## **Getting Started**

## Installing and Charging the Battery

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Li-ion) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, a warning tone sounds and a message repeats at regular intervals on the display. If this happens, the display dims to conserve the remaining battery power. When the battery level becomes too low, the phone automatically turns off.

Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power. You can use the phone while the battery is charging, but this causes the phone to charge more slowly.

Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibration mode, playing games, camera and browser usage affect the battery's talk and standby times.

**Important:** The battery must be fully charged before you use the phone for the first time; otherwise, you could damage the battery.

#### **Installing the Battery**

1. To remove the back cover, use a fingernail in the groove to lever the cover up until it clicks, then pull the cover in the direction shown to remove it.



2. Insert the top end of the battery into the phone housing with the label side down. The gold contacts on the end of the battery should match up with those on the phone.



- **3.** Push the top end of the battery down until it snaps into place.
- **4.** Replace the battery cover.

#### **Removing the Battery**

- 1. Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
- 2. Remove the back cover.
- 3. Use your finger to lift the battery (top end first) up and away from the phone.



#### **Charging the Battery with the Travel Adapter**

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable standard Li-ion battery. Use Samsungapproved charging devices and batteries. The icon indicates that the battery is full. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon blinks and the phone sounds a warning tone.

**Warning!** Using the wrong battery charger could cause damage to your phone and void the warranty.

- Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
- 2. Plug the large end of the travel adapter into a standard 120/220V AC wall outlet.
- **3.** Insert the end of the adapter into the charger/ accessory connector at the side of the phone.



## Turning Your Phone On and Off

- 1. To turn your phone on, press and hold the End key until the phone switches on. Once your phone is on, it displays "Looking for Service". When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters Idle mode. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.
  - If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, the phone enters Power Save mode and periodically searches for a signal. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to Idle mode.
- 2. To turn your phone off, press and hold the End key until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.

## Front Open View of Your Phone



- 1. **Earpiece**: The earpiece allows you to hear the other caller. Ringtones and sounds are also played through the earpiece, as are speakerphone conversations.
- 2. **Earphone Jack**: Allows you to plug in an optional earphone for safe, convenient hands-free conversations.
- 3. **Display Screen**: This screen displays all the information you need to operate your phone.
- 4. **Volume Key**: Allows you to adjust the ringer volume in Idle mode or adjust the voice volume during a call. The volume key can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down.

#### 5. Navigation Keys:

- The navigation keys allow you to scroll through the phone menu options.
- In Idle mode, press the up navigation key to access the Messaging menu and press the down navigation key to access the **Recent Calls** menu. Press the left and right navigation keys to create new shortcuts.

#### 6. Left Soft Key:

- In Idle mode, press to access the Send Msg menu.
- When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the left soft key performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom-left corner of the display screen.

#### 7. Send Key:

- Allows you to place or receive a call.
- In Idle mode, press the key once to access the recent call log.
- **Speakerphone Key**: During a call, press the key to enable or disable the speaker phone function.
- **9. Power/Accessory Interface Connector**: The Power/Accessory Interface Connector is used to plug in a travel adapter, or any available accessory to your phone.

#### 10. Special Function Keys:

#### Shift/Asterisk:

- Enters the asterisk [\*] character for calling features.
- In text entry mode, press the key to switch between letter cases when using the input type Alpha (ABC, Abc, abc) or T9 (T9word, T9Word, T9WORD).
- In Idle mode, press and hold to switch your handset to Silent Mode (with vibration).

#### Space/Pound:

- Enters the pound [#] character for calling features.
- In text entry mode, press to enter a space.
- In Idle mode, press and hold the key to lock the phone.
- 11. **Microphone**: The microphone allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- 12. Alpha-numeric Keys: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters. For information on entering text, see "Entering Text" on page 20.
- **13. Camera Key**: Launches the integrated digital camera:
  - In Idle mode, press to access the camera's preview mode.

#### 14. OK Kev:

- In Idle mode, press to access the **Menu**.
- Pressing when navigating through a menu accepts the highlighted choice in the menu.

#### 15. Back Key:

- Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode.
- Press to return to the previous menu or screen when navigating features on your phone.

#### 16. END/Power Key:

- During a call, press this key to end the call.
- When you receive an incoming call, press this key to reject the call.
- When in the main menu, press to return the phone to Idle mode and cancel your input.


• When the phone is off, press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone on. When your phone is in Idle mode, press and hold this key for a few seconds to turn your phone off.

#### 17. Right Soft Key:

- In Idle mode, press to access your Contacts.
- When using other features, such as the Web Browser, the right soft key performs a context-sensitive action. This action is shown in the bottom right corner of the display screen.
- **18. Voice Services Key**: In Idle mode, press and hold the key to access the voice recognition feature. For more information, see 'Activating Voice Recognition" on page 62.

## Understanding the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen provide a wealth of information about your phone's status and options. The display screen has three areas:



#### Screen Icons

This list identifies the symbols you'll see on your phone's display screens:



Indicates that your 1X web connection is active. Incoming voice calls go directly to Voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the web connection will terminate.



Indicates that data is being transferred over the 1X network. The arrow direction indicates whether the handset is sending or receiving data.



Indicates that your 1X connection is dormant.



Indicates that your phone is receiving 1X digital service.



Indicates that your phone is receiving digital (non-3G) service.



Indicates that Memory Card is inserted.



Indicates that you missed a call.



Indicates that you have a missed text message.



Indicates that you have a missed voice mail.



Indicates that you have missed scheduler.



Indicates that you have a missed alarm.



Indicates that you have a new Text message.



Indicates that you have a new Picture message.



Indicates that you have a new Voicemail.



Indicates that the text message is locked. A locked message cannot be deleted without confirmation.



Indicates that the TTY option is On. This icon is displayed only when earphones or a Bluetooth headset is in use.



Indicates that your phone is in vibrate mode.



Indicates that your phone is set to ringer plus vibrate mode.



Indicates that the ringer is set at a level between 1-8 or that 1-Beep is selected.



Indicates that the ringer is turned Off.



Indicates that an alarm is set on your phone.



Tells you a call is in progress.



Means there is no service, as your phone cannot find a signal.



Displays your current signal strength. When you are receiving maximum signal strength, six bars are shown.



Displays your current battery strength at full.



Indicates your current battery charge strength. (Icon shown fully discharged in idle mode.)



Indicates that the handset is in Key Mute mode.



Indicates that the handset is in Speaker mode.



Indicates that the Camera is enabled



Indicates that the self-timer function is enabled. With the self-timer enabled, a set amount of time is required prior to taking a picture.



Indicates that the white balance has been set to Sunny. This is used for taking pictures outdoors on bright sunny days.



Indicates that the white balance has been set to Cloudy. This is used for taking pictures outdoors under cloudy conditions.



Indicates that the white balance has been set to Incandescent. This is used for taking pictures indoors under normal lighting conditions.



Indicates that the white balance has been set to Fluorescent. This is used for taking pictures indoors under fluorescent lighting conditions.



Indicates that the white balance has been set to Manual. This is used for taking pictures indoors or outdoors using your own custom settings.



Indicates that a voice memo is being recorded.



Indicates that a voice memo is being stopped.



Indicates that a voice memo has been paused.



Indicates that a voice memo is being played.



Indicates that there is a voice caption attached to an image.



Indicates that Bluetooth technology is enabled.



Indicates that Bluetooth technology is connected.



Indicates that Bluetooth headset is connected.



Indicates that Bluetooth technology is hidden.

Phone Off Indicates that the handset is in Airplane mode.

## **Memory Card**

Your phone allows you to use a Micro SD (Secure Digital) memory card (up to 16GB) and an adapter to expand the phone's available memory space. This digital card makes it easy to exchange images, music, and voice data quickly between SD-compatible devices.

**Note:** Before you can copy files to a memory card from your PC, you must first insert it into the phone. The phone will format the card for you and create the necessary file folders. The card is formatted with a FAT32 file system that can be read by most computers.

#### Inserting the Micro SD Memory Card

#### To insert the Micro SD memory card into your phone:

- 1. Remove the back cover of the phone. Notice the memory card opening on the lower right side of the phone.
- 2. Position the Micro SD memory card in line with the opening and gently slide it into place until it is fully inserted and locked.

**Note:** Be sure to use only recommended memory cards (up to 16GB). Using non-recommended memory cards could cause data loss or damage your phone.

**Note:** Make sure your battery is fully charged before using the Micro SD memory card. Your data may become damaged or unusable if the battery runs out while reading or writing to the card.

#### Removing the Micro SD Memory Card

#### To remove the Micro SD memory card from your phone:

- 1. Remove the back cover of the phone.
- 2. Eject the card by pushing in and then releasing.
- 3. Pull the memory card out of the handset.

Warning! DO NOT remove a memory card while files are being accessed or transferred. It could result in loss or damage of data.

**Note:** If you remove your memory card, the location to save images will automatically default back to the Phone.

#### Using a Micro SD Adapter

You can also purchase a Micro SD memory adapter, which allows Micro SD memory cards to be used in SD-compatible devices. Before using with a reader, you will need to insert the Micro SD memory card into the Micro SD memory adapter.

With the label side of the Micro SD memory card facing up, insert the card into the Micro SD memory adapter and gently slide the card until it is fully inserted.

To remove the Micro SD memory card from the memory adapter:

Hold the front edge of the Micro SD memory card and gently pull outward to remove it from the adapter.

## Displaying Your Phone Number

In case you forget your phone number, your phone can remind you.

#### To display your phone number:

In Idle mode, press right soft key twice, followed by det. Your **My Name Card** is displayed with your phone number.

#### **Calling Emergency Numbers**

You can place calls to 911 (dial phone is locked or your account is restricted.

#### Adjusting the Volume

During a call, if you want to adjust the earpiece volume, use the Volume keys on the left side of the phone.

- Press the volume keys on the side of the phone to increase and decrease the volume level.
- In Idle mode, you can also adjust the ringer volume using these keys.

#### 15 Phone Basics

#### Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers with Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as Voice Mail or credit card billing numbers. There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause: sends the next set of numbers when you press 1.
- 2sec Pause: automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

**Note:** You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2-second and hard pauses.

#### To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- 1. Enter a phone number from Idle mode.
- 2. Press right soft key for **Options** and select **Hard Pause** or **2sec** Pause.
- 3. Enter additional numbers.
- 4. Press | ] to dial the number.

— or—

Press right soft key for **Options** and select **Save** to save the number in your Contacts list.

When dialing a number with a hard pause, press 1 to send the next set of numbers.

#### **Dialing from Your Contacts List**

You can select a Contact and dial the number automatically.

#### To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

1. Press of for **Menu** and then press for **Contacts**.

**Tip:** In idle mode, press the right soft key to quickly retrieve the Contacts list.

2. Scroll up or down to highlight the desired entry and press 1 to make the call.

**Tip:** If the desired entry contains more than one phone number, scroll up or down to display the number you wish to call and press \( \begin{array}{c} \] to make the call.

#### Using One-Touch/Two-Touch Speed Dialing

You can store up to 98 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a few buttons. For information on setting up this feature, see "Speed Dials" on page 28.

With this feature, you can dial Speed Dial entries using one key press for locations 2-9 and two key presses for locations 10-99.

#### To use One-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 2-9:

 Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows the saved caller ID or number.)

#### To use Two-Touch Dialing for Speed Dial locations 10-99:

- 1. Press the first digit.
- Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds. (The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows the saved call ID or number.)

**Note:** Your phone also supports 1 to 4 digit dialing. If you enter a number using the keypad without holding the last number and then press , your phone will dial those digits.

For example, if you enter and press , it dials 21, not the number stored in memory location 21.

## **Answering Voice Calls**

#### Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings and/or vibrates.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts list, the entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.

#### **Answering Calls**

- 1. Press the | ] key to answer the incoming call.
  - When the Any Key option in the Call Answer menu is activated, you can answer a call by pressing any key (Menu # a famo 4 ghi 3 def 1 one).
- 2. To end the call, press the  $\mathfrak{g}$  key.

The following options are also available to handle an incoming call:

- Press either of the side volume keys to quiet the ringer.
- Press the right soft key 📁 or 📔 key to Ignore the incoming call and send it directly to your Voice Mail box.

#### Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, the Missed Alerts screen is displayed. You have two options:

- Press the left soft key to Call the number.
- Press the right soft key 🔁 for **Dismiss** to remove the missed call from the call log.

## In-Call Options

#### Using the Menu Options

Select actions by pressing the right soft key for **Options** during a call. A list of options is displayed that allows you to perform different actions during the course of a call.

The following options are available:

- Speaker On/Off: allows you to activate or deactivate the speakerphone.
- **Key Mute/Unmute**: allows you to activate or deactivate DTMF tones. See "Tone Length" on page 74 for more information.
- Gontacts: accesses the Contacts menu options. See "Contacts" on page 25.
- April Messaging: allows you to check for Voice Mail and notifications. See "Messaging" on page 30.
- Saway Call: allows you to talk to two different people at the same time. See "Making Three-Way Calls" on page 19.
- Recent Calls: checks your call log for Recent, Dialed, Received and Missed calls. You can also erase the logs and view call times from this menu. See "History" on page 24.

- Voice Memo: allows you to record the other person's conversation during a call. For more information, see "Voice Service" on page 62.
- Tools: accesses the Tools menu options. See "Tools" on page 55.
- Phone Info: displays your phone's hardware and software versions. See "Phone Info" on page 77.

#### Making Three-Way Calls

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

- 1. Enter a number you wish to call and press 1.
- 2. Once you have established the connection, press the right soft key for **Options**, followed by for **3-Way Call**.
- 3. Select one of the following options for dialing the second number then press 1:
  - Contacts: accesses Contacts list.
  - Recent Calls: accesses Recent Calls.
  - Enter Phone #: allows you to dial the phone number.
- 4. When you're connected to the second party, press again to begin your three-way call.

If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

**Tip:** You can also begin a three-way call by displaying a phone number stored in your Contacts, Recent Calls, or Messaging menus. To call the third party, press 1.

#### Mute/UnMute

You can place the current call on hold by pressing the left soft key for **Mute**. To reactivate your phone's microphone, press the left soft key again for **UnMute**.

## **End-of-Call Options**

After receiving a call from or making a call, the phone number and the duration of the call are displayed. The call details are automatically moved to the recent calls. If the phone number is not in your Contacts, press the right soft key  $\sqrt{\phantom{a}}$  for **Options** and select **Save** to save the number to your Contacts.

**Note:** The End-of-Call options are not displayed for calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted numbers.

## Saving Phone Numbers

Your phone can store up to 600 entries (numbers/e-mails/URLs) in multiple categories (Mobile, Home, Work, Pager, E-mail, etc.). The Contacts capacity is based on number of entries, not on number of contacts. (For more information, see "Adding New Entries" on page 25.)

## **Entering Text**

#### Selecting a Character Input Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, symbols, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when sending text messages).

#### To change the character input mode:

- 1. When you display a screen where you can enter text, press the right soft key for **Options**.
- 2. Select a character input mode:
  - Alpha to enter characters with the keypad (see page 21).
  - T9 to enter characters using predictive T9 Text Input (see the next topic).
  - Symbol to enter symbols (see page 21).
  - Aghi Number to enter numbers (see page 21).
  - Quick Text to enter prewritten phrases. This option is available only for fields where Quick Text can be entered.
  - ShortCut to enter common Web text. This option is available only for fields where Shortcut text can be entered.

 Text Options to configure these options: Auto Capital, Used Word Dic., Display Cand., Prediction Start, Dual Language, and Auto-Space.

#### **Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input**

T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.) If the word you want does not display after you have entered all the letters, press to scroll through additional word selections. To accept a word and insert a space, press to erase a single character. Press and hold to delete an entire entry.

#### To enter text using T9:

- 1. From the text entry screen (for example, a new event in scheduler), press the right soft key for **Text Mode** and select **T9**.
- 2. Use the keypad to enter the new event. (For example, to enter "Meeting", press once, and twice, subject twic

#### **Entering Characters with the Keypad**

To enter characters by tapping the keypad, select the **Alpha** mode (see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 20). Press the corresponding key repeatedly until the desired character appears. When the **Abc** icon is shown at the bottom of your screen, the first letter of the first word is capitalized and following letters are lowercase. The \*\*\* key can be used to select the case desired.

#### To enter text using Alpha:

- 1. From a text entry screen (for example, a Contacts entry), press the right soft key for **Text Mode** and select **Alpha**.
- 2. Use your keypad to enter the contact's name. (For example, to enter "Bill", press twice, three times, in three times, and three times again.)

After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

#### **Entering Numbers and Symbols**

#### To enter numbers:

 Select the **Number** mode and press the appropriate key. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 20.)

#### 21 Phone Basics

#### To enter symbols:

Select the Symbol mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 20.) To enter a symbol, press the appropriate key displayed above the desired symbol character.

## Using Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the Received call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, just follow these easy steps.

#### To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call:

- Press \*+ es 6 mno 7 pars 1.
- 2. Enter the number you want to call.
- 3. Press ] (.

To permanently block your number, call the Customer Service department of your network service provider.

**Tip:** If you want to block the displaying of your phone number for the calls you make, you can do so by typing specific characters before you type the number you want to dial. You can also automate this. For information on prepending numbers to all of your phone calls automatically, see "Auto Prepend" on page 81.

## Responding to Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).

#### To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

• Press 1. (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)

#### To switch back to the first caller:

• Press 1 again.

## Using the Speakerphone

The speakerphone allows you to hear audio through the speaker and talk without holding your phone. During a call, press the right soft key \( \square \) for **Options** and then select **Speaker On** to activate the speakerphone or press . When the speakerphone is activated, use the Volume keys to adjust the sound level. To turn the speakerphone off during a call, press the right soft key T for **Options** and then select **Speaker Off** or press .

**Warning!** Due to higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

## History

With the History menu, you can:

view recent calls, grouped by day, that you missed, received, or dialed

**Note:** You can also access the most recent numbers in the three types of call records by pressing the key while in Idle mode.

## Viewing Your Recent Calls

#### To view an entry in your recent calls:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press Press for History.
- 3. Highlight an entry and press 

  to display the time and date of the call.
- 4. To call a number, highlight the entry and press 1.

**Note:** You cannot make calls from Recent Calls to entries identified as Unknown or Restricted.

## Recent Calls Options

When an entry is highlighted, press the left soft key of for **Send Msg** to send a message to the person. See "Messaging" on page 30. Press the right soft key for **Options** to select one of the following options for this entry. Depending on the Recent Calls category, not all options may be available:

- Save: saves the number to your Contacts as a New Entry or Existing Entry. See "Contacts" on page 25. You cannot save phone numbers already in your Internal Contacts or from calls identified as Unknown ID or Restricted.
- Prepend to add a dialing prefix to the phone number prior to calling. (Appears only if this number is not already stored as a Contact.)
- **Delete**: removes the number from your Call History.
- Delete All: removes all the entries from your Recent Calls.
- Show Contact: displays Contact information.

## **Contacts**

Use the Contacts menu to store your phone numbers and other contact information. You can specify the following information for each contact you add to your Contacts list: Mobile, Home, Work, Pager, E-mail, URL, Memo, Ringer, Fax, and Others. You can store up to 600 entries.

## Adding New Entries

#### Adding New Entries in Idle Mode

- 1. Enter a new phone number and press the right soft key (a) for **Options**.
- 2. Using the navigation keys, select **Save** and press .
- 3. Select **New Entry** and press .
- **4.** Select the type of number to be stored: **Mobile**, **Home**, **Work**, **Pager**, **Fax**, or **Others**. To select the category, press the Up or Down navigation key and then press .
- **5.** Enter a name. For information about entering text, see "Entering Text" on page 20.
- **6.** Press the Up or Down navigation keys to edit information in the other categories.
- **7.** Press the left soft key for **Done** to save the entry.

## Adding New Entries from the Contacts Menu

- 2. Press for Contacts.

## Finding, Editing or Dialing Contacts

You can access your contact list from the Idle screen by pressing the right soft key  $\bigcirc$ .

#### To find an entry from the Contacts menu:

- 1. Press for Menu.
- 2. Press of for Contacts.

- 3. A list of your Contacts is displayed. You can find a specific contact in one of the following ways:
  - Scroll through the list using the Up and Down navigation keys.
  - Enter the first few letters to locate the desired Contact. If more than one Contact appears, scroll through the list using the Up and Down navigation keys.
- **4.** To call the Contact, press 1.

To edit the Contact, press the right soft key \( \square \) for **Options**, and select Edit. See "Adding New Entries" on page 25.

## Selecting Ringer Types to Identify Entries

You can assign ringer types to different Contact entries so you can identify callers by the ringer you hear when they call.

#### To assign a ringer to a contact:

- 1. Display the edit screen for the Contact. See "Finding, Editing or Dialing Contacts" on page 25.
- 2. Press the navigation key down until **Ring** is selected and press .



- **3.** Using the navigation keys, select a ringer category and press .
- **4.** Press the navigation key up or down to highlight and listen to the desired ringer. Press 
  to select the desired ringer.
- 5. Press the left soft key for **Done** to save the changes to the contact entry.

## Selecting Pictures for Entries

You can assign a picture to a Contacts entry so that it appears on the displays whenever that person phones you.

#### To assign a picture to a contact:

- 1. Display the edit screen for the Contact. See "Finding, Editing or Dialing Contacts" on page 25.
- 2. Press the Up navigation key to select the photo area (if there is no photo, this area will be labelled **Add Photo**) and press the right soft key for **Add**. (If a photo has already been assigned, the right soft key will say **Change**.)
- **3.** Using the navigation keys, select one of the following options:
  - No Image: Leave the picture blank.

- New Picture: Use the camera to take a new picture. See "Camera" on page 45.
- My Pictures: Select an image from your Photo Gallery, MMS, or Transferred Images. See "Image Album" on page 46.
- My Content: Select an image from your downloaded images.
- **4.** When you find the image, highlight it and press the left soft key for **Assign**.
- **5.** Press the left soft key for **Done** to save the changes to the contact entry.

## Groups

#### **Assigning Contacts to Groups**

You can associate a group name to your entries. Once contacts are organized into groups, you can send text and multimedia messages to all members of a group simultaneously. Additionally, you can assign a unique Picture ID to the group.

To create a new group and associate an existing contact to a group:

- 1. Press for Menu.
- 2. Press ster for Contacts.
- 3. Press the right soft key for **Options**.
- 4. Press for New Group.
- 5. Press left soft key for **Start**.
- **6.** Highlight the desired contact and press the key. When you are finished adding contacts, press the left soft key for **Continue**.
- **7.** Enter a name for the group.
- **8.** Press the left soft key for **Save**.

#### To send text messages to all the Contacts in a group:

- **4.** Press the left soft key for **Send Msg**.

## **Speed Dials**

You can assign up to 98 phone numbers from the Contacts list that you use most frequently to the number keys (2 to 99). You can dial them easily whenever you want, simply by pressing and holding the associated number key.

#### **Creating Speed Dial Entries**

- **3.** Press the right soft key \( \square \) for **Options**.
- 4. Press [ abc ] for **Settings**.
- 5. Press for **Speed Dial**. A list of current speed dials is displayed.
- **6.** Using the navigation keys, select a number and press the right soft key for **Assign**.

**Note:** Memory location 1 is reserved for your Voice Mail server number.

7. Select an entry from the list and press .

### **Editing Speed Dial Entries**

#### To replace the number assigned to a speed dial location:

- 1. Press for Menu.
- 2. Press ster for Contacts.
- 3. Press the right soft key \( \square \) for **Options**.
- 4. Press Pabe for Settings.
- 5. Press for Speed Dial.
- **6.** Using the navigation keys, select the speed dial number you want to edit.
- 7. Press the right soft key 📁 for **Options**.
- 8. Select an option:
  - **Replace**: To replace the contact with another one.
  - Remove: To erase the number.

### **Using Speed Dial**

In Idle mode, to speed dial the numbers assigned to the 2 to 99 keys, press and hold the appropriate key. See page 17 for information.

# My Name Card

This function is similar to an entry in the Contacts list, except that it contains your own contact information, like a business card. You can transfer it to another Bluetooth-enabled device or send it in messages.

#### To view the name card:

- 1. Press on for Menu.
- 2. Press get for Contacts.
- 3. Press the right soft key  $\subseteq$  for **Options**.
- 4. Press Pabe for Settings.
- 5. Press def for My Name Card.
- **6.** If the name doesn't exist, enter the name and press the left soft key for **Done**.
- 7. Press the left soft key for **Send Contact**. This option lets you send your name card to a recipient listed in your contacts. For more information, see "Contacts" on page 25.

# Messaging

You can send and receive a range of different message types from your phone.

Press for **Menu**, followed by for **Messaging**.

This menu has the following messaging options:

- Voicemail: allows you to access your voice mailbox and check for voice messages.
- Text and Multimedia: allows you to compose and send Text and Multimedia messages to other phones able to receive the messages.
- Web Alert: allows you to view specific Web alerts from your service provider.

### Voice Mail

### Setting Up Your Voice Mail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voice mail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you should set up your voice mail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

**Note:** You must request this feature from your service provider for it to work correctly.

# To set up voice mail:

- 1. Press of for **Menu**, followed by 4ghi 1000 1.
- 2. Follow the system audio prompts to create your passcode, record your greeting, and record your name announcement.

### Voice Mail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By displaying at the top of your screen.

# New Voice Mail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call to check your voice mail.

# To call your voice mail immediately after receiving a message:

- 1. Press the 1 key to listen to the message.
- 2. Press the [ key to return to the Idle screen.

### To display your Voice Mail:

• Press • for Menu, followed by 4ghi 1me 1me

**Tip:** You can also press and hold the key to set up and check your voice mail.

**Important:** When you are roaming off the network, you may not receive notification of new voice mail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your voice mail by dialing 1 + area code + your Phone Number. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing voice mail while roaming off the network.

**Note:** Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are notified of new messages only when your phone is turned on and you are in a Service Area.

### Retrieving Your Voice Mail Messages

You can access your voice mail from the Messaging menu.

### To use the menu keys to access your voice mail:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press for Voicemail.
- 4. Press for **Dial Voicemail**.

**Note:** You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voice mail from your phone.

### Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice messages.

# To clear the icon from the display screen:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press for Voicemail.

- 4. Press Pabe for Clear Icon.
- 5. Press the navigation key up to select **Yes** and press .

# Text & Multimedia Messages

#### **Create New**

Using your phone, you can send text and multimedia messages to other mobile phones in North America and the rest of the world, depending on your carrier.

### To create a text message:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press Press for Text and Multimedia.
- 4. Press for **Send New**.
- 5. Enter the phone number or e-mail address manually, or, to send the message to a saved contact, press the Down navigation key, highlight Contact List and press . Highlight the desired contact and press the key. When you are finished adding contacts, press the left soft key for Done

If you wish to send your message to multiple numbers or addresses, repeat step 5. Use the navigation keys to move up and down your list of addresses. You can send a message to a maximum of 10 numbers.

**6.** When you are finished entering numbers or addresses, press the left soft key for **Next**.

**Tip:** For the next step, you can change text entry mode, by pressing the right soft key and select a text entry option. See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 20.

- **7.** Specify a Subject and create your message using the keypad as follows.
  - To add a Subject line to your message, highlight the Subject box using the navigation keys. Enter the subject text. When you are finished press the left soft key for Done.
  - To write the body of your message, highlight the main body box using the navigation keys. Enter the text of the message. When you are finished press the left soft key for **Done**.

**8.** To send the message, press the left soft key for **Send**. If you want to add multimedia files to the message, continue with the next procedure.

#### To add sound or picture files to a message:

- **1.** From the message composition screen, highlight **More** using the navigation keys and press .
- 2. Highlight **Add Sound** or **Add Picture** using the navigation keys and press .
- 3. Select an option:
  - For audio files, select Record New or Sound Album.
  - For pictures, select Take Picture or Image Album.
- **4.** The file is attached to your message. You can now finish composing and send your message.

### Adding slides to your message

Messages can contain up to 1000 characters. For lengthy messages, you can divide the message text among two slides. Each slide presents one screen of information. Each slide can contain its own sound and picture attachments.

### To add slides to a message:

- **1.** From the message composition screen, highlight **More** using the navigation keys and press .
- 2. Highlight **Add Slide** using the navigation keys and press .
- **3.** A new body box appears below the first box. You can move between the first and second slides using the Up and Down navigation keys. You can now finish composing and send.

# **Changing sending options for messages**

- 1. From the message composition screen, highlight **More** using the navigation keys and press the right soft key for **Options**.
- **2.** Highlight **Sending Options** and press  $(\circ\kappa)$ .
- **3.** Select the option you wish to change. The options available to you depend on the type of message you created.
  - **SMS options** (SMS messages are typically text-only messages.)

- CallBack Number: allows you to change the callback number for this message. The default callback number is your mobile phone number.
- Priority: allows you to change the priority of the message between Urgent and Normal.

**MMS options** (MMS messages typically have multimedia attachments.)

- Read Report: allows you to turn Read Report Off or On. When On, you will be notified when your message is read by the message's recipient.
- Delivery Report: allows you to turn Delivery Report Off or On. When On, you will be notified when your message is received by the message's recipient.
- Priority: allows you to change the priority of the message between High, Normal, and Low.
- **CC**: allows you to add a CC address to your message.
- BCC: allows you to add a BCC address to your message.
- Slide Timing: allows you set the duration (in seconds) of each slide.
- **4.** When finished with your messaging options, press the key to return to the message window.

# **Saving messages**

You can save a draft of your message prior to sending it. This is useful if you intend to send the message again in the future or if you cannot complete the message and want to do so at a later time.

# To save a draft of a message:

- 1. From the message composition screen, highlight **More** using the navigation keys and press the right soft key for **Options**.
  - Press for **Save to Drafts**. The message is stored in the **Drafts** folder. When the message is sent, the draft is deleted.
  - Press for Save Text. The text of your message is now stored as a Quick Text message.
  - For MMS messages (which typically contain sound or photograph files) you can select for Save As Template. Enter a name for the template and press . The message is now stored in your Templates folder. Unlike draft messages, templates are not deleted when sent.

2. You can now continue to compose or send your message.

#### Inhox

This folder contains all your received text and multimedia messages. From this folder, you can view your messages, reply to or forward the message to another destination.

#### To view a message in your inbox:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press Press for Text and Multimedia.
- 4. Press Press for Inbox. Your messages appear in a list.
- **5.** Highlight the desired message and press **.** The message appears on screen.

#### To reply to a message:

- 1. With the message open, select the left soft key for **Reply**.
- 2. Compose your reply message. For more information, see "To create a text message:", beginning at step 6.

**Note:** The address field is already filled in when replying to a message.

### Outbox/Sent

This folder contains messages you have sent and saved to your Outbox or are waiting to send. From this folder, you can select and resend messages.

# To forward or resend your message:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4 ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press Press for Text and Multimedia.
- 4. Press get for Outbox/Sent. Your messages appear in a list.
- 5. Highlight the desired message and select one of the following options:
  - If the message was successfully sent previously:
    - To forward the message to a different recipient, press the left soft key for **Forward**, and specify the new recipient.

- To resend the message, press the right soft key for **Options** and press to **Resend**. Your message will be sent to the same recipient. See page 32 for information.
- If the message failed to be sent previously:
  - To re-send, press the left soft key for **Resend**. Another attempt is made to send your message to the original recipient.
  - To forward the message to another recipient, press the right soft key for **Options** and press to **Forward**.

### To access Outbox/Sent options:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press [ eabs ] for **Text and Multimedia**.
- 4. Press get for Outbox/Sent. Your messages appear in a list.
- **5.** Press the right soft key  $\bigcirc$  for **Options**.
  - Resend: allows you to send your message again either to the original recipient or to a different one.
  - Move to Saved: allows you to move the message to the Saved list.
  - Save address: allows you to save an address in your Contacts list.
  - Message Details: allows you to view information about the message, such as date and time.
  - Message Status: allows you to view the Delivery Status and Read Status.
  - **Erase**: allows you to delete the message.
  - Erase Multiple: allows you to select and delete several messages.
  - Erase All: allows you to delete all the messages in the list.

### **Templates**

This folder contains predefined messages for common occasions, as well as multimedia messages you have saved as templates. To compose a multimedia message using a template:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press Press for Text and Multimedia.
- **4.** Press for **Templates**. Your templates appear in a list.

- 5. Select **Create New** or highlight the desired template and press .
- **6.** Compose your message. For more information, see "To create a text message:", beginning at step 5 on page 32. You can modify the message as desired.

#### **Drafts**

This folder contains drafts of unfinished or unsent text and multimedia messages. From this folder, you can complete and send your messages.

#### To open a saved draft:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press Pabe for Text and Multimedia.
- 4. Press for **Drafts**. Your draft messages appear in a list.
- 5. Highlight the desired draft message and press .
- **6.** Complete your message. For more information, see "To create a text message:", beginning at step 5 on page 32. You can modify the draft message as desired.

#### Saved

This folder contains saved text and multimedia messages. Saved messages will not automatically expire. Delete them manually.

### To open a message in the Saved folder:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press Pabe for Text and Multimedia.
- **4.** Press for **Saved**. Your saved messages appear in a list.
- 5. Highlight the desired saved message and press .

### **Erase Messages**

You can erase messages at anytime from the Inbox, Outbox/Send, Draft or Saved message folders.

# To erase the messages from the desired folder:

- 1. Press of for Menu.

There are several options associated with messages. The Settings menu allows you to customize the options to fit your preferences.

### To access the Settings menu:

The following options are available:

# **SMS Options**

- CallBack Number: allows you to change the callback number for this message. The default callback number is your mobile phone number.
- Priority: allows you to change the priority of the message between Urgent and Normal.

# **MMS Options**

- Read Report: allows you to turn Read Receipt Off or On. When On, you will be notified when your message is read by the message's recipient.
- Delivery Report: allows you to turn Delivery Receipt Off or On. When On, you will be notified when your message is received by the message's recipient.
- Priority: allows you to change the priority of the message between High,
   Normal, and Low.
- Auto Download: allows you to turn Auto Downloading Off or On. When On, the attachments for multimedia messages will automatically be downloaded to your phone.
- Rejection Settings: allows you to adjust the Rejection settings for your phone. The options available are:
  - By Size: allows you to reject multimedia messages that over a specified size.

- Reject Adv.: allows you to reject multimedia messages that are labeled as advertising (Adv.)

#### To access the web alert service (if available):

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press 4ghi for Messaging.
- 3. Press are for Web Alert.
- **4.** Follow the on-screen instructions.

# Music

Music (Menu [5]) provides a menu for accessing music.

## To access the Music menu:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press [siki] for Music.
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions.

# Wireless Web

Your phone comes equipped with Wireless Web access (Menu [5000]) through your browser. You can view specially designed versions of popular sites including sports, weather, news, and stock quotes. When you launch the browser, the phone automatically connects to the Internet.

Note: Rates and pricing vary according to your service plan. Please contact your service provider for additional information.

### Launch Web

#### To launch a web connection:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Wireless Web.
- 3. Press for **Launch Web**. You now are connected to your service provider's Web page.

### Navigating the Web

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a web session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips:

# **Soft Keys**

When browsing the Web, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more soft keys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the soft key buttons directly below the phone's display screen. Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the soft keys may change to indicate their function.

### **Scrolling**

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.

Press the Up and Down navigation keys to scroll line by line or press the volume buttons on the side of the phone to scroll one page at a time.

# **Navigating Between Web Pages**

Once you've learned how to use soft keys and scroll, you can start navigating Web sites.

 Select on-screen items by using the navigation key to highlight the desired item, then press the desired soft key button (or press ).

The left soft key is used primarily for selecting items.

 If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item.

Links appear as <u>underlined text</u> and allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

 Select links by highlighting the link and then selecting the appropriate soft key.

**Tip:** The tenth item in a numbered list may be selected by pressing the key on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.

**4.** To go back one page, press on your phone. (Note that is also used to delete text.)

### **Bookmarks**

You can view web pages that were saved as bookmarks in a previous web session.

#### To view a bookmarked web page:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Wireless Web.
- 3. Press abc for Bookmarks.
- **4.** Select a bookmark from the list of bookmarks. You now are connected to the web page.

### Go To URL

You can view web pages by specifying a URL.

#### To launch a web connection:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Wireless Web.
- 3. Press (see for Go To URL)
- **4.** Enter a URL or select a URL from the displayed list. You now are connected to the web page.

### **Taking Pictures**

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in Digital Camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button. You can activate Camera mode and take pictures when the phone is closed.

### To take pictures:

- 1. Press Menu Btu 1 on Camera.
- 2. Press for **Take Photo**.

**Shortcut:** To activate Camera mode, you can also press the Camera button located on the right side of the phone.

- 3. Using the phone's main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
  - To change the brightness of the screen, press the Up or Down navigation keys.
  - To zoom in or out, press the Left or Right navigation keys.

**Note:** If your camera is set to 1.3 M resolution, you will not be able to zoom in or out.

- **4.** Hold the camera steady. To take the picture, press or the Side Camera button until the shutter sounds.
  - The photo is automatically stored in your photo gallery. See "Image Album" on page 46 for more details.
  - If you wish to send your picture to someone via multimedia messaging, press the right soft key for **Options** then select **Send Msg**. Your picture is embedded in a new multimedia message. See "Sending Pictures via Multimedia Messaging" on page 46 for more details.

• If you wish to discard the current picture, press the right soft key for **Options** and then select **Erase**. You can continue to take pictures.

#### Camera Options

- 1. Take your picture, as described in "Taking Pictures" on page 45. From the Taken Picture screen, press the right soft key for **Options** then select **Send Msg** to send your picture as part of a multimedia message.
- 2. Specify a destination phone number or e-mail address by entering the information or selecting it from your Contacts list.
- **3.** Compose your multimedia message. Your picture is already attached to the message. For more information, see "To create a text message:", beginning at step 6 on page 32.

### Image Album

From your Image Album, you can view all the pictures that you have stored on your phone. Stored pictures can be sent to others as multimedia messages.

### To access your saved pictures:

- 1. Press Menu Btuy for Camera.
- 2. Press Press for Image Album.
- 3. Select an album:
  - Photo Gallery: displays pictures you have taken.
  - MMS: displays pictures for multimedia messages.
  - Transferred Images: displays pictures you have transferred from the memory card.
- **4.** Using the navigation keys, scroll through your stored photos and highlight the desired photograph.
  - To view the highlighted picture, press the left soft key for Expand (Photo Gallery only).
  - To modify your picture options, press the right soft key for Options. The following options are available:
    - Send: sends the picture to someone via multimedia messaging. For more information, see "Sending Pictures via Multimedia Messaging" on page 46.
    - Print: allows you to print the picture using PictBridge. For more information, see "PictBridge Print" on page 48.
    - Assign: allows you to use the picture for a wallpaper, picture ID, or incoming caller. In the address book, pictures can be used to identify incoming callers by displaying the image on screen.
    - **Erase**: erases the picture from memory.
    - Erase All: erases all the pictures from memory.
    - Copy/Move: allows you to copy or move the picture to your memory card.
    - Rename: allows you to change the name of the picture.
    - Info: displays the caption, time and date, resolution, size, and upload status of the image.

PictBridge is an industry standard established by the Camera & Imaging Products Association (CIPA) that enables a range of digital photo solutions including direct photo printing from a digital camera to a printer without the need for a PC.

**Note:** There are many PictBridge devices in the market whose compatibility with your phone cannot be guaranteed.

# **Printing From Your Phone**

Your phone comes equipped with a built-in camera that allows you to print images directly to a printer using the PictBridge technology. A USB cable must be connected between the two devices before any printing can occur.

# To use PictBridge to print pictures from your phone:

- 1. Insert one end of the accessory cable into the USB slot on the printer. (Printer must support PictBridge technology.)
- 2. Press of for Menu.
- 3. Press stuv for Camera.
- 4. Press for **Camera**.
- 5. Press 4ghi for PictBridge Print.
- **6.** Insert the USB cable into your phone.
- 7. Read the on-screen "Connect Printer" message and press the left soft key for Next.
- 8. Select the image gallery (**Photo Gallery**, **MMS**, or **Transferred Images**) and press .
- 9. Highlight the desired image and press the left soft key for Next. (To select multiple images, press to place a check mark next to each image selected.)
- **10.** Highlight **Copies** and press the navigation key left or right to select the desired number of copies to print.

- **11.** Press the navigation key down to select **Type**. Press the navigation key left or right to select one of the following:
  - Standard: prints the standard image.
  - **Index**: prints the index information.

**Note:** These options may vary and are dependent on the printer's capabilities.

**12.** Press the navigation key down to select **Size**. Press the navigation key left or right to select a size.

**Note:** These sizes are may vary and are dependent on the printer's capabilities.

- **14.** Press the navigation key down to select **Border**. Press navigation key left or right to select **On** or **Off**.
- 15. Press the right soft key to **Preview** the image the left soft key to **Print** the image.
- **16.** Select **Yes** to confirm printing and press .

# Bluetooth

Bluetooth® is a short-range wireless communications technology capable of exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet without requiring a physical connection.

Unlike infrared, you don't need to line up the devices to beam information with Bluetooth<sup>®</sup>. If the devices are within a range of one another, you can exchange information between them, even if they are located in different rooms.

# **Adding New Devices**

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Bluetooth.
- 3. Press for Trusted Devices.
- 4. Press left soft key for **Add New**.
- 5. Select Search.
- **6.** A list of Bluetooth devices is displayed. Highlight a device and press for **Add to list**.

#### To access Bluetooth menus:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Bluetooth.
- **3.** Select one of the following options:
  - for **Enable**: Select **On** or **Off** to enable or disable Bluetooth support.
  - for **Visibility**: Select **Visible for 1min** to let other devices search for your phone; otherwise, select **Hidden**.
  - for **Device Name**: Type in the name of your phone as it will appear to other Bluetooth devices. See "Entering Text" on page 20.
  - for **Device Info**: Displays information about your phone's Bluetooth configuration.
  - for **Select Device Type**: Displays default device for incoming and outgoing calls. Select **HandsFree** or **HeadSet**.
  - Type for **Use In-Band Ring**: Enable or disable use of in-band ring.
  - for Voice commands: Enable or disable voice commands.

# **Options**

After a device is added to your list of Trusted Devices, press the right soft key to select from the following options:

- Add New: adds another device to your Trusted Devices list.
- **Edit name**: shows the name given to your phone for Bluetooth® purposes. You can edit the name if needed.
- **Erase**: lets you delete the highlighted trusted device.
- Erase all: lets you delete all the trusted devices.
- Auto-accept: lets you accept trusted device transfers automatically.
- **Info**: lets you view information about the highlighted trusted device.
- Settings: Select Enable, Visibility, Device Name, Device Info, or **Select Device Type.**

**Note:** The software in this handset supports Bluetooth profiles: HSP, HFP, DUN, OPP, A2DP, and AVRCP. However, the software does not support the transfer of data files.

# Voice Memo

You can use your phone to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or other items.

# **Recording Voice Memos**

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press \*\*\* for Voice Memo.
- 3. If you have not previously recorded a voice memo, press the left soft key for **Record New**.

If you have previously recorded a voice memo, press the right soft key for **Options** and press for **Record New**.

To hear a previously recorded voice memo, press the left soft key for **Play**.

- **4.** Wait for the beep and then start speaking. (As it is recording, the phone displays a countdown timer that shows how many seconds are left for recording.)
  - Press the left soft key  $\longrightarrow$  to **Pause** the memo. (When a memo is paused, press the left soft key  $\longrightarrow$  again to **Resume** recording.)
- **5.** Press the right soft key to **Finish** the recording prior to the countdown completion.
- **6.** The memo is saved to your phone. Press the left soft key to **Play** your message for review.

# **Recording Phone Call Conversations**

- 1. During a call, press the right soft key 📁 for **Options**.
- 2. Press for **Voice Memo**. (A one minute counter is displayed on the screen to indicating the amount of time a single voice memo can be recorded.)

Press the left soft key rightarrow to **Pause**. (When a memo is paused, press the left soft key rightarrow again to **Resume** recording.)

**3.** Press the right soft key **\sum for Done** to stop and save the phone call conversation.

# Voice Memo Options

After recording a voice memo, you can select the following options by pressing the right soft key **Toptions** in the Voice Memo menu.

- **Erase All**: Erase all the voice memos.
- Copy/Move: Allows you to Copy or Move the memo to your memory card.
- Rename: Change the description of the voice memo.
- Info: Displays information about the selected voice memo, such as length, size and recording date.

# **Tools**

Tools (**Menu** provides helpful software applications to help you perform common functions, such as:

- setting an alarm so that the phone rings at a specific time, to remind you of an appointment, for example
- viewing a calendar and organizing your schedule
- using the phone as a calculator for basic mathematical equations or currency exchange operations
- viewing times in different parts of the world

# Alarm

Your phone comes with a built-in alarm clock with multiple alarm times.

#### To use the alarm clock:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Tools.
- 3. Press for Alarm.
- 4. Press 1000, or 1000 to select an alarm.
- 5. Press the navigation key left or right and select **On**.
- **6.** Press the navigation key down once and then use the keypad to enter the alarm time.
- 7. Press the right soft key 📜 to select AM or PM.
- 8. Press the navigation key down once and press to select an alarm tone from **Ring Tones**, **Melodies**, or **My Content**. See "Ringer Type" on page 71.
- 9. Press the navigation key down once and then press it right or left to select the Repeat interval: **Once**, **Mon to Fri**, **Sat & Sun**, or **Daily**.
- 10. Press the navigation key down once and then press it right or left to select the Snooze interval: Off, 5 minutes, 10 minutes, 15 minutes, or 20 minutes.
- **11.** Press the left soft key for **Done**.

# Calculator

Your phone comes with a built-in calculator.

#### To access the calculator:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for **Tools**.
- 3. Press [ abc ] for Calculator.
- 4. Enter a number with the keypad. (Press to insert a decimal point and to make the number negative or positive. To clear the input box, press the right soft key.)
- 5. Use your navigation key to select a mathematical function:
  - Left to subtract
  - Up to multiply
  - Right to add
  - Down to divide
- **6.** Enter the next number using the keypad. Repeat steps 5 to 7 as necessary.
- 7. Press to view the results.

### Calendar

Your Calendar helps organize your time and reminds you of important events.

### To add an event to today's schedule:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Tools.
- 3. Press ed for Calendar.
- 4. Select a Planner type:
  - Today: displays today's events.
  - Scheduler: displays a calendar from which you can select a day.
  - Task List: displays a to-do list.
  - **Countdown**: displays a countdown to a specific time.

# **Using Today Entries**

You can use the Today menu (**Menu** (**Menu** ) to display all the **Schedule**, **Task**, and **Countdown** entries for the current day:

 Press the Left and Right navigation keys to switch between the Schedule, Task, and Count tabs.  Press the Options soft key and select Jump to date to view a different day.

### **Using Scheduler Entries**

The Scheduler menu contains a calendar to keep track of your schedule and lets you set alarms to act as reminders.

# To create a Scheduler entry:

# To view Scheduler options:

You can select the following options in the Scheduler (**Menu** pressing the right soft key for **Options**:

- Add New: allows you to create a new Scheduler event.
- View Type: allows you to switch the Scheduler view to Monthly or Weekly.
- Jump to date: allows you to view the events for a specific day. Press the Left or Right navigation key to select an option. Then press the Down navigation key to enter the date information:

**Note:** To delete all the tasks, from the **Task List** menu, press the right soft key for **Options** and select **Erase All**.

You can use the Countdown function to remind you how much time is left until a specific event.

### To enter a Countdown:

- 5. Press the right soft key to select **AM** or **PM**.
- **6.** Press the Down navigation key once.
- 7. Use the keypad to enter the countdown Date.
- **8.** Press the left soft key for **Done**.

#### To view or edit existing Countdowns:

- 1. Display the **Countdown** menu (**Menu** (**Menu** (**a** def (**a** def) (**b** def) (**b** def) (**b** def) (**c** def) (**d** def)
- 2. Highlight a countdown and select one of the following options:
  - To edit the countdown, press to display the countdown details and then press the left soft key for Edit.
  - To delete countdown, press the right soft key for Options and select Erase.

**Note:** To delete all the countdowns, from the **Countdown** menu, press the right soft key **To Options** and select **Erase All**.

# Mass Storage

You can connect your phone to your personal computer using a USB data cable, using your phone as a portable disk drive.

### Connect to PC

You must insert a memory card into the phone in order to connect the phone to a computer. The memory card is the destination for all file transfer.

# To transfer files between your phone and your computer:

- 1. Connect your phone to the data cable.
- 2. Connect the data cable to your computer.
- 3. Press of for Menu.
- 4. Press for **Tools**.
- 5. Press for Mass Storage.
- **6.** Press for **Connect to PC**. The phone now appears as a removable disk on your computer.

**Warning**: Call is disabled when the device is connected as a mass storage device.

**7.** Using your computer's navigation systems, transfer your files between the computer and the phone.

**Warning**: Do not disconnect the phone from the data cable while transferring files! Please follow proper shutdown procedure for removable storage device to avoid file corruption.

8. When you are finished transferring files, press the right soft key for **Disconnect** and the right soft key to confirm.

It is now safe to remove the phone from the data cable.

#### **Format**

Use this menu to format a memory card that has been inserted into the card slot. Your handset is capable of supporting memory cards with a maximum memory of 8 GB.

### To format an inserted memory card:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Tools.
- 3. Press 4ghi for Mass Storage.
- 4. Press [abc] for Format.
- 5. Enter your lock code.

**Tip**: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your Mobile Directory Number or try 1234. If none of these work, call Customer Service at 1-800-Samsung.

Your phone comes with a memo pad you can use to compose and store reminders and memos to help keep yourself organized.

- 3. Press the left soft key to set Daylight Saving Time (DST).

### Voice Service

# **Activating Voice Recognition**

Voice recognition allows you to say commands to perform common functions supported by your phone. There is no voice training required to use the voice recognition feature. You simply say the pre-designated command displayed on your screen in a normal tone of voice to perform the desired function.

### To activate voice recognition:

- 1. Press the Voice Services key on the right side of the phone. (The phone prompts you to say a voice command.)
- 2. Wait for the beep and then say one of the following commands:
  - Call

- Send Text
- Lookup

Go To

Check

When it recognizes one of these commands, the phone launches the associated application. If the phone does not hear a command within approximately eight seconds, it de-activates voice recognition without taking any action.

#### Call

Call allows you to dial any valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number by speaking the number naturally, without pausing between the digits.

Tips for using voice Dial:

- Call works best in quieter environments.
- When saying a number, speak at a normal speed and say each digit clearly.
   There is no need to pause between digits.
- The phone recognizes the digits one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, zero, and oh. The phone does not recognize numbers such as "one eight hundred" for "1-800". Instead, say "one-eight-zero-zero".
- The phone recognizes only valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone numbers.
- If your phone does not usually recognize you correctly when you are using voice Call, try adapting Call to your voice, which can significantly improve

accuracy for some speakers. (See "Configuring Voice Adaptation" on page 65 for details.)

# To place a call using voice Call:

- 1. Activate voice recognition by pressing the Voice Services key on the right side of the phone. (The phone prompts you for a command.)
- 2. Say **Call**. (The phone prompts you to say the number.)
- 3. Say either a name stored in your Contacts or a valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number naturally and clearly.
  - If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by the correct number, say **Yes**. (You can also select the correct number from those displayed on the screen by pressing on the correct number. The phone will then dial the number.)
  - If the phone asks you, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect number, say No. (If there are other alternatives, the phone will prompt you with the next one. You can also press the navigation key up or down to select the correct number from the Choice List, and then press to dial.)
  - If you said a name listed in your Contacts that has more than one number associated with it, the phone displays the different locations (Mobile, Home, Work, Pager, Fax, Others) and asks you which one to dial. Say one of the location names and the phone will dial the number for the location you specified.

**Note:** In some cases, the phone might ask you to repeat a name or number. Make sure that the number is a valid 7, 10 or 11 digit North American phone number, and then say the number again. If the number isn't valid, or if the phone still doesn't understand the number on the second try, it will not place a call.

#### Send Text

The Send Text option allows you to quickly send a text message to a person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person.

- 1. Activate voice recognition by pressing the Voice Services key on the right side of the phone. (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
- 2. Say the person's full name, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. (The phone will play the name it recognized through the earpiece, and then open the contact information for that name.)

- If the phone says, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect name, say **No**. The phone then prompts you with the next name, if there is one. If there are no more names, the phone will say "Sorry, no match found."
- **3.** The Send To page opens. If the correct contact is displayed, press the **Next** soft key, and create your message. For more information on creating messages, see "Text & Multimedia Messages" on page 32.

#### Lookup

Lookup lets you retrieve contact information for any person in your Contacts by saying the full name of the person.

### To retrieve information using Lookup:

- 1. Activate voice recognition by pressing the Voice Services key on the right side of the phone. (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
- **2.** Say **Lookup**. (The phone will prompt you to say the name.)
- **3.** Say the person's full name, exactly as it is entered in your Contacts. The phone will play the name it recognized through the earpiece, and then open the contact information for that name.

If the phone says, "Did You Say," followed by an incorrect name, say **No**. The phone then prompts you with the next name, if there is one. If there are no more names, the phone will say "Sorry, No Match Found."

#### Go To

The Go To option allows you to quickly launch a menu item.

#### To use the Go To feature:

- 1. Activate voice recognition by pressing the Voice Services key on the right side of the phone. (The phone will prompt you for a command.)
- 2. Wait for the beep and say **Go To** followed by one of the following: Missed Alerts, History, Contacts, Messaging, Music, More Options (Wireless Web, My Files, Camera, Bluetooth, Voice Memo, Tools, or Settings under the More Options menu).

#### Check

The Check option gives you an update on the general status of your phone including signal and battery strength, network, and your phone number.

# To view the phone status information:

1. Activate voice recognition by pressing the Voice Services key on the right side of the phone. (The phone will prompt you for a command.)

 Wait for the beep and say Check followed by one of the following: Status, Time, Signal Strength, Network, Battery, or My Phone Number.

# **Configuring Confirmation**

You can configure your phone's confirmation setting for voice-based commands.

# To configure confirmation:

- 1. Press of for Menu.
- 2. Press for Tools.
- 3. Press 7<sub>pqs</sub> for **Voice Service**.
- **4.** Press the right soft key  $\subseteq$  for **Settings**.
- 5. Press for **Confirmation**.
- **6.** Highlight one of the following options: **Automatic**, **Always Confirm**, or **Never Confirm**.
- 7. Press the left soft key for **OK**.

# **Configuring Voice Adaptation**

You can configure your phone to adapt to your voice when using voice-based commands.

# **Keeping Tabs on Signal Strength**

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal. If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

#### **Understanding the Power Save Feature**

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key. Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

# **Understanding How Your Phone Operates**

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

# **Knowing Radio Frequency Safety**

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below. In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

# **Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance**

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

Try not to cover the phone's antenna.

- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it's inoperable, return it to a dealer store or call Customer Support for service.

**Note:** For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

# **Using Your Phone While Driving**

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first.

When using your phone in the car:

- Get to know your phone and its features, such as speed dial and re-dial.
- When available, use a hands-free device.
- Position your phone within easy reach.
- Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when stationary or before pulling into traffic.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may divert your attention from the road.
- Dial 911 to report serious emergencies. It's free from your wireless phone.
- Use your phone to help others in emergencies.
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless number when necessary.

# **Following Safety Guidelines**

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

# **Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

**Note:** Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

# **Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying**

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

# **Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas**

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn off your phone when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating that two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

Turn off your phone when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your phone or its accessories could generate sparks. Sparks could cause an explosion or a fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

**Note:** Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

# **Restricting Children's Access to your Phone**

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone, dial 911 by mistake or make calls that increase your phone bill.

The display on your handset is made of glass or acrylic and could break if your handset is dropped or if it receives significant impact. Do not use if screen is broken or cracked as this could cause injury to you.

# **Protecting Your Battery**

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Use only Samsung approved batteries and travel adapters. These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from 32° F to 113° F (0° C to 45° C).

What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal guidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety.
