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Safety and General Information

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorised antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.

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Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline telephone.

Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body.

Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries and antenna, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.Motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

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Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimetres) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches (15 centimetres) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- · NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your GP may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- · Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- · Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, unless it is a phone type especially qualified for use in such areas and certified as "Intrinsically Safe." Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

Batteries

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. Exercise care in handling any charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, bag, or other container with metal objects. Use only Motorola original batteries and chargers.

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.
- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.

Installing the UICC or SIM Card

Your 3G UICC (Universal IC Card) contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory. Your phone can use GSM SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) cards, but not all features will be available.


Caution: Do not bend or scratch your card. Avoid exposing your card to static electricity, water, or dirt.

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Note: You can install a memory card in your phone to store more multimedia files such as audio clips, pictures, and os. To install a memory

video clips. To install a memory card, remove your phone's battery door and battery and insert the card as shown.



Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

 Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.



- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling centre for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.



4 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the OK key to unlock the SIM card.


Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays SIM Blocked.

5 If necessary, enter your four-digit unlock code and press OK key to unlock the phone.

Tip: The unlock code is originally set to 1234. Your service provider may change this number before you receive your phone

Adjusting Volume

Press the up or down volume keys to:





- · increase or decrease speakerphone volume during a call
- · turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible

Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Action

1 Plug the travel charger into your phone with the release tab facing up.



- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, press the release tab and remove the travel charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

Turning Your Phone On

- 1 Open your phone.
- 2 Press and hold of for 2 seconds to turn on the phone.

Answering a Call

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

When Open to Answer is On, open the phone to answer the call. To set Open to Answer, press \blacksquare > Settings > In-Call Setup > Answer Options > Open to Answer.

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Changing the Call Alert

In the home screen, press the down volume key to switch the alert for incoming calls and other events to vibrate alert, then silent alert. Press the up volume key to reset ring alert.

Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press \blacksquare #.

While you are on a call, press \blacksquare > My Tel. Numbers.

Note: Your phone number must be stored on your SIM card to use this feature. To store your phone number on the SIM card, see page 55. If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.



Downloading Pictures



Your phone may contain predefined photos, pictures, and animations. You can download and store additional images on your phone.

If you are unable to establish a network connection with the micro-browser, contact your service provider.

- The files that you download or receive as attachments might have a copyright lock that keeps you from saving them on external memory, forwarding them, or editing them.
- Normal airtime and/or carrier usage charges apply.



Your phone may use a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. This type of connection is identified by à M (GPRS) indicator in the home screen that disappears when you start a micro-browser session. If you see an (·) (in-call) indicator during a micro-browser session, your phone is using a standard voice channel connection. The type of network connection your phone uses depends on your service provider's network. Your network connection charges may vary depending on the type of connection used.

Note: Some features on your phone might open a browser session automatically.

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Setting Up a Cable Connection

Attach a Motorola Original $^{\mbox{\scriptsize TM}}$ USB cable to the phone and external device as follows.

Note: Check your computer or hand-held device to determine the type of cable you need.



Using the Display

The *home screen* is displayed when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Press the 5-way navigation key $(\cdot \hat{\phi})$ left, right, up, or down to select one of the menu feature icons. If you select a menu icon by mistake, press \odot to return to the home screen.


Note: Your home screen may look different from the display shown above. For example, your service provider may hide the menu feature icons to allow a better view of the wallpaper image. You can still select the menu icons when they are hidden from view.

The \equiv (menu) indicator indicates that you can press the menu key (\equiv) to enter the main menu.

Learning to Use Your Phone - 33

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left soft key or right soft key to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

The following status indicators can display:



1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the Υ (no signal) indicator or Υ 0 (no transmit) indicator is displayed.

2. GPRS Indicator



Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:

3. Data Transmission Indicator

Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:

Selecting a Menu Feature


To select a menu feature, starting from the home screen:

Find the Feature > Recent Calls > Dialled Calls

This example shows that from the home screen, you must press 🔳, scroll to and select 🕏 Recent Calls from the main menu, then scroll to and select Dialled Calls. Press 💠 to scroll to and select items. Press the left/right soft keys to select the functions listed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:




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
- Press 💠 to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.
- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetised list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.
- When an option has a list of possible values, press ô left or right to scroll through and select a value.
- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text

Some features require you to enter information.



The message centre lets you compose and send text messages.



Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

Press # in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

Primary The primary text entry mode (see the

following section).

Numeric Enter numbers only (see page 47).

Symbol Enter symbols only (see page 47).

Secondary The secondary text entry mode (see below

to set).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry mode in any text entry screen by pressing > Entry Mode.

Setting Up a Text Entry Mode

Press Setup from any text entry screen. Select Primary Setup or Secondary Setup, and choose:







Note: You cannot make or receive calls when the phone is closed unless you attach a headset.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's integrated handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **SPEAKER** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **SPEAKER** key again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory. The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code or PIN2 code, if necessary.

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone


