing rings and jewelry, could result in a serious burn.

To obtain the longest possible battery life, we suggest the following:

For lithium-ion batteries:

Remove the battery pack from the charger once it is fully charged and ready for use.

For battery pack storage longer than 30 days:

- Store the battery pack where the temperature is below 80°F and away from moisture.
- Store battery packs in a 30%-50% charged condition.
- Every six months of storage, charge the pack as normal.

For nickel-cadmium batteries:

 Remove the battery pack from the charger once it is fully charged and ready for use.

For battery pack storage longer than 30 days:

- Store the battery pack where the temperature is below 80°F.
- Store battery packs in a "discharged" condition.

BATTERY PACK REMOVAL AND PREPARATION FOR RECYCLING



To preserve natural resources, please recycle or dispose of batteries properly.

This product uses lithium-ion or nickelcadmium batteries. Local, state or federal laws may prohibit disposal of batteries in ordinary trash.

WARNING:

Upon removal, cover the battery pack's terminals with heavy-duty adhesive tape. Do not attempt to destroy or disassemble battery pack or remove any of its components. MAINTENANCE

REPLACING BLADES

See Figures 18 - 19.

Always replace blades in pairs. Do not attempt to sharpen blades. If the blades become dull, replace them.

When replacing the blades, use recommended replacement blade only, RIDGID part number 671480001.




WARNING:


Blades are sharp. Use extreme caution when replacing the blades. Failure to heed this warning can result in serious personal injury.

- Remove the battery pack from the tool.
- Secure the planer in an upside-down position.
- Loosen the three screws securing the blade and blade clamp on the blade holder using the blade wrench provided.

NOTE: Before removing the old blades, take notice of the direction of cut as well as how the tapered edge of the old blades are oriented. The tapered edge of the new blades must be in the same orientation as the original blades, with the tapered edge on the same side as the screw heads and the flat edge facing the cylinder.

- Remove the blade and blade clamp.
- Remove the old blade from the blade holder.
- Clean any sawdust or wood chips from around the blade area.
- Place the new blade in position on the blade holder, with the three screws aligned with the screw holes.
- Replace the blade clamp.
- Replace and retighten the three blade-securing screws using the blade wrench.
- Repeat the above procedure to change the other blade.





MAINTENANCE

REPLACING THE BELT

See Figures 20 - 21.

When replacing the belt, use the recommended replacement belt only, RIDGID part number 570279001.

- Remove the battery pack from the tool.
- Remove belt cover screws.
- Remove the belt cover.
- Remove the old drive belt from the large pulley by turning the small pulley in a counterclockwise direction. As you turn the belt, pull and work it off the large pulley until it has been completely removed from both pulleys.
- Install the new belt over the small pulley. As you turn the belt, push and work it onto the large pulley, turning the pulley clockwise until the belt is in place.
- Replace the belt cover.
- Install belt cover screws and tighten securely, but do not overtighten.

CLEANING THE CHIP EXHAUST AND EMPTY-ING THE DUST BAG

See Figure 22.

After using the planer for an extended period of time or when planing wet or green lumber, chips may build up in the chip exhaust. Chip build-up restricts air flow and causes the motor to overheat. Clean the chip exhaust port and empty the dust bag regularly.

- Remove the battery pack from the tool.
- Remove the dust bag from the exhaust port.
- Clean the build-up from the exhaust port with a small piece of wood. Do not use your hands or fingers.
- Unzip the dust bag.
- Empty all debris from the dust bag and ensure that the collar is free of debris.
- Replace the dust bag.




