This section explains how to start using your phone by activating your service, setting up your voice mail, or getting an understanding of how this manual is put together.

Understanding this User Manual

The chapters of this guide generally follow the same order as the menus and submenus in your phone. A robust index for quick reference to most features begins on page 162.

Also included is important safety information that you should know before using your phone. Most of this information is near the back of the guide, beginning on page 139.

Notes and tips

Throughout this guide are icons and text that are set apart from the rest. These are intended to point out important information, quick methods for activating features, to define terms, and more. The definitions for these methods are as follows:

- Notes: Explain alternative options within the current feature, menu, or sub menu.
- Tips: Provide quick or innovative methods for performing functions related to the subject at hand.
- Important: Points out important information about the current feature that could affect performance, or even damage your phone.

Activating Your Phone

Contact your Wireless Carrier and follow their instructions for obtaining service, if necessary. We suggest that you read this guide to fully understand the services your phone supports.

Install the Battery

Note: Your phone comes packaged with a partially charged rechargeable standard Li-lon battery and travel adapter.

Important: You must fully charge the battery the first time you use your phone, otherwise you could damage the battery.

- Insert the top end of the battery first, matching the gold contacts on the top end of the battery to those inside of the phone.
- 2. Press the bottom end of the battery down into the phone.



Activating Your Phone

Place the battery cover over the battery and slide the cover upward into place.

Turn Your Phone On

- 1. Open the folder on your phone, as shown.
- Press the key.
- 3. The phone begins searching for a network signal.
- Once the phone finds a signal, the time, date and day appear in the bottom of the display.
- 5. You're now ready to place and receive calls.





Tip: Your phone has an internal antenna. Do not touch the phone case over the antenna while using your phone as this can affect call quality and can cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than is necessary.



Note: If you are outside of your carrier's coverage or roaming area, the No Service icon () appears at the top of the phone's display. If you cannot place or receive calls, try later when service is available, or at another location.

Turn Your Phone Off

Press and hold the key for two or more seconds. Your phone powers off.

Note: If your phone is on and you press of for less than one second, the phone will not power off. This prevents your phone from being turned off accidentally.

Remove the Battery

Important!: You must unplug the Travel Adapter (if it is connected) before removing the battery from the phone during charging to avoid damage.

- 1. Press and hold the key to turn off the phone (if on).
- Press the battery cover at point (1) and slide the cover (2) toward the bottom end of the phone.
- 3. Lift the battery cover up and away from the phone, bottom end first.
- Lift the battery (3) up and away from the phone, bottom end first.



Charging the Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable standard Li-lon battery. Only use Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

Use the Travel Adapter

The travel adapter included with your phone is a convenient, light-weight charger that rapidly charges your phone from any 120/220 VAC outlet.



1. Plug the large end of the Travel Adapter into a standard 120 VAC or 220 VAC wall outlet.

Note: For connection to an electrical supply not located in North America, you must use an adaptor of the proper configuration for the power outlet. Use of the wrong adapter could damage your phone and void your warranty.

Setting Up Your Voice Mail

 Insert the smaller end of the Travel Adapter into the charger/accessory connector at the bottom end of your phone.



Note: With the phone turned OFF, a discharged battery recharges fully in approximately 4 hours.

Low battery indicator

The battery indicator (()) in the upper-right corner of the display indicates power level. Monitor the battery strength and ensure your battery is adequately charged.

- Three bars (IIII) indicate a full charge.
- An empty battery icon () indicates a near empty battery.

If you continue to use your phone without charging its battery, the phone shuts down.

Setting Up Your Voice Mail

Voice mail allows callers to leave voice messages, which can be retrieved any time.

Note: Once your voice mail account has been set up, you can use the Voice Mail folder (under the Message menu) to view details of voice messages in your voice mail box.

- 1. In idle mode, press and hold the *fee* key or dial your own mobile number to dial voice mail.
- 2. Follow the prompts in the new user tutorial to setup your mail box.

Listen to voice mail

- 1. In idle mode, press and hold the *fee* key or dial your own mobile number to dial voice mail.
- 2. After connecting, you are prompted to enter your password.

Command Keys and Features

- 1. Headset Connector Used for handsfree, Teletypewriter (TTY), and Telecommunication Device for the Deaf (TDD) equipment.
- Volume Key Lets you adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the folder open) or adjust the voice volume during a call. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down.
- 3. External LCD Indicates when you have an incoming call or a message.
- Speaker The speaker, on the front of the folder, plays sounds such as ring tones and alerts.

- 5. Speakerphone Key Lets you enable and disable speakerphone mode.
- 6. Camera Key With the phone open and in standby mode, launches the camera.

In camera mode, takes a picture.

7. Camera Lens — The lens of your built-in camera.

Open View of Your Phone



Command Keys and Features

- 1. Left Soft Key Performs the functions indicated by the screen text on the bottom of the internal display.
- 2. SEND Key This key is used to initiate your calls.

- CLR (clear) Key Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a menu, press to return to the previous menu.
- 4. Voice Mail Hot Key Press and hold to automatically dial your voicemail.
- Special Function Keys Enter special characters. Perform various functions.
- Power/Accessory Connector Used to plug in the Travel Charger and to connect any available accessory cable.
- Voice Recognition Key Lets you access your phone's voice recognition features.
- Microphone The microphone used during phone calls and voice memo recordings.
- Alpha-numeric Keys Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
- 10. END/Power/MENU Exit Key Ends a call. Press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off. When you receive an incoming call, press to mute the ringer and send the call to Voice Mail.
- 11. OK Key Pressing when navigating through a menu accepts the highlighted choice in the menu.
- 12. Right Soft Key Performs the functions indicated by the screen text on the bottom of the display.
- Navigation Key In menu mode, lets you browse and highlight menu options.
- Internal Display Displays the numbers, messages, and icons you need to operate your phone.
- 15. Earpiece Plays sounds such as caller voices and call progress tones.

Command Keys

Functions for the soft keys are defined by what appears above each in the display. There are two soft keys, the left soft key and the right soft key .

Left Soft Key

Some functions of the left soft key are as follows.

- In standby mode, press the **MENU** (left) soft key (
- When the left soft key function is Option, press the **Option** (left) soft key (

• When the left soft key function is Edit, press the Edit (left) soft key (

Right Soft Key

Some functions of the right soft key are as follows.

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key () to open the Messages menu.
- When the right soft key function is Back, press the **Back** (right) soft key () to back up one menu level.

OK Key

- In a menu, press the OK key (or) to accept the highlighted selection.
- When the OK key function is Edit, press the Edit (OK) key (ox) to edit a Draft message.

Clear Key

The **CLR** key (**const**) is used to erase or clear numbers, text, or symbols from the display. You can also use the **const** key to return to a previous menu or to return to standby mode from any menu.

- If you enter an incorrect character, briefly press to backspace (and delete) the character.
- 2. To erase the entire sentence, press and hold .
- 3. To back up one menu level, briefly press
- 4. To return to standby mode, press and hold until you return to standby mode.

End Key

- 1. Press and hold the **End** key 🕼 to turn your phone on or off.
- 2. Briefly press for once to disconnect a call.
- Press for to return to standby mode from any menu, or to cancel the last input.

Send Key

The **Send** key is used to answer calls, dial calls, and to recall the last number(s) dialed, received, or missed.

- 1. Press sevo once to answer calls.
- 2. Enter a number and briefly press stomake a call.

- 3. Briefly press and in standby mode to display a list of recent calls to and from your phone.
- Press twice in standby mode to call the most recent number.
- Press again to pick up a waiting call. Press again to switch back to the other call.

Navigation Key

Use the directional keys on the navigation key is to browse menus, sub menus, and lists. Each key also acts as a shortcut to launch applications.

Speakerphone Key

Use the speakerphone key () — located on the right side of your phone — to switch from using the earpiece to the speakerphone before or during a call. Use the volume keys () — located on the left side of your phone — to adjust the volume. Press and hold the speakerphone key to enable and disable the speakerphone option.

Understanding the Display Screen

The top line of your phone's display contains icons that indicate network status, battery power, signal strength, connection type, and more. The following list contains icons that may appear in your display.



Display screen icons

Signal strength — Always appears when your phone is on and indicates the current signal strength. More lines indicate higher signal strength.



Service indicator — Indicates a call in progress. When dialing a number, this icon flashes until the call connects.



No service indicator — Indicates your phone cannot find a signal because you're outside a service area. You cannot make or receive calls. Wait for a signal or move into an open area to try and find a signal. The no service indicator always appears when you turn on your phone and disappears once service is located.

Analog mode indicator — Indicates your phone is operating in an analog service area or that digital service has been interrupted. Also indicates that some network features are not available. Also, you may need to recharge your phone's battery more often while in an analog service area.
 Roam — Extended roaming indicator. Roaming occurs when extended roaming indicator. Roaming occurs when

you use your phone outside your home area. While roaming, a wireless provider other than yours handles your call, so the service rate for the call may be higher than for calls made within your home area. Please refer to information from your Wireless Provider on roaming rates.

- New Message Indicates that you've received a new text, page, or web alert message. You're also notified by a visual and audible alert.
- Voicemail Indicates that you've received a new voicemail.
- **1X Protocol** Indicates your phone is using the 1X protocol.
- Battery strength Indicates the battery charge level. The more black bars, the greater the charge. When the battery becomes very low, a flashing empty battery icon displays and the phone sounds an audible alert, which indicates your phone is about to shut down.
- 0
- Alarm clock The alarm clock is set.
- GPS (911 only) This icon represents Global Positioning Service (GPS) for 911.
- ۲
- GPS Indicates GPS is on for location.



Vibrate plus Ring — Your phone is in vibrate plus ring mode. When you receive a call, the phone vibrates and rings.

Understanding the Display Screen

- Ring Your phone is in ring mode. When you receive a call, the phone rings.
- **1 Beep** Your phone is in 1 Beep mode. When you receive a call, the phone rings a single beep.
- Vibrate mode Your phone is in vibrate mode. When you
 - receive a call, the phone vibrates instead of ringing.
- **Ringer off** The ringer is in Ringer off mode. When you receive a call, it is only indicated in the displays.



Silent mode — Indicates your phone is in silent mode. Ringer is silenced for all alerts, incoming calls, and incoming messages. The phone alerts you of incoming calls, alerts, and messages by vibration and a message in the displays.



TTY mode — Indicates your phone is in TTY mode (For more information see "TTY Mode" on page 131).

Dialogue Boxes

Dialogue boxes prompt for action, inform you of status, or warn of situations such as low memory. Dialogue boxes and their definitions are outlined below.

- Choice
- · Example: "Save to draft?"
- Reconfirm
 - Example: "Erase all inbox msgs?"
- Performing
 - Example: "Sending ... " "Connecting ... "
- Completed
 - · Example: "Message Saved"
- Information
 - · Example: "New Message"
- Error
- Example: "System Error!"

Warning

· Example: "Battery Low," "Memory Full!"

Backlights

Backlights illuminate the internal and external displays and the keypad. When you press any key or open the phone, the backlights come on. They go off when no keys are pressed within a period of time set in the **Backlight** menu.

Note: During a phone call, the display backlights dim and turn off after one minute to conserve battery power, regardless of the Backlight setting.

See "Backlight" on page 122 for more information.

External Display

Your phone has an external display on the outside of the folder. When you close the phone, the external display shows a digital clock.

Icons that appear in the external display indicate the following:

- · Signal strength
- · Service protocol 1x
- · Digital roaming service
- · Incoming calls and messages
- · Alarms and alerts
- · Ringer/sound mode
- · Battery charge level

Your Phone's Modes

Call Answer Mode

You can select how you wish to answer a call.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), I (for Call Options), and I for Call Answer. The following call answer options appear in the display:
 - Send Key Only pressing shows a call.
 - Folder Open Opening the phone's folder or pressing sand answers a call.
 - Any Key Pressing any key except the key or key answers a call.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 3. Press the or key to select the method for answering calls.

Input mode

Input mode determines how you enter text, numbers and symbols. While at any text entry screen, press the **Option** (left) soft key (), then choose the input mode from the pop-up menu using the navigation keys. Optional input modes are **T9** Word, **Alpha**, **Symbol**, **Number**, and **Quick Text**. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)

Tip: You can also cycle between T9 Word, Alpha, and Number by repeatedly pressing and holding 🔍

Lock Mode

When the phone is in Lock Mode, restrictions are placed on phone use. You can receive calls and messages, but cannot place outgoing calls (except for emergency numbers) until you unlock the phone.

Lock Mode also restricts access to menus and the volume key. Unlock your phone by entering the lock code when prompted. (See "Lock Phone" on page 133 for more information.)

Standby Mode

Standby mode is the state of the phone once it has found service and is idle. The phone goes into standby mode:

- · After you power the phone on.
- When you press 揻 after a call or from within a menu.

In standby mode, you will see the time, day, and date as well as all phone status icons.

- 1. While in standby mode, enter a phone number, and press and to place a call.
- 2. Press loss to return to standby mode.

Receive Messages in Standby Mode

You can receive messages in standby mode. An alert tone sounds and a notification message appears in the display when a new message arrives.

- Press the View (right) soft key () to view now.
- Press the Ignore (left) soft key (

Talk Mode

You can place and receive calls only when your phone is on. While in a call your phone is in talk mode. Press the **MENU** (left) soft key (

Enter/Exit Silent Mode

Silence the tones your keypad makes when you press a key.

- In standby mode, press and hold Immodel. Entering Silent Mode briefly appears in the display and your phone does not play ring tones for incoming calls or sound alert tones.
- While in Silent mode and standby mode, press and hold **11.** Exit Silent Mode briefly appears in the display and your phone returns to standby mode.

Vibrate Mode

In standby mode, repeatedly press the volume key () down until Vibrate appears in the display. Your phone will now vibrate when you receive a call, but will play tones for alerts.

The volume key is on the left side of phone, near the Send key (sero).

Adjust the Ringer

- In standby mode, press the volume key (>>>>) on the left side of the phone up or down. Options are:
 - Ringer off
- Level 3
 Level 4
- Vibrate1 Beep
- Level 4
 Level 5
- Vib+Ring

Level 1Level 2

- 2. When you are satisfied with the setting, press the key. Your phone returns to standby mode.

Tip: You can also enter the Calls option by pressing the MENU (left) soft key (), then pressing the), then pressing the), and), and), and), and), set the Volume key on the left side of your phone to adjust the ringer setting.

Note: The Vibrate icon (\\) appears in the display when the phone is in Vibrate mode. The Vibrate plus Ring icon (\) papears in the display when the phone is in or Vib+Ring mode.

This section explains how to make or answer a call. This section also includes the features and functionality associated with making or answering a call.

Making a Call — Number Entry Dialing

- 1. With the phone on, enter the number you wish to call using the keypad.
- 2. Press the seven key to place the call.

Dialing Emergency Numbers

You can dial any of the numbers 911, *911, or #911 to place an emergency call.

If you dial 911, *911, or #911 and press the key, your phone dials the emergency number 911, automatically.

Important!: Emergency number 911 is hard-coded into your phone. You can dial this number almost any time, even when the phone is locked or restricted.

If you call 911 an audible tone is heard and an Emergency prompt appears in the display for the duration of the call.

Important!: Because of various transmission methods, network parameters, and user settings necessary to complete a call from your wireless phone, a connection cannot always be guaranteed. Therefore, emergency calling may not be available on all wireless networks at all times.

Important!: DO NOT depend on this phone as a primary method of calling 911 or for any other essential or emergency communications.

Dialing International Numbers

Call another country from the U.S.

- 1. In standby mode, enter the three-digit exit code (011) for the United States.
- 2. Enter the country code for the country that you are calling.
- 3. Enter the number that you wish to call, then press the seven key.

Note: Puerto Rico and Canada are on the North American dialing plan. When making calls to Puerto Rico and Canada It is similar to making calls within the United States, no unique country codes are necessary.

Placing calls when outside the U.S. - Mexico

- · Calling locally within Mexico: Dial the seven or eight-digit number.
- Calling long distance within Mexico: Dial 01, plus the ten-digit number (includes area code).
- Calling to the U.S. or Canada from Mexico: Dial 001, plus the ten-digit number (includes area code).

• Calling Voicemail from Mexico: Dial 001, plus your ten-digit wireless number. Once you hear the recorded prompt, press and enter your passcode.

Manual Pause Calling

When you call automated systems (like banking services), you are often required to enter a password or account number. Instead of manually entering the numbers each time, you can store the numbers in your Contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- P pause A hard pause stops the calling sequence until you press the stops key.
- **T pause** A two-second pause stops the calling sequence for two seconds and then automatically sends the remaining digits.

To manually call a number with pause(s) without storing it to your Contacts:

- 1. Enter the number you wish to call.
- Press the **Option** (left) soft key (]). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - P pause a hard pause (awaits input from you).
 - **T pause** a two-second pause.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired pause option.
- 4. Press or to enter the highlighted pause into your number sequence.
- 5. Press song to call the number.

Making a Call — Speed Dialing

You can store phone numbers and contact names in your phone's Contacts list. Speed Dialing lets you quickly and easily dial any contact in your Contacts list by using that contact's location number in the list. You can assign and change location (speed dial) numbers for your contacts. (See "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 60 for more information.)

One-Touch Dialing

Memory locations 002 through 009 are special One-Touch dialing locations. You can call the phone numbers stored in your phone's Contacts list from 002 through 009 by pressing and holding a single key.

Example: For location number 003, press and hold the E key until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

Two-Touch Dialing

Memory locations 010 through 099 are special Two-Touch dialing locations.

Example: For location number 013, briefly press the 🚾 key, then press and hold the 🕮 key until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

Three-Touch Dialing

Memory locations 100 through 495 are special Three-Touch dialing locations.

Example: For location number 113, briefly press the time key, briefly press the time key again, then press and hold the end key until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

Pause Dialing From a Contacts Entry

- If you speed dial a contact that contains (two-second) T pause(s) simply wait for the pauses to pass and the dialing to complete.
- If you speed dial a contact that contains (hard) P pause(s), wait for the appropriate prompt(s) from the number you are calling (credit card number, bank account number, and so on) and enter the appropriate response(s).

Making a Call — Voice Dialing

The Alltel Snap mobile phone includes state-of-the-art voice recognition software that lets you dial numbers using your voice.

Using Voice Dial

Use the **Voice Dial** command to dial any number stored in your Contacts list by saying the name of the contact (Name Dialing). You can also use Voice Dial to dial any valid telephone number, even numbers not stored in your contact list, by speaking the individual digits in the number (Digit Dialing).

Voice Dialing Tips:

- · Wait for the beep before speaking.
- Speak clearly at a normal volume, as if you were talking to someone on the phone.
- · When saying a name, say the first name then the last name.

Dialing a Name

To dial a name, do the following:

1. In standby mode, press and hold the one key.

"Say a Command" appears in the display and is pronounced through the earpiece.

2. Say, "Voice Dial".

You are prompted to "Say the name or number".

Speak clearly and say the name of a person in your Contacts list, first name followed by last name.

If the name is recognized, Voice Dial repeats the name and dials the number.

If Voice Dial is not sure which name you said, it displays a choice list of up to three names and prompts you with "**Did you say?**" followed by the first name on the list.

- Say "Yes" to confirm the name or "No" to hear the next name, or use the keypad to select the correct name from the list. (See see "Choice Lists Settings" on page 108, for more information.)
 - Press the Repeat (right) soft key () to say the name again.
 - Press the Settings (left) soft key () and press the Cancel right soft key () to exit Voice Dial without dialing.

If the recognized name has multiple numbers stored for it (that is, Mobile, Office, Home, and so on), Voice Dial displays the possible choices and prompts you with "Which number?"

- 5. Say one of the following number types:
 - Home
 - Work
 - Mobile
 - My Circle
 - Fax

Voice Dial dials the specified number.

Dialing a Number

To dial a number using Voice Dial, do the following:

1. In standby mode, press and hold the one key.

"Say a Command" appears in the display and is pronounced through the speaker.

2. Say "Voice Dial".

VoiceSignal prompts you to "Say the name or number."

3. Speak clearly and say the telephone number of the person you want to call. *For example, say "7 8 1 9 7 0 5 2 0 0."*

If it recognizes the number, Voice Dial repeats it and dials the number. If Voice Dial is not sure it has recognized the number, it displays a choice list of up to three numbers and prompts you with "**Did you say?**" followed by the first number on the list.

- Say "Yes" to confirm the number or "No" to hear the next one, or use the keypad to select the correct number from the list. (See see "Choice Lists Settings" on page 108, for more information.)
 - Press the Repeat (right) soft key () to say the name again.
 - Press the Settings (left) soft key () and press the Cancel right soft key () to exit Voice Dial without dialing.

Pause Dialing From a Contacts Entry

- If you voice dial a contact that contains (two-second) T pause(s) simply wait for the pauses to pass and the dialing to complete.
- If you voice dial a contact that contains (hard) P pause(s), wait for the appropriate prompt(s) from the number you are calling (credit card number, bank account number, and so on) and enter the appropriate response(s).

Answering a Call

Your phone notifies you of a call in the following ways:

- A ring tone sounds and/or your phone vibrates (Your phone provides: nine ring volume settings including 1- beep, Vibrate, Ringer Off, or Vibrate+Ring, and/or different ring types to distinguish callers.)
- A phone number (unless blocked by the caller) and a name appear in the display (If the caller's number and name are stored in your Contacts list).
- If the caller can't be identified, Call from unavailable#, Call from restricted number, or no number appears in the display.

Your phone continues to notify you of the call until one of the following events occurs:

- · You answer the call.
- You ignore the call.
- The calling party ends the call.
- · The call is sent to voicemail.

Answering an Incoming Call

Press the key. The ring tone and/or vibration stop and the caller's voice can be neard in the earpiece.

Tip: You can set your phone to answer calls when you open the folder, when you press any key but the key, or automatically. (See see "Call Options" on page 129 for more information.

Rejecting a Call

When you reject an incoming call, the call is immediately forwarded to your voice mail.

During an incoming call, press the Reject (right) soft key (). The caller is immediately forwarded to your voice mail.

Tip: You can mute the ringer to ignore an incoming call by closing the folder or by pressing the volume key.

Adjusting the Call Volume

In standby mode, repeatedly press the Volume key () down until the desired Call Volume Level appears in the display. The Volume key is on the left side of phone.

Calls Log

The Calls log retains information about Outgoing, Incoming, and Missed calls. You can also view times for your last call and the time totals for all calls.

Review the Calls Log

- 1. In standby mode, press the **MENU** (left) soft key (
- 2. Press the 5H0 key (for Calls).
- Press the number key associated with the Calls log that you wish to review or the function you wish to access:
 - Press **1** for **Outgoing** calls.
 - Press 2mm for Incoming calls.
 - Press **3** for **Missed** calls.
 - Press 4 for Erase Logs.
 - Press of for Call Timer.
 - Press **6** for **Data Counter**.

Note: In cases where there is a Contacts match for a Calls log entry, the name associated with the number appears in the display instead of the number.

Outgoing Calls

Your phone retains information about the last 20 outgoing calls and stores them in the Outgoing calls log. You can review the Outgoing calls log for the time and date of a call, as well as other information.

Note: To quickly view your most recent calls, briefly press 🐚 in standby mode. Up to 20 of your most recent outgoing, incoming, and missed calls appear in the display.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press for Outgoing. A list of your outgoing calls appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight a call, then press or to view further information about the call.
- 3. Press the **Option** (left) soft key (**1**). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Talk Call the selected number.
 - Save Save the number to your Contacts.
 - Prepend Add a prefix to the number.
 - Erase Erase the selected call from your Outgoing call log. (If this is a recent call, it will no longer appear in the Recent Calls list.)
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the highlighted option's function.

Incoming Calls

Your phone retains information about the last 20 Incoming calls and stores them in the Incoming call log. You can review the Incoming call log for the time and date of the call, as well as other information.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press 500 (for Calls) and 200 for Incoming. A list of your Incoming calls appears in the display.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight a call, then press the construction key to view further information about the call.
- 3. Press the **Option** (left) soft key (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Talk Call the selected number.
 - Save Save the number to your Contacts.
 - Prepend Add a prefix to the number.

- Erase Erase the selected call from your Incoming call list. (If this is a recent call, it will no longer appear in the Recent Calls list.)
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the highlighted option's function.

Missed Calls

Your phone retains information about the last 20 missed calls (calls that were never answered) and stores them in the **Missed** call log. You can review the Missed call log for the time and date of the call, as well as other information.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press see (for Calls) and e for Missed. A list of your missed calls appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight a call, then press the key to view further information about the call.
- Press the **Option** (left) soft key (] I > A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Talk Call the selected number.
 - Save Save the number to your Contacts.
 - Prepend Add a prefix to the number.
 - Erase Erase the selected call from your Missed call list. (If this is a recent call, it will no longer appear in the Recent Calls list.)
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the or key to perform the highlighted option's function.

Erase Logs

You can erase all calls from the **Outgoing**, **Incoming**, and **Missed** calls logs individually or you can erase **All Calls** from these calls logs at the same time.

Erase All Calls

In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press (for Calls), (for Calls), (for Erase Logs), and (for All Calls).

"Erase All Calls?" appears in the display as well as the following options:

- Yes Erases all calls in the Calls log.
- No Cancels erasing calls.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option, then press the key.

Call Timer

View the duration of your last call, total calls, and calls made during the life cycle of you phone using the Call Timer feature.

Note: Call Timer is not for billing purposes.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press for Calls) and for Call Timer. The following options appear in the display:
 - Last Call View the duration of your last call.
 - Total View the duration of the total call, incoming and outgoing, made on your phone since the last erasure.
 - LifeTime View the duration of all calls on your phone since activation (LifeTime timers cannot be erased).
 - Erase Total Erases the counters for the Total call timer.

Press the number of the option you wish enter, or use the navigation keys to highlight the option and press the or key.

2. Press the 🜆 key if you wish to exit the menu.

Note: Although Total call timers can be erased, LifeTime call timers can never be erased.

Data Counter

Use Data Counter to view the amount of data that has been sent or received (or a total of both) using the data services that your phone supports, such as **Axcess Shop**. The Data Counter can be a helpful tool for monitoring data usage, especially if your service agreement has specified limits.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key () then press see (for Calls) and e for Data Counter. The following options appear in the display:
 - Transmit View the amount of data (in kilobytes) that your phone has transmitted since last being reset.
 - Received View the amount of data (in kilobytes) that your phone has received since last being reset.
 - Total View the amount of data (in kilobytes) that your phone has transmitted and received since last being reset.
 - Erase Total Erase (reset) the Transmit, Received, and Total data counters.

Phone Modes

Standby Mode

Standby mode is the state of your phone once it is powered on and has found a wireless service. Your phone goes into standby mode:

- · After you power the phone on.
- When you press the desk key after a call or from within a menu or phone function screen.

When in standby mode, you will see the time, day, and date in the display as well as all currently active icons.

When in standby mode, you can:

- Make calls.
- · Receive calls and messages.
- · Access your phone's menus.
- · Change your phone's mode.
- · Activate Voice Command.
- · Adjust calls ringer volume.

Receive Messages in Standby Mode

You can receive messages while in standby mode. An alert tone sounds and a notification message appears in the display when a new message arrives.

- Press the View (right) soft key () to view the message now.
- Press the Ignore (left) soft key (<) to view the message later.

Talk Mode

While in a call your phone is in talk mode. Press the left soft key (\square) to display a list of In-Use menu options. (See see "In Use Menu Outline" on page 39 for more information).

Lock Mode

When you lock your phone using the **Lock Mode** menu option (see see "Lock Phone" on page 133 for more information), the following restrictions are placed on use of your phone:

- You can receive messages and calls.
- You cannot make outgoing calls (except for emergency numbers).
- You cannot access your phone's menus.
- The volume key is disabled.

Unlock your phone by following the prompts and entering the lock code.

Silent Mode

With a single press of the key you can silence the call ringer and tones that your keypad makes whenever you press a key.

When you receive a call, the phone vibrates instead of ringing.

Enter Silent Mode

In standby mode, press and hold the *model* key.
 "Entering Silent Mode" briefly appears in the display and your phone returns to standby mode.

The Silent Mode icon (I) appears in the top line of the display.

Exit Silent Mode

In standby mode, press and hold the *standby* key.

"Exit Silent Mode" briefly appears in the display and your phone returns to standby mode.

Vibrate Mode

You can set your phone to vibrate whenever you receive an incoming call using either of the following methods:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), (for Volume/Vibrate), and (for Calls.
- 2. Press the Left navigation key until "Vibrate" appears in the display, then press the or key.

Text Input Modes

You use your phone's text input modes (Alpha, Symbol, Number, or T9 WORD) to enter text, numbers, or symbols into messages, events, and other functions. The current text input mode is indicated in the lower right part of the display.

Note: See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information about text input modes.

Alpha Mode

- Press the key repeatedly until the desired character (letter, number, or symbol) appears in the display.
- Pause briefly and the displayed character is accepted and inserted into your message.
- Press 🗾 to enter a space.

Tip: To enter large numbers of symbols or numbers quickly, use Symbol mode or Number mode as described in the following sections.

Symbol Mode

Symbol mode lets you use keypad number keys to enter symbols such as @ or % into a text message, event, or e-mail address without going through repeated key presses as with Alpha mode.

You press the key that corresponds with the symbol that you wish to enter. For example, press en for an exclamation point (!).

Number Mode

Number mode lets you use keypad number keys to enter numbers into a text message, event, or e-mail address without going through repeated key presses as with Alpha mode.

T9 Word Text Entry Mode

T9 Word recognizes a commonly used word that is represented by a sequence of number key presses and inserts that word into your message. (For example, entering '8378' would insert 'test' into your message.) Using T9 Word is much faster than the more traditional text input method (Alpha mode) and requires only one press of a key per letter of the word that you're entering. [For example, in Alpha mode, you would have to enter '83377778' for 'test' instead of entering '8378' for 'test' as in T9 Word mode.]

Note: See "Entering Text in T9 Word Mode" on page 48 for more information about using the T9 Word text input mode.

Roaming

What is Roaming?

Roaming lets you use your Alltel Snap phone when you travel outside of your Wireless Provider's coverage area. The Roaming icon (

Note: Some features may be unavailable while roaming. Roaming also consumes additional power from the battery requiring more frequent recharging. Contact your Wireless Provider for more information about Roaming.

How Roaming Works

Roam Option lets you set roaming preferences if you move in and out of your home network. The following roaming options are available:

- Home only Your phone is available for normal operation only in the designated coverage area.
- Automatic-A Your Wireless Provider's Preferred Roaming List (PRL) of networks is used to acquire service. If no preferred networks are found, any digital "A" system is acquired.
- Automatic-B Your Wireless Provider's PRL is used to acquire service. If no
 preferred networks are found, any digital "B" system is acquired.

Menu Navigation

You access the menus and sub-menus in your phone by using the navigation keys

(• 💽 •), soft keys (🧲 📄), or a shortcut.

Navigate Using Keys

- 1. In standby mode, press the **MENU** (left) soft key (
- 2. Use the navigation keys to browse through the menus in your phone.
- Press the key to select a menu or sub-menu that then appears in the display.

Return to the Previous Menu

There are two methods for exiting a menu or list.

- Press the Back (right) soft key (
).
- Press the BACK key (BACK).

Navigate Using a Shortcut

You can also access the menus and sub-menus in your phone using menu item numbers. Using the menu and sub-menu numbers in conjunction with the **OK** key (**INCOL**) takes you directly to the menu or sub-menu of your choice. Before you can navigate using a shortcut, you'll need to know the menu or sub-menu number of the feature that you wish access.

Note: Use the list of menus and sub-menus, which begins on page 40, to navigate using shortcuts.

- 1. In standby mode, the **MENU** (left) soft key (
- Press the number of the menu, sub-menu, and so on for the feature that you wish to access.

Example: Press the left soft key (), then press the wey, and then the wey. This takes you to the **Tools** (MENU 8), and then to the **To Do List** (sub-menu 4).

Navigation key shortcuts

Some applications can be launched by pressing one of the four navigation keys (see the illustration) while in standby mode.



In Use Menu Outline

Your phone includes both a Main menu and an In-Use menu. The In-Use menu is accessible only when you are in a call.

- Press the left soft key () MENU, while in a call to display the following options:
 - Calls Checks your call log for outgoing, incoming, and missed calls. You can also erase your call logs from this menu.
 - Contacts Accesses Contacts menu options.
 - Voice Memo Records and saves voice memos.
 - Silent/Quit Activates or deactivates Silent Mode. In Silent Mode, your phones keypad tones are muted. This feature should not be used when you access automated services that require you to select options, or enter numbers (such as your voice mail password).
 - Send Tel# Send your phone number to the other party of the call.
 - Send DTMF Send your phone number as Dual-Tone Multi-Frequency dialing tones.
 - Voice Privacy Set Voice Privacy to Standard or Enhanced mode. Voice Privacy prevents the receiving party from seeing your number when you call.
 - Location Enable the GPS feature for emergency calls only (911 Only), or fully enable GPS (Location On).
 - Version View the software and hardware versions for your phone.

2. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option. Press the Key to select the In-Use menu option of your choice.

You can also press the **MUTE/Unmute** (left) soft key (

3. Press the MSG (right) soft key () to access the Messages menu to receive, review, and send messages during the current call.

This section outlines how to select the desired text input mode when entering characters into your phone. This section also describes how to use the T9 predictive text entry system to reduce the number of key strokes associated with entering text.

Text Entry Modes

You can compose text messages using alphabetical characters, symbols, and numbers. Each method of character entry (symbol, number, and so on) is called a text entry mode. There are four text entry modes, as indicated:

- Alpha Alphabetical text entry mode. Options are:
 - ABC All upper case
 - Abc Initial capital
 - abc All lower case
- Symbol Symbol entry mode. Enter symbols into your message by pressing the corresponding number that appears above it in the display.
- Number Number entry. Enter numbers by pressing the corresponding key on the keypad.
- **T9 Word** Predictive text mode. Press each key only once to enter the letter of the word that you're spelling.

Your current mode of text entry (Abc, Symbol, 123, or T9 Word) is indicated in the lower left part of the display when composing a text message.

Note: Each of the text entry modes are explained in greater detail in "Messaging" on page 64.

Changing the Text Entry Mode

- While composing a text message, press the **Option** (left) soft key (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - · Alpha / Symbol / Number / T9 Word
 - Text Format
 - Add Media
 - Quick Text

Alpha is highlighted. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to show any of the other three text entry modes.

2. Press the key to select the highlighted text mode.

Tip: You can also change the text entry mode to abc, 123, or T9 word by by repeatedly pressing and holding the util the desired mode appears in the lower left side of the screen.

Entering Text in Alpha (ABC) Mode

Note: See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 47 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

- Enter characters while in ABC (Alpha) mode by pressing the key with the desired characters (such as, pressing an once for "G").
- Press the key repeatedly until the desired character appears in the display (such as, pressing <u>unit</u> two times for "H").
- Pause briefly and the displayed character is accepted and inserted into your message.
- 4. Press the *space*.

Entering Text in T9 Word Mode

T9 Word recognizes commonly used words for a sequence of keypresses and inserts the word into your message. Using T9 mode is much faster than the more traditional method Alpha mode, since T9 *requires only one key press per letter* of the word that you are spelling.

Note: See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 47 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

 While in **T9 Word** mode, press each key that corresponds to a desired letter, in sequence, one time.

For example, if you press the key sequence 24 24 35, and the word "bad" appears on the screen.

- When you have completed pressing all the keys for the desired word, review the word displayed in your text.
- If the word is not the one you meant to enter, press the deal key to show the next word that matches the sequence of keys that you pressed.

For example, when you press the key sequence even is " is ", the word "and" appears on the screen. Suppose the word you want is "cod". Just press the even key until "cod" appears in the display.

Now, for practice, enter the work 'Samsung' into your message by pressing each of the following keys only once:



T9 Word recognizes that the most commonly used word for the numeric sequence you just entered is "Samsung."

Entering Upper and Lower Case Letters

In Abc and T9 Word modes, you can select to enter only upper case letters (ABC/T9 WORD), only lower case letters (abc/T9 word), or a mix of the two (Abc/T9 Word).

 While in T9 Word or Abc mode, use the way key to change the capitalization setting. Simply press the way key repeatedly until the desired capitalization mode appears.

The text entry mode indicator in the lower left corner of the screen changes to indicate the current capitalization setting.

For example, if the left soft key label is **ABC**, and you want to enter the word "ball", press the we word "ball", press the word "ball".

Tip: To enter a capital letter within a word, such as "SimTam", change the capitalization setting to Abc at the beginning of the word and before entering the "T". The capitalization setting will automatically change to abc after you enter each upper case letter.

Entering Symbols

Symbol mode enables you to enter symbols such as @ or % in a text message.

- While composing a text message, press the **Option** (left) soft key (). A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - · Alpha / Symbol / Number / T9 Word
 - Text Format
 - Add Media
 - Quick Text

Alpha is highlighted. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to display Symbol, then press the key. The first of four screens of symbols appear in the display.

- Use the Left and Right navigation keys to page through the other symbols, if necessary.
- 3. Enter the key that corresponds with the symbol that you wish to enter. For example, on the first page, press and for an exclamation point (!).
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 to insert as many symbols into your message as desired.

Entering Numbers

Enter numbers into a text message while in number mode (123).

Note: See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 47 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

► While in 123 mode, press the key containing the corresponding number that you wish to insert into your message.

This section explains how to manage your daily contacts by storing their name and number in your Contacts. Contacts entries can be sorted by name, entry, or group.

Your Contacts List

Your Contacts list can store up to 500 numbers, with each contact having up to five associated phone numbers, an e-mail address, and a picture ID.

Each phone number can be up to 32 digits in length, including hard pauses. Contact names can be up to 22 characters in length. You can also specify a memory location for each entry, and you can restrict access to the Contacts list to prevent unauthorized use.

Tip: One-Touch, Two-Touch, and Three-Touch Dialing allow you to call numbers stored in your Contacts list faster. (See page 25.)

Open Your Contacts List

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press for Contacts. The following Contacts sub-menus and options appear in the display:
 - Find Find a phone number By Name, By Entry, or By Group.
 - Add Add a number or e-mail to your Contacts.
 - Rename Group Rename one of your five groups.
 - Memory View available memory for dial entries.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the Contacts sub-menu or option of your choice, and press the ok key.

Tip: You can also access a sub-menu or menu option by pressing the number key corresponds to the menu item number. For example, press zee for Add.

Adding a New Contacts Entry

You can add an entirely new entry to your Contacts list or add information to an existing entry.

Using the Contacts Add Option

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Contacts) and for Add. The following options appear in the display:
 - Number Lets you enter a number to be dialed when calling the new contact.
 - Email Lets you enter an e-mail address for the new contact.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option and press the key.

- 3. Enter the phone number or e-mail address for the new Contacts entry, then press the key. The following options appear in the display:
 - New Entry Lets you create a new Contacts entry.
 - Find Lets you add the number or e-mail address you just entered to an existing Contacts entry.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight New Entry, then press the or key. The following (number type) icons appear in the display:



- Use the navigation keys to highlight the number type that matches your new entry and press the key. The Contacts information screen appears in the display with the Name field highlighted.
- Enter a name or phrase to associate with the type using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- 7. Press the ok key to save the entry.

Adding Pauses to Contacts Numbers

When you call automated systems (like banking services), you are often required to enter a password or account number. Instead of manually entering the numbers each time, you can store the numbers in your Contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- P pause A hard pause stops the calling sequence until further input from you.
- **T pause** A two-second pause stops the calling sequence for two seconds and then automatically sends the remaining digits.

Tip: You can enter multiple two-second pauses to extend the length of a pause. For example, two consecutive two-second pauses cause a total pause time of four seconds.

Note: Keep in mind that pauses count as digits towards the 32-digit maximum.

Store Pauses in a Contacts Entry

 In standby mode, enter the number you wish to store (such as your bank's teleservice number).

- Press the **Option** (left) soft key (). The following pause menu options appear in the display:
 - P pause a hard pause (awaits input from you).
 - T pause a two-second pause.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the pause option of your choice.
- 4. Press the or key to enter the highlighted pause into your number sequence.
- When you're finished entering the number and pauses, press the Save (right) soft key () to store the number in your Contacts.

Saving a Number from a Call

Once you've finished a call, you can save the number of the caller to your Contacts list.

Note: If the call was incoming and Caller ID information was unavailable, then the Save option is also unavailable.

- After you press the set to end your call, the call time, length of call, phone number, and name of the other party (if available) appear in the display.
- Press the Save (right) soft key (). The following options appear in the display:
 - New Entry Lets you create a new Contacts entry.
 - Find Lets you add the number or e-mail address you just entered to an existing Contacts entry.

Tip: You can also store a phone number by entering the number, and pressing the Save (right) soft key ().

 Use the navigation keys to highlight New Entry, then press the key. The following (number type) icons appear in the display:

Storing Number from a Calls Log

You can store numbers from the Calls logs to your Contacts.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press for Calls.
- Press the corresponding number on the keypad to view the following Calls logs:
 - Press for Outgoing
 - Press 200 for Incoming
 - Press set for Missed

A list of your calls appears in the display.

- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the number you wish to store in **Contacts**, then press the **Key**.
- Press the **Option** (left) soft key (). The following options appear in the display:
 - Talk Calls the selected number.
 - Save Saves the selected number to your Contacts list.
 - Prepend Lets you add or change digits to the beginning of the selected number (such as adding a "1" to a long distance number).
 - Erase Deletes the selected number from the selected Calls log.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Save, then press the key. The following options appear in the display:
 - New Entry Lets you create a new Contacts entry.
 - Find Lets you add the number or e-mail address you just entered to an existing Contacts entry.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight New Entry, then press the key. The following (number type) icons appear in the display:



 Use the navigation keys to highlight the number type that matches your new entry and press the key. The Contacts information screen appears in the display with the Name field highlighted.

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- 8. Enter a name or phrase to associate with the type using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- 9. Press the or key to save the entry.

Finding a Contacts Entry

Voice Method

Use the VoiceSignal **Contacts** command to view contact information for any named contact stored in your Contacts list by saying the name.

Note: The Contacts command shows the requested contact information in the display but does not dial any phone numbers for the contact.

To look up information for a specific contact:

1. In standby mode, press and hold the *loce* key to launch VoiceSignal.

"Say a Command" appears in the display and is pronounced through the speaker.

2. Say "Contacts".

VoiceSignal prompts you to "Say the name."

- Speak clearly and say the full name of the person you want to call, exactly as it is entered in your contact list.
 - If VoiceSignal recognizes the name you said, the contact information for that name appears in the display.
 - If VoiceSignal does not recognize the name you said, a choice list of up to three names appears in the display, and VoiceSignal prompts you with "Did you say?" followed by the first name on the list.
- Say "Yes" to confirm the name or "No" to hear the next name, or use the keypad to select the correct name from the list. (See see "Choice Lists Settings" on page 108, for more information.)
 - To say the name again, press the Repeat (right) soft () key.
 - To exit VoiceSignal without dialing, press the Settings (left) soft () key and press the Cancel (right) soft ().
- 5. The contact information for the name you selected appears in the display.

Keypad Methods

If you've stored a named contact in your Contacts list, Find lets you locate the entry quickly.

- 1. In standby mode, do one of the following:
 - Press the Up navigation key (Contacts Find shortcut).

 Press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Contacts) and for Find.

The Find screen appears in the display with By Name showing.

- Use the navigation keys to select the method you wish to use to find the entry. The available Find methods are:
 - By Name Search the Contacts alphabetically by name.
 - By Entry Search the Contacts by entry number.
 - By Group Search the Contacts by selecting from one of the five available groups.
 - By Number Search the Contacts by phone number.

Find by Name

This option lets you find a Contacts list entry by its contact name.

- In the Find screen, use the navigation keys to show By Name in the display.
- 2. Enter the name of the contact as it appears in your Contacts list.

Example: If you saved a contact name as "Amy Smith", begin your search for that contact by pressing
for "A".

Note: As you enter letter, the entry number and names of the closest matches (thus far) appear in the display.

When the desired Contacts entry is listed in the display, highlight the contact using the navigation keys (if necessary). Then:

- Edit Lets you edit details of the highlighted contact.

Find by Entry

This option lets you find a Contacts list entry by its Location number.

Editing an Existing Contact Entry

Editing an Existing Contact Entry

Once stored in the Contacts, an entry can be changed quite easily.

- 5. The Edit option is highlighted.
- 6. Press the ext key. The Contacts information screen appears in the display with the contact name highlighted.
- 7. Use the navigation keys to highlight a number stored in this contact entry.
- 8. Press **EACK** to backspace and delete numbers.
- 9. Press and hold to clear all numbers in the highlighted field.
- 10. When you're finished editing the number, press the key. Your changes are saved and a confirmation message appears in the display.

Assigning Speed Dial Numbers

When you add an entry to the Contacts list, you have the option of letting the phone assign a Location (Speed Dial) number or of selecting or entering a Location number. You can also change a contact's Location number.

- 2. Use the navigation keys to display the search method that you wish to use (By Name, By Group, By Entry, or By Number).
- 3. Enter information to find the Contacts list entry, or use the navigation keys to highlight the entry containing the Location number that you wish to change.
- 4. Once the entry is highlighted, press the or key.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to highlight SpeedDial.
- 6. Press the Edit (left) soft key (
- Use the Left and Right navigation keys to select the Number Type icon for the number you want the phone to dial when you speed dial this contact.
- 8. Press the or key to save your changes.

Add a Number or E-mail Address to an Existing Entry

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press 4 (for Contacts) and _____ for Add. The following options appear in the display:
 - Number Lets you enter a number to be dialed when calling the new contact.
 - Email Lets you enter an e-mail address for the new contact.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option and press the key.
- 3. Enter the phone number or e-mail address for the new Contacts entry, then press the key. The following options appear in the display:
 - New Entry Lets you create a new Contacts entry.
 - Find Lets you add the number or e-mail address you just entered to an existing Contacts entry.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Find**, then press the **key**.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to show the search method that you wish to use (By Name, By Group, By Entry, or By Number).
- 6. Enter information to find the entry and/or use the navigation keys to highlight the desired entry and press the or key. The Select Type screen appears in the display.

- 2. Press for New Text Msg.
- 3. Enter the phone number of the recipient, then press the or key.
- Enter the text for your message using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- At any point while composing a message, press the Option (left) soft key
). The following options appear in the display:
 - Alpha The entry mode for your message. Other modes, which are hidden, are Symbol, Number, and T9 Word. Use the navigation keys to show each of the text entry modes.
 - Text Format Choose the size, alignment, bold, italic, and other options for formatting your text.
 - Add Media Add a picture, animation, or melody to your message.
 - Quick Text Insert a pre-composed message into the body of your current message.
- Once you're finished entering your message, press the key. The following New Message options appear in the display:
 - Edit Send To Edit the recipient's Send To number.
 - Edit Text Edit the content of your message.
 - Send Options Choose the Priority, Validity, whether you wish to have a Delivery Acknowledgement, Insert a Signature, and whether you wish to Defer Delivery of the message. (See "Message Send Options" on page 69 for more information.)
 - Save in Draft Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Save Text Save the text in your message as a Quick Text message. Quick Text messages are pre-composed messages that can be inserted into any message you choose.
- To send your message, press the SEND (left) soft key ().

Creating and Sending a Media Message

 In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press for New Text Msg.

- 2. Enter the phone number of the recipient, then press the or key.
- Enter the text for your message using the keypad. See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- At any point while composing a message, press the Option (left) soft key
 (I). The following options appear in the display:
 - Alpha The entry mode for your message. Other modes, which are hidden, are Symbol, Number, and T9 Word. Use the navigation keys to display each of the text entry modes.
 - Text Format Choose the size, alignment, bold, italic, and other options for formatting your text.
 - Add Media Add a picture, animation, or melody to your message.
 - Ouick Text Insert a pre-composed message into the body of your current message.
- 5. Press eff (for Add Media). The following options appear in the display:
 - Add Picture Lets you add a preloaded or downloaded photo.
 - Add Animation Lets you add a preloaded or downloaded animation.
 - Add Melody Lets you add a preloaded or downloaded melody.
- Once you're finished entering your message text and/or adding media, press the key. The following New Message options appear in the display:
 - Edit Send To Edit the recipient's Send To number.
 - Edit Text Edit the content of your message.
 - Send Options Choose the Priority, Validity, whether you wish to have Delivery Acknowledged, and whether you wish to Defer Delivery of the message. See "Message Send Options" on page 69 for more information on these settings.
 - Save in Draft Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Save Text Save the text in your message as a Quick Text message. Quick Text messages are pre-composed messages that can be inserted into any message you choose.
- To send your message, press the Send (left) soft key ().

Creating and Sending a Picture Message

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press for New Pic Msg. The New Pic Message screen appears in the display with the Send To field highlighted.
- 2. Enter the phone number or e-mail address of the recipient, then press the Down navigation key.

Creating and Sending New Messages

Press the **Option** (left) soft key (

- Contacts Find and select a recipient from your Contacts list.
- Number The entry mode for your message. Other modes, which are hidden, are T9 Word, Alpha, Symbol, and Number. Use the navigation keys to display each of the text entry modes.
- .com The domain name for the recipient e-mail address. Other domains, which are hidden, are .edu and .net. Use the navigation keys to display each of the domain names.
- OnlineAlbum Sets your Online Album as the recipient of your picture. (Contact your Wirless Carrier for more information.)
- Save Address Add the recipient's number or e-mail address to your Contacts list.
- Recent Calls Find and select a recipient from your Recent Calls log.
- Enter the text for the Subject of your message using the keypad, then press the Down navigation key. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)

Press the **Option** (left) soft key (

- T9 Word
- Alpha
- Symbol
- Number
- Select a picture to include with your message, then press the Down navigation key.

Press the **Option** (left) soft key (

- Photo Gallery Lets you add a photo from the gallery or take a new photo.
- Image Gallery Lets you add a downloaded image.
- Erase Lets you remove a photo from your message.
- Enter the text for your message using the keypad, then press the Down navigation key. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)

Press the **Option** (left) soft key (

 Alpha — The entry mode for your message. Other modes, which are hidden, are Symbol, Number, and T9 Word. Use the navigation keys to display each of the text entry modes.

- Ouick Text Insert a pre-composed message into the body of your current message.
- Select a sound file to include with your message, then press the Down navigation key.

Press the **Option** (left) soft key (

- Sounds Lets you add a preloaded melody or a recorded sound file to your message.
- Erase Lets you remove a melody or sound file from your message.
- Once you're finished composing your message, press the Next (right) soft key (
). The following SEND NEW options appear in the display:
 - Preview View and play the message as the recipient will see and hear it.
 - Send Options Choose the Priority, Validity, whether you wish to have Delivery Acknowledged, and whether you wish to Defer Delivery of the message. See "Message Send Options" on page 69 for more information on these settings.
 - Save in Draft Save the message to your Drafts folder.
- To send your message, press the SEND (left) soft key ().

Creating and Sending a Handwritten Message

New Handwr. Msg lets you quickly send handwritten messages as pictures, rather than using the keypad to enter your message.

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press
 for New Handwr. Msg. The camera viewfinder screen appears in the display in Sketch mode (that is, high contrast).
- Position your handset so that the complete text of the message appears within the image corners. See "Simple Snap Shot" on page 82 for more information.

Tip: For best results, write your message on white or light-colored, unruled paper (that is, no lines).

- Use the Left and Right navigation keys to increase magnification of ("zoom in on") the message, as needed.
- Press the ok key. "Digitizing..." appears in the display, followed by a high-contrast picture of your message.
- If you are satisfied with the picture of your message, press the or key to save the picture and begin delivery process. The New Pic Message screen then appears in the display with the Send To field highlighted.

 Complete and send your new Handwritten Pic message. See "Creating and Sending a Picture Message" on page 66 for more information.

Message Send Options

You can set priority, validity, and other options before you send a message.

- After you've composed a message and pressed the key (for text messages) or the Next (right) soft key () (for picture and handwritten messages), you're returned to the New Message/SEND NEW menu.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Send Options, then press the or key. The following Send Options appear in the display:
 - Priority Assign a priority to your message.
 - Validity Select the period of time that you wish the message to be available to the recipient. After the set period of time, your message is recalled.
 - Delivery Ack Lets you activate or deactivate the report function. When this
 function is activated, the network informs you whether or not this message has
 been delivered.
 - CB# Text messages only Insert a number into your message for the recipient to call you back.
 - Def. Delivery Choose when you wish your message to be sent.
- Use the navigation keys to display the various Send Options for each menu item.
- 4. When the desired Send Option appears in the display, press the key to confirm the selection or to enter the send option's sub-menu.

Retrieving New Messages

When you receive a message in standby mode, the ringer sounds (unless turned off) and **New Message** appears in the display along with the closed envelope icon (\bowtie). The date and time of the message also appear in the display.

- Press the Ignore (left) soft key (
- Press the View (right) soft key () to open the message, where you have the option to Reply, Lock/Unlock, Erase, Forward, Save Contact, or Save Media.

Retrieve Messages While in a Call

When you receive a message while in a call, New Message appears in the display along with the closed envelope icon (\bowtie). To view the message without disconnecting the call:

 Press the Ignore (left) soft key () to ignore the message and save it to your inbox where you can view it later.

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 Press the View (right) soft key () to open the message, your call remains connected.

Voicemail

Voicemail allows callers to leave voice messages in your voice mailbox, and lets you review, play, and delete your voice messages any time you are in a network coverage area.

Voicemail Setup

Before callers can leave voice mail messages, you must first set up your account. See "Setting Up Your Voice Mail" on page 11 for more information.

Check your Voicemail

- In standby mode, press and hold the key until you're connected to the Voicemail system. A recorded message prompts you for a password.
- Enter your password. Follow the recorded prompts, to listen to your voice message, change administrative options, and so on.

Tip: You can also check your Voicemail by using entries in the Voicemail folder. See "Voicemail" on page 73 for more information.

Message Folders

Inbox

Received messages of all types (except Voice Mail) are stored in the Inbox.

1. In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press (for Inbox) to open the Inbox folder.

Tip: While in a call, press the MSG (right) soft key () to open the Messages menu.

- Use the navigation keys to highlight an incoming message that you wish to view.
- 3. Press the or key to view the highlighted message.
- While viewing your message, press the **Options** (left) soft key (), The following options appear in the display:
 - Reply Lets you reply to a message.
 - Lock/Unlock Block or permit erasure of the message.
 - Erase Erases the selected message.
 - Forward Lets you forward the message to other Email addresses or phone numbers.

- Save Contact Save the sender's number to your Contacts.
- Save Media Save any audio and/or image files.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option. Press the key to perform the function for the highlighted option.

Outbox

Your phone stores outgoing messages in the Outbox, regardless of whether the message was successfully transmitted to, or received by, the addressee.

Tip: Verify whether and when a message or e-mail was successfully received by enabling the **Delivery Ack** feature.

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press (for Outbox) A list of your outgoing messages appears in the display.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight a message that you wish to review, then press the key.
- Press the Option (left) soft key (). The following options appear in the display:
 - Forward Send a copy of the message to other Email addresses or phone numbers.
 - Lock/Unlock Block or permit erasure of the message.
 - Erase Erase the message.
 - Message Info Displays information related to the selected message.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the function for the highlighted option.

Drafts

Messages in the Drafts folder are those that have been composed but never sent. You can return to the Drafts folder at any time to view, edit, or send a draft message.

Text Message

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press [] (for Drafts). A list of your draft messages appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the draft text message that you wish to review, then press the key. The message text composition screen appears in the display.
- Add/change text using the keypad. (For more information, see "Entering Text" on page 46.)

- 4. Press the left soft key (🗾) **Options**, to display the options listed.
 - T9 Word / Alpha / Symbol / Number Set the text entry mode.
 - Text Format Change the size, alignment, and appearance of the message text.
 - Add Media Add a picture, an image, and/or a sound file to the message.
 - **Quick Text** Add precomposed text to the message.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option.
- 6. Press the or key to perform the function for the highlighted option.
- 7. When the message text is complete, press the or key. The New Message menu appears in the display.
- To change or add recipient(s) to the message, press the for Edit Send To.
- 9. Press the Option (left) soft key. The following options appear in the display:
 - Contacts Find and select a recipient from your Contacts list.
 - Number The entry mode for your message. Other modes, which are hidden, are T9 Word, Alpha, Symbol, and Number. Use the navigation keys to display each of the text entry modes.
 - .com The domain name for the recipient e-mail address. Other domains, which are hidden, are .edu and .net. Use the navigation keys to display each of the domain names.
 - Save Address Add the recipient's number or e-mail address to your Contacts list.
 - Recent Calls Find and select a recipient from your Recent Calls log.
- 10. When you have finished adding/changing message recipient(s), press the key to return to the New Message menu.
- 11. Set any needed Message Send Options. (For more information, see "Message Send Options" on page 69.)
- 12. Press we for Save in Draft to save this message as a new draft text message.
- **13**. Press the SEND key (or) to send the message.

Picture Message

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press
 (for Drafts). A list of your draft messages appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the draft text message that you wish to review, then press the key. The New Pic Message screen appears in the display.
Change, compose, and send the picture message. (For more information, see "Creating and Sending a Picture Message" on page 66.)

Voicemail

New voice messages in your voice mailbox are logged in the Voicemail folder of the Messages menu. Open the Voice Mail folder to view the Callback # (if available), Urgency, and other details of new voice mail messages.

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press (for Voicemail). A Voicemail status screen indicating the number of new messages in your voice mailbox, their urgency, and any callback numbers appears in the display.
- 2. Press the solar key to call your voice mailbox and listen to the message.

Note: You can also press and hold the Total key to dial your voice mailbox.

WAP Push

Occasionally, your Wireless Provider may send notifications to your phone in the form of WAP Push alerts. These alerts may contain information on new services or updates. When you receive an alert, you'll also receive a text notification and hear a tone.

Note: Contact your Wireless Provider for availability.

 In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press (for Wap Push).

An Alert Inbox status screen indicating the number of new alert messages in your WAP mailbox appears in the display.

- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired WAP alert.
- 3. Press the or key to view the selected WAP alert.

Messages and Lock Mode

Your phone can still receive messages while in Lock Mode. The time and date of the message appear in the display, but you cannot access the message until you enter the lock code. (For more information, refer to *"Lock Phone"* on page 133.)

Message Settings

The Msg Settings folder lets you define numerous message settings such as ringer types and save options.

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press
 (for Msg Setting). The following Msg Setting sub-menus appear in the display:
 - Text Msg Settings that apply to text messages.
 - Pic Msg Settings that apply to picture messages.
 - General Settings that apply to all messages.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired sub-menu. Press the ok key to enter the sub-menu. The following options appear in the display:
 - Text Msg
 - SaveInOutbox Elect to not save, prompt to save, or automatically save copies of sent text messages in your Outbox folder.
 - Insert Sign. Elect to not insert or insert a pre-composed text signature at the end of sent text messages.
 - Delivery Ack Enable or disable delivery acknowledgement of your sent text messages from your Wireless Carrier's server.
 - Direct View Enable or disable automatic presentation of newly received text messages.
 - Signature Compose or change the text signature to be inserted at the end of sent text messages, depending on the Insert Sign. setting.
 - Callback # Enter or change the number text message recipients can call in response to your sent text messages.
 - Pic Msg
 - SaveInOutbox Elect to not save, prompt to save, or automatically save copies of sent picture messages in your Outbox folder.
 - Delivery Ack Enable or disable delivery acknowledgement of your sent picture messages from your Wireless Carrier's server.
 - Retrieval Mode Elect to automatically retrieve newly received picture messages or to be prompted for retrieval.
 - General
 - Entry Mode Lets you specify T9 Word, Alphabet, or Number as the default message text entry mode.
 - Ouick Text Add or change pre-composed message text for insertion into messages.
 - Msg Alert Set Reminder and Alert On Call.
 - Auto Erase Automatically erase first message received after memory is full.
 - Voice Mail # Lets you enter the access phone number to your Voicemail account.

- Block Sender Block or Unblock messages from a specified web address or phone number, and View the List of Blocked senders.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option. Press the key to adjust the selected message setting.

Deleting Messages

You can erase all of the messages in each/all of your message folders from one convenient location.

Note: This function erases all messages in a selected message folder or in all message folders. To delete a single message, from the Messages menu, open the message folder where the message to be deleted is stored, then select and delete the message from the **Option** menu while viewing the message content.

- In standby mode, press the MESSAGE (right) soft key (), then press
 for Erase Msg. The following options appear in the display:
 - Inbox Lets you delete all unlocked messages from your Inbox.
 - Outbox Lets you delete all unlocked messages from your Outbox.
 - Draft Lets you delete all unlocked draft messages from the Draft folder.
 - All Messages Lets you delete all unlocked messages from all message folders.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the folder containing the messages that you wish to delete.
- 3. Press the key to open the highlighted folder. You are prompted to confirm the erasure of all messages in the folder.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight Yes or No, then press the Key.

This section explains the Axcess Shop features where users can download multimedia, applications, games, and check news and sports.

Axcess Shop Options

With Axcess Shop, you can download full featured applications over the air including games, personalized ring tones, pictures, and more. Send and receive instant messages and email, or browse the web to catch up on all the latest news.

- In standby mode, press the Right navigation key to launch Axcess Shop. The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess Shop icon ()
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- Press similar in the display.
- Press select "Remove" if you don't want to see the airtime warning again." appears in the display along with the following options:
 - Yes Closes the warning message pop-up for this session.
 - **Remove** Blocks the airtime warning message from appearing in future sessions.
- Use the Left and Right navigation keys to highlight the option you want, then press
 The following options listed appear in the display:
 - Tone Shop Select from a broad category of rintones that you can play on your phone.
 - Best Sellers Select from the most popular games, information services, and so on.
 - New Arrivals Provides updates on the latest games, information services, and so on.
 - Games Select from a broad category of games that you can play on your phone. Also select from several fun and interesting applications.
 - Wallpapers & Photos View, share your own pictures and even save them as your phone's wallpaper or screensaver.
 - Search Enter a keyword and search the Axcess Shop catalogue.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to highlight the category of your choice, then press
- Select the application you wish to download and follow the online directions.

Axcess Shop Settings

Use the Settings sub-menu within Axcess Shop to manage, move, order applications and much more.

 In standby mode, press the Right navigation key to launch Axcess Shop. The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess icon () (), highlighted.

- At the Axcess Shop menu, press the Right navigation key once to highlight the Settings icon (
 , then press
 , The following options appear in the display:
 - Order Apps Download applications over the network.
 - Move Apps Move previously downloaded applications between available folders.
 - Manage Apps Allow you to manage previously downloaded applications.
 - Main Menu View Select whether you wish to view the main Axcess Shop menu in a list or icon format.
 - Screen Savers View downloaded screensavers.
 - Airtime Warnings Enable or disable airtime warning messages.
 - View Log View the Axcess Shop log, which displays information about recent activity using Axcess Shop.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 4. Press or to enter the option's sub-menu and view or change settings.

Axcess Shop Help

The Help sub-menu within Axcess Shop is a short tutorial on several Axcess Shop features. View information about charges, cancelling subscriptions, buying apps, disabling apps, and more.

- In standby mode, press the Right navigation key to launch Axcess Shop. The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess icon () (), highlighted.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the Help icon (?), then press . The Help subjects listed in the following subsections appear in the display.

Buying New Apps

To buy new and exciting apps, visit the Axcess Shop. It provides you with a variety of apps you can choose from.

What do I pay?

When you buy an app you will be charged for the purchase cost of the app and the network connections to download it. Charges will also apply when you use apps that require network connections, such as downloading information and sending text messages.

Charges

Charges will apply for network connections. A network connection is used when you are browsing the Axcess Shop, downloading and restoring apps, or cancelling subscription apps. Charges will also apply when you use apps that require network connections, such as downloading information and sending text messages.

Cancelling Subscription

To cancel a subscription to an app:

- In standby mode, press the Right navigation key to launch Axcess Shop. The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess icon ()
 highlighted.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the Settings icon (), then press
- 3. Highlight Manage apps, then press or.
- 4. Select the app subscription you want to cancel.

Demo Apps

A Demo app is free and is designed to demonstrate the app's main features. It usually expires after a certain period of time or a number of uses and often has limited functions. When you run a demo app, you will be presented with a purchase option so you won't have to look for the app in the Axcess Shop.

Removing Apps

You may remove apps that are no longer needed. When you remove an app, you cannot use the application unless you purchase it again.

To remove an app:

- In standby mode, press the Right navigation key to launch Axcess Shop. The Axcess Shop menu appears in the display with the Axcess icon ()
 highlighted.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the Settings icon (//), then press
- 3. Highlight Manage apps, then press or.
- 4. Select the app you want to remove.

Disabled Apps

You can install new apps even if the memory of your phone is full by partially removing (disabling) apps you haven't used recently. When you need to use a disabled app, you can restore it at no additional purchase cost.

Restoring Apps

Disabled apps can be quickly restored at no additional purchase cost. To restore an app, run the application you want to restore from the Main Menu. You will be guided through the restoration process.

Expired Apps

Apps that were purchased based on the number of uses or time expire. You can purchase additional uses from the Axcess Shop.

Use your Alltel Snap phone to take full color digital pictures, display them on your phone's vivid color display, and instantly share them with family and friends. It's fun, and as easy to use as a traditional point-and-click camera. Depending on the resolution you choose, you can save dozens of pictures in your phone's memory.

This section explains how you can do the following:

- Take pictures with your phone's built-in digital camera.
- · Send and receive pictures taken with your phone's camera.
- Set the several options associated with the camera that help you take crisp, clear pictures.

Taking Pictures

Taking pictures with the built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens [located on the outside of the folder (above the external display)], and pressing a button.

Simple Snap Shot

To take a single picture using the current camera settings, do the following:

 In standby mode, press and hold the Camera key () on the right side of the phone.

The message "Camera Starting..." followed by a camera viewfinder screen appears in the display. (See "Camera Screen" on page 83 for more information.) Your phone is now in camera mode.

- 2. Point the camera at your subject.
- 3. Using the display as a viewfinder, press the or key when the image that you wish to capture appears in the display.
- 4. Press the Save (left) soft key (
- 5. Press the SEND key (or) to include the picture in a new picture message.
- 6. Press the Erase (right) soft key () to erase the photo.

Tip: You can change a number of the camera's options to suit particular uses for your pictures. See "Camera Options" on page 85 for more information.

Point, Click, and Send a Picture

Take a picture and send it to anyone with a compatible device in a few easy steps.

Tip: You can send a Picture message to up to ten recipients. Separate each recipient's address or phone number with a comma in the Send to field of the Picture message composer.

- In standby mode, press and hold the Camera key () to activate the camera.
- Using the display as a viewfinder, take the desired picture by pressing the Camera key (
) or the key.
- 3. Press the or key to display the New Pic Message composer.
- Select (from your Contacts list) or enter the recipient's phone number or email address using the keypad.
- Enter Subject and Message text and/or add a Sound file. (For additional information, see "Creating and Sending a Picture Message" on page 66.)

6. Press the or key to send the Picture message to the intended recipient(s).

Camera Screen

When you activate your phone's camera, the first and second lines of the display are reserved for the current camera setting and option icons. The center of the display shows a viewfinder image of the subject at which the camera is pointed. The soft key labels on the bottom line of the display change to the following:

- Option Pressing the left soft key () opens a pop-up menu of camera options.
- OK Pressing the key takes a picture of the image currently appearing on the display.
- Gallery Pressing the right soft key ()



opens the Photo Gallery so you can view or manage your stored pictures.

Camera Screen Icons



Camera — Indicates that pressing the key takes a picture of the image currently appearing on the display.

- High Resolution Indicates the camera's resolution setting (High, Med, or Low). (You can change the default camera resolution setting. See "Camera Options" on page 85 for more information.)
- Zoom Indicates that you can use the Left and Right navigation keys to zoom in or out on the current picture and indicates the current zoom setting [blank (no zoom available), 01, 02, 03]. The range of available zoom settings is determined by the Resolution setting (High = no zoom, Med = 01 - 03, Low = 01 - 05).
- Brightness Indicates that you can use the Up and Down navigation keys to increase or decrease brightness of the current picture and indicates the current brightness setting (4 - -4).

- **Counter** Indicates the remaining number of pictures you can take (up to 200).
- Multi Shot Indicates the Multi Shot option is active and that you will take and save multiple pictures of the current subject in quick succession when you press the Camera key

() or the or key. The number of pictures taken depends

upon the Resolution setting (High = 3 shots, Med = 5 shots, Low = 7 shots).



Self Timer in use — Indicates that you have set the camera shutter to delay for 5 seconds or 10 seconds after

you press the Camera key () or the key.

Zoom in on a Subject

Your camera has digital zoom capabilities of up to x5 in Low resolution mode (x3 in Medium resolution mode). Pictures may appear somewhat grainy as you zoom in; this is a normal result of digital enhancement.

- Press the Left and Right navigation keys to zoom in and out on your subject.
- 3. Press the or key or the Camera key () to take the picture.

Brighten/Darken Your Picture

The Brightness option lets you temporarily change the brightness of your pictures. The available brightness value range from 4 through -4.

Note: The Zoom setting is affected by the Resolution setting (camera mode). When Resolution is set to High no zoom is available. When Resolution is set to Medium, X1, X2, and X3 are available. When Resolution is set to Low, X1, X2, X3, X4, and X5 zoom settings are available.

- Use the Up and Down navigation keys to change the Brightness setting and to brighten or darken the image.
- 3. When the image is at the desired brightness, press the key or the Camera key (>>>> to take the picture.

Camera Options

The Camera Options let you temporarily override your default camera settings. Any settings you change using the Camera Options only apply to the current picture, to the current camera session, or until you make another change using the Camera Options. When you exit camera mode, all Camera Options settings return to default values.

To access the Camera Options, do the following:

- Press and hold the Camera key () on the right hand side of your camera. The camera viewfinder screen appears in the display indicating your phone is in camera mode.
- Press the Option (left) soft key (
). The following options appear in the display:
 - Resolution
 - Self Timer
 - Multi Shot
 - Fun Frame
 - Color Tones
 - White Balance
 - · Quality
 - Shutter Sound
- Press the number key corresponding to the desired option, or use the navigation keys or the volume keys (on the left hand side of your phone) to highlight the desired option and press the ord key to select it.

Resolution

The Resolution setting lets you change the default size (in pixels) of your pictures. The following resolutions are available:

- High (VGA 640 X 480 pixels)
- Medium (QVGA 320 X 240 pixels)
- Low (QQVGA 128 X 112 pixels)

- In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (
), then press
 for Resolution. The following options appear in the display:
 - High
 - Medium
 - Low
- 2. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to highlight the desired resolution.
- Press the or key to save the selected setting. You're returned to the Settings menu.

Note: The Zoom setting is affected by the Resolution setting (camera mode). When Resolution is set to High no zoom is available. When Resolution is set to Medium, X1, X2, and X3 are available. When Resolution is set to Low, X1, X2, X3, X4, and X5 zoom settings are available.

Delay Pictures with the Self Timer

The Self Timer option lets you temporarily delay the camera shutter taking picture long enough so you or the person taking the picture can join others in the picture.

- In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (), then press ror Self Timer (or use the navigation keys to highlight Self Timer and press the key). The following options appear in the display:
 - Off
 - 5 sec
 - 10 sec
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired delay, then press the key. The camera viewfinder screen appears in the display.

The next time you press the Camera key () or the key, a countdown timer appears on the last line of the display that indicates the seconds remaining before the camera takes the picture.

Multi Shot

The Multi Shot option lets you temporarily take multiple pictures in succession at the touch of a button. The number of pictures you can take depends on the Resolution setting, as indicated in the following list:

- High resolution 3 pictures
- Medium resolution 5 pictures
- Low resolution 7 pictures

See "Resolution" on page 85 for more information.

In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (
), then press
 for Multi Shot (or use the navigation keys to highlight Multi Shot and

press the or key). Off and On options appear in the display.

2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **On**, then press the **os** key. The camera viewfinder screen appears in the display.

Note: When Multi Shot is set to On, the multi shot progress bar appears in the display in camera mode.

The next time you press the Camera key () or the key, the camera takes several pictures in rapid succession.

Fun Frame

The Fun Frame option lets you temporarily apply one of the preloaded picture frames in your phone to characterize or enhance one or more pictures.

In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (), then press effor Fun Frame (or use the navigation keys to highlight Fun Frame, then press the key). The name of the current frame appears in the top line of the display.

Note: The Normal frame is a blank frame.

- 2. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to show the various Fun Frames.
- When you decide on the frame you wish to use, press the Select (left) soft key () or the key. The camera screen appears in the display with your selected Fun Frame in place.

The next time you press the Camera key () or the key, the camera includes the selected Fun Frame in your picture.

Color Tones

The Color Tones option lets you temporarily apply one of the following color-based special affects to one or more pictures:

- Normal No special affect.
- Sepia Replaces all colors with shades of sepia.
- · Monochrome Replaces all colors with shades of grey.
- Negative Reverses light and dark shades of grey.
- Emboss Creates a three-dimensional affect in the Monochrome picture.
- Sketch Reduces the picture to outlines.

Note: The Normal Color Tone leaves the picture unchanged.

- In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (), then press for Color Tones (or use the navigation keys to highlight Color Tones, then press the key). The name of the current Color Tone appears in the top line of the display.
- 2. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to show the various Color Tones and the effects they have on a picture.
- When you decide on the Color Tone you wish to use, press the Select (left) soft key () or the key. The camera screen appears in the display with your selected Color Tone applied.

The next time you press the Camera key () or the key, the camera applies the selected Color Tone to your picture.

White Balance

The White Balance option allows you to temporarily adjust picture quality according to the following available light values:

- Auto The camera automatically adjusts picture quality to available light.
- Sunny Use this setting when taking pictures in full sun.
- Cloudy Use this setting when taking pictures in cloudy conditions.
- Tungsten Use this setting when taking pictures under incandescent lights.
- Fluorescent Use this setting when taking pictures under fluorescent lights.
 - In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (), then press for White Balance (or use the navigation keys to highlight White Balance, then press the key). The name of the current White Balance option appears in the top line of the display.
 - 2. Use the navigation keys to show the various white balances and the effects they have on a picture.
 - When you decide on the White Balance you wish to use, press the Select (left) soft key () or the key. The camera screen appears in the display with your selected White Balance applied.

The next time you press the Camera key () or the or key, the camera applies the selected White Balance to your picture.

Quality

The Quality setting lets you select how much your pictures are compressed, thereby reducing their overall size (not to be confused with Resolution).

In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (), then press refor Quality. The following options appear in the display:

- Fine
- Normal
- Economy
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired quality setting.
- 3. Press the key. You're returned to the Settings menu.

Shutter Sound

The Shutter Sound setting lets you choose the sound our phone plays whenever you take a picture. Aside from being a cool sound effect, Shutter Sound acts as an audible reminder that your camera has taken a picture.

- In camera mode, press the Option (left) soft key (), then press for Shutter Sound. The following options appear in the display:
 - Sound 1
 - Sound 2
 - Sound 3
 - Sound 4
 - Sound 5
 - No Sound
- Use the navigation keys to highlight shutter sounds. Each sound plays as it is highlighted.
- 3. Once your choice is highlighted, press the or key. You're returned to the Settings menu.

After you've taken a picture, you can do any of the following:

Save the picture by pressing the Save (left) soft key (
 I).

The picture is stored in the **Photo Gallery**, a part of the phone's memory devoted to storing, browsing, and viewing saved pictures.

• Send the picture to someone else by pressing the or key.

For a detailed procedure, see "Creating and Sending a Picture Message" on page 66.

Discard the picture by pressing the Erase (right) soft key (
).

The Photo Gallery

Saved pictures are stored in the Photo Gallery. You can browse the Photo Gallery one picture at a time (expanded mode), or view several pictures at once in thumbnail format.

- In standby mode, briefly press the Camera key (>>>>). The following options appear in the display:
 - Take a Photo Activates your phone's camera and lets you take individual photos and multiple photos (multi shots).
 - · Photo Gallery Lets you view and manage your saved photos.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Photo Gallery, then press the key. Any pictures that you've saved appear in the display.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to browse pictures in the gallery.
- 4. Press the **Option** (left) soft key () while viewing pictures in the Picture Gallery. The following options appear in the display:
 - Pic Msg Send the currently displayed or highlighted picture as a Picture message.
 - W-Postcard Take a picture of handwritten text and digitize the writing and add it to an image. Once placed in the image, you can modify the text colors, placement, and various other features.
 - Assign Assign the currently displayed or highlighted picture to Wallpaper, as an opening and closing (power on and power off) graphic, or as a photo ID for someone in your Contacts list.
 - Online Album Sends a copy of the currently displayed or highlighted picture to your Online Album on your Wireless Carrier's server.
 - Rename Rename the currently displayed or highlighted picture.
 - Lock/Unlock Lock the currently displayed or highlighted picture so that it cannot be deleted, or unlock the picture so that it can be deleted.
 - Erase Erase the currently displayed or highlighted picture, provided it is unlocked.
 - Erase All Erase all of the unlocked pictures in the Picture Gallery. Locked pictures must be unlocked before you can erase them.
 - Photo Info View the Title, time and date created, size, and quality of the currently highlighted or displayed picture.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option. Press the key to perform the function for the option or enter its sub menu.

Switch From Expanded to Thumbnail Mode

- Once you've found a picture that you wish to view full size, press the Expand (right) soft key ().
- While viewing pictures in the picture gallery, press the Thumb. (right) soft key () to view several smaller pictures at a time.

Your phone is equipped with a WAP (Wireless Application Protocol) browser which allows you to access Internet specified for mobile phones. This section explains how to access the Axcess Web services of your Wireless Provider and navigate the WAP browser.

Axcess Web Operations

- Each time you launch Axcess Web, your phone connects to the Internet and the service indicator icon () appears in the display.
- Axcess Web ends your Internet connection after a certain period of inactivity; however, some information from your session remains stored in the phone (while your phone turned on). You can access this information without reconnecting to the Internet, but when you view stored information and select a link that was not accessed in the last session, the phone automatically re-connects to the Internet.

Launch Axcess Web

Note: The first time you use Axcess Web, you are prompted to go through a setup process that takes approximately three to five minutes.

1. In idle mode, press the Down navigation key (· OK ·).

If this is the initial launch of **Axcess Web**, you're prompted to enable security before proceeding.

A list of categories appears in the display.

- 2. Use the navigation keys to browse the categories.

Exit Axcess Web

▶ To exit Axcess Web, press the 🜆 key.

Navigate the Web

When you use **Axcess Web**, some of the keys operate differently than during a normal phone call. **Axcess Web** presents on-screen items in any of the following ways:

- · Text or numeric input
- · Links (embedded in content)
- · Numbered options (some may not be numbered)
- · Simple text

You can act upon options or links by using the soft keys.

Axcess Web Soft Keys

At the bottom of the **Axcess Web** display is a bar that contains browser commands. The left () and right () soft keys on the keypad are used to execute the commands that appear above them in the display. These are called "soft keys" because their function changes depending on the application.

Using Links

Links have several purposes, such as jumping to a different page, to a different site, or even initiating a phone call. Links are shown inside of brackets ([...]). You can normally use the left soft key (

- Contacts Choose the graphic or animation that appears in the display when selected contacts calls.

Shuffle Folder Options

This section explains how to use your phone's digital assistant functionality to schedule events, set reminders, create a "to do" list, perform calculations, and more.

Tools Menu

Tools is a suite of Personal Digital Assistant (PDA) applications such as a Calendar, To Do List, and Memo Pad that run on your phone. You can use your phone to schedule events, set reminders, create a to do list, perform calculations, and more with the functions provided by this useful feature.

Opening Tools Menu

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press for Tools. The following sub-menus appear in the display:
 - Voice Kit Lets you access voice recognition functions, record voice memos, and enable/disable spoken menus.
 - Today Lets you review and schedule events that will occur today.
 - Calendar Lets you view the current, past, or future month in a monthly calendar layout.
 - To Do List Lets you create and maintain a task list.
 - Alarm Clock Lets you set an alarm to go off once, or daily, at a specified time.
 - · Memo Pad Lets you store and review useful information.
 - World Time Lets you view the current time of day or night in another part of the world.
 - Calculator Lets you perform calculations, including addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.
 - Count Down Lets you view the amount of time between the current date and any event that you want to schedule.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight an application, then press the key.

The following sections provide detailed descriptions of the applications and how to use their functions.

Voice Kit

VoiceSignal is state-of-the-art voice recognition software for your mobile phone that lets you dial numbers, lookup contact information, and open applications using your voice.

To access your phone's voice settings, do the following:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), and (for Tools), a
 - Voice Command Lets you place calls, access your Contacts List, review your appointments, and more by speaking commands into your phone.

Also see "Making a Call — Voice Dialing" on page 26 and "Voice Method" on page 56 for more information.

- · Voice Memo Lets you record, review, and erase voice memos.
- TTS Text To Speech Lets you enable or disable spoken main menu options.
- Voice Setting Lets you tailor VoiceSignal to better respond to your voice and your phone use preferences.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired sub-menu, then press
 .

VoiceSignal Commands

To start VoiceSignal, do one of the following:

• In standby mode, press the orece key.

"Say a Command" appears in the display and is pronounced through the earpiece, followed by a list of available commands.

• In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press ever (for Tools), Image (for Voice Kit), and Image for Voice Command.

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Note: You can also set your phone to start VoiceSignal when you open the phone. See "Voice Launch" on 
page 109 for more information.
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VoiceSignal includes the following commands:

- Voice Dial Lets you dial the phone by saying any name stored in your contact list, without ever having to record, or "train" that name. VoiceSignal automatically voice-activates all your contacts, even if you have hundreds of them stored on your phone. You can also dial any telephone number, even if it is not stored in your contact list, by saying the digits in the number. (See "Making a Call — Voice Dialing" on page 26 for more information.)
- Voice Memo Lets you access the voice memo feature of your phone. (See "Voice Memo" on page 104 for more information.)
- Today Lets you access the Today feature of your phone. (See "Today" on page 110 for more information.)
- Calendar Lets you access the Calendar feature of your phone. (See "Calendar" on page 111 for more information.)
- Contacts Lets you look up and display contact information for any name stored in your Contacts list by saying the name. (See "Finding a Contacts Entry" on page 56 for more information.)
- Status Lets you say a single command ("Status") to check your phone's network coverage, signal strength, and battery.

Note: Speaking clearly, say the command that you want to use. If, after a few seconds, the device has not recognized a command, it prompts you to repeat the command. If, after a few more seconds, it still has not recognized a command, it tells you "Sorry, no match found," and cancels voice recognition.

Voice Command Tips:

- · Make sure you wait for the beep before speaking.
- Speak clearly at a normal volume, as if you were talking on the phone.

Voice-Activating Your Contacts List

When you first start VoiceSignal, it reads your Contacts list and voice-activates all the names stored there. When you have add or change contacts, VoiceSignal automatically reloads and voice-activates the entire list.

Ending Calls Before Restarting the VoiceSignal Software

When you use VoiceSignal to make a call, you must end that call before you can use VoiceSignal again.

Voice Memo

You can use your phone to record voice memos for later playback. You can also record the caller on the other end of the line during a phone conversation.

Note: There is limited space for the number and length of recordings.

- The maximum number of voice memos is 10.
- The maximum length for a single voice memo is 60 seconds.

Record a Voice Memo

In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Memo), and (for Record. The phone prompts, "Please record after the beep."

Tip: To launch Voice Memo using a voice command — In standby mode, press the 🖾 key. When the phone prompts, "Say a command." Say "Voice Memo" into the microphone.

- Wait for the beep, then start speaking. As it is recording the phone displays a countdown timer that shows the seconds remaining for the recording.
 - To pause the memo, press the Pause (left) soft key (). When a memo is paused, select Resume to resume recording.
- Press the Stop (right) soft key () once you're finished recording. The Memo Review list appears in the display with the newest memo highlighted.

- 4. Press the Play (right) soft key () to review the newest memo.
- For other options, press the **Option** (left) soft key (). The following options appear in the display:
 - Erase Erase a selected voice memo.
 - Erase All Erase all voice memos.
 - Edit Caption Change the name assigned to a selected voice memo.
 - Info Shows the Memo Title, Length and Size, and date and time Recorded for a selected voice memo.
- 6. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option. Press the key to perform the function for that option.

Review and Erase Voice Memos

If you've saved any voice memos, you can review them anytime.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Memo), and (for Review. A list of saved voice memos appears in the display.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the voice memo you wish to review then press the **Play** (right) soft key () to play the voice memo.
- Press the Option (left) soft key () to Erase, Erase All, Edit Caption, or show Info about voice memos.

Erase All Voice Memos at One Time

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Memo), and (for Erase All. "Erase all Voice Memos?" appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Yes (to erase all memos) or No (to return to the previous menu).
- 3. Press the or key to confirm your selection.

Text To Speech (TTS)

With TTS on, your phone "reads" main menu items through the earpiece when you highlight each one. To enable TTS, do the following:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), and (for TTS. The following options appear in the display:
 - TTS On Enables Text-To-Speech.
 - TTS Off Disables Text-To-Speech.

The current setting is highlighted. The default setting is TTS Off.

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2. Use the navigation keys to highlight TTS On, then press the or key to save and exit.

Voice Setting

Voice Setting lets you tailor VoiceSignal to better respond to your voice and your phone use preferences.

To access your phone's voice settings, do the following:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), and (for Voice Setting. The following options appear in the display:
 - Digit Dialing Lets you tailor VoiceSignal to better respond to your voice.
 - Sensitivity Lets you adjust how sensitive VoiceSignal is to spoken commands and names.
 - Choice Lists Lets you enable or disable lists of choices Voice Signal displays when unable to identify spoken names, numbers, or contacts.
 - Sound Lets you enable or disable playback of Prompts, Digits, or Names and lets you set the speed and volume of Names playback.
 - Voice Launch Lets you set what action(s) launch Voice Signal.
 - About Shows Version and Build information about the VoiceSignal application in your phone. Useful information when contacting Customer Support.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired sub-menu, then press

Adapting Digits

If you regularly have trouble with VoiceSignal not recognize the numbers you say, try adapting digit dialing to your voice. Adapting can improve the accuracy of digit recognition, especially for people with strong regional accents.

Note: After you adapt Digit Dial, your phone is customized to your voice, and your voice only. Others will not be able to use it unless they reset the phone to factory defaults.

Adaptation involves recording several sequences of four digits each. The recording process takes about a minute.

Tips for Adapting Digit Dialing

- Use Adapt Digits in a quiet place.
- · Make sure you wait for the beep before starting to speak.
- · Speak clearly, and say each digit distinctly.
- If you make a mistake while recording a sequence of digits, or if there is an unexpected noise that spoils the recording, re-record that sequence.
- Only adapt digits if you are regularly having problems with digit dialing. Once you
 adapt, digit dialing will not work as well for other people using your phone. (You
 can always reset digit adaptation to its original state, as described below.)

Adapt Digits

To adapt digit dialing, do the following:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for Digit Dialing. The following options appear in the display:
 - · Adapt Digits
 - Reset Digits
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Adapt Digits, then press the key. Adapt Digits process description appears in the display.
- Press OK (left) soft key () or press the key. Your phone displays the first digit sequence and "Please say" plays through the speaker followed by the four digits appearing in the display.
- 4. Wait for the beep and say the digits using your normal tone of voice. After a moment, the phone plays back the recording and prompts "Did the recording sound ok?"
 - If the recording was good, say "Yes."
 - If you need to re-record, say "No."

If you say "No," the phone prompts you to pronounce the digits again. Wait for the beep and then say the digits.

Repeat this step until you're satisfied with the recording.

- After confirming that the recording sounds "ok", continue the recording process with the next set of digits.
- After six sets of digits, "Adaptation complete" plays through the speaker and you are returned to the Digit Dialing menu.

Reset Digits

To reset digit dialing to factory default settings, do the following:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for Digit Dialing. The following options appear in the display:
 - Adapt Digits
 - Reset Digits
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Reset Digits, then press the extern the phone prompts you to confirm digit reset.
- 3. Press the OK (left) soft key () or the ex key to reset your digit adaptation, or press the Back (right) soft key () to cancel.

Sensitivity

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for Sensitivity. The following options appear in the display:
 - Commands Lets you control your phone's sensitivity to spoken voice commands.
 - Names Lets you control your phone's sensitivity to spoken names from your Contact list.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight an option, then press the key to select the highlighted option. The selected Sensitivity screen appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to adjust the selected Sensitivity setting to Reject More spoken commands or names or to Reject Less spoken commands or names. Recommended is the setting that works best for most voices and is the factory default setting.
- Press the <u>ok</u> key or the OK (left) soft key () to accept the new setting.

Choice Lists Settings

VoiceSignal displays choice lists based on your preferences: never if you do not want them, automatically when it needs help recognizing a spoken name or number, or always when you specify that it must. When displayed, a choice list contains up to three possible choices and prompt for you to confirm the correct one.
To change the way VoiceSignal uses choice lists:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for Choice Lists.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Name Dialing, Digit Dialing, or Contacts, then press the key.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the Choice List behavior you prefer:
 - Automatic VoiceSignal displays a choice list only when it is not sure if it has correctly recognized the name or number.
 - Always On VoiceSignal always displays a choice list, even when there is only one choice.
 - Always Off VoiceSignal never displays a choice list.
- Press the key or the OK (left) soft key () to accept the new setting.

Sound

Sound lets you specify what (if any) text prompts you want your phone to read to you through the earpiece.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for Sound. The following options appear in the display:
 - Prompts Enables or disables audio prompts.
 - Digits Enables or disables audio digit playback.
 - Names Enables or disables audio name playback.
 - Name Settings Lets you adjust the speed and volume of your phone's audio name playback.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting.
- 3. Press the key or the OK (left) soft key (

Voice Launch

To set the key or action that launches VoiceSignal, do the following:

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for Voice Launch. The following options appear in the display:
 - Voice Key Press the owe key to activate VoiceSignal for one call.

- Voice Key or Flip Open Press the exercise Key to activate VoiceSignal for repeated calls. Open and close folder to make and end calls using Voice Kit. Press of release VoiceSignal.
- Voice Key or EarMic Attach a headset to your phone. Press the key to activate VoiceSignal. Now, you can make and end calls using VoiceSignal by pushing the button on the headset.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the option you want, then press the key to save and exit.

About VoiceSignal

This option causes the **About VoiceSignal** screen to appear in the display, showing version and build information about the VoiceSignal software included on your phone.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools), (for Voice Kit), (for Voice Setting), and (for About.

The **About VoiceSignal** screen appears in the display showing the version level of the VoiceSignal software currently installed on your phone.

Today

Today lets you schedule up to nine events for the current day by indicating each event's start time and advance notification time. You can set alarms for these events so that you can be alerted before each event takes place.

Events, previously created for the present day using your phone's Calendar, automatically appear in your Today events list. (See "Calendar" on page 111 for more information.)

Add a New Event

In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and end for Today.

Tip: To launch Today using a voice command — In standby mode, press the 🚾 key. When the phone prompts, "Say a command." Say "Today" into the microphone.

You're prompted to enter a New Event.

2. Enter details of the event using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)

Calendar

- Press the Option (left) soft key () A pop-up menu containing the following text entry mode options appears in the display:
 - T9 Word
 - Alpha
 - Symbol
 - Number

Note: The current mode of text entry is indicated in the lower right of the display. See "Text Entry Modes" on page 47 for more information on text entry modes.

- Use the navigation keys to highlight the entry mode that you wish to use and press the key, or press the key to exit the pop-up menu.
- When you're finished entering details for the event, press the key. You're prompted to enter the time and date for the event.
- 6. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to change between am or pm.
- 7. Enter the time and date for the event using the keypad.
- When you're finished entering the time and date, use the navigation keys to highlight Alarm Option field.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the amount of time before the event occurs that you wish to be notified by an alert.
- 10. Press the key to store the event in your calendar. An alert will notify you prior to the event, if you set a notification alert.

Calendar

Calendar lets you view the current, past, or future month in a monthly calendar layout. While viewing the calendar, the current date is highlighted and days with scheduled events are surrounded by a box.

View an event

In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and SS for Calendar.

A calendar appears in the display with the current date highlighted. The month and year also appear.

Tip: To launch Calendar using a voice command — In standby mode, press the key. When the phone prompts, "Say a command." Say "Calendar" into the microphone.

- 2. Use the navigation keys to move around within the calendar.
 - Press the key to open the highlighted date.
 - Press the volume up key (()) to view previous months.
 - Press the volume down key () to view future months.
 - Press the Option (left) soft key () while viewing the calendar to display the following options.
 - View View events for any date surrounded by a box.
 - Add new Add a new event for the date.
 - Jump To Date Lets you jump to any date you specify.

To Do List

The To Do List lets you create a task list. You can store, prioritize and manage up to twenty To Do List tasks.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and (for To Do List. The Add To Do screen appears in the display.
- 2. Enter details of the task using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- 3. Press the **Option** (left) soft key (\square). A pop-up menu containing the following text entry mode options appears in the display:
 - T9 Word
 - Alpha
 - Symbol
 - Number
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the entry mode that you wish to use and press the key, or press the key to exit the pop-up menu.
- 5. When you're finished entering details for the task, press the <u>key</u>. You're prompted to enter the priority for the task.
- 6. Use the navigation keys to select High or Low.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the Time field. Use the navigation keys to select pm or am.
- 8. Enter a time and date for the task using the keypad.
- 9. Press the Key to store the task.

Add, Edit, and Erase To Do List Tasks

1. In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and (for To Do List.

- Use the navigation keys to browse tasks in your To Do List. Events are presented in order of priority.
- Press the Option (left) soft key () while viewing your To Do List. A pop-up menu containing the following options appears in the display:
 - Add new Add new task to the To Do List.
 - Edit Edit the task currently appearing in the display.
 - Erase Erase the task currently appearing in the display.
 - Erase All Erase all tasks from your To Do List.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the function for the highlighted option.

Alarm Clock

Your phone has an alarm clock that can be set to go off once, or daily at a specified time. Once set, the alarm clock is easy to change or turn off completely.

Note: The alarm doesn't function when the phone is turned off. If the time for an alarm that was set for Once has elapsed and the phone is off, the alarm occurs at the same time on the following day.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press even (for Tools) and for Alarm Clock. The following options appear in the display:
 - Alarm Clock 1
 - Alarm Clock 2
 - Alarm Clock 3
- Use the navigation keys to highlight an Alarm selection, then press the key. A Set Alarm screen appears in the display containing the following options:
 - Alarm Turns the alarm Off or On.
 - Time Select am or pm and enter the time for the alarm.
 - Alarm Interval Select whether the alarm sounds Once, Daily, Mon–Fri, Mon–Sat, Every Sun, Every Sat, or Every Weekend.

Use the navigation keys to highlight options and to select values for the options.

Use the keypad to enter the time for the alarm.

 Press the key when you're finished entering the time for the alarm. The alarm is set and the alarm icon () appears in the top of the display.

When an Alarm Sounds

An animated alarm clock appears in the display and an alert sounds when the specified time for the alarm arrives.

- ▶ Press any key to silence the alarm.
 - If the alarm was set as **Once**, the alarm icon disappears from the top of the display.
 - If the alarm was set as **Daily**, the alarm icon remains in the top of the display.
 - If the alarm was set as Mon-Fri, the alarm icon remains in the top of the display.
 - If the alarm was set as Mon-Sat, the alarm icon remains in the top of the display.
 - If the alarm was set as Every Sun, the alarm icon remains in the top of the display.
 - If the alarm was set as Every Sat, the alarm icon remains in the top of the display.
 - If the alarm was set as Every Weekend, the alarm icon remains in the top of the display.

Turn Off the Alarm

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press even (for Tools) and seven for Alarm Clock. The following options appear in the display:
 - Alarm Clock 1
 - Alarm Clock 2
 - Alarm Clock 3
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Alarm selection, then press the ox key.
- Alarm is highlighted, use the navigation keys to select Off, then press the key. Select alarm is turned off.

Memo Pad

You can create a notes and store them in Memo Pad. You can't prioritize or set an alert for stored notes. Return to Memo Pad anytime you wish to review and edit your notes.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press for Tools) and for Memo Pad.
- If you have any stored memos, they appear as a list in the display. If this is your first time in Memo Pad, you're prompted to add a new memo.

- Enter a memo using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- Press the Option (left) soft key () A pop-up menu containing the following text entry mode options appears in the display:
 - T9 Word
 - Alpha
 - Symbol
 - Number
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the entry mode that you wish to use and press the key, or press the key to exit the pop-up menu.
- When you're finished entering details for the memo, press the key. The memo is stored.

Review, Add, Edit, and Erase Memos

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press emitting (for Tools) and emitting for Memo Pad. Your list of stored memos appears in the display.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to browse memos. Press the Key to open a highlighted memo.
- Press the **Option** (left) soft key () while viewing your memos. A popup menu with the options listed in the following table appears in the display:
 - Add new Add a new memo to Memo Pad.
 - Edit Edit the memo currently highlighted or appearing in the display.
 - Erase Erase the memo currently highlighted or appearing in the display.
 - Erase All Erase all memos from Memo Pad.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 5. Press the key to perform the function for the highlighted option.

World Time

World Time lets you view the time of day or night in another part of the world. World Time displays time in the 24 different time zones around the world.

In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and (for World Time. A world map appears in the display.

- Use the navigation keys to display the city and time that you wish to view. The following cities/time zones are supported:

Calculator

You can perform calculations, including addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division using your phone.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and (for Calculator. The Calculator appears in the display.
- 2. Enter the first number in your equation using the keypad (numbers can be up to nine digits long).

Press 💶 to enter a decimal point.

Note: The Calculator tool lets you enter only two decimal places. For example, 1.23.

Press *solution* to change the sign for a number to a negative.

- 3. Use the navigation keys to set the type of calculation that you wish to perform. Your choices are as follows:
 - [+] Addition
 - [-] Subtraction
 - [x] Multiplication
 - [+] Division
- 4. Use the keypad to enter the second number into your equation.

Count Down

Count Down lets you view the amount of time between the current date and any event that you wish to schedule. You can create up to twenty Count Down events.

Note: If you have multiple Count Down timers, the event that is scheduled closest to the current date appears in the display. Use the navigation keys to browse the other Count Down timers.

- 2. Enter details for the **Count Down** event using the keypad. (See "Entering Text" on page 46 for more information.)
- Press the left soft key () Option to display a pop-up menu containing the following text entry mode options.
 - T9 Word
 - Alpha
 - Symbol
 - Number
- Use the navigation key to highlight the entry mode that you wish to use and press the ok key, or press the process key to exit the pop-up menu.
- Once you've finished entering details for the Count Down event, press or You're prompted to enter a time and date for the scheduled event.
- 6. Use the Left or Right navigation keys for am or pm, respectively.

Enter the time and date using the keypad.

7. Press or to store the event.

Review, Add, Edit, and Erase Count Down Events

Review scheduled Count Down event to determine how much time remains between the current time/date and any event that you've scheduled. You can also add another event, or edit and erase previously scheduled events.

- In standby mode press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Tools) and [] for Count Down.
- Any stored Count Down events appear in the display. The event scheduled closest to the current date appears first in the display.

Event details, including the days, hours and minutes left until the occurrence of the scheduled event appear in the display. The day, date, and time of the scheduled event appear in the bottom of the display.

- Press the Option (left) soft key (1), while viewing your memos. A popup menu displays with the options listed.
 - Add new Add anew event to Count Down.
 - Edit Edit the event currently appearing in the display.
 - Erase Erase the event currently appearing in the display.
 - Erase All Erase all scheduled event from Count Down.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option.
- 5. Press or to perform the function for the highlighted option.

This section explains how to customize your phone to suit your needs and preferences.

Display Settings

Using the **Display** menu, you can set the menu style, set the standby mode animation, customize the backlight settings, and more.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Display. The following options appear in the display:
 - Menu Style Lets you choose the main menu style.
 - Animation Lets you choose the media that displays on your phone when you turn it on, turn it off, and while in standby mode.
 - Banner Lets you create your own personalized greeting that appears in the display when your phone is in standby mode.
 - Backlight Lets you set backlight options for the LCD, Keypad, Power save, and Brightness.
 - Front Contrast Lets you set display contrast.
 - Auto-Hyphen With Auto-Hyphen enabled, your phone automatically hyphenates phone numbers as they are entered.
 - Dial Digits Lets you choose how the number will display on the display screen.
 - Dial Screen Adjust the color used to display dialed digits.
 - Theme Color Lets you choose menu color scheme.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight a sub-menu.
- Press the <u>ow</u> key to enter the highlighted sub-menu. The following sections describe the above listed display sub-menus in greater detail.

Menu Style

Menu Style allows you to choose how main menus appear in your display.

- In idle mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and for Menu Style. The following options appear in the display:
 - Icon Display main menus as icons.
 - Text Display main menus in a list format.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the option you want.
- 3. Press the key to select the highlighted option.

Animation

Animation lets you choose the multi-media or pictures that appear in your phone's display when you turn it on, turn it off, and while in standby mode (wallpaper).

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and () (for Display), and) for Animation. The following options appear in the display.
 - **Wallpaper** Choose the graphic or animation that appears in your display when the phone is in standby mode.
 - Opening Choose the animation that appears in your display when you turn on your phone.
 - Closing Choose the animation that appears in you display when you turn off your phone.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the sub-menu that you wish to enter, then press the ok key. The following options appear in the display:
 - Wallpaper
 - Preloaded Lets you select an image that is included with your phone.
 - My Image Lets you select an image that you have downloaded to your phone.
 - **Shuffle** Lets you select multiple images. These images are shown in random order.
 - Opening
 - Preloaded Lets you select an image that is included with your phone.
 - My Image Lets you select an image that you have downloaded to your phone.
 - Closing
 - Preloaded Lets you select an image that is included with your phone.
 - My Image Lets you select an image that you have downloaded to your phone.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to select **Preloaded**, **My Image**, or **Shuffle** images, then press the **or** key.
- Use the navigation keys to browse available images and animations for the selected sub-menu.
- Press the key to select the image or animation appearing in the display.

Banner

Create your own personalized greeting that appears in the display while your phone is in standby mode.

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1. In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (]), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and) for Banner.

Note: Press and hold to erase an existing banner, if necessary.

- Enter a word or short phrase to appear in your phone's display while in standby mode (Up to 12 characters).
- 3. Press the or key to save the new banner.

Backlight

You can set the backlight for your display or keypad to remain on for a specified period of time or remain on as long as the folder is open.

Note: Prolonged backlight use drains your battery faster.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and (for Backlight. The following sub-menus appear in the display:
 - LCD Sets the amount of time the backlight for the LCD remains on after a
 period of inactivity. Optional settings are 5, 10, and 15 seconds as well as Folder
 Open.
 - **Keypad** Sets the amount of time the backlight for the keypad remains on after a period inactivity. Optional settings are 5, 10, and 15 seconds as well as Folder Open.
 - Power save Unless the backlight setting for the LCD has been changed, the backlight dims after 5 seconds of inactivity, and then turns off after another 5 seconds. With Power save enabled, the backlight for the LCD is always dim and then turns off after 5 seconds of inactivity.
 - Brightness Sets the brightness of the backlight for the Main LCD and the Front LCD.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight a sub-menu.
- Press the or key to enter the highlighted option's sub-menu and change settings as desired.

Front Contrast

Set the contrast for the front display to your preference.

In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press error (for Settings) and the light (for Display), and the light of Front Contrast. The current Front Contrast setting appears in the display.

Display Settings

 Use the Left and Right navigation keys to adjust the contrast for the front display (0 – 50), then press the key to save your setting.

Auto Hyphen

Auto Hyphen automatically hyphenates phone numbers as they are entered.

Example: If you enter "5804370000", "580-437-0000" appears in the display.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and for Auto-Hyphen. The following options appear in the display:
 - Off
 - 0n
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting.
- 3. Press the or key to save the setting.

Dial Digits

Dial Digits adjust the color of numbers as they are entered into the display when making a call.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and (for Dial Digits. The following options appear in the display:
 - Basic All Dial Digits are black.
 - Rainbow Each number color is different.
 - Monochrome All Dial Digits are the same selected color.
 - Hyphenate Number colors divided by hyphens are the same.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting, then press the key to save the setting.

Dial Screen

Dial Screen adjust the color of display.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and) for Dial Screen. The following options appear in the display:
 - Color Setting Sets color of display.
 - Off Deactivates Dial Screen.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting.
- 3. Press the or key to confirm the setting.

Theme Color

Theme Color lets you select the color your phone uses to highlight menu items and scroll bar positions.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and (for Display), and) for Theme Color. The following options appear in the display:
 - Pattern 1
 - Pattern 2
 - Pattern 3
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting, then press the key to save the setting.

Sounds Settings

The Sounds menu provides a variety of options to customize audio properties for such things as ringers, keypad tones alerts, and more.

Volume/Vibrate

Use the Volume/Vibrate sub-menu to set the default volume for incoming calls and alarms, or set the phone to vibrate.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and for Volume/Vibrate. The following options appear in the display:
 - Calls Lets you set the volume and/or vibration for the incoming calls ringer.
 - Messages Lets you set the volume and/or vibration for the new messages ringer.
 - Alarm Lets you set the volume and/or vibration for the alarm ringer.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight an option, then press the or key.
- Use the Up and Down volume keys or the left/right navigation keys to select the volume level (or vibrate mode) for the selected setting.
- 4. Press the key to save the setting.

Vibrating Alert

You can set your phone to vibrate to indicate alerts.

If assigning ringer types for Calls, use the navigation keys to highlight Calls, then press the or key. The following options appear in the display:

- Preloaded Lets you select a melody that is included with your phone.
- My Melody Lets you select a melody that was downloaded.
- Shuffle Lets you select multiple melodies. These melodies are played in random order.

If assigning the Alarm ringer type, use the navigation keys to highlight **Alarm**, then press the key. The following Alarm options appear in the display:

- Alarm 1
- Alarm 2
- Alarm 3
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight Calls, Alarm 1, Alarm 2, or Alarm 3, then press the Key.
- Use the navigation keys to select Preloaded or My Melody (if you have downloaded melodies), then press the or key.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to browse through available ring tones. Each tone plays through the speaker as it is highlighted.
- 5. When the desired ringer type plays, press the or key to save the setting.

Assigning Messages, Data, and Calendar Ringer Types

Note: In analog mode, the phone plays the Bell 2 ringtone in place of any assigned MP3 or QCP type ringtones; including the Preloaded ringtone, Bell 1.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and (for Ringer Type. The following ringer types appear in the display:
 - Calls
 - Messages
 - Alarm
 - Data
 - Calendar

If customizing the Messages ringer types the following options appear in the display:

- Voice Mail
- Text
- Pic
- Wap Push
- Use the navigation keys to highlight a ringer type, then press the key. The following Melody Gallery options appear in the display:
 - Preloaded
 - My Melody
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Preloaded or My Melody, then press the or key. A list of bells and ringers (melodies) appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to browse through available ring tones. Each tone plays through the speaker as it is highlighted.
- 5. When the desired ringer type plays, press the or key to save the setting.

Key Beep

Use the Key Beep menu to adjust the volume level and length of tone that the keypad generates each time you press a key.

Key Beep Volume

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and (for Key Beep. Volume is highlighted.
- 2. Press the 💌 key.

- Use the volume keys or the navigation keys to set the volume level for keypad tones. A tone sounds as you increase or decrease the volume setting.

 - · Privacy Emit a tone whenever you are in enhanced privacy mode.

- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight Off or On.
- 4. Press or to confirm your selection.

Flip Tone

Set your phone to play a sound whenever you open or close the flip.

- 1. In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and (for Flip Tone.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight Off or On, then press OK.

Power On/Off

Set your phone to play a sound whenever you turn it on or off.

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- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and (for Power On/Off.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight Off or On, then press or .

Roam Ringer

Set your phone to sound a unique tone when a call is received outside your home service area. This feature is set to Off by default.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and (for Roam Ringer.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight Off or On, then press or .

Whisper Mode

This feature lets you talk in a low volume during a phone conversation and still be heard by the other party.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Sounds), and (for Whisper Mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight Off or On, then press or .

Call Options

Call Answer

You can select a specific answer mode when you receive an incoming call. Your phone can be preset to answer when you do any of the following:

- · Send key
- Folder open
- Any key
 - In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings),) (for Call Options), and) for Call Answer. The Call Answer sub-menu with the following options appears in the display:
 - Send Key Press store to answer an incoming call.
 - Folder Open Open the folder to answer an incoming call.
 - Any Key Press any key except an , p , or the key to answer an incoming call.
 - 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the method you wish to use for answering calls, then press ok.

Auto Answer

Auto Answer enables your phone to automatically answer calls after a period of time that you specify.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), if (for Call Options), and if for Auto Answer. The Auto Answer sub-menu with the following options appears in the display:
 - Off
 - After 5 sec
 - After 3 sec
 - After 1 sec
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting, then press or .

Auto Retry

Auto Retry automatically re-dials a number if the connection fails. Depending upon your location, the number of times your phone automatically dials the number may vary.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings),
 (for Call Options), and
 for Auto Retry. The Auto Retry sub-menu with the following options appears in the display:
 - Off
 - · Every 10 sec
 - Every 30 sec
 - Every 60 sec
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting, then press or.

Data

Use the **Data** menu to configure data connection speed and automatic detection settings.

Auto Detect

Select phone options for receiving data or voice, or set data reception to off.

1. In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (]), then press (for Settings), 🖭 (for Call Options), and 📖 for Data.

The following **Data** menu items appear in the display:

- Auto Detect
- Baud Rate

- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Auto Detect**, then press the <u>key</u>. The following options appear in the display:
 - Data off No incoming data calls accepted.
 - Data for next call Wait for data call for the next 10 minutes.
 - Data until powered off Data calls only, no voice calls accepted, until you
 power the phone off and on again.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the Auto Detect option you want, then press the or key.

The Data menu appears in the display.

Baud Rate

Set the data connection rate.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) key (), then press get (for Settings), get (for Call Options), and get for Data.

The following Data menu items appear in the display:

- Baud Rate
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Baud Rate, then press the key. The following Baud Rate options appear in the display:
 - Auto
 - 19200
 - 38400
 - 57600
 - 115200
 - · 230400
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired Data Baud Rate option, then press the key.

The Data menu appears in the display.

TTY Mode

Your phone is fully TTY/TDD compatible. TTY/TDD equipment is connected to your phone through the headset connector on the left side of the phone. TTY/TDD must be enabled before you can use your phone with a TTY/TDD device.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), III (for Call Options), and IIII for TTY Mode. A pop-up containing the message "Enabling TTY will disable headset audio. Continue?" and the following options appears in the display:
 - Yes Sends you to the TTY Mode menu.

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- No Returns you to the Call Options menu.
- The No option is highlighted.
- To change the TTY mode setting, use the navigation keys to highlight the Yes option, then press the Key. The following options appear in the display:
 - TTY Full Enables TTY mode and disables microphone and earpiece.
 - TTY + TALK Enables TTY mode and microphone.
 - TTY + HEAR Enables TTY mode and earpiece.
 - TTY OFF Disables TTY mode.

The current TTY Mode setting is highlighted.

 Use the navigation keys to highlight your selection and press the key. You're returned to the Call Options menu.

Note: The TTY icon (man) appears in the top of the display when the phone is in standby mode.

Network Settings

The Network settings let you select Number Assignment Module (NAM) settings, and Roam Options.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press e (for Settings) and e for Network. The following sub-menus appear in the display:
 - Set NAM If your service contract includes two phone numbers, set the NAM option to NAM 2 to use both numbers. Otherwise, set the NAM option to NAM 1.

- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired sub-menu, then press K.
- 3. Use the navigation keys and press or to highlight and select from available options.

Clock Set

Use the Clock Set sub-menu to set the time and date, which can be selected as Wallpaper in the Display menu.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), set for Clock Set. The Clock Set screen appears in the display.
- 2. Use the left/right navigation keys to select am or pm.

Language

- 3. Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight the Time setting.
- 4. Enter the time using the keypad and navigation keys.
- 5. Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight the Date setting.
- 6. Enter the date using the keypad and navigation keys.
- 7. Press or to save your settings.

Note: In digital service mode, the Clock Set feature is disabled. The network adjusts time and date automatically.

Language

The language option on your phone can change the language of voice prompts, menus, and key-input.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), for Language. The Language sub-menu with the following options appears in the display:
 - English
 - Español
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight your language preference, then press or .

Security Settings

Use the Security menu to lock your phone, set up emergency numbers, enable or disable voice privacy, set restrictions, as well as other security options.

Lock Phone

Locking the phone limits all outgoing calls except calls to 911 emergency and the three user-programmable emergency numbers. You can lock the phone manually during use, or set the phone to lock automatically when it is turned on. With the phone in lock mode, you can answer incoming calls, but you must unlock the phone to place outgoing calls (except to emergency and secret numbers).

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Note: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

Press The for Lock Phone. The following options appear in the display:
 Never — The phone remains unlocked.

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- On power up The phone locks automatically the next time your phone is powered ON and stays locked until you enter the lock code.
- Now The phone locks immediately and stays locked until you enter the locked code.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the Lock Phone option of your choice.
- 4. Press the key to perform the function for the highlighted option.

Change Lock

The default lock code for your phone is generally the last four digits of your phone number. It is advisable to change the default lock code to a secret code for security purposes.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Note: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

- Press for Change Lock. You're prompted to enter the new lock code.
- Enter the new lock code. You're prompted to re-enter the new lock code for verification.
- 4. Enter the new lock code again. Your changes are stored.

Note: Your phone does not allow you to view the lock code for obvious security reasons. If you change the lock code, be sure to write down or memorize the new code.

Emergency

Your phone provides the option of storing three emergency numbers. Each number can be up to 32 digits in length. All emergency numbers can be manually called at any time, even when your phone is locked or restricted. This can be a useful feature for controlling outgoing calls from your phone.

Note: Emergency number911 is hard-coded into your phone. You can dial this number any time, even when the phone is locked or restricted. If you call 911 an audible tone is heard and an Emergency prompt appears in the display for the duration of the call.

Important!: Because of various transmission methods, network parameters, and user settings necessary to complete a call from your wireless phone, a connection cannot always be guaranteed. Therefore, emergency calling may not be available on all wireless networks at all times. Important!: DO NOT depend on this phone as a primary method of calling 911 or for any other essential or emergency communications.

Remember to always turn your phone on and check for adequate signal strength before placing a call.

Store Emergency Numbers

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Tip: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

- 2. Enter the lock code, then press **end** for **Emergency** #.
- 3. Press 🚛 , 💷 , or 💷 to select from the three entry openings.
- 4. Enter the emergency number (up to 32 digits in length).
- 5. Press or to save the number that you entered.

Call Emergency Numbers in Lock Mode

- 1. In standby mode, enter the emergency number via the keypad.
- Press stopped to place the call.

Voice Privacy

Voice privacy lets you prevent those you call from seeing your number in their display when receiving your call. Voice privacy options are Standard and Enhanced.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and reference for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Note: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

- Enter the lock code, the press and for Voice Privacy. The following options listed appear in the display:
 - Standard Voice privacy is disabled.
 - Enhanced Voice privacy is enabled.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the Voice Privacy option of your choice, then press or .

Restriction

Restriction lets you restrict the use of your phone for outgoing and incoming calls. You can allow all calls, allow no calls, or allow only calls to or from your Contacts.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Note: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

- 2. Enter the lock code, then press **5**¹⁰ for **Restriction**.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to select **Outgoing** or **Incoming**.
- 4. Press OK.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to highlight Allow All, Allow None or, Allow Contacts, then press or.

Erase Memory

Erase memory erases your Contacts, Photo Gallery, and Voice Dial recordings. This feature is useful if you want to give your phone to a friend or family member.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Note: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

- 2. Enter the lock code, then press *memory* for **Erase Memory**. A confirmation prompt appears in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Yes or No, then press or . A confirmation message appears in the display while your messages are being erased. Your phone then returns to the Security menu.

Resetting Your Phone

Reset Phone returns all setup options to their factory default.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Security. You're prompted to enter the lock code.

Note: The default lock code is the last four digits of your telephone number.

- Enter the lock code, the press *important process of the display asking if you wish to restore default settings (except for the Contacts and Voice Dial).*
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight Yes or No, then press or.

Location Setting

This function identifies your location to the network via the Global Positioning System (GPS). You can set this function for continuous operation or to operate only in the event that you dial 911.

Note: Contact your Wireless Provider to determine whether, when, or where location-based services are available.

 In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Location.

The following options appear in the display:

- Location On GPS location setting is on wherever the feature is available.
- 911 Only GPS location setting is on only when you dial 911.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the option you want.
- Press the key to select the desired Location setting. You're returned to the Settings menu.

Airplane Mode

When set to **On**, Airplane Mode disables all radio functions of your phone. This prevents you from making or receiving calls, but allows you to use other features (such as the Tools) safely in sensitive environments, such as on board an aircraft.

- In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings) and for Airplane Mode. The following options appear in the display:
 - Off Enables the radio transmitter and receiver in your phone.
 - On Disables the radio transmitter and receiver in your phone.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired option, then press the key to save your setting.

Phone Info

Phone Info lets you identify the hardware and software versions of your phone and to identify the phone number assigned to your phone.

Version

You can view both the software and hardware version of your phone using this feature. This feature is helpful if you need to contact Customer Service.

1. In standby mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), (for Phone Info), and (for Version.

Your phone's hardware and software information appears in the display.

2. Press or to return to the Phone Info menu.

Phone Number

My Phone# displays the ten-digit number assigned to your phone by your Wireless Provider.

- In idle mode, press the MENU (left) soft key (), then press er (for Settings), or (for Phone Info), and er for Phone Number. The phone number assigned by Alltel appears in the display.
- 2. Press or to return to the Phone Info menu.

Software Update

Software Update lets you update your phone's software by downloading and installing improved software elements from your wireless provider's network.

- In standby mode, press the Menu (left) soft key (), then press (for Settings), or (for Phone Info), and for Software Update. The following option appears in the display:
 - Check For Update Checks your Wireless Provider's server for software updates for your phone.
- Press the ok key. You are prompted to confirm the software update check.
- Press the Yes (right) soft key () to proceed with the software update check. "Session in Progress.." appears in the display.
- Press the No (left) soft key () to cancel the software update check. When the software update check is complete and there are no updates found, your phone returns to standby mode.

Health and Safety Information *Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals* Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. Body-worn operations are restricted to Samsung-supplied, approved, or non-Samsung designated accessories that have no metal and must provide at least 1.5 cm separation between the device, including its antenna (whether extended or retracted) and the user's body. Non-compliance with the above restrictions may result in violation of FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are:

- Head: 1.39 W/kg
- · Body-worn: 0.522 W/kg

SAR information on this and other model phones can be viewed on-line at www.fcc.gov/oet/ea/. To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of

the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- "Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- "Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and

 "Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- · "National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- "Environmental Protection Agency
- "Federal Communications Commission
- · "Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- · "National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on

wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

"If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you
could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the
exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a
headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless
phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hands-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from

wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and

redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.

- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.
- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
- Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area

and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and

for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker.

These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on.
- should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- · should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference.

If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.

Hearing Aid Compatibility with Mobile Phones

When some mobile phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones, to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots

(fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and land line networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local Wireless Providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- Press the sevon key.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may

first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local Wireless Provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play

with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment, and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle.
 Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.

Product Performance

- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

Product Performance

Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.

If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.

Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- · Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- · Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is inoperable, call Customer Care for service.

Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas. Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your Wireless Provider for additional information.

Battery Standby and Talk Time

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Battery Precautions

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- · Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.

Samsung Mobile Products and Recycling

- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. - Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short- circuiting can occur when a
 metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a
 spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the
 battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited. For safe disposal options for Li-lon batteries, contact your nearest Samsung authorized service center. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.
