Computer Genealogy Lab Class

This series will run once a month for nine months on the second Tuesday of the month. This new lab class will help you learn to use on the computer the Genealogy software program, Family Tree Maker (FTM) version 2014. The lab contains 12 Windows computers and two iMac computers set up with FTM. You may also bring your own laptop computer with Family Tree Maker installed on it. *You must be a current member of the Sun City Computer Club to participate. A basic familiarity with your computer is also recommended.*

Purpose

The use of FTM will help you discover and preserve your family's heritage. It's quick and easy to use for those just starting to research their family history, but it's also robust enough for the most serious genealogist. You can use FTM to store, display, and print any kind of family information you want—from names, birth dates, marriages, and deaths to priceless family stories, pictures, and audio/video files. The ultimate goal for all participants is to eventually gather together their genealogical information, put it in the computer, print it, and share it.

Upload and sync files in Google Drive. Google gives you 15 GB of free storage shared across Google Drive, Gmail and Google+ Photos. The unique difference between Google Drive and other cloud storage programs is that anything you create in Docs, Sheets or Slides won't use up any of your storage. Anything uploaded into the Google format does not count against your storage either.

Useful Information on the Club's Website Tom Burt, SCSCC Vice-President

Most of you have, at some time, visited the Computer Club website at: www.scscclab.com. However, I suspect few of our members have really dug in to find all the useful information that's kept there. Space here limits how much I can cover, but I wanted to highlight a few of the key features.

Finally, it provides the address for paying dues in person or by mail: Sun City Summerlin Computer Club, 2251 N. Rampart Blvd., Box 111, Las Vegas, NV 89128.

The “About SCSCC” area initially shows the “Membership Information” page. In the left-hand pane are a variety of links, including “SCSCC Who’s Who 2015”, which is a comprehensive list of all the Board members, key staff and all the SIG and Kaffee Klatch leaders. There’s a link to a “Helping Hands” page listing members who have volunteered to accept calls for help on various areas of technology, such as Windows, Networking, Word processing, Spreadsheets and so forth. There are step by step directions for subscribing to the club’s various e-mail groups. Finally, there are links to the club’s governing documents and recent budgets.

All of this combines to make the website a very rich source of information about what’s going on in the club and in the broad field of computing and technology. I encourage our members to spend some time browsing through the site to become familiar with it and to then return often to stay up to date on the club’s many activities.

Kretchmar's Korner

A Fresh Install of Windows 10



If you've completed the upgrade from Windows 7 or 8.1 to Windows 10 and your new operating system does not seem to be working well, you might want to try a clean install of Windows 10 rather than sticking with the upgrade.

Some users have found the upgrade from Windows 7 or 8 to Windows 10 leaves behind too many artifacts from the older operating system. Often this can be fixed with a clean install of Windows 10.

Do the Upgrade to Windows 10 First

The first step if you want to perform a clean install of Windows 10 is to take advantage of Microsoft's upgrade offer and do the **upgrade** install *before* performing a clean install.

When you upgrade a Windows 7 or 8.1 system to Windows 10, Microsoft first confirms that you have a "Genuine Windows" operating system already installed in your computer. Microsoft then activates your computer for use with Windows 10. You don't actually see a Windows 10 product key - Microsoft states that your hardware is registered with Microsoft's servers. When you install Windows 10 on that PC again in the future, it will check in with Microsoft's servers, confirm it's installed on a registered PC, and automatically activate itself.

I have no particular reason not to trust what Microsoft says, or to not trust Microsoft's servers, but if I have my Windows 10 product key, I can manually enter and verify it at the beginning of the install process and know upfront if there is going to be an issue.

If you don't take advantage of the upgrade process first, the registration will never happen and your system will not be issued a Windows 10 product key. A Windows 7 or 8.1 product key will *not* work for activating Windows 10. There is no process that will give you a Windows 10 key if you provide your Windows 7 or 8.1 key.

You can download Microsoft's Windows 10 media creation tool at <https://www.microsoft.com/en-us/software-download/windows10> and select "Upgrade this PC now." It will automatically upgrade you to Windows 10 if your PC is running genuine Windows.



Open Settings, selecting Update & Security, and click on Activation.

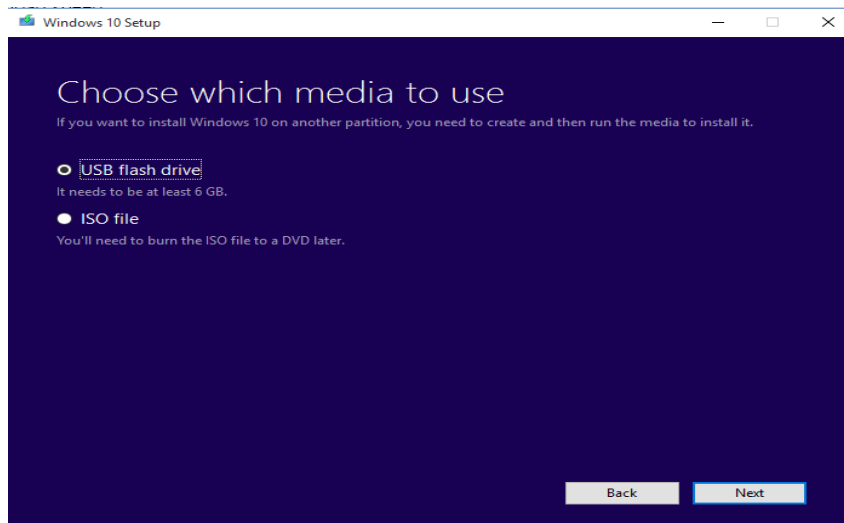
You should see "Windows is activated" here. Also, note whether the edition of Windows 10 you have installed is Windows 10 Home or Windows 10 Pro. Most users will receive the Home edition as the free upgrade, but you'll get Windows 10 Pro if you previously had a Professional edition of Windows 7 or 8.1 installed.

Extract your product key(s)

Once Windows 10 is installed and activated, the new Windows 10 product key can be gleaned from your system using a product such as Belarc Advisor http://www.belarc.com/free_download.html or a more powerful but harder to use program, Lazesoft Recovery Suite <http://www.lazesoft.com/download.html> . These processes will also report the product keys of any installed software, such as Microsoft Office.

What do I do now?

Return to the Microsoft Windows 10 download page <https://www.microsoft.com/en-us/software-download/windows10> and click on the appropriate download tool. This time instead of upgrading your computer you are going to choose "Create installation media for another PC". At a subsequent window you will be given an opportunity to create either an installation DVD or USB installation thumb drive (at least 4 GB).



After you have created the installation media, you will have to enter your system's BIOS (UEFI) and direct it to boot to your DVD or USB drive. Most newer computers have replaced BIOS with the more secure UEFI, so you will have to disable UEFI Secure Boot, select legacy boot (BIOS) and set the system to boot from your installation media. Naturally a custom fresh install of Windows 10 will over write any data on your system, so you will want to back up all of your data before starting the clean installation.
