

SIM card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and phonebook entries.

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.



battery

battery installation

battery charging

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the travel charger into your phone and an electrical outlet.



Your phone displays **Charge Complete** when finished

Tip: Relax, you can't overcharge your battery. It will perform best after you fully charge and discharge it a few times.

You can charge your battery by connecting a cable from your phone's mini-USB port to a USB port on a computer. Both your phone and the computer must be turned on, and your computer must have the correct software drivers installed. Cables and software drivers are available in Motorola Original data kits, sold separately.

battery tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.

ΤN

- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold for a few seconds or until the display turns on. If prompted, enter your



6-digit SIM card PIN code and/or 4-digit unlock code.

Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and

your phone displays **SIM Blocked**. Contact your service provider.

To turn off your phone, press and hold for 2 seconds.

make a call

Enter a phone number and press • to make a call.

To "hang up," close the flip or press <a>S.

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, just open the flip or press to answer.

To "hang up," close the flip or press .

your phone number

From the home screen, press **(II)** ## to see your number.

Tip: Want to see your phone number while you're on a call? Press **T** > **My Tel. Numbers**.


To store or edit your name and phone number on your SIM card, press the Edit key while displaying it. If you don't know your phone number, contact your service provider.

main attractions

You can do much more with your phone than make and receive calls!

take & send a photo

Press > Multimedia > Camera to see the camera viewfinder:



Note: Adjusting the exposure will affect the brightness of both the Photo Viewfinder display and the captured photo.

- 1 Point the camera lens at the photo subject.
 - You can press to open the **Pictures Menu**. See the table after this procedure.
- 2 Press the Capture key to take a photo.

or

To store the photo, press **Store** > **Store Only**.

or

To delete the photo and return to the active viewfinder, press the **Discard** key.

When the viewfinder is active, press to open the **Pictures Menu**:



send a stored photo in a message

- 1 Press **■** > **■** Messages > Create Message > New Multimedia Msg.
- 2 Press **> Insert** > **Picture**.
- **3** Scroll to the picture you want to insert and press **Insert**.
- 4 Enter message text and press **Send To**.
- 5 Scroll to the recipient address, press the center key •• , and press Send To.

record video

Press > Multimedia > Video Camera to see the video viewfinder.



Note: You can zoom only before you start recording. The number of video clips remaining is an estimate.

If you want to send your video in an MMS message, the video length must be set to

MMS. To set length, from the video viewfinder press \square > Videos Setup > Video Length.

Point the camera lens at the video subject, then:

- 1 Press the **Capture** key to start the video recording.
- 2 Press the Stop key to stop the video recording.
- To send the video clip in a multimedia message, press Store > Send in Message, enter a text note, press Send To, scroll to and select a recipient address, press the center key ..., then press Send.

or

To store the video clip, press Store > Store Only.

or

To delete the video clip and return to the active viewfinder, press the **Discard** key.

cable connections

Your phone has a mini-USB port so vou can connect it to a computer to transfer data. You can:



- Synchronize phonebook and datebook information between your phone and a computer or hand-held device.
- Use your phone as a modem to connect to the Internet
- Use your phone to send and receive data calls from your computer or handheld device.

Note: Motorola Original USB data cables and supporting software are sold separately. Check your computer or hand-held device to determine the type of cable you need.

To **transfer data** between your phone and computer, you must install the software included with the Motorola Original data kit. See the data kit user's guide for more information. To make data and fax calls. through a connected computer, see page 56.


basics

display

The home screen displays when you turn on the phone. To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and then .

Note: Your home screen may look different from the one below, depending on your service provider.




The Menu Indicator

shows that you can press

to open the menu. Soft Key Labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 1.

Status indicators can display at the top of the home screen:



- Signal Strength Indicator Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You can't make or receive calls when in the strength of the strength
- 2 EDGE/GPRS Indicator Shows when your phone is using a high-speed Enhanced Data for GSM Evolution (EDGE) or General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. Indicators can include:

3 Data Indicator – Indicators can include:




- 4 Roam Indicator Shows ▲ when your phone is seeking or using a network outside your home network.






Some features require you to select an option from a list:



- Scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.
- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight an option.
- In an alphabetized list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through its letters and highlight the closest matching list option.
- When an option has a list of possible settings, scroll left or right to select the setting.
- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

text entry

Some features let you enter text.



Press # in a text entry screen to select an entry mode:


Tip: WANT TO SHOUT YOUR MESSAGE? Press ① in a text entry screen to change text case to all capital letters (**AB**), no capital letters (**ab**) or mixed capitals (**Ab**).

iTAP® mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see or , press > Entry Setup to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP mode lets you enter words using 1 key press per letter. The iTAP software combines your keypresses into common words, and predicts each word as you enter it.

For example, if you press 7 7 6 4, your phone displays:



- If you want a different word (such as Progress), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining letters.
- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you

want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.


• Press 1 to enter punctuation or other characters.

tap mode

Press # in a text entry screen to switch to tap mode. If you don't see #b1 or #b2, press > Entry Setup to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.


To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

For example, if you press **8** 1 time, your phone displays:



When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the

word. For example, if you enter **prog** your phone might display:



- The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press ô down to change the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- Press • to move the flashing cursor to enter or edit message text.
- If you don't want to save your text or text edits, press to go to Msg Abort

Options. Select **Abort Message** to exit without saving.

 Tap extended mode cycles through additional special characters and symbols as you repeatedly press a keypad key.

numeric mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see 12. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want.


symbol mode

Press # in a text entry screen until you see @. Press a keypad key to show its symbols at the bottom of the display. Highlight the symbol you want, then press the Select key.

volume

Press the volume keys to:





- change the earpiece volume during calls
- change the ringer volume from the home screen

Tip: Sometimes silence really is golden. That's why you can quickly set your ringer to **Vibrate** or **Silent** by holding the down volume key in the home screen.

navigation key

Press the navigation key • • up, down, left, or right to scroll and highlight items in the display. When you highlight something, press



the *center key* • to select it. The center key usually does the same thing as the right soft key.

external display

When your phone is closed, the external display shows the time, date, status indicators, and notifications for incoming calls and other events. For a list of phone status indicators, see page 18.

To set the phone ring style in the external display:

- **1** Press a volume key to display **Style:** *style name*.
- **2** Press the smart key repeatedly, until the style you want appears.
- **3** Press a volume key to return to the home screen.

handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

During a call, press the **Speaker** key to turn the handsfree speaker on. Your phone displays **Spkrphone On**. Press the **Speaker** key again to turn off the handsfree speaker.

Note: The handsfree speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a handsfree car kit or headset.

codes & passwords

Your phone's 4-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**. The 6-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them:

Find it: Press Settings > Security > New Passwords

You can also change your **SIM PIN2** or call barring passwords.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Enter Unlock Code prompt, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, press and enter your 6-digit security code instead.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the 4-digit unlock code.

To manually lock your phone:

Press S Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now > unlock code.

To **automatically lock** your phone whenever you turn it off: Press \blacksquare > \blacksquare % Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Automatic Lock > \blacksquare 0n > unlock code.

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 37). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

battery meter

View a meter that shows your battery's charge level:

Find it: Press \blacksquare > \blacksquare Settings > Phone Status

> Battery Meter

customize

ring style

Each ring style profile uses a different set of sounds or vibrations for incoming calls and other events. Here are the profiles you can choose:

△① Loud ¾△¾ Vibe & Ring
△ → Soft ¾ △ Vibe Then Ring

\$B\$ Vibrate △ Silent

The ring style profile's indicator displays at the top of your home screen. To choose your profile:

Find it: Press \blacksquare > \blacksquare Settings > Ring Styles > Style: style name

change alerts in a ring style

You can change the alerts for incoming calls and other events. Your changes are saved in the current ring style profile.

Find it: Press $\blacksquare > \blacksquare$ Settings > Ring Styles > Style Detail

Note: Style represents the current ring style. You can't set an alert for the **Silent** ring style setting.

- 1 Highlight Line 1 or Line 2, then press the Change key to change it.
- 2 Highlight the alert you want, then press the **Select** key.
- **3** Press the **Back** key to save the alert setting.

time & date

You need to set your phone's time and date to use the datebook.

To set the time and date: Press

RY Sottings > Initial Sotup > Time and Date

> ${\mathbb B}^{\mathbb S}$ Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date

> time or date.

wallpaper

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Find it: Press $\blacksquare > \blacksquare$ Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

option	1
Picture	Select an image for your wallpaper, or None for no wallpaper.
Layout	Select Center to center the image in the display, Tile to repeat the image across the display, or Fit-to-screen to stretch the image across the display.

screen saver

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver. The screen saver displays when the flip is open and no activity is detected for a specified time.

Tip: This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

Find it: Press Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

option	1
Picture	Select an image for your screen saver, or None for no screen saver.
Delay	Select the length of inactivity before the screen saver displays.

display appearance

To choose a **color style** that sets the look of your phone's display:

 $\label{eq:constraints} \text{Press } \blacksquare \hspace{-0.05cm} \blacksquare \hspace{-0.05cm} \text{ Settings} > \text{Personalize} > \text{Color Style}.$

To adjust the **contrast** of your phone's display:

 $\text{Press } \; \overline{\blacksquare} \; > \; \overline{\$} \; \text{Settings} \; > \; \text{Initial Setup} \; > \; \text{Contrast}$

To save battery life, your **backlight** turns off when you're not using your phone. The backlight turns back on when you open the flip

or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the backlight turns off:

Press \blacksquare > \blacksquare Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight.

Note: To turn the backlight on or off for JavaTM applications, press $\boxed{\Xi} > \boxed{\$}$ **Settings** > **Java Settings** > **App Backlight**.

To save battery life, the **display** can turn off when you're not using your phone. The display turns back on when you open the flip or press any key. To set how long your phone waits before the display turns off:

Press Settings > Initial Setup > Display Timeout.

answer options

You can use different ways to answer an incoming call. To turn on or turn off an answer option:

Find it: Press \blacksquare > \blacksquare Settings > In-Call Setup

> Answer Options

option	
Multi-Key	Answer by pressing any key.
Open To Answer	Answer by opening the flip.

calls

To make and answer calls, see page 12.

turn off a call alert

You can press the volume keys to turn off a call alert before answering the call.

recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

Shortcut: Press from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.

Find it: Press 🔳 > 📵 Recent Calls

- Highlight Received Calls or Dialed Calls, then press the Select key.
- 2 Highlight a call. A ✓ next to a call means the call connected.
 - To call the number, press .
 - To see call details (like time and date), press the View key.
 - To see the Last Calls Menu, press . This menu can include:

option	
Store	Create a phonebook entry with the number in the No. field. Store does not appear if the number is already stored.
Delete	Delete the entry.
Delete All	Delete all entries in the list.
Hide ID/Show ID	Hide or show your caller ID for the next call.
Send Message	Open a new text message with the number in the To field.
Add Digits	Add digits after the number.
Attach Number	Attach a number from the phonebook or recent calls lists.

option	
Send Tones	Send the number to the network as DTMF tones.
	Note: This option displays only during a call.
Talk then Fax	Talk and then send a fax in the same call (see page 56).

redial

- 1 Press from the home screen to see the dialed calls list.
- 2 Highlight the entry you want to call, then press •.

If you hear a **busy signal** and see **Call Failed, Number Busy**, press **O** or the **Retry** key to redial the number. When the call goes

through, your phone rings or vibrates once, displays **Redial Successful**, and connects the call.

automatic redial

When you receive a **busy signal**, your phone displays **Call Failed, Number Busy**. With automatic redial, your phone automatically redials the number for up to four minutes. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates once, displays **Redial Successful**, and connects the call.

To turn automatic redial on and off, press
Settings > Auto Redial > On or Off.

return a call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and displays *X* **Missed Calls**, where *X* is the number of missed calls.

- Press the View key to see the received calls list.
- 2 Highlight the call you want to return, then press .

notepad

Your phone saves the last set of digits entered on the keypad in *notepad* memory. This can be the last phone number you called, or a number that you "jot down" during a call for later use. To see the number stored in the notepad:

Find it: Press 🔳 > 📵 Recent Calls > Notepad

- To call the number, press .
- To create a phonebook entry with the number in the No. field, press the Store key.

• To open the Dialing Menu to attach a number or insert a special character, press .

hold or mute a call

Press **T** > **Hold** to put all active calls on hold.

Press **Mute** key (if available) or \blacksquare > **Mute** to put all active calls on mute.

call waiting

When you're on a call, you'll hear an alert if you receive a second call.



Press (•) to answer the new call.

- To switch between calls, press the Switch kev.
- To connect the 2 calls, press the **Link** key.


• To end the call on hold, press > Fnd Call On Hold

To turn the call waiting feature on or off:

Find it: Press Settings > In-Call Setup > Call Waiting

caller ID

Calling line identification (caller ID) shows the phone number for an incoming call in your external and internal displays.



You can set your phone to play a different ringer ID for an entry stored in your phonebook (see page 43).

To show or hide **your phone number** from the next person you call, enter the phone number and press **3** > **Hide ID**.

emergency calls

Your service provider programs 1 or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Note: Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

1 Press the keypad keys to dial the emergency number.

2 Press **©** to call the emergency number.

international calls

If your phone service includes international dialing, press and hold to insert your local international access code (indicated by +). Then, press the keypad keys to dial the country code and phone number.

1-touch dial

To call phonebook entries 1 through 9, press and hold the single-digit speed dial number for 1 second.


You can set 1-touch dial to call the entries in your phone's memory phonebook, your SIM card's phonebook, or your Fixed Dial list:

Find it: Press Settings > Initial Setup > 1 Touch Dial > Phone, SIM, or Fixed Dial

To add a new phonebook entry, see page 42. To edit the **Speed No.** for a phonebook entry, press \blacksquare > \bigcirc **Phonebook**, highlight the entry, and press \blacksquare > **Edit**.

voicemail

Your network stores the voicemail messages you receive. To listen to your messages, call your voicemail number.



When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone displays the voicemail message indicator and **New Voicemail**. Press the **CALL** key to listen to the message.

To **check** voicemail messages:

Find it: Press **■** > **Messages** > Voicemail

Your phone may prompt you to store your voicemail phone number. If you don't know your voicemail number, contact your service provider.



The model V235 wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. 1 Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure.
