# Important safety precautions

Failure to comply with the following precautions may be dangerous or illegal.

#### Drive safely at all times

Do not use a hand-held phone while driving. Park the vehicle first.

#### Switch off the phone when refuelling

Do not use the phone at a refuelling point (service station) or near fuels or chemicals.

#### Switch off in an aircraft

Wireless phones can cause interference. Using them in an aircraft is both illegal and dangerous.

## Switch off the phone near all medical equipment

Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external radio frequency energy. Follow any regulations or rules in force.

#### Interference

All wireless phones may be subject to interference, which could affect their performance.

#### Be aware of special regulations

Meet any special regulations in force in any area and always switch off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

#### Water resistance

Your phone is not water-resistant. Keep it dry.

#### Sensible use

Use only in the normal position (held to the ear). Avoid unnecessary contact with the antenna when the phone is switched on.

#### **Emergency calls**

Key in the emergency number for your present location, then press  $\lceil n \rceil$ .

#### Keep your phone away from small children

Keep the phone and all its parts, including accessories, out of the reach of small children.

#### **Accessories and batteries**

Use only Samsung-approved batteries and accessories, such as headsets and PC data cables. Use of any unauthorized accessories could damage you and your phone and may be dangerous.

- The phone could explode if the battery is replaced with an incorrect type.
- Dispose of used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions.



At very high volumes, prolonged listening to a headset can damage your hearing.

#### **Qualified service**

Only qualified service personnel may repair your phone.





## Get started

First steps to operating your phone

#### SIM card information

When you subscribe to a cellular network, you receive a plug-in SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN, and available optional services.

## Install and charge the phone




Remove the battery cover.



If the phone is already on, first turn it off by pressing and holding [ ].





#### Get started





Plug the adapter into a standard AC power outlet.



When the phone is completely charged (the battery icon becomes still), unplug the adapter from the power outlet.

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Remove the adapter from the phone.



#### Low battery indicator

When the battery is low:

- a warning tone sounds,
- the low battery message displays, and
- the empty battery icon 
   blinks.

If the battery level becomes too low, the phone automatically turns off. Recharge your battery.

## Power on or off

Switch on	1. Press and hold [ 🔊 ].
Do not turn on the phone when mobile phone use is prohibited.	<ol> <li>If necessary, enter the PIN and select &lt;<b>OK</b>&gt;.</li> </ol>
Switch off	Press and hold [ 🔊 ].

#### Key Lock mode

When you press and hold [**HOLD**], the key lock feature locks the exposed keys to prevent accidental key presses from affecting phone operations.

To unlock the keypad, press and hold [HOLD].

#### Offline mode

You can switch the phone to Offline mode, in which the phone functions requiring network connection are deactivated. This mode is helpful when you want to use your phone in a place where you are not allowed to use mobile devices, such as in an airplane and at a hospital.

To switch to Offline mode, select  $\langle$  Menu $\rangle \rightarrow$  Settings  $\rightarrow$  Phone settings  $\rightarrow$  Offline mode  $\rightarrow$  On.

In Offline mode, you can use non-wireless functions, such as games, calendar, camera, and music player.





#### Access menu functions

Use the soft keys

The roles of the soft keys vary depending on the function you are using. The bottom line of the display indicates their current role.

By tapping on the touch screen:

Your phone's display is a touch screen which can recognise when you touch items displayed on it.

- 1. Tap a desired soft key indicator.
- 2. To scroll up or down or side to side:
  - Tap the left or right arrow to scroll left or right.
  - Tap and drag the scroll bar to scroll up or down.
- 3. Tap a desired option or function.


## By pressing the soft keys and Navigation keys:

- 1. Press a desired soft key.
- 2. Press the Navigation keys to move to the next or previous option.
- Choose <Select> or press

#### Use the stylus pen

A stylus pen is supplied with your phone to let you tap and write on the touch screen.

  - Always use a Samsung authorised stylus pen for tapping or for making strokes on the phone screen. Never use an actual pen, pencil, or other sharp object to write on the phone screen as this will scratch the screen.

#### Use the camera

#### Take a photo

- Aim the lens at the subject and make any desired adjustments.
- Select a on the bottom of the display or press [ok/ā] or [Camera] to take a photo. The photo is saved automatically.
- 4. Select <**Back**> to take another photo.

#### View a photo

- 1. In Idle mode, select  $\langle Menu \rangle \rightarrow My \text{ files } \rightarrow Images \rightarrow My \text{ photos.}$

Record a video

## Send an SOS message

You can send an SOS message to your family or friends for help in an emergency.

#### Set up SOS message options

- 1. In Idle mode, select <Menu> → Messages → SOS message.
- 2. Select **Yes** on the **Message sending** field.
- 3. Select Recipients.
- 4. Select a destination field.
- Enter the phone number to which you want to send the SOS message and select <Save>.
- 6. Select  $\langle Options \rangle \rightarrow Save$  to save your settings.

Send the SOS message In Idle mode, press [  $\blacktriangle$  /  $\checkmark$  ] 4 times when the keypad is locked. The phone sends the SOS message.

#### **Use Bluetooth wireless**

Your phone is equipped with Bluetooth technology, enabling you to connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices and exchange data with them, talk hands-free, or control the phone by remote control.

Turn on Bluetooth In Idle mode, select **<Menu>**   $\rightarrow$  **Applications**  $\rightarrow$  **Bluetooth**  $\rightarrow$  **Activation**  $\rightarrow$  **On**. Search for and pair with a Bluetooth device

- In Idle mode, select
   <Menu> → Applications
   → Bluetooth → My
   devices → Search new
   device.
- 2. Select a device.
- Enter a Bluetooth PIN or the other device's Bluetooth PIN, if it has one, and select <**OK**>.

When the owner of the other device enters the same code, pairing is complete.

#### Step outside the phone

#### Send data

1. Access an application, Phonebook, My files, Calendar, or Memo.

- 2. Select the item you want to send.
- 3. Select <Options> → Send via → Bluetooth.
- 4. For **Phonebook**, select which data you want to send.
- 5. Select a device.
- If necessary, enter the Bluetooth PIN and select <OK>.

Receive data

- When a device attempts to access your phone, select <**Yes**> to permit the connection.
- If necessary, select <**Yes**> to confirm that you are willing to receive.

#### Watch the phone display on a TV

You can view the display of your phone on a TV screen by connecting the phone and TV with a TV out cable. This enables you to enjoy the photos, videos and music stored in the phone's memory with your family or friends on a larger screen.

#### Important TV information

- Depending on your particular TV model, the location and shape of the video input and audio output ports may vary. Match cable connector and TV port colours.
- Depending on the video system, the image may vibrate or in some other way be less than optimal.
- Depending on the video quality, some video clips may not display.
- You cannot use a Bluetooth stereo headset or the zooming feature in TV Out mode.
- You cannot use the touch feature in TV Out mode.

Transfer phone display to a TV  With the TV switched on, connect your phone to the TV with a TV out cable, as shown.



2. Switch the TV to External Input mode.

The display switches to TV Out mode and you can view the phone's display on the TV screen.

3. If necessary, set the video system for your TV in the **TV-out**. ▶ p. 119

#### Use a memory card


You can use a memory card to increase your phone's memory capacity.

Important memory card information

- Frequent erasing and writing will shorten a memory card's lifespan.
  - Do not remove a memory card from the phone or turn off the phone while data is being accessed or transferred. This could result in loss of data and/or damage to the card or phone.

- Do not subject memory cards to strong shocks.
- Do not touch memory card terminals with your fingers or metal objects. If dirty, wipe the card with a soft cloth.
- Keep memory cards away from small children or pets.
- Do not expose cards in a place subject to electrostatic discharge and/or electromagnetic interference.
- Some memory cards may not be compatible with your phone, depending on the size of the memory card.

Insert a memory card





Press the card until it locks into place.

Remove the memory card

- 1. Press the memory card so that it is disengaged from the phone.
- 2. Remove the card from the slot.

Use a card adapter Using a card adapter and a USB card reader/writer, you can read the card on a PC.

- Insert a memory card into a card adapter, and then the adapter into a card reader/writer.
- 2. Plug the USB connecter of the card reader/writer into the USB port on your PC.
- 3. Access the appropriate memory disk and copy to and from the card.

## Enter text

Handwriting, Keypad, and Keyboard modes

You can enter text in some features, such as Messages, Phonebook, or Calendar, using English mode, T9 mode, Number mode, and Symbol mode.

### Changing the text input mode

Example: Entering a message

- 1. In the text entry screen, select
- 2. Select the mode you want to use from the list.

## Using Handwriting mode

Your phone is equipped with powerful character recognition software that allows you to convert your handwriting into typed characters accurately and efficiently

#### Tips for using Handwriting mode

- Because of the touch screens sensitivity, choices displayed may differ each time you write a character.
- If you cannot find the symbolic characters you want with Handwriting mode, use the Symbol mode to enter them.
- Write at a normal speed. If you write letters too slowly or too quickly, the phone may not recognise your writing.
- Tap, drag, and lift the stylus pen, as precisely as possible.

### **Using Keypad mode**

You can enter text by pressing the alphanumeric keys on the phone, labelled with the Chinese strokes and alphabet.

### **Using English mode**

#### Enter text

### Using T9 mode

This mode allows you to enter English by using T9 technology. T9 is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes.

### Entering a word

- 1. Select **T9** from the screen to switch to English word mode.
- 2. Tap **2** to **9** to start entering a word. Tap each key once for each letter.

For example, tap 4, 3, 5, 5, and 6 to enter *Hello* in T9 mode.

T9 predicts the word that you are typing, and it may change with each key that you press.

3. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting characters.

 When the word displays correctly, go to step
 Otherwise, tap 0 to display alternative word choices for the keys that you have taped.

For example, Of and Me use 6 and 3.


### Adding a word to the T9 dictionary

This feature may not be available for some languages.

- 1. Enter the word that you want to add.
- Tap **0** to display alternative words for your key presses. When there are no more alternative words, **Spell** appears on the bottom line.

### Using Number or Symbol mode

You can enter numbers and symbols by selecting 10 from the screen.



### Using Keyboard mode

You can select either the alphabetic, numeric, or symbolic keyboard. To enter characters using the onscreen keyboard, just tap the one you want on the keyboard.

### Making a call from Phonebook

You can quickly dial a number from the SIM card using the location number assigned when stored.

### Answering a call

When you receive a call, the phone rings and displays the incoming call image.

Select < **Accept**> or press [  $\frown$  ] to answer the call.

### Tips for answering a call

- When Anykey answer is active, you can press any key to answer a call, except for [ < ], [ ▲/▼] and <Reject>. ▶ p. 117
- Select < Reject> or press [ I to reject a call.

Call functions

 Press and hold [▲/▼] to reject a call or mute the ringer, depending on the Volume key setting. ▶ p. 117

### Viewing missed calls

If you have any missed calls, the screen displays how many calls you have missed.

- 1. Select <View>.
- 2. If necessary, scroll through the missed calls.
- 3. Press [ ~] to dial the number you want.

### Using the headset

Use the headset to make or answer calls without holding the phone.

Connect the headset to the jack on the left side of the phone. The button on the headset works as follows:

### Placing a call on hold/Retrieving

Select <**Hold**> to place the call on hold, or select <**Retrieve**> to retrieve the call.

### Making a second call

You can make another call if your network supports this function.

- 1. Select <**Hold**> to put the call on hold.
- 2. Make the second call in the normal way.
- 3. Select **<Swap>** to switch between the calls.
- Select <Options> → End held call to end the call on hold.
- 5. To end the current call, press [  $\checkmark$  ].

### Answering a second call

You can answer an incoming call while already on the phone, if your network supports this function and you have activated the call waiting feature. ► p. 123

### Using the speakerphone feature

Use the speakerphone feature to talk and listen with the phone a short distance away.

### Using In-call options

Select **<Options**> to access the following options during a call:

 Switch to headset/Switch to phone: switch the call to a Bluetooth headset or hands-free car kit or back to the phone. To use this feature, you first need to connect your headset or car kit to the phone.

- Voice clarity on/Voice clarity off: remove extraneous noise and increase call quality so that the person with whom you are speaking can hear you clearly even if you are in a noisv place.
- Mute/Unmute: switch off the phone's microphone so that the other person on the phone cannot hear you, or switch it back on.
- **Dialer**: open the dialling screen.
- Mute keys/Send keys: switch the key • tones off or on.

To communicate with answering machines or computerised telephone systems, Send keys must be selected.

- Phonebook: access the contact list.
- Send DTMF: send the DTMF (Dual tone ٠ multi-frequency) tones as a group. The DTMF tones are the tones used in phones for tone dialling, sounding when you select the number keys from the dialling screen.

This option is helpful for entering a password or an account number when you call an automated system, like a banking service.

- Message: read an incoming message and ٠ send a new message. ▶ p. 71
- Join: set up a multi-party call by adding a ٠ caller on hold to a currently active call. You can include up to five people on a multi-party call.
- **Split**: have a private conversation with the selected participant. The other participants can converse with each other. After the private conversation, select Join to return both private participants to the multi-party call.
- Transfer: transfer the currently active call to a caller on hold. The two callers can talk to each other, but you are disconnected from the call.
- Remove: disconnect the selected ٠ participant.

- End held call: disconnect the call currently on hold.
- Conv. record: record your conversation.
- SIM service: access special services, such as news, weather forecasts, entertainment, and location services, provided by your SIM card. This option is available when you use a SIM card supporting SIM AT menus.

### Call log (Menu 1)

Use this menu to view the calls you have dialled, received, or missed, and the length of the calls. You can also check the cost of your calls, if the SIM card supports this function. To access this menu, select <**Menu>** in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  **Call log**.

#### Recent contacts (Menu 1.1)

This menu displays the most recent calls dialled, received, or missed.

### Accessing a call record

1. Select a call type.

- 2. Scroll through the call list.
- 3. Press [ ] to dial a number, or [ OK/*i*] to view the details of a call.

### Using call record options

While viewing call details, select **Options**> to access the following options:

- Call: make a call to the number.
- Add to Phonebook: save the number in Phonebook.
- View contact details: access contact information, if the caller is saved in Phonebook.
- **Send message**: send an SMS or MMS message to the selected number.
- **Delete**: delete the selected call record or all records.
- Add to reject list: add the number to the Reject list.

### Missed calls (Menu 1.2)

This menu displays the most recent received calls that you did not answer.

### Dialled calls (Menu 1.3)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have dialled.

### Received calls (Menu 1.4)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have received.

### Delete all (Menu 1.5)

Use this menu to delete all of the records in each call type.

- 1. Select the call types to clear.
- 2. Select < Delete>.
- 3. Select **<Yes>** to confirm the deletion.

### Call time (Menu 1.6)

This menu displays the time log for calls made and received. The actual time invoiced by your service provider will vary.

- Last call time: check the length of your last call.
- **Total sent**: check the total length of all the calls you have dialled.
- **Total received**: check the total length of all the calls you have received.
- **Reset timers**: reset the call timers. You need to enter the phone password.

The password is preset to **00000000**. You can change this password. ▶ p. 125

### Call costs (Menu 1.7)

This network feature displays the cost of calls. This menu is available only if supported by your SIM card. Note that this is not intended to be used for billing purposes.

- Last call cost: check the cost of your last call.
- Total cost: check the total cost of all your calls. If the total cost exceeds the maximum cost set in Set max cost, you must reset the counter before you can make another call.
- Max cost: check the maximum cost limit set in Set max cost.
- Reset counters: reset the cost counters.
- Set max cost: set the maximum cost authorised for your calls.
- **Price/Unit**: set the price per unit that is applied when the cost of your calls is calculated.

### Phonebook (Menu 2)

You can store phone numbers on your SIM card and in your phone's memory. The SIM card and phone's memory are physically separate, but they are used as a single entity called Phonebook.

To access this menu, select <**Menu**> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  **Phonebook**.

### Contact list (Menu 2.1)

Use this menu to search for contact information stored in Phonebook.

### Finding a contact

- 1. Select <Change>.
- 2. Enter the first few letters of the name that you want to find and press [ OK/æ].
- 3. Select the name you want from the list.

 Scroll to a number and press [ ] to dial, or press [ oK/z ] to edit the contact information.

### Using Phonebook options

While viewing contact details, select <**Options**> to access the following options:

- Edit: edit contact information.
- Send message: send an SMS or MMS message to the selected number, or send an MMS message or e-mail to the selected e-mail address.
- **Copy**: copy the number to the phone's memory, to the SIM card, or to the FDN list.
- Send via: send the contact via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Delete: delete the selected contact.
- Mark as default number: set the selected number as the default for the contact.

• **Print via Bluetooth**: print contact information by connecting the phone to a printer via Bluetooth.



Some printers may not be compatible with the phone.

#### FDN contacts (Menu 2.2)

Use this menu to create a list of contacts to be used in FDN (Fixed Dialling Number) mode, in which the phone allows outgoing calls only to the specified phone numbers, if your SIM card supports this feature. You can activate FDN mode in the **FDN mode** menu. ▶ p. 126

#### Adding a contact

- 1. From the FDN list, select  $\langle Options \rangle \rightarrow Add$ .
- Enter your PIN2 supplied with the SIM card and select < OK>.
- 3. Enter information about the contact:

- Name: assign a name.
- Phone number: add a number.

- **Delete**: delete the selected group. Group members, however, will not be deleted from Phonebook.

### Speed dial (Menu 2.5)

Use this menu to assign speed dial numbers (2 to 9) for 8 of your most frequently dialled numbers.

### Assigning speed dial entries



### Using name card options

After saving your name card, select **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the name card.
- Send via: send the name card via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Exchange namecard: exchange name cards with another person's name card via Bluetooth.
- Remove: delete the name card.

• **Print via Bluetooth**: print your contact information by connecting the phone to a printer via Bluetooth.



#### Own number (Menu 2.7)

Use this feature to check your phone numbers, or to assign a name to each of the numbers. Changes made here do not affect the actual subscriber numbers on your SIM card.

#### Management (Menu 2.8)

Use this menu to manage contacts in Phonebook.

 Save new contacts to: select a default memory location for saving contacts. If you select Always ask, the phone will ask you to select a memory location each time you save a number.

- Copy all: copy all of the contacts stored on the SIM card to the phone's memory, or vice versa.
- List by: sort your contacts by the first name or last name.
- Delete all: delete all of the contacts from your phone's memory, your SIM card, or the FDN list.
- Search by initials: search for a contact with the initial letters of the first name and last name in the contact list.
- Memory status: display the number of contacts you have stored in Phonebook.

#### Service number (Menu 2.9)

Use this menu to view the list of Service Dialling Numbers (SDN) assigned by your service provider, including emergency numbers and numbers for directory enquiries. This menu is available if your SIM card supports SDN.

- 1. Scroll to the number you want and select <**View**>.
- 2. Select <**Dial**> or [ ~].

### Applications (Menu 3)

Use this menu to play music files, edit photos, or play Java applications. You can also use the Bluetooth feature.

To access this menu, select <Menu> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  Applications.

### Music player (Menu 3.1)

Use this menu to enjoy music. First, you need to save music files in your phone's memory or on a memory card. To enjoy high quality music, you can use an optional Bluetooth stereo headset.



Normal headsets and Bluetooth mono headsets are not compatible with the music player.

### Downloading or receiving music files

You can play \*. mp3, \*.aac, and \*.m4a files. Use the following methods to save music files to your phone:

- Download from the wireless web ▶ p. 67
- Download from a computer using the Samsung PC Studio programme ► Samsung PC Studio User's Guide
- Receive via an active Bluetooth connection

- Move to: move the selected file to another music album.

- **Copy to**: copy the selected file to another music album.
- **Remove**: remove the selected file or all files from the play list.
- Details: access the file properties.
- Key management: manage the licence keys you have acquired.

### Voice recorder (Menu 3.2)

Use this menu to record voice memos. A voice memo can be up to one hour long.

### Recording a voice memo

- 1. Select **O** or press [ OK/*i*] to start recording.
- 2. Speak into the microphone.
  - Select () or press [OK/*i*] to pause the recording.
  - Select () or press [OK/*i*] to resume the recording.



 When you have finished, select ■ or <Save>, or press [Down]. The voice memo is automatically saved.

Select  $\bigcirc$  to save the voice memo and review the memo immediately.

### Playing a voice memo

- 1. From the voice recorder screen, select <Options>  $\rightarrow$  Go to My voice clips.

- Copy to card: copy the file to a memory card, if inserted.
- Delete: delete the file.
- **Rename**: change the file name.
- Bluetooth visibility: share the selected file with other Bluetooth devices.
- Lock/Unlock: lock the file to prevent if from being deleted, or unlock the file.
- Details: access the file properties.

### Image editor (Menu 3.3)

Use this menu to edit your photos using various editing tools.

### Applying an effect

- 8. Enter a new file name and press [ OK/*i*].

### Bluetooth (Menu 3.4)

Using Bluetooth wireless, you can connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices and exchange data with them, talk hands-free, or control the phone remotely.

Bluetooth technology allows free wireless connections between all Bluetooth-compliant devices within a range of 10 metres. Since the devices communicate using radio waves, they do not need to be in line of sight to each other.

- If there are obstacles between the devices, the maximum operating distance may be reduced.
  - It is recommended that you do not use the Bluetooth feature while using multimedia features such as voice recorder, camera, and music player, or vice versa for better performance.
  - Some devices, especially those that are not tested or approved by Bluetooth SIG may be incompatible with your phone.

### Setting up the Bluetooth feature

The **Bluetooth** menu provides the following options:

- Activation: activate or deactivate the Bluetooth feature.
- **My devices**: search for connectable Bluetooth devices.
- **My phone's visibility**: allow other Bluetooth devices to connect to your phone.
- **My phone's name**: assign a Bluetooth device name to your phone, which is then displayed on other devices.
- Secure mode: determine if the phone asks for your confirmation when other devices access your data.
- **Bluetooth services**: display available Bluetooth services.

# Searching for and pairing with a Bluetooth device

1. From the **Bluetooth** menu, select **My** devices.

### 2. Select Search new device.

After searching, a list of devices to which you can connect displays. The following icons indicate the kind of device:

- 🚡 Stereo headset
- 💼 Mobile phone
- 🖣 Computer
- 🚡 PDA
- 🖷 Unknown device
- 🖶 Printer
- In Mono headset/Hands-free car kit The colour of the icon indicates the status of the device:
- Grey for unpaired devices
- Blue for paired devices

- Orange for devices that are currently connected to your phone
- 3. Select a device.
- Enter a Bluetooth PIN and select < OK>. This code is used just once and you do not need to memorise it.

When the owner of the other device enters the same code, pairing is complete.

Some devices, especially headsets or hands-free car kits, may have a fixed Bluetooth PIN, such as **0000**. If the other device has one, you must enter the code.

### Using device options

From the device list, select **Options**> to access the following options:

- **Connect**: connect to a headset or handsfree car kit.
- **Disconnect**: end the connection with the connected device.

- Browse files: search for data from the device and import data directly to your phone.
- Service list: access the Bluetooth service list of the device.
- Rename: rename the paired device.
- Authorise device/Unauthorise device: determine whether or not the phone asks you to permit connection when other devices try to connect to your phone.
- **Delete**: remove the selected device or all devices.

### Sending data via Bluetooth

- 1. Activate the Bluetooth feature.
- 2. Select the application in which the item you want to send is stored.
- 3. Scroll to the item you want and select <**Options**>.

4. Select Send via  $\rightarrow$  Bluetooth.

The phone searches for devices within range and displays a list of available devices.

- 5. Select a device.
- 6. If necessary, enter the Bluetooth PIN needed for pairing and select **<OK**>.

### **Receiving data via Bluetooth**

To receive data via Bluetooth, your phone's Bluetooth feature must be active and its visibility must be enabled.

- If an unauthorised Bluetooth device sends data to your phone, select <**Yes**> to allow the device to access your phone.
- 2. Select **<Yes>** to receive data.

### Java world (Menu 3.5)

Use this menu to access the embedded Java games and downloaded Java applications.

### Playing a game

Select a game from the game list and follow the onscreen instructions. The procedure may differ from game to game.

### Using Java application options

From the application list, select **Options**> to access the following options:

- Start: launch the selected application.
- Delete: delete the selected application.
- **Details**: access the application properties.
- **Permission**: set permission settings for services charging you additional costs, such as network access and SMS.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

**Proxy**: activate or deactivate the proxy server.

**Proxy settings**: customise the following proxy settings:

When the proxy is set to Enable:

- IP address: enter the gateway address.
- **Port**: enter the port number.

When the proxy is set to **Disable**:

- DNS1: enter the primary address.
- DNS2: enter the secondary address.

#### Games (Menu 3.6)

Use this menu to access the embedded touch games.

Select a game from the game list and follow the onscreen instructions. The procedure may differ from game to game.

### Dictionary (Menu 3.7)

Use this menu to search for words.

### Looking up a word

- 1. Select < Change>.
- 2. Enter the word you want and press [OK/i].
- 3. Select the word you want.

The display shows the pronunciation of the word you entered and the corresponding words.



 To look up another word, select < Back> and repeat from step 1.

To save the word in the Wordbook, select  $<\!\!\textbf{Options}\!\!> \rightarrow \textbf{Save}.$ 

### Using dictionary options

From the dictionary screen, select **<Options>** to access the following options:

Available services may vary, depending on your service provider's plans. For details, see your SIM card instructions or contact your service provider.

### Browser (Menu 4)

The Wireless Application Protocol (WAP) on your phone allows you to access the wireless web. Using the web browser, you can access up-to-date information and a wide variety of media content, such as wallpapers, ringtones, and music files.

To access this menu, select < **Menu**> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  **Browser**.

#### Home (Menu 4.1)

Use this menu to connect your phone to the network and load the homepage of the wireless web service provider.



The touch screen is deactivated in this menu.

#### Current profile (Menu 4.6)

#### Messages (Menu 5)

Use the **Messages** menu to send and receive short messages, multimedia messages, and e-mails. You can also access push messages and broadcast message, and use the SOS message feature.

To access this menu, select < **Menu**> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  **Messages**.

#### Create new message (Menu 5.1)

Use this menu to create and send text messages, multimedia messages, or e-mails.

#### Text message (Menu 5.1.1)

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send text messages including pictures, audio clips, and animated images.

### Creating and sending an SMS message

- 1. Enter your message and press [ OK/*i*].
  - The maximum number of characters allowed in a message varies by service provider. If your message exceeds the maximum number of characters, the phone will split the message.
    - You can use various options by selecting <**Options**>. ▶ next section
- 2. Select a destination field.
- 3. Enter a destination number and press [OK/*i*].

To send the message to more than one recipient, fill in additional destination fields.

Select <**Options**> → **Send** to send the message.

# Using options while composing an SMS message

While composing a message, select **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Send only: just send the message.
- Save and send: send the message and then save it in the Sentbox folder.
- **Preview as vivid message**: view the message in 3D view mode. The phone converts message text to 3D vivid graphics. This option is available only when the message consists of a single page.
- **Insert**: add a template, Phonebook entry, or bookmarked URL address.
- Add picture/Add animation/Add melody: attach a simple image, animated image, or a melody.

- Text style: change the text attributes.
- **Cancel**: cancel composing the message.

#### Multimedia message (Menu 5.1.2)

Multimedia Message Service (MMS) delivers messages containing a combination of text, image, video, and audio, from phone to phone or from phone to e-mail.

To send the message to more than one recipient, fill in additional destination fields.

12.Select  $\langle Options \rangle \rightarrow Send$  to send the message.

- Add image/Add video/Add music/Add sound: add an image, video clip, or sound clip.
  - When you add a video clip, you are unable to add a sound file to the current page. To insert a sound file, add a new page.

- Change image/Change video/Change music/Change sound: replace an added item.

- **Preview**: view the message as it will be shown on the recipient's phone.
- View: open the selected attachment.
- Send: send the message.
- Save in: save the message in another message folder.
- Add page: add pages. Move to each page by pressing [Left] or [Right].
- **Delete page**: delete the added page.
- Edit page: change the duration of page display or move the page forward or backward among the other pages.
- Attach: attach name cards or calendar data as data format attachments, memos, or document files stored in the Other files folder.
- Remove subject/Remove text/Remove media/Remove: remove an added item.

#### Email (Menu 5.1.3)

You can create and send e-mails that include text, audio, and images. To use this feature, you need to subscribe to an e-mail service and set up your e-mail account and profile.  $\triangleright$  p. 88, p. 90

- Edit: edit the template.
- **Send**: create and send a new message using the selected template.

• **Delete**: delete the selected template or all templates.

#### Multimedia message template

(Menu 5.3.2)

You can access embedded MMS templates or ones you have saved so that you can use them in composing an MMS message.

#### Creating a template

- 1. Select **<Options>**  $\rightarrow$  **Add new**.
- 2. Create a template as you would when creating an MMS message.
- 3. Select **<Options>**  $\rightarrow$  **Save in**  $\rightarrow$  **Templates**.

#### Using template options

Use this menu to set up various options for using the messaging services.

### Text messages (Menu 5.5.1)

You can configure SMS settings.

• Sending options: set up the options for sending SMS messages:

**Reply path**: allow recipients to reply to you through your SMS server.

**Request delivery receipt**: set the network to inform you when messages have been delivered.

**Validity period**: set the length of time your messages are stored in the SMS server.

**Message type**: set the default message type. The network can convert messages into the selected format.

**Service centre**: store or change the number of SMS server.

 Receiving options: activate 3D view mode for displaying received messages. The phone will convert message text to 3D vivid graphics. This option is available only when the message consists of a single page. • **Block number**: specify phone numbers from which you want to reject.

#### Multimedia messages (Menu 5.5.2)

You can configure MMS settings.

• Sending options: set up the options for sending MMS messages:

**Request delivery receipt**: set the network to inform you when your messages have been delivered.

**Address hiding**: set your address to be hidden from the recipient's phone.

**Request read receipt**: send a read-reply request along with your messages.

**Priority**: set the priority level of your messages.

**Expiry**: set the length of time your messages are stored in the MMS server. **Delivery time**: set a time delay before messages are sent.

Receiving options: set up the options for receiving MMS messages:

**Anonymous reject**: reject messages from unknown senders.

Advert allowed: accept advertisements. Report allowed: set the network to inform the sender when a message has been delivered to you.

**Home network**: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are in your home service area.

Network when abroad: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are roaming on another network. Reception within home network or abroad has the following options:

- Automatic: the phone automatically retrieves messages from the server.
- Reject: the phone rejects all messages.

- Manual: the phone displays notifications.
   Use the Retrieve option to manually download new messages.
- Multimedia message profile: set up an MMS profile and select a profile to be used.
   Current profile: select a profile.
   Profile settings: configure MMS profiles

using different MMS servers:

- **Profile name**: assign a name to the MMS profile.
- Server URL: enter the address of your MMS server.
- **Proxy**: connect to the GPRS network using the proxy server.
- GPRS settings: customise the settings required for connecting to the GPRS network.

When the proxy is set to Enable:

IP address: enter the gateway address.

Port: enter the port number.
APN: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network.
Login ID: enter the user ID.
Password: enter the password.
When the proxy is set to Disable:
DNS1: enter the primary address.
DNS2: enter the secondary address.
APN: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network.
Login ID: enter the user ID.
Password: enter the password.

- Version: select an available OMA version and maximum size limit for sending or receiving messages.
  - Depending on your service provider, it may not be possible to support the maximum limit 300KB. In this case, try again after changing the setting to 100KB.

- **Block number**: set the Block number list to reject MMS messages from specific phone numbers. Numbers specified here are also included in the SMS Block number list.
- Message class: select the type of message content you will add or the message size.
   Text only: you can add only text of up to 30 KB.

**Small imaging**: you can add any type of item, except for video, of up to 30 KB.

Moderate imaging: you can add any type of item, except for video, of up to 100 KB. Small video: you can add any type of item of up to 100 KB.

**Moderate video**: you can add any type of items of up to 300 KB.

• **Creation mode**: select an MMS creation mode.

**Warning**: you can create a message with any type of content and of any size, but the phone will inform you when the content and size have exceeded the maximum.

**Free**: you can create a message with any type of contents and of any size.

**Restricted**: you can create a message with the type of content and size specified in **Message class**.

#### Emails (Menu 5.5.3)

You can configure e-mails settings.

You cannot change e-mail profile and account settings while an e-mail is being sent or retrieved.

• Sending options: set up the options for sending e-mails:

**Send copy to self**: send a copy of your e-mail to your e-mail account.

**Request delivery receipt**: set the network to inform you when e-mails have been delivered.

**Request read receipt**: send a read-reply request for a reply along with e-mails. **Priority**: select the priority level of your e-mail.

Add signature: attach your name, phone number, or a simple memo to e-mails. Edit name: edit the name in your signature. Edit telephone number: edit the phone number in your signature.

**Edit note**: edit the tag line in your signature.

• **Receiving options**: set up the options for receiving e-mails:

**Check interval**: determine how often the phone checks the server for incoming e-mails.

If you select **Not used**, you can use the Check new mail feature to check your e-mail manually.

**Send read receipt**: determine whether or not the phone sends a read-reply for incoming e-mails. If you select **Announce**, the phone asks you to send a read-reply.

**Retrieve option**: set whether the phone downloads e-mail headers only or both e-mail headers and bodies.

**Delete option**: determine whether e-mails are deleted immediately or the next time you connect to the server.

**Download limit**: determine the maximum size for incoming e-mails. Your phone will reject e-mails that exceed the specified size.

**Keep in server**: leave the copies of e-mails in the server after retrieving.

• **Email accounts**: set up an e-mail account and select an account to be used:

Current account: select an account.

Account settings: configure e-mail accounts using different e-mail servers. Select <Create>, or select <Options>  $\rightarrow$  Create, if one has already been saved.

- **In use**: select this option to use the account and to display the account in **Email inbox**.
- Account name: enter a name for the currently selected account.

To access the following options, select <**Options** $> \rightarrow$  **Next**.

- **User name**: enter a user name.
- **Email address**: enter your e-mail address.
- **Reply address**: enter your e-mil address to be used when the recipient sends a reply.

To access the following options, select <**Options** $> \rightarrow$  **Next**.

- **SMTP server**: enter the IP address or host name of the outgoing e-mail server.

- SMTP port: enter the SMTP port number.
- **SMTP user ID**: enter the SMTP user name.
- **SMTP password**: enter the SMTP password.
- Secure connection (SMTP): use a secure connection for the e-mail service.
- Retrieve server type: select the protocol for the incoming e-mail server. The remaining options depend on the protocol type setting.

When the protocol type is **POP3**:

- POP3 server: enter the IP address or host name of the server that receives your e-mail.
- POP3 port: enter the POP3 port number.
- Same ID and password: select if you want to have the same user ID and password with the outgoing e-mail server.
- POP3 user ID: enter the POP3 user name.

- **POP3 password**: enter the POP3 password.
- APOP login: connect to the server by using the APOP login scheme when this option is selected.
- Secure connection (POP3): use a secure connection for the e-mail service. When the protocol type is **IMAP4**:
- **IMAP4 server**: enter the IP address or host name of the server that receives your e-mail.
- **IMAP4 port**: enter the IMAP4 port number.
- Same ID and password: select if you want to have the same user ID and password with the outgoing e-mail server.
- **IMAP4 user ID**: enter the IMAP4 user name.
- **IMAP4 password**: enter the IMAP4 password.

- Secure connection (IMAP4): use a secure connection for the e-mail service.
- **Include attachments**: select this option to receive attachments with e-mails.
- **Email retrieval limit**: set the number of headers you will retrieve from the server.
- **Email profiles**: set up an e-mail profile and select a profile to be used.

**Current profile**: select a profile. **Profile settings**: configure e-mail profiles using different e-mail servers. Set the options for each profile:

- **Profile name**: enter a name for the e-mail profile.
- **APN**: enter the access point name used for the GPRS network address.
- Login ID: enter the user ID.
- **Password**: enter the password.
- **DNS1**: enter the primary address.
- DNS2: enter the secondary address.

• Block list: specify e-mail addresses or subjects you want to reject.

#### Push messages (Menu 5.5.4)

You can change the settings for receiving push messages from the wireless web server.

- **Receive**: set how your phone receives push messages.
- Service centre: enter the address of the server from which you want to receive push messages, when the **Receive** option is set to **Text message-C specific**.

## SOS message (Menu 5.6)

In an emergency, you can send an SOS message to your family or friends for help. You can also receive an SOS message from other people who are in an emergency. Use this menu to specify options for sending and receiving an SOS message.

 Message sending: activate or deactivate the SOS message feature. To send an SOS message, press [▲/▼] 4 times when the keypad is locked.

While the phone is attempting to send an SOS message, à turns to red and you cannot access menu functions in this mode. To use the phone as normal, press [~] when the icon turns to blue.

- Recipients: specify the phone numbers to which you want to send an SOS message.
- **Repeat sending**: set the number of times the phone resends the SOS message.
- Incoming SOS alert: set whether or not the phone uses the preset alert type (siren and alert message) for incoming SOS messages. If you select No, the phone uses the message ringer setting.

• Text: check the preset SOS message text.

#### Broadcast messages (Menu 5.7)

The broadcast service delivers short messages on various topics such as the weather or traffic.

Use this menu to change the settings for the service and to access broadcast messages.

• Read: open received messages.

All broadcast messages are stored in the **Temporary** folder and will be deleted when you turn the phone off. If you do not want a message to be deleted, save it to the **Archive** folder. While viewing the message, select <**Options**> → **Save**.

• Activation: enable or disable the reception of broadcast messages.

- **Receiving channels**: specify the channels from which you receive broadcast messages.
- **Language**: select the languages in which broadcast messages display.

Please contact your service provider for details.

#### Memory status (Menu 5.8)

Use this menu to view the memory status for text, multimedia, e-mail, or push messages. You can also access a message folder by selecting it from this menu.

# My files (Menu 6)

The **My files** menu allows you to access images, videos, voice memos, music files, sounds, and other files stored in the phone's memory or on a memory card.

To access this menu, select <Menu> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  My files.

### **Tips for Digital Rights Management**

As a result of the Digital Rights Management (DRM) system, some of the media items you download from the Internet or receive by MMS may require a licence key to access them. You can acquire the key from the website which owns the rights to the content; use the Activate key option.

Note the following icons on the list:

- Forwardable item with a valid key.
- Forwardable item without a valid key.
- Inforwardable item with a valid key.

Inforwardable item without a valid key.

Your service provider supports only countbased or unlimited-access DRM files.

#### Images (Menu 6.1)

This menu displays photos you have taken and images you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

### Viewing an image

- 1. Select an image folder.
- 2. Select an image.

#### Viewing a slide show

You can view your images as a slide show.

- 1. Select an image folder.
- While viewing an image, select <**Options**>
   → Slide show.

- 3. Select a time interval. The slide show begins.
- 4. Select **<Back**> to stop the slide show.

#### Using image options

While viewing an image, select **<Options>** to access the following options:

- List: return to the image list.
- Full screen view/Normal view: change the view mode.
- Send via: send the file via MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Set as: set the file as your wallpaper or as a caller ID image for a Phonebook entry.
- Edit: edit the image using the Image editor if it is a photo taken by the camera on the phone. ▶ p. 57
- Activate key: get a new licence key when the key for the selected DRM file expires.

- Reactivate key: get another licence key even when the key for the selected DRM file has not expired.
- **Move to**: move the file to another folder or a memory card, if inserted.
- Copy to card: copy the selected file or all files to a memory card, if inserted.
- Delete: delete the selected file.
- Rename: change the file name.
- Slide show: view all image as a slide show.
- **Bluetooth visibility**: share the file with other Bluetooth devices.
- **Print via**: print the image by connecting the phone to a printer via Bluetooth or USB.
  - To print via USB, you first need to set the
    - USB mode to **Pictbridge**. ▶ p. 117
    - Some printers may not be compatible with the phone.

- Lock/Unlock: lock the file to prevent it from being deleted, or unlock the file.
- Details: access the file properties.
- Key management: manage the licence keys you have acquired.

#### Videos (Menu 6.2)

This menu displays video clips you have recorded, downloaded, or received in messages, or imported from your computer.



Video clips recorded on other devices, such as camcorders, may not play correctly.

## Playing a video clip

- 1. Select a video folder.
- 2. Select a video clip.

During playback, use the following keys and icons:

- Activate key: get a new licence key when the key for the selected DRM file expires.
- Reactivate key: get another licence key even when the key for the selected DRM file has not expired.
- **Move to**: move the file to another folder or a memory card, if inserted.
- **Copy to card**: copy the file to a memory card, if inserted.
- Delete: delete the file.
- Rename: change the file name.

- Bluetooth visibility: share the selected file with other Bluetooth devices.
- Lock/Unlock: lock the file to prevent it from being deleted, or unlock the file.
- **Details**: access the file properties.
- Key management: manage the licence keys you have acquired.

#### Music (Menu 6.3)

Use this menu to access music files you have downloaded or imported from your computer.

## Playing a music file

Select a file. The music player opens and the selected music file plays. ▶ p. 53

When you close the music player, background music will not continue unless the file is added to the play list.

## Sounds (Menu 6.4)

This menu displays the voice memos you have recorded, and sound files you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

## Playing a sound clip

- 1. Select a sound folder.
- 2. Select a sound clip. For a voice memo, see **Voice recorder.** ▶ p. 56

While playing a sound clip, select **Options**> to access the following options:

- List: return to the sound list.
- Send via: send the selected file via MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Set as: set the file as your ringtone, as a ringtone for a Phonebook entry, or as a ringtone for alarms.

- Activate key: get a new licence key when the key for the selected DRM file expires.
- **Reactivate key**: get another licence key even when the key for the selected DRM file has not expired.
- **Move to**: move the file to another folder or a memory card, if inserted.
- Copy to card: copy the file to a memory card, if inserted.
- **Delete**: delete the file.
- Rename: change the file name.
- **Bluetooth visibility**: share the selected file or the files you want with other Bluetooth devices.
- Lock/Unlock: lock the file to prevent it from being deleted, or unlock the file.
- **Details**: access the file properties.
- Key management: manage the licence keys you have acquired.

## Other files (Menu 6.5)

Files that you have received but which are not supported by your phone are stored in this folder. You cannot open these files on the phone.

From the file list, select **<Options**> to access the following options:

- Send via: send the file via e-mail or Bluetooth.
- Activate key: get a new licence key when the key for the selected DRM file expires.
- Reactivate key: get another licence key even when the key for the selected DRM file has not expired.
- Move to card: move the selected file to a memory card, if inserted or the phone's memory.
- **Copy to card**: copy the selected file to a memory card, if inserted or the phone's memory.

- Delete: delete the selected file or all files.
- Rename: change the file name.
- List by: change the sort order of the file list.
- **Bluetooth visibility**: share the currently selected file or the files you want with other Bluetooth devices.
- **Print via**: print the image by connecting the phone to a printer via USB or Bluetooth.
  - ✓ To print via USB, you first need to set the USB mode to **Pictbridge**. ▶ p. 117
    - Some printers may not be compatible with the phone.
- **Lock/Unlock**: lock the file to prevent it from being deleted, or unlock the file.
- **Details**: access the file properties.
- Key management: manage the licence keys you have acquired.

## Memory card (Menu 6.6)

Use this menu to access the files stored on a memory card. This menu is shown only when a memory card is inserted into the phone.

- Your phone is preset to use FAT16-formatted memory cards. If you insert a FAT32formatted memory card, the phone will ask you to reformat the memory card. If you do not, you will not be able to access the card from the phone.
  - If a folder on a memory card has subfolders which exceed the maximum folder depth supported by your phone's file system, you may not open or delete the maximum depth subfolders on the phone.

#### Memory status (Menu 6.7)

You can check the total amount of memory for media items and the amount of memory currently in use in each media box. You can also access a media box by selecting it from this menu.

## Planner (Menu 7)

Use this menu to keep track of your schedule. You can also use convenient features, such as an alarm clock, calendar, memo pad, world clock, calculator, convertor, timer, and stopwatch.

To access this menu, select < **Menu**> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  **Planner**.

### Alarm (Menu 7.1)

Use this menu to set alarms. The alert type for a normal alarm corresponds to the call alert type settings. A wake up alarm is not affected by your sound settings.

## Setting an alarm

- 1. Select the type of alarm.
- 2. Select an alarm option.
  - Alarm: activate the alarm.
  - Alarm time: enter the time for the alarm to ring.
  - **AM/PM**: set **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
  - Alarm day: select the days on which you want the alarm to sound. If you select Once only, the alarm sounds at the specified time and then is deactivated.
  - Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.

3. Select <**Save**>.

## Stopping an alarm

- For an alarm, press any key.
- For a wake-up alarm, select <Confirm> or press [ OK/z].

Press any key, except for **<Confirm>** and [ok/*i*], to cause it to sound again after 5 minutes.

## Deactivating an alarm

- 1. Select the alarm you want to deactivate.
- 2. Select Off on the Alarm lines.
- 3. Select <Save>.

# Setting alarms to sound when the phone is off

From the Alarm screen, select  $\textbf{Auto power} \rightarrow \textbf{On}.$ 

If the phone is off when it is time for the alarm to sound, the phone switches on and sounds the alarm.

## Calendar (Menu 7.2)

Use this menu to keep track of your monthly schedule.

When you access the **Calendar** menu, the calendar in Month view appears with today's date indicated by a grey box.

## Creating an item

You can store appointments, anniversaries, tasks, and miscellaneous items on the calendar. More than one item per day can be stored.

# Entering an appointment or a miscellaneous item

1. Select a date on the calendar.

# 2. Select <**Options**> → **Create** → **Appointment** or **Miscellany**.

- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - Subject: enter a title for the item.
  - Details: enter item details.
  - Start date and Start time: enter the starting date and time for the item.
  - **AM/PM**: select **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
  - End date and End time: enter the ending date and time for the item.
  - **AM/PM**: select **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
  - Location: (for Appointment) enter information about the appointed location.
  - Alarm: select to set an alarm for the item.
  - **before**: set how long before the item the alarm is to alert you.
  - Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.

- **Repeat**: (for **Appointment**) select to set the item to recur.
- **until**: (for **Appointment**) select a repeat unit and set the date to end the repeating.
- 4. Select <**Save**> to save the item.

#### **Entering an anniversary**

- 1. Select a date on the calendar.
- 2. Select **<Options>**  $\rightarrow$  **Create**  $\rightarrow$  **Anniversary**.
- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - **Occasion**: enter information about the anniversary.
  - Date: enter the date.
  - Alarm: select to set an alarm for the anniversary.
  - **before**: set how long before the anniversary the alarm is to alert you.

- Alarm time: enter the time for the alarm to sound.
- **AM/PM**: select **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
- Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.
- **Repeat every year**: set the phone to remind you of the anniversary every year.
- 4. Select **<Save**> to save the anniversary.

## Entering a task

- 1. Select a date on the calendar.
- 2. Select **<Options>**  $\rightarrow$  **Create**  $\rightarrow$  **Task**.
- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - Task: enter information about the task.
  - Start date: enter the starting date.
  - **Due date**: enter the ending date.
  - Priority: select a priority level.
  - Alarm: select to set an alarm for the task.

- **before**: set how long before the task the alarm is to alert you.
- Alarm time: enter the time for the alarm to sound.
- **AM/PM**: select **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
- Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.
- 4. Select **<Save**> to save the task.

## Consulting the calendar

Once you have created items, the item icons and the number of items for a specific day appears at the bottom of the calendar.

- Appointments
- 🐴 Anniversaries
- 🗹 Tasks
- Miscellaneous items

#### Viewing an item

- 1. Select a date on the calendar to display the items for that day.
- 2. Select an item to view its details.
- 3. Press [Left] or [Right] to access the other items scheduled for the selected day.

While viewing an item, select **Options**> to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the item.
- Create: add a new item.
- Send via: send the item via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- View by: change the view mode of the calendar.
- **Done/Not done**: change the status of the task.
- **Delete**: delete the item.

 Print via Bluetooth: print the item details by connecting the phone to a printer via Bluetooth.

Some printers may not be compatible with the phone.

#### Using calendar options

On the calendar, select **Options**> to access the following options:

- View by: change the view mode of the calendar.
- Create: add a new item.
- Go to: select today's date or enter a specific date.
- Event list: sort items by the type of item.
- **Delete**: delete items stored on the calendar by using various deleting options.
- **Settings**: change the default settings for the calendar:

**Starting day**: select which day of the week the calendar starts with.



**Default view by**: select the default calendar view mode.

- **Missed alarm events**: access items whose alarms you have missed.
- **Memory status**: access the memory information for the items stored on the calendar.

#### Viewing items in a different mode

You can change the calendar display to Day view or Week view. Select  $\langle Options \rangle \rightarrow View$  by  $\rightarrow$  a view mode.

## Day view

You can view items for the selected date. The following icons will be displayed according to the items type and status:

- 🔔 Alarm set
- 🗳 Recurring item
- Completed task

• Task priority (Orange: high, Light blue: normal, and Grey: low)

Select an item to view its details.

#### Week view

You can view items for the selected week. A cell on the timetable indicates the presence of item information. Blue boxes indicate scheduled items, and green boxes indicate miscellaneous items.

Select the cell that contains the item you want.

#### Memo (Menu 7.3)

You can create a list of memos.

## Creating a memo

- 1. Select **<Options>**  $\rightarrow$  **Create**.
- 2. Enter the memo contents and press [ OK/*i*].

### Viewing a memo

Select a memo from the list. While viewing a memo, select **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the memo.
- Send via: send the memo via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Delete: delete the memo.
- Print via Bluetooth: print the memo by connecting the phone to a printer via Bluetooth.

 Memory status: check the number of memos stored in the phone's memory.

## World clock (Menu 7.4)

Use this menu to find out the current time in another part of the world.

## Viewing world time

- 1. From the world map, press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the city you want on the upper or lower line. As the time line moves, the time and date of the given zone display.
- 2. Press [OK/i] to save the time zone.

## Applying daylight saving time

- From the world map, select <Options> → Apply daylight saving time.
- 2. Select the time zones you want.
- 3. Select <Save>.



### Calculator (Menu 7.5)

Use this menu to perform arithmetic functions such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

1. Enter the first number.

You can use a decimal point or a bracket, use additional arithmetic functions, and switch to the Convertor screen by selecting **<Options>**.

- 2. Enter the operation for your calculation by selecting arithmetic functions on the display.
- 3. Enter the second number.
- Press [OK/i] or select = on the display to view the result.
- 5. If necessary, repeat from step 2 to continue the calculation.

## Convertor (Menu 7.6)

Use this menu for common conversions, such as length and temperature.

## Performing a conversion

- 1. Select a type of convertor.
- 2. Select the original unit and press [Down].
- 3. Press [ ок/*і*].
- Enter the value to be converted and press [ OK/i ].
- 5. Press [Down].
- Select the unit to which you want to convert. The equivalent value for the amount you entered displays.
- While entering the value, select **±** on the display to change the temperature to above zero (+) or below zero (-).

#### Using convertor options

Select **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Clear: clear the current values.
- **Reverse**: reverse the conversion.
- Exchange rate: access the currency rate list.

#### Timer (Menu 7.7)

Use this menu to set a period of time for the phone to count down. The phone sounds an alarm when the specified period of time expires.

#### Starting the timer

- 1. Select <Set>.
- Enter the length of time you want to count down and select <**OK**>.
- 3. Select or press [OK/*i*] to start counting down.

### Stopping the timer

- Press any key to stop the timer when it sounds.
- Select or press [OK/i] on the Timer screen to stop the timer before it sounds.

#### Stopwatch (Menu 7.8)

Use this menu to measure elapsed time. The maximum time is 10 hours.

- 1. Select ▶ or press [OK/*i*] to start the stopwatch.
- Select or press [ OK | i ] to select an interval. You can repeat this step for a total of 4 intervals.
- 3. To reset the stopwatch, select <**Reset**>.

## Camera (Menu 8)

You can use the camera module embedded in your phone to take photos and record videos. To access this menu, select <**Menu**> in Idle mode  $\rightarrow$  **Camera**, or press [Camera].

- Do not take photos of people without their permission.
  - Do not take photos in a place where cameras are not allowed.
  - Do not take photos in a place where you may interfere with another person's privacy.

## Take a photo (Menu 8.1)

The camera produces jpeg photos.

## Taking a photo

- Access the **Take a photo** menu to turn on the camera, and switch the display to Capture mode. You can also press and hold [Camera] in Idle mode.
- 2. Make any desired adjustments.
  - Press [Up] or [Down] to zoom in or out.
  - Press [Left] or [Right] to adjust the brightness.
  - Press [ ▲ ] to flip the image vertically.
  - Press [ ▼\_] to show the mirror image.
  - Select < > to use the camera options.

  - Use the setting icons on the display to change the camera settings or switch to other modes. ▶ p. 110
- Select at the bottom of the display or press [ok/i] or [Camera] to take a photo. The photo is saved in the My photos folder.

#### Time and date (Menu 9.1)

Use this menu to set the current time and date on your phone.

 Home zone: set your home time zone. Select the city that corresponds to your home zone. To set the daylight saving time, select Set daylight saving time.

- Time: enter the current time.
- **AM/PM**: select **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
- Time format: select a time format.
- Date: enter the current date.
- Date format: select a date format.
- Auto update: activate the auto time update feature. Your phone will read the MCC (Mobile Country Code) from the network and automatically update the current time for the country that you are in when you travel abroad.
  - Time information may not be updated when you move to one time zone to another within a country.

#### Phone settings (Menu 9.2)

Many different features of your phone's system can be customised to suit your preferences.

#### Language (Menu 9.2.1)

Use this menu to select a language for the display.

#### Greeting message (Menu 9.2.2)

Use this menu to enter the greeting that is displayed briefly when the phone is switched on.

#### Shortcuts (Menu 9.2.3)

You can use the Navigation keys as shortcut keys to access specific menus directly from Idle mode. Use this menu to assign a shortcut to a key.

#### Assigning a shortcut to a key

### Sound settings (Menu 9.4)

Use this menu to customise various sound settings.

### Incoming call (Menu 9.4.1)

Use this menu to select a volume level and alert type for incoming calls.

- Alert type: specify how you are to be informed of incoming calls.
- **Ring tone**: select a ringtone for the call ringer.
- Volume: select a ringer volume.

#### Keypad tone (Menu 9.4.2)

Use this menu to select the tone that the phone sounds when you press a key.



You can adjust the key tone volume using  $[\blacktriangle/ v]$  in Idle mode.



#### Message tone (Menu 9.4.3)

Use this menu to set up the ringtone for incoming messages.

- **Alert type**: specify how you are informed when a message comes in.
- **Tone**: select one of the several message tones.
- **Repetition**: specify how often the phone informs you of a new message.

#### Touch tone (Menu 9.4.4)

Use this menu to select the melody that the phone sounds when you touch the screen.

#### Power-on/off tone (Menu 9.4.5)

Use this menu to select the melody that the phone sounds when it is switched on or off.

#### Silent mode (Menu 9.4.6)

Use this menu to set how the phone acts to alert you to a specific event in Silent mode.

#### Extra tones (Menu 9.4.7)

Use this menu to customise additional tones for the phone.

- **Minute minder**: set the phone to beep every minute during an outgoing call to keep you informed of the length of your call.
- **Connection tone**: set the phone to beep when an outgoing call is connected to the system.
- Alerts on call: set the phone to beep when you receive a new message or when the time for an alarm comes during a call.
- **Indicative tone**: set the phone to beep when a pop-up window displays.

#### Touch settings (Menu 9.5)

#### Call barring (Menu 9.7.2)

This network service allows you to restrict your calls.

- 1. Select a call barring option:
  - All outgoing: prohibit outgoing calls.
  - **International**: prohibit international calls.
  - International except home: only allow calls to numbers within the current country when you are abroad, and to your home country.
  - All incoming: prohibit incoming calls.
  - **Incoming while abroad**: prohibit incoming calls when you use your phone outside of your home service area.
  - **Cancel all**: cancel all call barring settings, allowing to be sent and received normally.

- Change barring password: change the call barring password obtained from your service provider.
- 2. Select the type of calls to be barred.
- 3. Select **Activate**. To deactivate call barring, select **Deactivate**.
- Enter the call barring password supplied by your service provider and choose <**Select**>.

### Call waiting (Menu 9.7.3)

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you while you are on another call.

- 2. Select **Activate**. To deactivate call waiting, select **Deactivate**.

#### **Network selection** (Menu 9.7.4)

This network service allows you to manually select the network to be used while roaming outside of your home area, or to let the network be chosen automatically. You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

#### Caller ID (Menu 9.7.5)

This network service allows you to hide your phone number from the person you are calling. However, some networks do not allow the user to change this setting. If you select **Default**, the phone will use the default setting provided by the network.

#### Voice mail server (Menu 9.7.6)

Use this menu to store the number of the voicemail server and access your voicemails.

Your service provider can give you the voicemail server number.

- Connect to voice server: connect to the voicemail server to allow you to listen to your messages.
- Voice server number: enter the voicemail server number.

#### Band selection (Menu 9.7.7)

For the phone to make and receive phone calls, it must register with an available network.

Your phone can handle any of the following types of networks: Combined GSM 900/1800, GSM 1900, and Tri band (GSM 900/1800/ 1900).

The country where you purchased your phone determines the default band that it uses. When you travel abroad, you must remember to change to an appropriate band.

#### Security (Menu 9.8)

Use this menu to protect the phone against unauthorised use by managing the several access codes of your phone and SIM card.



If you enter an incorrect PIN/PIN2 three times, the SIM card is blocked. To unblock it, you need to enter your PUK/PUK2 (Personal Unblocking Key). The codes are supplied by your network operator.

#### PIN check (Menu 9.8.1)

The 4- to 8-digit PIN (Personal Identification Number) protects your SIM card against unauthorised use. When this feature is enabled, the phone requires your PIN each time it is switched on.

#### Change PIN (Menu 9.8.2)

Use this menu to change your PIN. The PIN check feature must be enabled to use this feature.

#### Phone lock (Menu 9.8.3)

The Phone lock feature locks the phone from unauthorised use.

When this feature is enabled, you must enter a 4- to 8-digit phone password each time the phone is switched on.

The password is preset to **00000000**. To change the password, use the **Change password** menu.

#### Change password (Menu 9.8.4)

Use this menu to change your phone password.

### Privacy (Menu 9.8.5)

Use this menu to lock access to call logs, Phonebook, or your media contents, including messages, media files, and document files.

- 1. Select the items to lock.
- 2. Select **Save**> to lock the marked items.
- 3. Enter the phone password and select **<OK>**.

To access a locked item, you need to enter the phone password.

#### SIM lock (Menu 9.8.6)

The SIM lock feature allows your phone to work only with the current SIM by assigning a SIM lock code. You must enter the SIM lock code to use a different SIM card.

#### FDN mode (Menu 9.8.7)

If supported by your SIM card, Fixed Dialling Number (FDN) mode restricts your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers. When this feature is enabled, you can make calls only to phone numbers stored on the SIM card.

#### Change PIN2 (Menu 9.8.8)

If supported by your SIM card, use this menu to change your current  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{PIN2}}$  .

#### Mobile tracker (Menu 9.8.9)

When someone tries to use your phone with another SIM card, the phone will automatically send the preset tracking message to your family or friends. You can check the phone number from which the messages are sent and then track your phone. This feature is useful when the phone is stolen or lost.



Sending of the tracking message will be billed to the user of the unauthorised SIM card. To use your phone with any other SIM card, you must first deactivate the mobile tracking feature.

- 1. Enter the phone password and select <**OK**>.
- 2. Specify the following options:
  - Mobile tracker: activate the Mobile tracker feature.
  - Recipients: specify phone numbers to which you want to send the tracking messages.
  - Sender: enter the sender's name.
  - **Message**: check the preset tracking message text.

- Press <Accept> if you agree to the terms and conditions of service listed on the screen.

#### Memory status (Menu 9.9)

Use this menu to check the amount of memory being used for storing data in Shared memory, Messages, My files, Calendar, Phonebook, JAVA world, and Memo.

#### Reset settings (Menu 9.10)

Use this menu to reset the phone settings, display settings, sound settings, and light settings individually.

- 1. Select the setting categories to be reset.
- 2. Select <**Reset**> to reset the marked items  $\rightarrow$  <**Yes**>.
- 3. Enter the phone password and select **<OK>**.

The password is preset to 00000000. You can change this password. ▶ p. 125



#### Key management (Menu 9.11)

Use this menu to manage the licence keys you have acquired to activate media files locked by DRM systems.

Select **<Options**> to access the following options:

- View: open the corresponding item.
- Delete: delete the selected licence key.
- **Go to My Messages**: access the message that contains the media file.
- Go to My Items: access the corresponding file folder.
- Go to Java: access the corresponding game.
- **Details**: access the properties of the licence key.

Help and personal needs

To save the time and expense of an unnecessary service call, perform the simple checks in this section before contacting a service professional.

# When you switch on your phone, the following messages may appear:

"Insert SIM"

• Be sure that the SIM card is correctly installed.

"Phone lock"

• The automatic locking function has been enabled. You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.

"Enter PIN"

• You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the PIN supplied with the SIM card.  The PIN check feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered. To disable this feature, use the **PIN** check menu.

"Enter PUK"

• The PIN code has been entered incorrectly three times, and the SIM card is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider.

#### "No Service," "Network Failure," or "Not Done" displays

- The network connection has been lost. You may be in a weak signal area. Move and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have no subscription with your service provider. Contact the service provider for further details.

Solve problems

## You have entered a number but it was not dialled

- Be sure that you have pressed [ ~ ].
- Be sure that you have accessed the right cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an outgoing call barring option.

#### Your correspondent cannot reach you

- Be sure that you have accessed the right cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an incoming call barring option.

## Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

• Be sure that you have switched off the microphone.

• Be sure that you are holding the phone close enough to your mouth. The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.

## The phone starts beeping and "Battery low" flashes on the display

• Your battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.

- Check the signal strength indicator on the display ( $\Upsilon_{\rm HIII}$ ). The number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong ( $\Upsilon_{\rm HIII}$ ) to weak ( $\Upsilon$ ).
- Try moving the phone slightly or moving closer to a window if you are in a building.

## Health and safety information

## SAR certification information

This phone meets European Union (EU) requirements concerning exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed the limits for exposure to radiofrequency (RF) energy, as recommended by the EU Council. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines were developed by independent scientific organisations through the periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The limits include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

## Health and safety information

The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the EU Council is 2.0 W/kg.<sup>1</sup> The highest SAR value for this model phone was 0.673 W/kg.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value.

This is because the phone is designed to

 The SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over ten grams of body tissue. The limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements. The SAR values may vary, depending on national reporting requirements and the network band. operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, compliance with the European R&TTE Directive must be shown. This directive includes as one of its essential requirements the protection of the health and safety of the user and any other person.

#### Precautions when using batteries

- Never use a charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power. Talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.

- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge, the type of battery, and the charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Samsungapproved chargers. Disconnect the charger from the power source when it is not in use. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places because the capacity and lifetime of the

battery will be reduced. Try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0°C (32°F).

- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object like a coin, clip or pen causes a direct connection between the + and - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery). For example, do not carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag where the battery may contact metal objects. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

## **Road safety**

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone while driving, follow local regulations in the country or region you are in.

## **Operating environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in the area you are in, and always switch off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's quide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

#### **Electronic devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch off your phone immediately.

#### Hearing aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy.

Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Switch off your phone in health care facilities when regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so.

#### Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle.

You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

#### **Posted facilities**

Switch off your phone in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

### Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your phone when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch off the phone while at a refuelling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. Switch on the phone.
- 2. Key in the emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.

3. Press [ 🕤 ].

Certain features like Call Barring may need to be deactivated before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

#### Other important safety information

 Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle.
 Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.

- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Improperly installed wireless equipment could result in serious injury if the air bag inflates.
- Switch off your phone before boarding an aircraft. It is dangerous and illegal to use wireless phones in an aircraft because they can interfere with the operation of the aircraft.

#### Care and maintenance

- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that corrode electronic circuits.

- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth.
