

- Frequent erasing and writing will shorten a memory card's lifespan.

- Do not subject memory cards to strong shocks.
- Do not touch memory card terminals with your fingers or metal objects. If dirty, wipe the card with a soft cloth.

- Keep memory cards away from small children or pets.
- Do not expose memory cards in a place subject to electro static discharge and/or electrical noise.


Insert a memory card

- 1. Slide a memory card into the memory card slot, with the label side face down.
- 2. Press the card until it locks into place.
- Remove the memory card
- 1. Press the memory card so that it is disengaged from the phone.
- 2. Slide the card out of the slot.

#### Use a card adapter

Using a card adapter and a USB card reader/writer, you can read the card on a PC.

- Insert a memory card into a card adapter, and then the adapter into a card reader/writer.
- 2. Plug the USB connector of the card reader/writer into the USB port on your PC.
- Access the appropriate memory disk and copy to and from the card.

ABC, T9, Number, and Symbol modes

You can enter text in some features such as messaging, Phonebook, or Calendar, using ABC mode, T9 mode, Number mode, and Symbol mode.

# Changing the text input mode

The text input mode indicator displays when the cursor is in a text field.

- Press the right soft key to change the text input mode. ( T9 mode, Alerce: ABC mode, Ilere: Number mode, and elerg: Symbol mode)
- Press and hold [#] to switch between T9 and ABC mode.
- Press and hold [ \*] to switch to Symbol mode.

#### Other ABC mode operations

- To enter the same letter twice or to enter a different letter on the same key, wait for the cursor to move to the right automatically or press [Right]. Then, enter the next letter.
- Press [ \*] to change the case. Lower case (No indicator), Initial capital (♠), and Capital lock (♠) are available.
- Press [#] to insert a space.
- Press the Navigation keys to move the cursor.
- Press [C] to delete characters one by one. Press and hold [C] to clear the display.

#### Using T9 mode

T9 is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes.

#### Entering a word in T9 mode

1. Press [2] to [9] to start entering a word. Press each key once for each letter.

For example, press **[4**], **[3**], **[5**], **[5**], and **[6**] to enter *HELLO* in T9 mode.

T9 predicts the word that you are typing, and it may change with each key that you press.

- 2. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting characters.
- When the word displays correctly, go to step 4. Otherwise, press [0] to display alternative word choices for the keys that you have pressed. For example, *OF* and *ME* use [6] and [3].
- 4. Press [#] to insert a space and enter the next word.

#### Tips for using T9 mode

- Press [1] to enter periods or apostrophes automatically.
- Press [ ★] to change the case. Lower case (No indicator), Initial capital (♠), and Capital lock (♠) are available.
- Press the Navigation keys to move the cursor.

#### Adding a new word to the T9 dictionary

This feature may not be available for some languages.

- 1. Enter the word that you want to add.
- Press [0] to display alternative words for your key presses. When there are no more alternative words, Spell displays on the bottom line.
- 3. Press <**Spell**>.
- Enter the word you want using ABC mode and press < OK >.

- 2. Scroll to the number you want and press [  $\searrow$ ].

## Making a call from Phonebook

Once you have stored a number in Phonebook, you can dial the number by selecting it from Phonebook. ▶ p. 33

You can also use the speed dial feature to assign your most frequently called numbers to specific number keys. ▶ p. 35

You can quickly dial a number from the SIM card using the location number assigned when stored.

- 1. In Idle mode, enter the location number for the phone number you want and press [ #].
- 2. Scroll through other numbers, if necessary.
- 3. Press < Dial > or [  $\frown$ ] to dial the number you want.

# Viewing missed calls

If you have missed calls, the screen displays how many calls you have missed.

#### Placing a call on hold/Retrieving

Press <**Hold**> or <**Retrieve**> to place the call on hold or retrieve the call.

#### Making a second call

You can make another call if your network supports this function.

- 1. Press <**Hold**> to put the call on hold.
- 2. Make the second call in the normal way.
- 3. Press **<Swap>** to switch between the calls.
- Press < Options> and select End held call to end the call on hold.
- 5. To end the current call, press [

#### Answering a second call

You can answer an incoming call while already on the phone, if your network supports this function and you have activated the call waiting feature.  $\blacktriangleright$  p. 81

- 1. Press [  $\frown$  ] to answer the call. The first call is automatically put on hold.
- 2. Press **<Swap>** to switch between the calls.

#### Using the Speakerphone feature

Use the Speakerphone feature to talk and listen with the phone a short distance away.

Press [ i ] to activate the Speakerphone feature. Press the key again to switch back to the earpiece.

## **Using In-call options**

Press **<Options**> to access the following options during a call:

- Voice clarity on/Voice clarity off: remove extraneous noise and increase call quality so that the person with whom you are speaking can hear you clearly even if you are in a noise place.
- **Mute/Unmute**: switch off the phone's microphone so that the other person on the phone cannot hear you, or switch it back on.
- Mute keys/Send keys: switch the key tones on or off.
  - $\ensuremath{\fbox{\sc l}}$  To communicate with answering machines or
    - computerised telephone systems, **Send keys** must be selected.

Call functions

- **Phonebook**: access the contact list.
- Send DTMF: send the DTMF (Dual tone multifrequency) tones as a group. The DTMF tones are the tones used in phones for tone dialling, sounding when you press the number keys. This option is helpful for entering a password or an account number when you call an automated system, like a banking service.
- **Messages**: read an incoming message and send a new message. ▶ p. 49
- **Join**: set up a multi-party call by adding a caller on hold to a currently active call. You can include up to five people on a multi-party call.
- **Split**: have a private conversation with one multiparty call participant. The other participants can converse with each other. After the private conversation, select **Join** to return both all private participants to the multi-party call.
- **Transfer**: transfer the currently active call to a caller on hold. The two callers can talk to each other, but you are disconnected from the call.

- **Remove**: disconnect one multi-party call participant.
- End held call: disconnect the call currently on hold.
- **SIM service**: access special services, such as news, weather forecasts, entertainment, and location services, provided by your SIM card. This option is available when you use a SIM card supporting SIM AT menus.

# Menu functions

# Call records (Menu 1)

Use this menu to view the calls you have dialled, received, or missed, and the length of the calls. You can also check the cost of your calls, if your SIM card supports this function.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **Call records**.

#### Recent contacts (Menu 1.1)

This menu displays the most recent calls dialled, received, or missed.

#### Accessing a call record

- 1. Press [Left] or [Right] to move to another call type.
- 2. Press [Up] or [Down] to scroll through the call list.

3. Press [ ⌒] to dial a number, or [ *i*] to view the details of a call.

#### Using call record options

From the call list, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- **Details**: access the call details.
- Call: make a call to the number.
- Save as contacts: save the number in Phonebook.
- Send message: send an SMS or MMS message.
- **Delete**: delete the selected call record or all records.

#### Missed calls (Menu 1.2)

This menu displays the most recent received calls that you did not answer.

#### Dialled calls (Menu 1.3)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have dialled.

Menu functions

#### Received calls (Menu 1.4)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have received.

#### Delete all (Menu 1.5)

Use this menu to delete all of the records in each call type.

- 1. Press [ *i* ] to check the call types to clear.
- 2. Press < Delete >.
- 3. Press < **Yes**> to confirm the deletion.

#### Call time (Menu 1.6)

This menu displays the time log for calls made and received. The actual time invoiced by your service provider will vary.

- Last call time: check the length of your last call.
- **Total sent**: check the total length of all the calls you have dialled.
- **Total received**: check the total length of all the calls you have received.

- **Reset timers**: reset the call timers. You need to enter the phone password.
  - ☐ The password is preset to **00000000**. You can change this password. ▶ p. 85

#### Call costs (Menu 1.7)

This network feature displays the cost of calls. This menu is available only if your SIM card supports this feature. Note that this is not intended to be used for billing purposes.

- Last call cost: check the cost of your last call.
- **Total cost**: check the total cost of all your calls. If the total cost exceeds the maximum cost set in **Set max cost**, you must reset the counter before you can make another call.
- Max cost: check the maximum cost limit set in Set max cost.
- Reset counters: reset the cost counters.
- Set max cost: set the maximum cost authorised for your calls.
- **Price/Unit**: set the price per unit that is applied when the cost of your calls is calculated.

# Phonebook (Menu 2)

You can store phone numbers on your SIM card and in your phone's memory. The SIM card and phone's memory are physically separate, but they are used as a single entity called Phonebook.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **Phonebook**.

#### Contact list (Menu 2.1)

Use this menu to search for numbers in Phonebook.

	You can quickly access this menu by pressing <b><contacts< b="">&gt; in Idle mode.</contacts<></b>
<b>V</b>	<contacts> in Idle mode.</contacts>

#### Finding an entry

- 1. Enter the first few letters of the name that you want to find.
- 2. Select the name you want from the list.
- 3. Scroll to a number and press [ ヽ] to dial, or press [ i] to edit the contact information.

#### **Using Phonebook options**

While viewing contact details, press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the contact information.
- Send message: send an SMS, MMS, or e-mail message to the selected number.
- **Copy**: copy the number to the phone's memory, to SIM card, or to the FDN list.
- Send via: send the contact via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Delete: delete the selected entry.
- **Print via Bluetooth**: print the contact information via a Bluetooth-compatible printer.

#### FDN list (Menu 2.2)

Use this menu to create a list of contacts to be used in FDN (Fixed Dialling Number) mode, in which the phone allows outgoing calls only to the specified phone numbers, if your SIM card supports this feature. You can activate FDN mode in the **FDN mode** menu.  $\blacktriangleright$  p. 86

## Adding a contact

- 1. From the FDN list, press <**Options**> and select **Add**.
- 2. Enter your PIN2 and press **<OK>**.
- 3. Enter information about the contact:
  - Name: assign a name.
  - Phone number: add a number.
  - Location: assign a location number.
- 4. Press <**Save**> to save the contact.

## Using contact options

You can access contact options by pressing **<Options>** in Contact list.

## Add new contact (Menu 2.3)

Use this menu to add a new contact to Phonebook.

## Storing a number in the phone's memory

- 1. Select Phone.
- 2. Change the settings or enter information about the contact:
  - First name/Last name: assign a name.

- **Mobile/Home/Office/Fax/Other**: add a number in any category.
- Email: assign an e-mail address.
- **Graphic ID**: assign a caller ID image to alert you to a call from the person.
- **Alert**: assign a ringtone to alert you to a call from the person.
  - The settings specified in **Graphic ID** and **Alert** are given priority over group settings.
- **Group**: assign the number to a caller group.
- **Notes**: add a memo about the person.
- 3. Press **<Save**> to save the contact.

## Storing a number on the SIM card

- 1. Select SIM.
- 2. Enter information about the contact:
  - Name: assign a name.
  - Phone number: add a number.
  - Location: assign a location number.
- To assign a caller ID image, ringtone, or group, the contact must be saved to the phone's memory.

3. Press <**Save**> to save the contact.

### Group (Menu 2.4)

Use this menu to organise your contacts in caller groups.

### Adding members to a caller group

- 1. Select a group.
- 2. Press < Add> and select the contact you want.
- 3. To add more contacts, press **<Options**>, and repeat step 3.

## Managing caller groups

While viewing the group list, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- View: access the members of the selected group.
- Add: add a new group.
- Edit: change the properties of the selected group.
- Send message: send an SMS, MMS, or e-mail message to the members you want.

• **Delete**: delete the selected group. Group members, however, will not be deleted from Phonebook.

### Speed dial (Menu 2.5)

Use this menu to assign speed dial numbers (2 to 9) for 8 of your most frequently called numbers.

## Assigning speed dial entries

- 1. Select a key location from **2** to **9**. Key **1** is reserved for your voice mail server.
- 2. Select a contact from the contact list.
- 3. Select a number.

## Managing speed dial entries

From the Speed dial screen, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- Add: assign a number to an unassigned key. You can select a contact from Phonebook or the FDN list.
- View: check the name and number assigned to a key.
- **Change**: assign a different number to a key.

• **Remove**: clear the speed dial setting for a day.

## **Dialling speed dial entries**

In Idle mode, press and hold the appropriate key.

## My name card (Menu 2.6)

Use this menu to create a name card and send it to other people.

## Saving your name card

The procedure for creating your name card is the same as the one for saving a number in the phone's memory.  $\blacktriangleright$  p. 34

## Using name card options

After saving your name card, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the name card.
- Send via: send the name card via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- **Exchange namecard**: exchange the name card with another person via Bluetooth.

- **Remove**: remove the name card information.
- **Print via Bluetooth**: print the name card information via a Bluetooth-compatible printer.

## **Own number** (Menu 2.7)

Use this feature to check your phone numbers, or to assign a name to each of the numbers. Changes made here do not affect the actual subscriber numbers on your SIM card.

### Management (Menu 2.8)

Use this menu to manage Phonebook.

- **Default saving**: select a default memory location for saving contacts. If you select **Ask on saving**, the phone will ask you to select a memory location each time you save a number.
- **Copy all to phone**: copy all of the contacts stored on the SIM card to the phone's memory.
- Sort by contacts: sort your contacts by the first name or last name.

- Delete all: delete all of the contacts from your phone's memory, your SIM card, or the FDN list.
- **Memory status**: display the number of contacts you have stored in Phonebook.

## Service number (Menu 2.9)

Use this menu to view the list of Service Dialling Numbers (SDN) assigned by your service provider, including emergency numbers and numbers for directory enquiries. This menu is available if your SIM card supports SDN.

- 1. Scroll to the number you want and press < View >.
- 2. Press <**Dial**> or [ ∽].

## Applications (Menu 3)

Use this menu to play Java games and play MP3 music files. You can also use convenient features, such as a voice recorder, alarm clock, calculator, convertor, timer, and stopwatch.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **Applications**.

### MP3 Player (Menu 3.1)

Use this menu to enjoy music. First, you need to save music files in your phone's memory. To enjoy high quality music, you can use an optional Bluetooth stereo headset.

 $\ensuremath{\fbox{MP3}}$  Normal headsets are not compatible with the MP3 player.

## Downloading or receiving music files

Use the following methods to save music files to your phone's memory:

• Download from the wireless web ▶ p. 45

- Download from a computer using the Samsung PC Studio programme ► Samsung PC Studio User's Guide
- Receive via Bluetooth ▶ p. 82
- Copy files to a memory card and insert the card into the phone.

## Creating a play list

Add the music files to the play list so you can play them.

- 1. From the MP3 player screen, press <Options> and select Add music from  $\rightarrow$  Phone or Memory card.
- 2. Press [ *i* ] to select the files you want and press <**Add**>.

## **Playing music files**

- 1. From the MP3 player screen, press <**Options**> and select **Play via**.
- 2. Select **Phone** to use the phone speaker.

Select **A/V headset** to use a Bluetooth stereo headset and then search for and connect to the headset.

During playback, use the following keys:

i	Pauses or resumes playback.
Up	Accesses the play list.
Left	Moves back to the previous file. Moves backward in a file when held down.
Right	Skips to the next file. Skips forward in a file when held down.
▲/▼	Adjusts the volume.

6	Sets the MP3 player to play tracks in random order.
Down	Stops playback.

### Using MP3 player options

From the MP3 player screen, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- Play via: select a sound output mode, Phone or A/V headset. If you selected A/V headset, you can use a Bluetooth stereo headset and then search for and connect to the headset.
  - ${\ensuremath{\overline{\mbox{V}}}}$  You can try a Bluetooth connection from the headset. To do this, the phone must be in Idle mode.
- **Pause**: pause playback (appears only if MP3 is playing).
- Transfer to A/V headset/Transfer to phone: switch the sound output to a Bluetooth stereo headset or the phone speaker.
- Send via: send the file via e-mail or Bluetooth.
- Open play list: access the play list.
- **Set as**: set the file as your ringtone, as a ringtone for a Phonebook entry, or alarm melody.
- **Remove from play list**: remove the selected file from the play list.

• **Settings**: change the default settings for playing music files.

Repeat mode: select a repeat mode.

**Shuffle**: set the MP3 player to play tracks in random order.

**Visualization**: change the playback animation. **Volume**: select a volume level.

• **Properties**: access the file properties.

## Accessing the play list

From the MP3 player screen, press [Up].

Press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Play via: select a sound output mode, Phone or A/V headset.
- Add music from: add files to the play list.
- **Move list**: move the selected file to the position you want within the play list.
- **Remove**: remove the selected file or all files from the play list.



### Voice recorder (Menu 3.2)

Use this menu to record voice memos. A voice memo can be up to one hour long.

### Recording a voice memo

- 1. Press [ *i* ] to start recording.
- 2. Speak into the microphone.

Press [  $\boldsymbol{i}$  ] to pause or resume the recording.

- 3. Press **<Save**> or [Down]. The voice memo is automatically saved.
- 4. Press [ *i*] to review the voice memo.

## Playing a voice memo

- From the Voice record screen, press <Options> and select Go to voice list.
- 2. Select a voice memo. The memo plays.

During playback, use the following keys:

### Using voice recorder options

From the voice recorder screen, press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Record: record a new voice memo.
- **Settings**: customise the default settings for the voice recorder.

**Recording time**: select a recording time.

Volume: select a volume level.

**Default name**: change the default prefix of file names.

• Go to voice list: access the voice memo list.

### Java world (Menu 3.3)

Use this menu to access the embedded Java games and downloaded Java applications.

## Accessing an application

- 1. From the Java word screen, select **Downloads**.
- Select an application and follow the onscreen instructions, the procedure may differ from game to game.

From the application list, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- Launch: launch the selected application.
- **Application settings**: select whether or not to continue a game when an event, such as incoming messages or alarms, occurs on the phone during the game. You can also select whether or not you exchange game information with the network while playing an on-line game or when you need to connect to the Internet.
- **Delete**: delete the application.
- Properties: access the application properties.

## **Changing Java settings**

You can change the settings for accessing Java services.

From the **Java world** menu, select **Settings**. Change the following settings:

- **APN**: enter the access point name.
- Login ID: enter the user ID.
- **Password**: enter the password.
- Proxy: select whether or not you use a proxy server to access network services. Depending on this setting, options in Proxy settings vary.
- **Proxy settings**: provide you with the following options:

When the proxy is set to **Enable**:

IP address: enter the HTTP proxy address.

**Port**: enter the port number.

When the proxy is set to **Disable**:

DNS1: enter the primary DNS address.

DNS2: enter the secondary DNS address.

## **Checking memory status**

You can view the amount of total and used memory for Java games.

From the Java world menu, select Memory status.

## World time (Menu 3.4)

Use this menu to set your local time zone and find out what time it is in another part of the world.

## Setting the local time zone

- From the world map, press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the city you want on the upper line (
  ). As the time line moves, the time and date of the given zone display.
- 2. Press [  $\boldsymbol{i}$  ] to save the city as your local time zone.

## Viewing world time

- 1. From the world map, move to the lower line ( $\checkmark$ ).
- Press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the city you want.
- 3. Press [ *i* ] to save the time zone.

## Applying daylight savings time

- From the world map, press <**Options**> and select Set daylight saving time.
- 2. Press [ *i* ] to select the time zones you want.
- 3. Press <**Save**>.

### Alarm (Menu 3.5)

Use this menu to set alarms. The alert type for a normal alarm corresponds to the call alert type settings. A wake up alarm is not affected by your sound settings.

## Setting an alarm

- 1. Select the type of alarm.
- 2. Select an alarm option.
  - Alarm: activate the alarm.
  - Alarm time: enter the time for the alarm to ring.
  - AM/PM: set AM or PM in 12-hour format.
  - Alarm day: check the days for the alarm.
  - Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.
- 3. Press <**Save**>.

### Stopping an alarm

- For an alarm, press any key.
- For a wake-up alarm, press <**OK**> or [*i*]. Press any key, except <**OK**> and [*i*], to cause it to sound again after 5 minutes. You can do this a maximum of 5 times.

# Setting the alarm to sound even if the phone is off

From the Alarm screen, select **Auto power**  $\rightarrow$  **On**.

If the phone is off when it is time for the alarm to sound, the phone switches on and sounds the alarm.

## Deactivating an alarm

- 1. Select the alarm you want to deactivate.
- 2. Select Off on the Alarm line.

## Calculator (Menu 3.6)

Use this menu to perform basic arithmetic functions such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

- 1. Enter the first number.
  - Press <.()> to insert a demical point or bracket.
  - Press [ \*] or [ #] to move the cursor.
- 2. Enter the operation for your calculation by pressing the Navigation keys.
- 3. Enter the second number.
- 4. Press [ *i*] to view the result.
- 5. If necessary, repeat from step 2 to continue the calculation.

## Convertor (Menu 3.7)

Use this menu for common conversions, such as currency and temperature.

## Performing a calculation

1. Select the convertor type you want.

- 2. Press [Left] or [Right] to select the original unit and press [Down].
- 3. Enter the value to be converted and press [Down].
  - Press [ \*] to insert a decimal point.
  - Press [ #] to change the temperature to above zero (+) or below zero (-).
- 4. Press [Left] or [Right] to select the unit to which you want to convert.

The equivalent value for the amount you entered displays.

## Using convertor options

Press <**Options**> to access the following options:

- Clear: clear the current value.
- **Reverse**: reverse the conversion.
- Currency rates: display the currency rate list.

### Timer (Menu 3.8)

Use this menu to set a period of time for the phone to count down. The phone will sound an alarm when the specified period of time has expired.

## Starting the timer

- 1. Press <**Set**>.
- Enter the length of time you want to count down and press <**OK**>.
- 3. Press [ *i* ] to start counting down.

## Stopping the timer

- Press any key to stop the timer when it rings.
- Press [ *i* ] on the Timer screen to stop the timer before it rings.

## Stopwatch (Menu 3.9)

Use this menu to measure elapsed time. The maximum time is 10 hours.

- 1. Press [ *i* ] to start the stopwatch.
- 2. Press [  $\boldsymbol{i}$  ] to check an interval. You can repeat this step for a total of 4 intervals.
- 3. To reset the stopwatch, press <**Reset**>.

## SIM-AT (Menu 3.10)

This menu is available if you use a SIM-AT card that supports SIM Application Tool kit menus and provides additional services, such as news, weather, sports, entertainment, and location services. Available services may vary, depending on your service provider's plans. For details, see your SIM card instructions or contact your service provider.

## Browser (Menu 4)

The Wireless Application Protocol (WAP) on your phone allows you to access the wireless web. Using the web browser, you can access up-to-date information and a wide variety of media content, such as wallpapers, ringtones, and music files. To access this menu, press **<Menu>** in Idle mode and select **Browser**.

### Home (Menu 4.1)

Use this menu to connect your phone to the network and load the homepage of the wireless web service provider. You can also press [i] in Idle mode.

- Bookmarks: switch to the Bookmarks menu.
- Messages: check the message stored in the My messages folder. You can also create and send a new SMS message. ▶ p. 52

• File manager: switch to the File manager menu. ▶ p. 63

## Exiting the browser

Press [ 🍙 ] to exit the browser.

## Bookmarks (Menu 4.2)

Use this menu to save URL addresses to quickly access a website.

## Adding a bookmark

- 1. Select an empty location.
- 2. Enter a name for the bookmark and press [Down].
- 3. Enter a URL address.
- 4. Press [ *i* ] to save the bookmark.

## Accessing a bookmarked page

Selecting a bookmark item launches the web browser and access the associated web page.

### Using bookmark options

After saving an item, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Go: access the website.
- Edit: edit the address and name of the bookmark.
- **Delete**: delete the selected bookmark or all bookmarks.

## Go to URL (Menu 4.3)

Use this menu to manually enter a URL address and access the associated website.

## Clear cache (Menu 4.4)

Use this menu to clear the cache, which is the temporary memory that stores the web pages you have recently accessed.

## Profile settings (Menu 4.5)

Use this menu to set up servers for the web browser. Contact your service provider for details about your settings options. For each server, the following options are available:

- Profile name: assign a name to the server profile.
- **Home URL**: enter the address of your homepage.
- **Bearer**: select a bearer for each type of network address accessed.
- **Proxy**: select whether or not the phone uses a proxy server to launch the web browser. Your service provider can tell you if your network requires a proxy server, and they can give you the appropriate settings.
- **GPRS settings**: customise the GPRS network settings:

When the proxy is set to **Enable**:

**Proxy IP**: enter the web gateway address.

Proxy port: enter the port number.

**APN**: enter the access point name of the GPRS network gateway.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

Password: enter the password.

When the proxy is set to **Disable**:

**DNS1**: enter the primary address.



DNS2: enter the secondary address.

**APN**: enter the access point name of the GPRS network gateway.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

Password: enter the password.

• **GSM settings**: customise the following GSM network settings:

When the proxy is set to **Enable**:

**Proxy IP**: enter the web gateway address.

Proxy port: enter the port number.

Dial number: enter the PPP server phone number.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

Password: enter the password.

Data call type: select a data call type.

When the proxy is set to Disable:

**DNS1**: enter the primary address.

**DNS2**: enter the secondary address.

**Dial number**: enter the PPP server phone number.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

**Password**: enter the password. **Data call type**: select a data call type.

### Current profile (Menu 4.6)

Use this menu to activate one of the proxy servers you have set up.

## Messages (Menu 5)

Use the **Messages** menu to send and receive short messages, multimedia messages, and e-mails. You can also use push message, cell broadcast message, and SOS message features.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **Messages**.

### Create new message (Menu 5.1)

Use this menu to create and send text messages, multimedia messages, or e-mails.

### Text message (Menu 5.1.1)

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send or receive text messages including pictures, audio clips, and animated images.

1. Enter your message.

```
The maximum number of characters allowed in a short message varies by service provider. If your message exceeds the maximum number of characters, the phone will split the message.
```

- Press < Options > to access the following options for creating a message:
  - **Insert**: add a template, Phonebook entry, or bookmark.
  - Add picture/Add animation/Add melody: attach a simple image, animated image, or a melody.
  - Attach: add a name card or calendar data as data format attachments.
  - Save to: save the message in another folder.
  - Language select: change the language used in T9 input mode.
  - **Text style**: change the text attributes.
- 3. When you have finished, press **<Options>** and select **Send only** or **Save and send**.
- 4. Enter a destination number.

To send the message to more than one recipient, fill in the destination fields.

5. Press [ *i* ] to send the message.

### Multimedia message (Menu 5.1.2)

Multimedia Message Service (MMS) delivers messages containing a combination of text, image, video, and audio, from phone to phone or from phone to e-mail.

- 1. Select the **Subject** line.

- **Insert**: add a template, Phonebook entry, or bookmark.
- Save to: save the message in another folder.
- Text style: change the text attributes.
- Language select: change the language used in T9 input mode.

- 6. When you have finished, press [  $\boldsymbol{i}$  ].
- After adding items, press < Options > to access the following options for editing the message:
  - **Edit**: edit the subject or text of your message.
  - **Preview**: view the message as it will be shown on the recipient's phone.
  - Save to: save the message in another folder.
  - Change image/Change video/Change sound: replace the added image, video clip, or audio to another one.
  - Add page: add pages. Move to each page by pressing [Left] or [Right].
  - **Delete page**: delete the added page.
  - **Edit page**: set the page duration or move the current page to the previous page.
  - Attach: attach name cards or calender data as a data format attachment.
  - Remove subject/Remove media/Remove sound/Remove message: remove an added item.
- 8. When you have finished, press **<Options>** and select **Send**.

9. Enter a phone number or e-mail address.

To send the message to more than one recipient, fill in additional destination fields.

10. Press [ *i* ] to send the message.

### Email (Menu 5.1.3)

You can send and receive e-mails that include text, audio, and images. To use this feature, you need to subscribe to an e-mail service and set up your e-mail account and profile.  $\blacktriangleright$  p. 61

- 1. Select the **Subject** line.
- 2. Enter the subject of your e-mail and press [ *i*].
- 3. Select the Message line.
- 4. Enter the e-mail text.

Press <**Options**> to access the following options:

- **Insert**: add a template, Phonebook entry, or bookmark.
- Save to: save the e-mail in another folder.
- 5. When you have finished, press [ *i*].

- Select the File attach line and select one of the following options to add files:
  - Add image/Add videos/Add sounds/Add music: add items stored in the phone's memory.
  - Other files: add document files stored in the Other files folder.
  - Memory card: add files stored on a memory card.
  - Attach: attach name cards or calender data as data format attachments.
- After adding items, press < Options > to access the following options to edit the e-mail:
  - Edit: edit the subject or text.
  - Remove subject/Remove message: clear the subject or text.
  - Remove: delete the selected attachment or all attachments.
  - **Remove all attachments**: delete all attachments.
- 8. When you have finished, press <**Options**> and select **Send**.

- 9. Enter an e-mail address.
  - To send the e-mail to more than one recipient, fill in additional destination fields.

## My messages (Menu 5.2)

Use this menu to access messages you have received, sent, or which have failed in sending.

### Inbox (Menu 5.2.1)

This folder stores all of the messages you have received, except for e-mails.

The following icons may appear on the message list to show the message type:

- MMS notifications
- Push messages

A ! icon next to a message means that the message is of high priority. A grey-coloured message icon indicates low priority.

## Using message options

While viewing a message, press **<Options>** to access the following options:

### SMS messages

- **Reply via**: reply to the sender via SMS or MMS.
- **Forward**: forward the message to other people.
- **Delete**: delete the message.
- Move to phone/Move to SIM: move the message between the SIM card and the phone's memory.
- Add to block list: add the sender's number to the Block list.
- **Cut address**: extract URLs, e-mail addresses, or phone numbers from the message.
- **Protection**: protect the message from being deleted.

### Draft (Menu 5.2.2)

This folder stores messages you have saved to send at a later time.

When you select an SMS or e-mail message, it opens in Edit mode so that you can edit and/or send the message.

When you select an MMS message, it opens in Preview mode as would a message from the Inbox. To edit the MMS message, press <**Options**> and select **Edit**.



### Outbox (Menu 5.2.3)

This folder stores messages that the phone is attempting to send or has failed to send.

While viewing a message, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Send again: retry sending the message.
- **Forward**: forward the message to other people.
- **Delete**: delete the message.
- Move to phone/Move to SIM: move the message between the SIM card and the phone's memory.
- **Protection**: protect the message from being deleted.
- **Print via Bluetooth**: print the message via a Bluetooth-compatible printer.
- **Properties**: access the message properties.

### Sentbox (Menu 5.2.4)

This folder stores messages that you have sent successfully.

While viewing a message, press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- **Forward**: forward the message to other people.
- **Delete**: delete the selected message.
- Move to phone/Move to SIM: move the message between the SIM card and the phone's memory.
- **Protection**: protect the message from being deleted.
- **Print via Bluetooth**: print the message via a Bluetooth-compatible printer.
- **Properties**: access the message properties.

### Email box (Menu 5.2.5)

This folder stores e-mails that you have received.

### Viewing an e-mail

 Press <Select> when Check new mail highlights. The phone checks the e-mail server and downloads new e-mails.

The following icons may appear on the list to show the e-mail status:

- 🎽 Retrieved from the server
- 🍗 Being retrieved
- X Failed to retrieve

A ! icon next to a message means that the message is of high priority. A grey-coloured message icon indicates low priority.

- 2. Select an e-mail or header.
- Press [▲/▼] to view other pages in the e-mail. Press and hold [▲/▼] to move to the first or last page in the e-mail.
- 4. Press [\*] or [#] to view the next or previous e-mail.

## Using e-mail options

While viewing the e-mail or header, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- **Retrieve**: retrieve the body of the e-mail from the e-mail server.
- **Open file**: open the selected file.
- Save file: save the selected file.
- **Reply to:** send a reply to the sender or all recipients.
- Forward: forward the e-mail to other people.
- **Delete**: delete the e-mail from the phone's memory or from both the phone's memory and the e-mail server.
- Add to block list: add the sender's e-mail address or subjects to the Block list.
- **Cut address**: extract URLs, e-mail addresses, and phone numbers.
- Cut attachment: save the selected attachment or all attachments from the e-mail to your phone's memory.

## My folder (Menu 5.2.6)

Use this menu to view the messages you have moved to this folder using the **Move to my folder** option while viewing a message list.

## Templates (Menu 5.3)

Use this menu to make and use templates of frequently used messages or passages.

## Text template (Menu 5.3.1)

You can create SMS templates with the sentences you use frequently so that you can retrieve and insert them when composing an SMS message.

## Creating a template

- 1. Select an empty location.
- 2. Enter a message and press [ *i* ].

### Using template options

From the text template list, press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the template.
- Send message: create and send a new message.
- **Delete**: delete the selected template.

### MMS template (Menu 5.3.2)

When you access this menu, you can view the list of templates.

### Creating a template

- 1. Press **<Options**> and select **Add new**.
- 2. Create a template as you would when creating an MMS message.
- 3. Press <Options> and select Save to  $\rightarrow$  Templates.

## Using templates options

From the template list, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- View: open the selected template.
- Send message: create and send a new message.

- Edit: edit the selected template.
- Add new: add a new template.
- **Delete**: delete the selected template or all templates. You cannot delete the embedded templates.

### Delete all (Menu 5.4)

Use this menu to delete all messages in each message type at once.

- 1. Press [ *i* ] to select the message folders you want.
- 2. Press < Delete>.
- 3. Press < Yes> to confirm the deletion.

### Settings (Menu 5.5)

Use this menu to set up various options for using the messaging service.

### Text message (Menu 5.5.1)

You can configure SMS settings.

• Send settings: set up the options for sending SMS messages:

**Reply path**: allow recipients to reply to you through your SMS server.

**Delivery report**: set the network to inform you when messages have been delivered.

**Validity period**: set the length of time your messages are stored in the SMS server.

**Message type**: set the default message type. The network can convert messages into the selected format.

**Service centre**: store or change the number of SMS server.

 Block number: set the Blocked number list to reject SMS messages from specific phone numbers.

### Multimedia message (Menu 5.5.2)

You can configure MMS settings.

• Send settings: set up the options for sending MMS messages:

**Delivery report**: set the network to inform you when messages have been delivered.

**Address hiding**: set your address to be hidden from the recipient's phone.

**Read reply**: send a read-reply request along with your messages.

Priority: set the priority level of your messages.

**Expiry date**: set the length of time your messages are stored in the MMS server.

**Delivery after**: set a time delay before messages are sent.

**Send size**: select a maximum size of attached items allowed for messages.

• **Receive settings**: set up the options for receiving MMS messages:

**Anonymous reject**: reject messages from unknown senders.

Advert allowed: accept advertisements.

**Report allowed**: set the network to inform the sender when a message has been delivered to you.

**Home reception**: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are in your home service area.

**Roaming reception**: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are roaming on another network.

Reception within your home network or while roaming has the following options:

- **Automatic**: the phone automatically retrieves messages from the server.
- **Reject**: the phone rejects all messages.
- **Manual**: the phone displays notifications. Use the **Retrieve** option to manually download new messages.
- **MMS profiles**: configure required network settings for MMS.

Current profile: select a profile.

**Profile settings**: customise the options for each profile:

- **Profile name**: assign a name to the MMS profile.

- Server URL: enter the address of your MMS server.
- **Proxy**: connect to the GPRS network using the proxy server.
- **GPRS settings**: customise the settings required for connecting to the GPRS network.

when the proxy is set to **Enable**:

**IP address**: enter the gateway address.

**Port**: enter the port number.

**APN**: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

Password: enter the password.

when the proxy is set to **Disable**:

**DNS1**: enter the primary address.

**DNS2**: enter the secondary address.

**APN**: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

Password: enter the password.

- Version: select an available OMA version and maximum size limit for sending or receiving messages.
  - Depending on your service provider, it may not be possible to support the maximum limit 295KB. In this case, try again after changing the setting to 100KB.
- Block number: set the Blocked number list to reject MMS messages from specific phone numbers.

### Email (Menu 5.5.3)

You can configure e-mails settings.

 $\checkmark$ 

You cannot change e-mail account and profile settings while an e-mail is being sent or retrieved.

• Send settings: set up the options for sending e-mails:

**Send copy to self**: send a copy of your e-mail to your e-mail account.

**Delivery confirm**: set the network to inform you when e-mails have been delivered.

**Read confirm**: send a request for a reply along with your e-mail.

**Priority**: select the priority level of your e-mail.

**Include signature**: attach your name, phone number, or a simple memo to e-mails.

Edit name: edit the name in your signature.

**Edit telephone number**: edit the phone number in your signature.

Edit note: edit the tag line in your signature.

• **Receive settings**: set up the options for receiving e-mails:

**Check interval**: determine how often the phone checks the server for incoming e-mails.

If you select **Not used**, you can use the Check new mail feature to check your e-mail manually.

**Read reply**: determine whether or not the phone sends a read-reply when an incoming e-mail has been read.

If you select **Announce**, the phone asks you to send a read-reply.

**Retrieve option**: set whether the phone downloads e-mail headers only or e-mail headers and bodies both.

**Delete option**: determine whether e-mails are deleted immediately or the next time you connect to the server.

**Reject if over**: determine the maximum size for incoming e-mails. Your phone will reject e-mails that exceed the specified size.

Leave a copy of messages on the server: leave the copies of e-mails in the server after retrieving.

• **Email account**: set up your e-mail accounts and select the one to be used:

Current account: select an account.

**Account settings**: set up an e-mail account. The options are available for each account:

- **In use**: select this option to use the account and to display the account in **Email box**.
- Account name: enter a name for the currently selected account.

- **User name**: enter a name to be displayed as the sender's name in your outgoing e-mails.
- Email address: enter your e-mail address.
- **Reply address**: enter your e-mil address to be used when the recipient sends a reply.
- User ID: enter your e-mail ID.
- Password: enter your e-mail password.
- **SMTP server**: enter the IP address or host name of the outgoing e-mail server.
- SMTP port: enter the SMTP port number.
- **Protocol type**: select the protocol for the incoming e-mail server. The remaining options depend on the protocol type setting.
- **POP3 server/IMAP4 server**: enter the IP address or host name of POP3 or IMAP4 server.
- **POP3 port/IMAP4 port**: enter the POP3 or IMAP4 port number.
- **APOP login**: connect to the server by using the APOP login scheme when this option is selected.
- **Include attachments**: select this option to receive attachments with e-mails.

- Max. Emails retrieved: set the number of headers you will retrieve from the server.
- **Secure connection**: use a secure connections for e-mail service.
- **Email profile**: configure the network settings required to send or receive e-mails.

Current profile: select a profile.

**Profile settings**: set up an e-mail profile. The following options are available for each profile:

- **Profile name**: enter a name for the e-mail profile.
- **APN**: enter the access point name used for the GPRS network address.
- Login ID: enter the user ID.
- Password: enter the password.
- DNS1: enter the primary address.
- DNS2: enter the secondary address.
- Block list: specify e-mail addresses or subjects you want to reject.

### Push message (Menu 5.5.4)

You can determine whether or not your phone retrieves push messages.

## SOS message (Menu 5.6)

In an emergency, you can send SOS messages to your family or friends for help. You can also receive SOS messages from other people who are in an emergency. Use this menu to specify options for sending and receiving SOS messages.

 Message sending: activate or deactivate the SOS message feature. To send an SOS message, press
 [▲/▼] 4 times in Idle mode, with the phone closed.

✓ While the phone is attempting to send an SOS message, the icon turns to red and you cannot access menu functions. When the icon turns to blue, use the phone as normal.

- **Recipients**: specify the phone numbers to which you want to send SOS messages.
- **Repeat sending**: set the number of times the phone repeats sending SOS messages.

- **Incoming SOS alert**: set whether or not the phone uses the preset alert type (siren and alert message) for incoming SOS messages. If you select **No**, the phone uses the message ringer setting.
- Text: check the preset SOS message text.
- You can view the onscreen help by pressing **<Options**> and selecting **Help**.

### Broadcast messages (Menu 5.7)

The cell broadcast service delivers short messages on various topics such as the weather or traffic.

Use this menu to change the settings for the service and to access broadcast messages.

• Read: open received messages.

The **Temporary** box saves network messages until the phone is switched off.

The **Archive** box saves network messages indefinitely. Press **<Options>** and select **Save** when a text notification appears to save to the **Archive** box.

- **Receive**: enable or disable the reception of broadcast messages.
- **Channel**: specify the channels from which you receive broadcast messages.
- **Language**: select the languages in which broadcast messages display.

Please contact your service provider for details.

### Memory status (Menu 5.8)

Use this menu to view the memory status for text, multimedia, e-mail, or push messages.

You can also access a message box by selecting it from this menu.

## File manager (Menu 6)

The **File manager** menu allows you to access images, videos, voice memos, music files, sounds, and other files stored in the phone's memory or on a memory card.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **File manager**.



According to the DRM (Digital Rights Management) system, web content may not be able to be forwarded.

## Images (Menu 6.1)

This menu displays photos you have taken and images you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

## Viewing an image

- 1. Select an image folder.
- 2. Select an image.

### Viewing a slide show

You can view images as a slide show, a sequential presentation of each image in the current folder.

- 1. Select Photos.
- 2. Press <**Options**> and select **Slide show**.
- 3. Select an interval option.

The slide show begins.

4. Press <**Cancel**> to stop the slide show.

## Using image options

While viewing an image, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- List: return to the image list.
- Send via: send the file via MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- Set as: set the file as your wallpaper or as a caller ID image for a Phonebook entry.
- **Edit**: add an emoticon or decorative frame or apply a special effect to the photo.
- Move to: move the file to another folder.

- Copy to memory card: copy the selected file to a memory card.
- Delete: delete the selected file.
- **Rename**: change the file name.
- Slide show: view all images as a slide show.
- Share for Bluetooth: share the selected file with other Bluetooth devices.
- **Print via**: print the file by connecting the phone to a printer via Bluetooth or USB.
- **Protection**: protect the file from being deleted.
- **Properties**: access the file properties.

## Videos (Menu 6.2)

This menu displays video clips you have recorded, downloaded, or received in messages, or imported from your computer.

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Video clips recorded on other devices, such as camcorders, may not play correctly.

### Playing a video clip

- 1. Select a video folder.
- 2. Select a video clip.

From a player screen, use the following keys:

- Protection: protect the file from being deleted.
- **Properties**: access the file properties.

## Music (Menu 6.3)

This menu displays MP3 music files you have downloaded, or received in messages, or imported from your computer.

- 1. Select a sound folder.
- 2. Select a file. The MP3 player opens. ► p. 38



## Sounds (Menu 6.4)

This menu displays the voice memos you have recorded, and sound files you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

## Playing a sound clip

- 1. Select a sound folder.
- 2. Select a sound clip. For a voice memo, see **Voice** recorder. ▶ p. 40

From a sound screen, press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- Play: play the selected file.
- Send via: send the selected file via MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- **Set as**: set the file as your ringtone, as a ringtone for a Phonebook entry, or as a alarm melody.
- Move to: move the file to another folder.
- Copy to memory card: copy the file to a memory card.
- **Delete**: delete the file.

- **Rename**: change the name of the file.
- Share for Bluetooth: share the selected file or all files with other Bluetooth devices.
- **Protection**: protect the file from being deleted.
- **Properties**: access the file properties.

### Other files (Menu 6.5)

Files that you have received but which are not supported by your phone are stored in this folder. You cannot open these files on the phone. Unsupported file formats include \*.doc, \*ppt, and \*.txt.

## Memory card (Menu 6.6)

Use this menu to access the files stored on a memory card. This menu is shown only when a memory card is inserted into the phone.

## Memory status (Menu 6.7)

You can check the total amount of memory for media items and the amount of memory currently in use in each media box.

## Calendar (Menu 7)

The Calendar feature enables you to keep track of your schedule.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **Calendar**.

## Consulting the calendar

When you access the **Calendar** menu, the calendar in Month view appears with today's date highlighted.

## Selecting a day

- Press [Left] or [Right] to move by day.
- Press [Up] or [Down] to move by week.
- Press [▲/▼] to move by month.

## Using calendar options

Press **<Options>** to access the following options:

- View mode: change the view mode of the calendar. ▶ p. 69
- Create: add a new item.

- Go to: go to the current date or a specific date.
- Sort by: sort items by type of item.
- **Delete**: delete items using various deleting options.
- **Missed alarm events**: access items whose alarms you have missed.
- **Memory status**: access the memory information for the items stored on the calendar.

## **Creating an item**

You can store scheduled events, anniversaries, and To do items on the calendar. More than one item per day can be stored.

### Entering a new scheduled item

- 1. Select a date on the calendar.
- 2. Press <Options> and select Create  $\rightarrow$  Schedule or Miscellaneous.
- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - **Subject**: enter a title for the item.
  - **Details**: enter item details.

- **Location**: (for **Schedule**) enter information about the location of the item.
- Alarm: select to set an alarm for the item.
- **before**: set how long before the item the alarm is to alert you.
- Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.
- **Repeat**: (for **Schedule**) select to set the item to recur.
- **until**: (for **Schedule**) select a repeat unit and set the date to end repeating.
- 4. Press **<Save**> to save the item.

## Entering a new anniversary

1. Select a date on the calendar.

- 2. Press **<Options>** and select **Create**  $\rightarrow$  **Anniversary**.
- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - **Occasion**: enter information about the anniversary.
  - Date: enter the date.
  - Alarm: select to set an alarm for the anniversary.
  - **before**: set how long before the anniversary the alarm is to alert you.
  - Alarm time: enter the time for the alarm to ring.
  - **AM/PM**: select **AM** or **PM** in 12-hour time format.
  - Alarm tone: select an alarm tone.
  - **Repeat every year**: set the phone to remind you of the anniversary every year.
- 4. Press **<Save**> to save the item.

## Entering a To do item

- 1. Select a date on the calendar.
- 2. Press **<Options>** and select **Create**  $\rightarrow$  **To do**.

- 3. Enter information or change the settings:
  - To do: enter information about the task.
  - Start date: enter the starting date.
  - Due date: enter the ending date.
  - **Priority**: select a priority level.
- 4. Press <**Save**> to save the task.

Once you have scheduled things, the item icons and the number of items for a specific day appears at the bottom of the calendar.

- Send via: send the item via SMS, MMS, e-mail, or Bluetooth.
- View mode: change the view mode of the calendar.
- **Done/Undone**: change the status of the to-do item.
- Delete: delete the item.
- **Print via Bluetooth**: print the item via a Bluetooth-compatible printer.

## Viewing an item in a different mode

You can change the calendar display to Day view or Week view, press <0ptions> and select View mode  $\rightarrow$  a view mode.

# Camera (Menu 8)

You can use the camera module embedded in your phone to take photos and record videos.

To access this menu, press <**Menu**> in Idle mode and select **Camera**, or press and hold [1].

- Do not take photos of people without their
  - permission.Do not take photos in a place where cameras are not
  - Do not take photos in a place where cameras are not allowed.
  - Do not take photos in a place where you may interfere with another person's privacy.

# Taking a photo

The camera produces JPEG photos.

- When you take a photo in direct sunlight or in bright
- conditions, shadows may appear on the photo.
- 1. Access the **Camera** menu or press and hold [1] to turn on the camera.

**ISO**: change the ISO setting, which controls the sensitivity of your camera. For low light situations, select a higher ISO number. The higher the ISO number, the faster the camera shutter functions and the more sensitive the camera is to light.

# Time & Date (Menu 9.1)

Use this menu to set the current time and date on your phone. Before setting the time and date, specify your time zone in the **World time** menu.  $\blacktriangleright$  p. 42

- Set time: enter the current time.
- AM/PM: select AM or PM in 12-hour time format.
- Time format: select the time format.
- Set date: enter the current date.
- Date format: select the date format.

# Phone settings (Menu 9.2)

Many different features of your phone's system can be customised to suit your preferences.

# Language (Menu 9.2.1)

Use this menu to select one of several languages for the display text.

# Greeting message (Menu 9.2.2)

Use this menu to enter the greeting that is displayed briefly when the phone is switched on.

# Slide settings (Menu 9.2.3)

Use this menu to set how the phone reacts when you open it for an incoming call, and when you close it while using a function.

- **Up**: set whether or not to answer a call by opening the phone.
- **Down**: set whether or not the phone maintains the menu you are using when you close the phone.
  - When you set **Down** to **Continue operation**, the keypad lock works only in Idle mode.

## Short cut (Menu 9.2.4)

You can use the Navigation keys as shortcuts to access specific menus directly from Idle mode. Use this menu to a shortcut to a key.

### Assigning a shortcut to a key

- 1. Select the key to be used as a shortcut key.
- 2. Select the menu that will be assigned to the key.

# Using shortcut options

Press **<Options>** to access the following options:

# Extra settings (Menu 9.2.7)

You can turn the automatic redialing or answering features on or off.

- Auto redial: set the phone to make up to ten attempts to redial a phone number after an unsuccessful call.
- Voice clarity: remove extraneous noise and increase call quality so that the person with whom you are speaking can hear you clearly even if you are in a noisy place.



# Display settings (Menu 9.3)

Use this menu to change settings for the display.

Wallpaper (Menu 9.3.1)

You can change the background image that is displayed in Idle mode.

# Text display (Menu 9.3.2)

You can change the display settings for the text displayed on the idle screen.

- Text position: select a position. If you do not want text to display in Idle mode, select Off.
- Text style: select a font style.
- Text colour: select a font colour.

# Calendar (Menu 9.3.3)

Use this menu to display the calendar of the current month on the idle screen.

Skin (Menu 9.3.4)

You can select a skin colour pattern for Menu mode.

# LCD brightness (Menu 9.3.5)

You can adjust the brightness of the display for varying lighting conditions.

# Dialling display (Menu 9.3.6)

Use this menu to select a font colour and size for the numbers entered and the background colour of the display while dialling.

# Show caller information (Menu 9.3.7)

Use this menu to set the phone to display missed call notifications with the most recently missed caller's information.

# Sound settings (Menu 9.4)

Use this menu to customise various sound settings.

# Incoming call (Menu 9.4.1)

Use this menu to select a volume level and alert type for incoming calls.

- Ring tone: select a ringtone for the call ringer.
- Volume: select a ringer volume.

• Alert type: specify how you are to be informed of incoming calls.

### Keypad tone (Menu 9.4.2)

Use this menu to select the tone that the phone sounds when you press a key.



You can adjust the keypad tone volume using  $[ \blacktriangle / \checkmark ]$  in Idle mode.

# Message tone (Menu 9.4.3)

Use this menu to set up the ringtone for incoming messages.

- **Tone**: select one of several message tones.
- Alert type: specify how you are informed when a message comes in.
- **Repetition**: specify how often the phone informs you of a new message.

# Power on/off (Menu 9.4.4)

Use this menu to select the melody that the phone sounds when it is switched on or off.

# Slide tone (Menu 9.4.5)

Use this menu to select the tone that the phone sounds when you open or close the phone.

# Quiet mode (Menu 9.4.6)

Use this menu to set how the phone acts to alert you to a specific event in Quiet mode.

# Extra tones (Menu 9.4.7)

Use this menu to customise additional tones for the phone.

- **Minute minder**: set the phone to beep every minute during an outgoing call to keep you informed of the length of your call.
- **Connection tone**: set the phone to beep when an outgoing call is connected to the system.
- Alerts on call: set the phone to beep when you receive a new message or when the time for an alarm comes during a call.
- **Indicative tones**: set the phone to beep when a pop-up window displays.



# Light settings (Menu 9.5)

Use this menu to change settings for the light.

Backlight (Menu 9.5.1)

You can select the length of time the backlight or display stays on.

- **On**: select the length of time the backlight stays on.
- **Dim**: select the length of time the display stays on in Dim mode after the backlight turns off. After a specified time, the display turns off.

# Keypad light (Menu 9.5.2)

You can set how the phone controls the use of the keypad light.

- Use at any time: the keypad light is always used.
- **Use at nighttime**: the keypad light is used only between 5:00 PM and 9:00 AM.
- **Use at custom time**: specify the time period that the keypad light is used.

# Network services (Menu 9.6)

Use this menu to access network services. Please contact your service provider to check their availability and subscribe to them, if you wish.

# Call diverting (Menu 9.6.1)

This network service reroutes incoming calls to a phone number that you specify.

- 1. Select a call diverting option:
  - Divert always: divert calls.
  - **Busy**: divert calls when you are on another call.
  - **No reply**: divert calls when you do not answer the phone.
  - **Unreachable**: divert calls when you are not in an area covered by your service provider or when your phone is switched off.
  - Cancel all: cancel all call diverting options.
- 2. Select the type of calls to be diverted.
- 3. Select Activate. To deactivate call diverting, select Deactivate.

- 4. Move to the Divert to line.
- Enter the number to which calls are to be diverted and press <**Select**>.
- If you selected **No reply**, move to the **Seconds** (sec) line and select the length of time the network delays before diverting a call.

### Call barring (Menu 9.6.2)

This network service allows you to restrict your calls.

- 1. Select a call barring option:
  - All outgoing: prohibit outgoing calls.
  - International: prohibit international calls.
  - International except home: only allow calls to numbers within the current country when you are abroad, and to your home country.
  - All incoming: prohibit incoming calls.
  - **Incoming while abroad**: prohibit incoming calls when you use your phone outside of your home service area.
  - **Cancel all**: cancel all call barring settings, allowing to be sent and received normally.

- Change barring password: change the call barring password obtained from your service provider.
- 2. Select the type of calls to be barred.
- 3. Select Activate. To deactivate call barring, select Deactivate.
- 4. Enter the call barring password supplied by your service provider and press **<Select**>.

# Call waiting (Menu 9.6.3)

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you while you are on another call.

- 1. Select the type of calls to which the call waiting option will apply.
- 2. Select Activate. To deactivate call waiting, select Deactivate.

# Network selection (Menu 9.6.4)

This network service allows you to manually select the network to be used while roaming outside of your home area, or to let the network be chosen automatically.

# Menu functions

You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

# Caller ID (Menu 9.6.5)

This network service allows you to prevent your phone number from being displayed on the phone of the person being called. If you select **Default**, the phone will use the default setting provided by the network.

# Voice mail server (Menu 9.6.6)

Use this menu to store the number of the voice mail server and access your voice mails.



Your service provider can give you the voice mail server number.

- Connect to voice mail: connect to the voice mail server to allow you to listen to your messages.
- Voice server number: enter the voice mail server number.

# Band selection (Menu 9.6.7)

For the phone to make and receive phone calls, it must register with an available network.

Your phone can handle any of the following types of networks: GSM 1900, Combined GSM 900/1800, and GSM 900/1800/1900.

The country where you purchased your phone determines the default band that it uses. When you travel abroad, you must remember to change to an appropriate band.

# Bluetooth (Menu 9.7)

Using Bluetooth wireless, you can connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices and exchange data with them, talk hands-free, or control the phone remotely.

Bluetooth technology allows free wireless connections between all Bluetooth-compliant devices within a range of 10 metres. Since the devices communicate using radio waves, they do not need to be in line of sight to each other.

- ✓ If there are obstacles between the devices, the maximum operating distance may be reduced.
  - It is recommended that you cannot use the Bluetooth feature while using multimedia features such as voice recorder, camera, and MP3 player, or vice versa, for better performance.
  - Some devices may not be compatible with your phone.

# Setting up the Bluetooth feature

The **Bluetooth** menu provides the following options:

- Activation: activate or deactivate the Bluetooth feature.
- **My devices**: search for connectable Bluetooth devices.
- **My phone's visibility**: allow other Bluetooth devices to connect to your phone.
- My phone's name: assign a Bluetooth device name to your phone, which is then displayed on other devices.
- Secure mode: determine if the phone asks for your confirmation when other devices access your data.

Bluetooth services: display available Bluetooth services.

# Searching for and pairing with a Bluetooth device

1. From the Bluetooth setting options, select My devices.

### 2. Select Search new device.

After searching, a list of devices to which you can connect displays. The following icons indicate the kind of device:

- Enter a Bluetooth PIN and press <**OK**>. This code is used just once and you don't need to memorise it. When the owner of the other device enters the same code, pairing is finished.

Some devices, especially headsets or hands-free car kits, may have a fixed Bluetooth PIN, such as **0000**. If the other device has one, you must enter the code.

# Using device options

From the device list, press **<Options**> to access the following options:

- **Connect**: connect to the headset or hands free car kit.
- **Disconnect**: end the connection with the connected device.
- **Browse files**: search for data from the device and import data directly to your phone.
- **Service list**: access the Bluetooth service list of the device.
- Rename: rename the paired device.

- Authorize device/Unauthorize device: determine if the phone asks you to permit connection when other devices try to connect to your phone.
- Delete: delete the selected device or all devices.

# Sending data via Bluetooth

- 1. Activate the Bluetooth feature.
- 2. Select the application in which the item you want to send is stored.
- 3. Scroll to the item you want and press <**Options**>.
- 4. Select **Send via**  $\rightarrow$  **Bluetooth**.

The phone searches for devices within range and displays a list of available devices.

- 5. Select a device.
- 6. If necessary, enter the Bluetooth PIN needed for pairing and press <**OK**>.

# **Receiving data via Bluetooth**

To receive data via Bluetooth, your phone's Bluetooth feature must be active.

If an unauthorised Bluetooth device sends data to your phone, the phone displays a confirmation message. To receive data, press **<Yes>**.

### Security (Menu 9.8)

Use this menu to protect the phone against unauthorised use by managing the several access codes of your phone and SIM card.

☑ If you enter an incorrect PIN/PIN2 three times in succession, the SIM card is blocked. To unblock it, you need to enter your PUK/PUK2 (Personal Unblocking Key). The codes are supplied by your network operator.

# PIN check (Menu 9.8.1)

The 4- to 8-digit PIN (Personal Identification Number) protects your SIM card against unauthorised use. When this feature is enabled, the phone requires your PIN each time it is switched on.

## Change PIN (Menu 9.8.2)

Use this menu to change your PIN. The PIN check feature must be enabled to use this feature.

# Phone lock (Menu 9.8.3)

The Phone lock feature locks the phone from unauthorised use.

When this feature is enabled, you must enter a 4- to 8-digit phone password each time the phone is switched on.

The password is preset to **00000000**. To change the password, use the **Change password** menu.

# Change password (Menu 9.8.4)

Use this menu to change your phone password.

# Privacy (Menu 9.8.5)

Use this menu to lock your media contents, including messages, media files, and document files.

- 1. Press [ *i*] to check the items to lock.
- 2. Press <**Save**> to lock the marked items.
- 3. Enter the phone password and press **<OK>**.

To access a locked item, you need to enter the phone password.

Menu functions

# SIM lock (Menu 9.8.6)

The SIM lock feature allows your phone to work only with the current SIM by assigning a SIM lock code. You must enter the SIM lock code to use a different SIM card.

# FDN mode (Menu 9.8.7)

If supported by your SIM card, Fixed Dialling Number (FDN) mode restricts your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers. When this feature is enabled, you can make calls only to phone numbers stored on the SIM card.

# Change PIN2 (Menu 9.8.8)

If supported by your SIM card, the Change PIN2 feature changes your current PIN2.

# Memory status (Menu 9.9)

Use this menu to check the amount of memory being used for storing data in **Shared memory**, **Messages**, **File manager**, **Calendar**, **Phonebook**, and **JAVA world**.

# Reset settings (Menu 9.10)

Use this menu to reset the phone settings, display settings, and sound settings individually.

- 1. Press [  $\boldsymbol{i}$  ] to check the setting categories to be reset.
- 2. Press <**Reset**> to reset the marked items and then <**Yes**>.
- 3. Enter the phone password and press <**OK**>.

 $\fbox$  The password is preset to **00000000**. You can change this password  $\blacktriangleright$  p. 85

# Solve problems

## Help and personal needs

To save the time and expense of an unnecessary service call, perform the simple checks in this section before contacting a service professional.

# When you switch on your phone, the following messages may appear:

"Insert SIM"

• Be sure that the SIM card is correctly installed.

"Phone lock"

• The automatic locking function has been enabled. You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.

"Enter PIN"

- You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the PIN supplied with the SIM card.
- The PIN check feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered. To disable this feature, use the **PIN check** menu.

"Enter PUK"

• The PIN code has been entered incorrectly three times in succession, and the phone is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider.

# "No Service," "Network Failure," or "Not Done" displays

- The network connection has been lost. You may be in a weak signal area. Move and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have no subscription with your service provider. Contact the service provider for further details.

# You have entered a number but it was not dialled

- Be sure that you have pressed [ ∽].
- Be sure that you have accessed the right cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an outgoing call barring option.

# Your correspondent cannot reach you

Solve problems

- Be sure that you are accessing the correct cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an incoming call barring option.

# Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

- Be sure that you have switched off the microphone.
- Be sure that you are holding the phone close enough to your mouth. The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.

# The phone starts beeping and "Battery low" flashes on the display

• Your battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.

# The audio quality of the call is poor

- Check the signal strength indicator on the display  $(\Upsilon_{\text{unil}})$ . The number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong  $(\Upsilon_{\text{unil}})$  to weak  $(\Upsilon)$ .
- Try moving the phone slightly or moving closer to a window if you are in a building.

# No number is dialled when you re-call a Contacts entry

- Use the Contact Search feature to ensure the number has been stored correctly.
- Re-store the number, if necessary.

# The battery doesn't charge properly or the phone sometimes turns itself off

• Wipe the charging contacts both on the phone and on the battery with a clean soft cloth.

# If the above guidelines do not help you to solve the problem, take note of:

- The model and serial numbers of your phone
- Your warranty details
- A clear description of the problem

Then contact your local dealer or Samsung after-sales service.

# Health and safety information

# SAR certification information

This phone meets European Union (EU) requirements concerning exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed the limits for exposure to radio-frequency (RF) energy, as recommended by the EU Council. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines were developed by independent scientific organisations through the periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The limits include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the EU Council is  $2.0W/kg.^*$ 

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, compliance with the European R&TTE Directive must be shown. This directive includes as one of its essential requirements the protection of the health and safety of the user and any other person.

The highest SAR value for this model phone was 0.563 W/ kg.

<sup>\*</sup> The SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 2.0 watts/ kilogram (W/kg) averaged over ten grams of body tissue. The limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements. The SAR values may vary, depending on national reporting requirements and the network band.

# Health and safety information

# Precautions when using batteries

- Never use a charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power. Talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge, the type of battery, and the charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. Disconnect the charger from the power source when it is not in use. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.

- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places because the capacity and lifetime of the battery will be reduced. Try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Liion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0°C (32°F).
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental shortcircuiting can occur when a metallic object like a coin, clip or pen causes a direct connection between the + and - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery). For example, do not carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag where the battery may contact metal objects. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

# **Road safety**

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone while driving, follow local regulations in the country or region you are in.

# **Operating environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in the area you are in, and always switch off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

# **Electronic devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

### Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch off your phone immediately.

## **Hearing aids**

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives. Health and safety information

# Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy.

Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Switch off your phone in health care facilities when regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so.

# Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle.

You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

# **Posted facilities**

Switch off your phone in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

# Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your phone when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch off the phone while at a refuelling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include the areas below decks on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas, such as propane or butane, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

# **Emergency calls**

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless, and landline networks as well as userprogrammed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications like medical emergencies.

To make or receive calls, the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. Switch on the phone.
- 2. Key in the emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press [ 🔨 ].

Certain features like Call Barring may need to be deactivated before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

# Other important safety information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Improperly installed wireless equipment could result in serious injury if the air bag inflates.
- Switch off your phone before boarding an aircraft. It is dangerous and illegal to use wireless phones in an aircraft because they can interfere with the operation of the aircraft.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

# **Care and maintenance**

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children and pets. They inadvertently damage these things or choke on small parts.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.

- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.
