# Important safety precautions





#### Tips for using ABC mode

 To enter the same letter twice or to enter a different letter on the same key, wait for the cursor to move to the right automatically or press [Right]. Then, enter the next letter.

#### Enter text

- · Press [#] to insert a space.
- Press [\*] to change case. Lower case (No indicator), Initial capital (♠), and Capital lock (♠) are available.
- Press the Navigation keys to move the cursor.
- Press [C] to delete characters one by one. Press and hold [C] to clear the display.

# Using T9 mode

T9 is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes.

#### Entering a word in T9 mode

- 1. Press [2] to [9] to start entering a word. Press each key once for each letter.

  - T9 predicts the word that you are typing, and it may change with each key that you press.

#### Adding a new word to the T9 dictionary

This feature may not be available for some languages.

1. Enter the word that you want to add.

- Press [0] to display alternative words for your key presses. When there are no more alternative words, Spell appears on the bottom line.
- 3. Press < Spell > .
- Enter the word you want using ABC mode and press < OK >.

- 2. Scroll to the number you want and press [\scrolls.].

#### Making a call from Contacts

Once you have stored a number in Contacts, you can dial the number by selecting it from Contacts. ▶ p. 46

You can also use the speed dial feature to assign your most frequently called numbers to specific number keys. ▶ p. 47

You can quickly dial a number from the SIM card using its location number assigned when stored.

- In Idle mode, enter a location number and press [#].
- Press [Up] or [Down] to scroll through other numbers.
- 3. Press < Dial > or [ →] to dial the number you want.

# **Ending a call**

Close the phone or press [ 🗝].

# Answering a call

When you receive an incoming call, the phone rings and displays the incoming call image.

Press [ ] or < Accept > to answer the call.

### Tips for answering a call

- When Anykey answer is active, you can press any key to answer a call, except for <Reject>, [♣⁰], and [▲/▼]. ▶ p. 54
- When Active folder is active, you can simple open the phone. ▶ p. 54
- Press < Reject > or [ , 0] to reject a call.
- Press and hold [▲/▼] to reject a call or mute the ringer, depending on the Side key setting. ▶ p. 56

## Viewing missed calls

If you have missed calls, the screen displays how many calls you have missed.

- 2. If necessary, scroll through the missed calls.
- 3. Press [ ] to dial the number you want.

- 2. Press < Options> and select Swap to switch between the calls.
- Press < Options > and select End held call to end the call on hold.
- 4. To end the current call, press [ $ightharpoonup^{\circ}$ ].

# Using the Speakerphone feature

Use the Speakerphone feature to talk and listen with the phone a short distance away.

Press **<Spkr on>** to activate the Speakerphone feature. Press **<Normal>** to switch back to the earpiece.

#### Using In-call options

Press **Options** to access the following options during a call:

- Hold/Retrieve: place the current call on hold, or retrieve the call.
- Swap: switch between the current call and a call on hold during a multi-party call.
- Join: set up a multi-party call by adding a caller on hold to a currently active call. You can include up to 5 people on a multi-party call.
- Split: have a private conversation with one multiparty call participant. The other participants can converse with each other. After the private conversation, select Join to return to the multi-party call.
- Mute/Unmute: switch off the phone's microphone so that the other person on the phone cannot hear you, or switch it back on.
- New call: place a new call.
- · Contacts: access the Contacts list.

- Message: read an incoming message or send a new message.
- Mute keys/Send keys: switch the key tones on or off.
  - ▼ To communicate with answering machines or computerised telephone systems, Send keys must be selected.
- Send DTMF: send the DTMF (Dual tone multifrequency) tones as a group. The DTMF tones are the tones used in phones for tone dialling, sounding when you press the number keys. This option is helpful for entering a password or an account number when you call an automated system, like a banking service.
- End held call: disconnect the call currently on hold.
- SIM AT: access additional services provided by your SIM card, such as news, weather forecast, sports, entertainment, and location services. This option is available if you use a SIM card supporting SIM Application Toolkit menus.

# Menu functions

All menu options listed

## Call register (Menu 1)

Use this menu to view the calls you have dialled, received, or missed, and the length of calls. You can also check the cost of your calls, if your SIM card supports this function.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Call register.

## Missed calls (Menu 1.1)

This menu displays the most recently received calls that you did not answer.

#### Accessing a call record

- 1. Press [Up] or [Down] to scroll through the call list.
- Press [OK] to view the details of a call, or press [ ] to dial a number.

#### Using call record options

While viewing call details, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Call back: dial the selected number.
- Send message: send an SMS or MMS message to the selected number.
- · Edit: edit the number.
- · Delete: delete the selected call record.
- Delete all: delete all records.

#### Received calls (Menu 1.2)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have received.

#### Dialled calls (Menu 1.3)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have dialled.

#### Delete all (Menu 1.4)


Use this menu to delete all of the records in each call type.

- Press < Select > to select the call types to be cleared.
- 2. Press < OK > .
- Press < Yes> to confirm the deletion.

#### Call time (Menu 1.5)

This menu displays the time log for calls made and received. The actual time invoiced will vary.

- Last call time: check the length of your last call.
- Total sent: check the total length of all the calls you have dialled.
- Total received: check the total length of all the calls you have received.
- Reset timers: reset the call timers. You need to enter the phone password.



#### Call costs (Menu 1.6)

This network feature displays the cost of calls. This menu is available only if your SIM card supports this feature. Note that this is not intended to be used for billing purposes.

- Last call cost: check the cost of your last call.
- Total cost: check the total cost of all of your calls.
   If the total cost exceeds the maximum cost set in Set max cost, you must reset the counter before you can make another call.
- Max cost: check the maximum cost limit set in Set max cost.
- Reset counters: reset the cost counters.
- Set max cost: set the maximum cost authorised for your calls.
- **Price/Unit**: set the price per unit that is applied when the cost of your calls is calculated.

### Multimedia (Menu 2)

The **Multimedia** menu allows you to access images, sounds, and games stored in the phone's memory. Furthermore, you can easily access the t-zones online portal for downloading new multimedia contents.



In Idle mode, press [Up] to quickly access this menu.

#### Sounds (Menu 2.1)

This menu displays sounds you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

#### Playing a sound clip

Scroll to a sound clip. The clip plays.

### Using sound options

While playing a sound clip, press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Set as ringtone: set the file as your ringtone or as a ringtone for a Contacts entry.
- Rename: change the file name.

#### Menu functions

Delete: delete the file.

Properties: access the file properties.

## Downloading a sound clip

You can download sound clips from the specified web page of t-zones.

- 1. From a sound screen, select t-music.
- 2. Search for a sound clip and follow the onscreen instructions to download it.

#### Images (Menu 2.2)

This menu displays images you have downloaded, received in messages, or imported from your computer.

#### Viewing an image

- Scroll to an image and press < View >.
- 2. Press [Left] or [Right] to access the other images.

#### Using image options

While viewing an image, press **Options**> to access the following options:

Send: send the file via MMS.

- Set as wallpaper: set the image as wallpaper for the idle screen.
- Rename: change the file name.
- Delete: delete the file.
- **Properties**: access the file properties.

#### Downloading an image

You can download images from the specified web page of t-zones.

- 1. From an image screen, select More pictures.
- 2. Search for an image and follow the onscreen instructions to download it.

#### Games (Menu 2.3)

Use this menu to play embedded games. You can also download and store Java applications.

## Playing an embedded game

- 1. Select a game.
- For SnowBallFight, press any key twice to go to the startup screen. Press [#] and select New Game.

For **BubbleSmile**, select **START GAME** → a game mode

## Using game options

Scroll to a game and press **Options**> to access the following options:

- Launch: launch the selected game.
- Delete: delete the game.
- Properties: access the game properties.

#### Downloading a game

You can download games from the specified web page of t-zones.

- 1. From a game screen, select **t-games**.
- 2. Search for a game and follow the onscreen instructions to download it.

#### Delete all (Menu 2.4)

Use this menu to delete all media items in each media hox

#### Memory status (Menu 2.5)

You can access memory information for media items.

## Applications (Menu 3)

Use this menu to set alarms and store tasks on the calendar. You can also use convenient features, such as voice recorder, calculator, converter, timer, and stopwatch.

#### Alarm (Menu 3.1)

Use this menu to set alarms. The alert type for a normal alarm corresponds to the call alert type settings. A wake-up alarm is not affected by your sound profiles.

#### Setting an alarm

- Select the type of alarm.
- Press < Options > and select Alarm day.
- Press < Select > to select the days on which the alarm rings and press < OK >.

#### Menu functions

- 4. Enter the time for the alarm to ring and press < **OK** > .
- 5. Press < Options > and select Alarm tone.
- Select an alarm tone.

#### Stopping an alarm

- For a non-wake-up alarm, press < Confirm>.
- For a wake-up alarm, press < Confirm>.
   Press < Snooze> to cause it to sound again after 5 minutes. You can do this a maximum of 5 times.

#### Removing an alarm

- Select an alarm you want to remove from the list.
- Press < Options > and select Remove alarm.
- 3. Press < Yes >.

# Setting the alarm to ring even if the phone is off

From the Alarm screen, select **Auto power** → **On**.

If the phone is off when it is time for the alarm to ri

If the phone is off when it is time for the alarm to ring, the phone switches on and sounds the alarm.

#### Calculator (Menu 3.2)

Use this menu to perform basic arithmetic functions such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

- Enter the first number.
   Press [\*] to insert a decimal point.
- 2. Press [#] to access the math function you want.
- Enter the second number.
- 4. Press <=> to view the result.
- If necessary, repeat from step 2 to confirm the calculation.

#### To do list (Menu 3.3)

Use this menu to access tasks you have created on the calendar.

The following icons on the list indicate the task status:

#### Voice recorder (Menu 3.4)

Use this menu to record and review voice memos.

#### Record (Menu 3.4.1)

Select to start recording.

2. Speak into the microphone.

Select to pause the recording.

Select to resume the recording.

3. When you have finished, select . The voice memo is automatically saved.

Select to review the voice memo.

#### Voices (Menu 3.4.2)

Use this menu to access voice memos you have recorded.

#### Playing a voice memo

Select a voice memo and select .

#### During playback:

Use the following buttons on the display:

Press [▲/▼] to adjust the volume.

### Menu functions

#### Using voice memo options

#### Delete all (Menu 3.4.3)

Use this menu to delete all voice memos you have recorded.

#### Settings (Menu 3.4.4)

Use this menu to configure settings for recording a voice memos.

 Recording time: select a voice recording mode.
 Normal: record a voice memo within the limit of the currently available memory.

**Limit size(for MMS)**: record a voice memo for adding to an MMS message.

Volume: select a volume level for playing a voice memo

 Default name: change the default prefix of file names for saving voice memos.

#### Memory status (Menu 3.4.5)

You can access memory information for voice memos.

#### Conversion (Menu 3.5)

Use this menu for common conversions, such as length and temperature.

- Select a converter.
- 2. Enter the value to be converted and press [Down].
  - Press [\*] to insert a decimal point.
  - Press [#] to change the temperature to above zero (+) or below zero (-).
- 3. Press [Left] or [Right] to select the original unit on the **From** line and press [Down].
- Select the unit to which you want to convert on the To line.
- 5. Press < **OK** > .

The equivalent value for the amount you entered displays.

#### Timer (Menu 3.6)

Use this menu to set a period of time for the phone to count down. The phone will sound an alarm when the specified period of time has expired.

#### Starting the timer

- Press < Set >.
- 2. Enter the length of time you want to count down and press < **OK** >.
- 3. Press **Start** to start counting down.

### Stopping the timer

- Press any key to stop the timer when it rings.
- Press < Stop > on the Timer screen to stop the timer before it rings.

#### Stopwatch (Menu 3.7)

Use this menu to measure elapsed time. The maximum time is 10 hours.

- 1. Press < **OK** > to start the stopwatch.
- 2. Press < **OK**> to check an interval. You can repeat this step for a total of 4 intervals.

#### SIM AT (Menu 3.8)

This menu is available if you use a SIM-AT card that supports SIM Application Tool kit menus and provides additional services, such as news, weather, sports, entertainment, and location services. Available services may vary, depending on your service provider's plans. For details, see your SIM card instructions or contact your service provider.

## Messages (Menu 4)

Use the **Messages** menu to send and receive text messages or multimedia messages. You can also use push message, voicemail, and cell broadcast message features.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Messages.

## Short messages (Menu 4.1)

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send and receive text messages that may include simple pictures, animated images, and melodies.

### Menu functions

### Create (Menu 4.1.1)

You can create and send a text message.

In Idle mode, press [Left] to quickly access this menu.

- 1. Enter your message.
  - The maximum number of characters allowed in a message varies by service provider. If your message exceeds the maximum number of characters, the phone will split the message.
- Press **Options**> to access the following options for creating a message:
  - Text: change the text attributes.
  - Add media: attach a picture, animated image, or a melody.
  - Preset messages: add a text template to text.
- 3. When you have finished, press [**OK**].
- Enter a destination number and press <OK>, or press <Contacts> to retrieve one from Contacts.
- 5. To send the message to more than one recipient, fill in additional destination fields.

6. Press < Send > to send the message.

### Inbox (Menu 4.1.2)

This folder stores all of the SMS messages you have received.

While viewing a message, press < Options > to access the following options:

- · Message reply: reply to the sender.
- · Call back: call the sender.
- Delete: delete the message.
- Cut address: extract URLs, e-mail addresses, or phone numbers from the message.
- Send: send the message to other people.
- Edit: edit the message.
- Extract media: save media content from the message to your phone's memory.

### Outbox (Menu 4.1.3)

This folder stores SMS messages that you have sent or you have saved for later use.

While viewing a message, press **Options** to access the following options:

- Delete: delete the message.
- Cut address: extract URLs, e-mail addresses, or phone numbers from the message.
- Send: send or resend the message.
- · Edit: edit the message.
- Transfer: move the message between the phone's memory and the SIM card.

### Delete all (Menu 4.1.4)

Use this menu to delete all of your messages in each message box.

- Press < Select > to select the message boxes to be cleared.
- 2. Press < Delete >.
- 3. Press < Yes> to confirm the deletion.

### Multimedia messages (Menu 4.2)

Multimedia Message Service (MMS) delivers messages containing a combination of text, image, and audio, from phone to phone or from phone to e-mail.

### Create (Menu 4.2.1)

You can create and send an MMS message.

- Press < Add> on the Subject line.
- 2. Enter the message subject and press **OK**>.
- Move to the **Picture** or **Sound** line and press < **Add**>.
- Select an image or sound and press < Add>.
  - $\sqrt{}$
- The maximum size allowed for a message can differ, depending on your service provider.
  - Depending on the file type or DRM (Digital Rights Management) system, some files may not be able to be forwarded.
- Move to the Message line and press <Add>.
- Enter the message text.
- 7. Press < Opt. > and select Done.

### Menu functions

- 8. Press **Opt.**> to access the following options for editing the message:
  - Add page: add pages. Move to each page by pressing [Left] or [Right].
  - Page timing: change the duration of page display. After the specified time, the display automatically scrolls to the next page.
  - Text effect: change the text attributes.
  - Clear subject/Clear picture/Clear sound/ Clear message: clear the subject, image, sound, or text.
  - Delete page: delete an added page.
- When you have finished, press < Opt.> and select Send.
- 10. Enter a phone number or e-mail address from one of the following options:
  - Recent log: select a number or address from the destinations to which you have sent messages recently.
  - Contacts: retrieve a number or address from Contacts.
  - Phone number: enter a phone number.

- E-mail address: enter an e-mail address.
- 11. To send the message to more than one recipient, fill in additional destination fields.
- 12. Press < **Send**> to send the message.

Inbox (Menu 4.2.2)

This folder stores MMS messages that you have received. The following icons are available to show the message status:

- MMS notification
- MMS

Depending on the DRM (Digital Rights Management) system, messages having web content may not be able to be forwarded

While viewing a message, press **<Opt.>** to access the following options:

- Reply: reply to the sender.
- Replay: replay the message.
- · Delete: delete the message.
- Forward: forward the message to other people.
- · Call back: call the sender.

- Cut media: save media content from the message to your phone's memory.
- Cut address: extract URLs, e-mail addresses, or phone numbers from the message.
- Properties: access the message properties.

### Outbox (Menu 4.2.3)

This folder stores MMS messages that the phone has sent or has failed to send.

The following icons are available to show the message status:

- Mi currently being sent
- 🍱 sent
- krying to send again
- Kalanda salah sal
- Mathematical opened by the recipient

While viewing a message, press **Opt.** to access the following options:

- Delete: delete the message.
- · Replay: replay the message.

- Send: send or resend the message.
- Properties: access the message properties.

### Draft (Menu 4.2.4)

This folder stores messages you have saved to send at a later time. Messages interrupted while created are also saved in this message folder.

While viewing a message, press **Opt.** to access the following options:

- Edit: edit the message.
- Replay: replay the message.
- **Delete**: delete the message.
- Properties: access the message properties.

### Delete all (Menu 4.2.5)

Use this menu to delete all of the messages in each message folder.

- Press < Select > to select the message folders to be cleared.
- Press < Delete >.
- 3. Press < Yes > to confirm the deletion.

### Push messages (Menu 4.3)

Use this menu to access messages from web servers.

- Inbox: access push messages you have received.
- Setting: determine whether or not your phone receives push messages.

**Always**: the phone receives push messages.

**Never**: the phone rejects push messages.

**Optional**: the phone receives push messages from the specified web server.

Delete all: delete all of the push messages.

### Preset messages (Menu 4.4)

Use this menu to make text templates of frequently used messages so that you can retrieve and insert them when composing a message.

- 1. Select an empty location.
- 2. Enter a message and press < OK >.

### Voice mail (Menu 4.5)

Use this menu to store the number of the voicemail server and access your voicemails.



If not pre-configured, you must enter the voicemail server number before accessing the server. Your service provider can give you the number.

- Connect to voice server: connect to the voicemail server to allow you to listen to your messages.
- Voice server number: change the voicemail server number or name.

### Broadcast (Menu 4.6)

The Cell Broadcast (CB) service delivers SMS messages on various topics, such as the weather or traffic.

Use this menu to change the settings for the service and to access broadcast messages.

 Read: access broadcast messages you have received. The **Temporary** box saves network messages until the phone is switched off. Press **<Options>** and select **Save** when a text notification appears to save to the **Archive** box.

The **Archive** box saves network messages indefinitely.

- Receive: select to receive broadcast messages, or not.
- Channel: indicate the channels from which you wish to receive broadcast messages. Please contact your service provider for details.
- Language: select the preferred languages in which broadcast messages display.

### Settings (Menu 4.7)

Use this menu to set up various options for using messaging service.

Short messages (Menu 4.7.1)

You can configure SMS settings.

 Service center: store or change the number of your SMS server.

- Validity period: set the length of time your messages are stored in the SMS server.
- Message type: set the default message type. The network can convert the messages into the selected format.
- Reply path: allow recipients to reply to you through your SMS server.
- **Delivery report**: set the network to inform you when your messages have been delivered.
- Character support: select a character encoding type. If you select Automatic, the phone switches the encoding type from GSM-alphabet to Uni-code if you enter a Unicode character. Use of Unicode encoding will reduce the maximum number of characters in a message to about half. If this menu is not shown, your phone provides automatic character encoding by default.

### Multimedia messages (Menu 4.7.2)

You can configure MMS settings.

**Send settings**: set up the options for sending MMS messages:

**Priority**: set the priority level of messages.

Validity period: set the length of time messages are stored in the MMS server.

**Delivery after**: set a time delay before messages are sent.

**Delivery report**: set the network to inform you when your messages have been delivered.

Read reply: send a read-reply request along with your messages.

Receive settings: set up the options for receiving MMS messages.

**Home reception**: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are in your home service area.

Roaming reception: determine if your phone retrieves new messages automatically when you are roaming on another network.



You may be additionally charged for receiving MMS messages when you are roaming.

Reception within home network or abroad has the following options:

- Manual: the phone displays notifications. Use the Retrieve option to manually download new messages.
- Automatic: the phone automatically retrieves messages from the server.
- Reject: the phone rejects all messages. Anonymous reject: reject messages from unknown senders.

Ads reject: reject advertisements.

Report allowed: set the network to inform the sender when a message has been delivered to you. MMS profiles: configure required network settings for MMS.



Check with your service provider before you change any MMS settings on your phone.

**Current profile**: select a profile to be used for MMS.

**Profile setting**: customise the options for each profile:

- Profile name: assign a name to the MMS profile.
- Server URL: enter the address of your MMS server
- **Proxy use**: activate or deactivate the proxy server when connecting to the GPRS network.
- GPRS setting: customise the settings required for connecting to the GPRS network.

IP address: (When Proxy use is enabled) enter the gateway address.

IP port: (When Proxy use is enabled) enter the port number.

**DNS1** and **DNS2**: (When **Proxy use** is disabled) enter the primary and secondary DNS (Domain Name Server) addresses.

**APN**: enter the access point name of the GPRS network gateway.

Login ID: enter the user ID. Password: enter the password.

### Memory status (Menu 4.8)

Use this menu to access memory information for SMS and MMS messages.

### t-zones (Menu 5)

Using the **t-zones** menu, you can launch the Wireless Application protocol (WAP) browser on your phone and access t-zones, a WAP service provided by T-Mobile. You can access up-to-date information and a wide variety of media content, such as games, wallpapers, and ringtones from t-zones.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select t-zones.



You will be additionally charged for accessing t-zones and downloading media content.


### Exiting the browser

### Calendar (Menu 6)

The Calendar feature enables you to keep track of important dates and events.

To access this menu, press < Menu > in Idle mode and select Calendar.



### Consulting the calendar

When you access the **Calendar** menu, the calendar in Month view appears with today's date indicated by a blue box.

### Selecting a date on the calendar

- Press [Left] or [Right] to move by day.
- Press [Up] or [Down] to move by week.

### Using calendar options

From the calendar, press < Options > to access the following options:

- · Add memo: add a new event.
- Go to date: enter a specific date.
- View all: access all events. Move to the other events by pressing [Left] or [Right].
- Delete day: delete the events stored for the selected date.
- Delete all: delete all events stored on the calendar.

### Creating an event

You can store events on the calendar. More than one event per day can be stored.

- Select a date on the calendar.
- Press < Options > and select Add memo.
- 3. Enter a memo about the event and press < OK >.
- 4. Select an event type.
- For Call, enter a phone number you need to dial and press <OK>.
  - For **Anniversary**, skip to step 7.
- 6. Enter the event time and press < **OK**>.
- 7. Press < Yes> to set an alarm for the event.
- Enter the time for the alarm to ring and press <OK>.
- 9. Select an alarm tone.

### Viewing an event

Once you have scheduled events, the following icons and the number of events for a specific day appears at the bottom of the calendar.

- Edit: edit the event.
- Move: move the event to a different day.
- Copy: copy the event to a different day.

### Profiles (Menu 7)

Use this menu to customise various sound settings, such as the call ringer, message ringer, and alert sounds to be used in various situations.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Profiles.

### Incoming calls (Menu 7.1)

Use this menu to change the sound settings for incoming calls.

- Default melodies: select one of the default melodies to be used as your ringtone.
- Sounds: select a downloaded melody to be used as your ringtone.
- Ring volume: select a ringtone volume.
- Alert type: specify how you are to be informed of incoming calls.

### Messages (Menu 7.2)

Use this menu to change the sound settings for incoming SMS messages and MMS messages individually.

- Tone: select one of several message tones.
- Alert type: specify how you are to be informed when a message comes in.
- Repetition: specify how often the phone informs you of a new message.

### Power on/off (Menu 7.3)

Use this menu to turn on or off the melody that the phone sounds when it is switched on or off.

### Connection tone (Menu 7.4)

Use this menu to set the phone to beep when an outgoing call is connected to the system.

### Key tone (Menu 7.5)

Use this menu to select the tone that the phone sounds when you press a key.



You can adjust the keypad tone volume using [ ▲ / ▼] in Idle mode.

### Minute minder (Menu 7.6)

Use this menu to set the phone to beep every minute during a call to keep you informed of the length of your call.

### Quiet mode (Menu 7.7)

Use this menu to set how the phone acts to alert you to a specific event while in Quiet mode.

### Alerts on call (Menu 7.8)

Use this menu to set the phone to beep when you receive a new message or when the time for an alarm comes during a call.


### Contacts (Menu 8)

You can store phone numbers on your SIM card and in your phone's memory. The SIM card and phone's memory are physically separate, but they are used as a single entity called Contacts.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Contacts, or press < Contacts> in Idle mode.

### Find name (Menu 8.1)

Use this menu to search for numbers in Contacts.



### Finding an entry

- Enter the first few letters of the name that you want to find.
- 2. Scroll to the name you want.
- For entries saved on the SIM card, press [ ↑] to dial.

For entries saved in the phone's memory, scroll to a number and press [ \ \cdot\)] to dial.

### **Using Contacts options**

While viewing contact details, press < Options > to access the following options:

- Send message: send an SMS or MMS message to the selected number.
- **Assign speed dial**: assign a speed dial number to the selected number.
- Edit number: edit the selected number.
- Change name: change the name of the selected contact.
- Delete entry: delete the contact.
- Copy: copy the selected number to the phone's memory or to the SIM card.

### Add entry (Menu 8.2)

Use this menu to add a new contact to Contacts.

### Storing a number in the phone's memory

- Select Phone.
- 2. Select a number type.

- Enter information and press < Save > or < OK >.
- 4. Enter a name and press < **OK** >.
- To save additional information, press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the field you want.
- Enter information or change settings.
  - Mobile/Home/Office/Fax/Other: press
     Options> and select Edit number and add a number in any category.
  - E-Mail: press < Edit > and assign an e-mail address.
  - Note: press < Edit > and add a memo about the person.
  - Group: press < Options > and assign the contact to a caller group.
  - Graphic: press < Options > and assign an image as a caller ID image to alert you to a call from the person.
  - Alert: press < Options > and assign a ringtone to alert you to a call from the person.
- 7. Press < OK > or < Select > .

### Storing a number on the SIM card

- Select SIM.
- Enter a phone number and press < Save >.
- 3. Enter a name and press < **OK** >.

### Speed-dial list (Menu 8.3)

Use this menu to assign speed dial numbers (2 to 9) for 8 of your most frequently called numbers

### Assigning speed dial entries

- Select a key location from 2 to 9. Key 1 is reserved for your voicemail server.
- 2. Select Edit number
- 3. Enter a phone number or press < Contacts > to retrieve a number from Contacts.
- 4. Press < **OK** > .

### Managing speed dial entries

While viewing the Speed-dial list screen, press <**Select**> to access the following options:

• Edit number: enter a number or assign a different number to a key.

### Menu functions

- Change name: change an entry name.
- Delete: clear the speed dial setting for a key.

### Dialling speed dial entries

In Idle mode, press and hold the appropriate key.

### Copy all to phone (Menu 8.4)

Use this menu to copy all of the contacts stored on the SIM card to the phone's memory.

### Delete all (Menu 8.5)

Use this menu to delete all contacts stored on the SIM card or in the phone's memory.

- Press < Select > to select the memory locations to be cleared.
- 2. Press < Delete >.
- 3. Press < Yes> to confirm the deletion.

### Group setting (Menu 8.6)

Use this menu to change the properties of caller groups.

From each caller group, the following options are available:

- **Melody**: select a ringtone to alert you when a call comes in from a member of the group.
- Change name: change the group name.
- View image: check the group ID image to be displayed when a call comes in from a member of the group.

### Own number (Menu 8.7)

Use this feature to check your phone numbers or to assign a name to each of the numbers. Changes made here do not affect the actual subscriber numbers on your SIM card.

### Memory status (Menu 8.8)

Use this menu to check the number of contacts you have stored in Contacts.

### **SDN** (Menu 8.9)

Use this menu to view the list of Service Dialling Numbers (SDN) assigned by your service provider, including emergency numbers and numbers for directory enquiries. This menu is available if your SIM card supports SDN.

- 1. Scroll to the number you want.
- Press < Dial > or [ ↑].

### Settings (Menu 9)

The **Settings** menu provides you with various setting options to customise the phone to your preferences and needs. You can also reset the settings to their default status.

To access this menu, press < Menu> in Idle mode and select Settings.

### Clock (Menu 9.1)

Use this menu to change the time and date displayed on your phone. Before setting the time and date, set your time zone in the **Set world time** option.

- Set time: enter the current time.
- Set date: enter the current date.
- Set world time: set your local time zone or find out what time it is in another part of the world.
  - Press [Left] or [Right] to scroll to the city you want. As the time line moves, the time and date of the given zone display.
  - Press <Set> and select Set local to save the city as your local time zone.
  - To apply daylight savings time, press <**Set**> and select **Set DST**.
- **Set format**: select a time and date format.

### Display (Menu 9.2)

Use this menu to change settings for the display and backlight.

### Wallpaper (Menu 9.2.1)

You can set up the idle screen on the main display.

 Default wallpapers: select one of the default images to be displayed.

### Menu functions

- Images: select a downloaded image to be displayed.
- Text position: select a text position. If you do not want text to display in Idle mode, select Off.
- Text style: select a font style or colour.

### Colour theme (Menu 9.2.2)

You can select a skin colour pattern for Menu mode.

### Backlight time (Menu 9.2.3)

You can select the length of time the backlight of the main display and the keypad stays on.

- On: select the length of time the backlight stays on.
- Dim: select the length of time the display stays on in Dim mode after the backlight turns off. After a specified time, the display turns off.

### LCD Brightness (Menu 9.2.4)

You can adjust the brightness of the main and external displays for varying lighting conditions.

### Dialling font colour (Menu 9.2.5)

Use this menu to select a font colour for the numbers entered while dialling.

### Show caller information (Menu 9.2.6)

Use this menu to set the phone to display missed call notifications with the most recently missed caller's information.

### Greeting message (Menu 9.3)

Use this menu to enter the greeting that is displayed briefly when the phone is switched on.

### Language (Menu 9.4)

Use this menu to select one of several languages for the display text or the text input mode.

### Security (Menu 9.5)

Use this menu to protect the phone against unauthorised use by managing the several access codes of your phone and SIM card.



If you enter an incorrect PIN/PIN 2 three times in succession, the SIM card is blocked. To unblock it, you need to enter your PUK/PUK2 (Personal Unblocking Key). The codes are supplied by your service provider.

### PIN check (Menu 9.5.1)

The 4-to 8-digit PIN (Personal Identification Number) protects your SIM card against unauthorised use. When this feature is enabled, the phone requires your PIN each time it is switched on.

### Change PIN (Menu 9.5.2)

Use this menu to change your PIN. The PIN check feature must be enabled to change the PIN.

### Phone lock (Menu 9.5.3)

Use this menu to lock the phone from unauthorised use.

When this feature is enabled, you must enter a 4- to 8-digit phone password each time the phone is switched on.

The password is preset to **00000000**. To change the password, use the **Change password** menu.

### Change password (Menu 9.5.4)

Use this menu to change your phone password.

### Privacy (Menu 9.5.5)

Use this menu to lock access to MMS messages, images, or sounds.

- Press < Select > to select the items to lock.
- 2. Press < **OK** > .
- 3. Enter the phone password and press < **OK** >.

When a privacy option is enabled, you must enter the phone password to access the locked items.

### SIM lock (Menu 9.5.6)

This menu allows your phone to work only with the current SIM by assigning a SIM lock code. You must enter the SIM lock code to use a different SIM card.

### FDN mode (Menu 9.5.7)

If supported by your SIM card, Fixed Dialling Number (FDN) mode restricts your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers. When this feature is enabled, you can make calls only to phone numbers stored on the SIM card.

### Menu functions

### Change PIN2 (Menu 9.5.8)

If supported by your SIM card, use this menu to change your current PIN2.

### Internet (Menu 9.6)

Use this menu to connect your phone to the Internet services. You can also set up connection profiles for connecting your phone to the network and launching the web browser.

### Bookmark (Menu 9.6.1)

Use this menu to save URL addresses in order to quickly access web pages.

### Adding a bookmark

- 1. Select an empty location.
- 2. Enter a URL address and press < OK >.
- 3. Enter a title for the bookmark and press < OK >.

### Using bookmark options

After saving an item, press **Select** to access the following options:

Go: access the bookmarked web page.

- Edit: edit the URL address and title of the bookmark.
- · Delete: delete the bookmark.

### Go to URL (Menu 9.6.2)

Use this menu to manually enter a URL address and access the associated web page.

### Clear cache (Menu 9.6.3)

Use this menu to clear the cache, which is the temporary memory that stores the recently accessed web pages.

### Profile settings (Menu 9.6.4)

Use this menu to create and customise connection profiles containing the settings for launching the web browser.



Your phone is suited for connecting to the network by default. If you change the settings without first checking with your service provider, the web browser feature may not work properly.

For each profile, the following options are available:

· Profile name: enter a profile name.

- Bearer: select the network bearer type.
- Proxy use: activate or deactivate the proxy server.
- GPRS setting: customise the following GPRS network settings:

**IP** address: (When **Proxy use** is enabled) enter the IP address of the proxy server.

**IP port**: (When **Proxy use** is enabled) enter the port number of the proxy server.

**APN**: enter the access point name of the GPRS network gateway.

Login ID: enter the user ID.

**Password**: enter the password.

**IP** address: (When **Proxy use** is enabled) enter the IP address of the proxy server.

**IP port**: (When **Proxy use** is enabled) enter the port number of the proxy server.

**DNS1** and **DNS2**: (When **Proxy use** is disabled) enter the primary and secondary DNS (Domain Name Server) addresses.

Dial Number: enter the PPP phone number.

**Login ID**: enter the user ID. **Password**: enter the password.

Data call type: select a call type for the data

transmission.

Current profile (Menu 9.6.5)

Use this menu to select a connection profile to be used for accessing the web browser.

### Extra settings (Menu 9.7)

You can turn the automatic redialling or answering feature on or off.

 Auto redial: set the phone to make up to 10 attempts to redial a phone number after an unsuccessful call.

### Menu functions

- Active folder: answer an incoming call by opening the phone and end a call by closing the phone.

When this feature is deactivated, you must press  $[\ \ ]$  or < **Accept**> to answer a call.

### Reset settings (Menu 9.8)

Use this menu to reset the phone's settings you have changed.

- 1. Select a setting category to be reset.
- 2. Press < Yes> to confirm the reset.
- 3. Enter the phone password and press < OK >.

The password is preset to **00000000**. You can change this password. ▶ p. 51

### Network services (Menu 9.9)

Use this menu to access network services. Please contact your service provider to check their availability and subscribe to them, if you wish.

### Call diverting (Menu 9.9.1)

This network service reroutes incoming calls to a phone number that you specify.

- 1. Select a call diverting option:
  - Divert always: divert all calls.
  - **Busy**: divert calls when you are on another call.
  - **No reply**: divert calls when you do not answer the phone.
  - Unreachable: divert calls when you are not in an area covered by your service provider or when your phone is switched off.
  - Cancel all: cancel all call diverting options.
- 2. Select the type of calls to be diverted.
- To activate call diverting, press < Activate >. To deactivate call diverting, press < Remove >.
- 4. Enter the number to which calls are to be diverted and press < OK >.
- 5. If you selected **No reply**, select the length of time the network delays before diverting a call.

### Call barring (Menu 9.9.2)

This network service allows you to restrict your calls.

- 1. Select a call barring option:
  - All outgoing: prohibit all outgoing calls.
  - International: prohibit international calls.
  - International except to home: only allow calls to numbers within the current country when you are abroad, and to your home country.
  - All incoming: prohibit incoming calls.
  - Incoming while abroad: prohibit incoming calls when you use your phone outside of your home country.
  - Cancel all: cancel all call barring settings, allowing to be sent and received normally.
  - Change barring password: change the call barring password.
- 2. Select the type of calls to be barred.
- Press < Activate >. To deactivate call barring, press < Deactivate >.
- 4. Enter the call barring password and press < OK >.

### Call waiting (Menu 9.9.3)

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you while you are on another call.

- Select the type of calls to which the call waiting option will apply.
- Press < Activate >. To deactivate call waiting, press < Deactivate >.

### Network selection (Menu 9.9.4)

This network service allows you to either automatically or manually select the network used while roaming outside of your home area. You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

### Caller ID (Menu 9.9.5)

This network service allows you to prevent your phone number from being displayed on the phone of the person being called. If you select **Default**, the phone will use the default setting provided by the network.



Some networks do not allow the user to change this setting.

### Band selection (Menu 9.9.6)

For the phone to make and receive phone calls, it must register with an available network. Your phone can handle any of Combined GSM 900/1800 and GSM 1900, and support automatic switching between three bands.

The country where you purchased your phone determines the default band that it uses. When you travel abroad, you may need to change to an appropriate band.

### Side key (Menu 9.0)

Use this menu to set whether the phone mutes the call ringer or rejects a call if you press and hold [  $_{\perp}/_{\parallel}$ ] when a call comes in.

## Solve problems

### Help and personal needs

To save the time and expense of an unnecessary service call, perform the simple checks in this section before contacting a service professional.

# When you switch on your phone, the following messages may appear:

"Insert SIM"

Be sure that the SIM card is correctly installed.

### "Enter password"

The automatic locking function has been enabled.
 You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.

### "Fnter PIN"

- You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the PIN supplied with the SIM card.
- The PIN check feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered.
   To disable this feature, use the PIN check menu.

### "Enter PUK"

 The PIN code has been entered incorrectly three times in succession, and the SIM card is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider.

# "No service," "Network failure," or "Not done" displays

- The network connection has been lost. You may be in a weak signal area. Move and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have no subscription with your service provider.
   Contact the service provider for further details.

### You have entered a number but it was not dialled

- Be sure that you have pressed [►].
- Be sure that you have accessed the right cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an outgoing call barring option.

### Your correspondent cannot reach you

- Be sure that your phone is switched on. ([
   pressed for more than one second.)
- Be sure that you are accessing the correct cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an incoming call barring option.

### Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

- Be sure you have switched off the microphone.
- Be sure you are holding the phone close enough to your mouth. The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.

# The phone starts beeping and "Battery low" flashes on the display

 Your battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.

### The audio quality of the call is poor

Check the signal strength indicator on the display (\(\mathbb{T}\_{\text{intill}}\)). The number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong (\(\mathbb{T}\_{\text{intill}}\)) to weak (\(\mathbb{T}\)).

 Try moving the phone slightly or moving closer to a window if you are in a building.

# No number is dialled when you re-call a Contacts entry

- Use the Find name menu to ensure the number has been stored correctly.
- · Re-store the number, if necessary.

# The battery doesn't charge properly or the phone sometimes turns itself off

 Wipe the charging contacts both on the phone and on the battery with a clean soft cloth.

# If the above guidelines do not help you to solve the problem, take note of:

- The model and serial numbers of your phone
- Your warranty details
- A clear description of the problem

Then contact your local dealer or Samsung after-sales service.

# Health and safety information

### **SAR Certification Information**

This phone meets European Union (EU) requirements concerning exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed the limits for exposure to radio-frequency (RF) energy, as recommended by the EU Council. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines were developed by independent scientific organisations through the periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The limits include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the EU Council is 2.0 W/ kg.\*

The highest SAR value for this model phone was 0.996 W/kg.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, compliance with the European R&TTE Directive must be shown. This directive includes as one of its essential requirements the protection of the health and safety of the user and any other person.

### Precautions when using batteries

- Never use a charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power. Talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge, the type of battery, and the charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers.
   Disconnect the charger from the power source when it is not in use. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.

<sup>\*</sup> The SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over ten grams of body tissue. The limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements. The SAR values may vary, depending on national reporting requirements and the network band.

### Health and safety information

- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places because the capacity and lifetime of the battery will be reduced. Try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0°C (32°F).
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object like a coin, clip or pen causes a direct connection between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery). For example, do not carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag where the battery may contact metal objects. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

### Road safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When you are driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone while driving, follow local regulations in the country or region you are in.

### Operating environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in the area you are in, and always switch off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

### **Electronic devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

### **Pacemakers**

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch off your phone immediately.

### Hearing aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

### Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy.

Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Switch off your phone in health care facilities when regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so.

### Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle.

You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

### Posted facilities

Switch off your phone in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

### Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your phone when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch off the phone while at a refuelling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. To make or receive calls, the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. Switch on the phone.
- 2. Key in the emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press [ ].

Certain features like Call Barring may need to be deactivated before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

### Other important safety information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Improperly installed wireless equipment could result in serious injury if the air bag inflates.
- Switch off your phone before boarding an aircraft. It is dangerous and illegal to use wireless phones in an aircraft because they can interfere with the operation of the aircraft.

 Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

### Care and maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep your phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children and pets. They may accidentally damage these things or choke on small parts.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.

### Health and safety information

- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.
- Do not paint the phone. Paint can clog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
