# Operating Instructions

## PRECAUTIONS

### IMPORTANT INFORMATION, PLEASE READ CAREFULLY BEFORE USING THIS PRODUCT.

This product is intended to safely provide turn-by-turn instructions to get you to a desired destination. Please read the following precautions to ensure that you use this navigation system correctly.

- *This product is not a substitute for your personal judgment. Any route suggestions made by this navigation system should never supersede any local traffic regulations or your personal judgment and/or knowledge of safe driving practices. Do not follow route suggestions if the navigation system instructs you to perform an unsafe or illegal manoeuvre, places you in an unsafe situation, or routes you into an area which you consider unsafe.*
- *Glance at the screen only when necessary and safe to do so. If prolonged viewing of the screen is necessary, stop in a safe and legal manner and location.*
- *Do not input destinations, change settings, or access any functions requiring a prolonged view of the monitor while you are driving. Stop in a safe and legal manner and location before attempting to access the system.*
- *When using the navigation system to find/route to an emergency service, please contact the facility to validate and verify availability, prior to driving to it. Not all locations of emergency service providers such as police and fire stations, hospitals, and clinics are contained in the database. - *The map database contained within the media (SD memory card) in which it is stored is the most recent map data available at the time of production. - *The map database is designed to provide you with route suggestions, it does not take account of the relative safety of a suggested route, or of factors which may affect the time required to reach your destination. # PRECAUTIONS

## Product Cleaning

Use a soft dry cloth for periodic cleaning of the product. For more severe stains, please dampen the cloth with water only. Anything else has the chance of dissolving the paint or damaging the plastic.

## Temperature

Be sure the temperature inside the vehicle is between +45°C (+113°F) and 0°C (+32°F) before turning your unit on.

## Moisture Condensation

You may notice the disc playback sound wavering due to condensation. If this happens, remove the disc from the player and wait about an hour for the moisture to evaporate.

## Damaged Disc

Do not attempt to play cracked, warped, or damaged discs. Playing a bad disc could severely damage the playback mechanism.

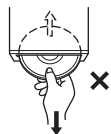
## Maintenance

If you have problems, do not attempt to repair the unit yourself. Return it to your Alpine dealer or the nearest Alpine Service Station for servicing.

## Never Attempt the Following

Do not grip or pull out the disc while it is being pulled back into the player by the automatic reloading mechanism.

Do not attempt to insert a disc into the unit when the unit power is off.



## Inserting Discs

Your player accepts only one disc at a time for playback. Do not attempt to load more than one disc.

Make sure the label side is facing up when you insert the disc. "Unable to read Disc." will be displayed on your player if you insert a disc incorrectly. If "Unable to read Disc." continues to be displayed even though the disc has been inserted correctly, push the RESET switch with a pointed object such as a ballpoint pen. Playing a disc while driving on a very bumpy road may result in skips, but this will not scratch the disc or damage the player.

## Irregular Shaped Discs

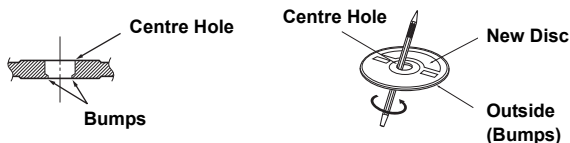
Be sure to use round shaped discs only for this unit and never use any special shaped discs.

Use of special shaped discs may cause damage to the mechanism.



## New Discs

To prevent the CD from jamming, "Unable to read Disc." is displayed if discs with irregular surfaces are inserted or if discs are inserted incorrectly. When a new disc is ejected immediately after initial loading, use your finger to feel around the inside of the centre hole and outside edge of the disc. If you feel any small bumps or irregularities, this could inhibit proper loading of the disc. To remove the bumps, rub the inside edge of the hole and outside edge of the disc with a ballpoint pen or other such instrument, then insert the disc again.



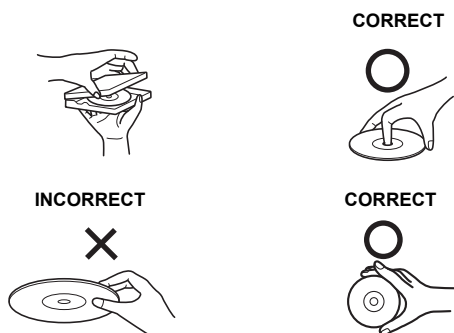
## Installation Location

Make sure the INE-S900R will not be installed in a location subjected to:

- Direct sun and heat
- High humidity and water
- Excessive dust
- Excessive vibrations

## Correct Handling

Do not drop the disc while handling. Hold the disc so you will not leave fingerprints on the surface. Do not affix tape, paper, or gummed labels to the disc. Do not write on the disc.



## Disc Cleaning

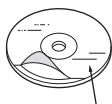
Fingerprints, dust, or soil on the surface of the disc could cause the DVD player to skip. For routine cleaning, wipe the playing surface with a clean, soft cloth from the centre of the disc to the outer edge. If the surface is heavily soiled, dampen a clean, soft cloth in a solution of mild neutral detergent before cleaning the disc.



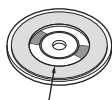


## Disc Accessories

There are various accessories available on the market for protecting the disc surface and improving sound quality. However, most of them will influence the thickness and/or diameter of the disc. Using such accessories can cause operational problems. We recommend not using these accessories on discs played in INE-S900R.

Disc Stabilizer

- After turning the system off, a slight ghost of the image will remain temporarily. This is an effect peculiar to LCD technology and is normal.
- In cold temperature conditions, the screen may lose contrast temporarily. After a short warm-up period, it will return to normal.

Operation of some of the functions of this unit is very complex. Because of this, it was deemed necessary to place these functions into a special screen. This will restrict operation of these functions to times when the vehicle is parked. This ensures the focus of the driver's attention will be on the road and not on the INE-S900R. This has been done for the safety of the driver and passengers. The car must be parked and the parking brake must be engaged for the procedure described in the Owner's Manual to be valid. The warning "No operation while driving - for your safety" will be displayed if any attempts are made to perform these operations while driving.

*The INE-S900R draws minimal current even when its power switch is turned off. If the switched power (ignition) lead of the INE-S900R is connected directly to the positive (+) post of the vehicle's battery, the battery may be discharged.*

*An SPST (Single-Pole, Single-Throw) switch (sold separately) can be added to simplify this procedure. Then, you can simply place it in the OFF position when you leave the vehicle. Turn the SPST switch back ON before using the INE-S900R. For connecting the SPST switch, refer to the "Connection Diagram of SPST Switch (Sold Separately)" (page 139). If the power (ignition) lead is unswitched, it must be disconnected from the battery post should the vehicle be left unused for an extended period of time.*

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## DualDisc

This unit is not compatible with DualDisc.

Using a DualDisc may cause unit malfunction, and may cause disc damage when the disc is inserted/ejected.

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## Double-sided DVD

This unit is not compatible with double-sided DVD.

Using a double-sided DVD may cause unit malfunction, and may cause disc damage when the disc is inserted/ejected.

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## DVD region number (playable region number)

This DVD player will play back any disc whose region number is 2 (or All). DVDs with a region number other than those listed below, cannot be played on this DVD player.



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## Using compact discs (CD/CD-R/CD-RW)

If you use unspecified compact discs, correct performance cannot be guaranteed.

You can play CD-Rs (CD-Recordables)/CD-RWs (CD-ReWritables) which have been recorded only on audio devices.

You can also play CD-Rs/CD-RWs containing MP3/WMA/AAC formatted audio files.

- Some of the following discs may not play on this unit:  
Flawed discs, discs with fingerprints, discs exposed to extreme temperatures or sunlight (e.g., left in the car or this unit), discs recorded under unstable conditions, discs on which a recording failed or a re-recording was attempted, copy-protected CDs which do not conform to the audio CD industry standard.
- Use discs with MP3/WMA/AAC files written in a format compliant with this unit. For details, see pages 63 and 64.

To customers using CD-R/CD-RW

- If a CD-R/CD-RW cannot be played back, make sure the last recording session was closed (finalised).
- Finalise the CD-R/CD-RW if necessary, and attempt playback again.

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## Tips for making your own CDs

The INE-S900R plays DVD Video, Audio CD, DivX® and has a built in MP3/WMA/AAC decoder.

The following information is designed to help you create your own music CDs (either Audio CD or MP3/WMA/AAC encoded CD-R/RW files).

### What is the difference between an Audio and MP3/WMA/AAC CD?

An Audio CD is the same format as the commercial CDs you buy in the store (also known as CD-DA). MP3 (MPEG-1 Audio Layer 3)/WMA (Windows Media Audio)/AAC (Advanced Audio Coding) is a data file that uses a compression scheme to reduce the size of the music file\*.

### Multisession CD-R/CD-RW:

Once a recording has been stopped, this is considered one session. If the disc is not closed (finalised), additional data may be added. Once this additional data has been recorded, this becomes a "multisession" CD. Only the last session of a multisession DATA formatted disc can be played, depending on the writing software that is used to format the disc.

### Properly formatted MP3/WMA/AAC Discs:

Use ISO9660 formatting to insure proper playback. You may use standard ISO naming Level 1 (8.3 DOS standard), Level 2 (32 characters) or Joliet (Windows long filenames) file naming conventions\*.

\* Please consult the Owner's manual for additional information.

### On handling compact discs (CD/CD-R/CD-RW)

- Do not touch the surface.
- Do not expose the disc to direct sunlight.
- Do not affix stickers or labels.
- Clean the disc when it is dusty.
- Make sure that the disc is smooth and flat.
- Do not use commercially available disc accessories.

### Do not leave the disc in the car or the unit for a long time.

### Never expose the disc to direct sunlight.

Heat and humidity may damage the disc and you may not be able to play it again.



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## Using DVD-Rs/DVD-RWs/DVD+Rs/DVD+RWs

- This unit is compatible with discs recorded in the standard DVD-Video formats.
- Note that discs not finalised (processed to enable to play on playback-only DVD players) cannot be played on this DVD player.
- Some discs may not play back, depending on the recording device and disc format.
- Discs or files utilizing copy protection, may not be playable. Some recording systems may not properly format copied files to enable proper playback.
- In the following cases, the disc may not play on this unit: discs recorded by certain DVD recorders, certain irregular discs, flawed discs, dirty discs, when the pickup lens of this DVD player is dirty, or when moisture condensation has occurred inside the unit.
- Be sure to follow all cautions included with your DVD-Rs/DVD-RWs/DVD+Rs/DVD+RWs discs.
- Do not put stickers, seals, or tape on the label side of DVD-Rs/DVD-RWs/DVD+Rs/DVD+RWs.
- Compared to the regular discs, DVD-Rs/DVD-RWs/DVD+Rs/DVD+RWs are more affected by heat, moisture, and direct sunlight. If left in a car, etc., damage may occur and it might not play on this unit.
- The operable temperature range for disc playback is as follows:  
DVD-R/DVD-RW: -25 ~ +70°C  
DVD+R/DVD+RW: +5 ~ +55°C

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## Disc terminology

### Title

If titles are programmed for the DVD, these are the largest units of division of the information recorded on the disc.

### Chapter

Each Title may also be divided into smaller divisions, called chapters. These can be specific scenes or musical selections.

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## Protecting the USB connector

- Only an iPod/iPhone or USB memory can be connected to the USB connector on this unit. Correct performance using other USB products cannot be guaranteed.
- If the USB connector is used, be sure to use only the supplied connector cable with the unit. A USB hub is not supported.
- Depending on the connected USB memory device, the unit may not function or some functions may not be performed.
- The audio file format that can be played back on the unit is MP3/WMA/AAC.
- Artist/song name, etc., can be displayed, however characters may not be correctly displayed.

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## On Handling USB Memory

- This unit can control a memory storage device that supports the USB Mass Storage Class (MSC) protocol. Playable audio file formats are MP3, WMA and AAC.
- USB memory function is not guaranteed. Use USB memory according to the terms of agreement. Read the USB memory Owner's Manual thoroughly.
- Avoid usage or storage in the following locations:  
Anywhere in the car exposed to direct sunlight or high temperatures.  
Anywhere the possibility of high humidity or corrosive substances are present.
- Fix the USB memory in a location where driver operation will not be hindered.
- USB memory may not function correctly at high or low temperature.
- Use only certified USB memory. Note that even certified USB memory, may not function correctly depending on its type or state.
- Depending on the settings of the USB memory type, memory state or encoding software, the unit may not play back or display properly.
- Files protected by DRM (Digital Rights Management), cannot be played back on this unit. These include AAC formatted files purchased from the iTunes Store and WMA or other files with some form of copyright protection.
- USB memory may take time to start playback. If there is a particular file other than audio in the USB memory, it may take considerable time before the file is played back or searched.
- The unit can play back "mp3", "wma" or "m4a" file extensions.
- Do not add the above extensions to a file other than audio data. This non-audio data will not be recognized. The resulting playback may contain noise that can damage speakers and/or amplifiers.
- It is recommended to back up important data on a personal computer.
- Do not remove the USB device while playback is in progress. Change SOURCE to something other than USB, then remove the USB device to prevent possible damage to its memory.



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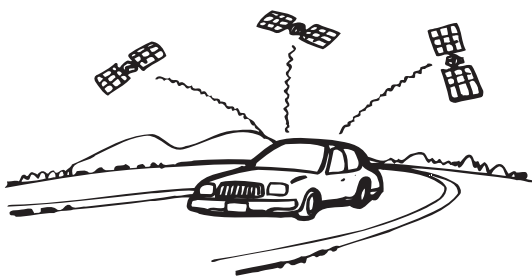
# Getting Started

## Preface

### Navigation systems

This navigation system uses three different sensing devices to determine the present location and to track the progress of the vehicle. These three devices are: a GPS (Global Positioning System) receiver which receives digital signals from GPS satellites to determine the current position of the vehicle, a gyroscope which determines which direction the vehicle turns, and a speedometer pulse sensor which determine how far the vehicle has travelled. Because this system incorporates a gyroscope and a speed sensor, the system will be able to display the vehicle's position and track the vehicle's progress even in areas where the GPS signal may be blocked.

All map data is contained on a removable SD memory card. This system integrates this unique map database with the sensing devices to automatically plot out a route when a destination is entered. While driving, the navigation system guides you along the route with pictorial displays and verbal prompts.



*Altitude display accuracy can vary widely since the system uses only GPS signals for determining altitude approximations. Unlike altitude measurement, map matching accuracy is much more precise due to calculation methods that utilize three inputs: 1) GPS signals, 2) vehicle speed signals, and 3) the system's built-in electronic gyro signals.*

### GPS (Global Positioning System)

This system receives signals from 3 or more GPS satellites (operated by the United States Department of Defense) orbiting at an altitude of 21,000 kilometers and measures the present car position using the same principles as triangulation. If the system receives signals from more than three GPS satellites, positioning becomes possible.

The GPS positioning system uses both three dimensional and two dimensional positioning.

#### Three dimension positioning

If GPS satellite reception is good, the positioning can be performed in three dimensions: latitude/longitude/altitude.

#### Two dimension positioning

When GPS satellite reception is less than optimal positioning is performed in two dimensions: latitude/longitude. In the latter case, since altitude cannot be determined, minor positioning discrepancies can occur three dimension positioning.

#### There may be a delay before the actual vehicle's position is displayed

Determination of the present vehicle's position starts when the ignition key is turned to the ACC or ON position, and ends when the key is turned OFF. When the key is first turned to the ACC or ON position delay of approximately one to two minutes is typical before the present vehicle's position can be displayed.

#### The error from the actual position of the vehicle

When GPS signals can be received from 4 or more satellites, 3 dimensional positioning (altitude, latitude, and longitude) of the vehicle can be determined. In this case, error is in the range of 30 to 200 meters. When GPS signals can only be received from 3 satellites, only two dimensional positioning (latitude and longitude) can be determined, resulting in a slight increase in error. When GPS signals can only be received from less than three satellites, positioning of the vehicle through GPS is not possible. In addition to the inherent GPS error margin, the error rate may also increase if the United States Department of Defense deliberately changes its accuracy.

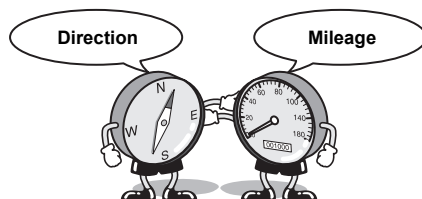
#### Locations where GPS signals are received easily

The optimum locations for receiving GPS signals are locations that command a good view where there are no tall buildings, trees, or other objects to obstruct the signals.

### Gyroscope/ Speed sensor

The gyroscope is a sensor that accurately measures the angle by which the direction of a vehicle or other moving body changes.

Gyroscopes are used in inertial navigation systems for airliners and ships. In this navigation system, the gyroscope is used together with the speed sensor, making it possible to display the position of the vehicle even in locations where GPS signals may be blocked.





### About car positional accuracy on initial use

Accurate Gyroscope/Speed sensor performance is not possible first without accumulating driving some data. The car position may not be correctly displayed after initial installation of the system without inputting information about any previous changes (exchanging the tire, etc.). The error margin between sensor information and GPS data (as calculated from the vehicle position) is continuously analyzed/ revised, resulting in a gradual increase in system accuracy. A measurement is constant even if GPS signals cannot be received avoiding the “filling of the gap” that occurs in running only the Gyro sensor.

## Navigation Terminology

### Navigation

The navigation system displays and tracks the vehicle’s position and movement on a moving map display. When a destination is input, the navigation system quickly calculates a route and guides you along the route with pictorial displays and voice prompts.

### Present Vehicle Position

The present vehicle position is indicated by an arrowhead within a circle

### Map matching

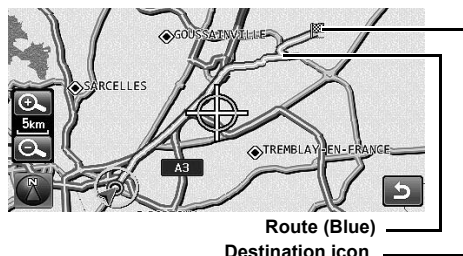
Since GPS navigation has an error window of about 30 m - 200 m, the position of your vehicle may be calculated in such a way that it is displayed incorrectly off the road. Map matching automatically corrects this error so that the position is displayed on the road.

### Destination

The point on the map that is your destination is specified and displayed with the destination icon. You can set up a destination and 4 waypoints for the same journey.

### Route

When a destination is input, the navigation system automatically calculates a route and displays it in blue on the map



### Address book

Locations you go to frequently can be stored into address book and marked on the map. The system can store up to 200 points. You can add icons at the marking locations so that the system also displays the icons on the map.



### Motorway-preference selection

When searching for routes with the navigation system, you can switch between searching for routes that give priority to motorways and those that give priority to ordinary roads. When you specify motorway preference, the navigation system automatically searches for a route that gives priority to motorways and guides you along that route.



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## Features

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### Large Touch-screen Monitor

This device is equipped with touch screen. Just touch the screen to operate this unit. You can also operate it using the remote control (sold separately).

### 18 Languages Selectable

You can choose one of the 18 languages for using this unit.

### Automatic Route Calculation

Just select the destination and your navigation system does the rest, automatically searching for the route you need.

### Real Time Voice Guide

A voice guide informs you of the distance and direction until your course changes, giving advice timed to match road conditions. <NAV> button lets you repeat the last voice guide when needed by just pushing the button. The voice guidance may not be given if the vehicle's present position is too near the destination.

### Map Zooming

You can change the map display in 12 magnification scales.

### 3-Dimensional Map Display

A bird's eye view, 3-dimensional map can also be displayed.

### Multiple-Destination Setting

You can set up to a destination and 4 waypoints in any order you like for the same journey.

### Intersection Zoom (Auto Zoom Map)

As you near intersections and cross points, the map display automatically zooms in to show a more detailed view that you will need. This means there is no need to press the zoom buttons.

### Direct Input of Name of Place of Interest

Input only the name of a place of interest (without inputting the city name) to search for the route to the place of interest.

### Safety Camera Warning

This feature allows you to receive a warning when approaching a Road Safety Camera. You must ensure on your own liability that using this feature is legal in the country where you intend to use.

### Dynamic Route Guidance Function

While following the route you have set, this function continuously searches for alternative routes to optimize travel time. The dynamic route guidance is performed based on TMC restriction events (accident, traffic congestion, etc.).

A message will be displayed to inform you that a route search to avoid a restriction district for a particular day, week, time and the detour point is made automatically.

### Detour of Congestion Area

Areas in London, for example, where a congestion tax has been introduced, are shown in a different colour (scale less than 2 km). You can also search for a detour around a congested area.

### Built-in Gyroscope and Speed Sensors

The gyroscope for sensing direction and the speed pulse sensor for detecting distance provide data which allows the vehicle position and direction to be displayed even in locations where the GPS signals cannot be received, such as between high buildings or in tunnels.

### Built-in RDS-TMC Receiver

Real time traffic information from the Traffic Message Channel (TMC) will be automatically received. In the event of a traffic jam or traffic restriction, etc., you will be informed by voice and visual guidance. TMC traffic information is already broadcast in Austria, Andorra, Belgium, Switzerland, Czech, Germany, Denmark, Spain, France, Liechtenstein, Great Britain, Italy, Luxembourg, Monaco, Norway, Netherlands, San Marino and Vatican City.

*RDS-TMC information may not be received depending on FM radio reception and TMC service conditions.*

### Enjoying DVD with clear pictures

DVD-Video stored in high definition and high-quality sound format can be played. DivX<sup>®</sup> mode and ASF mode are supported.

### Enjoying MP3/WMA/AAC player

CD-R/CD-RW/DVD-R/DVD-RW/DVD+R/DVD+RW or USB memory is playable.

### iPod/iPhone Connection

You can connect iPod/iPhone using an optional cable (sold separately) and play back songs and video in iPod/iPhone.

## About This Navigation System

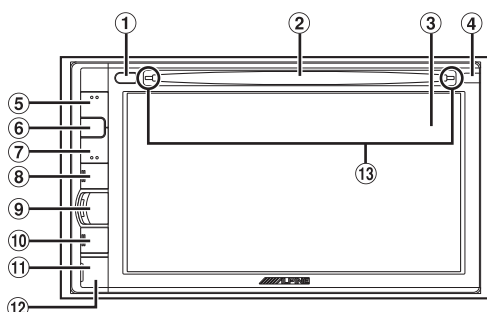
This system is shipped with an SD memory card that is already inserted into the system. The SD memory card contains the necessary data such as map data.

*Usually, you do not need to remove the SD memory card.*

*If the SD memory card is malfunctioning for any reason, consult your nearest Alpine dealer.*

*Do not insert an SD memory card which has been connected to a device other than this unit. It may cause data corruption.*

## Location of Controls



- ① **▲ button**  
Ejects a disc.
- ② **Disc Slot**
- ③ **Monitor**
- ④ **Remote sensor / Dimmer sensor**
  - Point the optional remote control transmitter (RUE-4202) towards the remote sensor within a range of 2 meters. Some operations are possible in Audio/Visual mode.
  - Senses the brightness of the car interior.
- ⑤ **▲ (VOL.)**  
Turns up the volume of the audio/visual mode.
- ⑥ **MUTE**  
Activating this function will instantly lower the volume level by 20 dB.
- ⑦ **▼ (VOL.)**

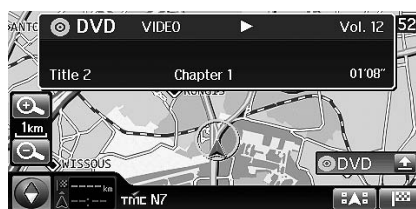

The light will turn off when a disc is inserted.

### Optional Remote Control Interface Box

This unit is operable using the vehicle's secondary radio controls. An Alpine Remote Control Interface Box (optional) is required. For details, contact your Alpine dealer.

### Controllable with Remote Control

This unit can be controlled with an optional Alpine remote control (RUE-4202). Some operations are possible in Audio/Visual mode. For details, consult your Alpine dealer. Point the optional remote control transmitter at the remote control sensor.



### About the button descriptions used in this Owner's Manual

This Owner's Manual uses square brackets to present a touch switch name (e.g. [Destination]), and uses angle brackets to present a button name on the body (e.g. <MENU>).



## Turning the System On

With the Alpine navigation system, when the ignition key is turned to ACC or ON, the opening screen will be automatically displayed.

- 1 When the system is used for the first time, both the language selection menu and important information saying "Disclaimer" are displayed on the same screen. There are 18 languages to choose from. Touch [▲] or [▼] to scroll the list, and then touch the desired language.



After the language has been selected, important information is displayed in each language. Be sure to read the important information.

- 2 After you have read this important information, touch [OK].

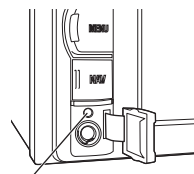
The radio screen is displayed.

*Some of this unit's functions cannot be performed while the vehicle is in motion. Be sure to stop your vehicle in a safe location and apply the parking brake before attempting these operations.*

## Initial System Start-Up

Be sure to press the RESET switch when using the unit for the first time, after changing the car battery, etc.

- 1 Turn off the unit power.
- 2 Remove the cover.




- 3 Press RESET switch with a ballpoint pen or similar pointed object.



# Basic Operation

## Turning Power On or Off

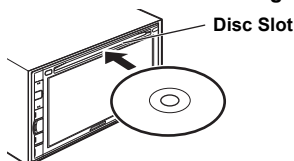
- 1 Turn the ignition key to the ACC or ON position.  
The system is automatically turning on. After turned on, the opening screen appears first and then the mode screen (map screen, radio screen, etc.) appears.
  - When turned on, the system displays the last mode screen that was displayed before the ignition key was turned off. For example, when the navigation mode screen is displayed, if you turn off the ignition key and then turn it on, the system displays the navigation mode screen again.
- 2 To turn off the system, press and hold the <SOURCE/PWR> button for more than 3 seconds.  
The system is turned off.

The unit can be turned on by pressing any button on the unit, except  (Eject).

## Inserting/Ejecting a Disc

### Inserting the Disc

- 1 Insert the disc with the label side facing up.



When you insert the disc up to certain point, it is automatically pulled into the unit. The unit starts to play the disc.

*Do not touch the surface of the disc directly with your fingers. Before inserting or removing the disc, always turn the ignition key to ACC or ON. You cannot remove or insert the disc with the ignition key turned to OFF.*

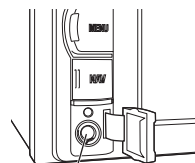
### Removing the Disc

- 1 Press <▲>.  
When the disc has been ejected part way, take it out.  
*If the disc cannot be ejected by pressing <▲>, press and hold <▲> again for at least 10 seconds.*

## Using the Front AUX Input Terminal

Connect a portable music player, etc., by simply connecting it to the input on the front panel. An optional adapter cable is required (standard RCA to 3.5ø mini-phono plug or 3.5ø to 3.5ø mini phono plug). You can also play back video connecting with an optional AV cable (4-pole mini AV plug to 3-RCA).

- 1 Remove the cover from the Front AUX Input Terminal.

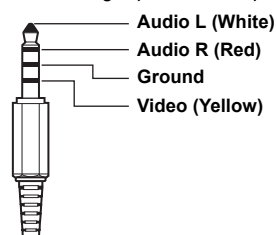


Front AUX Input terminal

- 2 Connect a portable music player, etc., by using an optional adapter cable.

## Adjusting the Volume

You can adjust the volume by the button on the body or the Setup screen.

### Adjusting the volume of the Audio/Visual mode

- 1 Press <^> or <v>.  
 : Turns up the volume.  
 : Turns down the volume.

*Navi MIX Level: The audio volume during the navigation guide can be set by adjusting the audio volume while the navigation guide continues. When the navigation guide finishes, the previous audio volume and the previous screen are restored. For example, if navigation cuts in when the volume is lower than the setting level, the volume during the navigation guide will be reset to the current listening volume. (When the navigation guide cuts in, the audio volume does not increase.)*

### Adjusting the volume of the Navi Guidance

Adjust on the Setup screen.

## Adjusting the volume of the Sound (Beep) Guide

## Lowering Volume Quickly

Activating the Audio Mute function will instantly lower the volume level by 20 dB.

### 1 Press <MUTE> to activate the MUTE mode.

The audio level will decrease by about 20 dB and “Mute” flashes.

### 2 Pressing <MUTE> again will bring the audio back to its previous level.

## Changing between the NAVIGATION menu and the AUDIO/VISUAL menu

### 1 Press <MENU>.

The NAVIGATION menu screen or the AUDIO/VISUAL menu screen appears.

In the navigation mode, the NAVIGATION menu screen appears. In the audio/visual mode, the AUDIO/VISUAL menu screen appears.

### 2 To change to the NAVIGATION menu screen, touch the [NAVIGATION] tab.

To change to the AUDIO/VISUAL menu screen, touch the [AUDIO/VISUAL] tab.



Touch the [NAVIGATION] tab.

Touch the [AUDIO/VISUAL] tab.



If you press <MENU> on the MENU screen, the NAVIGATION menu screen and AUDIO/VISUAL menu screen are switched alternately.

In this Owner's Manual, the navigation instructions assume that the NAVIGATION menu screen appears when the <MENU> button is pressed. Also, the audio/visual instructions assume that the AUDIO/VISUAL menu screen appears when the <MENU> button is pressed.

## Touch operation

You can operate the system by using the touch panel on the screen.

Be sure to touch the switch lightly with the pad of your finger on the display to protect the display.

If you touch a switch and there is no reaction, remove your finger from the display once, and try again.

Touch switches that cannot be operated appear dull in colour.

### Common touch switches

- : Returns to the previous screen. Depending on the function, this switch may cancel the operations performed on the screen.
- : Closes the window.

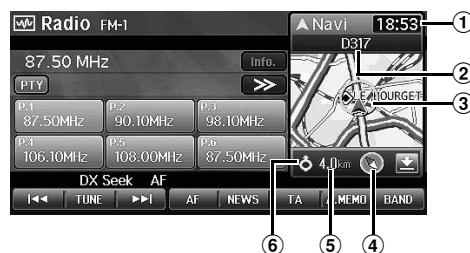
## Window operations

This system uses window displays on the map screen and the AUDIO/VISUAL main screen.

In the NAVIGATION mode, the AUDIO/VISUAL Window is displayed, which allows you to perform simple operations in the AUDIO/VISUAL mode. In AUDIO/VISUAL mode, the current position screen is displayed.

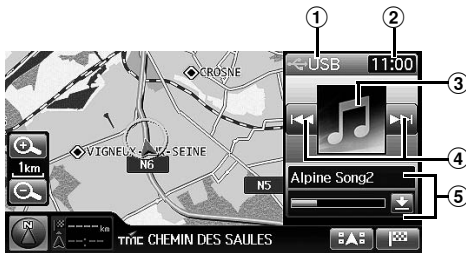

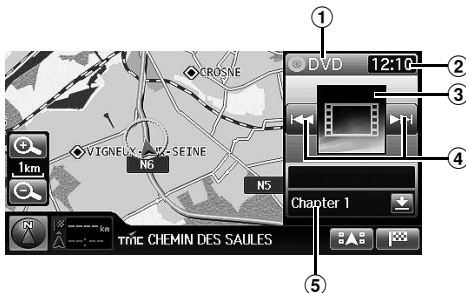

## Selecting an Item in a List

To scroll through a list, perform the following operations.

- 1 Touch [▲] or [▼] to scroll items one by one up or down.



- 2 Touch and hold [▲] or [▼] to scroll quickly through the list.



There are 3 progressive levels of scroll speed.

At first, when you touch and hold, the list scrolls 4 lines per second. After holding for a while, the list scrolls 8 lines per second. After holding even further, the list scrolls 40 lines per second.

- ① When the list is arranged in alphabetical order, an initial letter appears while scrolling at the highest speed.

\* This feature may not be available for some lists.

## Using the On-Screen Keyboard

When you are required to input a character on the screen using the keyboard, the display changes to the keyboard. Use the displayed characters to input information. The following procedure explains how to select characters.

### Entering characters

- 1 Touch the desired character.



- ① **Text window**  
Displays the selected characters/numerals.
- ② **←X (Delete)**  
Returns to the previous character and erases it. Touching here for more than 2 seconds will erase all input characters.
- ③ **Character keypad**
- ④ **OK**  
The selected character is set. The available characters, depending on the item, are shown in the list.
- ⑤ **␣ (Space)**
- ⑥ **Special character selector switch**  
Changes the character keypad to display additional characters.
- ⑦ **Number/symbol selector switch**  
Changes the character keypad to display numbers and symbols.

### Entering number

- 1 Touch the desired number.





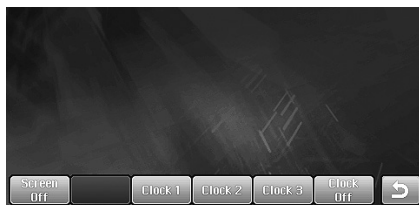

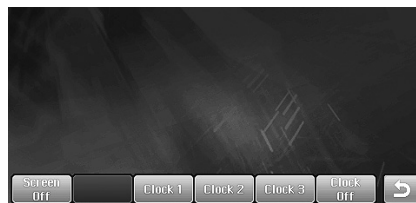

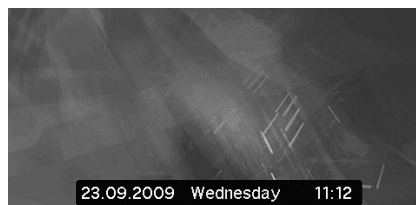

# Navigation

## Basic Operations

### How to View a Navigation Screen

The map screen that shows the position of the vehicle is called the navigation screen. Normally, the vehicle is displayed at the centre of the map screen and the map is automatically scrolled according to the movement of the vehicle.

#### Current Vehicle Position Map (without route)



#### ① POI Icons

The POI icons can be displayed on the map when map scale is 200 m (200 yards) or less.

#### ② Address book Icons

The address book icons can be displayed at the entered locations on the map when map scale is 10 km (6 miles) or less.

#### ③ (Zoom in)

Enlarges the map scale.

#### ④ Map scale

#### ⑤ (Zoom out)

Reduces the map scale.

#### ⑥ Compass Icon


This indicates the orientation of the map. When you set the direction in which the vehicle is moving to up, the red triangle points north.

The icon's color circle also indicates whether the current GPS position is available or not.



: The current GPS position is available.



: The current GPS position is not available.

#### ⑦ Destination information switch

When setting the route, you can change to the manoeuvre list screen by touching this switch. For details, see page 26.

#### ⑧ TMC indicator

For details, see page 53.

#### ⑨ Street name

#### ⑩ switch

Displays/hides the POI Icons. For details, see page 27.

#### ⑪ switch

Displays the Destination screen. You cannot touch the switch while you are driving. For details, see page 30.

#### ⑫ AUDIO/VISUAL window

For details, see page 19 and 20.

#### ⑬ Vehicle position icon

○: This indicates the current position of the vehicle.

▲: This indicates the direction in which the vehicle is moving.

#### ⑭ Clock display

Current time received from GPS is displayed. See "Clock Setup" (page 94).

*Building outline is displayed on the 50 m (50 yards) scale map.*



## Point Display

**① Distance from the current vehicle position**  
Distance in a straight line from the current vehicle position.

**② [Search] switch**  
You can search for facilities in the vicinity of the crosshair icon on the map. For details, see "Finding facilities in the vicinity of the specified location by Scrolling the Displayed Map" (page 38).

**③ [Home] switch**  
Save the cross hair icon's position as Home, enters the position into the address book, or sets the position as the current position. For details, see "Save as Home" (page 41), "Save as Address Book" (page 41) or "Set as Current Position" (page 40).

**④ [Waypoint] switch**  
Adds the cross hair icon's position as a waypoint. For how to add a waypoint, see "Add a Waypoint" (page 42).

**⑤ [Destination] switch**  
Sets the cross hair icon's position as the destination. For how to set the destination, see "Finding a Destination by Scrolling Displayed Map" (page 37).

**⑥ [View icons] switch**  
Appears only when the cross hair icon lays on a POI icon. You can touch the switch to display. See "Finding a Destination by POI icon" (page 38).

**⑦ Crosshair icon**  
Align the crosshair icon over the place to be searched by scrolling the map.

**⑧ Details on the crosshair icon**  
Street names, addresses and POIs (Point of interest) are displayed.

*The selected street's colour changes (scale less than 1 km/800 yards).*

## Displaying a Desired Place

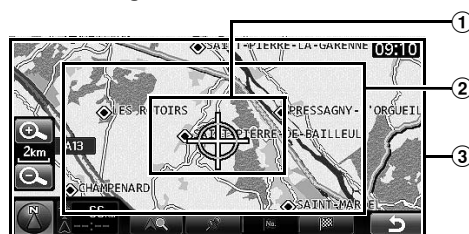
You can search a map for a desired place by scrolling it.

### Scrolling the Map

#### 1 Touch the Map Display.

The map continues to scroll while you touch the map display. When you release the display, the screen becomes the scroll screen in which the straight distance from the current position is displayed.

■ **Scroll speed changes depending on the screen area you are touching.**



**① Area 1**  
Scrolls slow.

**② Area 2**  
Increases the scroll speed in three stages in accordance with how long you touch the screen.

**③ Area 3**  
Scrolls quickly.

*You can not scroll continuously while driving for your safety. Scrolling a 3D map changes it to a 2D map. See "Changing the Map Orientation" (page 25). The <NAV> button returns you to the current car position map. Scrolling is not available in the manoeuvre list screen.*

### Displaying the Current Vehicle Position Map

The screen returns to the present peripheral map after when the map is scrolled, other maps are displayed for searching destination, and the menu screen is displayed.

#### 1 Press <NAV>.

The current car position screen is displayed.

- 1 **Change the map magnification ratio by touching [🔍] (zoom in) or [🔍] (zoom out).**

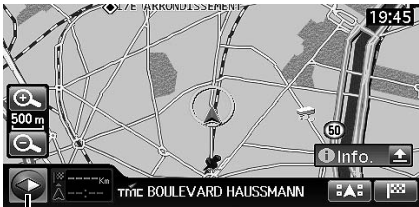


The building outlines can be displayed on the map when map scale is 50 m (50 yards) or less.

## Changing the Map Orientation

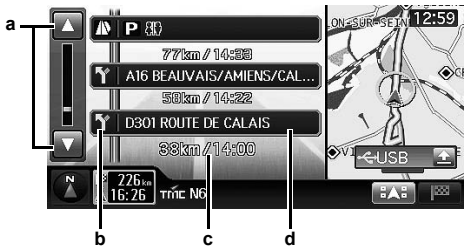

The right map always shows the vehicle position (it cannot be scrolled).  
The Manoeuvre list screen cannot be displayed if the destination is not set.  
Roundabouts are also displayed in the Manoeuvre list screen. When the destination or a waypoint is set on a roundabout, the roundabout is displayed ahead of the destination/waypoint.  
The map display on the right side of the screen switches the head up display when the screen displays the 3D map.

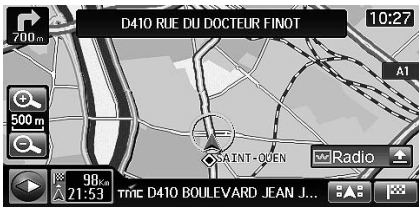

## About Congestion Areas

Areas in London, for example, where a congestion tax has been introduced, display streets in a different colour on the map (scale 2 km/ 1 mile or less). You can also search for a detour of a congested area.

*To automatically find a congestion area detour during a search, set “Congestion charge zone” to Off in the road preference setting. For details, see page 39.*

### ■ If “Congestion charge zone” is set to Off

If the destination is set in a congestion area and a route is searched, a confirmation message is shown.



### ■ If “Congestion charge zone” is set to On

Even if the destination is set in a congestion area, the route is searched as usual.

*When the current vehicle position is in a congestion area, a route is searched, regardless of the congestion area setting.  
If “Congestion charge zone” is set to Off after the destination has been set for a congested area, an alternate route through the congested area will be searched. If you want to avoid the congested area, do another search, setting the destination outside the congested area.*



## Caution

*If “Congestion charge zone” is set to Off, in searching for a route through a congested area, decide your own detour route.*



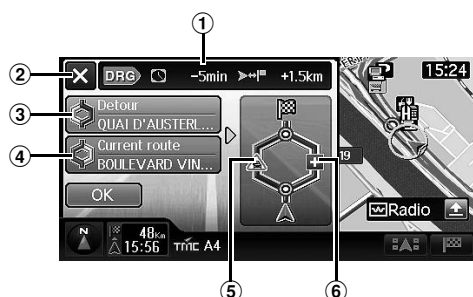
## About Dynamic Route Guidance

The DRG (dynamic route guidance) updates traffic changes from moment to moment, providing you with a more accurate anticipated arrival time.

The dynamic route guidance is performed based on TMC restriction event (accident, traffic congestion, etc.). When an optimal route is found, the message is shown in the display and automatically changes the route (when the DRG is set to Auto). For details, refer to page 103.

### If the Dynamic route guidance is set to Manual

If an optimal route is found using the dynamic route guidance function, the DRG screen appears. You can select a Detour route or the Current route.



① **DRG information display**

The time reduction and distance reduction/increase appear.

② **X switch**

Close the DRG screen display and continue the guidance along the current route.

③ **Detour route selection switch**

The street name is displayed.

④ **Current route selection switch**

The street name is displayed.

⑤ **Current route information display**

The TMC event icon that causes the detour is displayed.

⑥ **Detour route information display**

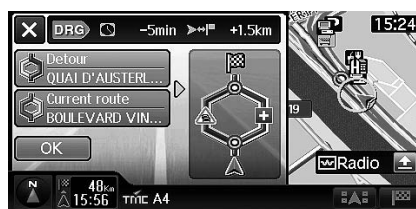
The distance reduction/increase indication icons

**+**: The distance will be increased compared with the current route distance.

### 1 Touch [Detour] or [Current route].



### 2 Touch [OK].

The route is changed or remains on the current route, and the guidance starts.

*If there is no operation for 30 seconds, the current route is selected. While the DRG screen is displayed, if you drive along the detour route, the detour route is selected. If you drive along the current route, the current route is selected.*

### If the Dynamic Route Guidance is set to Auto

If an optimal route is found using the Dynamic Route Guidance function, the route will be automatically changed to a new route.

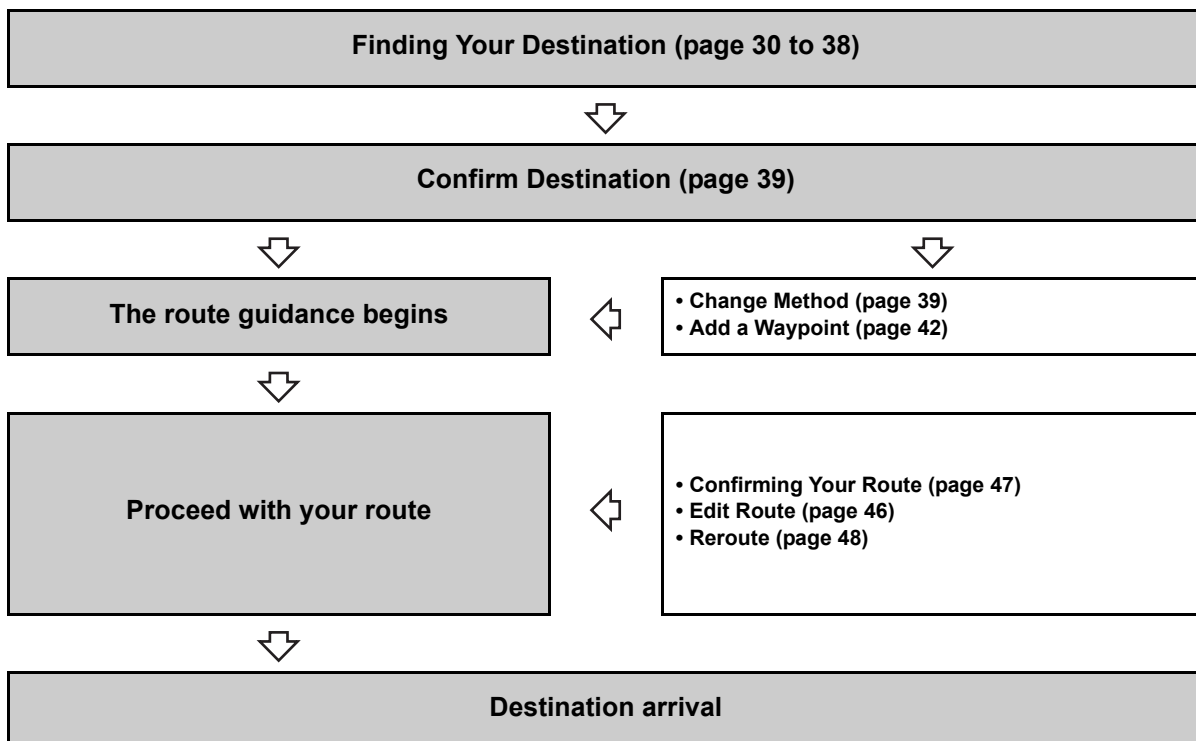

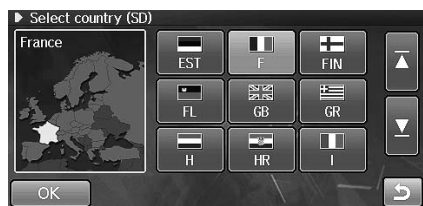

## Guidance Display

This section describes various guidance features presented as you drive along the route.

### Intersection/junction guidance



#### ① Distance gauge

The distance to the intersection is indicated.

#### ② Street name display

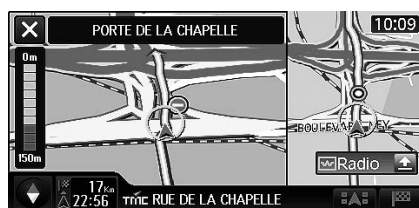
The next street name is displayed.

- To cancel the magnified intersection screen, touch [X].
- The intersection name display or lane display may differ from the actual intersection.
- The intersection guidance may be delayed or may be very early.
- Touch [X] to close the Intersection/junction guidance. Press <NAV> to display the Intersection/junction guidance again.

When “Setting the Intersection Guidance” (page 102) is set to On, the intersection/junction guidance view is displayed. You can set the following items.

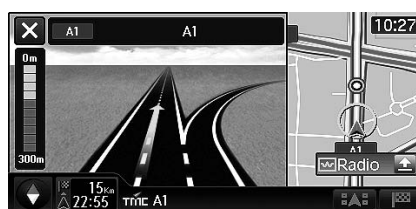
### Intersection magnified view

If the system has image data of the approaching intersection, the magnified view is displayed.



### Motorway junction guidance view

While you are driving on a motorway/toll road, if the system has image data of the junction, the motorway junction guidance view is displayed.



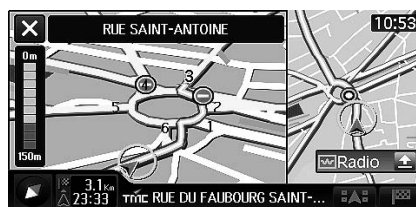
### Manoeuvre arrow guidance view

When the intersection is approaching, the system displays an arrow to indicate the direction in which to turn.



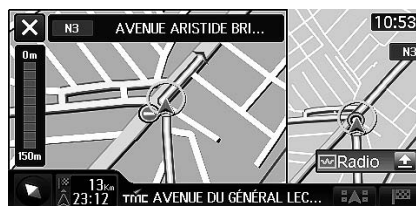
### Roundabout magnified guidance view

The system magnifies a roundabout to display guidance.



### Motorway entrance/exit ramp guidance

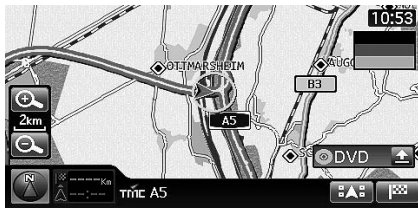
The system displays the magnified view of a motorway entrance/exit ramp to provide guidance.





## Border guidance

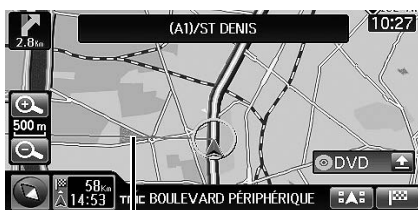
When you have crossed a border, the national flag is displayed.

## Direction line display

The direction line can be displayed to indicate the direction from the current position to the destination/waypoint.



Direction line

You can set to display or not to display the direction line. See "Setting the Direction line Display" (page 101).

## Voice Guidance

While you are driving along the route, voice guidance is provided according to the driving conditions and the vehicle speed. During guidance to the destination, the system automatically provides voice guidance on intersections, turnings, waypoints, motorway entrance/exit ramps, junctions, the arrival at the destination, etc. "Voice guidance examples" are only typical examples. The voice guidance may vary depending on traffic conditions. Use the voice guidance examples for reference only.

You can adjust the volume of the voice guidance. (See "Navi Guidance Volume Adjustment" on page 92.)

## Examples for voice guidance to the destination

### General road intersection voice guidance

Intersection announcements to turn left or right are voice guided while driving on the route.

#### Example of voice guidance

- In 200 m, right turn.
- Right turn.

### Motorway divergence voice guidance

The direction is voice guided and a screen is displayed in large scale at the divergence while driving the route on a motorway.

#### Example of voice guidance

- In 2 km, keep right.

## Examples for voice guidance on arrival at the destination/waypoint/ferry port/car train terminal

- Your destination is in 1 km.
- Approaching the destination.
- You have arrived at your destination.
- Ferry port.
- Car train terminal.

## Confirming the voice guidance

The voice message is repeated by pressing the <NAV> button.

When the guide volume is set to OFF (VOL 0), voice guidance is not performed even if the <NAV> button is pressed.

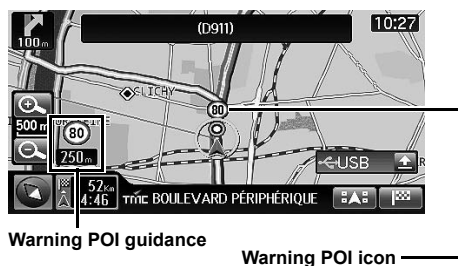


## Personal POI guidance

You can display the Personal POI data (POI warning data/Custom POI data) on the map screen by updating the information via the USB memory.

An alarm can be set to inform you of when you are nearing a POI warning location. For details on how to update and set the Personal POI, see “Personal POI Setup” (page 105).

### ■ Example of displaying Warning data



*Warning POI guidance is provided when you are driving. Manoeuvre the guidance is provided only when you are approaching from the direction specified.*

*Warning POI guidance is provided 600 m (600 yards) and 200 m (200 yards) before the POI on motorways/toll roads, and 250 m (250 yards) and 80 m (80 yards) before the POI on non-motorway roads.*

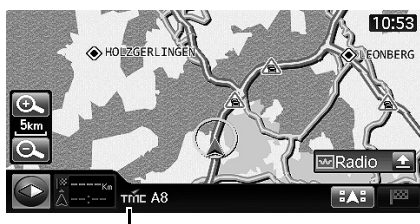

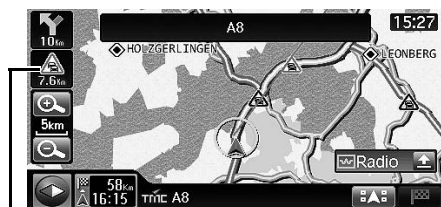

## Turning AF (Alternative Frequencies) On or Off

The RDS (Radio Data System) is a radio information system using the 57 kHz subcarrier of regular FM broadcast. The RDS allows you to receive a variety of information such as traffic information, station names, and to automatically re-tune to a stronger transmitter that is broadcasting the same programme.

### 1 Touch [AF] to select the AF (Alternative Frequency) ON or OFF mode.

The "AF" indicator appears in the display.

*When the AF ON mode is selected, the unit automatically tunes to a strong signal station in the AF list.*

*Use the AF OFF mode when automatic re-tuning is not required.*

#### Tips

*If the unit receives the PTY31 (Emergency Broadcast) signal, the unit will show "Alarm" in the display only when PTY31 is set to On. For operation, refer to "Setting PTY31 (Emergency Broadcast) Reception" (page 110).*

## Receiving Traffic Information Automatically

Traffic information is heard only when it is being broadcast. If traffic information is not being broadcast, the unit is set in the standby mode.

When a traffic information broadcast begins, the unit automatically receives it and the display shows "Traffic information".

When traffic information broadcast is over, the unit will automatically set to the standby mode.

*If the traffic information broadcast signal falls below a certain level, the unit remains in the receiving mode for 1 minute. If the signal remains below a certain level for over 70 seconds, "TA" blinks in the display.*

*If you do not want to listen to the traffic information being received, touch [TA] to skip that traffic information message. You can also skip it by pressing <SOURCE/PWR>.*

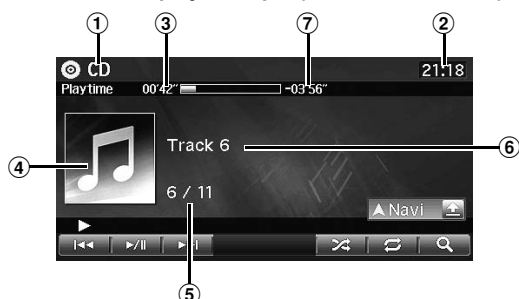

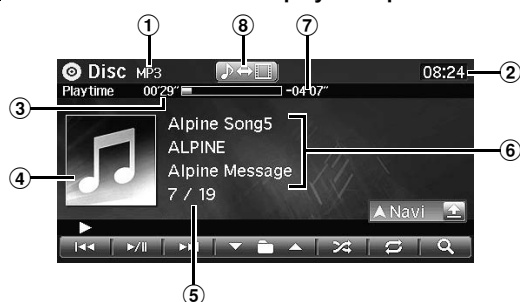

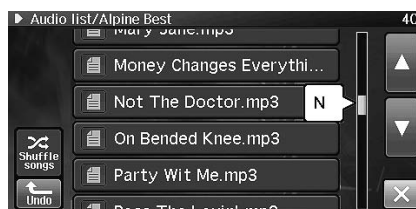

# About MP3/WMA/AAC

## CAUTION

*Except for private use, duplicating audio data (including MP3/WMA/AAC data) or distributing, transferring, or copying it, whether for free or for a fee, without permission of the copyright holder is strictly prohibited by the Copyright Act and by international treaty.*

## What is MP3?

MP3, whose official name is "MPEG-1 Audio Layer 3", is a compression standard prescribed by the ISO, the International Standardization Organization and MPEG, which is a joint activity institution of the IEC.

MP3 files contain compressed audio data. MP3 encoding is capable of compressing audio data at extremely high ratios, reducing the size of music files to as much as one-tenth their original size. This is achieved while still maintaining near CD quality. The MP3 format realizes such high compression ratios by eliminating the sounds that are either inaudible to the human ear or masked by other sounds.

## What is AAC?

AAC is the abbreviation for "Advanced Audio Coding", and is a basic format of audio compression used by MPEG2 or MPEG4.

## What is WMA?

WMA, or "Windows Media™ Audio," is compressed audio data. WMA is similar to MP3 audio data and can achieve CD quality sound with small file sizes.

## Method for creating MP3/WMA/AAC files

Audio data is compressed using software with MP3/WMA/AAC codecs. For details on creating MP3/WMA/AAC files, refer to the user's manual for that software. MP3/WMA/AAC files that are playable on this device have the file extensions.

MP3: ".mp3"

WMA: ".wma" (ver. 2, 7, 8, 9 are supported)

AAC: ".m4a"

WMA is not supported for the following files. Windows Media Audio Professional, Windows Media Audio 9 Voice or Windows Media Audio 9 Pro Lossless.

There are many different versions of the AAC format. Confirm that the software being used conforms to the acceptable formats listed above. It is possible that the format may be unplayable even though the extension is valid.

Playback of AAC files encoded by iTunes is supported.

This device may not play back correctly depending on sampling rates.

## ID3 tags/WMA tags

This device supports ID3 tag v1 and v2, and WMA tag. If tag data is in an MP3/WMA/AAC file, this device can display the title (track title), artist name, and album name ID3 tag/WMA tag data (maximum 64 characters).

For non-supported characters, blank character is displayed.

The number of characters may be limited, or not correctly displayed, depending on the tag information.

## Playing back MP3/WMA/AAC

MP3/WMA/AAC files are prepared, then written to a CD-R, CD-RW (DVD-R/DVD-RW/DVD+R/DVD+RW) using CD-R writing software and USB memory.

Disc: 4,096 files/256 folders (including Root Folders)  
USB memory: 10,000 files/1,000 folders (including Root Folders)

Playback may not be performed if a disc exceeds the limitations described above.

If a file/folder name is long, the maximum possible number of files may decrease.

- Both Audio and Video files are counted if their formats are playable on this unit.

## Media supported

The media that this device can play back are CD-ROMs, CD-Rs, CD-RWs, DVD-Rs, DVD-RWs, DVD+Rs, DVD+RWs and USB memory.

## Corresponding File Systems

This device supports discs formatted with ISO9660 Level 1 or Level 2.

Under the ISO9660 standard, there are some restrictions to remember.

The maximum nested folder depth is 8 (including the root directory). The number of characters for a folder/file name is limited.

Valid characters for folder/file names are letters A-Z (all caps), numbers 0-9, and '\_' (underscore).

This device can play back discs in Joliet, Romeo, etc., and other standards that conform to ISO9660. However, sometimes the file names, folder names, etc., are not displayed correctly.

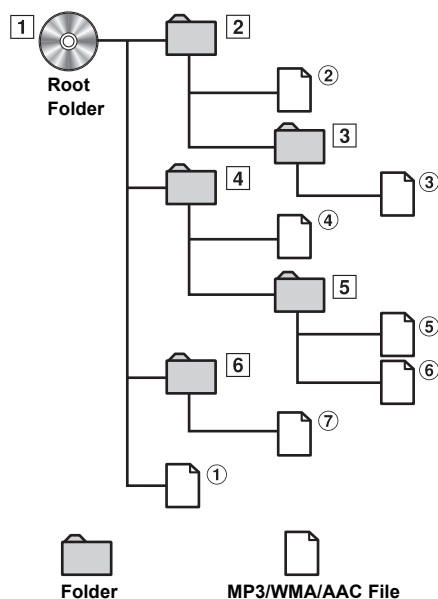
This device supports Mixed Mode CD, Enhanced CD (CD-Extra) and Multi-Session.

This device cannot correctly play back discs recorded with Track At Once or packet writing.



## Order of files

Files are played back in the order that the writing software writes them to the disc. Therefore, the playback order may not be what's expected. Verify the writing order in the software's documentation. The playback order of the folders and files is as follows. (The following numbers may differ from actually displayed numbers.)



## Terminology

### Bit rate

*This is the “sound” compression rate specified for encoding. The higher the bit rate, the higher the sound quality, but also the larger the files.*

### Sampling rate

*This value shows how many times per second the data is sampled (recorded). For example, music CDs use a sampling rate of 44.1 kHz, so the sound is sampled (recorded) 44,100 times per second. The higher the sampling rate, the higher the sound quality, but also the larger the volume of data.*

### Encoding

*Converting music CDs, WAVE (AIFF) files, and other sound files into the specified audio compression format.*

### Tag

*Song information such as track titles, artist names, album names, etc., written into MP3/WMA/AAC files.*

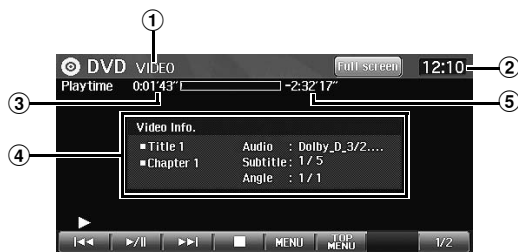

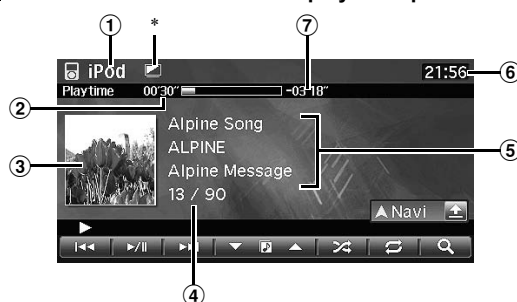

If [] is not displayed during video file playback, touch [1/2] to change the operation switch.

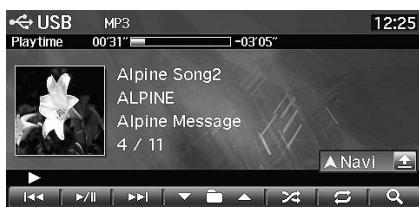

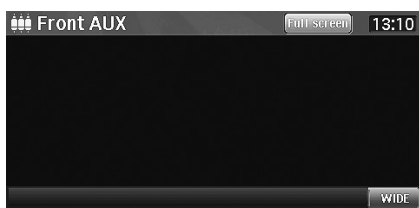

The passcode is set, and the system returns to the previous screen.

To change the passcode after setting once, enter the old passcode once, then enter the new passcode twice.

## Setting the Auto Storing Call History

You can set whether or not the history data of the mobile phone is automatically transferred to the system when it is connected to the system.

**Setting item: Storing call history**

**Setting contents: On (Initial setting) / Off**

**On:** The mobile phone's history data is transferred.

**Off:** The mobile phone's history data is not transferred.



# Rear Camera Operation (Optional)

## Turning the Rear Camera On and Off

Set "Setting the Rear Camera" (page 93) to On.

### 1 Shift the gear lever to the reverse position (reversing).

The rear view image is displayed while the car remains in reverse.

### 2 If you shift the gear lever to a position other than reverse (reversing), the monitor returns to the previous screen.

- Refer also to the Owner's Manual of the rear camera.
- Be sure to also check behind and around the car visually. Use the camera image to assist in showing conditions behind and around the car.
- Depending on where the unit is installed, actual conditions may differ from the displayed image.

### About the rear camera guide

To display the guide, set "Rear camera guide line display setting" (page 93) to On. Also, to adjust the guide, see "Adjusting the Rear Camera Guide line" (page 93). You can also turn off the guide in the Rear camera display screen.

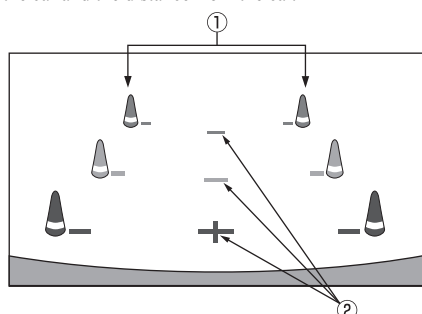
### 1 Touch [Guide Off] on the Rear camera display screen.

The guide line disappears, and then the [Guide Off] switch changes to [Guide On].

### 2 Touch [Guide On] to turn on the guide.

### ■ Indication mark meaning

When you put the car in reverse gear, the monitor screen switches to the rear camera view and the guides appear to help you to perceive the width of the car and the distance from the car.



### ① Car width extension marks (red, yellow and green in order of proximity)

The marks are the extension lines of the width of the car, which provide guidance for the path of the car when you drive straight in reverse.

The marks represent the distance from the rear of the car (from the rear end of the bumper).

The marks do not move in synchronisation with the steering wheel.

Each centre position of the mark represents about 0.5 m (red), about 1 m (yellow) and about 2 m (green) behind.

### ② Distance guidance marks

The marks represent the distance from the rear of the car (from the rear end of the bumper).

The marks do not move in synchronisation with the steering wheel.

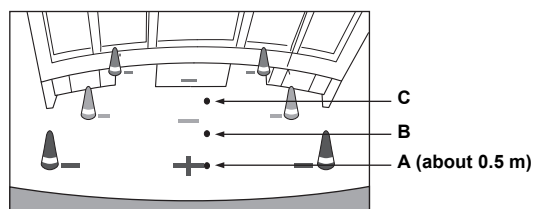
Each centre position of the mark represents about 0.5 m (red), about 1 m (yellow) and about 2 m (green) behind.

- Depending on the condition of the car or road surface, the range of vision may vary.
- The camera's range of vision has a limit. Objects near both ends of the bumper and objects under the bumper may be out of sight of the camera.
- The rear camera image may have a tint which is different from the actual surroundings.
- Depending on the car, the guidance may deviate to the right or left. This is not a malfunction.

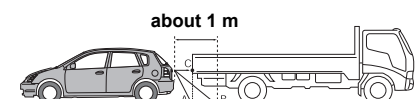
### ■ Distance guidance mark

The distance guidance mark represents the distance to the road surface, so you cannot measure the distance to an object on the road surface.

<Positions of A, B and C>



In the screen, according to the distance guidance marks, the truck seems to be parked about 1 m away (at the position B). In actual fact, however, if you reversed to position A, you would collide with the truck. In the screen, positions A, B and C seem to be located in order of proximity. However, in actual fact, the position A and C are the same distance, and B is far there away than positions A and C.

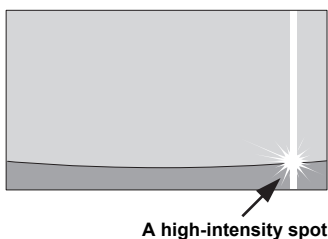
- The car width extension mark represents the distance to the road surface, so when an object on the road surface is displayed on the screen, the mark does not represent the actual distance to the object.



- In the following conditions, screen visibility may be impaired. This is not a malfunction.
  - When it is dark (during the night, etc.).
  - When the temperature around the camera lens is high or low.
  - When water drops adhere to the camera, or when the humidity is high (such as rainy weather, etc.).
  - When foreign bodies (such as mud, etc.) adhere to the camera or its peripheral area.
  - When sunlight or headlights directly strike the camera lens.
  - When a CCD camera is connected, if a high-intensity spot (such as a reflection of the sunlight on a car body) is shot by the camera, a smear phenomenon\* which is peculiar to CCD cameras, may occur.

\* **Smear phenomenon:**

A phenomenon which occurs when a high-intensity spot (such as a reflection of the sunlight on a car body) is shot by the camera, a tail is formed up and down (vertical direction) of the spot.

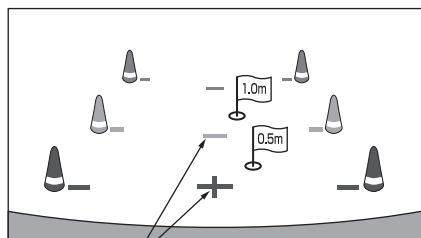


**Error between the screen and the actual road surface**

In the following conditions, errors are produced between the screen guidance and the actual road surface. (The illustrations represent a case when the camera is installed in the standard position.)

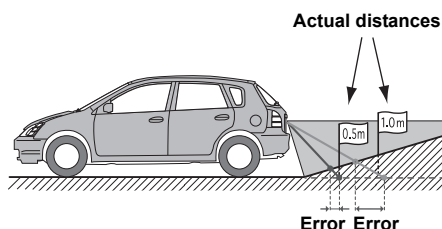

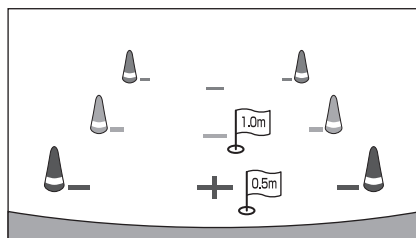

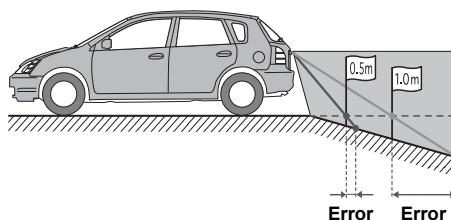

Therefore in the case of an upward slope behind the car, the distance guidance mark is displayed as closer than the actual distance. For example, if there is an obstacle on the upward slope, it may appear farther away than its actual position. Also, an error may occur between the guidance and the actual path of the car on the road surface.

■ **When there is a steep downward slope behind the car (example)**

The Parking Brake must be engaged to access the Setup screen. Attempting to access this screen while driving will display the warning "No operation while driving - for your safety."

## General Setup Operation

The following steps 1 to 6 are common operations to each "Setting item" of General Setup. Refer to each section for details.

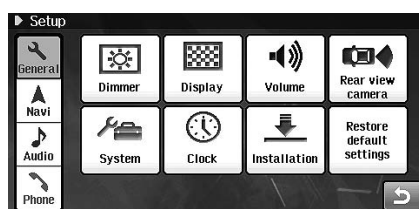

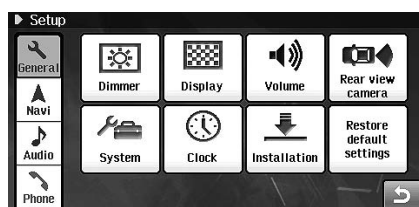

**Dimmer:** Automatically adjusts the illumination of the unit to the brightness of the car interior.

**Illum.:** Set the Illumination to decrease the illumination brightness of the unit with the head lights of the vehicle ON.

**On:** Keep the background illumination of the monitor dark.

**Off:** Deactivate Auto Dimmer mode to keep the background illumination of the monitor bright.

Scroll display is available if CD text, file name or tag information is entered.

**On:** Turns on the AUTO scroll mode. Scroll display is repeated as long as the mode is turned on.

**Off:** Turns off the AUTO scroll mode. Scroll display is done once as a track is changed.

- The display scrolls on the unit when the screen is filled up.

You can adjust the volume of the Sound Guide.

**Setting contents: Off, 1 to 7 (Initial setting: 4)**

### Navi Guidance Volume Adjustment

The volume of the guidance voice is adjusted in 8 steps.

**Setting item: Guidance**

**Setting contents: Off, 1 to 7 (Initial setting: 4)**

### Guidance volume confirmation

1 Touch [Test].

The test tone is output with the adjusted volume setting.



## Auto volume Adjustment

When you set this item to a value from 1 to 6, as you accelerate the volume of the system is automatically turned up. The higher setting value brings about the higher rate of increase in volume.

**Setting item:** Auto volume control

**Setting contents:** Off, 1 to 6 (Initial setting: Off)

## Rear view camera Setup

### Adjusting the Rear Camera Guide line

You can adjust the rear camera guide line position.

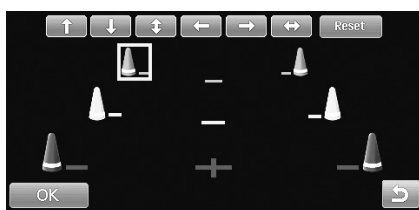

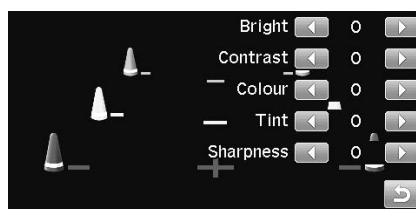

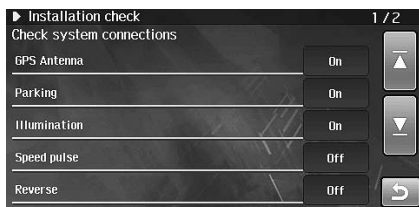

To provide accurate guidance, the system accumulates comparative data between the GPS signal and the vehicle speed pulse signal. You can check the progress of accumulated data on the screen. Furthermore, you can fine-tune the current position display. Usually, you can use the system without any calibration. However, if the current position generally deviates from the actual position, perform "Reset calibration". After performing, drive along a road with good visibility for several tens of km to complete the auto calibration. If the movement of the current position mark on the map deviates from the actual movement of the vehicle even after performing the reset calibration and auto calibration, perform the manual calibration.

Setting contents: -100.0% to +600.0%  
(Initial settings: -1.2%)

Depending on the condition of your vehicle, or after replacing the tyres or wheels, the movement of the current position on the map may deviate from the actual vehicle movement. You can use this function to fine-tune the movement of the current position (the initial setting is -1.2 %).

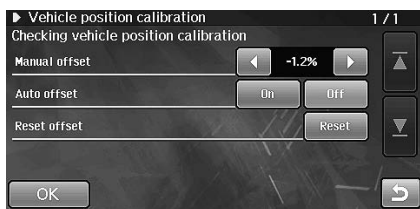

## Formatting the SD memory card

When formatting the SD memory card, stored data (map data, etc.) is deleted. As a result, normally you cannot use this function, and only Alpine dealer formats the SD memory card.

When you format the SD memory card, all data stored in it is deleted. If the SD memory card does not properly work for some reason, or the system does not recognize the SD memory card, format it with the system. Note that you cannot restore the deleted data.

The system is rebooted. After the reboot, format completes.

- Note the following until the mode screen (map screen, radio screen, etc.) is displayed after the reboot.

## Initializing the System

You can initialize all data such as marked positions, setting item values, etc., to restore the factory settings. Remove the DVD/CD disc, etc., from the system before operation.

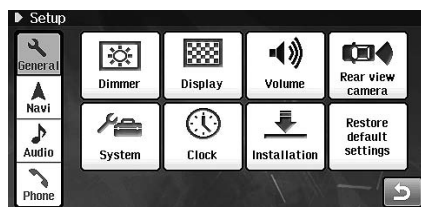

When the Dimmer setting is set to "Dimmer", the switching between the day screen and the night screen depends on the brightness of the car interior. 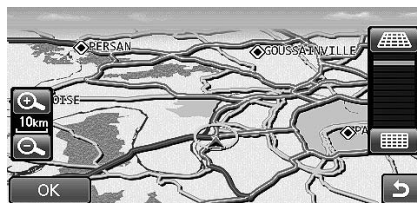

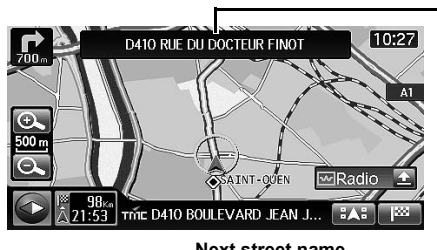

**Off:** The system does not provide Border guidance.

### The estimated Arrival Time Display Setting

You can set to display the estimated arrival time in which way: always displays the arrival time to the destination, or displays the arrival time to a waypoint (if existent).

### Setting the Arrival Time

When the system calculates a route, it also estimates the time it will take to the destination. Arrival is displayed in the time of the destination time zone, or remaining time is displayed.

If the difference in volume level between the CD and FM radio is too great, adjust the FM signal level as follows.

### PI SEEK Setting

**Setting item: PI seek**

**Setting contents: Auto / Off (Initial setting)**

### Receiving RDS Regional (Local) Stations

When Off is selected, the unit automatically keeps receiving the related local RDS station.

**Setting item: RDS regional**

**Setting contents: On (Initial setting) / Off**

### Setting PTY31 (Emergency Broadcast) Reception

PTY31 (Emergency Broadcast) reception can be set to On/Off.

**Setting item: PTY31(ALARM)**

**Setting contents: On (Initial setting) / Off**

- *The unit automatically gives priority to an emergency broadcast whenever it begins, and interrupts the programme you are currently listening to when PTY31 is set to on.*
- *The unit will show “Alarm” in the display during PTY31 reception.*



## DVD Setup

You can perform DVD setup in DVD mode.

Once set, this becomes the default language. This function is convenient when you always want to listen in English. (The language setting is not effective on some discs. If not, the default language is set from the factory.)

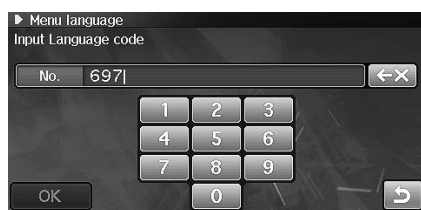

- Not all DVDs provide a Parental Lock feature. If you are unsure about a DVD, play it first to confirm. Do not leave DVDs accessible to young children for whom you deem them inappropriate.

## Changing the Passcode

#### 16:9 WIDE:

Select this when connected to a wide screen TV. This is the factory setting.

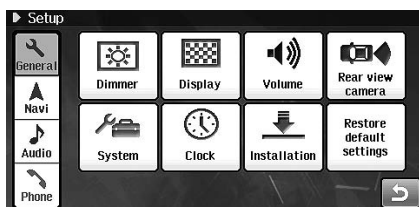

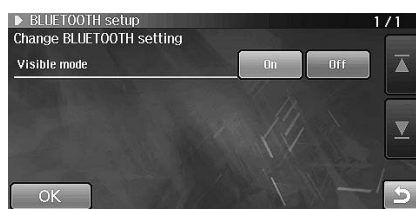

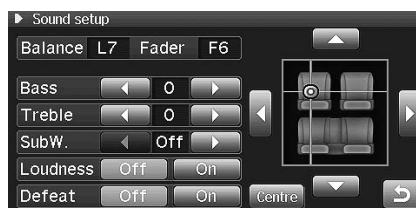

- Adjustment cannot be performed when Defeat is set to On.

## Adjusting the Subwoofer Level

You can set the Subwoofer level when a Subwoofer is connected. When no Subwoofer is connected, this item is set to Off.

**Setting item:** SubW.

**Setting contents:** Off, 0 to +15 (Initial setting: Off)

## Setting the Loudness

Loudness introduces a special low- and high-frequency emphasis at low listening levels. This compensates for the ear's decreased sensitivity to bass and treble sound at these levels.

**Setting item:** Loudness

**Setting contents:** Off (Initial setting) / On

- Adjustment cannot be performed when Defeat is set to On.

## Turning Defeat ON or OFF

If you set the Defeat to On, the Bass/Treble/Loudness settings return to the initial settings. If you set to Off, they resume to the set value.

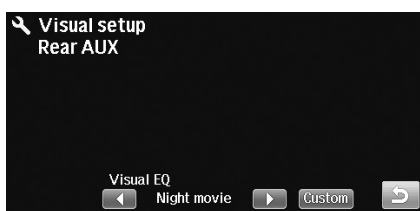

**Setting item: Colour**

**Setting contents: -15 to +15**

- *Tint adjustment cannot be made in Navigation mode/Audio mode .*

### **Adjusting Tint of Picture**

Adjust the colour from Green (-15) to Red (+15). “Green” or “Red” is displayed at the maximum of each colour.

**Setting item: Tint**

**Setting contents: -15 to +15**

- *Tint adjustment cannot be made in Navigation mode/Audio mode .*

### **Adjusting Picture Quality**

Picture sharpness adjustment range is from Soft (-15) to Hard (+15). “Hard” and “Soft” appear as the maximum and minimum values specified.

**Setting item: Sharpness**

**Setting contents: -15 to +15**

- *Tint adjustment cannot be made in Navigation mode/Audio mode.*

## **Storing and recalling the picture quality adjustment values**

You can store Bright, Contrast, Tint, Colour and Sharpness that you adjusted for Visual source. You can also recall the stored adjusted values.

- 1 After adjusting Bright, Contrast, Tint, Colour and Sharpness (page 118), touch and hold [Preset 1] or [Preset 2].**

The adjusted setting values are stored.

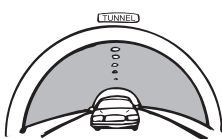
# Information

## Fluctuation of the Current Position or Tracks

The fluctuation can be made smaller by combining the GPS, the self-contained navigation, and the map matching. However, these functions may not operate correctly according to conditions, and fluctuation may be considerable.

### Fluctuation by GPS Positioning not Acceptable

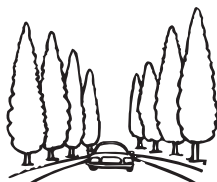
When only the radio waves of two GPS satellites or less can be received, the positioning by GPS cannot be performed. When the vehicle is in the following places, positioning by GPS cannot be performed because the radio waves of the GPS satellite are interrupted and cannot be received.



In tunnels and indoor parking lots



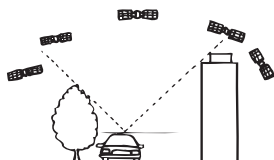

When GPS satellite is low on the horizon (angle below 10°), obstructions sometimes make normal reception impossible

In the following cases, the radio waves of the GPS satellites may be temporarily not be receivable due to radio interference.

- When using a satellite phone or mobile phone near the GPS antenna.

In the following cases, the GPS satellite signals may not be receivable.

- A roof rack is used (GPS antenna installed on roof of car).
- A metallic object is near the GPS antenna (GPS antenna installed inside car).
- A window film that contains metal is installed in the car (GPS antenna installed inside car).

### Fluctuation by GPS Satellites

GPS satellites are managed by the United States Department of Defence, and may transmit positional data that the satellite intentionally shifted. The fluctuation of the positioning grows at such time.

Measure the current position with the fluctuation of approx. 10 to 100 m when performing three dimension positioning. The fluctuation of the two dimension positioning grows a little in the case of three dimension positioning.

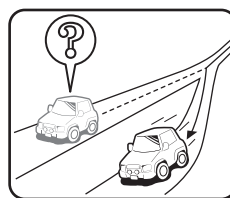
Insufficient accuracy may result when the location of GPS satellites is unfavourable (when the satellites are in similar direction or similar height). (When radio waves from two or more satellites immediately above the vehicle and a very limit horizon in north, south, east, and west is received, the best accuracy is obtained for GPS positioning.)

For the accuracy of GPS positioning, the fluctuation in the direction of height grows a little compared with the horizontal direction.

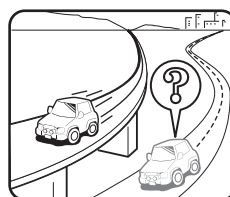
Since satellite signals from around the earth's opposite hemisphere cannot be received, height comparison cannot be sufficiently performed.

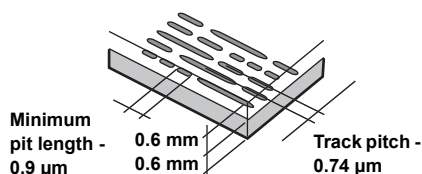
## About DVDs

Music CDs and DVDs have grooves (tracks) in which the digital data is recorded. The data is represented as microscopic pits recorded into the track – these pits are read by a laser beam to play the disc. On DVDs, the density of the tracks and pits is twice that of CDs, so DVDs can contain more data in less space.

### DVDs



A 12 cm disc can contain one movie or about four hours of music. In addition, DVDs provide sharp picture quality with vivid colours thanks to a horizontal resolution of over 500 lines (compared to less than 300 for VHS tape).

### In addition, DVDs offer a variety of functions.

#### **Multiple audio\* (page 70)**

Movies can be recorded in up to eight languages. The desired language can be selected from the unit.

#### **Subtitles function\* (page 70)**

Movies can include subtitles in up to 32 languages. The desired subtitle language can be selected from the unit.

#### **Multi angle function\* (page 70)**

When the DVD contains a movie shot from multiple angles, the desired angle can be selected from the unit.

#### **Multi story function\***

With this function, a single movie includes various story lines. You can select different story lines to view various versions of the same movie.

Operation differs from disc to disc. Story line selection screens including instructions appear during the movie. Just follow the instructions.

\* These functions differ from disc to disc. For details, refer to the disc's instructions.

#### **Rating levels (parental lock)**

This is a DVD function for restricting the viewing age as stipulated by laws in different countries. The way in which viewing is restricted differs from DVD to DVD. Sometimes the DVD cannot be played at all, other times certain scenes are skipped, and other times certain scenes are replaced with different scenes.

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# Installation and Connections

Before installing or connecting the unit, please read the following and pages 1 to 6 of this manual thoroughly for proper use.

## Warning

### MAKE THE CORRECT CONNECTIONS.

Failure to make the proper connections may result in fire or product damage.

### USE ONLY IN CARS WITH A 12 VOLT NEGATIVE GROUND.

(Check with your dealer if you are not sure.) Failure to do so may result in fire, etc.

### BEFORE WIRING, DISCONNECT THE CABLE FROM THE NEGATIVE BATTERY TERMINAL.

Failure to do so may result in electric shock or injury due to electrical shorts.

### DO NOT ALLOW CABLES TO BECOME ENTANGLED IN SURROUNDING OBJECTS.

Arrange wiring and cables in compliance with the manual to prevent obstructions when driving. Cables or wiring that obstruct or hang up on places such as the steering wheel, shift lever, brake pedals, etc. can be extremely hazardous.

### DO NOT SPLICE INTO ELECTRICAL CABLES.

Never cut away cable insulation to supply power to other equipment. Doing so will exceed the current carrying capacity of the wire and result in fire or electric shock.

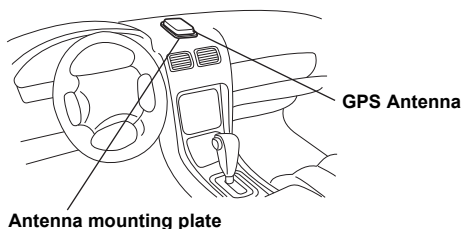
Clean dust and oil at the mounting location and mount the GPS Antenna.

#### **To prevent external noise from entering the audio system.**

- Locate the unit and route the leads at least 10 cm away from the car harness.
- Keep the battery power leads as far away from other leads as possible.
- Connect the ground lead securely to a bare metal spot (remove any paint, dirt or grease if necessary) of the car chassis.
- If you add an optional noise suppressor, connect it as far away from the unit as possible. Your Alpine dealer carries various noise suppressors, contact them for further information.
- Your Alpine dealer knows best about noise prevention measures so consult your dealer for further information.

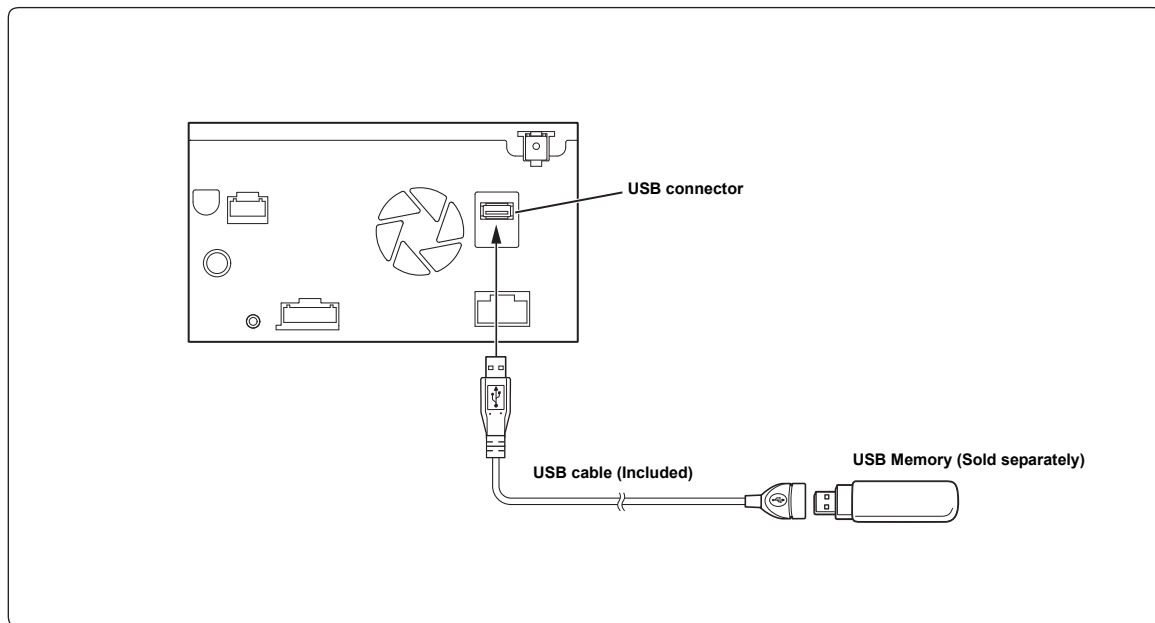

- ㉓ **Illumination Lead (Orange)**  
This lead may be connected to the vehicle's instrument cluster illumination lead. This will allow the backlighting of the INE-S900R to dim whenever the vehicle's lights are turned on.

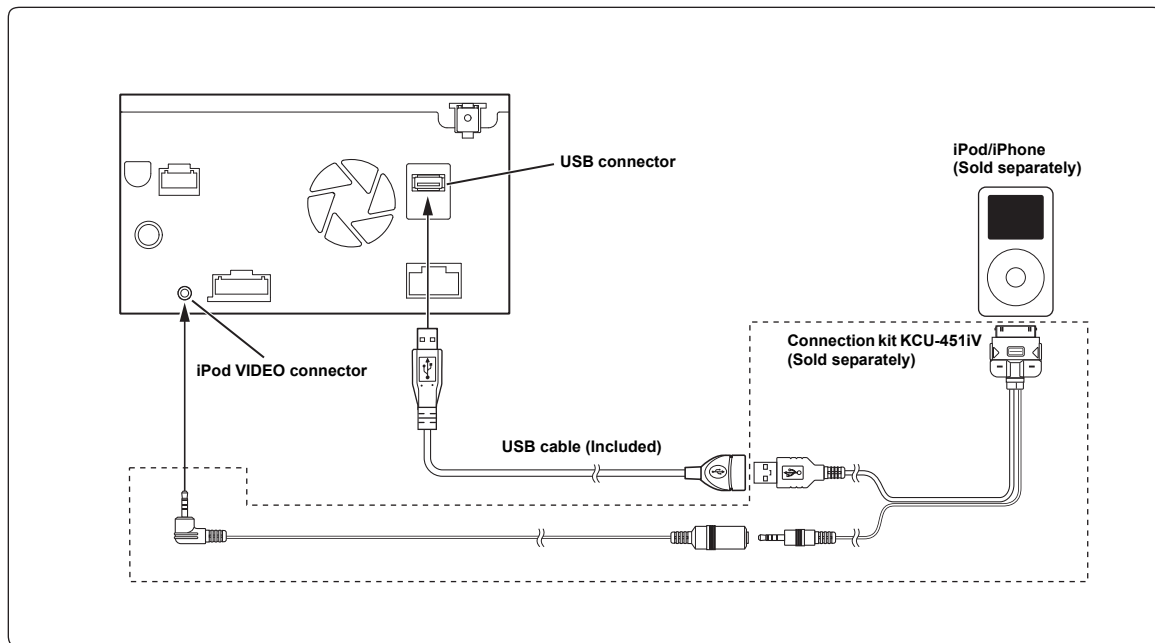

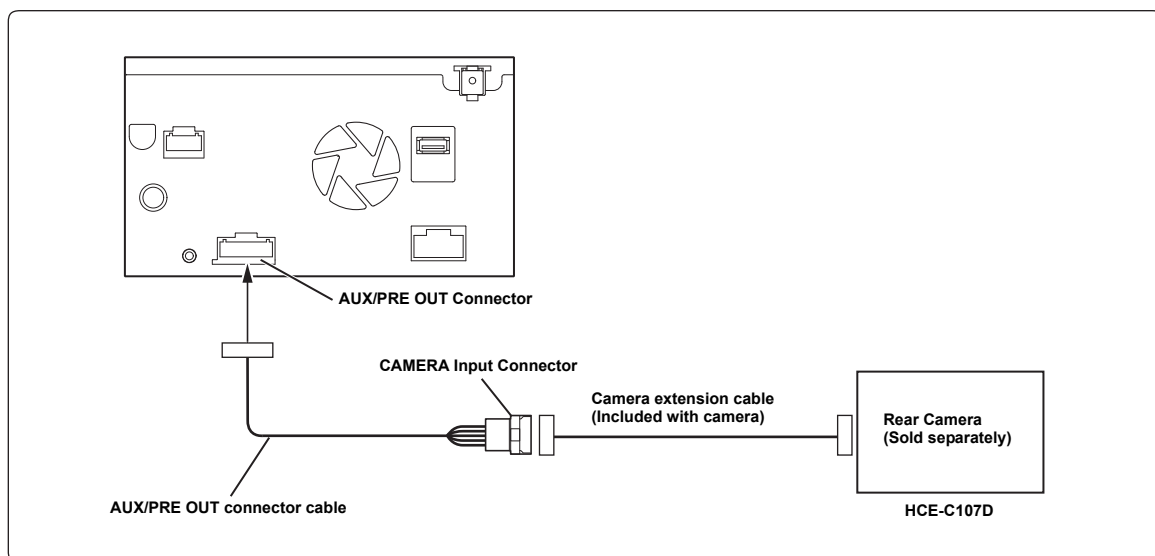
