

# Safety and General Information

This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.\*

## Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user's guides published prior to September 1, 2005

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

## Operational Precautions

To assure optimal mobile device performance and to be sure human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

#### External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorolasupplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed.

## Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola, keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimeters (1 inch) from your body. Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. ## RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

This device complies with Part 15 of FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

## Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so. These location include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in flight.

#### **Pacemakers**

If you have a pacemaker, consult your physician before using this device. Persons with pacemakers should observe the following precautions:

- ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimeters (8 inches) from your pacemaker when the mobile device is turned ON.
- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

## **Hearing Aids**

Some digital mobile devices may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer or physician to discuss alternatives.

#### Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the physician or the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy.

# **Driving Precautions**

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile device in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Use a mobile device may be distracting. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

## **Operational Warnings**

Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas, such as health care facilities or blasting areas.

## Automobile Air Bags

Do not place a mobile device in the air bag deployment area.

## Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted, and can include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. When you are in such area, turn off your mobile device, and do not remove, install, or charge batteries. In such areas, sparks can occur and cause an explosion or fire.

## **Damaged Products**

If your mobile device or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

## **Batteries and Chargers**

If jewelry, keys, beaded chains, or other conductive materials touch exposed battery terminals, this could complete an electrical circuit (short circuit), become very hot, and could cause damage or injury. Be careful when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original™ batteries and chargers.** 

**Caution:** To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

# **Choking Hazards**

Your mobile device or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking hazard to small children. Keep your mobile device and its accessories away from small children.

### Glass Parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service center.

## Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing video games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout. If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your physician before playing video games or enabling a flashing-lights feature (if available) on your mobile device. Discontinue use and consult a physician if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation. It is always a good idea to hold the screen away from your eyes, leave the lights on in the room, take a 15-minute break every hour, and stop use if you are very tired.

## Repetitive Motion

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck or other parts of your body. If you continue to have discomfort during or after such use, stop use and see a physician.

# about this guide

This guide shows how to locate a menu feature as follows:

#### Find it: Press > Recent Calls > Dialed Calls

This example shows that, from the Home Screen, you press to open the menu, highlight and select **Recent Calls**, and then highlight and select **Dialed Calls**.

Press **.**  $\dot{\mathbf{O}}$  to scroll to and highlight a menu feature. Press **SELECT** to select the highlighted menu feature.



## SIM card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.

# installing your SIM card


**Caution:** Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.



# battery

## battery installation

We recommend storing batteries in their protective cases.



# battery charging

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.



Plug the travel charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone displays **Charge Complete** when finished.

**Tip:** You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

# battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



 New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.

When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.

- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark place.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.


**Warning:** Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Before using your phone, read the battery safety information in the "Safety and General Information" section included in the gray-edged pages at the back of this guide.

# turning it on and off

Press and hold to turn on the phone. If prompted, enter your SIM card PIN code and press **OK** to unlock the SIM card.

**Caution:** If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays SIM Blocked.



If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press **OK** to unlock the phone.

**Note:** The phone unlock code can be 4 to 8 digits long. The default unlock code is 1234 (default code may be different in some regions – contact customer support).

# making a call

- **1** Press 1 ~ 0 to dial the phone number.
- 2 Press ( to make the call.
- **3** Press **1** to end the call when you are finished.


# answering a call

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

- 1 Press or **ANSWER** to answer the call.
- 2 Press to end the call when you are finished.

# adjusting the volume

Press • up to increase the volume in the earpiece or down to decrease the volume during a call.

# sending a multimedia message



A *Multimedia Messaging Service* (MMS) message contains one or more pages with text and embedded media objects (pictures or sounds). You can send the multimedia message to other wireless phones with MMS and to email addesses.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Messages > Create Message > New Multimedia Msg

- 1 Press 1 ~ 0 to enter page text.
- 2 Press 🔳 to open the MMS Menu.
- 3 Press to scroll to Insert Object.
- 4 Press **SELECT** to display a list of items you can insert.
- **5** Press to scroll to **Multimedia**, **Quick Note**, or **Number**.
- **6** Press **SELECT** to select the file type.
- 7 Press to highlight the item you want.
- **8** Press **SELECT** to insert the item. To add another page to the message, continue to the next step. To send the message, go to step 15.
- **9** Press **1** to open the **MMS Menu** to add a new page.

#### 24 main attractions

- 10 Press o to scroll to Add New Page.
- **11 SELECT** to add a new page to the message. Repeat steps 1 through 8 to enter contents for the new page.
- 12 Press 🔳 to open the MMS Menu to set the subject.
- **13** Press •**♦** to scroll to **Set Subject**.
- **14** Press 1 ~ 0 to enter the subject text.
- **15** Press **0K** to to select the message recipient.
- **16** Press to scroll to the recipient's number.
- 17 Press MARK to mark the number. Repeat steps 12 and 13 to mark additional numbers or go to the next step.
- 18 Press OK to view all recipients.
- **19** Press **1** to view additional options:

New Number: Enter a number that is not in the phonebook.

New E-mail Address: Add an e-mail address.

Send: Send the message.

Remove User: Remove the selected recipient from the list.

Remove All: Remove all recipients.

**Sending Options**: Set the sending options.

From Phonebook: Select the recipient from the phonebook.

**20** Press **SEND** to send multimedia message.

# receiving a multimedia message



When you receive a multimedia message or letter, your phone displays the  $\ensuremath{\mbox{\ensuremath{\varnothing}}}$  indicator and New Message, and sounds an alert.

Press **READ** to open the message.

Multimedia messages that you receive can contain different media objects:


- Photos and animations are displayed as you read the message.
- · A sound file begins playing when its page is displayed.

# basics

# display

The *home screen* displays when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Press the navigation key •• left, right, up, or down to select one of the menu feature icons. If you select a menu icon by mistake, press • to return to the home screen.

**Note:** Your home screen may look different from the display shown in the previous illustration. For example, your service provider may hide the menu icons to allow a better view of the wallpaper image. You can still select the menu icons when they are hidden from view. To show or hide the menu icons, see page 66.


When the **I** is displayed, you can press the menu key **I** to enter the main menu.

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left or right soft key to perform the function indicated by the label.

Your phone can display the time and date in the home screen (see page 66).

### status indicators

The following illustration shows some common status indicators:



- Signal Strength Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection.
- 2 GPRS GPRS-net connected and GPRS packet message can be sent.
- **3 Data Transmission –** Via network (phone-to-computer data transfer is not supported).
- **4 Roam Indicator –** appears when your phone uses another network system outside your home network.



## selecting a menu feature


The following example shows how to select a menu feature, starting from the Home Screen:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Recent Calls > Dialed Calls

This example shows that from the Home Screen, you must press **1**, scroll to and select **1** Recent Calls from the main menu, then scroll to and select **1** Dialed Calls. Press • • to scroll, and use the left or right soft keys to select the functions displayed in the bottom corners of the display.

## selecting a feature option

Some features require you to select an option from a list.




Press • up or down to highlight the option you want.


- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetized list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and highlight the closest matching option on the list.
- When an option has a list of possible values, press **.** left or right to scroll through and select a value.
- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

# text entry

Some features require you to enter information.



You can compose and send text messages in the message center. A *character counter* indicates how many more characters will fit in the message.



## text entry method

Multiple text entry methods make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The method you select remains active until you select another method.

Press # in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry methods:

Alternatively, you can select a text entry method in any text entry screen by pressing  $\blacksquare$  > Input Mode.

## setting up a text entry method

Multiple text entry methods make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The method you select remains active until you select another method.

Press # in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry methods:

**Primary** The primary text entry method

(see below to set).

Symbol Enter symbols only.

123 Enter numbers only.

**Secondary** The secondary text entry method

(see below to set).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry method in any text entry screen by pressing **()** > Input Mode.


#### iTAP™ mode

Press  $\ensuremath{\#}$  in a text entry screen to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see  $\ensuremath{\square}$  or  $\ensuremath{\square}$ , press  $\ensuremath{\blacksquare}$  > Entry Setup to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP mode lets you enter words using one keypress per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words and predicts each word as you enter it.

Note: Features may differ from your handset.

For example, if you press 7 7 6 4, your phone displays:



- If you want a different word (such as Progress), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.
- Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.

### tap mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to tap mode. If you do not see 1 or 2, press > Entry Setup to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

**Note:** Features may differ from your handset.

#### capitalization

Press ① in any text entry screen to change the text case. The following indicators show capitalization status:

abc = no capital letters ABC = all capital letters

**Abc** = capitalize next

letter only

#### tap method

This is the standard method for entering text on your phone.


The **Tap** method cycles through the letters and numbers on the key you press. The **Tap Extended** method also cycles through additional symbols shown in the chart on page 39.

- Press a keypad key one or more times to select a letter, number, or symbol.
- 2 Press keypad keys to enter remaining characters.
- 3 Press Insert to store the text.
- **4** Press **#** to switch entry modes.

**Tip:** Press  $\diamondsuit$  up to accept a word completion; press  $\boxtimes$  to insert a space.

In a text entry screen, you can press ## to switch the entry methods. If Tap or Tap Extended is not available as the Primary or Secondary entry method, see page 35.

When you enter text with the Tap or Tap Extended method, the soft key functions change.



When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **Pro** you might see:



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

#### tap method text entry rules


- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press • left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalized.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press to exit without saving.

### iTAP® method

iTAP software provides a predictive text entry method that lets you enter a word using one key press per letter. This can be faster than the **Tap** method because your phone combines the key presses to predict common words.

For example, if you press [7], [7], [6], [4], the letter combinations that match your key presses display the word **Product**.

Press • up to accept **Products**.



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

#### entering words

In a text entry screen, you can press ## to switch to a different text entry method. An indicator shows which method is active (see page 37). If the iTAP method is not available as the Primary or Secondary entry method, see page 35.

- 1 Press 1 ~ # to show possible letter combinations at the bottom of the display.
- 2 Press � left or right highlight the combination you want.

- 3 Press SELECT to lock a highlighted combination or you can press keypad keys to add more letters to the end of the combination.
- **4** Press **★** to enter the highlighted combination when a word appears in the display. A space is automatically inserted after the word.

If you enter a word that your phone does not recognize, the phone stores it to use as one of your word options. When you fill the available memory space for unrecognized words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

#### numeric mode

In a text entry screen, press ## to switch entry methods until the 12 (numeric) indicator displays.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press ## to switch to another entry method.

#### symbol mode

In a text entry screen, press ## to switch the text entry methods until the @ (symbol) indicator displays.

- 2 Press • left or right to highlight the combination you want.

- 3 Press SELECT to lock a highlighted combination or you can press keypad keys to add more symbols to the end of the combination.
- **4** Press **★** to enter the highlighted combination.



# navigation key

Press the navigation key •• to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system, to highlight menu items, to change feature



settings, and to play games. Press the left soft key to select a highlighted menu item.

## codes and passwords

Your phone has a 4-digit unlock code that is set to 1234 by default. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, and/or call barring password, if necessary.

To change a code or password:

Find it: Press > Settings > Security > New Passwords

# locking and unlocking your phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer calls.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 55).

### locking your phone manually

- **1** Press keypad keys to enter your unlock code.
- 2 Press **OK** to lock the phone.

### unlocking your phone

Your service provider may reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number.

At the Enter Unlock Code prompt:

- 1 Press keypad keys to enter your unlock code.
- **2** Press **0K** to unlock your phone.

### set your phone to lock automatically

You can set your phone to lock every time you turn it off:

Find it: Press > Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Automatic Lock > On

- 1 Press keypad keys to enter your unlock code.
- 2 Press **0K** to activate automatic lock.

### if you forget a code, PIN, or password

If you forget your unlock code, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that does not work, perform the following actions at the Enter Unlock Code prompt:

- 1 Press to display the unlock code bypass screen.
- **2** Press keypad keys to enter your security code.
- **3** Press **0K** to submit your security code.

### phonebook

This section briefly describes basic **Phonebook** operations. For more information about using the **Phonebook**, see page 63.

### storing a phone number

Enter a phone number in the home screen, then press **SAVE** to create a **Phonebook** entry for that number. Fill in the other fields to complete the entry.

#### dial a number

Press  $\blacksquare$  > **Phonebook** > *desired entry*, then press  $\boxdot$ .

**Shortcut:** Press • • down to access **Phonebook** from idle screen.

If your entries are sorted by **Name**, enter the first letter of the person's name to highlight it. For example, press **5** for the first entry that starts with K.

### sort phonebook entries

Press  $\blacksquare$  > Phonebook, next press  $\blacksquare$  > Setting > Sort by, and then select whether you want to sort the phonebook using Alphanumeric, Pinyin, Stroke, or Location.

**Note:** Features may differ from your handset.

### viewing entries by category

Press > Phonebook, next press > Categories, and then select whether you want to view All entries, entries in a predefined category (Caller Group 1 ~ Caller Group 15), or entries in a category you created.

To set the category for a phonebook entry, see page 64.

# locking the keypad

In all modes, press followed by the to lock the keypad. Repeating this key sequence unlocks the keypad.

To store or edit your name and phone number information on your SIM card:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Phone Status > My Tel. Numbers

If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.

#### time and date

You must set the time and date to use the datebook.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date

### ring style

Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

You can select one of five different ring styles. The ring style indicator in the display shows the current ring style (see page 28).

To set a ring style:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Ring Styles > Style

- 1 Press to scroll to the ring style.
- **2** Press **SELECT** to select the ring style.

#### 48 customize

Each ring style consists of settings for specific event alerts: Ringing Volume, Ring Tone, Incoming Call Alert, Vibrating, Message Alert Tone, Keypad Tone Volume, Key Tone Type, Reminders, Startup Music & Power Off Music. To change these settings, press  $\blacksquare$  > Settings > Ring Styles > style Detail.

### answer options

You can set the phone to answer by pressing any key.

To activate or deactivate an answer option:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > In-Call Setup

- 1 Press O to scroll to Anykey Answer.
- 2 Press ON to select the option.

### wallpaper

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image on your phone's home screen. The wallpaper image appears as a faint watermark in text and menu displays.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

- 1 Press •**Ô** to scroll to **Picture**.
- 2 Press **SELECT** to open the picture viewer.
- 3 Press · ♠ to scroll to a picture. Scroll to (Off) to turn off the wallpaper image.
- 4 Press **0K** to select the image.
- **5** Press **BACK** to return to **Wallpaper** screen.

- 6 Press ❖ to scroll to Layout.
- **7** Press **SELECT** to adjust the image layout.
- 8 Press to select a layout option. Center places the image in the center of the display. Tile fills the display with multiple copies of the image. Fit-to-Screen resizes the image, if necessary, to fit the display.
- **9** Press **0K** to confirm the layout setting.
- 10 Press BACK to save wallpaper settings.

#### screen saver

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver image.

The screen saver image displays when the phone is on and no activity is detected for a specified time. The image shrinks to fill the display, if necessary. An animation repeats for one minute, then the first frame of the animation displays.

Tip: To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

Find it: Press > Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

- 1 Press •Ô• to scroll to Picture.
- **2** Press **SELECT** to open the picture viewer.
- 3 Press up or down to scroll to a picture/animation. Scroll to (Off) to turn off the screen saver image.
- **4** Press **0K** to select the image.
- **5** Press **BACK** to return to **Screen Saver** screen.

#### 50 customize

- 6 Press •Ô→ to scroll to Delay.
- **7** Press **SELECT** to set the delay interval.
- 8 Press to scroll to the inactivity interval that triggers the screen saver.
- **9** Press **0K** to confirm the delay setting.
- **10** Press **BACK** to save screen saver settings.

# display appearance

#### contrast

Press • right to increase the contrast. Press • left to decrease the contrast.

#### color

Select the color palette on your phone to display indicators, highlights, and soft key labels.

- 2 Press OK to select the Color Style.
- **3** Press **BACK** to return to previous menu.

### backlight

You can set the amount of time that the display and keypad backlights remain on.

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight

- 1 Press • up or down to scroll to a time-out setting.
- **2** Press **0K** to select the setting.
- 3 Press BACK to return to previous menu.

### calls

For basic instructions on how to make and answer calls, see page 22.

#### active line



You can change the active phone line to make and receive calls from your other phone number.

**Note:** This feature is available only for SIM cards enabled for dual phone lines.

Find it: Press > Settings > Phone Status > Active Line

The **Active Line** indicator in the display shows which phone line is currently active (see page 28).

#### redial

- **1** Press **(** to view the dialed calls list.
- 2 Press o to scroll to the entry you want to call.
- **3** Press ( to redial the number.

#### automatic redial



When you receive a busy signal, your phone displays Call Failed. Number Busy.

To redial the phone number:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Settings > In-Call Setup > Auto Redial

Your phone automatically redials the number. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates one time, displays **Redial Successful**, and then connects the call.

#### caller ID

### incoming calls



Calling Line Identification (Caller ID) displays the phone number for incoming calls in your phone's display.

The phone displays the caller's name when the name is stored in your phonebook, or **Calling** when Caller ID information is not available.

### outgoing calls



You can show or hide your phone number as an ID for the calls that you make.

Find it: Press • > Settings > In-Call Setup > Show Number

#### turn off a call alert

While the phone is ringing or vibrating:

Press IGNORE to cancel the incoming call.



Depending on your phone settings and/or service subscription, the call may be forwarded to your voice mail, another number, or the caller may hear a busy signal.

### emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 112, 911, or 000 that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations. Sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- **1** Press keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- **2** Press ( to call the emergency number.

#### international calls

Press and hold ① to insert the local international access code (+) for the country that you are calling.

#### recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialed, even if the calls did not connect. The lists are sorted from the newest to the oldest entries. When the phone's memory or SIM card is full, the oldest entries are deleted so that new entries can be added.

**Tip:** Press from the home screen to view the list of dialed calls.

Find it: Press > Recent Calls

- 1 Press o to scroll to Received Calls or Dialed Calls.
- 2 Press **SELECT** to select the list.
- 3 Press to scroll to an entry. A ✓ means the call connected.
- 4 Press ( to call the entry's number.

or

Press **VIEW** to view entry details.

or

Press to open the Last Calls Menu to perform various operations on the entry.

The Last Calls Menu can include the following options:

# returning calls

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls and displays:

X Missed Calls, where X is the number of missed calls

- 1 Press **VIEW** to see the list of received calls.
- 2 Press ô to select a call to return.
- 3 Press ( to make the call.

### notepad

The most recent set of digits entered on the keypad are stored in your phone's notepad memory. These digits can be a phone number that you called, or a number that you entered but did not call. To retrieve the number stored in the notepad:

Find it: Press 🔳 > Recent Calls > Notepad

Press to call the number.

or

Press **SAVE** to create a phonebook entry with the number in the **No.** field

### speed dialing

Each entry that you store in your phonebook is assigned a unique speed dial number.

To see an entry's speed dial number, press  $\blacksquare$  > **Phonebook**, scroll to the entry, press **VIEW**.

To speed dial a phonebook entry:

- 1 Press keypad keys to enter the speed dial number for the entry you want to call.
- 2 Press # to submit the number.
- **3** Press **1** to call the entry.

# 1-touch dialing

To call phonebook entries 1 through 9, press and hold the single-digit speed dial number for one second. If no speed number is assigned to the digit, you will be prompted to assign number.

#### voicemail



Voicemail messages that you receive are stored on the network, not on your phone. To listen to your messages, you must call your voicemail phone number.

Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

### listening to voicemail messages

Find it: Press 🔳 > Messages > Voicemail

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number.

### receiving voicemail

When you receive a voicemail message, your phone displays the 🖎 indicator and New Voicemail.

Press CALL to listen to the message.

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number

### storing your voicemail number

If necessary, use the following procedure to store your voicemail phone number on your phone. Usually your service provider has already done this for you.

Find it: Press > Messages > > Voicemail Setup

- 1 Press keypad keys to enter your voicemail number.
- **2** Press **SAVE** to store the number.

You cannot store a p (pause), w (wait), or n (number) character in this number. If you want to store a voicemail number with these characters, create a phonebook entry for it. Then you can use the entry to call your voicemail.

### call waiting



When you are on a call and a second call comes in, an alert tone sounds to indicate that you have a call waiting.

- 1 Press to answer the new call.
- 2 Press **SWITCH** to switch between calls.

or

Press LINK to connect the 2 calls.

or

Press > End Call On Hold to end the call on hold.

You must turn on call waiting to use this feature. To turn call waiting on or off:

Find it: Press > Settings > In-Call Setup > Call Waiting

# putting a call on hold

Press **HOLD** (if available) to put the call on hold.

or

Press 🔳 > Hold.

### transferring a call



You can announce that you are transferring an active call to another party, or you can directly transfer the call.

### announcing the call transfer

Find it: Press 🔳 > Hold

- 1 Press keypad keys to dial the number where you are transferring the call.
- 2 Press (a) to call the number and speak with the person who answers.
- 3 Press 🔳 to open the menu.
- 4 Press to scroll to Transfer.
- **5** Press **SELECT**.
- 6 Press OK to confirm the transfer.

### not announcing the call transfer

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The ICNIRP SAR limit for mobiles devices used by the general public is 2 W/kg and the highest SAR value for this device when tested at the ear was 0.86 W/kg. As mobile devices offer a range of functions, they can be used in other positions, such as on the body as described in this user guide. In this case, the highest tested SAR value is 0.48 W/kg.

As SAR is measured utilizing the device's highest transmitting power, the actual SAR of this device while operating is typically below that indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to reach the network.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

The World Health Organization has stated that present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile devices. They note that if you want to reduce your exposure

then you can do so by limiting the length of calls or using a "hands-free" device to keep the mobile phone away from the head and body.
