

Important safety precautions

Important safety precautions

Read these guidelines before using your wireless phone. Failure to comply with them may be dangerous or illegal.

Road safety at all times

Do not use a hand-held phone while driving; park the vehicle first.

Switching off when refuelling

Do not use the phone at a refuelling point (service station) or near fuels or chemicals.

Switching off in an aircraft

Wireless phones can cause interference. Using them in an aircraft is both illegal and dangerous.

Switching off near all medical equipment

Switch off your phone near medical equipment. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy. Follow any regulations or rules in force.

Interference

All wireless phones may be subject to interference, which could affect their performance.

Special Regulations

Meet any special regulations in force in any area and always with off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger (in a hospital for example).

Water Resistance

Your phone is not water-resistant. Keep it dry.



Sensible Use

Use only in the normal position (held to the ear). Avoid unnecessary contact with the antenna when the phone is switched on.

Emergency call

Key in the emergency number for your present location, then press . Give all necessary information as accurately as possible. Do not end the call until given permission to do so.

Keeping small children away from your phone

Keep the phone and all its parts including accessories out of the reach of small children.

Accessories and Batteries

Use only Samsung-approved accessories and batteries. Use of any unauthorized accessories could damage your phone and may be dangerous.

Use only Smsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers.

Qualified Service

Only qualified service personnel may repair your phone.

For more detailed safety information, see "Health and safety information" on page 151.






Your phone





Display

The display has 2 areas.



Icons

Icon	Description
Taul	Signal strength : Shows the received signal strength. The greater the number of bars, the better the signal.
C	Service : Appears when a call is in progress.
X	No service : Appears when you are outside a service area. When it displays, you can neither make nor receive calls. Wait a little while for a better signal or move into an open area to regain service.
8	Roaming : Appears when you are out of your home area and have logged onto a different network; for example, when traveling in other countries.
<u> </u>	Alarm mode : Appears when you have set an alarm to ring at a specified time.



Your phone

Icon	Description (continued)
×	New message : Indicates that there is a new message waiting to be viewed.
8	Vibration mode : Appears when the call ringer type is set to Vibrate , or when your phone is in Silent mode.
	Battery status : Shows the level of your battery. The more bars you see, the more power you have remaining.

External display

Your phone has an external display on the front of the phone. It indicates when you have an incoming call or a message. It also alerts you at the specified time when you have set an alarm. The backlight turns on and the corresponding icon appears on the external display.

When you close the phone, the display shows the current time on a digital clock.

Backlight


The backlight illuminates the display and keypad. When you press any key or open the phone, the backlight turns on and remains on for a given period of time, depending on the setting in the **Display/Light** menu (**MENU 8-2**).

To specify the length of time for which the backlight is active, set the **Display/Light** menu. See page 146 for further details.

Service light

The service light on the front of the phone flashes to indicate an incoming call, message, or alarm, and flashes for a few seconds when you turn the phone on or off.

You can select the time period for the service light to blink in the **Service LED** menu (**MENU 8-2-4**). See page 147 for further details.



Camera

The camera module at the top center of your phone allows you to take a photo or record a video while on the move.

For further details about the Camera feature, see page 117.





Flash

You can use the built-in flash on the front of the phone to view the external display or to take photos when it is dark. You can also use the flash in emergency conditions.

With the external display on, press and hold 🔽 on the left side of the phone to turn the flash on or off.

If you receive a notification of an incoming message or a notice of a missed call, you need to clear those items before you can use the flash. See page 53 for further details.

Getting started

Using the battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion battery. Use only approved batteries and chargers. Ask your local Samsung dealer for further details.

Note: You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A discharged standard battery recharges fully in approximately 200 minutes.

Installing the battery

1. Place the battery so that the tabs on the end align with the slots at the bottom of the phone.



2. Press the battery down until it clicks into place.

Make sure that the battery is properly installed before switching on the power.





Removing the battery

- If necessary, switch off the phone by pressing and holding interpretent until the power-off image displays.
- 2. To remove the battery:
 - Slide the battery catch lock toward the top of the phone and hold it in that position.
 - ^② Lift away the battery, as shown.



Charging the Battery

A travel charger and a desktop charger are provided for charging your batteries.

Using the Travel Charger

The travel charger allows you to use the phone while the battery is charging, but this will cause the battery to charge more slowly.

1. With the battery in position on the phone, plug the travel charger connector into the jack at the bottom of the phone.

Make sure that the arrow on the connector is facing toward the front of the phone.

2. Plug the adapter into a standard AC wall outlet.



3. When charging is finished, unplug the adapter from both the power outlet and the phone by pressing the buttons on both sides of the connector and pulling out the connector.



Note: Do not remove the battery from the phone without unplugging the adapter. Otherwise, the phone may be damaged.





Getting started


Using the Desktop Holder

Using the desktop holder, you can charge the battery.

The phone can be used while the battery is charging, but this increases the time it takes to charge your battery. To get the quickest charge for any battery, turn off the phone.

1. Plug the power cord of the desktop holder into a standard AC outlet.

When the power is connected properly, the small lights, or LEDs, on the charger, flicker briefly and then turn off.



2. Place the phone, with the battery attached, into the front compartment.

The small LED on the charger turns on.



The LED on the charger indicates the charging progress by the following colours:

- Red: the battery is being charged.
- Green: the battery is completely charged.

When charging is completed and the LED changes to green, remove the battery or phone from the desktop holder and unplug the power cord of the charger from the AC outlet.

Low battery indicator

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, a warning tone sounds and "Low battery" displays once.

When the battery becomes too weak for the phone to operate, it switches off automatically.



Switching on or off the phone

- 1. Open the phone, if necessary.
- 2. Press and hold *for* more than one second to switch on the phone.

The service light flashes and then the idle screen appears on the display as soon as the system locates service.

If the phone is out of a service area, the No Service icon () appears on the display. In this case, you cannot place and receive calls. Try again later when service is available.

- Note: You can change the display language in the Language/ שויין menu (אין -OK-6). See page 53.
- When you wish to switch off the phone, press and hold i for more than 2 seconds.

WARNING!

Do not switch on the phone when mobile phone use is prohibited or when it may cause interference or danger.

Note: Do not touch the antenna on the phone unnecessarily when the phone is switched on. Contact with the antenna affects the call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

Your phone's modes

Standby mode

Standby mode is your phone's basic state. The phone goes into Standby mode soon after you turn it on, or whenever you briefly press in Standby mode, you will typically see the current time and date. If you enter a phone number, you can press to dial it, or press it o save it in Phonebook.

Press at any time to return to Standby mode. Be careful; if you are on a call when you press , your phone disconnects the call and returns to Standby mode.

Talk mode

You can place and answer calls only when your phone is turned on. During a call, the phone is in Talk mode. While you are in Talk mode, pressing gives you a list of options. See page 36 for details.

Power save mode

Your phone comes with a Power Save feature that is automatically activated if your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching. While this feature is active, the phone's battery charge is conserved. To return to Standby mode, press any key.





Lock mode

When you lock your phone using the **Lock Phone** menu (**MENU 8-6-2**), you cannot use the phone. In Lock mode, you can receive messages and calls, but you cannot place a call or use the phone's menu functions.

To unlock the phone temporarily, press $\textcircled{\mbox{\sc end}}$ and enter the lock code.

For further details about locking and unlocking the phone, see page 149.

Silent mode

Silent mode disables all sounds on the phone. This feature is best used in situations where the phone might disturb others, such as in a meeting, in a library, or in a theater. Your phone can be set to Silent mode with a press of a key in Standby mode.

To enter Silent mode, press and hold *IPP* until "Silent mode enabled" and the Vibration icon (IP) appear.

To exit and reactivate the previous sound settings, press and hold *solutional context of the setting of the se*

Call functions

Making a call

To make a call:

1. In Standby mode, enter the area code and phone number.

While entering a phone number, press \bigcirc to insert a hard pause. For further details about pause dialing, see page 31.

- 2. Press 🗔 . The phone places the call to the entered phone number.
- **Note**: You can press and hold the number key corresponding to the last digit of the phone number to begin dialing.

Correcting the number

To clear	Press
the last digit displayed	CLR .
the whole display and return to Standby mode	and hold it for more than one second.





Ending a call

When you want to finish your call, press [].

The call time, or the length of the call, displays, along with the phone number of the other party. If the number is stored in your Phonebook, the name displays. If there is no match, you can press and store the number in Phonebook. For further details about storing a number, see page 27.

Or, simply close the phone to end a call.

Using the recent call logs

The phone stores up to 90 calls dialed, received, or missed, chronologically. The last call is saved in the first position.

To recall any of these numbers:

- If there are characters on the display, return to Standby mode by pressing [3].
- 2. Press 🛴. The list of recent calls displays.
 - 🕗: Dialed calls
 - 📞: Received calls
 - 🌿: Missed calls
 - See: Calls answered by the answering machine feature.
- 3. Press the Navigation keys to scan through the list until you find the number you want.
- 4. Press 🔨 to dial the displayed number.
- Note: When you select a call answered by the answering machine feature, press D to access the Inbox menu (MENU 7-2-2). For further details, see page 141.



You can store the phone numbers you call regularly in the phone's memory, which is called "Phonebook." For further details about the Phonebook feature, see page 54.

Saving a number with a name in Phonebook

- 1. Press after ending a call or entering the phone number you want to save by using the number keypad.
- 2. Select an icon to identify the category in which the number is to be stored.

To select the category, press the Left or Right key and press the B.

- 3. Press the Navigation keys to move through the fields and fill in each field as needed.
 - **Name**: Enter a name for the number. For further details about entering characters, see page 28.
 - Home/Mobile/Office/Other/FAX: Add a number in the Phone number field. You can enter a speed dial number in the box at the right side of the label. Notice that speed dialing is not available for fax numbers.
 - E-mail: Enter an e-mail address.
 - ללא קברצה (Group): Select a caller group by pressing ווש or ווש. The ringer melody for the group also appears.
 - Memo: Enter a memo to remind you of personal details.





- 4. When you are finished, press 😭 to save the entry.
- 5. Select **Yes** and press 强.
- 6. Press CR or to exit.

Entering text

When you are asked to enter characters, the available text input modes appear at the bottom of the display.

2. Press the key labeled with the letter you want:

- To enter a number, press and hold the corresponding key, or press runtil (1) highlights. Then press the key you want.
- Press and to clear the characters one by one. Pressing and holding the key clears the display.

- You can move the cursor by pressing
 Image: Ima
- To enter a capital letter, press the 💌 key.
 - Note: To enter only capital letters, press the key before beginning to enter text.
- If you select Symbol mode, the available symbols display. Press the keys corresponding to the symbols you want to enter. To display more symbol sets, press the Navigation keys.

Finding and dialing a number in Phonebook

- 1. Press in Standby mode.
- 2. When Name highlights, enter the first few letters of the name by pressing the associated alphanumeric keys and press **a**.

The phone searches for the names on the list containing those characters, and then displays the corresponding entries in alphabetical order.

- 3. Press 📷 or 🕋 to scroll to a name.
- 4. If necessary, press s or s to find the number.
- 5. Press \mathbb{Q} to place a call to the number.

You can find a number using specific information, such as the name, phone number, or location number. For details, see page 54.





Call functions

Speed-dialing

Once you have stored phone numbers in Phonebook, you can dial them easily with a few presses of the keys.

Enter the memory location of the number you want to dial, and then hold the final digit to dial.

One-touch dial: Memory locations 001 through 009 are special one-touch locations. You can dial the phone numbers stored in them simply by pressing one key.

Press and hold the third digit of the memory location containing the number to be dialed.

For example: Location no. 009 Press @ and hold.

The number (and name) stored displays, and then dials.

Two-touch dial: For memory locations of two digits.

Press the second digit briefly, then hold down the third digit of the memory cell.


For example: Location no. 023 Press (2) briefly and hold (3).

The number (and name) stored displays, and then dials.

Three-touch dial: For memory locations of three digits.

Press the first two digits briefly, then hold down the third digit of the memory cell.

For example: Location no. 123 Press 1 and 2 briefly, and then hold 3



Four-digit dialing

You can quickly dial a phone number in Phonebook or the Calls log by entering its last four digits. Your phone searches for the entire number for you.

- Enter the last four digits of the phone number. Your phone displays the phone number(s) matching your input.
- 2. Scroll through the numbers, if necessary, using the Navigation keys to display the one you want.
- 3. Press \mathbb{K} to dial the number.

Pause dialing

When you call an automated system, like a banking service, you are often required to enter a password or account number. Instead of manually entering the numbers each time, you can store the numbers in your Phonebook, separated by special characters, which are called pauses.

Storing pauses in a Phonebook entry

To store a number in your Phonebook that contains pauses:

1. Enter the phone number you want to store, such as the bank's teleservice phone number.





Call functions

2. Press refer to insert a pause. A "P" displays, meaning that a hard pause will occur at that point in the dialing sequence.

The "P" stops the dialing and waits for the teleservice to prompt you for a number. The number following the "P" is your account number, PIN, etc.

- 3. Enter the digits that need to follow the pause, such as your account number.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 to add more pauses and numbers, if necessary.
- 5. Store the number in your Phonebook as you normally would by pressing .
- 6. Select an icon to identify the category in which the number is to be stored.

To select the category, press the Left or Right key and press \Im .

7. Follow the procedure from step 1 on page 59.

Pause dialing from a stored Phonebook entry

- 1. Dial the number from Phonebook.
- 2. Wait for the appropriate prompt from the number you are calling.
- 3. When prompted, press 🕓 to send the DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) number that follows your pause.

"Send DTMF" flashes on the display and the transmitted tone sounds.

Manual pause dialing

You can enter pauses manually during the dialing process.

- 1. Enter the phone number of the service you want to call, such as a bank's teleservice phone number.
- 2. Press \blacksquare to insert a pause.

The screen displays a "P" indicating a pause.

- 3. Enter the number to be sent after the pause by pressing the digit keys.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 to add more pauses and numbers, if necessary,
- 5. Press 🛴.
- 6. After connecting, wait for the prompt from teleservice. Press 🖏 again after the prompt to send the additional number(s).





Adjusting the volume during a call

During a call, if you want to adjust the voice volume, use the Volume keys on the left side of the phone.

Press it to increase the volume level and it to decrease the level. The image on the display shows all 4 levels; the more bars you see, the higher the level is.



In Standby mode, you can also adjust the keypad tone and function volume using these keys.

Silencing a call ringer

You can silence the ringer when a call comes in. Press and hold one of the Volume keys when the phone is closed. If the phone is open, press and hold $\boxed{1}$ on the left side of the phone or [c].

Rejecting a call

To reject an incoming call, press and hold 🚺 on the left side of the phone when your phone is open.

Answering a call

When somebody calls you, the phone alerts you by ringing and blinking the service light on the front of the phone.

If the caller can be identified, the caller's phone number, or name if stored in Phonebook, displays.

There are 2 ways to answer a call, depending on your setting in the **Call Answer** menu (**MENU 8-4**):

If you select	To answer the call,
Folder Open	open the phone. If it is already open, press 🗔.
Any Key	open the phone and press any key except for <i>and</i> Volume keys.

To end the call, close the phone or press [].

Notes:

- You can answer a call while using Phonebook or menu features. The current operation stops.





Call functions

Viewing missed calls

If you do not answer a call for any reason, the phone indicates a missed call with a text notification on the screen.

If the display informs you of a missed call, press 🕔 to access the Calls log list.

Or, press it to clear the message and return to Standby mode.

You can also view missed calls via the **Missed Call** menu (**MENU 1-4**). Missed calls are indicated by the <u>K</u> icon. For details, see page 58.

Options during a call

Your phone provides a number of functions that you can use during a call. As some of these options are network services, you may not be able to use all of them at all times.

Press far during a call to access the following options:

Phonebook: allows you to go to the **Phonebook** menu. See page 54.

Message Setup: allows you to go to the **Message** menu. See page 70.

Mute Mic.: allows you to switch your phone's microphone off, so that the other person cannot hear you.

Example: You wish to say something to a person in the room, but do not want the other person to hear you.

Key Tone Off: does not transmit the key tones. It allows you to press keys without hearing annoying key tones during a call.

Send Phone #: sends the DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) tones of your phone number.

Talk: Send DTMF: sends the DTMF tones of the currently displayed number. DTMF tones can be used to control electronic phone services, such as bank-by-phone or voice mail. During a call, enter the digits you want to send as DTMF tones, for example, a bank account number and password. Press and then in the figure of the send the number.

Switching to Whisper mode

Whisper mode automatically increases the microphone's sensitivity to allow the other person to hear your voice even though you may be speaking very softly.

To switch to Whisper mode, press and hold \Im during a call.

Note: In normal environments, this feature may cause your voice to be loud.





Call functions

Call forwarding

This feature provides the option of forwarding incoming calls to another phone number, even though your phone is turned off. Activating Call Forwarding does not affect outgoing calls made from this phone. Contact your service provider to activate Call Forwarding.

Call waiting

You can answer an incoming call while you have a call in progress, if this service is supported by the network. Contact your service provider to activate Call Waiting.

When a new call is detected, the incoming call alert sounds, depending on the network, and a text notification displays.

To answer a waiting call:

- 1. To answer the call, press 🛴. The phone connects the calling person and places the current person on hold.
- 2. Press 🔍 again to switch between the 2 people.
- 3. To end the call, press i or close the phone. All calls are disconnected.

Three-way calling

This feature enables you to conduct conference calls with 2 separate people at the same time. The phone records the 2 people into the Outgoing call log. You are billed airtime for each of the outgoing calls separately. Contact your service provider to activate Three-way Calling.

To make a three-way call:

- During a conversation, enter the phone number for the third person and press ,
- 2. When the third person answers, press 🐧 again to begin your three-way call.

When one of the callers hangs up, you and the remaining caller stays connected. If you initiated the call and you hang up first, all 3 people are disconnected.





Using the menus

Your phone offers a range of functions that allows you to tailor it to your needs. These functions are arranged in menus and submenus.


The menus and submenus can be accessed by scrolling or by using shortcuts.

Accessing menu modes

In Standby mode, press 🛒 to enter Personal Menu mode.



Or press and hold 📻 to enter Menu mode.



You can configure Personal Menu mode with your favorite menu functions by registering new menus and changing the menu order or icons in the **My Phone** menu. Note that you can access the menu only from Personal Menu mode.

For further details about configuring Personal Menu mode, see page 49.

Accessing a menu function by scrolling

- In Standby mode, press to enter Personal Menu mode.
- 2. Scroll using the Navigation keys to reach a menu, for example, **Useful Tools**. Press 📡 to enter the menu.
- Find the menu option you want, for example,
 Embedded melodies, by scrolling using compared or
 Press by to select the menu option.

If the menu you have selected contains submenus, repeat this step.

- 4. Scroll using the Navigation keys to find the setting of your choice.
- 5. Press 🚡 to save the setting.

Notes:

- To return to the previous menu level, press CR.
- You can exit the menu without changing the menu settings by pressing .

When you see a blinking box at the bottom left of the display in Main Menu mode, it means that the highlighted menu has some options available.

- Note: These options are unavailable for the My Phone menu.
- Press \bigcirc to access the following options:

Change I con: allows you to change the menu icon. For further details, see page 50.

Delete Menu: deletes the menu from Personal Menu mode.

Change Order: allows you to change the menu order. For further details, see page 51.

Using shortcuts

The main menu items, such as menus, submenus, and setting options, are numbered and can be accessed quickly by using their shortcut numbers.



You can use the E-mail service, which allows you to send or receive e-mail messages.

SMS Info (MENU 2-1-7)

You can send an SMS query to receive information from the web server. Various topics, such as news, sports, entertainment, and finance, are available.

Once you select a topic, your phone sends a query with the code associated with the selected topic, and the server will send you the requested information in an SMS message.

What's New? (MENU 2-1-8)

Selecting this menu loads the WAP page preset by your service provider so that you can get information about your service provider's latest offerings, such as downloads, pricing plans, entertainment, technical help, and customer services.

Message (MENU 2-2)

Using this menu, you can:

- · create and send a text message.
- read your text messages and listen to voice messages.
- · create and send a namecard.
- use the message templates.
- view how many messages you have sent or received.
- Note: You can quickly access the Message menu by pressing a in Standby mode.

New Msg. (MENU 2-2-1)

In this menu, you can create and send a text message.

- Note: You can quickly access the New Msg. menu by pressing and holding 📔 in Standby mode.
- 1. Enter a message and press 🜇.

For further details about entering characters, see page 28.

2. Enter the phone number of the destination using the number keypad.

Pressing \bigcirc allows you to search for a number from Phonebook by a person's or group's name. When you find the number, press (*) to place a check mark and press (2).

 If you want to send the message to more than one person, press and fill in another destination field.

Note: You will be billed for each phone number.

- 4. If necessary, repeat steps 2 and 3 to add more phone numbers. You can enter up to 20 numbers.

- When the message has been sent successfully, the display asks if you want to save it in the Sent Msg. folder (Menu 2-2-3-1). Select Yes or No, and press 2.

If the phone fails to send the message, the phone asks if you want to save it in the **Hold Msg.** folder (Menu 2-2-3-2). Select Yes or No, and press .

Incoming (MENU 2-2-2)

Your phone can receive voice mail and text messages. When the phone receives a message, an alert sounds, and a text notification displays along with the New Message icon (Solar). The icon remains on the display until you read the text message(s) or listen to the voice message(s).

Your phone receives incoming messages in both Standby mode and Talk mode. Messages can be received when the phone is locked, but you cannot access them. To review messages, you must unlock the phone.

When the memory is full and a new message comes in, the phone automatically erases the messages in the Incoming box, starting with the oldest in order, to receive the new one. If all of the messages are protected or not reviewed, the phone rejects new messages.

Reading text messages

 Select **Text Msg** on the Incoming screen using the Navigation keys and press <a>[m].

An indexed list of text messages displays. The first message is the latest one. A symbol on the left of the sender's name or number indicates the status of the message:

- 🔬: Read messages
- 🖾: Unread messages
- 🔂: Locked messages
- 2. Scroll to a message and press 🛐 to view the message.

While reading a message, press $\ensuremath{\fbox{e}}$ to access the following options:

Reply: allows you to send a reply message to the sender.

Forward: allows you to forward the message to other people.

Delete: deletes the message.

Save Number: allows you to save the phone number of the sender.

Protect: allows you to keep the message from being deleted. Locked messages are marked with the icon on the list. They are not deleted until you unlock them by selecting this option.

On the message list, press $\ensuremath{\fbox{}}$ to access the following options:

Delete: deletes the selected message.

Delete All: deletes all messages.

Del Selected: allows you to select more than one message by pressing **C**. Choosing this option deletes those messages.

Listening to voice messages

1. Select **Voice Msg** on the Incoming screen using the Navigation keys and press **P**.

The display shows you information about the latest voicemail, such as the time and date it was received and the caller's name or number.

2. Select a message using the Navigation keys.

Note: You can also press and hold not standby mode to dial the Voice mail server.

Setting up the message alert

The following options are available:

Alert Time: when a message is received, your phone alerts you using the specified type in the **Alert Type** option. You can set how often this will happen. Select one of the following options:

<u>Once</u>: The phone alerts you to a new message just once at the time of receipt.

<u>Every 2 min.</u>: The phone alerts you to a new message every 2 minutes until you open the message.

<u>Off</u>: The phone alerts you by blinking the service light.

Alert Type: allows you to select a type for the message alert.

Lamp: the service light flashes; the phone neither rings nor vibrates.

<u>Alert Type $1 \sim 5$ </u>: the phone uses one of several alert tones.

Vibrate: the phone vibrates but does not ring.

Setting up the message display

Using the **Msg**. **Display** menu (**MENU 2-2-2-4**), you can set the phone to display the contents of a new text message when it comes in.

The following options are available:

Set: the phone displays the full contents of the message.

Cancel: the phone displays the New Message icon (SM) and text notification only.

Outgoing (MENU 2-2-3)

You can store sent messages after transmission. When the phone cannot send messages, you can also store them as holding messages for sending later.

- On the Outgoing screen, select Sent Msg., Hold Msg., or Draft Msg. using the Navigation keys, and press .
- 2. Scroll to a message and press 😭 to view the message.

While viewing a message, press $\textcircled{\mbox{\sc res}}$ to access the following options:

- Edit: allows you to edit the message. This option is only available for the Draft Msg. menu.
- Forward/Send SMS/Resend: allows you to forward, send or resend the message.
- **Delete**: deletes the message.





Internet/SMS

On the message list, press $\overline{\mathbb{R}}$ to access the following options:

New Msg.: allows you to create a new message. This option is only available for the **Draft Msg.** menu.

Forward/Resend: allows you to forward or resend the message. You cannot use this option in the Draft Msg. menu.

Delete: deletes the selected message.

Delete All: allows you to delete all messages.

Name card (MENU 2-2-4)

In this menu, you can create a name card for your self and send it to other people.

To send a name card:

- 1. Select Send Name card and press 🖗
- 2. Enter a destination number.

Pressing \bigcirc allows you to search for a number from Phonebook by a person's or group's name. When you find the number, press (*) to place a check mark and press ().

 If you want to send the message to more than one person, press and fill in another destination field.

Message Log (MENU 2-2-6)

This menu shows you how many messages you have sent or received.

Set Modem (MENU 2-3)

Your phone is capable of sending or receiving digital data and fax calls when connected to a computing device (laptop, desktop, handheld, palmtop, etc.) running Windows NT, Windows 98, or later versions of Windows. The phone functions just like a standard modem on your PC, enabling you to use wireless data involving a wide variety of Windows software applications.

To use digital data or fax services with your phone, you need to obtain a digital data/fax kit from your local Samsung dealer. This kit contains the cables, software, and user's manual required for you to connect and use your phone with your computing device.

See your data kit manual for further details about setting up your computing device.

Note: The phone must be on a digital network to receive faxes and data.

Alert Type (Menu 2-3-1)

In this menu, you can set how you are alerted when the phone receives data and fax calls.

- 1. Select a ringer category by pressing s or , and press ____.
- 2. Select the sound or melody you want by pressing or .
- 3. Press $\overline{\mbox{m}}$ to save the selection.
- 4. To exit, press CR or [].

Auto Receive (MENU 2-3-2)

You can set the phone to function as a modem to receive voice, data, and fax calls.

The following options are available:

Cancel: The auto receive mode for data and faxes is turned off. Your phone can only send or receive voice calls.

Modem: The phone automatically receives data.

Fax: The phone automatically receives faxes.

Data Call (MENU 2-3-3)

In this menu, you can select the speed for the communication between your phone and a computing device.

Select one from Auto speed, 19.2kbps, 115.2kbps, and 230.4kbps.









Useful Tools

Using the Useful Tools menu, you can:

- listen to melodies downloaded from the Wireless Web or received in messages.
- view images downloaded from the Wireless Web or received in messages, and set one as your wallpaper for the idle screen.
- set the I.Beam feature.
- play Bomb link.
- view the memory status for games, melodies, and images.

Embedded melodies (MENU 3-1)

This menu accesses the sounds and melodies used to alert you to incoming calls. A sound or melody selected in this menu is used according to the setting in the **Ringer Type** menu (**MENU 8-1-1**). You can also play downloaded files using your phone as an MP3 player.

Note: You can quickly access the Embedded melodies menu by pressing and holding in Standby mode.

Setting a ringer bell

- Select a ringer category using the Navigation keys and press 2.
- 2. Select a melody using the Navigation keys and press 🖗 .

Using the Video Bell menu

When you have downloaded video clips from the Wireless Web or received them in messages, you can use them in the **Video Bell** menu (**Menu 3-1-3**). You can also use video clips you have recorded in this menu.

To play a video clip:

Idle Mode: allows you to select an image to display on the idle screen.

Incoming Call: allows you to select an image to alert you when a call comes in.

Browser Conn.: allows you to select an image to display when you connect to the Internet.

Power On: allows you to select an image to display when you switch on the phone.

Power Off: allows you to select an image to display when you switch off the phone.

Delete Image: allows you to delete images or video clips downloaded from the Wireless Web, or images or video clips you have used in the Setup Animation option.

I. Beam (MENU 3-3)

This feature allows you to use the phone as a remote controller for various machines, such as a television or video player. You can also send or receive data to or from IrDA-compatible phones or other devices through the infrared port.

Note: You can quickly access the **I.Beam** menu by pressing **im** in Standby mode.

- 4. When a confirmation message displays, select **Yes** and press **P**.

While you are using the phone as a remote controller, you can use other remote controllers you have set up by pressing and then pressing and then pressing so a to scroll to the remote controller you want to use. If you close the phone while using your phone as a remote controller, the remote control function does not deactivate.

Notes:

- When a call come in while you are using your phone as a remote controller, press 🔍 to answer the call.
- You can turn on or off all of the machines you have registered to be remotely controlled by the phone at one time. Select the space you want to control and press es?.

Sound: allows you to turn the game sound on or off.

<u>Vibe</u>: allows you to set the phone to vibrate when bombs go off.

High Scores: shows the high score table.

<u>Clear Scores</u>: allows you to clear your score.

INSTRUCTIONS: shows how to play the game.

To play the Bomb link game:

- 1. Select ENDLESS or 100 ATTACK and press
- 3. While playing the game, pressing R pauses the game and the phone displays the following options:
 - **Sound**: allows you to turn the game sound on or off.
 - Vibe: allows you to set the phone to vibrate when bombs go off.

Memory Status (MENU 3-5)

You can check the amount of memory being used and the remaining memory available for games, melodies, and images.

The displays show the Total, Used, and Free memory for the various items.

Game: shows the list of applications downloaded from the Wireless Web.

Music: shows the list of downloaded music files, such as sounds or melodies.

Image: shows the list of downloaded image files.

When you select an item from the list, the display shows its memory size at the bottom. You can change the sort order of the file list by pressing \llbracket or \blacksquare .

You can also delete the selected item or all of the items by pressing \overline{P} .

Organizer

The Organizer feature enables you to:

- set the phone to ring at a specified time.
- · keep track of important dates and events.
- create a list of things to do.
- use the phone as a calculator.
- check the current time in another part of the world.
- enter an event and keep track of how much time has passed since the event.
- view the time log for calls and set the current time and date.

Morning Call (MENU 4-1)

You can set an alarm to ring at a specified time every day or only on weekdays. This feature is useful when you need a wake-up call.

To set a wake-up call:

- 1. Press \blacksquare and select one of the following options:
 - Morn. Call Time: enter the time you want the alarm to ring using the number keypad. You need to enter the time in 24-hour format.
 - **Melody**: select the ringer type and then the melody or sounds.
 - Interval: select a repeat option for the alarm to ring from Daily, Sun to Fri, or Sun to Thu.
 - **Repeat**: select how often the phone informs you of the morning call.





- 2. After changing the settings, press \Im .
- 3. Repeat steps 1 to 2, if necessary.
- 4. When you are finished, select Set.
- 5. Press \Im to save the setting.

To cancel the weekday alarm, access the **Morning Call** menu (**MENU 4-1**) and select **Cancel**.

To stop the alarm when it rings, press any key after opening the phone.

Note: Keep in mind that if the alarm time expires while the phone is in Silent mode, the phone vibrates once and the service light blinks.

To cancel an alarm, access it and select **Cancel** on the Alarm Clock screen.

Scheduler (MENU 4-3)

Setup (MENU 6-6)

Using this menu, you can lock your photos, videos, photo mails, or video mails. You can also change the default sounds to be used when you are using the camera.

To access the **Setup** menu, you must enter the 4digit lock code. It is preset to "0000" at the factory.

Lock Photos (MENU 6-6-1)

In this menu, you can lock the **Photo Album** menu to keep it from being accessed by unauthorized people. Select **Lock** and press **Select**. Once the menu has been locked, you need to enter the lock code to access it.

Lock Videos (MENU 6-6-2)

In this menu, you can lock the **Video Album** menu to keep it from being accessed by unauthorized people. Select **Lock** and press **A**. Once the menu has been locked, you need to enter the lock code to access it.

Lock Photo Mail (MENU 6-6-3)

In this menu, you can lock the **Photo Mail** menu to keep it from being accessed by unauthorized people. Select **Lock** and press **A**. Once the menu has been locked, you need to enter the lock code to access it.



Lock Video Mail (MENU 6-6-4)

In this menu, you can lock the **Video Mail** menu to keep it from being accessed by unauthorized people. Select **Lock** and press **A**. Once the menu has been locked, you need to enter the lock code to access it.

Camera Sound (MENU 6-6-5)

In this menu, you can change the camera sounds.

- Select a shutter release sound using s or , and press .
- Select a readiness indicator sound using s or
 , and press .
- 3. Select a self-timer sound using e or e, and press .

Voice Tools

In this menu, you can use the phone's voice features, allowing you to:

- record a voice memo.
- set the phone to answer a call and record the caller's message.

Voice Memo (MENU 7-1)

This menu allows you to record voice memos and review them.

Record (MENU 7-1-1)

1. Wait until a beeping prompt sounds and record a memo by speaking into the microphone.

While you are recording, a timer displays to show you the elapsed time.

You can pause recording by pressing \overrightarrow{m} and then resume by pressing \overrightarrow{m} .

- 2. Press 🖗 to end recording. The screen provides you with the following choices:
 - **Review**: allows you to listen to the voice memo. The screen displays the length of the memo.
 - **Rerecord**: allows you to discard the current memo and record another one.
 - Save: allows you to save the voice memo.

- 3. When you are satisfied, select the **Save** option and press **P**.
- 4. Enter a title for the memo and press 强.

For further details about how to enter characters, see page 28.

Note: During a call, you can record your conversation by pressing and holding <u>a</u>.

Review (MENU 7-1-2)

When you access this menu, a list of the voice memos you have recorded displays.

Scroll through the list using the Navigation keys and press $\overline{\mathbb{P}}$ to listen to the selected voice memo.

You can pause the playback by pressing \overrightarrow{e} and then resume by pressing \overrightarrow{e} . To stop, press \overleftarrow{e} .

On the Voice Review screen, press \bigcirc to access the following options:

Play: plays the selected voice memo.

Info: allows you to view information about the memo, such as the file name, memory size, recording time, and the time and date it was saved.

Erase: erases the selected voice memo.

Erase All: allows you to erase all of the voice memos stored on your phone.

Voice Answer (MENU 7-2)

If you are not able to answer an incoming call, you can set your phone to answer a call with the a greeting message and record the caller's message. As this feature shares memory with voice memos, the total length of messages is dependent on the available memory minus any voice memos.

Note: You can quickly access the Voice Answer menu by pressing 🖗 in Standby mode.

On/Off (*MENU 7-2-1*)

Using this menu, you can set whether or not the phone uses the Answering Machine feature when a call comes in. To use this feature, select **Set** and press **Set**.

Note: you can also activate the Voice Answer feature by pressing and holding con the front of the phone.

Inbox (*MENU 7-2-2*)

You can listen to the callers' messages recorded on your phone. When you access this menu, a list of the recorded messages appears.

An icon displayed in the list indicates the message status:

- isolays when you haven't checked the message.
- Solution of the message.

For further details about listening to a message and using message options, see page 140.

Screening (MENU 7-2-3)

In this menu, you can enable or disable the speaker, allowing you to listen to the caller's message while the caller is leaving it. To use this feature, select **Set** and press \Im .

Wait Time (MENU 7-2-4)

In this menu, you can set how long the phone waits before responding to a call with the greeting message. Select one of the several options.

Choose Greeting (MENU 7-2-5)

In this menu, you can select a greeting message to be played when a call comes in.

Press the Navigation keys to a greeting message and press \Im .

Record Greeting (MENU 7-2-6)

Your phone provides you with a default greeting message to be played when a call comes in. You can also record up to 3 of your own greeting messages.

- 1. Select one of the entries and press \Im .
- 2. Follow the procedure from step 1 on page 139.

Setting

Many different features of your phone can be customized to suit your preferences.

Sounds (MENU 8-1)

You can use this menu to customize various sound settings.

Ringer Type (MENU 8-1-1)

In this menu, you can set unique ringer melodies for incoming calls and messages.

The following options are available:

Bell/Melody: the phone rings using the selected tone or melody.

Vibrate: the phone vibrates but does not ring.

Lamp: the service light flashes.

Vibrate & Bell: the phone first vibrates and then starts ringing.

Bell & Vibrate: the phone first rings and then vibrates.

Ringer Volume (MENU 8-1-2)

In this menu, you can adjust the ringer volume for incoming calls.

Use control or control or the Volume keys on the left side of the phone to increase or decrease the volume.

Key Tone Type (MENU 8-1-3)

In this menu, you can select the tone that the phone sounds when you press a key.

On Time Sound (MENU 8-1-4)

You can set your phone to sound an alert every hour on the hour.

- Enter the time period during which the phone sounds the hour alert using the number keypad and press
- 2. Select an alert type using e or , and press
- 3. Select **Set** and press 🖗.

Function Sound (MENU 8-1-5)


Your phone can give audible alerts (beeps) at specified times to inform you that certain things have happened. The alerts only occur in your earpiece so the other person on the phone does not hear them. The following options are available:

Type: allows you to select one of the 2 alert tones.

Function Select: You can turn on or off each alert. The following alerts are available:

<u>Confirm/Save</u>: When this alert is selected, the phone sounds an alert when you save your selection or change a menu function.

<u>Cancel/Warning</u>: When this alert is selected, the phone sounds an alert when you cancel your selection or change when a confirmation message appears.



<u>Power</u>: When this alert is selected, the phone sounds an alert when you turn it on or off.

<u>Connect</u>: When this alert is selected, the phone sounds a connect tone when your call is connected to the system.

<u>Release</u>: When this alert is selected, the phone sounds a disconnect tone when a call is disconnected.

<u>Manner Mode</u>: When this alert is selected, the phone sounds an alert when you exit Silent mode.

To turn on an alert:

- 1. Select an alert using me or .
- 2. Press (**) to place a check mark in front of the alert you want to turn on.

To select all alerts, press 🔊.

To remove the check mark, press 🐑 again.

- 3. To select more alerts, repeat steps 1 and 2.
- 4. When you are finished, press \mathbb{R} .





Display/Light (MENU 8-2)

In this menu, you can change the time settings for the backlight and the service light.

Main LCD light (MENU 8-2-1)

In this menu, you can select the length of time the backlight for the main LCD remains on.

When the phone is closed, the backlight turns off, thus conserving battery power. When the phone is open, the backlight remains on for the specified length of time after the last key has been pressed or after you have opened the phone. Remember that backlight use drains your battery faster.

External LCD light (MENU 8-2-2)

In this menu, you can select the length of time the external LCD is active, showing the current time and date.

When you close the phone, the external LCD displays the time and date, flashing its backlight. After 5 seconds, the backlight turns off and then after a specified time, the external LCD shows only the current time.

Keypad light (MENU 8-2-3)

You can set the backlight mode for the keypad. **Normal Mode** flashes the backlight when you press any key. Select **Power Save Mode** to use the backlight only between 5:00 PM and 8:00 AM. Doing this saves battery power. In this menu, you can select the length of time the service light blinks before going off.

- 1. Enter the time period for the service light to blink using the number keypad.
- 2. Select **Set** and press \mathbb{R} .

To turn off the service light, select Cancel.

Intl Prefix (MENU 8-3)

You can set the phone to automatically dial an international call code when you make a call.

Enter an international call service number and select **Set**. Press A. The number will display when you press and hold **1** in Standby mode.

Call Answer (MENU 8-4)

This menu allows you to select how to answer an incoming call.

The following options are available:

Folder Open: The phone answers when you open the phone. If the phone is already open, press $[]_{1}$.

Any Key: When the phone is open, you can press any key except for and Volume keys. When the phone is closed, you can answer the call by opening the phone.

Change Lock (MENU 8-5)

This feature allows you to change your current lock code to a new one. The lock code is preset to "0000" at the factory.

To change the lock code, enter the current lock code. Enter a new, 4-digit lock code and enter the code once again at the prompt.

Your phone provides you with various security options, including a user-programmable lock code and emergency numbers.

Reset Phone (MENU 8-6-1)


In this menu, you can restore the default settings of all user-selectable options. You can also restore the phone's memory.

To access this menu, you must enter the 4-digit lock code. It is preset to "0000" at the factory.

The following options are available:

Reset Functions: allows you to restore the default settings of all user-selectable options.

Reset All: allows you to restore information or items except for the VOD contents stored in the phone's memory.



When a confirmation message displays, select **Yes** and press (a) to confirm. The phone reboots, turning itself off and then back on, and returns to Standby mode.

Select No to cancel your selection.

Lock Phone (MENU 8-6-2)

When the phone is locked, you cannot operate the phone until you enter the lock code.

To access this menu, you must enter the 4-digit lock code. It is preset to "0000" at the factory.

The following options are available:

On Power-up: the phone locks automatically the next time you turn it on.

Auto Lock: the phone locks immediately. After unlocking the phone temporarily, you can lock the phone again by closing the phone.

Cancel: the phone remains unlocked.

To use the phone in Lock mode, press \bigcirc and enter the 4-digit lock code. Your phone unlocks temporarily and you can use the phone.

Emergency # (MENU 8-6-3)

Your phone provides the option of storing 4 emergency numbers. All of these numbers can be manually dialed at any time, even if your phone is locked or all outgoing calls are restricted.

IMPORTANT NOTICE!

Emergency calling may not be available on all wireless networks at all times, due to the various transmission methods, network parameters, and user settings used to complete a call from your wireless phone. A connection cannot always be guaranteed.

DO NOT depend on this phone as a primary method of dialing 100 or for any other essential or emergency communications.

Remember to always turn on your phone and check for adequate signal strength before placing a call.

To store an emergency number:

- Press control or to select an empty location and press
- 2. Enter a number and press 🖗 to save the number.
- Note: 100, 101, 102, and *166 will remain as alwaysaccessible emergency numbers, even if you change them on the emergency number list. To make an emergency call in Lock mode, simply enter one of the programmed emergency numbers and press [].

Exposure to radio frequency (RF) signals

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on the safety standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and through evaluation of scientific studies.

The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for wireless phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6W/kg.



^{**.} In the U.S. and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. For body operation

Precautions when using batteries

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsungapproved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.

- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F).
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental shortcircuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and – terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

Road safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, make sure that you are following the special regulations in a given area or country.

Operating environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

Electronic devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.



Persons with pacemakers:

• Should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on

· Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket

• Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference

If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone immediately off.

Hearing aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle.

You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch off the phone while at a refuelling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.



Emergency calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- 2. Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 100 or any other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press 🗔 .

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.



Other important safety information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phones in aircraft may be dangerous to the operation of the aircraft, and is illegal.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

Care and maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children's.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.

- Do not paint the phone. Paint can clog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Do not put the phone in or on heating devices, such as a microwave oven, a stove or a radiator. The phone may explode when overheated.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas or modified accessories may damage the phone and violate regulations governing radio devices.
- If the phone, battery, charger or any accessory is not working properly, take it to your nearest qualified service facility. The personnel there will assist you, and if necessary, arrange for service.

Glossary

Air time

Actual time spent talking on the wireless phone. Most carriers bill customers based on how many minutes of airtime they use each month.

Antenna

A device for transmitting or receiving signals. The size and shape of antennas is determined, in part, by the frequency of the signal they receive. Wireless phones and the base station must have antennas.

Call diverting

Ability to reroute calls to another number.

Call waiting

Informs you that you have an incoming call when you are engaged on another call.

Caller line identification services (Caller ID)

Services allowing subscribers to view or block the telephone numbers of callers.

CDMA (Code Division Multiple Access)

A spread-spectrum approach to digital transmission. With CDMA, each conversion is digitized and then tagged with a code. The mobile phone deciphers only a particular code to pick the right conversation off the air. The transmitted signal is just above noise level across the available bandwidth.





Glossary

Deactivation

The process of rendering a wireless phone inactive.

DTMF

You send DTMF signals when you enter numbers by pressing the digit keys.

Frequency

A measure based on time, as one or more waves per second, in an electrical or light wave information signal. A signal's frequency is stated in cycles-per-second or Hertz (Hz).

LCD (Liquid Crystal Display)

Commonly used to refer to the screen display on the wireless phone.

Prepend

The addition of a prefix, such as an area code, to a phone number.

Roaming

The ability to use a wireless phone to make and receive calls in places outside of the home service area.

Service charge

The amount paid each month to receive wireless service.

Standby time

The amount of time a fully charged wireless portable or transportable phone can be on and idle without being in use. (See Talk Time)

Talk time

The length of time a person can talk on a portable or transportable wireless phone without recharging the battery.

Wireless

Radio-based Systems that allow transmission of telephone or data signals through the air without a physical connection, such as a metal wire (copper) or fiber optic cable.
