Key Functions

- 1. **Speaker:** The speaker allows you to hear the other caller and the different ring tones and sounds offered by your phone.
- 2. Signal Strength Indicator: This icon represents the signal strength by displaying bars. The more bars displayed, the better the signal strength.
- 3. **Display Screen:** This screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone.
- 4. **Headset Jack:** Allows you to plug in an optional headset for safe, convenient hands-free conversations.
- 5. **Volume Key:** Allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the flip open) or adjust the voice volume during a call. The volume key can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down.
- **6. Left Softkey:** This key can be used in several different ways.
 - In idle mode, press to access the Menu.
 - When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the left softkey performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom left corner of the Display Screen.
- 7. **Right Softkey:** This key can be used in several different ways.
 - In idle mode, press to access your Contacts.

- When using other features, such as the Web Browse, the right softkey performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom right corner of the Display Screen
- 8. **OK Key:** Press when navigating through a menu accepts the highlighted choice in the menu.
- Navigation Key: This key allows you to scroll through the phone menu options and provides a shortcut to phone functions from standby mode.
- 10. SEND Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - Allows you to place or receive a call.
 - In standby mode, press the key once to access the Outgoing call log.
 - If you press and hold the key down, you will initiate the Voice Recognition feature.
- Numeric Keypad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
- Shift/Asterisk Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - Enters the asterisk [*] character for calling features.
 - In text entry mode, press to change the character input type (ABC, Abc, abc).
 - In standby mode, press and hold to switch your handset to Silent Mode.
- 13. Power/Accessory Interface Connector: The Power/ Accessory Interface Connector is used to plug in a travel adaptor, or any available accessory to your phone.

- 14. Microphone: The microphone allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- 15. Space/Pound Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - Enters the pound [#] character for calling features.
 - In text entry mode, press to enter a space.
 - In standby mode, press and hold will prompt you to enter your Lock code to lock the handset.
- 16. BACK Key: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a menu, press to return to the previous menu.
- 17. END Key: This key can be used in several different ways.
 - During a call, press to end the call.
 - When you receive an incoming call, press to enter silent mode and mute the ringer.
 - When the phone is off or in standby mode, press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone On or Off.
 - When in the main menu, press to return the phone to standby mode and cancel your input.
- 18. Ringer/Vibrate Indicator: This icon indicates that a ring tone or vibrate is selected as the ringer.
- 19. Battery Indicator: The battery indicator displays the amount of remaining battery charge currently available in your phone. When all bars are displayed in the battery icon. the phone's battery is fully charged. When no bars are displayed, the phone's battery is completely discharged or empty.

20.1X Indicator: Technology that allows faster data rates, always-on data service, and improved voice network capacity.

Viewing the Display Screen

Your phone's interior and exterior display screens provides a wealth of information about your phone's status and options. This list identifies the symbols you'll see on your phone's display screens:



tells you a call is in progress.

means there is no service, as your phone cannot find a signal.

displays your current signal strength. The more lines you have, the stronger your signal.


- displays your current battery strength at full.
- displays your current battery strength at empty.
- indicates that your phone is receiving 3G digital service.
- indicates that your phone is receiving digital (non 3G) service.
- indicates that your phone is roaming.
- indicates that your phone's browser is in security mode.

Phone Off indicates that your phone is in Airplane Mode. All TX and RX transmissions are turned Off.

indicates that your phone is in Auto Answer mode. Calls are automatically directed to voice mail after a selected number of rings.

indicates that you have new text messages waiting.

indicates that you have new Voice Mail messages waiting.



indicates that 3G functionality is dormant or inactive.

indicates that you are receiving information.

indicates that you are sending information.

indicates that a file (ringer, game, java app, etc.) has been downloaded to your phone.

indicates that the ringer is set at a level between 1-5 or that 1-Beep is selected.

indicates that the ringer is turned Off. Ø

indicates that your phone is in Vibrate mode.

indicates that your phone is in High+Vibrate mode.

indicates that your phone is in Silent mode.

indicates that an alarm is set on your phone.

Tip: Display indicators let you know when you're off the network.

Turning Your Phone On and Off

To turn your phone on:

• Press to turn your phone on.

Once your phone is On, it displays "Looking for Service" which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode – the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls. If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode. In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned On).

Tip: The Power Save feature helps to conserve your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

To turn your phone off:

Press and hold for two seconds until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

Using Your Phone's Battery and Charger

Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Lilon) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides approximately 3 hours of continuous digital talk time or approximately 6 days of continuous digital standby time. When the battery reaches 5% of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately two minutes of talk time left, the phone sounds an audible alert and then powers down.


Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, playing games, or browser use affect the battery's talk and standby times.

Tip: Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

Installing the Battery

To install the Lilon battery:


- 1. Insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone at an angle, making sure the plastic tab on the bottom of the battery is inserted into the matching slot in the phone.
- 2. Press down until the battery snaps into place.



Removing the Battery

To remove your battery:

- 1. Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
- 2. Push the battery release latch up completely.
- 3. Using the side tabs, pull the top of the battery away from the phone and remove.



Charging the Battery

Your phone's Lilon battery is rechargeable and should be charged as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose all the information you were just working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of either of your phone's display screens. indicates that the battery is full. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon blinks and the phone sounds a warning tone.

Always use a Samsung-approved desktop charger, travel adapter, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

Warning! Using the wrong battery charger could cause damage to your phone and void the warranty.

Phone Basics

Displaying Your Phone Number

Just in case you forget your phone number, your phone can remind you.

To display your phone number:

 Press the left softkey for Menu, followed by have to display your phone number.



Note: To access the phone's main Menu, press the left softkey 🥖 from standby mode. Menu items may be selected by highlighting them with the navigation key and pressing (2), or you can press the number corresponding to the menu item on your keypad.

Making and Answering Calls

Making Calls

Placing a call from your phone is as easy as making a call from any land-line phone. Just enter the number and press 🥼 and you're on vour way to clear calls.

To make a call using your keypad:

- 1. Make sure your phone is on.
- 2. Enter a phone number. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press back to erase one digit at a time. Press and hold Tack to erase the entire number.)
- 3. Press to call.
- or close the phone when you are finished.

Tip: To redial your last outgoing call, press



twice.

You can also place calls from your phone by using Voice Command (page 28), Speed Dialing numbers from your Contacts (page 18), and using your Call History listings (page 52).

Answering Calls

To answer an incoming call:

- 1. Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to Voice Mail.)
- 2. Press 🚺 to answer an incoming call. (Depending on your phone's settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key. See "Call Answer Mode" on page 94 for more information.)

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings and/or vibrates.
- The LED flashes.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts, the Contacts entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.

The following options are also available to handle an incoming call:

- Press or the volume key to quiet the ringer.
- Either press the right soft key or press and hold the volume key for 2 seconds to **Ignore** the incoming call and send it directly to your Voice Mail box.

Ending a Call

To disconnect a call when you are finished:

Close the phone or press



Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, the Missed Call log is displayed on your screen. You have two options:

- Press the left softkey / to Save the phone number to your Contacts.
- Press the right softkey to call the number back.

Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 (dial 🍻 🗀 and press 🔊), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted.

Warning: 911 call can be terminated by closing a flip or pressing END key.

However, after terminating call phone will stay in Emergency mode and from emergency mode you can exit by pressing 🐃 🖅.

Warning: You can not make 911 calls when the phone is in airplane mode and the icon "phone off "is displayed. Turn the phone back on, by disabling airplane mode. For more details, see "Airplane Mode" on page 92.

In-Call Options

Select actions by pressing the right softkey 📗 for **Options** during a call. A list of options is displayed that allows you to perform different actions during the course of a call. The following options are available: (To select an option, press the corresponding keypad number or highlight the option and press (2).)

- (1) Mute or UnMute allows you to mute or reactivate your phone's microphone.
- (2) Call History checks your call log for Missed, Outgoing, and Incoming calls. You can also erase the logs from this menu.
- (3) Contacts accesses the Contacts menu options.
- (4) 3-Way Call allows you to talk to two different people at the same time. (For more information, see "Making a Three-Way Call" on page 24.)
- (5) Messages allows you to check for Voice Mail and notifications.
- (6) Voice Memo allows you to record the current conversation. (For more information, see "Reviewing and Erasing Memos" on page 36.)
- (7) Utilities accesses the Utilities menu options.
- (8) Version displays the hardware/software version and Preferred Roaming List (PRL) being used.

End-of-Call Options

After receiving a call from or making a call to a phone number that is not in your Contacts, the phone number and the duration of the call are displayed. Press the right softkey to **Save** the new number in your Contacts. (See below for more information on "Saving a Phone Number.")

Note: The End-of-Call options are not displayed for calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted number.

Saving a Phone Number

Your phone can store up to 500 entries (numbers/e-mails/URLs) in seven categories (Home, Office, Mobile, Pager, Fax, Alias, E-Mail). Phone book capacity is based by number of entries not by number of contacts. (For more information, see "Adding a New Contact" on page 47.)

To save a number from standby mode:

- 1. Enter a phone number.
- 2. Press the right softkey for Save.
- Using the navigation keys, select New Entry to create a new contact or Find to add the number to an existing contact and press
- 4. Select the **Type** using the navigation key and press (3).
 - . Select the **Type** using the havigation key and press
 - HomeOfficeMobile
 - PagerFax
- Enter the name using the keypad and press <a>
- After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is

displayed.

Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as Voice Mail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause (P) sends the next set of numbers when you press .
- 2-Second Pause (T) automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2-second and hard pauses.

To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- 1. Enter a phone number from standby mode.
- 2. Press left softkey for **Options** and select **P pause** for a hard pause or **T pause** for a 2-second pause.
- 1. Enter additional numbers.
- 2. Press to dial the number.

Press right softkey to **Save** to save the number in your internal Contacts.

When dialing a number with a hard pause, press send the next set of numbers.

Dialing From Contacts

To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

1. Press the right softkey to display your **Contacts**.

- 2. Scroll left or right to search by Name, Entry, or Group.
- 3. Scroll up or down to highlight the desired entry and press to make the call.

Tip: If the desired entry contains more than one phone number, scroll up or down to display the number you wish to call and press to make the call.

Using One-Touch/Two-Touch/Three-Touch Speed Dialing

You can store up to 500 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a few buttons. With this feature, you can dial Speed Dial entries using one key press for locations 1-9, two key presses for locations 10-99, and three key presses for 100-500.

To use One-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 1-9:

 Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Calling...".)

To use Two-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 10-99:

- 1. Press the first digit.
- Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Calling...".)

To use Three-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 100-500:

- 1. Press the first digit.
- 2. Press the second digit.

3. Press and hold the third digit for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Calling...".)

Note: Your phone also supports 1- 4 digit dialing. If you enter a number using the keypad without holding the last number and then press your phone will dial those digits. (For example, if you enter 2 and press 🧗 , it dials 211, not the number stored in memory location 211.

Entering Text

Selecting a Character Input Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, symbols, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when sending text messages).

To change the character input mode:

- 1. When you display a screen where you can enter text, press the left softkey / for **Options**.
- 2. Select a character input mode:
 - **T9 (English)** to enter characters using predictive T9 Text Input (see page 20).
 - **Alpha** to enter characters by tapping the keypad (see page 20).
 - Symbol to enter symbols (see page 21).
 - Number to enter numbers (see page 21).

Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone by pressing keys just once per letter. (To select the **T9 (English)** mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" above.)

T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.) If the word you want does not display after you have entered all the letters, press one to scroll through additional word selections. To accept a word and insert a space, press

If you make a mistake, press to erase a single character. Press and hold to delete an entire entry.

To enter text using T9:

- From the text entry screen (for example, a new event in scheduler), press the left softkey for **Options** and select T9 (English).
- 2. Use your keypad to enter the new event. (For example, to enter "Meeting", press once, and twice, so once, once,

Entering Characters by Tapping the Keypad

To enter characters by tapping the keypad, select the Alpha mode (see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19). Press the corresponding key repeatedly until the desired character appears. When the Abc icon is shown, the first letter of the first word is capitalized and following letters are lowercase. The key can be used to select the case desired.

To enter text using Alpha:

 From a text entry screen (for example, a Contacts entry), press the left softkey for Options and select Alpha. 2. Use your keypad to enter the contact's name. (For example, to enter "Bill", press 2 oct twice, 4 three times, 5 kg three times, and three times again.)

Characters scroll in the following order:

- PQRS7
- 2 obc ABC2 8 tuv T U V 8
 - 3 def DEF3 **9** W X Y Z 9
 - 4 ghi GHI4
 - **5** M J K L 5 Space
- 6 M N O 6 Change case

After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Entering Numbers and Symbols

To enter numbers:

 Select the Number mode and press the appropriate key. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19.)

To enter symbols:

 Select the Symbol mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 19.) To enter a symbol, press the appropriate key indicated on the display.

Using Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, just follow these easy steps.

To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call:

- 1. Press *1 6 mo 7 page.
- 2. Enter the number you want to call.
- 3. Press .

To permanently block your number, call the Customer Service department of your network service provider.

Responding to Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

 Press (...). (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)

To switch back to the first caller:

• Press 🔊 again.

Do Not Disturb Mode

For those calls where you don't want to be interrupted, you can activate Do Not Disturb mode, which disables Call Waiting. To activate Do Not Disturb Mode:

Press of followed by 7 8 before placing your call.

To disable Do Not Disturb Mode

Press of followed by of before placing your call.

Using Call Forwarding

Call Forwarding lets you forward all your incoming calls to another phone number – even when your phone is turned off. You can continue to make calls from your phone when Call Forwarding is activated

To Activate Call Forwarding

- 1. Press * followed by 7 case 2 abc).
- 2. Enter the area code and phone number to which your future calls should be forwarded.
- 3. Press . You will see a message and hear a tone to confirm the activation of Call Forwarding.

To Deactivate Call Forwarding

- 1. Press * followed by 7 page (3 def).
- 2. Press . You will see a message and hear a tone to confirm the deactivation of Call Forwarding.

Note: You may be charged a higher rate for calls you have forwarded.

Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

To make a Three-Way Call:

- Enter a number you wish to call and press
- 2. Once you have established the connection, press the right softkey for **Options**, followed by 4 on for **3-Way Call**.
- 3. Dial the second number and press



4. When you're connected to the second party, press 🎑 again to begin your three-way call.

If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

Tip: You can also begin a Three-Way Call by displaying a phone number stored in your Internal Contacts, Call History, or Messaging. To call the third party, press

Note: Call Waiting and Three-Way Calling might not be available while roaming off the network.

Roaming

Understanding Roaming

Recognizing Icons on the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the network. The following chart indicates what you'll see depending on where you're using your phone.

Note: You will pay a higher per-minute rate for roaming calls.

Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming, your call quality will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on your home network. You may not be able to access certain features, such as web services.

Setting Your Roaming Mode

Your phone allows you to control your ability to roam. By using the **Roaming** menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts. Choose from three different settings on your phone to control your roaming experience:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press for Settings.
- 3. Press for Others.
- 4. Press (5) for Roaming.

- 5. Press 2 oct for Set Mode.
- To select an option, highlight it and press
 - Home Only: This setting allows you to access the home network only and prevents roaming on other networks.
 - Automatic: This setting seeks service. When service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.

Set NAM

This setting allows you to associate your mobile identification number (MIN) to your phone's electronic serial number (ESN).

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press for Settings.
- 3. Press 9^{wxyz} for **Others**.
- 4. Press (5) for Roaming.
- 5. Press (i) for Set NAM.
- Using the navigation keys, select NAM 1 or NAM 2 and press

Voice Services

Activating Voice Recognition

Voice recognition allows you to say commands to perform common functions supported by your phone. There is no voice training required to use the voice recognition feature. You simply say the predesignated command displayed on your screen in a normal tone of voice to perform the desired function.

To activate voice recognition:

- 1. Press and hold []. (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
- 2. Wait for the beep and then say one of the following commands:
- Voice Dial
- Voice Memo
- Calendar

- Contacts
- Status

When it recognizes one of these commands, the phone launches the associated application. If the phone does not hear a command within approximately eight seconds, it de-activates voice recognition without taking any action.

Note: If you want to use another button to activate voice recognition, in addition to , press the left softkey for **Menu**, followed by for **Launch Pad**. Though this menu, you can change button assignments, including the button used to launch "Voice Dial," which is the voice recognition application.

Using Voice Dial

Voice Dial allows you to dial any valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number by speaking the number naturally, without pausing between the digits.

Tips for using Voice Dial:

- Voice Dial works best in quieter environments.
- When saying a number, speak at a normal speed and say each digit clearly. There is no need to pause between digits.
- The phone recognizes the digits one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, zero, and oh. The phone does not recognize numbers such as "one eight hundred" for "1-800." Instead, say "one-eight-zero-zero."
- The phone recognizes only valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone numbers.
- If your phone does not usually recognize you correctly when you are using Voice Dial, try adapting Voice Dial to your voice, which can significantly improve accuracy for some speakers. (See "Changing Voice Dial Sensitivity" on page 33 for details.)

To place a call using Voice Dial:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding (The phone prompts you for a command.)



- Say Voice Dial. (The phone prompts you to say the number.)
- Say either a name stored in your Contacts or a valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number naturally and clearly.

- If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by the correct number, say "Yes." (You can also select the correct number from those displayed on the screen by pressing on the correct number. The phone will then dial the number.)
- If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect number, say No. (If there are other alternatives. the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct number from the Choice List, and then press (?) to dial.)
- If you said a name listed in your Contacts that has more than one number associated with it, the phone displays the different locations (Home, Office, Mobile, Pager, Fax) and asks you which one to dial. Say one of the location names and the phone will dial the number for the location you specified.

Note: In some cases, the phone might ask you to repeat a name or number. Make sure that the number is a valid 7 or 10 digit North American phone number, and then say the number again. If the number isn't valid, or if the phone still doesn't understand the number on the second try, it will not place a call.

Enabling/Disabling Choice Lists

You can customize whether the Voice Dial feature displays the list of top voice recognition choices or automatically dials the first number. without displaying a choice list.

To enable or disable choice lists for Voice Dial:

- 1. Press the left softkey 👍 for **Menu**.
- 2. Press for **Settings**.

- 3. Press 3 def for Voice Dial.
- 4. Press 3 def for Choice Lists.
- 5. Press 1:a, for Name Dialing, 2 acc for Digit Dialing or 3 det for Contacts.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select Automatic, Always On or Always Off and press (2).

Using Name Lookup

Name Lookup lets you retrieve contact information for any person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person.

To retrieve information using Name Lookup:

- Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
- Say Contacts. (The phone will prompt you to say the name.)
- Say the full name of the person, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone will play the name it recognized through the earpiece, and then open the contact information for that name.)
 - If the phone says, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect name, say No. The phone then prompts you with the next name, if there is one. If there are no more names, the phone will say "Sorry, No Match Found."

Phone Status Information

The voice recognition Status option gives you an update on your signal strength and battery level.

To retrieve your phone's status information:

 Press and hold to activate voice recognition. (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.) 2. Wait for the beep and say **Status**. Your phone's current status information is displayed.

Customizing Voice Dial

Adapting Voice Dial

Voice Dialing is speaker independent, which means that no initial training or adaptation is required. Some users with heavy accents or unusual voice characteristics may encounter difficulty in achieving high accuracy with speaker independent Voice Dialing, so the Adapt Digits feature allows users to dramatically improve the digit accuracy through adaptation. Users who get acceptable digit recognition accuracy will find no additional benefit to performing the Adapt Digit adaptation.

After you adapt Voice Dial, your phone will be customized to your voice. Other people will not be able to use Voice Dial on your phone unless they reset the phone to factory defaults.

Note: ONLY adapt Voice Dial if the system is frequently misrecognizing your speech. You can always restore the system to its original factory setting.

Adaptation involves recording several digit sequences to teach the system your voice. The adaptation process takes about 3 minutes. Tips for adapting Voice Dial:

- Adapt digits in a guiet place.
- Make sure you wait for the beep before starting to speak.
- Speak clearly, but say each digit sequence naturally.
- If you make a mistake while recording a sequence of digits, or if there is an unexpected noise that spoils the recording, you

can say or select **No** when the prompt asks, "Did the recording sound OK?" You will then be prompted to re-record the sequence.

To adapt Voice Dial to your voice:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press for Settings.
- 3. Press 3 def for Voice Dial.
- 4. Press (1) for **Digit Dialing**.
- 5. Press **To Adapt Digits**. (The phone displays the first digit sequence.)
- When you are ready to start recording, press ②. (The phone prompts you to say the first sequence of digits.)
- Wait for the beep, and then repeat the digits using a normal tone of voice. (The phone plays back your recording and asks you if the recording sounds "OK.")
 - If the recording sounds OK (no mistakes and no background noises), say Yes.
 - If you need to re-record the digits to fix any problems, say
 No. (The phone then prompts you to say the digits again.)
- 8. Wait for the beep, and then record the digits again. (Repeat this step until you are satisfied with the recording.)
- After confirming that the recording sounds OK, repeat the recording process with the next set of digits. In total, there are 10 sets of numbers. When you are finished with a full session, you will reach a screen that reads, "Adaptation Complete."

Note: It is recommended that you perform the complete adaptation of Voice Dial at least once to achieve the maximum benefit of this feature. If a partial adaptation is performed, you can always return later and resume the process from the half way point.

Resetting Voice Dial Adaptation

To erase any adaptation and reset Voice Dial to its original state:

- 1. Press the left softkey for **Menu**.
- 2. Press 6 for Settings.
- 3. Press 3 def for Voice Dial.
- 4. Press (10) for Digit Dialing.
- 5. Press 2 on for Reset Digits.
- 6. Press the left softkey 🗐 to select **OK**.

Changing Voice Dial Sensitivity

You can adjust your phone's sensitivity to sounds when listening for voice commands or names, making it require a more exact or less exact sound match before responding to your command. To adjust your phone's voice dial sensitivity:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 6 for **Settings**.
- 3. Press 3 def for Voice Dial.
- 4. Press 2 obs for Sensitivity.
- 5. Press (1:0) for **Commands** or (2 obs) for **Names**.
- 6. Press the navigation key up or down to select **Reject More** or **Reject Less** and press (%).

 If you select Reject More, your phone will require a more exact sound match and if you select Reject Less, your phone will require a less exact sound match.

Changing Voice Dial Prompts

By default, your phone provides audio prompts such as "Please say a command". You can turn these prompts on or off.

To turn voice dial prompts On or Off:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press for Settings.
- 3. Press (3 def) for Voice Dial.
- 4. Press 4 on for **Sound**.
- 5. Press 1 o for **Prompts**, 2 o for **Digits** or 3 for **Names**.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select **On** or **Off** and press .

Changing Voice Launch

By default, Voice Dial is activated by pressing and holding . You can change your phone's settings to activate Voice Dialing whenever you open the flip lid of your phone.

To change your Voice Launch method:

- 1. Press the left softkey /: for Menu.
- 2. Press for **Settings**.
- 3. Press (3 def) for Voice Dial.
- 4. Press (5 M) for Voice Launch.

5. Press the navigation key up or down to select **Send Only** or Send and Flip and press (3).

Voice Memos

You can use your phone to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or other items.

Recording Voice Memos

To record a voice memo:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing and holding (The phone will prompt you for a command.)



- 2. Say Voice Memo.
- 3. Wait for the beep and then start speaking. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)
 - Press the left softkey / to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey 🗐 again to Resume recording.)
- 4. To finish recording, press the right softkey 🖺 to **Stop** to the recording prior to the countdown completion.
- 5. The memo is saved to your phone. Press the right softkey to Play your message for review.

Tip: You can also assign Voice Memos to either the left or right navigation keys. For more information, see "Launch Pad" on page 93. You can also create voice memos by pressing the left softkey for Menu. followed by 5 kg 1 20.

To record a conversation during a phone call:

- 1. During a call, press the right softkey for **Options**.
- Press for Voice Memo. (A one minute counter is displayed on the screen to indicating the amount of time a single voice memo can be recorded.)
 - Press the left softkey to Pause the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left softkey again to Resume recording.)
- 3. Press the right softkey to **Stop** to the recording prior to the countdown completion. The memo is saved to your phone.

Note: A total of 10 minutes in 10 separate memos can be recorded and saved. Individual memos can record up to 60 seconds of audio.

Reviewing and Erasing Memos

To play the voice memos you have recorded:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🔠 followed by 5🔊 for **Utilities**.
- 2. Press (1.0) for Voice Memo.
- Press (2 cond) for Review. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
- 4. Select a memo and press the right softkey or . or .

Press the number corresponding to the memo you want to review. (The phone replays the memo.)

To erase an individual memo:

- 1. Press the left softkey f followed by f for **Utilities**.
- 2. Press (1'e) for Voice Memo.

- 3. Press 2 ... for **Review**. (The phone displays a list of saved memos, with the first one selected.)
- 4. Using the navigation keys, highlight the memo to erase.
- 5. Press the left softkey 🔝 for **Options** followed by 📭 for Erase.
- **6.** Press the navigation key up to select **Yes** and press (). To erase all voice memos:
 - Press the left softkey (followed by (for Utilities.
 - 2. Press (1'e) for Voice Memo.
 - 3. Press (3^{def}) for **Erase All**.
 - 4. Press the navigation key left to select **Yes** and press (§)



Using Text to Speech (TTS)

Your phone is equipped with a Text to Speech (TTS) feature. TTS causes your phone to speak the currently-highlighted menu choice. As you navigate through the menus, TTS informs you what your current selection is, without having to look at the display screen.

Note: TTS is enabled for only the first two menu levels.

Enabling/Disabling TTS

To enable TTS:

- 1. Press left softkey 1, followed by 6 for Settings.
- 2. Press 4 ghi for TTS.
- 3. Press (10) for TTS Mode.
- 4. Using the navigation key, select **TTS On** and press (3).

To disable TTS:

- 1. Press left softkey (1), followed by (600) for **Settings**.
- 2. Press 4_{ghi} for **TTS**.
- 3. Press (i) for TTS Mode.
- 4. Using the navigation key, select **TTS Off** and press <a> .

Adjusting the TTS Volume level

- 1. Press left softkey (1), followed by (6 for Settings.
- 2. Press 4 gni for TTS.
- 3. Press 2 obc for TTS Volume.
- 4. Using the navigation key, select the desired volume level and press 🧐.

Navigating Through Menus

Menu Styles

Your phone can display the various features and options in one of two different menu styles, **Nature** and **Icon**. Regardless of which style you prefer, menu organization and key commands do not change.

Nature Style

Nature style displays all the various menu choices in a vertical list. As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. You can use your navigation keys to scroll through menus quickly and easily. The scroll bar at the right of the menu keeps track of your position in the menu at all times.

- To navigate through a menu, simply press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu, such as **Settings**. you may also navigate to the next menu by pressing the navigation key left or right.
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice. For example, if you want to view your last incoming call:
 - 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
 - 2. Press 2 con for Call History.
 - 3. Press (3 def) for Incoming Calls.

lcon

Icon style displays the first level menu choices with graphical icons arranged in a grid pattern. In other menu levels, choices are arranged in a vertical list, similar to Nature style.

- To navigate through a first level menu, simply press the navigation key in the direction towards your desired menu choice. The currently-highlighted menu choice is enlarged and has a text label beneath it. Once the desired menu option is highlighted, press 🧐.
- You can also press the number corresponding to the menu choice.

Note: For more information on changing the menu style between Nature and Icon, see "Changing the Phone's Menu Style" on page 83.

Using Contacts

Adding a New Contact

Your phone can store up to 500 entries (numbers/e-mails/URLs) in seven categories (Home, Office, Mobile, Pager, Fax, Alias, E-Mail). Phone book capacity is based by number of entries not by number of contacts.

To add a new entry:

1. Enter a new phone number and press the right softkev for Save

Finding Contacts

There are several ways to display your Contacts entries; by name, by entry, or by group. To find an entry from the Contacts menu:

- 2. Press (1'e), for Contacts.
- 3. Press (1 in for List Entries.
- 4. Press the navigation key left or right to search by **Name**, Group, or Entry.

- 5. Once the desired option is highlighted, press the navigation key down.
- Enter the first few letters or entry # to locate the desired entry.
- 7. Scroll to highlight the name and press 🚺 to make the call.

Adding a Phone Number to a Contact Entry

To add a phone number to an entry:

- 1. Press the left softkey /: for Menu.
- 2. Press (1.0) for Contacts.
- 3. Press (1'e) for List Entries.
- 4. Select the desired entry and press 🗐.
- 5. Press the left softkey for **Options**, followed by **2** to **Edit** the entry.
- Press the navigation key down until the desired label (Home, Office, Mobile, etc.) is highlighted.
- 7. Enter the phone number using the keypad and press 🧐.

Editing a Contacts Entry's Phone Number

To edit an entry's phone number:

To select a ringer type for an entry:

Call History

Viewing History

You'll find the Call History feature very helpful. It is a list of the last 20 phone numbers (or Contacts entries) for each of: calls missed, calls made, or calls accepted. Call History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as new numbers are added to the beginning of the list and the oldest entries are removed from the bottom of the list.

Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) and Contacts entry name (if the phone number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list. To view a Call History entry:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 2 obs for Call History.
 - Press (1) for Recent Calls.
 - Press (2 abo) for Outgoing Calls.
 - Press for Incoming Calls.
 - Press 4_{ghi} for Missed Calls.

Tip: You can access your list of recent calls from the idle screen by pressing the navigation key down. You can also access your list of outgoing calls from the idle screen by pressing the kev.

Call History Options

For additional information on a particular call, highlight a Call History entry and press (2). The time and date of the call is displayed.

Tip: You can also scroll between Call History entries by pressing the navigation key left or right.

Press the left softkey \bigcirc for **Options** to select one of the following options for this entry:

- Dial
- Save
- Prepend
- Erase

Making a Call From Call History

To place a call from Call History:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 2 on for Call History.
- 3. Select Recent Calls 10, Outgoing Calls 2..., Incoming Calls 3. or Missed Calls 4...
- Highlight the entry you want to call and press to dial the number.

Note: You cannot make calls from Call History to entries identified as Unknown or Restricted.

Saving a Phone Number From Call History

To save a phone number from Call History:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 2 occ for Call History.

- 3. Select Recent Calls (10), Outgoing Calls (200) Incoming Calls (3 or Missed Calls (4 ghi).
- 4. Highlight the entry you want to save and press 🧐.



5. Press the left softkey (: for **Options**, followed by **2** who to Save the number.

Follow the onscreen prompts to complete the entry. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 16 for more details.)

After you have saved the number, the new Contacts entry is displayed.

Note: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Internal Contacts or from calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted.

Prepending a Phone Number From **Call History**

If you need to make a call from Call History and you happen to be outside your local area code, you can add the appropriate prefix by prepending the number.

To prepend a phone number from Call History:

- 1. Press the left softkey / for Menu.
- 2. Press 2 oc for Call History.
- 3. Select Recent Calls (10), Outgoing Calls (2000), Incoming Calls (3 def), or Missed Calls (4 ghi).
- 4. Highlight the entry you want to prepend and press
- 5. Press the left softkey for **Options**, followed by 3 or to Prepend the number.
- 6. Use the keypad to enter the desired numbers.

7. Press to call the pre-pended number.

Erasing Call History

To erase individual Call History entries, see "Call History Options" on page 51.

To erase Call History:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 2 on for Call History.
- 3. Press 5 pm for Erase Logs.
- 4. Select Outgoing Calls 1:0, Incoming Calls 2 ob), Missed Calls (3 or All Calls (4 ghi).
- 5. Using the navigation key, highlight **Yes**, and press 🧐.

Air Time

Air time allows you to check the time of the last call or the total air time since your phone was activated on the network. **These times** are not meant for billing purposes. To view the air time:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 2 on for Call History.
- 3. Press for Call Timers.
- 4. Press (1) for Last Call, (2 ob) for Recent Calls, or (3 of) for **LifeTime**.

Messaging

Now you can exchange text and email messages right from your phone and stay connected without saying a word. Within the Messaging menu you can also view the number of voice mail messages you have waiting for you. The following folders are available in the Messaging menu:

- Voice Mail allows you to listen to any voice messages.
- Text Messaging allows you to create and send new text messages, as well as check your Text Message Inbox for received messages.
- E-Mail allows you to send a text message to a person's email address.
- Chat allows you to chat with other people using the Chat feature

Using Voice Mail

Setting Up Your Voice Mail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voice mail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your voice mail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

To set up your voice mail:

- 1. Press and hold the navigation key up.
- 2. Follow the system prompts to create your passcode, record your greeting, and record your name announcement.

Note: You must request this feature from your service provider for it to work correctly.

Voice Mail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By the LED blinking red.
- By displaying at the top of your screen.

New Voice Mail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your voice mail.

To call your voice mail:

- 1. Press the right softkey to View your message.
- 2. Press the left softkey / to **Listen** to the message.

Tip: You can also press and hold the navigation key up to check your voice mail.

To display your Missed Calls:

Press the left softkey 🔝 for Menu, followed by 🔞



Important: When you are roaming off the network, you may not receive notification of new voice mail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your voice mail by dialing 1 + area code + your Phone Number. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing voice mail while roaming off the network.

Note: Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are only notified of new messages when your phone is turned on and you are in a Service Area.

Retrieving Your Voice Mail Messages

To dial your voice mail from your phone, you can either speed dial your voice mail by pressing and holding the navigation key up or by using the menu keys.

Using the Menu to Retrieve Your Messages

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press (3 def) for Messaging.
- 3. Press (10) for Voice Mail.
- 4. Press (1) for Inbox.
- 5. Press the left softkey 🖪 to **Listen** to your messages.

Note: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voice mail from your phone.

Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice and text messages.

To clear the icon from the display screen:

- 1. Press the left softkey /: for Menu.
- 2. Press 3 def for Messaging.
- 3. Press (1) for Voice Mail.
- 4. Press 2 obc for Clear VM Count.
- 5. Press the navigation key up to select **Yes** and press 🧐.

Text Messaging

Using Text Messaging

Using your phone you can send text MSGs to other mobile phones in North America and rest of the world, depending on your carrier. For more information, refer to you carrier.

In addition, messaging includes a variety of pre-set messages such as "Where are you?" that make composing messages fast and easy.

To send a text message:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press of for Messaging.
- 3. Press 2 obc for Text Messaging.
- 4. Press (1) for **Send Message**.
- Enter the phone number of the person to whom you're sending a message and press <a>

Shortcut: You can choose phone numbers or addresses saved to your phone by pressing the left softkey for **Options**, and selecting **Contacts**.

- If you wish to send your text message to multiple addressees, repeat step 5. Use the navigation keys to move up and down your list of addressees. You can send a text message to a maximum of 10 numbers.
- Enter your message using the keypad. Press when finished.

Tip: For more information on entering text, see "Entering Text" on page 19.

7. If you want to adjust the Send options for your message. press 3 or. Otherwise, proceed to the next step.

You can adjust the following options for your text message:

- Priority
- Validity
- Delivery Report
- Call Back #
- Def. Delivery

Note: Support for these options may vary depending on your service provider. Please contact your service provider for more information.

8. Press the left softkey 🔁 to Send.

To read a Text Message:

When you receive a text message, you will see "New Text Message" on your display screen. Select the right softkey



To reply to a Text Message:

- 1. While the message is open, select the left softkey 🗐 for Options.
- 2. Press 2 obc to Reply.
- 3. Compose your reply or use a pre-composed messages.

- Use the left softkey for **Options**, followed by to
 to select a character input mode.
- To use pre-written messages press left softkey for **Canned MSG**. Press the corresponding number on the keypad to enter the preset message response.
- 4. Press 🧐.
- 5. Press the left softkey 🔁 to Send.

Erasing Messages

You can erase messages at anytime from the Inbox, Outbox, or Saved message folders. To erase the messages from the desired folder:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press of for Messaging.
- 3. Press 2 obc for **Text Messaging**.
- 4. Press for Erase Msg.
- 5. Press for Inbox, 2 on for Outbox, 3 of for Saved or 4 or All Messages.
- Press the navigation key left or right to select **Yes** and press

Message Setup Options

There are several options associated with text messages. The Message Setup menu allows you to customize the options to fit your preferences. The message options are divided into the following categories:

 General: allows to configure the scroll timer and MSG Reminder.

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 New Message: allows you to configure Call Back #. Save Message, Entry Method, Delivery Acknowledgment, and Canned Messages.

To access the Msg Setup menu:

General Options

Message Reminder

This option allows you to configure how often you are notified of new text messages that are waiting. To access message reminder:

- 1. Press the left softkey 📶 for Menu.
- 2. Press 3 def for Messaging.
- 3. Press 2 obc for **Text Messaging**.
- 4. Press 7 for Msg Settings.
- 5. Press (1) for **General**.
- 6. Press 2 occ for MSG Reminder.
- Press the navigation key up or down to select the desired duration and press to Select.

New Message Options

The following options are available in the New Message option settings. These options allow you to customize options associated with text messages.

Call Back Number

The Call Back Number option allows you to insert a callback number that is automatically sent with all new text messages. To access callback number:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- Press 3 for Messaging.
- 3. Press 2 occ for **Text Messaging**.
- 4. Press 7 for Msg Settings.
- 5. Press 2 ob for New Message.
- 6. Press (1'e) for Call Back #.

- 7. Press and hold BACK to clear the number. Enter the new number using your keypad.
- 8. Press (9) to Save.

Save Message

Allows you to configure the auto save options for outgoing text messages. You can select one of the following options:

- Do Not Save does not save a copy of the outgoing message.
- Prompt Save prompts you to save a copy of the outgoing message.
- Auto Save automatically saves a copy of the outgoing message in the filed folder.

To access save message:

Entry Method

Canned Messages

Canned messages are used to enter common responses to questions. A canned message can be selected and automatically entered into the message. Canned messages can also be customized

to whatever you want by editing the 11 pre-set messages already stored in your phone. To edit a canned message:

- 2. Press 3 of for Messaging.
- 3. Press 2 obc for Text Messaging.
- 4. Press 7 for Msg Settings.
- 5. Press 2 on for New Message.

- 8. Press and hold back to erase the message. Enter your new message or changes and press (9) to save.

F-Mail and Chat

Your phone is capable of accessing online e-mails and engaging in online chat sessions. Consult with your Service Provider for more details.

To access your online e-mail or chat session:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🖅 for Menu.
- 2. Press (3 def) for Messaging.
- 3. Press 3 of for E-Mail or 4 on for Chat.

Do More

Wireless Web

Your phone comes equipped with Wireless Web access through your browser. You can view specially designed version of popular sites which includes sports, weather, news, stock quotes etc.... as well as downloadable ringtones, Wallpapers and games. When you launch the browser, the phone will connect to the Internet and the service indicator icon will display.

Note: Rates and pricing vary according to your service plan. Please contact your service provider for additional information.

Launching the Browser

To launch a web connection:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 4_{ghl} for **Do More**.
- 3. Press (10) for Wireless Web.
- 4. Your connected to the Mobile Web Home page.

Web Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone's display lets you know the current status of your web connection through indicators which appear at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:

- Your web connection is active (data is being transferred).
 Incoming voice calls go directly to voice mail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate.
- When your web connection is dormant (no data is being sent or received). Though not currently active, when dormant the phone can restart an active connection quickly; voice calls can be made and received.

Navigating the Wireless Web

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a web session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

Softkeys

When browsing the Web, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkey buttons directly below the phone's display screen. Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.

To use softkeys, simply press the desired softkey button. If an additional pop-up menu appears when you press the softkey button, select the menu items using your keypad (if they're numbered) or by highlighting the option and pressing .

Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.

 Press the navigation key up and down to scroll line by line or press the volume buttons on the side of the phone to scroll one page at a time.

Navigating Between Web Pages

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating Web sites.

 Select on-screen items by using the navigation key to highlight the desired item, then press the desired softkey button (or press (2)).

You'll find that the left softkey 📶 is used primarily for selecting items.

 If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item.

Links, which appear as <u>underlined text</u>, allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

 Select links by highlighting the link and then selecting the appropriate softkey.

Tip: The tenth item in a numbered list may be selected by pressing the key on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.

• To go back one page, press _____ on your phone. (Note that _____ is also used like a BACKSPACE key to delete text.)

Using the Menu to Navigate

By pressing the Menu softkey, you can navigate between web pages.

- Press the Menu softkey and select one of the following options:
- 1. **Home** to return to the Telus home page.
- 2. **Forward** one web page (if you have not returned back from a previous web page, this option is greyed out).
- Bookmarks displays a list of your existing bookmarks as well as allowing you to mark the current site as a new bookmark.
- 4. Go To URL to directly jump to a specific web page.
- 5. Show URL to view the URL of your current webpage.
- History to see a list of web pages you have browsed this session.
- 7. **Search** allows you to search the web.
- 8. Snapshots allows you to create a snapshot of your current web page. You are returned to your current snapshot page when you restart your browser.
- 9. Reload this page.
- 10. Advanced allows you to customize your Mobile Browser preferences.
- 11. Clear allows you to erase your browser History, browser cache, stored cookies or autofill information.
- Exit closes your Mobile browser and returns you to the Idle screen.
- 13. About displays your Mobile browser version.

Downloading Ringtones, Games and Images

With your new web enabled phone, you have access to a variety of services such as downloadable Ringtones, Games, Images, Tools and Other applications.

Tip: You can access the Do More menu from the Idle screen by pressing .

To view your scheduled events:

- A calendar is displayed. Dates that have events scheduled have a box around them

 - If you have no memos composed, then the New Memo menu is automatically displayed.

- Enter up to 60 characters in the memo using the keypad and press to Save. (For more details on entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 19.)

To view a note:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 5 pm for Utilities.
- 3. Press 4_{gh} for **Note Pad**.
- 4. Use the navigation keys to scroll to the desired memo and press to view the memo details.

To delete saved notes:

- 1. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Menu.
- 2. Press 5 m for **Utilities**.
- 3. Press 4_{gh} for Note Pad.
- Highlight the task you wish to delete using the navigation keys.

- 5. Press the left softkey 🗐 for Options.
- 6. Press of to Erase the highlighted note or 4 to Erase
- 7. Highlight **Yes** with the navigation key and press (2) to confirm.

Using the Calculator

Your phone comes with a built-in calculator.

To use the calculator:

- 4. Enter a number with the keypad. (Press to insert a decimal point and/or to make the number negative or positive.)

World Clock

World Clock displays what time it is in twenty-four different time zones around the world together with one or more major cities, states, regions, or countries in a time zone.

To access world time:

- Press the navigation key left, right, up, or down to display the different time zones.

Phone Settings

You can customize your phone's display, sound and other settings to the way you like it.

Display Settings

Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Your phone allows you to choose how the menu appears on your display screen.

To select the display's menu style:

Changing the Wall Paper

Your new phone offers options for what you see on the display screen when in standby mode.

To change the display images:

- 2. Press for Settings.
- 3. Press (i) for **Display**.
- 4. Press 2 obc for Wall Papers.

5. Press To for **Local Image** or **Local**

- **6.** Press the navigation key left or right until the desired image is displayed.
- 7. Press (to save and exit.

Changing the Text Greeting

The text greeting can be up to 12 characters and is displayed on your phone's screen in standby mode. You may choose to display a custom greeting or display your User Name on the phone's screen. To display or change your custom greeting:

Alerts

Your phone can alert you with an audible tone when you change service areas, once a minute during a voice call, or when a call has been connected.

The different actions available are:

- Minute Beep An alert tone is sounded every minute that you are connected.
- Service Alert An alert tone is sounded when you come in or out of your coverage area.
- Connect An alert tone is sounded when you are initially connected.
- Disconnect Fade- An alert tone is sounded when the signal fades and the connection is lost.

To enable or disable alert sounds:

- 3. Press 2 obc for **Sounds**.
- 4. Press 3 for Alerts.
- Press:

- 6. Select **On** or **Off** using the navigation key and press (?) to save and exit.

Key Beep Volume

To adjust the key beep volume:

- 4. Press (5) for **Key Beep**.
- Press the navigation key right to increase or left to decrease the volume.

Tone Length

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a key press. Voice mail or other automated systems may require long or short time lengths to activate different features. To select a key tone:

Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Notepad, Voice Memos, etc., when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When your phone is in Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information. All incoming calls will be sent directly to your voice mail box.

To set your phone to Airplane Mode:

- 1. Press the left softkey ᆁ for **Menu**.
- 2. Press 6 for Settings.
- 3. Press for Airplane Mode. (A brief explanation of Airplane Mode will display.)
- 4. Press the navigation key up or down to select **On** or **Off** and press (9) to save and exit.

While in Airplane Mode, your phone's standby screen will display "Phone off."

Note: 911 and emergency calls can not be made when the Airplane mode is on.

Launch Pad

You have the option of assigning the navigation key to an often-used function. The center navigation key cannot be changed. Pressing the navigation key left in standby mode will launch the assigned feature.

To set the actions required to answer an incoming call:

Phone Security

Accessing the Security Menu

All of your phone's security settings are available through the Security menu. You must enter your lock code to view the Security menu.

- **4.** Enter your lock code. (The security menu is displayed.)

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of vour Phone Number.

Using Your Phone's Lock Feature

Locking Your Phone

When your phone is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 911 or special numbers.

To lock your phone:

Unlocking Your Phone

To unlock your phone:

Special Numbers

You can save up to three special numbers in addition to your Internal Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories). You can make and receive calls from special numbers even when your phone is locked. You can save three special numbers in addition to your Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories). To add or replace a special number:

- 1. From the Security menu, press (3 or Special #.
- Select entry one, two, or three and press <a>
- 3. Enter the number using the keypad.

4. Press (9) to Save.

Note: There are no Speed Dial options associated with special numbers.

Erasing the Contacts

To erase all the names and phone numbers in your Contacts:

Erasing Content

This option deletes all saved downloaded content from the phone. including games, Ringtones, Wallpapers, and applications. To erase your downloads:

- 2. Using the navigation key, select **Yes** and press (to permanently delete.

Resetting Your Phone

Resetting the phone restores all the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings. The Contacts, Scheduler, and Messaging are not affected.

To reset your phone:

- 1. From the Security menu, press for **Reset Phone**. Your phone will reset.
- 2. Using the navigation key, select **Yes** and press (?). Your phone will reset.

Safety

Getting the Most Out of Your Reception

Keeping Tabs on Signal Strength

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal. If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key. Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Knowing Radio Frequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below. In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after

reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended, and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend, or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it's inoperable, return it to a dealer store or call Customer Support for service.

Note: For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone Failure to follow the instructions outlined may lead to

Using Your Phone While Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first. When using your phone in the car:

- Get to know your phone and its features, such as speed dial and re-dial.
- When available, use a hands-free device.
- Position your phone within easy reach.
- Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when stationary or before pulling into traffic.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may divert your attention from the road.
- Dial 911 to report serious emergencies. It's free from your wireless phone.
- Use your phone to help others in emergencies.
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless number when necessary.

Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn off your phone when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating that two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

Turn off your phone when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your

phone or its accessories could generate sparks. Sparks could cause an explosion or a fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

Restricting Children's Access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone, dial 911 by mistake or make calls that increase your phone bill.

Caring for the Battery

Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

Use only Samsung approved batteries and travel adapters.
 These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.

- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from 32° F to 113° F (0° C to 45° C).
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. When used correctly, the battery can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:
 - Less than one month:
 4° F to 140° F (-20° C to 60° C)
 - More than one month: 4° F to 113° F (-20° C to 45° C)

Disposal of Lithium Ion (Lilon) Batteries

For safe disposal options of your Lilon batteries, contact your nearest service center.

Special Note: Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

Note: For safety, do not handle a damaged or leaking Lilon battery.

Specific Absorption Rates (SAR) for Wireless Phones

The SAR is a value that corresponds to the relative amount of RF energy absorbed in the head of a user of a wireless handset. The SAR value of a phone is the result of an extensive testing. measuring and calculation process. It does not represent how much RF the phone emits. All phone models are tested at their highest value in strict laboratory settings. But when in operation, the SAR of a phone can be substantially less than the level reported to the FCC. This is because of a variety of factors including its proximity to a base station antenna, phone design and other factors. What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal quidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety. All phones must meet the federal standard, which incorporates a substantial margin of safety. As stated above, variations in SAR values between different model phones do not mean variations in safety. SAR values at or below the federal standard of 1.6 W/kg are considered safe for use by the public.

The highest reported SAR values of the **SCH-**a570 are:

- 1.42 W/kg CDMA Head SAR
- 1.06 W/kg CDMA Body SAR
