Understanding this User Manual

The sections of this manual generally follow the features of your device. A robust index for features begins on page 128.

Also included is important safety information, beginning on page 109, that you should know before using your device.

This manual gives navigation instructions according to the default display settings. If you select other settings, navigation steps may be different.

Unless otherwise specified, all instructions in this manual assume that you are starting from a Home screen. To get to the Home screen, you may need to unlock the device or keypad. For more information, see *"Securing Your Device"* on page 10.

Note: Instructions in this manual are based on default settings, and may vary from your device, depending on the software version on your device, and any changes to the device's Settings.

Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the device unlocked, at the Home screen.

All screen images in this manual are simulated. Actual displays may vary, depending on the software version of your device and any changes to the device's Settings.

Special Text

In this manual, you'll find text that is set apart from the rest. These are intended to point out important information, share quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more. The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Presents alternative options for the current feature, menu, or sub-menu.
- Tips: Provides quick or innovative methods, or useful shortcuts.
- Important: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance.
- Warning: Brings to your attention important information to prevent loss of data or functionality, or even prevent damage to your device.

Text Conventions

This manual provides condensed information about how to use your device. To make this possible, the following text conventions are used to represent often-used steps:

→ Arrows are used to represent the sequence of selecting successive options in longer, or repetitive, procedures. For example:

"From a Home screen, touch Menu $\blacksquare \rightarrow$ Settings \rightarrow Wireless and network \rightarrow Wi-Fi settings."

Activating your device

If you purchased your device at a store, it is activated and ready to use. If you received a new device by mail, it may need to be activated before you can use it.

To activate your device, choose from the following:

- Visit your wireless provider's store.
- Contact your wireles provider's customer support.

Displaying Your Device Number

► From a Home screen, touch Menu = → Settings → About device → Status.

Your device number displays under Device number.

Battery

Your device is powered by a rechargeable, standard Li-Ion battery. A Wall/USB Charger (Charging Head and USB cable) are included with the device, for charging the battery.

Note: The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your device for the first time.

After the first charge, you can use the device while charging.

Warning!: Use only approved charging devices. Approved accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

Battery Indicator

The Battery icon (in the Status Bar shows battery power level. When battery power is less than fifteen percent (15%), your device will prompt you to charge the battery. If you continue to operate the device without charging, the device will power off.

Tip: Task Manager provides helpful information about extending battery life. For more information, see "Task Manager" on page 8.

Charging the Battery

Your device comes with a Wall/USB Charger (Outlet Connector, Charging Head and USB cable) to charge your device from any standard 120/220 VAC outlet.

Note: The battery comes partially charged. You must fully charge the battery before using your device for the first time.

After the first charge, you can use the device while charging.

- 1. Carefully slide the Outlet Connector into the Charging Head
 - (1), making sure the connection is secure. Outlet Connector



- 2. Insert the USB cable into the Charging Head (2).
- Insert the USB cable into the device's Charger/Accessory Port.



- 4. Plug the Charging Head into a standard AC power outlet.
- When charging is complete, unplug the Charging Head from the power outlet and remove the USB cable from the device.

Turning Your Device On and Off

Turning Your Device On

Press and hold the Power/Lock Key.

Note: Your device's internal antenna is located along the bottom back of the device. Do not block the antenna; doing so may affect signal quality and may cause the device to operate at a higher power level than is necessary.

Turning Your Device Off

- 1. Press and hold the Power/Lock Key
- 2. At the prompt, touch Power off.

Your Google Account

Your device uses your Google account to fully utilize its Android features, including Gmail, Maps, Navigation, Google Talk and the Android Market. When you turn on your device for the first time, use Accounts and sync settings to set up a connection with your existing Google account, or create a new Google account. For more information, see *"Accounts and sync"* on page 99.

System Tutorial

Learn about important concepts to get the most out of your device.

► From a Home screen, touch Menu => Settings → About device → System tutorial.

Roaming

When you travel outside your home network's coverage area, your device can roam to acquire service on other compatible digital networks. When Roaming is active, the Roaming icon \triangle appears in the Status Bar of the display.

Tip: You can set your device's roaming behavior. For more information, see "Mobile networks" on page 90.

During roaming, some services may not be available. Contact your wireless provider for more information about your coverage area and service plan.

Task Manager

Your device can run applications simultaneously, with some applications running in the background.

Use Task Manager to see which applications are running on your device, and to end running applications to extend battery life. You can also uninstall applications from your device and see how much memory is used by applications.

Task Manager provides information about applications, including:

- Active applications: View and end running applications.
- Package: View and uninstall application packages.
- RAM manager: View and manage RAM (Random Access Memory) usage.
- Summary: View memory usage.
- Help: Useful tips for extending battery life.

- From a Home screen, touch Applications →
 Task Manager.
- Touch the Active applications tab to view applications running on your device. Touch End to end an application, or End all to stop all running applications.
- Touch the Package tab to view applications installed from Android Market. Touch Uninstall to remove an application from your device.
- 4. Touch the RAM manager tab to display the amount of RAM (Random Access Memory) currently in use. Touch Level 1 to clear inactive processes, or Level 2 to clear inactive and background processes, then touch Clear Memory.
- Touch the Summary tab for RAM and Storage memory statistics.
- 6. Touch the **Help** tab for information about extending battery life.
- Tip: To launch Task Manager from any screen, touch and hold Home 🖒 , then touch Task Manager.

You can also access Task Manager from the **Program Monitor** widget. For more information, see *"Widgets"* on page 20.

Memory Card

Your device supports removable microSDTM or microSDHCTM memory cards, for storage of music, pictures, videos, and other files.

Note: You can only store music files that you own (from a CD or purchased with the device) on a memory card.



Installing a Memory Card

Note: A 16GB microSD memory card is pre-installed in your device.

- 1. Open the Memory Card Slot cover and turn to expose the slot.
- With the gold contacts facing down, carefully slide the memory card into the slot, pushing gently until it clicks into place.
- 3. Replace the Memory Card Slot cover.

Removing a Memory Card

Important!: To prevent damage to information stored on the memory card, unmount the card before removing it from the device.

- From a Home screen, touch Menu = → Settings → SD card and device storage → Unmount SD card.
- 2. Open the Memory Card Slot cover and turn to expose the slot.
- 3. Gently press down on the memory card, so that it pops out from the slot, and carefully pull the card out.
- 4. Replace the Memory Slot cover.

Securing Your Device

By default, the device locks automatically when the screen times out, or you can lock it manually. You can unlock the device using one of the default Unlock screens, or for increased security, use a personal screen unlock pattern.

Locking the device manually

Press the Power/Lock Key

Unlocking the device

- 1. Press the Power/Lock Key _____.
- Touch and drag
 Unlock from left to right.

You can also set the master Volume level from the lock screen. Touch and drag **Sound** from right to left to toggle Sound between ON and OFF modes.



Front View



- 1. 3.5mm Headset Jack: Plug in an optional headset or TTY equipment.
- 2. Menu Key: Touch to display options for the current screen.
- Home Key: Touch to display the Home screen. Touch and hold to display recent applications or launch Task Manager.
- 4. Back Key: Touch to return to the previous screen or option.
- Search Key: Touch to launch Google Search, to search your device or the web.
- 6. Front-facing Camera Lens: Used when taking pictures.
- Light Sensor: Used to control screen brightness automatically, and when taking pictures with the Frontfacing Camera.

Side and Top Views



- Microphone: Used to pick up your voice, or audio during recording.
- Memory Card Slot: Install a memory card for storage of files.
- Volume Key: From a Home screen, press to adjust Master volume. During playback, press to adjust Media volume.
- Power/Lock Key: Press and hold to turn the device on or off. Press to lock the device, or to wake the screen for unlocking.

Back View



- 1. Camera Flash: Used when taking photos.
- Camera Lens: Used when taking photos or recording videos.
- 3. USB Power/Accessory Port: Plug in a USB cable for charging or to sync music and files.
- 4. External Speakers: Used in music or video playback, notification tones, and for other sounds.

Home Screen

The Home screen is the starting point for using your device.



Note: Unless stated otherwise, instructions in this User Manual start with the device unlocked, at the Home screen.

- Status Bar: Presents icons to show notifications, network status, battery power, and connection details. For a list of icons, see "Status Bar" on page 19.
- Widgets: Applications that run on the Home screen. These widgets are found on the Home screen by default. For more information, see "Widgets" on page 20.
- Home screen: The starting point for using your device. Place icons, widgets and other items to customize your device to your needs.
- Shortcuts: Shortcuts to common applications. These shortcuts are found on the Home screen by default. For more information, see "Shortcuts" on page 22.
- Primary Shortcuts: Shortcuts to common features. For more information, see "Primary Shortcuts" on page 20.

Warning!: If your device has a touch screen display, note that a touch screen responds best to a light touch from the pad of your finger. Using excessive force or a metallic object when pressing on the touch screen may damage the tempered glass surface and void the warranty. Extended Home Screen

The Home screen consists of the Home panel, plus 4 panels that extend beyond the display width to provide more space for adding shortcuts, widgets and folders. You can also add panels, to a total of 9.

Slide your finger horizontally across the screen to scroll to the left or right side panels. As you scroll, the indicator at the top of the display shows your current position.

Adding and removing Home screen panels

Your device comes with 5 Home screen panels. You can customize the Home screen to include additional panels, and set one panel as Home.

- 1. From a Home screen, touch Menu $\blacksquare \rightarrow Edit.$
- 2. Use these controls to configure panels:
 - **Remove**: Touch and drag a panel to the Trash Can to remove the panel from the Home screen.



Add: Touch to add a new panel, up to a total of 9.

To rearrange the order of panels, touch and drag a panel to a new location.

Tip: You can also display Edit options by pinching the Home screen.

Navigating Your Device

Use command keys and the touch screen to navigate.

Command Keys

Menu Key

Touch $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Menu}}\xspace$ to display options for the current screen or feature.

Home Key

Touch Home \frown to display the Home screen.

Touch and hold **Home** for a menu of recent applications, or to launch Task Manager.

Back Key

Touch Back 🗂 to return to the previous screen, option or step. Search Key

Touch $\ensuremath{\textbf{Search}}\xspace Q$ to search the web and your device.

Context-sensitive Menus

Context-sensitive menus offer options for that feature or screen. To access context-sensitive menus:

- Touch Menu 🔳.
- Touch and hold on an item.

Finger Gestures

Touch

Touch items to select or launch them. For example:

- Touch the on screen keyboard to enter characters or text.
- Touch a menu item to select it.
- Touch an application's icon to launch the application.

Touch and Hold

Activate onscreen items. For example:

- Touch and hold a widget on the home screen to move it.
- Touch and hold on a field to display a pop-up menu of options.

Swipe, Flick or Slide

Swipe, flick or slide your finger vertically or horizontally across the screen. For example:

- · Unlocking the screen
- · Scrolling the Home screens or a menu

Pinch

Use two fingers, such as your index finger and thumb, to make an inward pinch motion on the screen, as if you're picking something up, or an outward motion by sweeping your fingers out. For example:

- Pinch the Home screen to show customization options.
- Pinch a picture in Gallery to zoom in.

Notification Panel

The Notification Panel shows information about connections, messages and other items.

Sweep your finger downward from the top of the screen.



Icons

Icons at the top of the Notification Panel show status for:

- Wi-Fi: Touch to enable or disable Wi-Fi. For more information, see "Wi-Fi" on page 65.
- Bluetooth: Touch to enable or disable Bluetooth. For more information, see "Bluetooth" on page 68.
- GPS: Touch to enable Standalone GPS services. For more information, see "Use wireless networks" on page 95.
- Sound mode: Touch to toggle Silent mode on or off.
- Orientation Lock: Touch to enable or disable Orientation Lock. When enabled, the screen orientation locks in the current orientation (horizontal or vertical) and will not rotate when you rotate the device.

Brightness

Touch and drag the slider to set the brightness, or touch **Auto** to allow the device to set brightness automatically based on available light and battery charge status.

Clearing Notifications

- Sweep your finger downward from the top of the screen to display the Notifications Panel.
- 2. Touch a notification to clear it.

Touch Clear to clear all notifications.

Status Bar

The Status Bar displays icons to show device status.

- **3G Coverage**: 3G network coverage is available.
 - **3G Connection Active**: Device is active on a 3G network.
- **1x Coverage**: 1xRTT network coverage is available.
 - 1x Connection Active: Device is active on a 1xRTT network.
 - **Signal Strength:** Current signal strength. The greater the number of bars, the stronger the signal.
 - **Roaming**: Your phone is outside the home coverage area, and roaming mode is active.
- Airplane Mode Active: All wireless communications are disabled. See "Airplane mode" on page 85.
- System Alert: Check Notifications Panel for alerts.
- Battery Level: Shown fully charged.
- Charging Indicator: Battery is charging.
 - **Device Power Critical**: Battery has less than twenty percent (20%) power remaining.

- **USB Connected**: Device is connected to a computer using a USB cable.
- New Message: You have new message(s).

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- New Email Message: You have new email.
 - **Alarm Set**: An alarm is active. For more information, refer to *"Alarm Clock"* on page 72.
 - Silent mode: All sounds except media and alarms are silenced, and Vibrate mode is not active. See "Silent mode" on page 91.
 - Vibrate mode: Silent mode and Vibrate mode are active. See "Vibrate" on page 91.
- Preparing SD Card: A memory card is installed.
- SD Card Removed: Memory card was uninstalled.
 - Bluetooth Active: Bluetooth is turned on.

Widgets

Widgets are self-contained applications that you can place on the Home screen to access your favorite features.

Adding Widgets to the Home screen

- Navigate to the desired Home screen, then touch and hold on the screen to display the Add to Home screen menu.
- 2. Touch Widgets, then touch a widget to add it to the Home screen.

Removing Widgets

► Touch and hold the Widget until **Remove (III**) appears, then drag the Widget to the **Remove icon** to remove it.

AccuWeather Clock: Display the forecast from AccuWeather. Touch the widget to choose locations.



Analog Clock: Display an analog clock.

Calendar Clock: Display an analog clock with the current date.



Daily Briefing: Monitor the weather, financial information, news and your schedule from one convenient location. Appears on the Home screen by default. For more information, see *"Daily Briefing"* on page 77.



Google Search: Display a Google Search bar. For more information, see *"Google Search"* on page 53.



Homescreen tips: Display tips about the Home screen. The Homescreen tips widget appears on the main Home screen by default.



Latitude: Locate your friends on a map, and share or hide your location. For more information, see *"Latitude"* on page 52.



Market: Download applications from the Android Market. See *"Market"* on page 79.

News and Weather: Display current news and weather for your location. For more information, see *"News and Weather"* on page 53.



- Picture frame: Display a picture on the Home screen.

Adding Shortcuts from Applications

- 1. Navigate to a Home screen panel.
- 2. Touch Applications
- Touch and hold on an application icon. The Shortcut icon is automatically placed on the selected Home screen.


Removing Shortcuts

► Touch and hold the Shortcut until **Remove** appears, then drag the Shortcut to the **Remove** icon.

Folders

Place Folders on the Home screen to organize items together on the Home screen.

- Navigate to the desired Home screen, then touch and hold on the screen to display the Add to Home screen menu.
- 2. Touch Folders, then touch a selection:



- All contacts: Create a folder containing all contacts.
- **Contacts with phone numbers**: Create a folder containing contacts with stored phone numbers.
- **Received list from Bluetooth**: Create a folder containing a list of items received via Bluetooth.
- Recent documents: Create a folder containing documents opened recently.
 - **Starred contacts**: Create a folder containing contacts marked as Favorites.

Removing Folders

► Touch and hold the Folder until **Remove** appears, then drag the Folder to the **Remove** icon.

Wallpaper

Choose a picture to display in the background of the Home screen. You can choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images, or select a picture you've downloaded or taken with the Camera.

- From a Home screen, touch and hold on the screen to display the Add to Home screen menu, then touch Wallpapers.
 - or –

From a Home screen, touch Menu $\square \rightarrow$ Wallpaper.

- 2. Choose a source for images:
 - Gallery: Access the Gallery to choose a picture from an installed memory card. Touch a picture to select it, then use the crop tool to resize the picture, if desired. Touch Save to save the picture as wallpaper.
 - Live wallpapers: Choose from pre-loaded interactive animated wallpapers. Touch a wallpaper to see an example, then touch Set wallpaper.
 - Wallpaper gallery: Choose from pre-loaded wallpaper images. Touch a wallpaper, then touch **Set wallpaper**.

Applications

The Applications screen holds all applications on your wireless device. Applications that you download and install from the Android Market or from the web are also added to the Applications screen.

You can place shortcuts to applications on the Home screen, for quick access to the application. For more information, see "Adding Shortcuts from Applications" on page 22.

- 1. From a Home screen, touch Applications
- 2. Slide your finger left or right to scroll the Applications screens.
- 3. Touch an icon to launch the application.

Customizing the Applications Screens

- Touch and hold an application icon, then drag it to a new location.
- 4. When you are finished, touch Menu $\square \rightarrow$ Save.

Gmail: Send and receive emails via Gmail, Google's web-based email. See "*Gmail*" on page 42.

This section explains how to manage contacts and accounts.

Accounts

Your device can synchronize with a variety of accounts. With synchronization, information on your device is updated with any information that changes in your accounts.

- Microsoft Exchange: Add your Exchange account to sync Contacts, Calendar and Email.
- Google: Add your Google account to sync your Contacts, Calendar and Gmail.
- Facebook: Add your Facebook account to sync Contacts.
- Twitter: Add your Twitter SNS Service to sync Contacts.
- MySpace: Sync with MySpace SNS Service for Contacts.

Note: You must register your device with your social networking site before using the device to access the network.

Setting Up Your Accounts

Set up and manage your synchronized accounts with the Accounts and sync setting.

- From a Home screen, touch Menu = → Settings → Accounts and sync.
- 2. Touch Add account, then select the account type.
- Follow the prompts to enter your account credentials to complete the set-up process.
- The device communicates with account servers to set up your account. When complete, your account appears in the Manage accounts area of the Accounts and sync screen.

Setting Up a Facebook account

Note: You must register your device with your social networking site before using the device to access the network.

- From a Home screen, touch Menu → Settings → Accounts and sync → Add account →Facebook.

Contacts

Store contact information for your friends, family and colleagues, to quickly access information or to send a message.

To access Contacts:

From a Home screen, touch Contacts [2].

Tip: A shortcut to Contacts appears on the Home screen by default.

Creating Contacts

- 2. At the Save contact to prompt, touch Device to save the account to your Contacts only, or touch an account for synchronizing the contact (available options depend on the accounts you have set up for synchronization).

- Touch Email address to enter an email address, then touch the Label button to choose a label, from Home, Work, Mobile, Other, or **Custom** to create a custom label. Touch (+) to add an address.
- Touch Instant msg to enter an instant message address, then touch the label button to choose a label, from Google Talk, AIM. Windows Live, Yahoo!, Skype, OQ, ICO, Jabber, or Custom to create a custom label. To add another IM, touch (-).
- Touch Groups to assign the contact to a group. For more information about Groups, see "Groups" on page 33.
- Touch (+) to add Postal Address to enter a physical address.
- Touch (+) to add Organization fields to enter an organization.
- Touch More to add a Note, Nickname, Web address, Birthday, or Anniversary.
- 4. When you finish entering information, touch Done.

Updating Contacts

Make changes to update an existing contact.

- From a Home screen, touch **Contacts** 1.
- 2. Touch a contact to view its information, then touch Edit.
- 3. Continue entering contact details.
- To delete a contact, touch **Delete**. At the prompt, touch **OK**. 4.

Joined Contacts

Your device can synchronize with multiple accounts, including Google and Corporate Exchange, plus the social networking sites Facebook, Twitter, and MySpace. When you synchronize contacts from these accounts with your device, you may have multiple contact records for one person.

Joining contact records allows you to see all the contact's numbers and addresses together in one Contact entry. Joining also helps you keep your contacts updated, because any changes that your contacts make to their information in the respective accounts is automatically updated the next time you synchronize with the account.

- 1. From a Home screen, touch Contacts [2].
- 2. Touch a contact from a synchronized account to display its information.
- If the contact has no joined contacts, touch Menu = → More → Join Contact to join another contact record to the displayed contact.
- 4. While viewing a contact, touch the Joined contacts field to view joined contacts, and use these options:
 - Touch another contact record to join it to the contact.
 - Touch
 next to a joined contact to unlink it from the displayed contact.

Get Friends

Use the Get Friends feature to sync with your accounts. You can choose an account you've already added, or add a new account.

Sending Namecards

You can send contact namecards as a vCards via Bluetooth to other Bluetooth devices, or via Email or Gmail as an attachment.

Note: Not all Bluetooth devices will accept contacts, and not all devices support transfers of multiple contacts. Check the target device's documentation

Exporting and Importing Contacts

Settings

When you create a new contact, you save the contacts to the device, or to an account. Use Settings to set a default behavior.

My profile is your own contact record. You can send My profile as a vCard via Bluetooth or as an attachment via Email or Gmail.

Groups

Assign contacts to Groups to make searching for contacts faster, or to quickly send messages to group members.

- 4. Touch Done to save the new group.

Deleting a Group

This section describes how to enter words, letters, punctuation and numbers when you need to enter text.

Virtual QWERTY Keyboard

Your device uses a virtual QWERTY keyboard for text entry. Use the keyboard to enter letters, punctuation, numbers, and other characters into text entry fields or applications. Access the keyboard by touching any text entry field.

The virtual QWERTY keyboard displays at the bottom of the screen. By default, when you rotate the device, the screen orientation updates to display the keyboard at the bottom of the screen.

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Swype Keyboard in New Message

Text Input Methods

Your device offers two text input methods:

- Swype: Swype is a new text input method that allows you to enter words by gliding your finger over the virtual QWERTY keyboard, lifting your finger between words. You can also enable Word prediction, which matches your key touches to common words.
- Samsung Keypad: The Samsung Keyboard is a virtual QWERTY keyboard that allows you to enter text by touching keys on the screen. The Samsung Keypad includes predictive text, which matches your key touches to common words so that you can select the word to enter it into your text.

Changing the Input Method

When entering text, you can select the text input method.

- Touch and hold on a text input field, then select an input method:
 - Swype
 - Samsung keypad

Entering Text Using Swype

Swype is a new way to enter text on touch screens. Instead of touching each key, use your finger to trace over each letter of a word. For each word, place your finger on the first letter and glide to the subsequent letters, lifting on the last letter.

This example shows how to enter the word "this". Put your finger down on the "t", and without lifting, glide it to the "h", then to the "i" then over to the "s".



Here are a few tips to get you started:

- Spacing is automatic: When you finish a word, just lift your finger and start the next word.
- Double letters: Just "scribble" on the key.
- Capitalization: Swype recognizes and capitalizes the first word of sentences. If you want to capitalize a word that isn't at the beginning of a sentence, just glide above the keyboard before gliding over the next letter.
- Contractions: Swype recognizes most words that include an apostrophe; just swype the letters of the word, including the apostrophe.
- Punctuation: Tap and hold a key to view a punctuation menu and make a selection.
- Accented characters: Just glide through the letters of the word. Swype usually recognizes the word and correctly accents the letters.
- Error correction: If you make a mistake, double-tap on the word you want to change.

- Touch sym to switch to Symbols mode, then touch a key.
- Touch SYM → Shift ↑ for more symbols, then touch the corresponding key.

Using the Numeric Keyboard

Switch to a Numeric Keyboard, to quickly enter numbers and mathematical operators:

► Touch and hold ¹²³_{ABC}.

Using Swype Speech Recognition

Enter text by speaking. Swype recognizes your speech and enters text for you.

► Touch 👤 . At the **Speak now** prompt, speak the text you want to enter.

Editing Keyboard

The Editing Keyboard provides a quick way to move the cursor and highlight text. If the application in which you are working supports editing, you can cut, copy or paste highlighted text.

Entering Text Using the Samsung Keypad

The Samsung Keypad is a custom virtual QWERTY keyboard, featuring predictive text. Input characters by tapping the onscreen keys with your finger, or use speech recognition.

As you enter characters, predictive text matches your key touches to common words and displays them. Select a word from the display to insert it into your text.

Entering Upper and Lower Case Letters

Section 5: Messaging

This section describes how to send and receive messages, and other features associated with messaging.

Types of Messages

Your device supports these types of messages:

- Text messages: Send and receive simple messages containing text to other mobile devices or email addresses (also known as SMS).
- Multimedia messages: Send and receive messages with attached pictures, sound, and/or video to other mobile devices or email addresses (also known as MMS).
- Email: Send and receive email from your email accounts, including Microsoft Exchange mail.
- · Gmail: Send and receive Gmail from your Google account.
- Google Talk: Chat with other Google Talk users.

Note: Messaging service availability depends on your network and service plan. Multimedia Messaging charges apply per your Calling Plan. Monthly plans are available. Higher rates apply for International Multimedia Messaging (when available). Compatible Device required. Consult your wireless provider for more information.

Text and Multimedia Messaging

Your device can send and receive text and multimedia messages to other mobile devices and to email addresses.

Tip: A shortcut to Messaging appears on the main Home screen panel by default.

Creating and Sending Messages

1. From the Home screen, touch Messaging $\bowtie \rightarrow$

New message 🖂

- 2. Tap the To field and enter recipients:
 - As you enter a name, phone number or email address, matching contacts appear on the screen. Touch a contact to add it to the list.
 - Touch Contacts 🖪 to choose contacts. Touch contacts to select them, then touch Add to add selected contacts as recipients.
- Touch Enter message here to compose your message. While composing a message, touch Menu = for these options:
 - Add subject: Add a subject field to the message and enter a subject. (This option also converts the message to MMS.)
 - Insert smiley: Add a text emoticon to the message.
 - Import text: Select text from Contacts, Calendar, or Memo to add to the message.
 - Brightness setting: Adjust the screen brightness.
 - Discard: Discard the message.

- Touch Attach to add media to the message to convert it to MMS:
 - Picture: Add a picture.
 - Video: Add a video.
 - Audio: Add a sound clip.
 - Capture picture: Take a new picture.
 - Capture video: Record a new video.
 - Record audio: Create a new audio clip.
 - Slide: Add a slide to this message, to add another picture or video.
- 5. Touch **Send** to send the message.

Managing Messages

Threaded View

Messages you send and receive to the same contact, number or address are grouped together as a "thread". Threaded messages allow you to see all the messages you exchanged with a contact or other recipient, as a conversation, with the latest message displayed first.

- From the Home screen, touch **Messaging** $rac{1}{rac{2}}$.
- Message threads display by contact, number, or address. 2. While viewing message threads, you have these options:
 - Touch and hold a thread to choose from:
 - View Contacts / Add to contacts: View the contact record, or save the sender/recipient's information as a new contact, or to update an existing contact.
 - Delete thread: Erase the entire message thread.
 - Touch **Menu F** for these options:
 - Delete threads: Touch message threads to mark them for erasure, or touch Select all to mark all message threads for erasure.
 - Brightness setting: Enable or disable the display's automatic brightness setting.
 - Settings: Configure message settings.

Message Settings

Configure message settings.

From the Home screen, touch **Messaging** 🗮. 1.



- 2.
 - Storage settings:
 - Delete old messages: Touch to enable or disable automatic erasure of messages when stored messages reach default limits. When disabled, the device will prompt you to delete old messages to make room.
 - Text message limit: Touch to set a limit for the number of text messages per conversation thread.
 - Multimedia message limit: Touch to set a limit for the number of multimedia messages per conversation thread.
 - Multimedia message (MMS) settings:
 - Auto-retrieve: Touch to enable or disable automatic retrieval of MMS messages. When enabled. MMS messages download automatically. When disabled, the device prompts to download new MMS messages.
 - Roaming auto-retrieve: Touch to enable or disable automatic retrieval of MMS messages when in Roaming mode. When enabled, MMS messages download and display automatically. When disabled, the device prompts you to download new MMS messages.
 - Notifications settings:
 - Notifications: Touch to enable or disable alerts in the status bar
 - Select ringtone: Touch to select a ringtone for message alerts.
 - Vibrate: Touch to enable or disable vibration for message alerts.

Gmail

Send and receive emails via Gmail, Google's web-based email.

► From a Home screen, select Applications Gmail .

Setting Up Your Gmail Account

The first time you launch Gmail, your device will prompt you to set up your Google account.

Note: You can use more than one Google account on your device. To add another account, use the Menu = → Accounts option.

- From a Home screen, select Applications → Gmail ¹/₂.
- 2. At the Set up your Google Account screen, touch Next to begin, then touch an option:
 - Create: Follow the prompts to create a new account.
 - Sign in: Enter your Google Username and Password, then touch Sign In.
- The device communicates with the Google server to set up your account and synchronize your email. When complete, your Gmail appears in the Inbox.

 - Attach: Launch Gallery to select a picture to add to the message.
 - Discard: Close the message without saving.
 - Help: Learn about using Gmail.
- 7. Touch Send to send the message.

Gmail account settings

- Touch Menu => → More → Settings for these settings:
 - General settings:
 - Signature: Create a text signature to add to outgoing messages.
 - Confirm actions: Have your device prompt you to confirm Archive, Delete, and Send actions.
 - Reply all: Enable or disable Reply All as the default action when responding to messages.
 - Auto-advance: Choose a screen to show after you delete or archive a conversation.
 - Message text size: Set the size of text in message displays.
 - Batch operations: Allow changes to labels on more than one conversation.
 - Clear search history: Remove previous searches you performed.
 - Labels: Choose which labels are synchronized.
 - Notification settings:
 - Email notifications: When enabled, notifications for new email appear in the Status Bar.
 - Select ringtone: Choose a ringtone for new email notifications.
 - Vibrate: Choose vibration settings for email notifications.
 - Notify once: When enabled, a notification appears in the Status Bar for new email, not for every new message.

Email

Use Email to view and manage all your email accounts in one application.

Configuring Email Accounts

- 1. From a Home screen, touch Email 🔊
- At the Set up email screen, choose a provider, or touch Others to set up another account.
- Enter account credentials, then complete set-up by following the prompts to configure account options. Available options vary, depending on the provider. If the account includes synchronization of contacts and calendars, you can choose whether to synchronize these features with your device.

Note: To configure email account settings at any time, touch the account to display Acccount Settings.

Composing and Sending Email

Managing Emails

Combined Inbox

You can view emails you receive to all accounts in the All inboxes screen, or you can view email accounts individually.



Google Search

Search the internet, and your device, using the Google search engine.

Tip: The Google Search widget appears on the on the Home screen by default. For information about displaying widgets on the Home screen, see "Adding Widgets to the Home screen" on page 20.

- 2. Enter search criteria to display matching searches.
- 3. Touch Voice Search 👤 to search using spoken commands.

Voice Search

Voice Search offers voice-activated Google searches.

Section 7: Music

Music

Music plays songs from an installed memory card.

Tip: A shortcut to Music appears on the Home screen by default.

 - Repeat: Touch to repeat the current song, repeat all songs, or disable repeat mode.
 - · Playback controls:
 - Touch $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ to advance to the next song. Touch and hold $\blacktriangleright \flat$ to scan forward through the current song.
 - − Touch I ◄ to go back to the previous song. Touch and hold ► to scan backward through the current song.
 - − Touch to pause playback. Touch ► to resume playback.

Creating a Playlist

- From a Home screen, touch Music , then touch the Playlists tab.
- Touch Menu = → New playlist, then touch the name field to enter a name for the playlist.
- 3. Touch Done to save the new playlist.

Adding Songs to Playlists

- From a Home screen, touch Music *Playlists* tab.
- 2. Touch the playlist, then touch Add music.
- Touch songs to select them, or touch Select all. A checkmark indicates selected songs.
- 4. Touch Add to add the selected songs to the playlist.

Music Player Settings

 - Effect: Touch to choose a sound effect.
 - Music menu: Choose the types of menus to display as tabs in Music Player.

Camera

Use your device's built-in Camera to take pictures and record video.

Tip: A shortcut to Camera appears on the Home screen by default.

From a Home screen, touch Camera [].

Options

 - White balance: Choose a setting for the light source.
 - Effects: Apply an effect to pictures.
 - ISO: Choose a setting for imaging sensitivity.
 - Image quality: Choose a quality setting for photos.

- - Review: Enable or disable the instant review feature, to display images immediately after capture.
 - GPS: Enable or disable tagging of pictures with the GPS location.
 - Shutter sound: Select a tone to play when the camera's shutter opens and closes.
 - Reset: Set all Camera settings to the defaults.

Camcorder

Use your device's built-in Camcorder to record high-definition video in 720p resolution.

Tip: A shortcut to Camera appears on the Home screen by default.

 From a Home screen, touch Camera (), then slide the Mode o icon.

- Music: Launches Music Player, to select music to play with the Clock or Slideshow. For more information, see "Music" on page 55.

Media Hub

Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that provides access to local area networks. Use your device's Wi-Fi feature to:

- · Access the internet for browsing, or to send or receive email.
- Access your corporate network.
- Use hotspots provided by hotels or airports while traveling.

Wi-Fi communication requires access to an existing Wireless Access Point (WAP). WAPs can be Open (unsecured, as with most hotspots), or Secured (requiring you to provide login credentials). Your device supports the 802.11 b/g/n Wi-Fi protocol.



Sound settings

General

Silent mode

Temporarily silence all the sounds your device makes except for media playback and alarms.

Vibrate

When enabled, your device vibrates to alert you to new notifications.

White color density

Set the density for display of the color white.

Set the density for display of the color black. Black color density can be used to enhance picture depth.

- 2. Touch No animation, Some animations, or All animations.

Screen timeout

Set the length of delay between the last key press or screen touch and the automatic screen timeout (dim and lock).

- From a Home screen, touch Menu => Settings → Display settings → Screen timeout.
- 2. Touch a setting to select it.

Power saving mode

When enabled, your device will automatically analyze the screen and adjust the brightness to conserve battery power.

 - Pattern: A screen unlock pattern is a touch gesture you create and use to unlock your device. Follow the prompts to create or change your screen unlock pattern.
 - PIN: Touch to select a PIN to use for unlocking the screen.
 - Password: Touch to create a password for unlocking the screen.

Passwords

Visible passwords

When enabled, password characters will display briefly as you touch them while entering passwords.

- Recapture: When enabled, the system re-displays matching words when you make corrections to a word inserted by the system.

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

Although GALAXY is not a cell phone, it can operate on the same network as cell phones and can use the same radio frequency (RF) signals to communicate with the network as a cell phone. Therefore, although the following information refers specifically to RF exposure from wireless phones, it may apply similarly to GALAXY when it is being used on a cell phone network.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published information for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

Do cell phones pose a health hazard?

Many people are concerned that cell phone radiation will cause cancer or other serious health hazards. The weight of scientific evidence has not linked cell phones with any health problems.

Cell phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF). Over the past 15 years, scientists have conducted hundreds of studies looking at the biological effects of the radio frequency energy emitted by cell phones. While some researchers have reported biological changes associated with RF energy, these studies have failed to be replicated. The majority of studies published have failed to show an association between exposure to radio frequency from a cell phone and health problems.

The low levels of RF cell phones emit while in use are in the microwave frequency range. They also emit RF at substantially reduced time intervals when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects.

The biological effects of radio frequency energy should not be confused with the effects from other types of electromagnetic energy.

Very high levels of electromagnetic energy, such as is found in Xrays and gamma rays can ionize biological tissues. Ionization is a process where electrons are stripped away from their normal locations in atoms and molecules. It can permanently damage biological tissues including DNA, the genetic material.

The energy levels associated with radio frequency energy, including both radio waves and microwaves, are not great

enough to cause ionization of atoms and molecules. Therefore, RF energy is a type of non-ionizing radiation. Other types of non-ionizing radiation include visible light, infrared radiation (heat), and other forms of electromagnetic radiation with relatively low frequencies.

While RF energy does not ionize particles, large amounts can increase body temperatures and cause tissue damage. Two areas of the body, the eyes and the testes, are particularly vulnerable to RF heating because there is relatively little blood flow in them to carry away excess heat.

Research Results to Date: Is there a connection between RF and certain health problems?

The results of most studies conducted to date say no. In addition, attempts to replicate and confirm the few studies that have shown a connection have failed.

The scientific community at large therefore believes that the weight of scientific evidence does not show an association between exposure to radio frequency (RF) from cell phones and adverse health outcomes. Still the scientific community has supported additional research to address gaps in knowledge. Some of these studies are described below.

Interphone Study

Interphone is a large international study designed to determine whether cell phones increase the risk of head and neck cancer. A report published in the International Journal of Epidemiology (June, 2010) compared cell phone usage for more than 5,000 people with brain tumors (glioma and meningioma) and a similar number of healthy controls.

Results of this study did NOT show that cell phones caused brain cancer. In this study, most people had no increased risk of brain cancer from using cell phones. For people with the heaviest use of cell phones (an average of more than ½ hour per day, every day, for over 10 years) the study suggested a slight increase in brain cancer. However, the authors determined that biases and errors prevented any conclusions being drawn from this data. Interphone is the largest cell phone study to date, but it did not answer all questions about cell phone safety. Additional research is being conducted around the world, and the FDA continues to monitor developments in this field.

International Cohort Study on Mobile Phone Users (COSMOS)

The COSMOS study aims to conduct long-term health monitoring of a large group of people to determine if there are any health issues linked to long-term exposure to radio frequency energy from cell phone use. The COSMOS study will follow approximately 300,000 adult cell phone users in Europe for 20 to 30 years. Risk of Brain Cancer from Exposure to Radio Frequency Fields in Childhood and Adolescence (MOBI-KIDS)

MOBI-KIDS is an international study investigating the relationship between exposure to radio frequency energy from communication technologies including cell phones and brain cancer in young people. This is an international multi-center study involving 14 European and non-European countries. Surveillance, Epidemiology, and End Results (SEER) program of the National Cancer Institute

The National Cancer Institute (NCI) actively follows cancer statistics in the United States to detect any change in rates of new cases for brain cancer. If cell phones play a role in risk for brain cancer, rates should go up, as heavy cell phone use has been common for quite some time in the U.S. Between 1987 and 2005, the overall age-adjusted incidence of brain cancer did not increase. Cell Phone Industry Actions

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the cell phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support-needed research on possible biological effects of RF for the type of signal emitted by cell phones;
- Design cell phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user; and
- Cooperate in providing users of cell phones with the current information on cell phone use and human health concerns.

Reducing Exposure: Hands-Free Kits and Other Accessories

Steps to Reduce Exposure to Radio Frequency Energy

If there is a risk from being exposed to radio frequency energy (RF) from cell phones - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your RF exposure.

- · Reduce the amount of time spent using your cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between your head and the cell phone.

Hands-Free Kits

Hand-free kits may include audio or Bluetooth $^{\textcircled{B}}$ headsets and various types of body-worn accessories such as belt-clips and holsters.

Combinations of these can be used to reduce RF energy absorption from cell phones.

Headsets can substantially reduce exposure since the phone is held away from the head in the user's hand or in approved bodyworn accessories. Cell phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet RF exposure compliance requirements when used against the head and against the body.

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free

kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used for convenience and comfort. They are also required by law in many states if you want to use your phone while driving.

Cell Phone Accessories that Claim to Shield the Head from RF Radiation

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from cell phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories which claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption.

Children and Cell Phones

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to any users of cell phones from RF exposure, including children and teenagers. The steps adults can take to reduce RF exposure apply to children and teenagers as well.

- Reduce the amount of time spent on the cell phone;
- Use speaker mode or a headset to place more distance between the head and the cell phone.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using cell phones at all. For example, The Stewart Report from the United Kingdom made such a recommendation in December 2000. In this report, a group of independent experts noted that no evidence exists that using a cell phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit cell phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) Certification Information

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government.

These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations: the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE).

In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile devices employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless devices to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg).

The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements. SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the mobile device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the mobile device while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the mobile device is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model mobile device is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model of a device are performed in positions and locations (e.g. near the body) as required by the FCC.

For typical operations, this mobile device has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines.

Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile device with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR value for this model phone as reported to the FCC is:

Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings, and equipment.

You should follow some common sense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Always turn the volume down before plugging the earphones into an audio source.
- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- Be aware that you can adapt to higher volume settings over time, not realizing that the higher volume may be harmful to your hearing.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental noise. By blocking background environment noise, noise cancelling headphones should allow you to hear the music at lower volumes than when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech, or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area, and always switch your mobile device off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the mobile device or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

Using Your Mobile Device Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless mobile device. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Implantable Medical Devices

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless mobile device and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device.

Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON;
- · Should not carry the mobile device in a breast pocket;

- Should turn the mobile device OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place;
- Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your wireless mobile device with an implantable medical device, consult your health care provider. Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your mobile device off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle before using your mobile device in a motor vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your mobile device off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your mobile device off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Users are advised to switch the mobile device off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

Restricting Children's Access to Your Mobile Device

Your mobile device is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the mobile device, or use services that increase your mobile device bill.

Keep the mobile device and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The mobile device may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the mobile device if such interference cannot be eliminated. Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association.

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your mobile device not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas, and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the mobile device warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the mobile device. Although your mobile device is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the mobile. Faulty service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Ensure that any mobile devices or related equipment used in your vehicle are securely mounted.
- Check regularly that all wireless mobile device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the mobile device, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including portable wireless equipment near or in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your mobile device off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless mobile devices in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation. Check with appropriate authorities before using any function of a mobile device while on an aircraft.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of network services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

Standard Limited Warranty

What is Covered and For How Long?

What is Not Covered?

This Limited Warranty is conditioned upon proper use of Product by Purchaser. This Limited Warranty does not cover: (a) defects or damage resulting from accident, misuse, abnormal use, abnormal conditions, improper storage, exposure to moisture or dampness, neglect, unusual physical, electrical or electromechanical stress, or defects in appearance, cosmetic, decorative or structural items, including framing, and any non-operative parts unless caused by SAMSUNG; (b) defects or damage resulting from excessive force or use of a metallic object when pressing on a touch screen: (c) equipment that has the serial number or the enhancement data code removed, defaced, damaged, altered or made illegible: (d) any plastic surfaces or other externally exposed parts that are scratched or damaged due to normal use: (e) malfunctions resulting from the use of Product in conjunction or connection with accessories, products, or ancillary/peripheral equipment not furnished or approved by SAMSUNG: (f) defects or damage from improper testing. operation, maintenance, installation, service, or adjustment not furnished or approved by SAMSUNG: (g) defects or damage from external causes such as collision with an object, or from fire, flooding, sand, dirt, windstorm, lightning, earthquake, or from exposure to weather conditions, or external battery leakage, theft, blown fuse, or improper use of any electrical source: (h) defects or damage caused by cellular signal reception or transmission, or viruses or other software

To obtain service under this Limited Warranty, Purchaser must return Product to an authorized Tablet service facility in an adequate container for shipping, accompanied by Purchaser's sales receipt or comparable substitute proof of sale showing the original date of purchase, the serial number of Product and the sellers' name and address. SAMSUNG new parts or components when repairing any Product or replace Product with a rebuilt, reconditioned or new Product. Repaired/replaced cases will be warranted for a period

of ninety (90) days. All other repaired/replaced Product will be warranted for a period equal to the remainder of the original Limited Warranty on the original Product or for 90 days, whichever is longer. All replaced parts, components, boards and equipment shall become the property of SAMSUNG. If SAMSUNG determines that any Product is not covered by this Limited Warranty, Purchaser must pay all parts, shipping, and labor charges for the repair or return of such Product.

- "THE WORKMANSHIP OF THE PRODUCT OR THE COMPONENTS CONTAINED THEREIN; OR
- COMPLIANCE OF THE PRODUCT WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF ANY LAW, RULE, SPECIFICATION OR CONTRACT PERTAINING THERETO.

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
