

Safety and General Information

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorised antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.

Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline telephone.

Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body.

Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries and antenna, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.Motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimetres) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches (15 centimetres) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your GP may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- · Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, unless it is a phone type especially qualified for use in such areas and certified as "Intrinsically Safe." Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

Batteries

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become guite hot. Exercise care in handling any charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, bag, or other container with metal objects. Use only Motorola original batteries and chargers.

Your battery or phone may contain symbols, defined as follows:

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to blinking lights, such as when watching television

or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a blinking-lights feature on your phone. (The blinking-light feature is not available on all products.)

Parents should monitor their children's use of video game or other features that incorporate blinking lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a blinking-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- · Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- · Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you play games on your phone, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.
- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.

Getting Started

About This Guide

This guide describes the basic features of your Motorola wireless phone.

Optional Features



This label identifies an optional network, SIM card, or subscription-dependent feature that may not be offered by all service providers in all geographical areas. Contact your service provider for more information.

Optional Accessories



This label identifies a feature that requires an optional Motorola Original™ accessory.

Installing the SIM Card

Your SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.



Battery Use

Battery performance depends on many factors, including your wireless carrier's network configuration; signal strength; the temperature at which you operate your phone; the features and/or settings you select and use; items attached to your phone's accessory connector; and your voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Caution: To prevent injuries or burns, do not allow metal objects to contact or short-circuit the battery terminals.

To maximise your battery's performance:

- Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers.
 The phone warranty does not cover damage caused from using non-Motorola batteries and/or battery chargers.
- New batteries or batteries that have been stored for a long time may require a longer charge time.
- Maintain the battery at or near room temperature when charging.
- Do not expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When you do not intend to use a battery for a while, store it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Batteries gradually wear down and require longer charging times. This is normal. If you charge your battery regularly and notice a decrease in talk time or an increase in charging time, then it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



The rechargeable batteries that power this phone must be disposed of properly and may need to be recycled. Refer to your battery's label for battery type. Contact your local recycling centre for proper disposal methods.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.


Installing the Battery

Note: If necessary, remove the battery from its protective clear plastic case.



Your phone is designed to use only Motorola Original batteries and accessories. We recommend that you store batteries in their protective cases when not in use.

- 1 Squeeze the sides of the front housing in the middle of the "Motorola" logo as shown in the diagram;
- 2 Simultaneously press the release button on the top of the phone with the thumb of your free hand;
- **3** While implementing Steps 1 and 2, pull the rear housing away from the phone.



Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Action

1 Plug the travel charger into the bottom of your phone.



- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates Charge Complete, remove the travel charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

Turning Your Phone On

Action

Press and hold for 2 seconds to turn on the phone.



2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press (S) to unlock the SIM card.

Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays SIM Blocked.

3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press OK () to unlock the phone.

Adjusting Volume

Press the 5-way Navigation key (((a)) left or right to increase or decrease volume.



- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible

Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the key left once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the key right to switch back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

Alternatively the volume can also be accessed by pressing menu > Settings > Ring Styles.

Receiving a Multimedia Message



When you receive an MMS message, your phone displays the ∜ (message waiting) indicator and a **New Message** notification, and sounds an alert.

READ (🥌)	open the message

MMS messages that you receive can contain the following media objects:

- Pictures, and animations are displayed as you read the message.
- · A sound file or video clip begins playing when its slide is displayed.

Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/filename and press **VIEW** (()) (image file type), **PLAY** (()) (sound file or video clip), or **OPEN** (()) (object such as phonebook or datebook entry, or unknown file type).


Playing Video Clips

You can download video clips with the micro-browser, and send and receive video clips in multimedia messages.



Using the Display


The *home screen* displays when you are **not** on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left soft key () or right soft key () to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

Your phone can display an analogue or digital clock in the home screen (see page 67).

The following status indicators can display:



1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the \mathbf{r}^{a} (no signal) indicator or $\mathbf{r}^{a} \times$ (no transmit) indicator displays.

2. GPRS Indicator



Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:

 \blacksquare = GPRS PDP context \blacksquare = GPRS packet data active \blacksquare available

3. Data Transmission Indicator

Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:

= secure application connection

□ = secure Circuit Switch
Data (CSD) call

B = Bluetooth® connection

= insecure application connection

= insecure CSD call

4. Roam Indicator



Shows when your phone is seeking or using another network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

5. Active Line Indicator



Shows 🗓 or 🗘 to indicate the current active phone line. Other indicators can include:

6. Message Indicator



Displays when you receive a new message. Indicators can include:

When you enter a message, a number in this location shows the number of characters left on the current page (text message), or the message size (multimedia message).

7. Location Indicator



Your phone may be able to send location information to the network during an emergency call. Indicators show when your phone is sending location information:


Using the 5-Way Navigation Key



Use the 5-way navigation key (⑤) to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system, highlight menu items, change feature settings, and play games. Press the centre select button to select a highlighted menu item.

Using Menus

From the home screen, press to enter the main menu.

Selecting a Menu Feature


To select a menu feature, starting from the home screen:

Find the Feature > Recent Calls > Dialled Calls

This example shows that from the home screen, you must press scroll to and select Recent Calls from the main menu, then scroll to and select Dialled Calls. Press to scroll, and the left/right soft keys to select the functions listed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



Press (to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.

- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetised list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.

When an option displays a list of possible values, press
 left or right to scroll through and select a value.


When an option displays a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text

Some features require you to enter information.



The message centre lets you compose and send text messages. A Character Counter indicates how many more characters will fit in a message.



Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The method (for example, iTAP predictive text or TAP input mode) you select remains active until you select another method.

Press is in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

Primary The primary text entry mode (see below to set).

Numeric Enter numbers only (see page 39).

Symbol Enter symbols only (see page 39).

Secondary The secondary text entry mode (see below to set).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry mode in any text entry screen by pressing > Entry Mode.

Tip: You can switch between text Entry Methods by pressing whilst in edit mode.

Setting Up a Text Entry Mode

Press > Entry Setup from any text entry screen. Select Primary Setup or Secondary Setup, and choose:

ITAP Let the phone predict each word as you

Using Tap Method


This is the standard method for entering text on your phone.


Tap Method Text Entry Rules

- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press down to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press to exit without saving.

Using iTAP™ Method

iTAP[™] software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **Tap** method, because your phone combines the key presses into common words.

For example, if you press [] [] [] [], letter combinations that match your keypresses display:



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Entering Words

In a text entry screen, you can press to switch entry modes. An indicator shows which method is active (see page 34). If **ITAP** method is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 33.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's integrated handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press **SPEAKER** () to turn the handsfree speaker on or off while either dialling a call or during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press **SPEAKER** () again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, and/or call barring password if necessary.

To change a code or password:

Find the Feature Settings > Security > New Passwords

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 54).

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Voice Name** and press **RECORD** (). When you are ready, press **RECORD** () again and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds). When prompted, press **RECORD** () and repeat the name. Press **DONE** () to store the voice name.

Storing a Picture for Caller ID

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

You can store a picture for a phonebook entry. The picture displays when you receive calls from the entry.

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Picture** and press **CHANGE** (\bigcirc). Press \bigcirc to select a picture, and press **SELECT** (\bigcirc) to store it for the entry.

Dialling a Number

Note: You can also access the Phonebook from idle display by pressing , depending on local settings.

Press $\stackrel{}{\underline{}}$ > Phonebook, press $\stackrel{}{\underline{}}$ > Categories, then select whether you want to view All entries, entries in a predefined category (Business, Personal, General, WIPs), or entries in a category you created.


