
Tom's Tech-Notes

Windows 10 Update Tom Burt, SCSCC Vice-President

Microsoft is wrapping up the initial release of Windows 10. The Windows punditry now expect Windows 10 to be rolled out to users via Windows Update about the end of July. The Windows update will be optional. Users running Windows 7 SP1 or Windows 8.1 Update 1 will reportedly be able to receive the update as an "in place" update. The update will be free for 1 year after it is first made available.

There's still some ambiguity about whether the release of Windows 10 will be available in ISO format (i.e. so it can be burned onto a DVD or onto a bootable flash drive). Also unclear is what it will cost if someone is building a new system that has no prior version of Windows installed. As Microsoft clarifies these situations, we'll keep you posted.

Note – there's no need to rush to upgrade to Windows 10, especially if you're currently running Windows 8.1. The operational differences are modest, except for the return of the Start Menu.



Windows 10 Start Menu

The new Start Menu presents a pane with a list of installed programs on the left, and then an array of smart tiles to the right. You can pin or unpin particular apps to the array of smart tiles. The complete list of installed programs is available by clicking the "All apps" menu item near the bottom left of the Start Menu.

In Windows 10, many more of the settings applets have been redone in the "Modern" (formerly "Metro") style, so it takes some adjusting to use them proficiently. Many settings have been relocated, so plan on doing some hunting. Other built-in apps, such as mail, contacts, music and photos have been updated.

Another key new feature in Windows 10 is Cortana, a personal assistant that talks and recognizes your voice and learns your needs and behavior patterns over time. Cortana combines voice input / output with a powerful search engine and some artificial intelligence and learning to provide some remarkable capabilities. Cortana is being brought over to Windows 10 from the Windows Phone. Versions of Cortana will also eventually be available on Android phones and tablets and on the Windows 10 tablets.

Most existing Windows 7 and 8 applications, notably MS Office, should install and run on Windows 10. System level programs that install drivers or otherwise use low-level system interfaces (for example, anti-virus programs and file backup programs) may need updates from their vendors to be compatible with Windows 10. The Windows 10 installer reportedly has a comprehensive compatibility checker that checks a system before performing an upgrade install and will warn you of problems ahead of time.

If you'd like to try out Windows 10, you can join the Windows Insider program by registering with your Microsoft ID. The link is: https://insider.windows.com/. Once enrolled, you can download an ISO of the latest Windows 10 build (currently 10122). Once you have the ISO, I recommend installing it in a Virtual Box virtual machine. You can get Oracle Virtual Box at: https://www.virtualbox.org. Once virtual box is installed, you can create an empty virtual machine, point the virtual DVD drive to the Windows 10 ISO, boot the virtual machine and it will run the Windows 10 setup. Using this approach will allow you to explore Windows 10 on the same PC as your production system with no risk to your production setup.

The Problem with Carbonite



Carbonite online backup services are inexpensive; \$60 a year for the cheapest package. But like many other things in life, you get what you pay for. That is why we've recently seen several club members having trouble with Carbonite. Many computer users have found that online storage is safer and a major improvement over previous backup systems, but most people want a backup system they can just set and forget. In my experience Carbonite's problems outweigh the solution it purports to provide.

I have never subscribed to Carbonite's backup service; I have tested a trial version of the professional program and was not impressed. Here are some of the major problems we've observed or learned about from club members and others.

Not all files are automatically backed up. Although Carbonite advertises they automatically back up all files, this is not the case. Videos are not included in the automatic backups and many PDF files are not supported at all! Carbonite's answer to this is to require the user to recreate files in an Adobe alternative and to manually back up each file. This is time consuming and not a good solution.

Carbonite does not do system backups with its basic package. This is good, since backing up an entire system online to Carbonite's cloud servers might take months.

Slow performance in today's world of SSDs, high speed Internet, and Windows 8 and OS X is completely unacceptable. The backup service is painfully slow. It can take several days for Carbonite to initially upload and save your data, especially when there is a lot of data to store. This slows down a computer's performance, restricting what you can do while your files are being backed up. After the initial backup the process is faster, since only new or changed documents need to be copied.

You cannot access your files while the system is in backup mode. You have to wait for the backup to finish before you can continue your work.

If you have any issues, customer Service is poor. The "technicians" are pleasant and sound as though they are based in the US, but they don't seem to really know the product and do not provide any real solutions, other than maybe you should send them more money to get an upgraded package. When you call, you will get a general type of answer, (i.e. reboot) but nothing of value if you have an unusual issue. Emails are a waste of time.

Carbonite does not use versioning. In other words many backup programs keep multiple versions of the same file for a period of time. Carbonite only keeps the latest version of a file. Therefore, a file is modified and some original data from a prior version is lost, Carbonite will only have the latest incomplete version. If you happen to delete a file from your computer, you have 30 days to restore it, before it's deleted from Carbonite's servers. Remember, Carbonite is online backup, not online storage.

Carbonite makes no redundant backups. Business class backup services have redundant backup systems in case something goes wrong with the main storage system. This means that all of the data in one data center is copied to another data center. This way all information is retained in case of natural disaster or hardware malfunctions. Carbonite uses only one data center, I presume because this is cheaper. Many customers have allegedly lost data because of this.

The system tends to freeze your computer. Not always, but often enough you have to reboot your computer once the backup is complete before you can do anything else. I think this is a manifestation of some old clunky software that does not cut it today.

Carbonite is preset to run a backup several times a day. That means your work will constantly be interrupted all day. This can be even more of a bother if you have to reboot your system every time Carbonite decides to run another backup.

Obviously one way to avoid this is to change the settings so that the backup only occurs when you aren't using your computer – like at night. However, most people don't like to leave their computer running all night as this is quite a waste of electricity.

Carbonite will not allow you back up a file immediately. For example, if you have just completed a large Word document, you will want it backed up right away so that you don't have to carry your laptop around with you, and your document will be available using any computer with Internet access. Even if you choose to run a backup right away, it can take hours.

Restoring data takes a very long time. When you want to access your files, you want them now. You sometimes can't afford to wait ten hours or more for your files to be restored to your computer.

Sometimes the system won't let you restore your data at all. Carbonite may be running a backup, it may be searching for files to restore or the system itself may just be too busy. You aren't given any explanation; it sometimes just fails to work.

For that \$60 that Carbonite charges for a year's service, you can buy your own USB 3.0 external drive and do a system backup and set up Windows built-in file history to do periodic backups. You can also create free accounts to use Microsoft OneDrive, Google Drive, or iDrive to save copies of those files you want to have available in the cloud or those files you cannot afford to lose.
