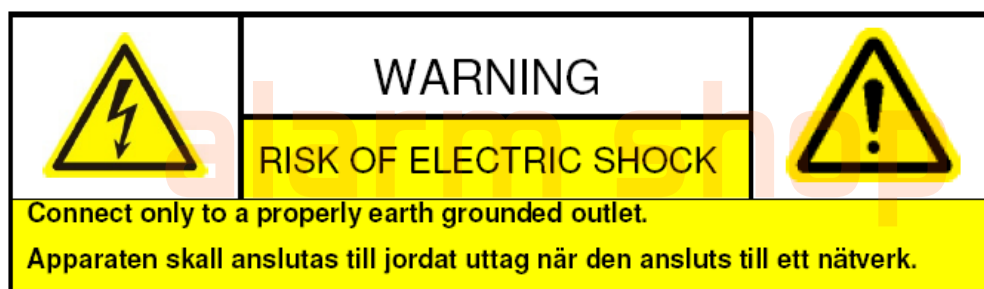

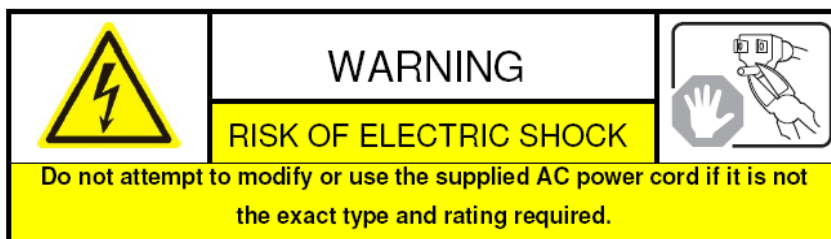

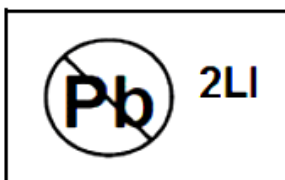

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CHAPTER 1

Introduction

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1.1 Front Panel

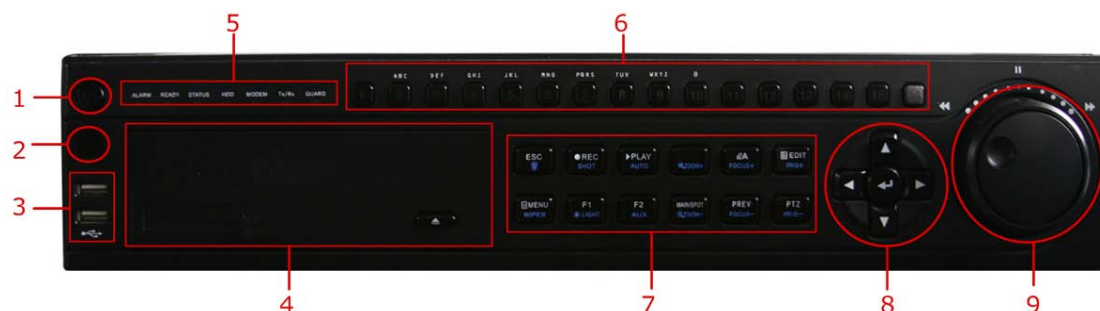

Note: If GUARD indicator is blue (default), all alarm event and exception settings are valid. Otherwise, alarm event and exception settings will be invalid, but normal recording will still be available.

Note: It is important to note that you must click the EDIT button on either the remote or front panel on a text field before you're able to edit its content. After you're done entering text, you must hit the ENTER button to be able to move on to the next field.

1.2 IR Remote Control Operations

The DVR may also be controlled with the included IR remote control, shown in Figure 1.3.

Note: Batteries (2×AAA) must be installed before operation.

The keys on the remote control closely resemble the ones found on the front panel. Referring to Figure 1.3, they include:

Troubleshooting Remote Control:

Note: Make sure you have install batteries properly in the remote control. And you have to aim the remote control at the IR receiver in the front panel.

If there is no response after you press any button on the remote, follow the procedure below to troubleshoot.

Steps:

1. Go into Menu > Settings > General > More Settings by operating the front control panel or the mouse.
2. Check and remember DVR ID#. The default ID# is 255. This ID# is valid for all IR remote controls.
3. Press the DEV button on the remote control.
4. Enter the DVR ID# from step 2.
5. Press the ENTER button on the remote.

If the Status indicator on the front panel turns green blue, the remote control is operating properly. If the Status indicator does not turn green blue and there is still no response from the remote, please check the following:

1. Batteries are installed correctly and the polarities of the batteries are not reversed.
2. Batteries are fresh and not out of charge.
3. IR receiver is not obstructed.

If the remote still can't function properly, please change the remote and try again, or contact the device provider.

1.3 USB Mouse Operation

A regular 3-button (Left/Right/Scroll-wheel) USB mouse can also be used with this DVR. To use a USB mouse:

1. Plug USB mouse into one of the USB interfaces on the front panel of the DVR.
2. The mouse should automatically be detected. If in a rare case that the mouse is not detected, the possible reason may be that the two devices are not compatible, please refer to the recommended the device list from your provider.

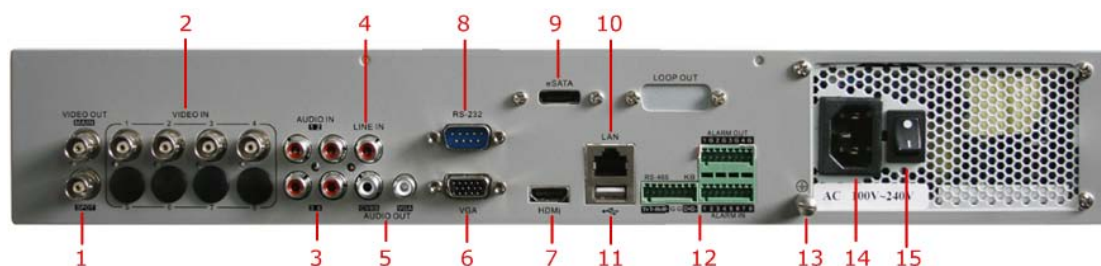


Figure 1.5 DS-7304HI-ST&DS-7304HFI-ST Rear Panel

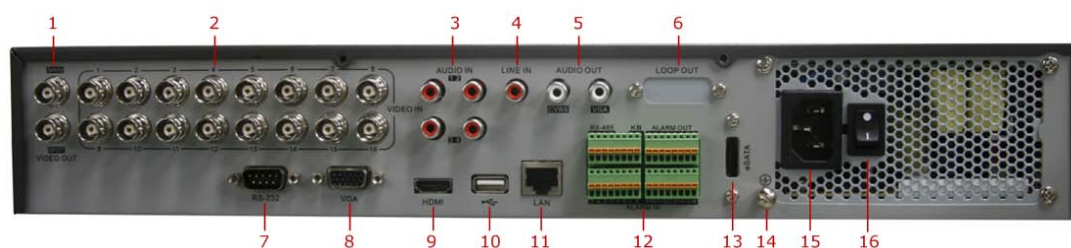

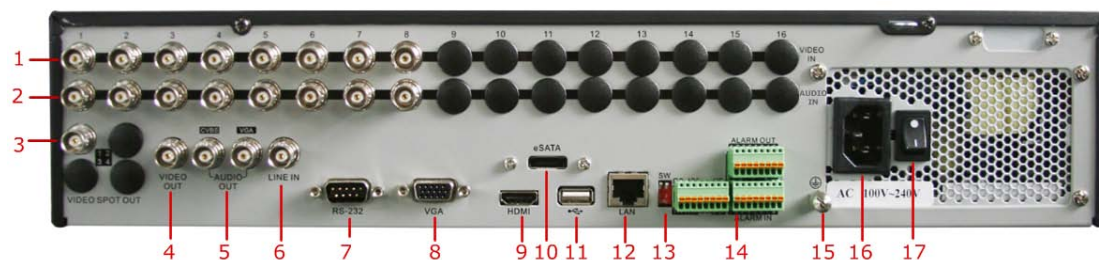

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1.6 Starting Up and Shutting Down the DVR

Purpose:

Proper startup and shutdown procedures are crucial to expanding the life of the DVR.

Before you start:

Check that the voltage of the extra power supply is the same with the DVR's requirement, and the ground connection is working properly.

Starting up the DVR:

Steps:

1. Check the power supply is plugged into an electrical outlet. It is HIGHLY recommended that an Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) be used in conjunction with the device. The Power indicator LED on the front panel should be red, indicating the device gets the power supply.
2. Press the POWER button on the front panel. The Power indicator LED should turn green (DS-7300HI/HFI-ST) or blue (DS-8100HDI-ST). The unit will begin to start.
3. After startup, the Power indicator LED remains green/blue.

Shutting down the DVR

Steps:

There are two proper ways to shut down the DVR. To shut down the DVR:

• OPTION 1: Standard shutdown

1. Enter the Shutdown menu.

Menu > Shutdown

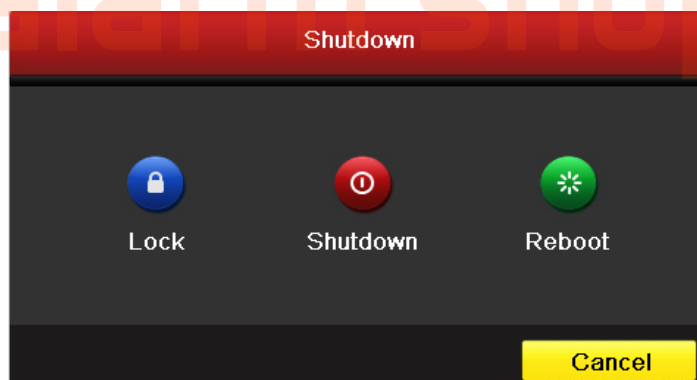


Figure 1.9 Shutdown Menu

2. Select the **Shutdown** button.
3. Click the **Yes** button.

• OPTION 2: By operating the front panel

1. Press and hold the POWER button on the front panel for 3 seconds.
2. Enter the administrator's username and password in the dialog box for authentication.
3. Click the **Yes** button.

Note: Do not press the POWER button again when the system is shutting down.

Rebooting the DVR

While in the Shutdown menu (Figure 4), you can also reboot the DVR.

Steps:

1. Enter the **Shutdown** menu by clicking Menu > Shutdown.
2. Click **Reboot** to reboot the DVR.

Getting Started

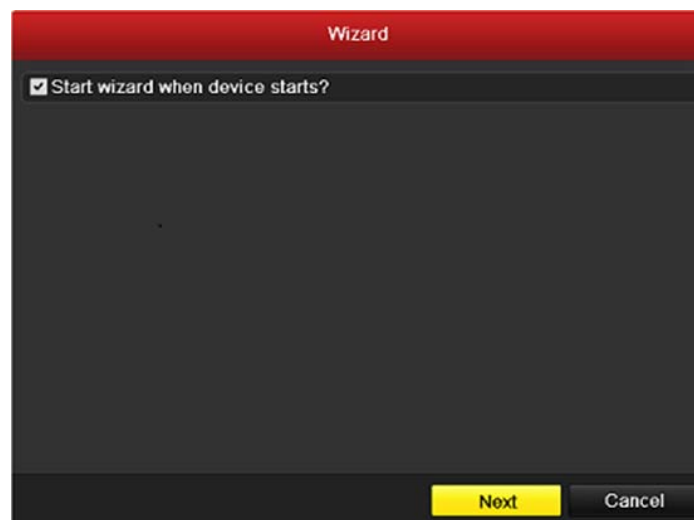


Figure 2.1 Start Wizard Interface

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By default, the Setup Wizard will start once the DVR has loaded, as shown in Figure 2.1.

Operating the Setup Wizard:

1. The Setup Wizard can walk you through some important settings of the DVR. If you don't want to use the Setup Wizard at this time, click the **Cancel** button. You can also choose to use the Setup Wizard next time by leaving the "Start wizard when DVR starts?" checkbox in checked status.

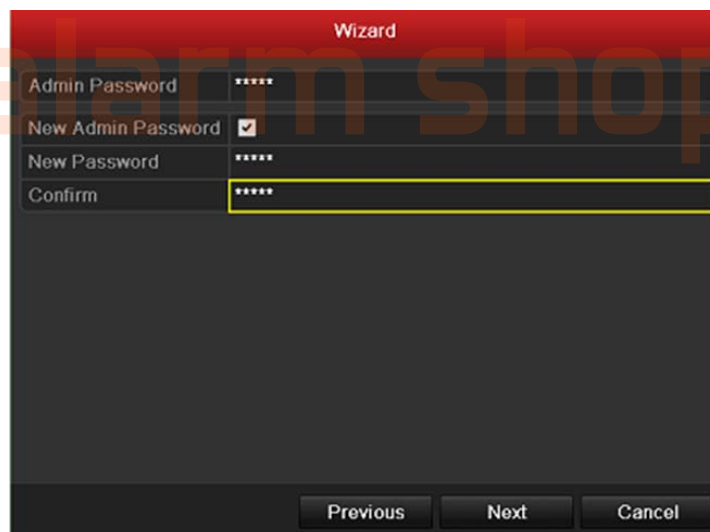


Figure 2.2 Login Window

2. Click **Next** button on the Wizard window to enter the **Login** window, as shown in Figure 2.2.

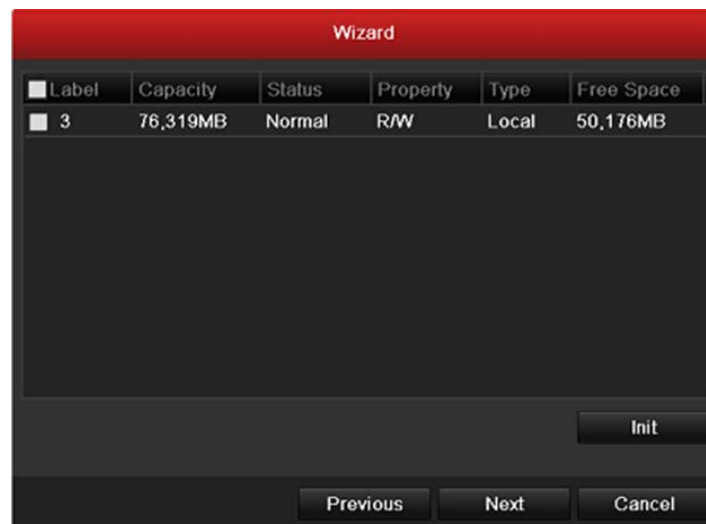


Figure 2.5 HDD Management

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C H A P T E R 3

Live View

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3.1 Introduction of Live View

Live view shows you the video image getting from each camera in real time. The DVR will automatically enter Live View mode when powered on. It is also at the very top of the menu hierarchy, thus hitting the ESC many times (depending on which menu you're on) will bring you to the Live View mode.

Live View Icons

In the live view mode, there are icons at the right top of the screen for each channel, showing the status of the record and alarm in the channel, so that you can find problems as soon as possible.

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3.2 Operations in Live View Mode

In live view mode, there are many functions provided. The functions are listed below.

- Single Screen: show only one screen on the monitor.
- Multi-screen: show multiple screens on the monitor simultaneously.
- Auto-switch: the screen will be auto switched to the next one. And you must set the dwell time for each screen on the configuration menu before enabling the auto-switch. Menu>Configuration>Live View>Dwell Time.
- All-day Playback: play back the recorded videos for current day.
- Aux/Main output switch: the DVR will check the connection of the output interfaces to define the main and auxiliary output interfaces. When both HDMI and VGA are connected, or either one is connected, it is used as the auxiliary video output for live view, playback, recording and PTZ controls; When both HDMI and VGA are not connected, it is used as the main video output for live view playback, recording, PTZ control and menu operations.

When the aux output is enabled, the main output can't do any operation, and you can do some basic operation on the live view for the Aux output.

3.2.1 Front Panel Operation

Note: If the corresponding camera supports intelligent function, the Reboot Intelligence option will be included when right-clicking mouse on this camera.

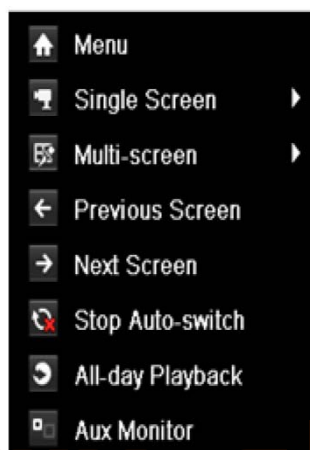


Figure 3.1 Right-click Menu

3.2.3 Using an Auxiliary Monitor

Certain features of the Live View are also available while in an Aux monitor. These features include:

- **Single Screen:** Switch to a full screen display of the selected camera. Camera can be selected from a dropdown list.
- **Multi-screen:** Switch between different display layout options. Layout options can be selected from a dropdown list.
- **Next Screen:** When displaying less than the maximum number of cameras in Live View, clicking this feature will switch to the next set of displays.
- **Playback:** Enter into Playback mode.
- **PTZ:** Enter PTZ Control mode.
- **Main Monitor:** Enter Main operation mode.

Note: In the live view mode of the main output monitor, the menu operation is not available while in Aux output mode.

3.2.4 Quick Setting Toolbar in Live View Mode

On the screen of each channel, there is a quick setting toolbar which shows when you point the mouse to the

bottom of the screen.

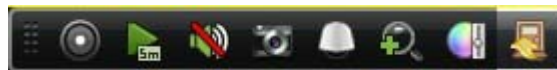


Figure 3.2 Quick Setting Toolbar

Instant Playback only shows the record in last five minutes. No record is found, it means there is no record during the last five minutes.



Digital Zoom can zoom in the selected area to the full screen. Left-click and drag the red box for target zooming area, as shown in Figure 3.3.

Image Settings icon can be selected to enter the Image Settings menu. There are four preset modes for selection according to the real situation.

Below is the explanation for each mode.

- Standard: in general lighting conditions (default).
- Indoor: the image is relatively smoother.
- Dim Light: the image is smoother than the other two modes.
- Outdoor: the image is relatively clearer and sharper. The degree of contrast and saturation is high.

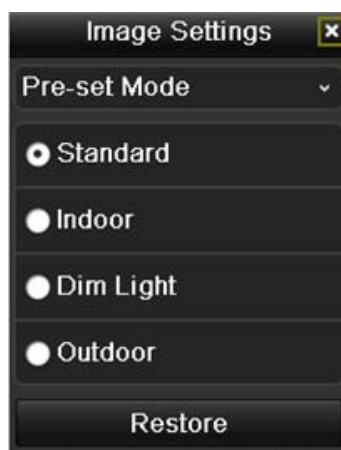


Figure 3.4 Image Settings-Preset

You can also choose the Customize mode to set the image parameters like brightness, contrast, saturation and hue. Click the **Restore** button to restore the previous settings.

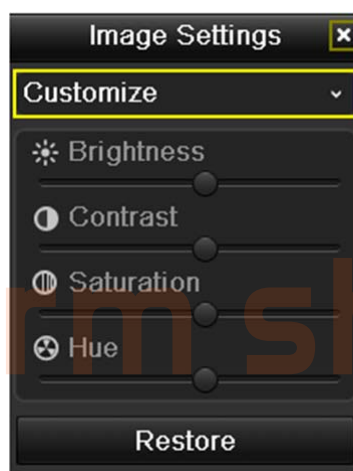


Figure 3.5 Image Settings-Customize

3.3 Adjusting Live View Settings

Purpose:

Live View settings can be customized according to different needs. You can configure the output interface, dwell time for screen to be shown, mute or turning on the audio, the screen number for each channel, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the Live View Settings interface.

Menu> Configuration> Live View

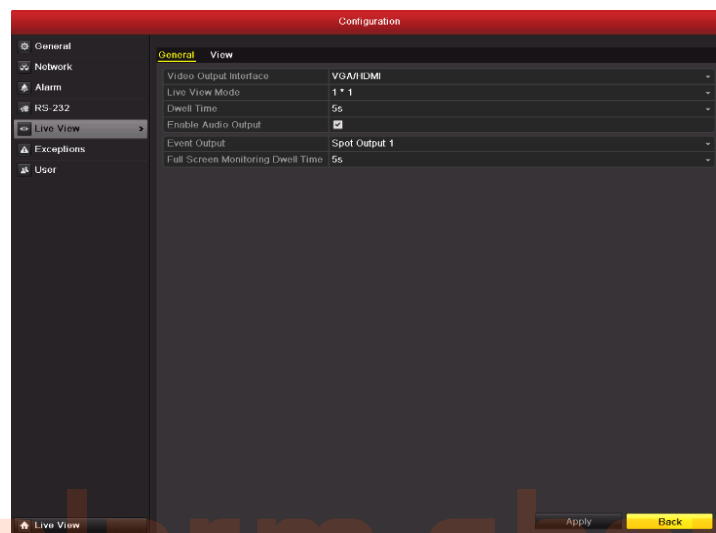


Figure 3.6 Live View-General

The settings available in this menu include:

- **Video Output Interface:** Designates the output to configure the settings for. Outputs include VGA/HDMI, Main CVBS and Spot Output1.
- **Live View Mode:** Designates the display mode to be use for Live View.
- **Dwell Time:** The time in seconds to *dwell* between switching of channels when enabling auto-switch in Live View.
- **Enable Audio Output:** Enables/disables audio output for the selected video output.
- **Event Output:** Designates the output to show event video.
- **Full Screen Monitoring Dwell Time:** The time in seconds to show alarm event screen.

2. Setting Camera Order

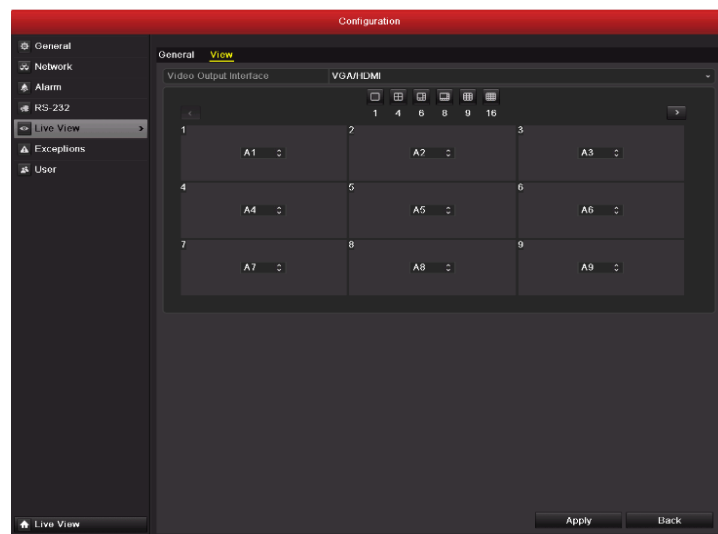


Figure 3.7 Live View- Camera Order

To set the camera order:

- 1) Select **View**.
- 2) Click the up and down button at each screen to select the channel you would like to display.
Setting an 'X' means the channel will not be displayed.
- 3) Click the **Apply** button.

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3.4 Locking the System

Purpose:

After locking the system, the monitor turns to the live view mode and if you want to do some operation, you need to enter user name and password to log in again.

Steps:

1. Enter the Shutdown menu.

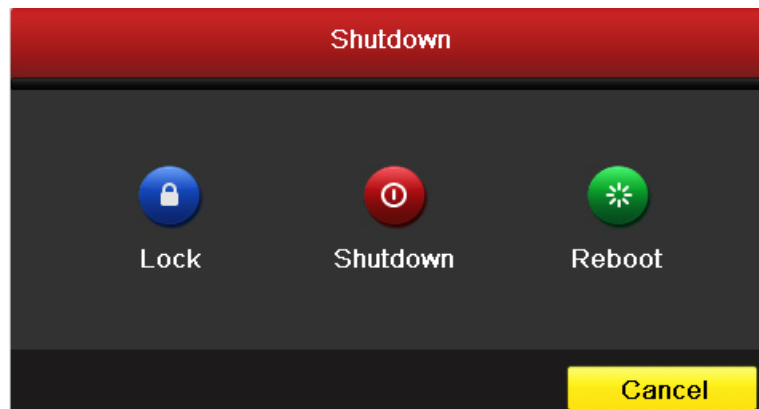


Figure 3.8 Shutdown

CHAPTER 4

PTZ Controls

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4.1 Configuring PTZ Settings

Purpose:

Follow the procedure to set the parameters for PTZ. The configuring of the PTZ parameters should be done before you set the PTZ camera.

Before you start:

Check that the PTZ and the DVR are connected properly through RS-485 interface.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Settings interface.

Menu > Camera > PTZ

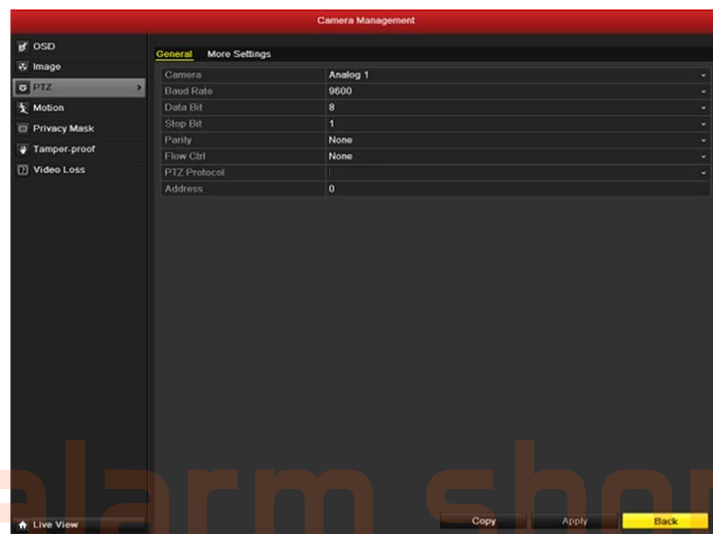


Figure 4.1 PTZ- General

2. Choose the camera for PTZ setting next to **Camera** label.
3. Enter the parameters of the PTZ camera.
Note: All the parameters should be exactly the same as the PTZ camera parameters.
4. Click **Copy** if you want to configure same settings to other PTZ cameras.
5. Click **Apply** button to save settings.

4.2 Setting PTZ Presets, Patrols & Patterns

Before you start:

Please make sure that the presets, patrols and patterns should be supported by PTZ protocols.

4.2.1 Customizing Presets

Purpose:

Follow the steps to set the Preset location which you want the PTZ camera to point to when an event takes place.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
Menu>Camera>PTZ>More Settings

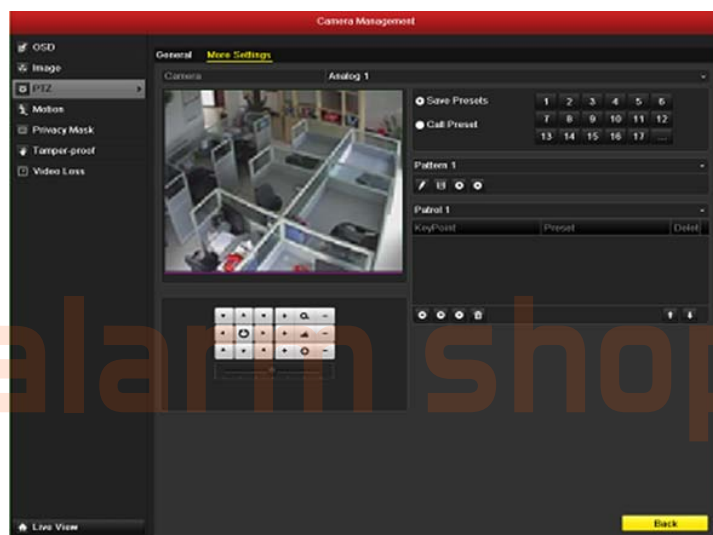


Figure 4.2 PTZ- More Settings

2. Use the directional button to wheel the camera to the location where you want to set preset.
3. Click the round icon before **Save Preset**.
4. Click the preset number to save the preset.

Repeat the steps2-4 to save more presets. If the number of the presets you want to save is more than 17, you can click [...] and choose the available numbers.

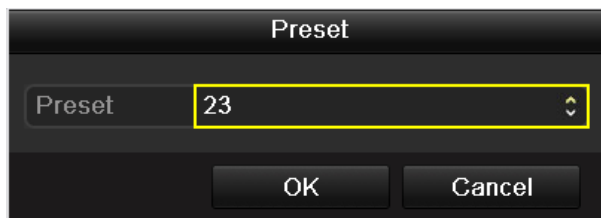


Figure 4.3 More Presets

4.2.2 Calling Presets

Purpose:

This feature enables the camera to point to a specified position such as a window when an event takes place.

Call preset in the PTZ setting interface:

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
Menu>Camera>PTZ>More Settings
2. Check the round icon before **Call Preset**.

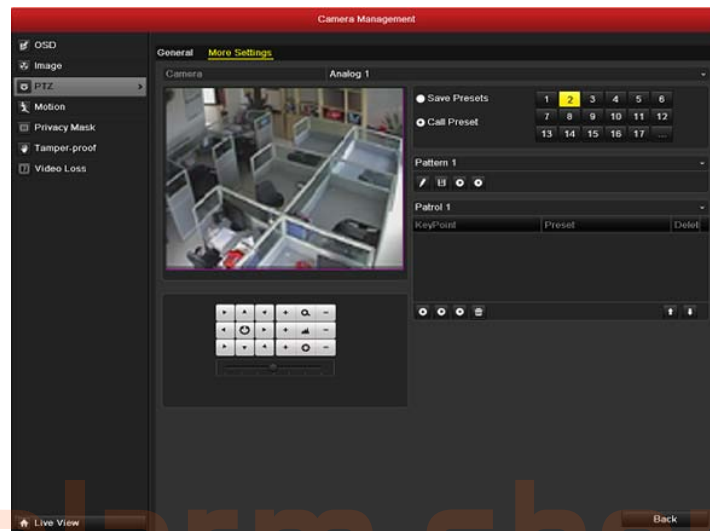


Figure 4.4 PTZ- Call Preset

3. Choose the preset number.

Call preset in live view mode:

4.2.3 Customizing Patrols

Purpose:

Patrols can be set to move the PTZ to different key points and have it stay there for a set duration before moving on to the next key point. The key points are corresponding to the presets. The presets can be set following the steps above in **Customizing Presets**.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
Menu>Camera>PTZ>More Settings
2. Select patrol number.
3. Select the  under Patrol option box to add key points for the patrol.

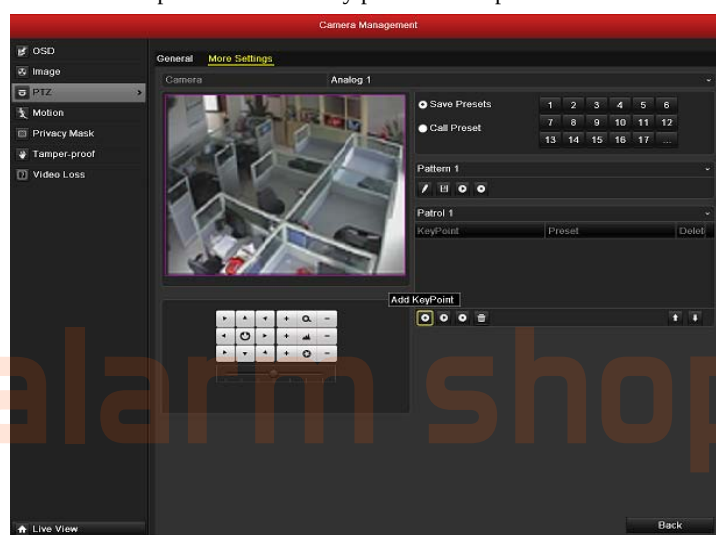


Figure 4.6 PTZ- Add Key Point

4. Configure key point parameters, such as the key point No., duration of staying for one key point and speed of patrol. The key point is corresponding to the preset. The **Key Point No.** determines the order at which the PTZ will follow while cycling through the patrol. The **Duration** refers to the time span to stay at the corresponding key point. The **Speed** defines the speed at which the PTZ will move from one key point to the next.

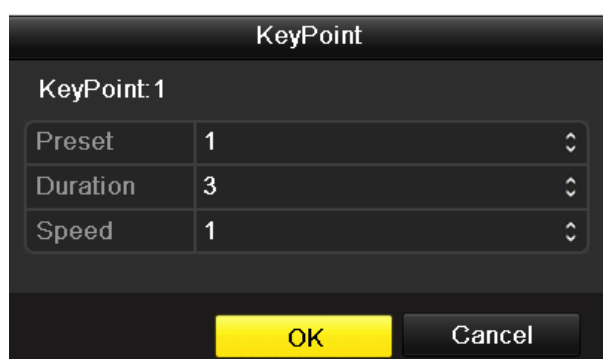


Figure 4.7 Key point Configuration

- Click **OK** to save the key point to the patrol.

Repeat the above steps to add more key points.

You can also delete all the key points by clicking the trash icon .

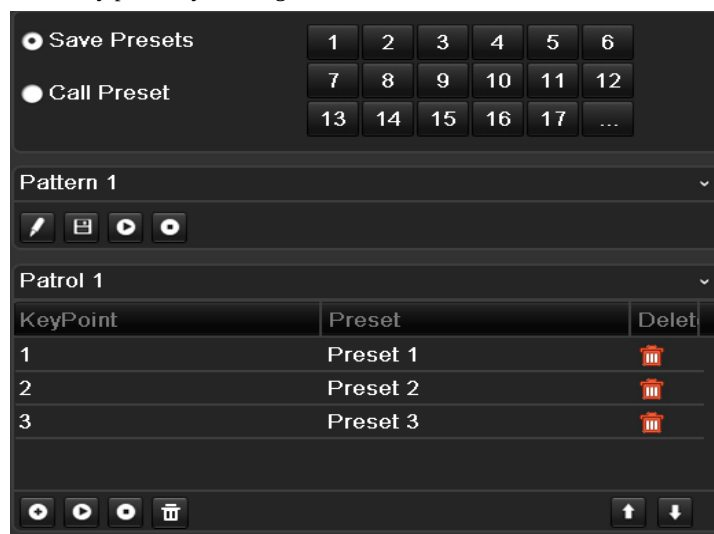


Figure 4.8 KeyPoints Deletion

4.2.4 Calling Patrols

Purpose:

Calling a patrol makes the PTZ to move according the predefined patrol path.

Calling patrol in the PTZ setting interface:

Steps:

- In the PTZ setting interface.
Menu> Camera> PTZ> More Settings
- Select the patrol number, and then click  to call the patrol.
- Click  to stop it.

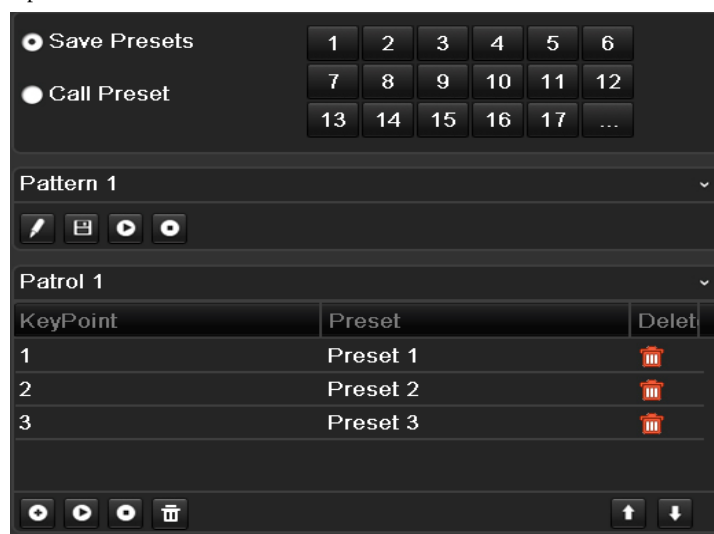


Figure 4.9 Calling Patrol

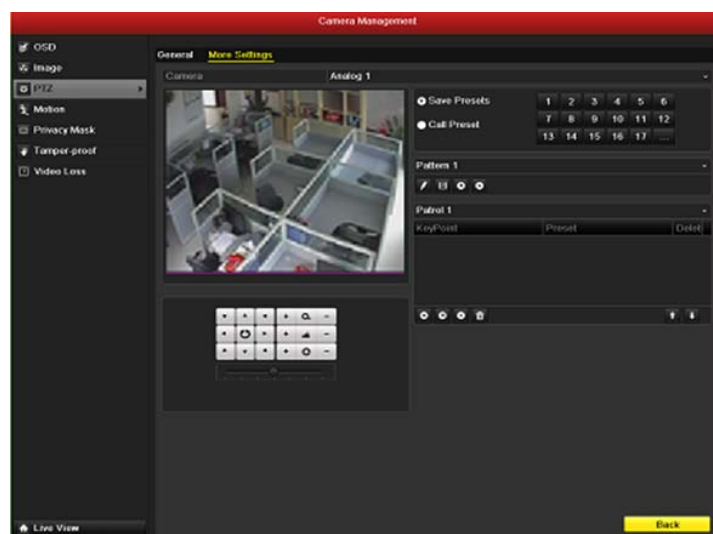


Figure 4.11 PTZ- Pattern

The movement of the PTZ is recorded as the pattern.
4. Click  to save the pattern.
Repeat the above steps to save more patterns.

4.2.6 Calling Patterns

Purpose:

Follow the procedure to move the PTZ camera according to the predefined patterns.

Calling pattern in the PTZ setting interface.

Steps:

1. Enter the PTZ Control interface.
2. Select the pattern number.
3. Click , then the PTZ moves according to the pattern. Click  to stop it.

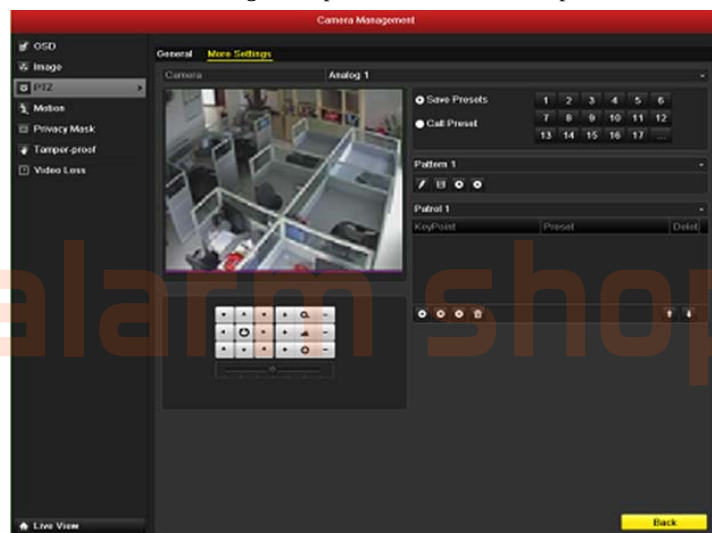


Figure 4.12 PTZ- Calling Pattern

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5.1 Configuring Encoding Parameters

Before you start:

1. Make sure that the HDD has already been installed. If not, please install a HDD and initialize it.
(Menu>HDD>General)

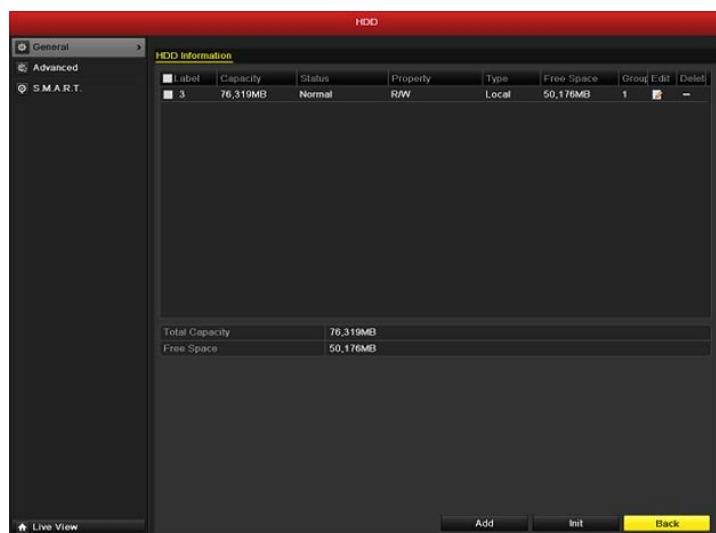


Figure 5.1 HDD- General

2. Click **Advance** to check the storage mode of the HDD.
 - 1) If the HDD mode is *Quota*, please set the maximum record capacity and maximum picture capacity. For detailed information, see *Chapter 10.5 Configuring Quota Mode*.
 - 2) If the HDD mode is *Group*, you should set the HDD group. For detailed information, see *Chapter 5.9 Configuring HDD Group for Recording and Capture*.

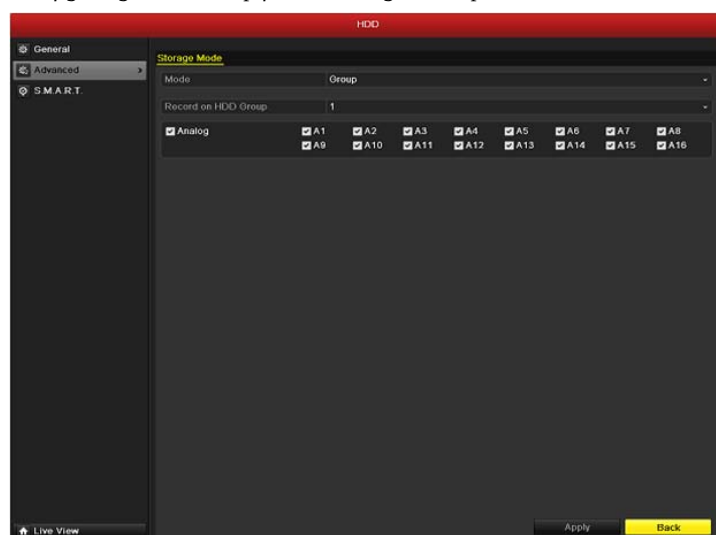


Figure 5.2 HDD- Advanced

Steps:

Menu>Record>Encoding

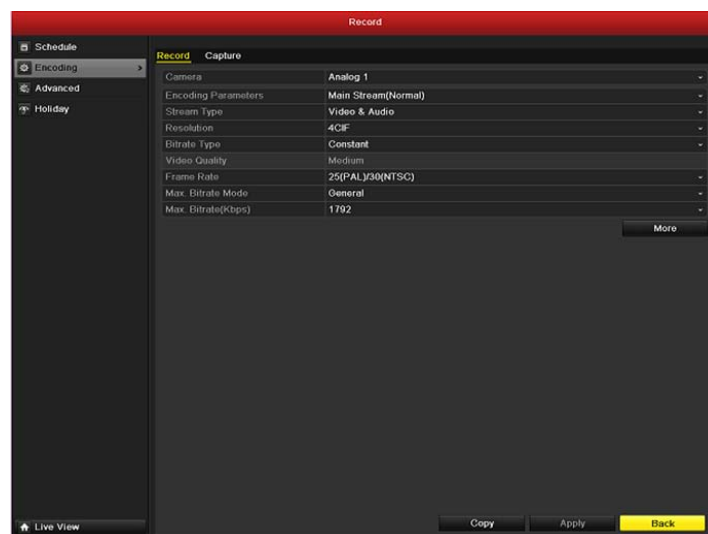


Figure 5.3 Record Encoding

2. Encoding Parameters for Recording

- 1) Select **Record** to configure. You can select the camera and configure the encoding parameters, stream type, the resolution, and the video quality on demand.

- 2) Click **More** to configure the pre-record, post-record time, expired time, redundant record/capture and whether you want to record audio.
 - **Pre-record:** The time you set to record before the scheduled time or event. For example, if the start time of recording is 10:00 and you set the pre-record time as 5 seconds, then the DVR will start to record at 9:59:55.
 - **Post-record:** The time you set to record after the event or the scheduled time. For example, when an alarm triggered recording ends at 11:00 and if you set the post-record time as 5 seconds, then it will record till 11:00:05.
 - **Expired Time:** The expired time is the longest time for a record file to be kept in the HDD, if the deadline is reached, the file will be deleted. You can set the expired time to 0, and then the file will

not be deleted. The actual keeping time for the file should be determined by the capacity of the HDD.

- Redundant Record/ Capture: Enabling redundant record or capture means you save the record and captured picture in the redundant HDD. See *Chapter 5.8 Configuring Redundant Record/ Capture*.
- Record Audio: Choose “yes” to record the sound, “no” to record the image without sound.

- 3) Click **Apply** to save the settings.
- 4) Click **OK** to back to the upper level menu.
- 5) You can copy the settings to other channels by clicking **Copy**, if the setting can also be used for other channels.

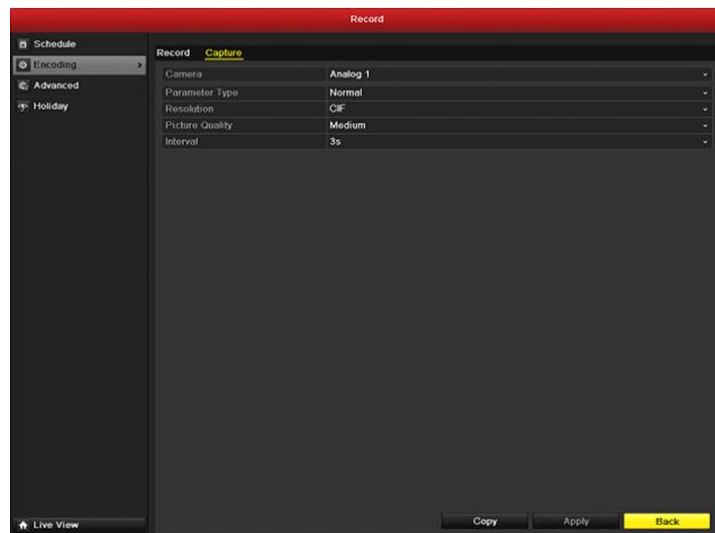


Figure 5.6 Encoding Parameters for Capture

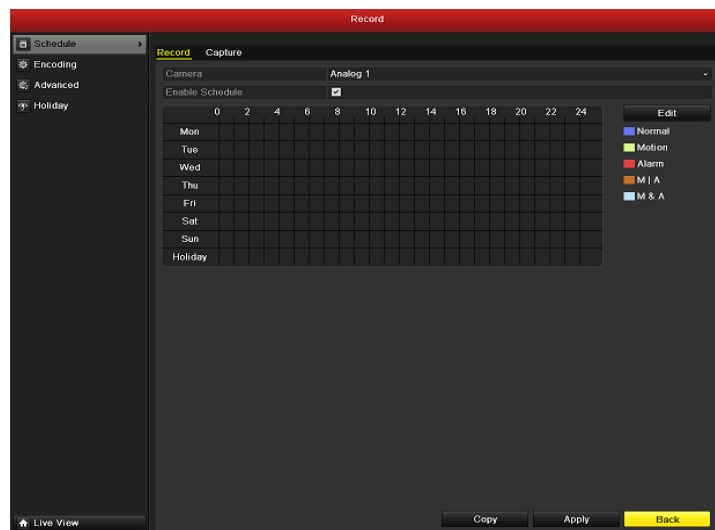


Figure 5.7 Record Schedule

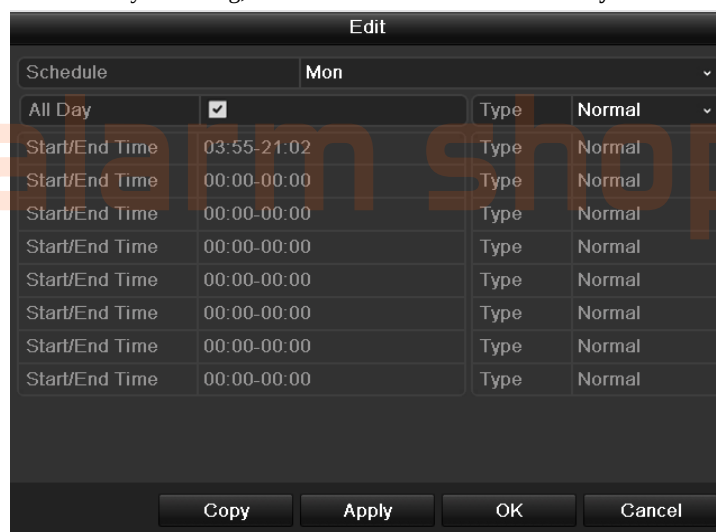


Figure 5.8 Edit Schedule

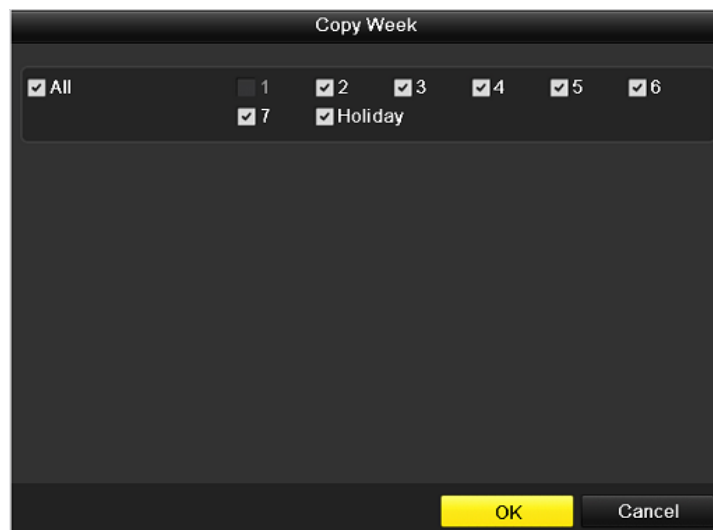


Figure 5.9 Copy Schedule to Other Days

5.3 Configuring Motion Detection Record and Capture

Enabling motion detection function can trigger certain channels to start recording, or trigger full screen monitoring, audio warning, notify the surveillance center and so on.

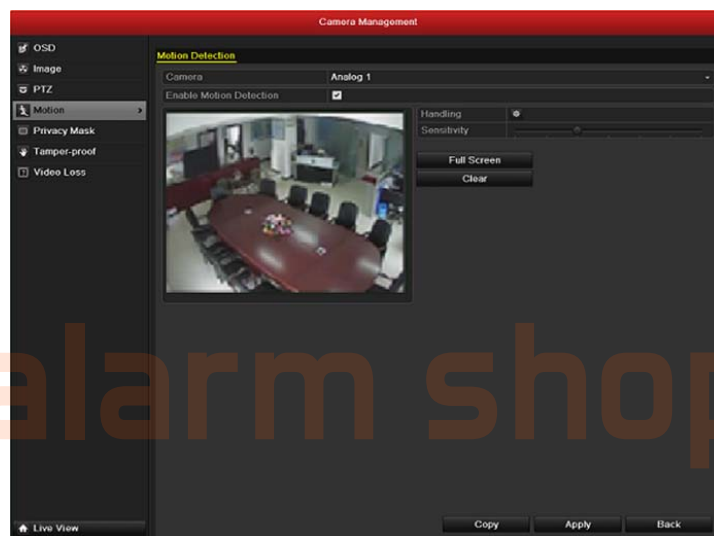


Figure 5.11 Motion Detection

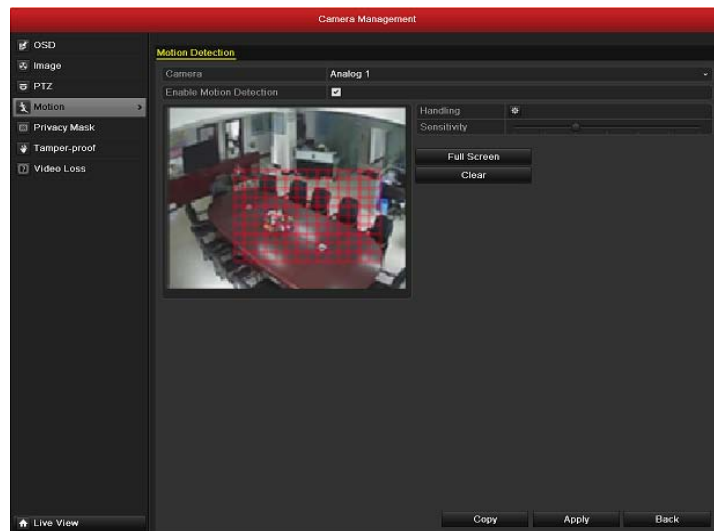


Figure 5.12 Motion Detection- Mask

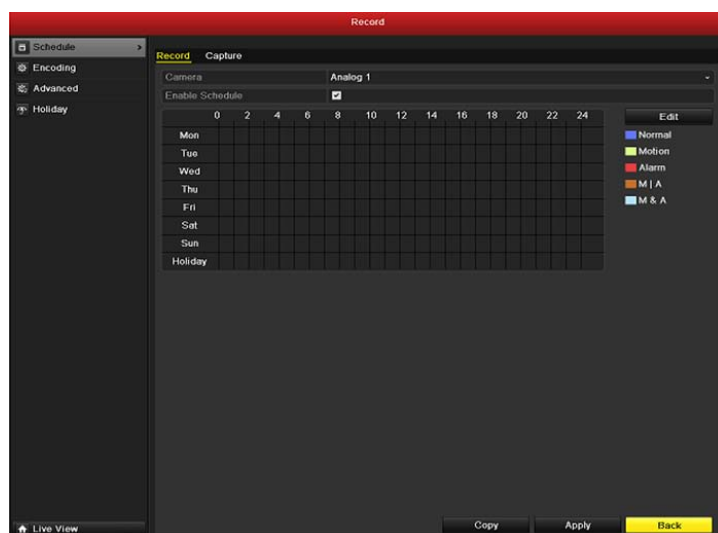


Figure 5.14 Record Schedule

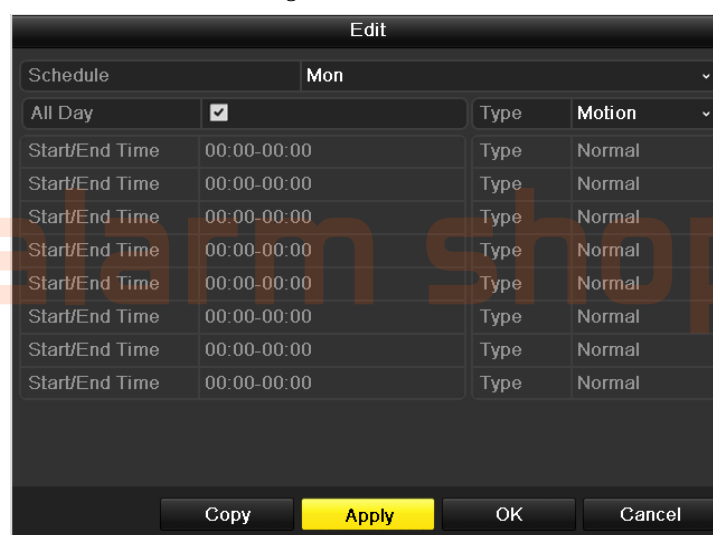


Figure 5.15 Edit Schedule- Motion Detection

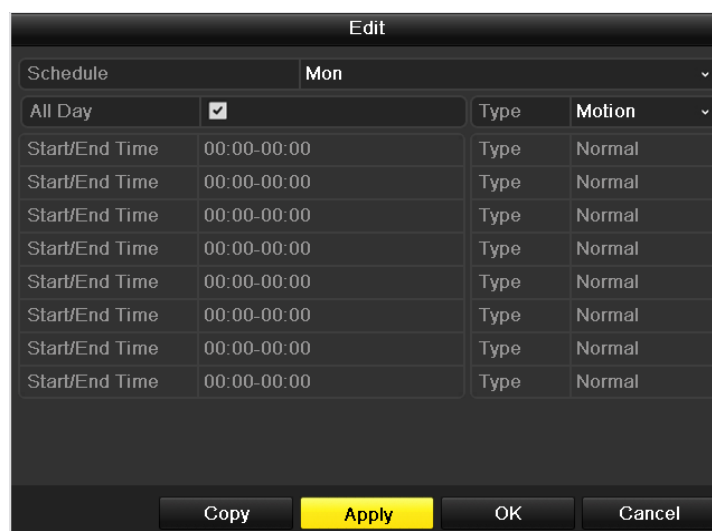


Figure 5.16 Edit Schedule- All Day

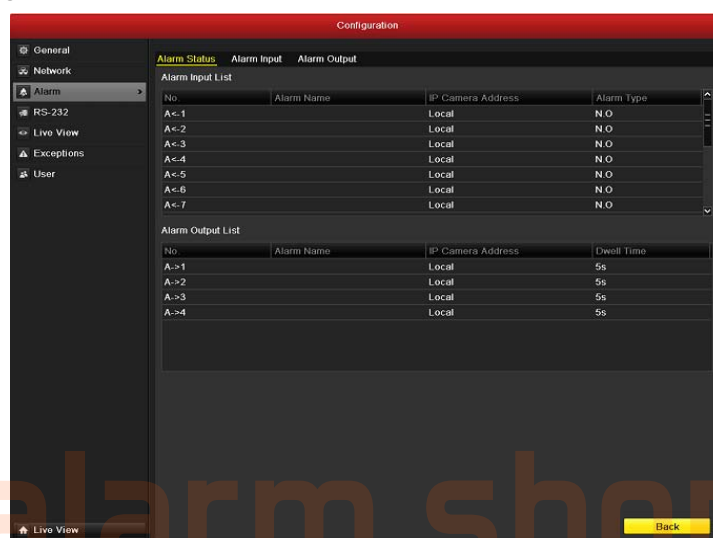


Figure 5.19 Alarm Settings

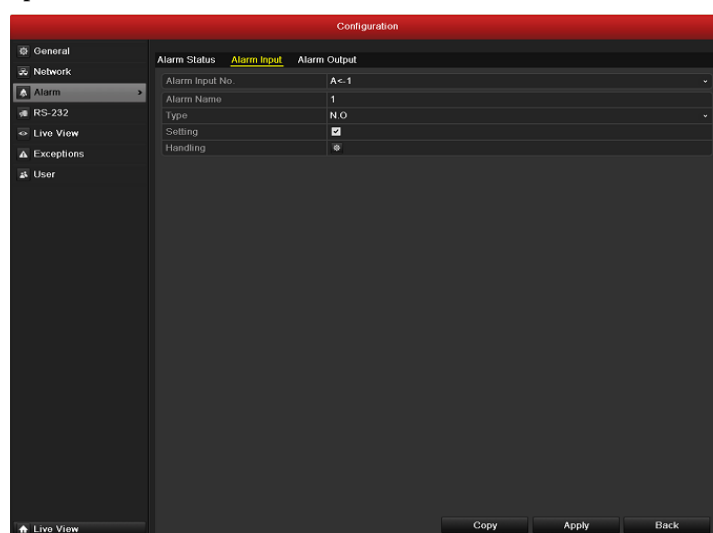


Figure 5.20 Alarm Settings- Alarm Input

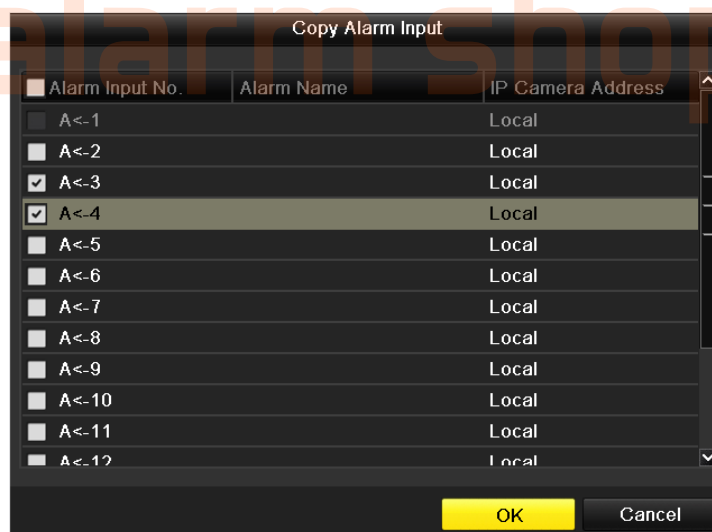


Figure 5.22 Copy Alarm Input

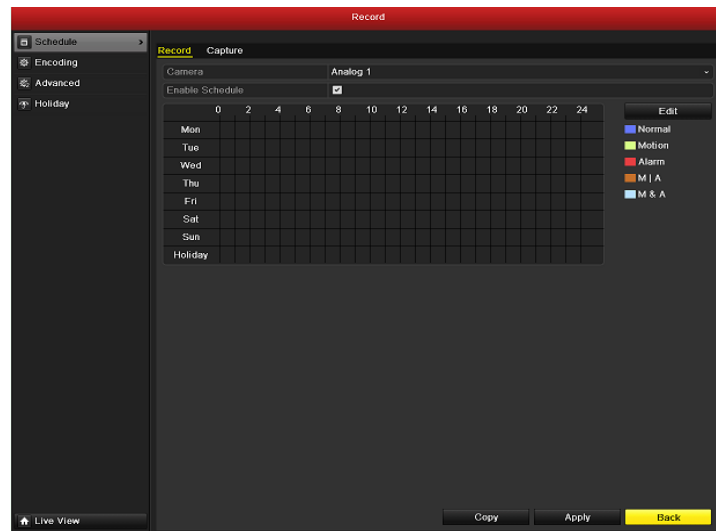


Figure 5.23 Record Schedule

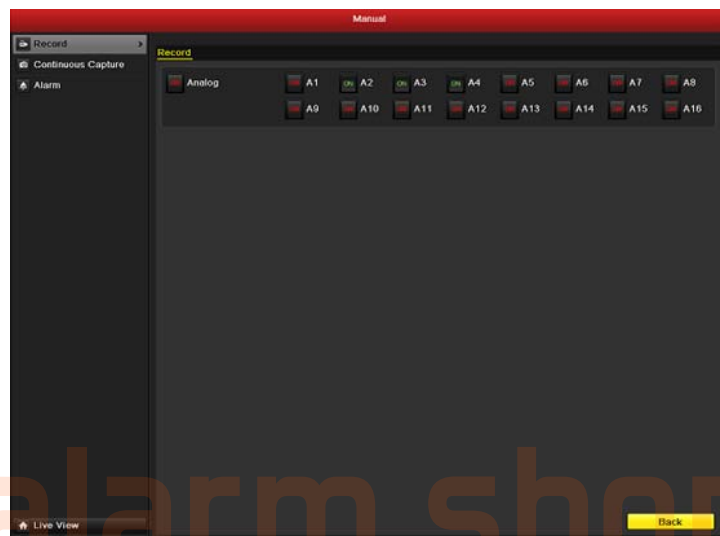


Figure 5.24 Manual Record

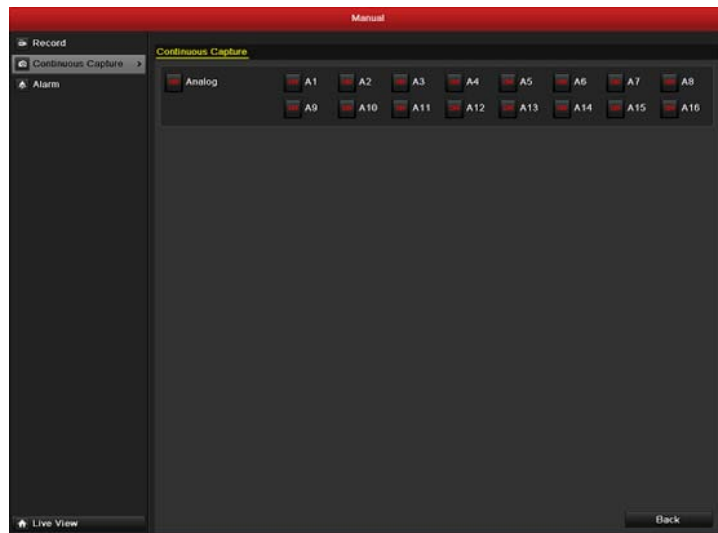


Figure 5.25 Continuous Capture

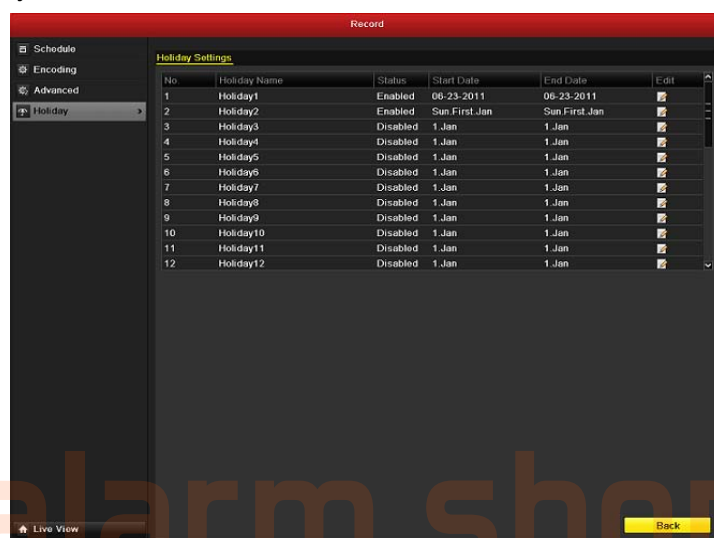


Figure 5.26 Holiday Settings

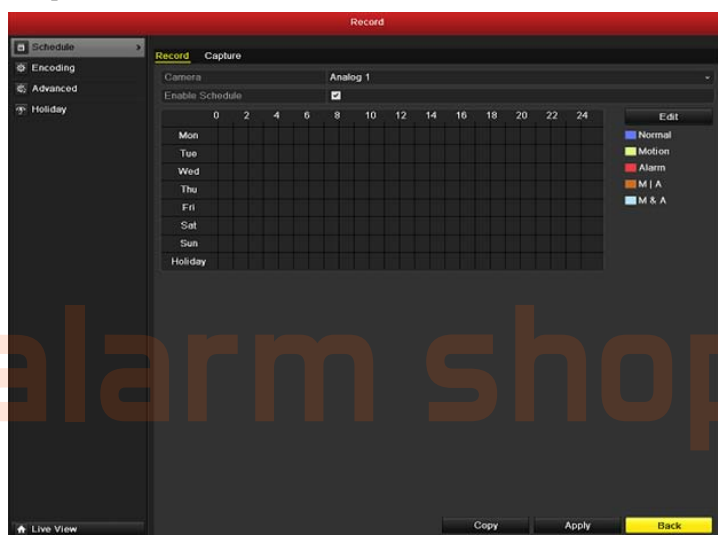


Figure 5.29 Record Schedule

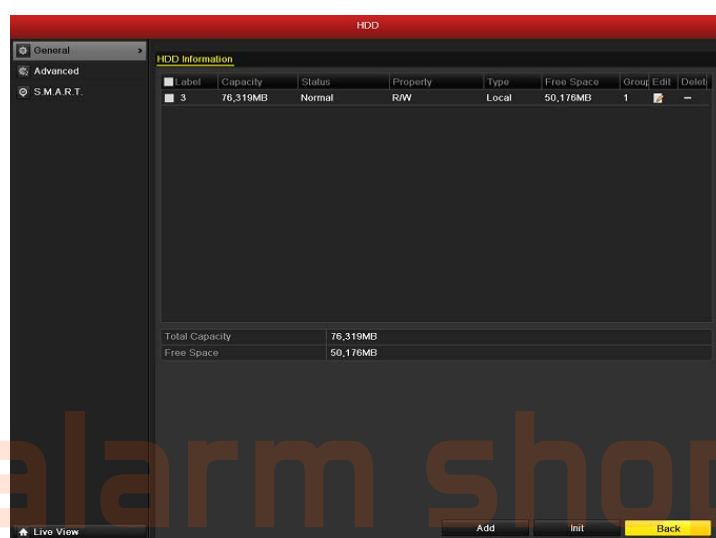


Figure 5.31 HDD General

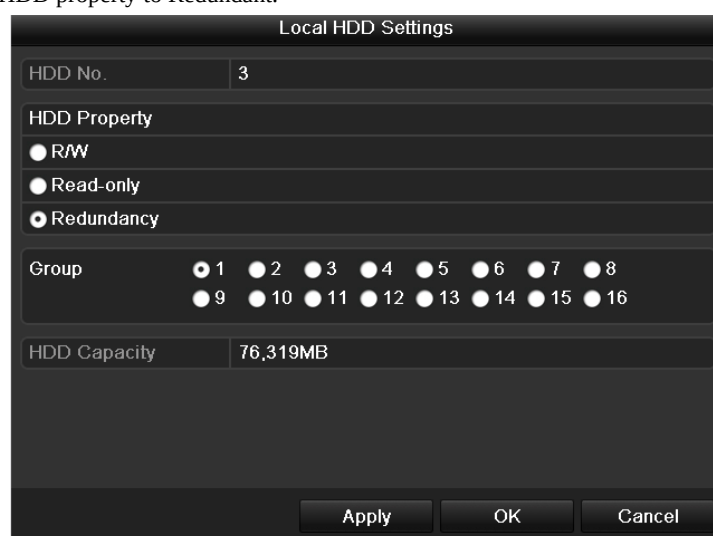


Figure 5.32 HDD General-Editing

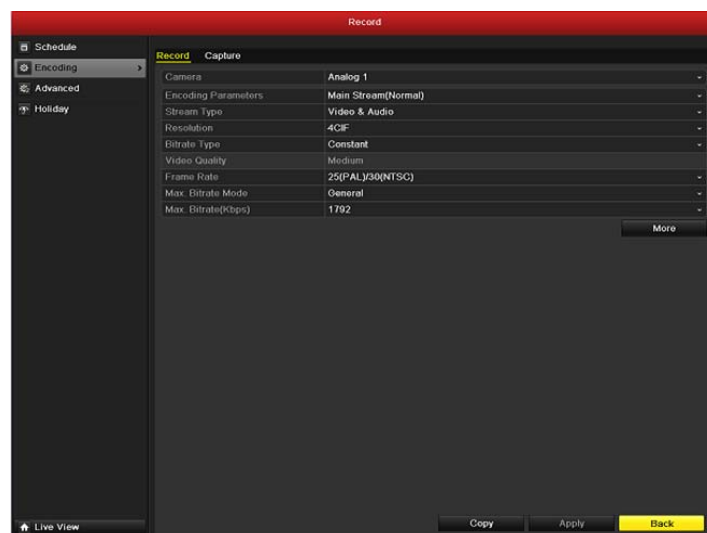


Figure 5.33 Encoding Record

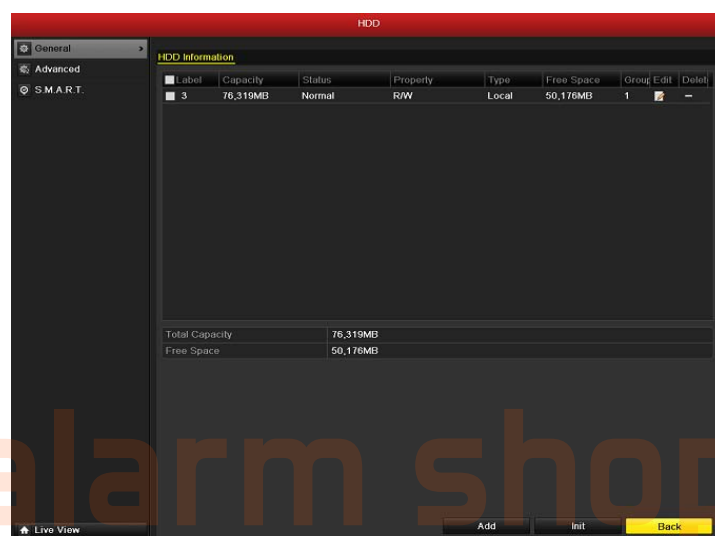


Figure 5.35 HDD General

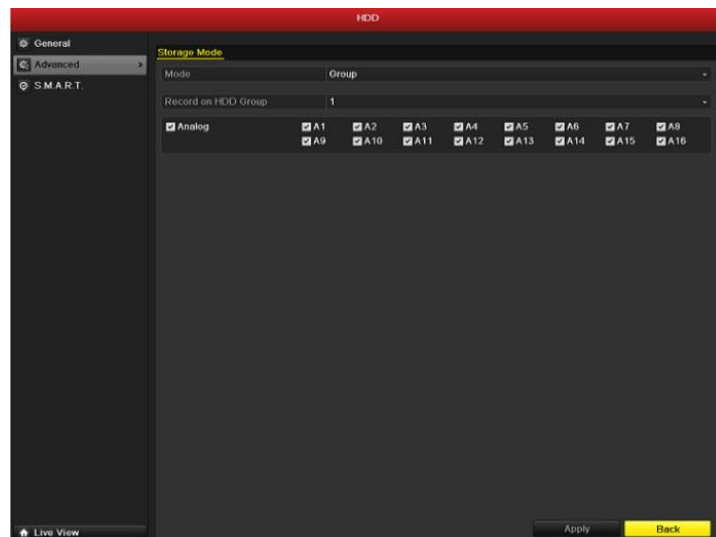


Figure 5.36 HDD Advanced

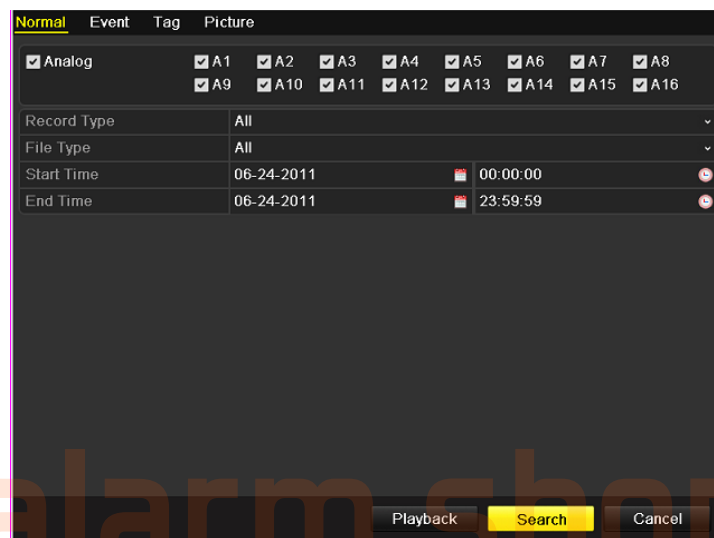


Figure 5.37 Playback

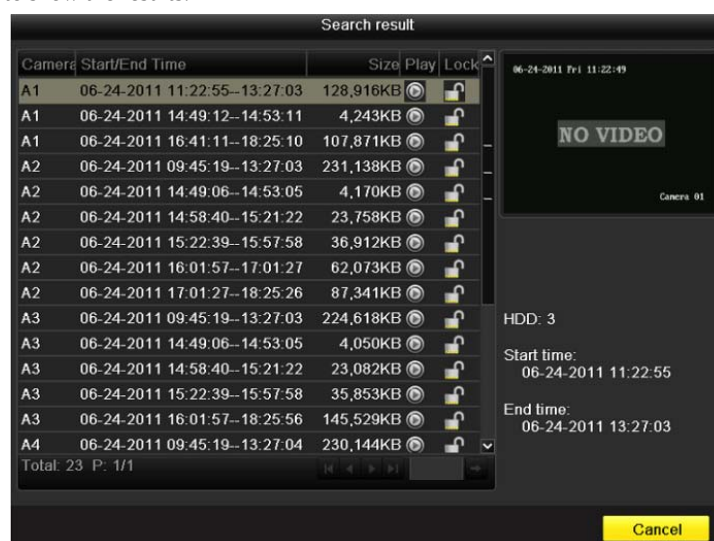


Figure 5.38 Playback- Search Result

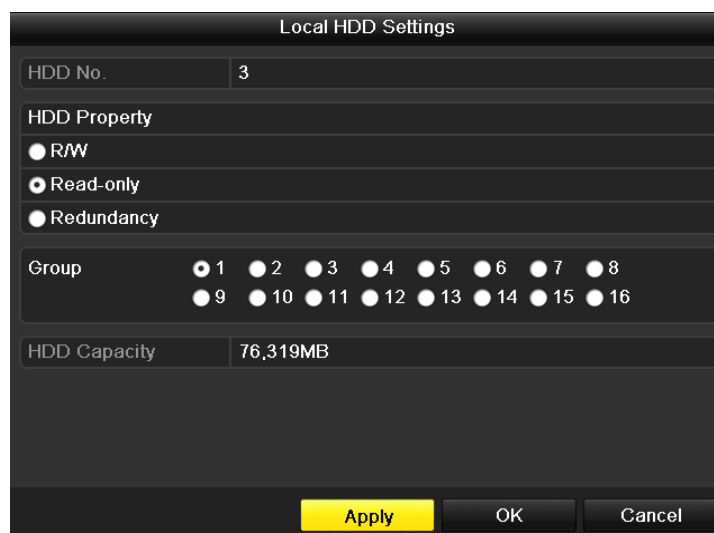


Figure 5.41 HDD General- Editing

CHAPTER 6

Playback

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6.1 Playing Back Record Files

6.1.1 Playing Back by Channel

Purpose:

Play back the recorded video files of a specific channel in the live view menu. Channel switch is supported.

Instant playback by channel:

Steps:

Choose a channel in live view mode using the mouse and click the  button in the quick setting toolbar.

Note: Only record files recorded during the last five minutes on this channel will be played back.

All-day Playback by channel

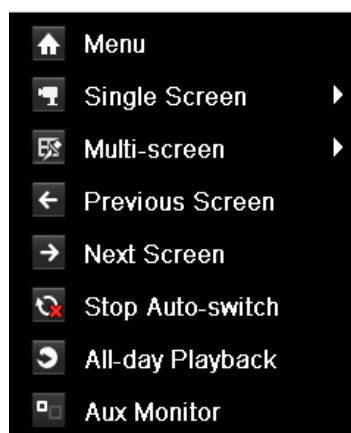


Figure 6.2 Right-click Menu under Live View

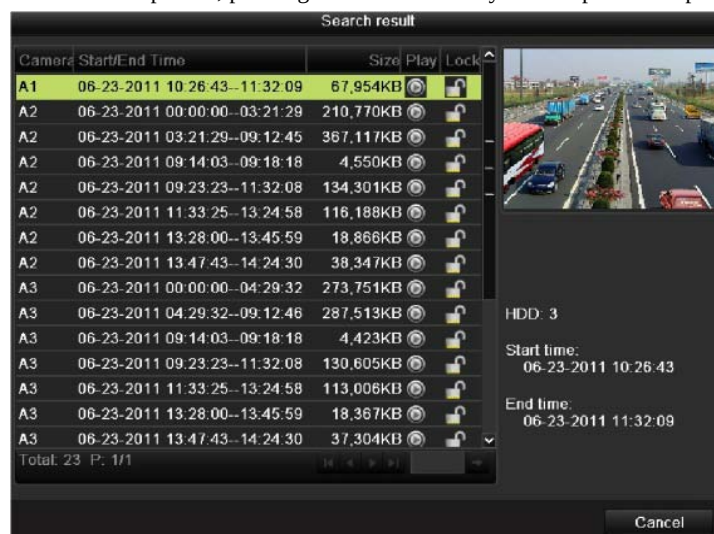


Figure 6.10 Result of Normal Video Search

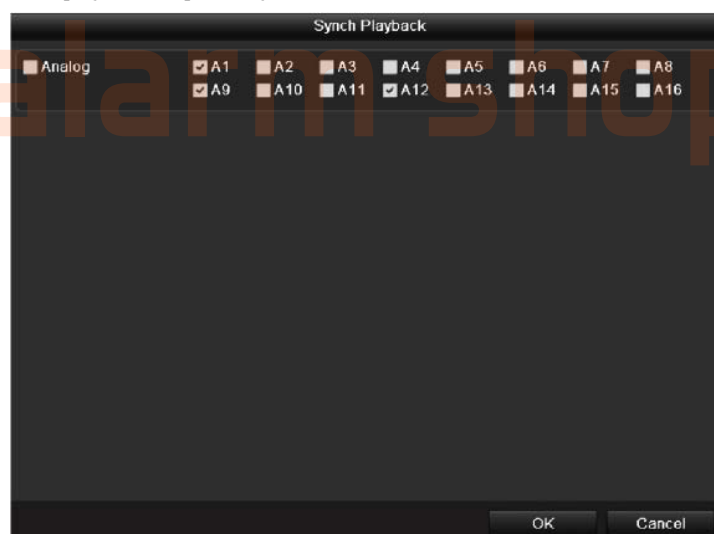


Figure 6.11 Select Channels for Synchronous Playback

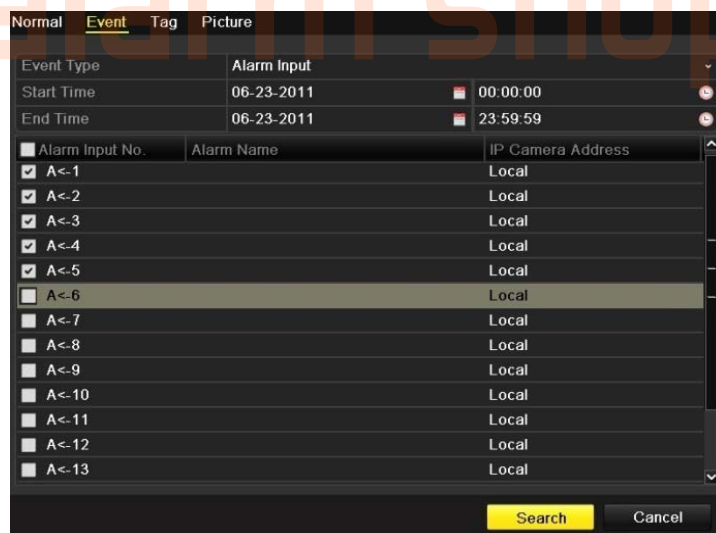


Figure 6.15 Video Search by Alarm Input

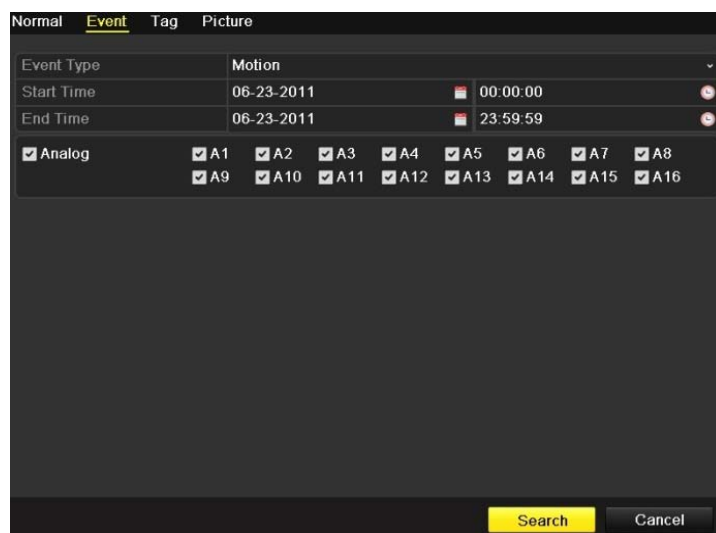


Figure 6.16 Video Search by Motion

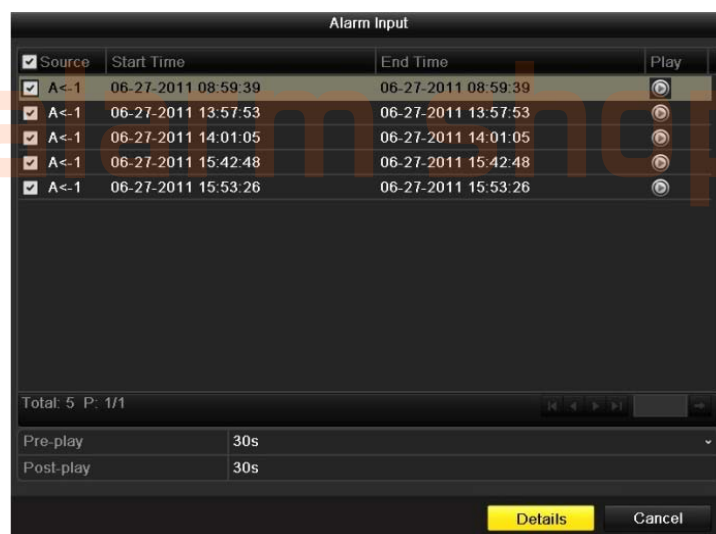


Figure 6.17 Result of Video Search by Alarm Input

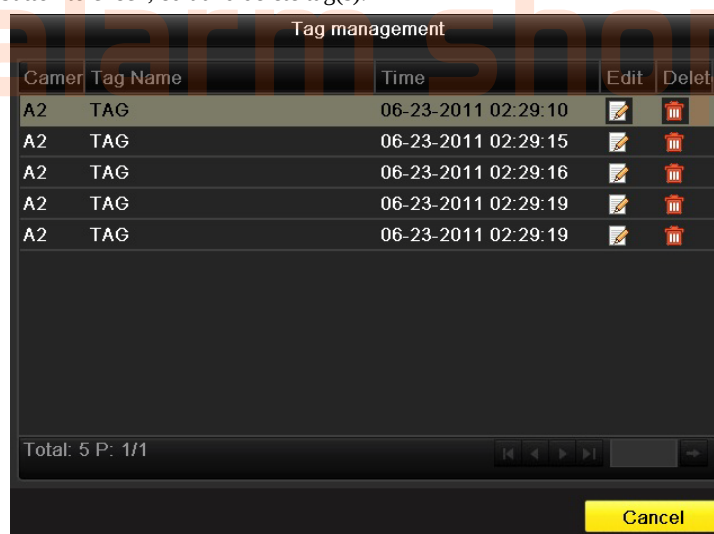


Figure 6.23 Tag Management Interface

6.2 Auxiliary Functions of Playback

6.2.1 Playing Back Frame by Frame

Purpose:

Play video files frame by frame, in order to check image details of the video when abnormal events happen.

Go to Playback interface and click button  and  until the speed changes to *Single* frame. One click on the playback screen represents playback or adverse playback of one frame. It is also feasible to use button  in toolbar.
- **Using the Front Panel:**
Rotate the inner control on Jog Shuttle counterclockwise or press the  button to set the speed to *Single* frame. One click on button  represents playback or adverse playback of one frame.

6.2.2 Smart Search

Purpose:

In order to locate motion detection event easily and accurately in the playback progress bar, you are allowed to analyze a certain area (scene) dynamically, and to get all of the related motion detection events that occurred in this area.

Steps:

1. Go to Playback interface and play the video.

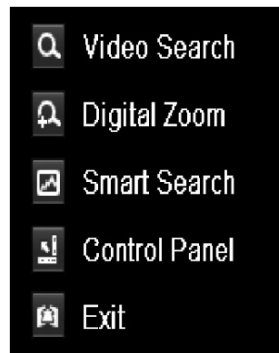


Figure 6.31 Right-click Menu under Playback

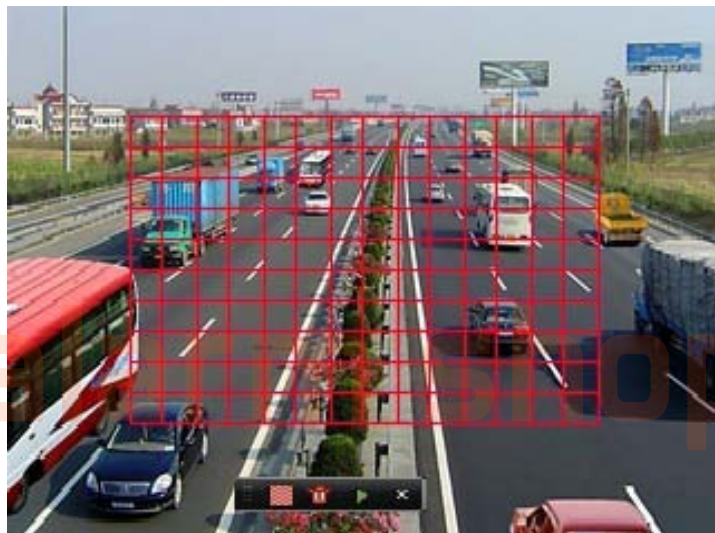


Figure 6.32 Draw Area of Smart Search

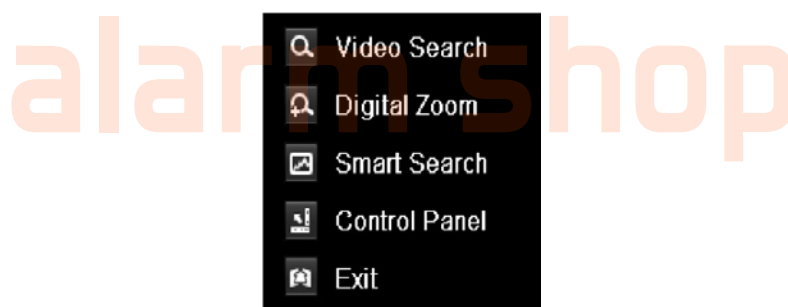


Figure 6.36 Right-click Menu under Playback

CHAPTER 7

Backup

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7.1 Backing up Record Files

7.1.1 Quick Export

Purpose:

Export record files to backup device(s) quickly.

Steps:

1. Enter Video Export interface.

Choose the channel(s) you want to back up and press **Quick Export** button.

Note:

1. The DVR must be connected with local backup device before quick export.
2. The time duration of record files on a specified channel cannot exceed one day. Otherwise, the message box "Max. 24 hours are allowed for synchronous quick export." will pop up.
3. The number of channels for synchronous export cannot exceed 4. Otherwise, the message box "Max. 4 channels are allowed for synchronous quick export." will pop up.

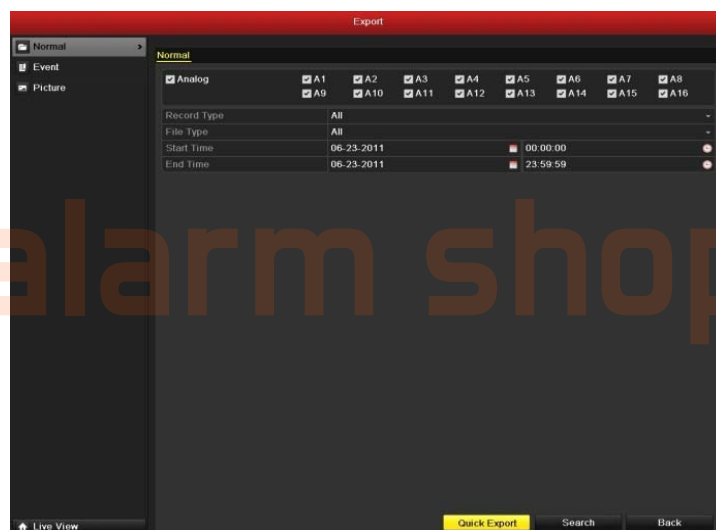


Figure 7.1 Quick Export Interface

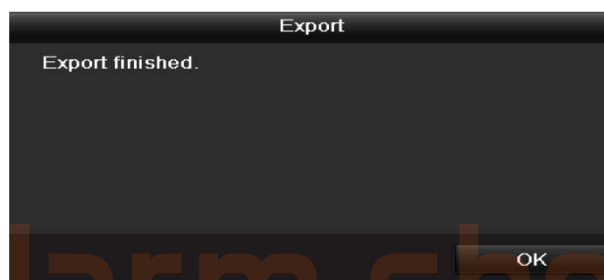


Figure 7.3 Export Finished

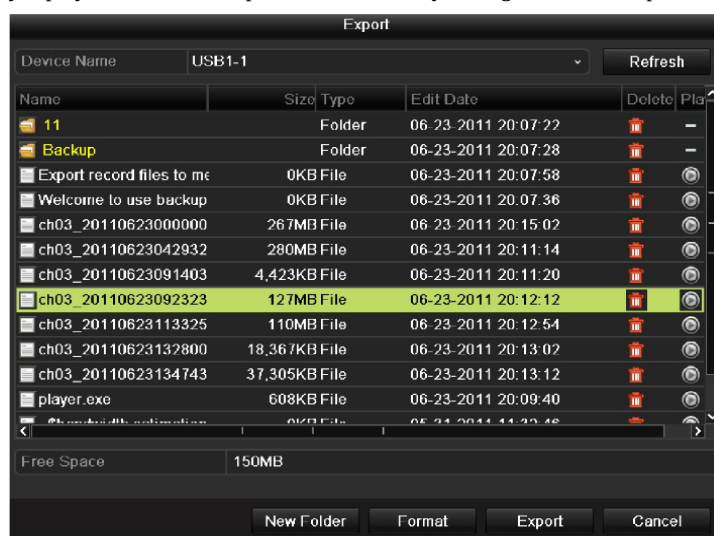


Figure 7.4 Checkup of Quick Export Result Using USB1-1

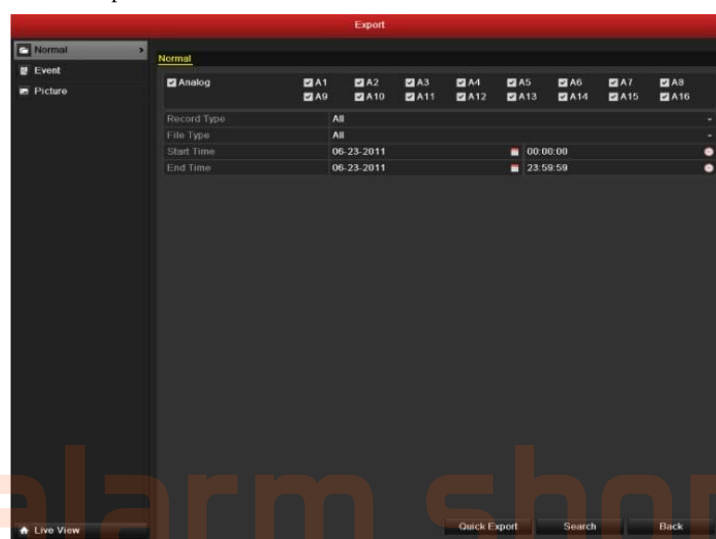


Figure 7.5 Normal Video Search for Backup

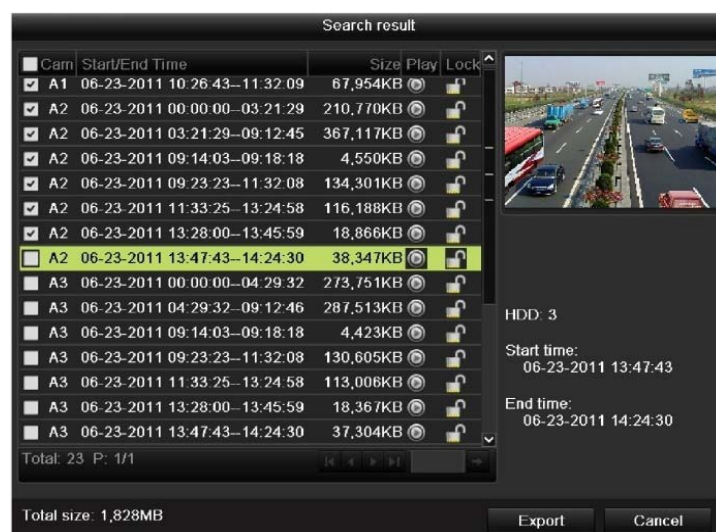


Figure 7.6 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

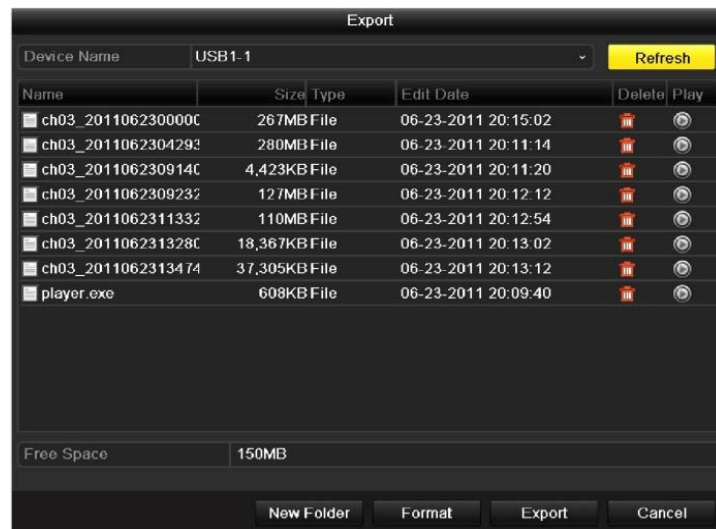


Figure 7.7 Export by Normal Video Search using USB Flash Drive

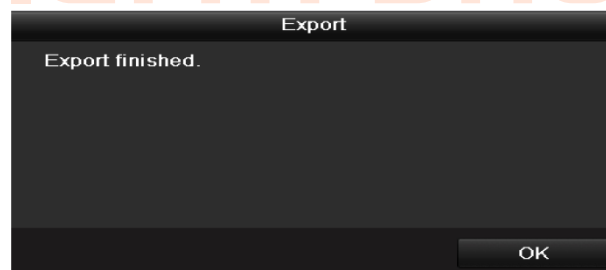


Figure 7.8 Export Finished

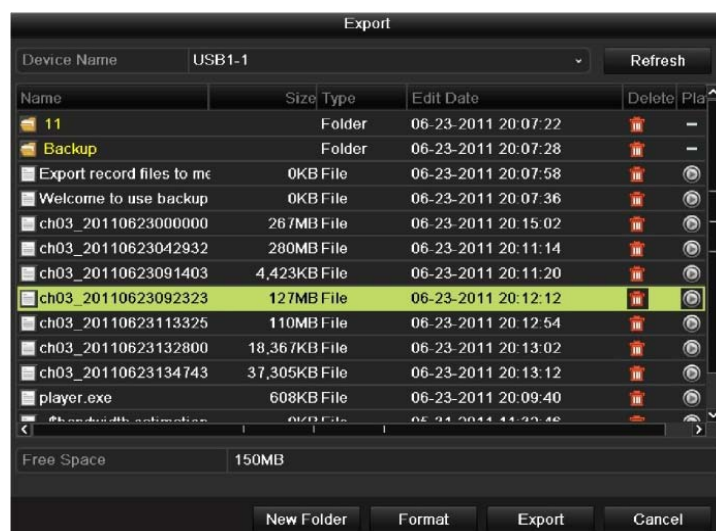


Figure 7.9 Checkup of Export Result using USB Flash Drive

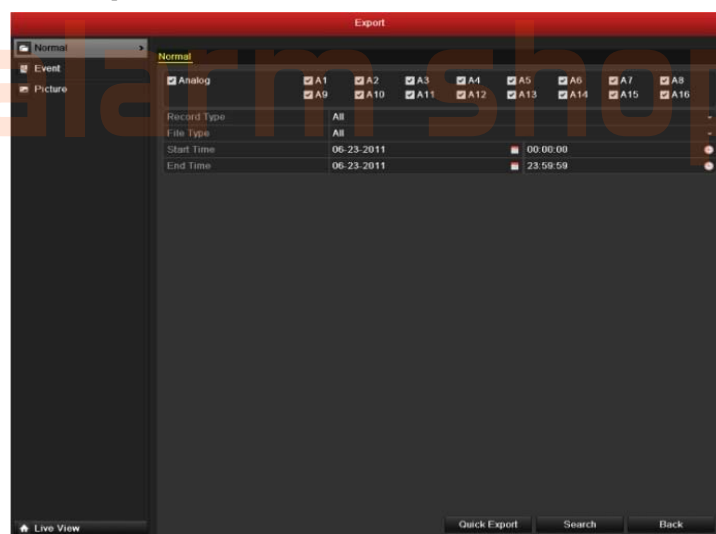


Figure 7.10 Normal Video Search for Backup

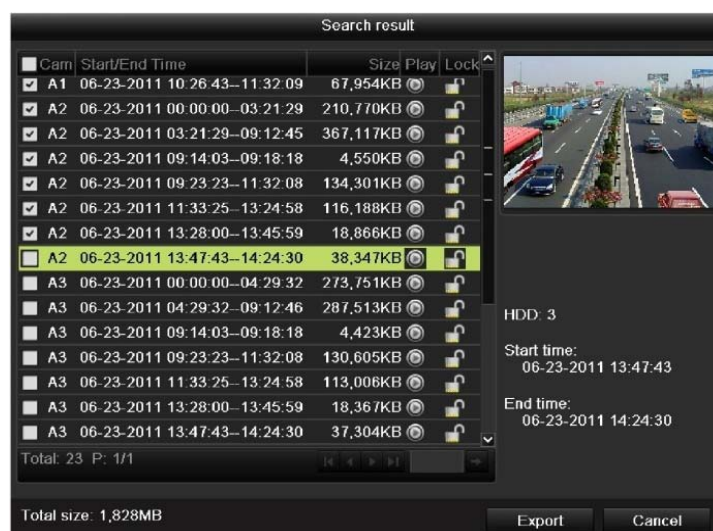


Figure 7.11 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

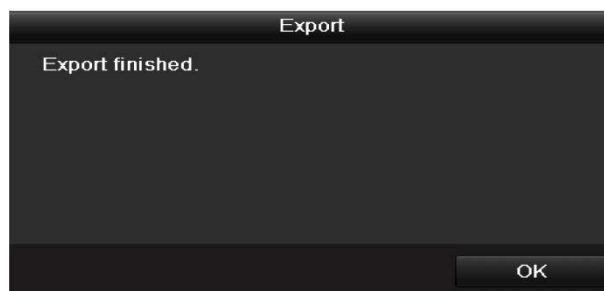


Figure 7.13 Export Finished

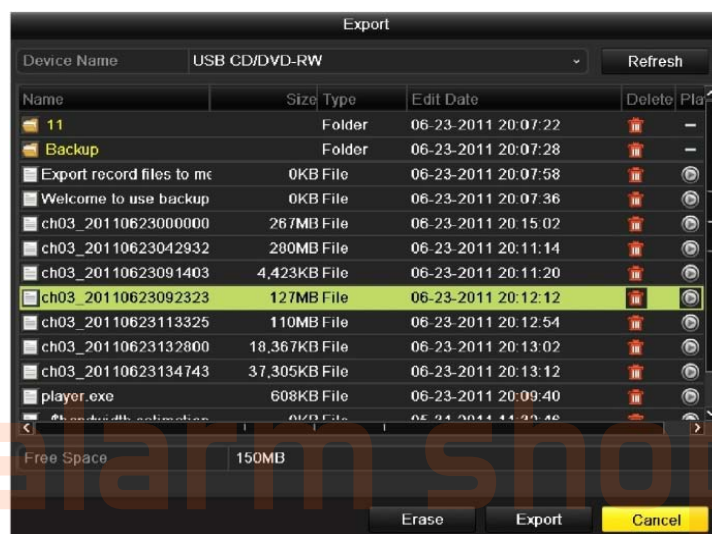


Figure 7.14 Checkup of Export Result using USB Writer

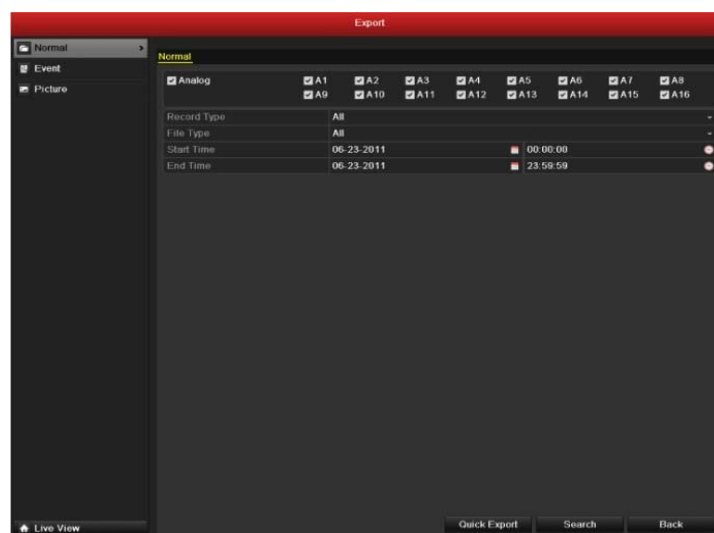


Figure 7.15 Normal Video Search for Backup

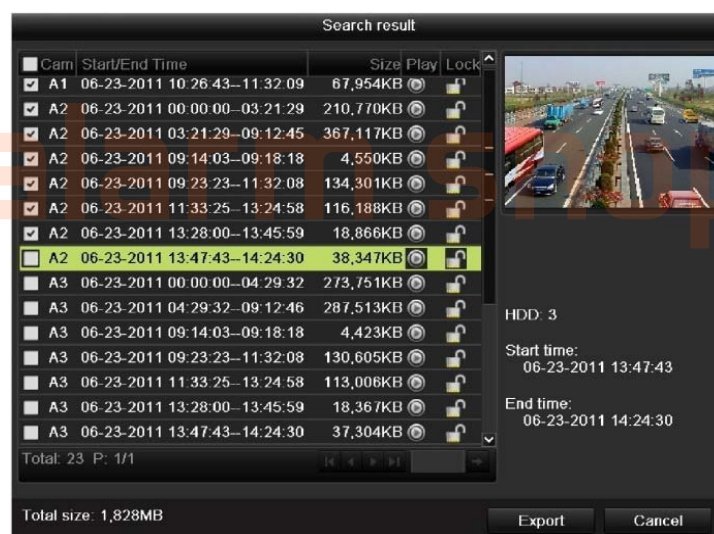


Figure 7.16 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

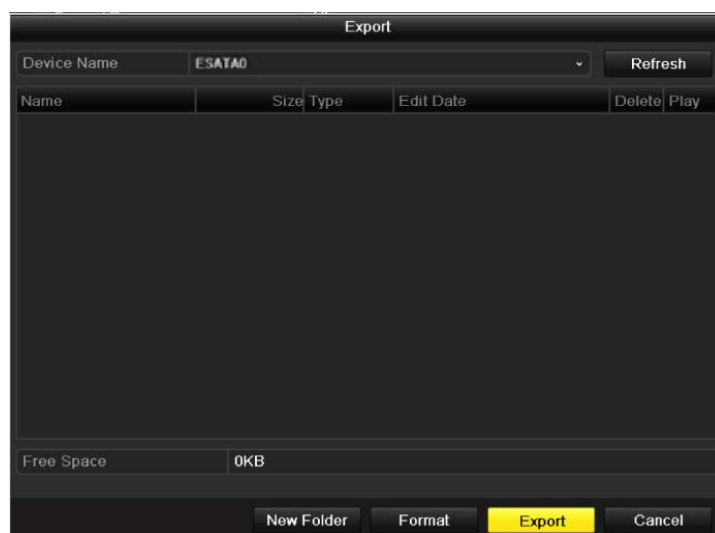


Figure 7.17 Export by Normal Video Search Using eSATA HDD

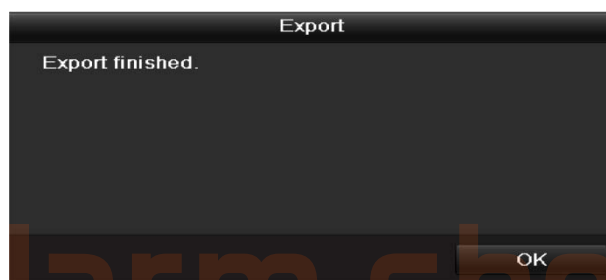


Figure 7.18 Export Finished

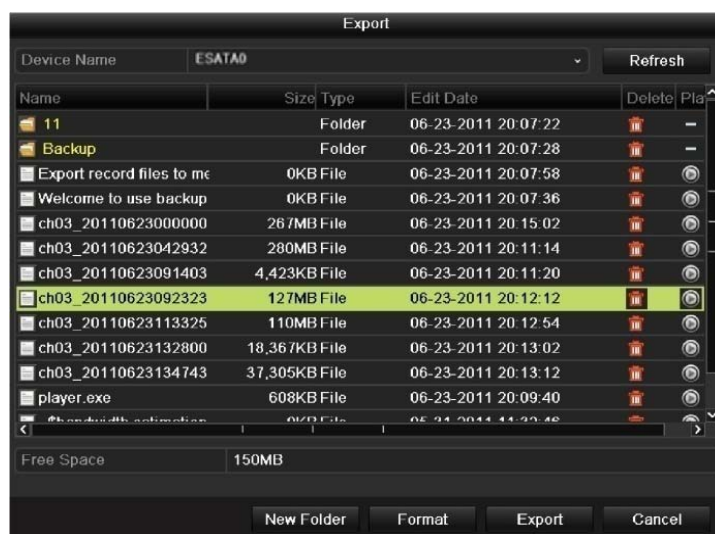


Figure 7.19 Checkup of Export Result Using eSATA HDD

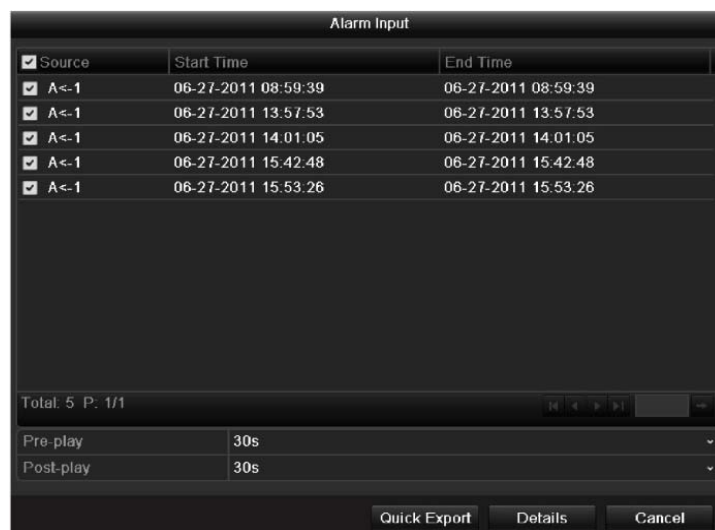


Figure 7.21 Result of Event Search

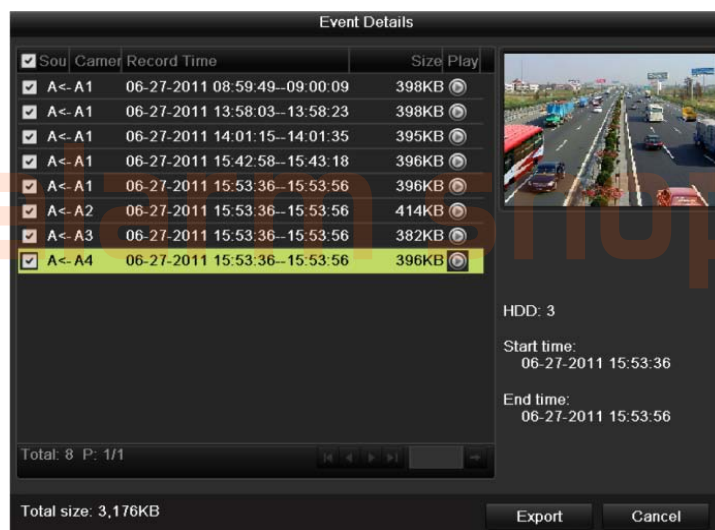


Figure 7.22 Event Details Interface

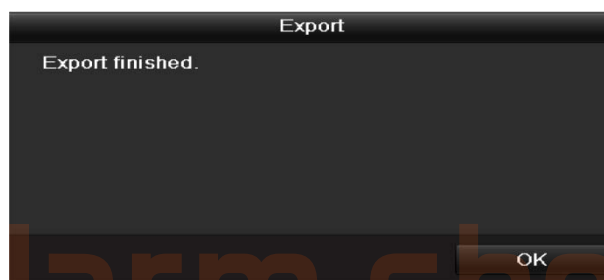


Figure 7.24 Export Finished

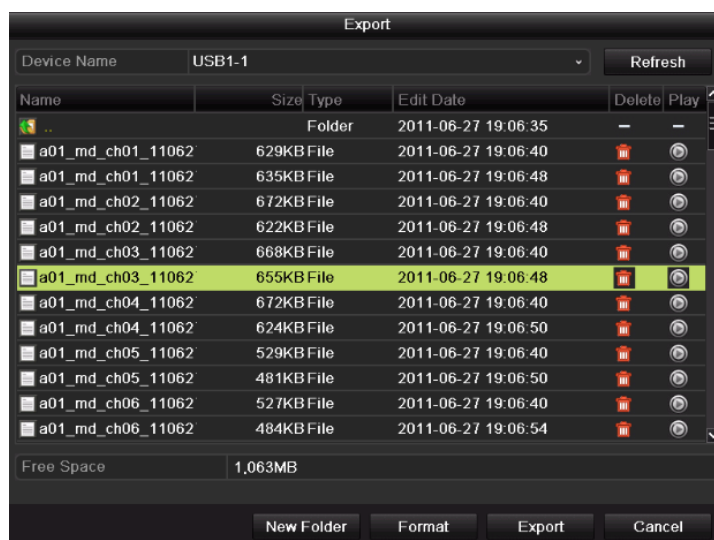


Figure 7.25 Checkup of Event Export Result Using USB Flash Drive

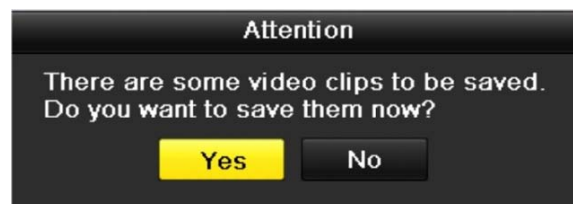


Figure 7.27 Attention to Video Clip Saving

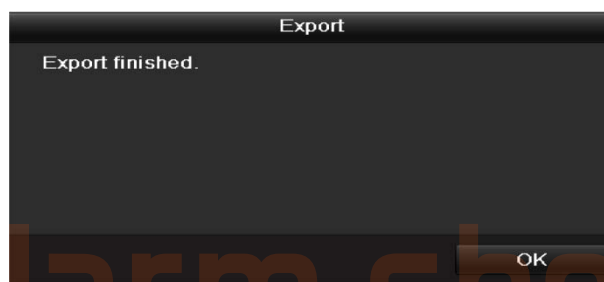


Figure 7.29 Export Finished

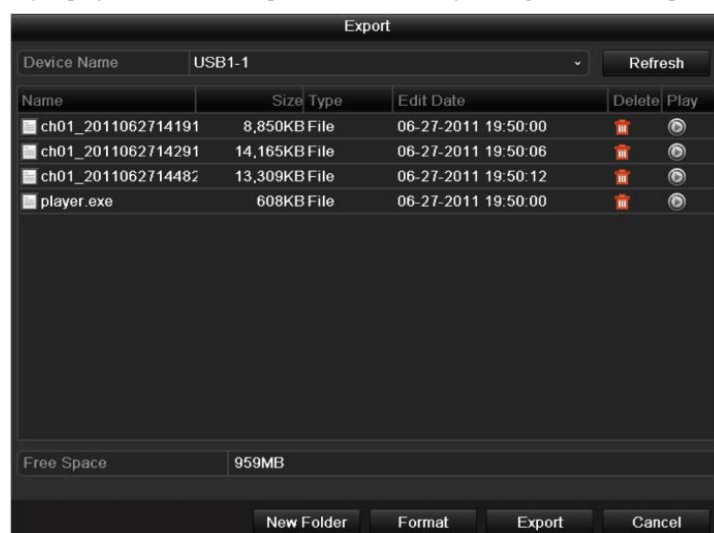


Figure 7.30 Checkup of Video Clips Export Result Using USB Flash Drive

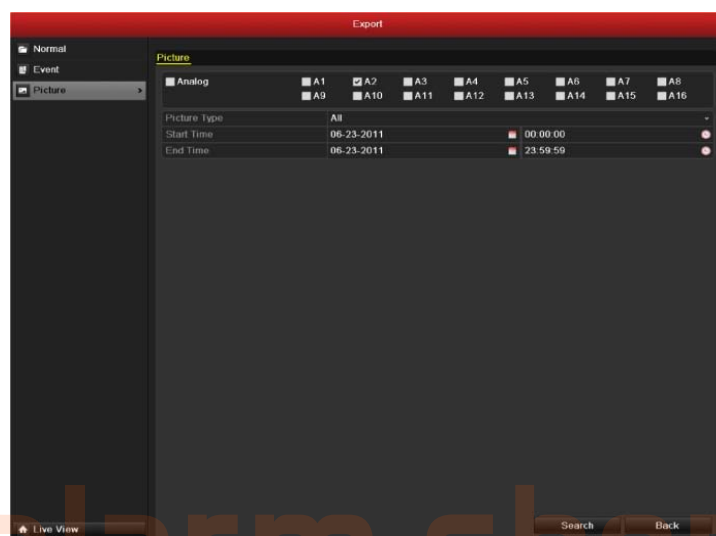


Figure 7.31 Picture Search for Backup

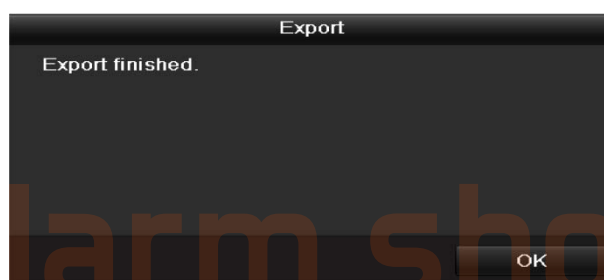


Figure 7.34 Export Finished

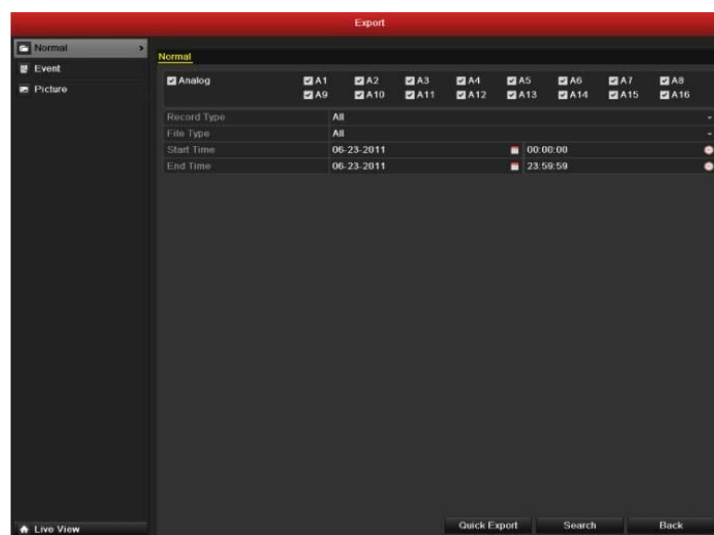


Figure 7.36 Normal Video Search for Backup

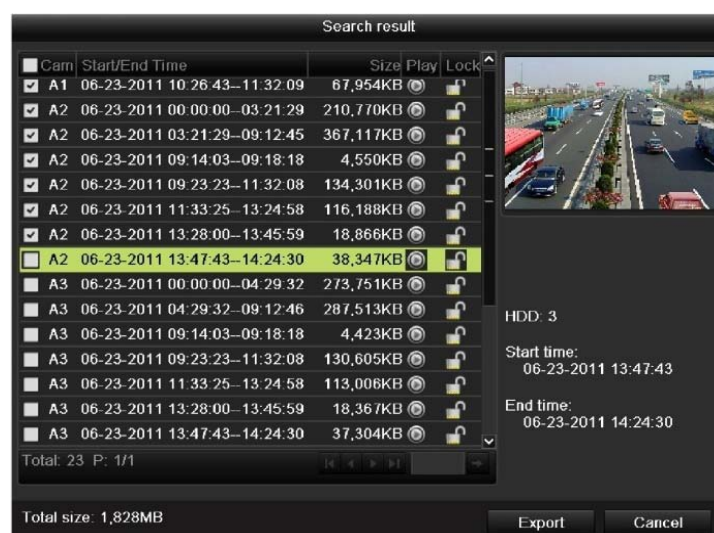


Figure 7.37 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

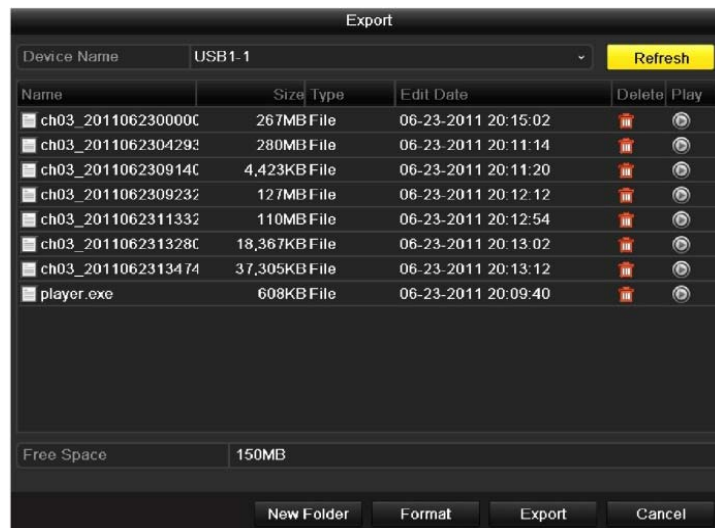


Figure 7.38 USB Flash Drive Management

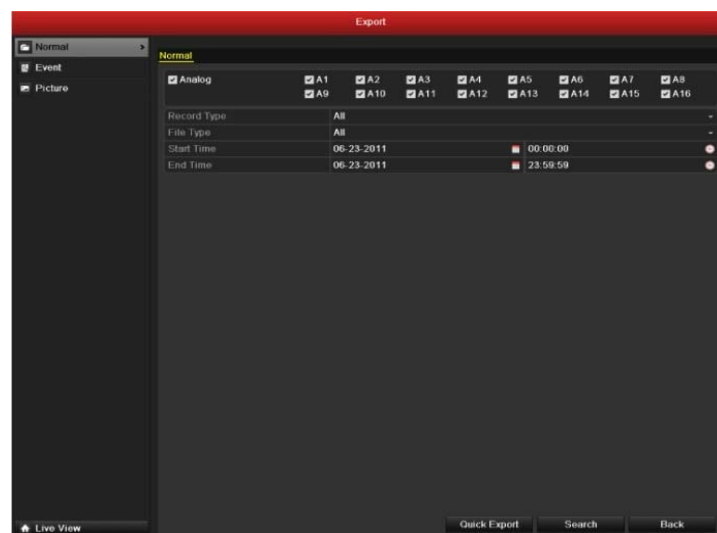


Figure 7.39 Normal Video Search for Backup

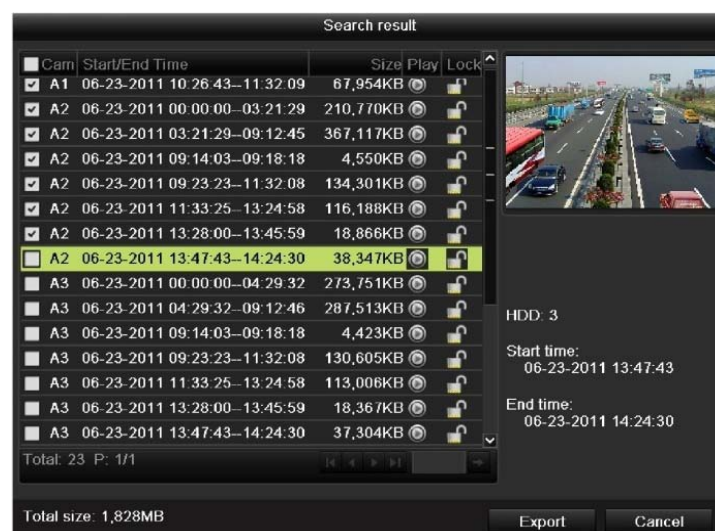


Figure 7. 40 Result of Normal Video Search for Backup

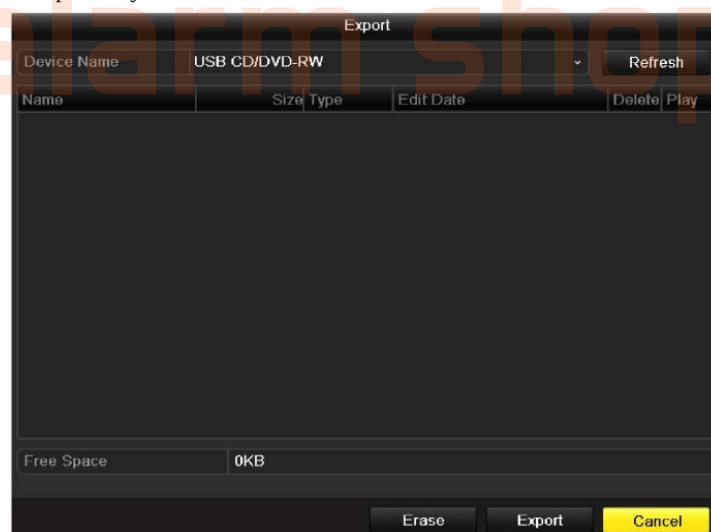


Figure 7.41 USB Writer Management

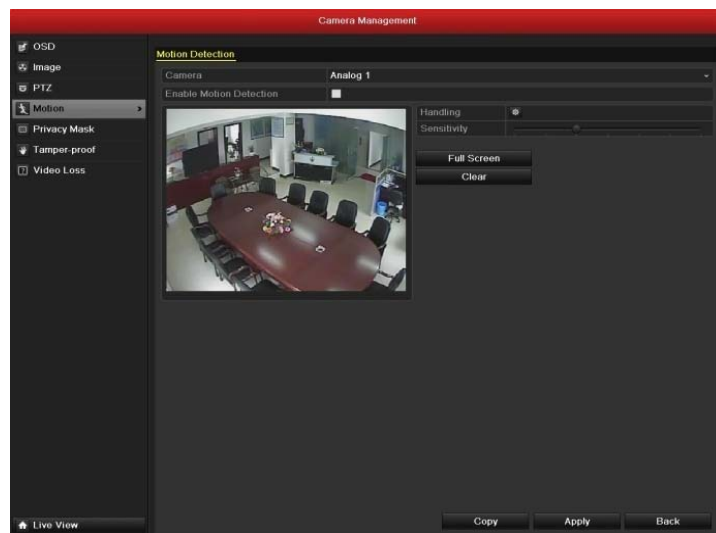


Figure 8.1 Motion Detection Setup Interface

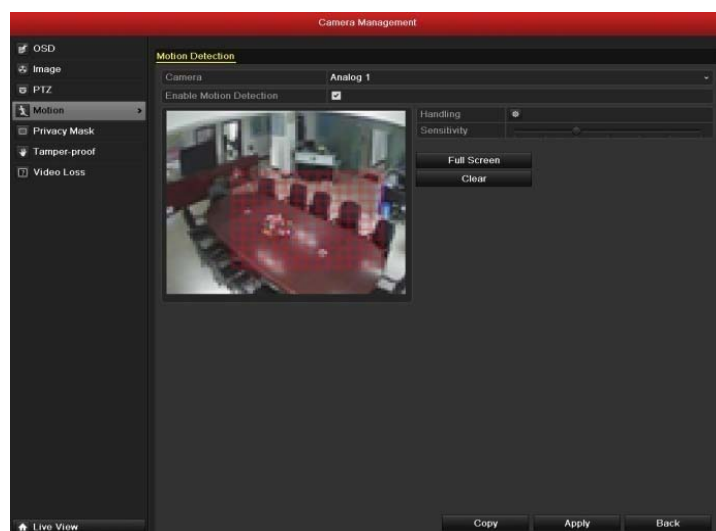


Figure 8.2 Set Detection Area and Sensitivity

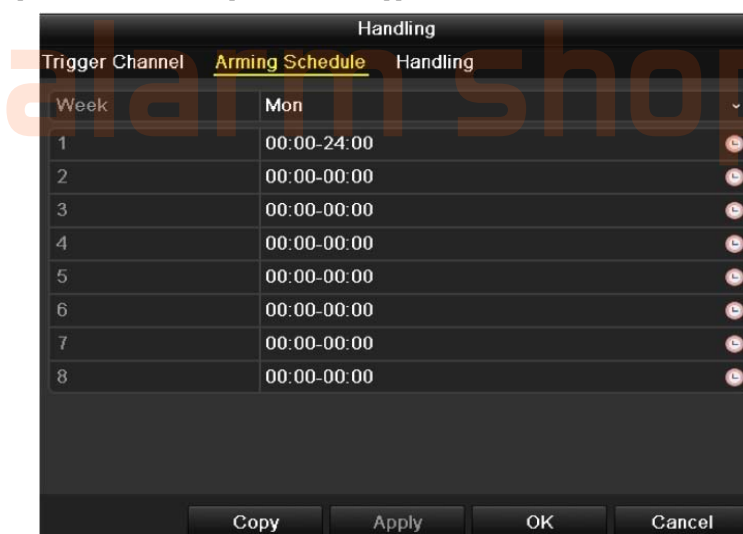


Figure 8.4 Set Arming Schedule of Motion Detection

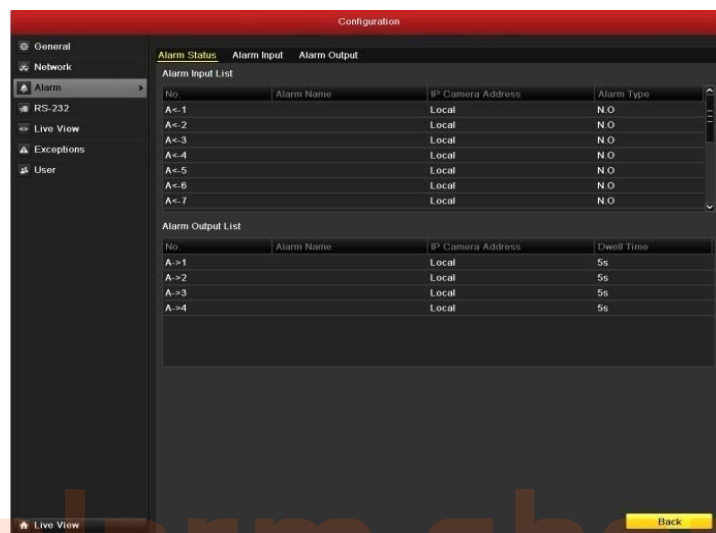


Figure 8.6 Alarm Status Interface of System Configuration

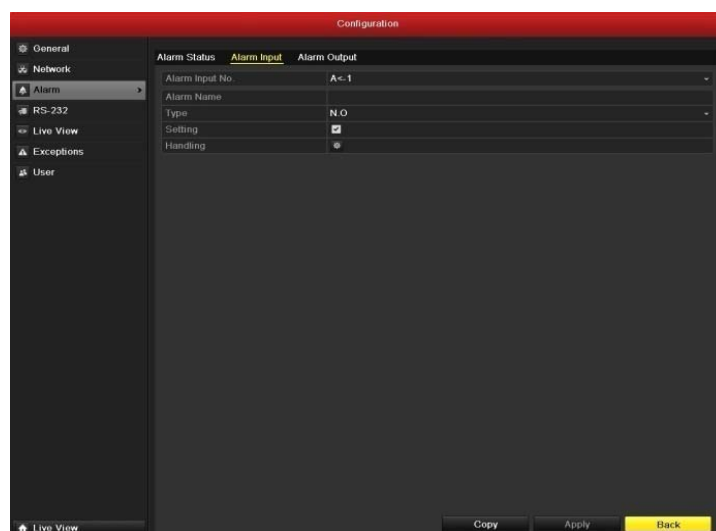


Figure 8.7 Alarm Input Setup Interface

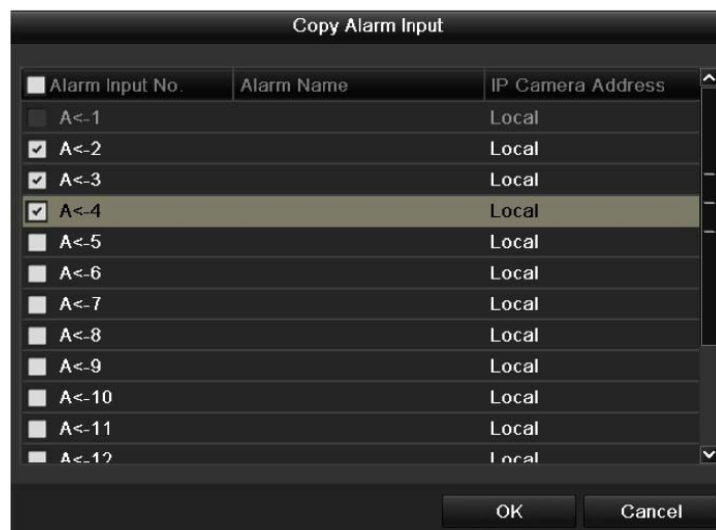


Figure 8.10 Copy Settings of Alarm Input

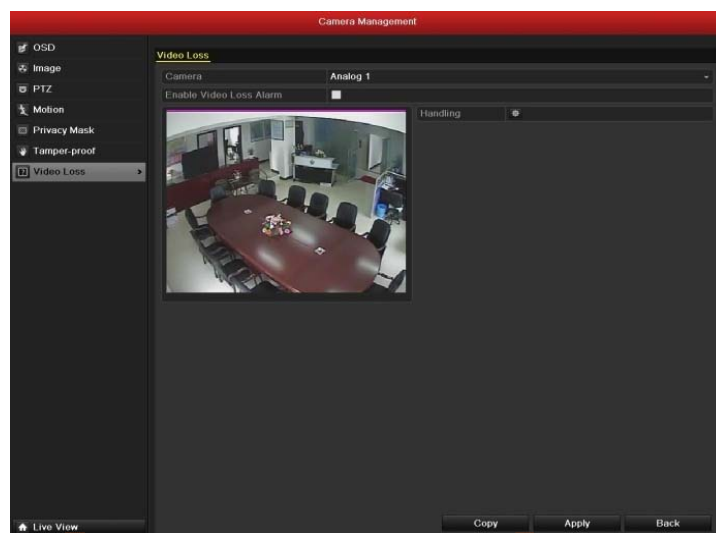


Figure 8.11 Video Loss Setup Interface

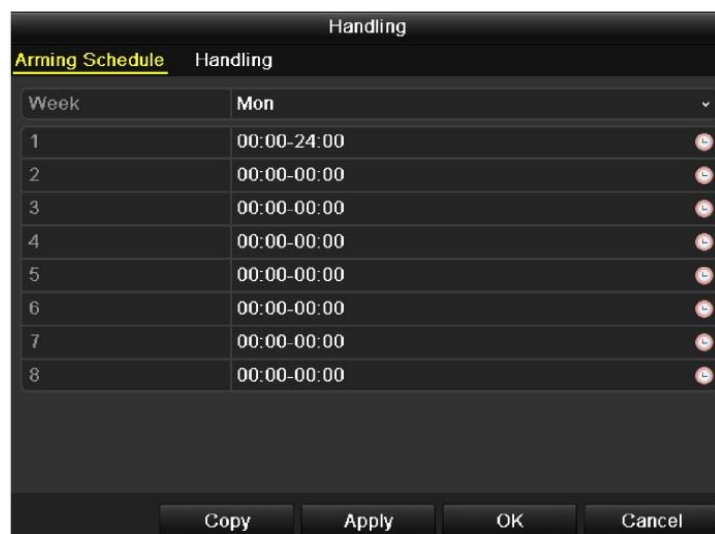


Figure 8.13 Set Arming Schedule of Video Loss

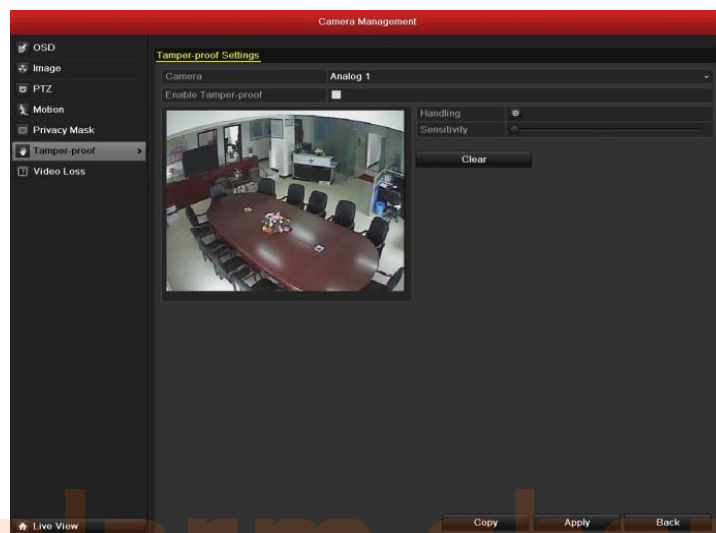


Figure 8.15 Tamper-proof Setup Interface

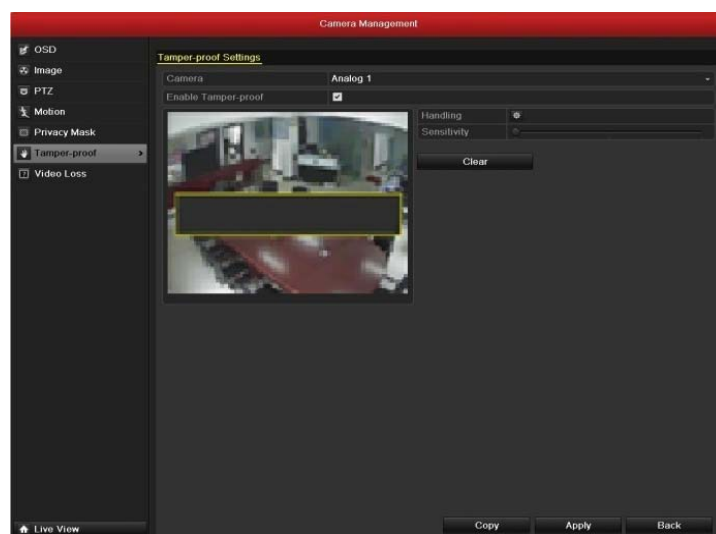


Figure 8.16 Set Detection Area and Sensitivity of Video Tampering

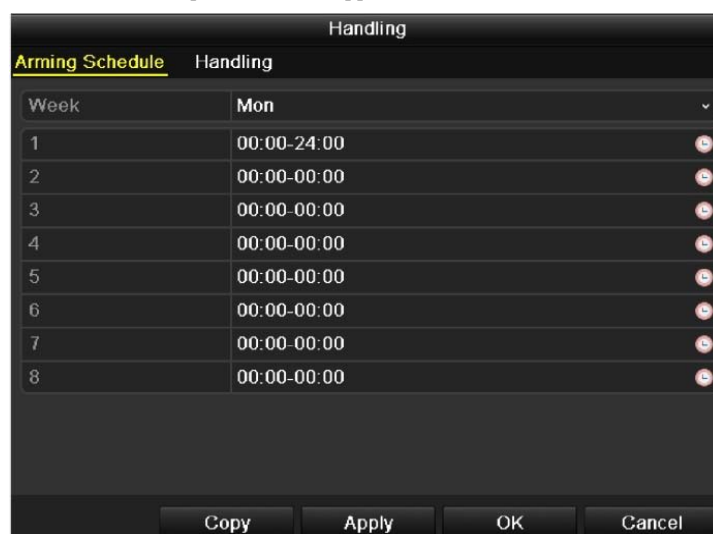


Figure 8.17 Set Arming Schedule of Video Tampering

8.5 Handling Exceptions

- **Network Disconnected:** Disconnected network cable.
- **IP Conflicted:** Duplicated IP address.
- **Illegal Login:** Incorrect user ID or password.
- **Abnormal Video Signal:** Unstable video signal.
- **Input / Output Video Standard Mismatch:** I/O video standards do not match.
- **Abnormal Record/Capture:** No space for saving recorded files or captured images.

Steps:

Enter Exception interface of System Configuration and handle various exceptions.

Menu> Configuration> Exceptions

Please refer to *Chapter 8.6* for detailed alarm response actions.

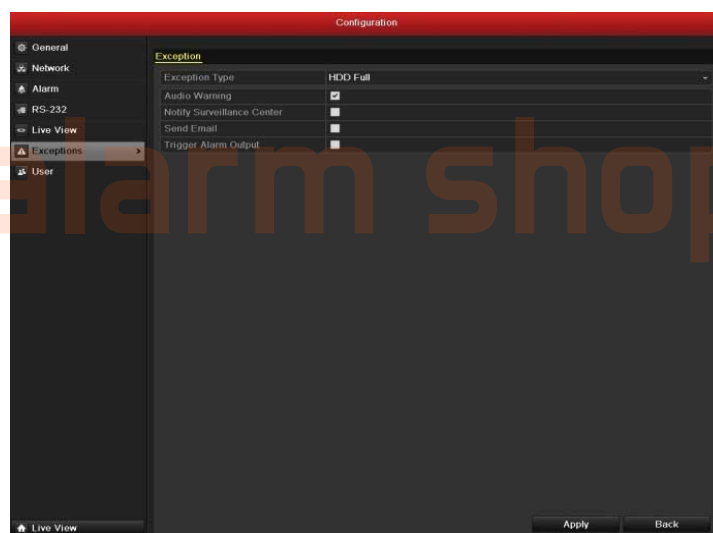


Figure 8.19 Exceptions Setup Interface

8.6 Alarm Response Actions

Purpose:

Alarm response actions will be activated when an alarm or exception occurs, including Full Screen Monitoring, Audible Warning (buzzer), Notify Surveillance Center, Upload Picture to FTP, Trigger Alarm Output and Send Email.

Full Screen Monitoring

When an alarm is triggered, the local monitor (VGA/HDMI or BNC monitor) display in full screen the video image from the alarming channel configured for full screen monitoring.

If alarms are triggered simultaneously in several channels, their full-screen images will be switched at an interval of 10 seconds (default dwell time). A different dwell time can be set by going to Menu > Configuration > Live View > Full Screen Monitoring Dwell Time.

Auto-switch will terminate once the alarm stops and you will be taken back to the Live View interface.

Note: You must select during “Trigger Channel” settings the channel(s) you want to make full screen monitoring.

Audible Warning

Trigger an audible *beep* when an alarm is detected.

Notify Surveillance Center

Sends an exception or alarm signal to remote alarm host when an event occurs. The alarm host refers to the PC installed with Remote Client.

Note: The alarm signal will be transmitted automatically at detection mode when remote alarm host is configured. Please refer to *Chapter 9.2.6* for details of alarm host configuration.

Upload Captured Pictures to FTP

Capture the image when an alarm is triggered and upload the picture to a FTP server.

Note: Please set up FTP address and the remote FTP server first.

Email Linkage

Send an email with alarm information to a user or users when an alarm is detected.

Please refer to *Chapter 9.2.10* for details of Email configuration.

Trigger Alarm Output

Trigger an alarm output when an alarm is triggered.

1. Enter Alarm Output interface.

Menu> Configuration> Alarm> Alarm Output

Select an alarm output and set alarm name and dwell time. Press **Schedule** button to set the arming schedule of alarm output.

Note: If “Manually Clear” is selected in the dropdown list of Dwell Time, you can clear it only by going to Menu> Manual> Alarm.

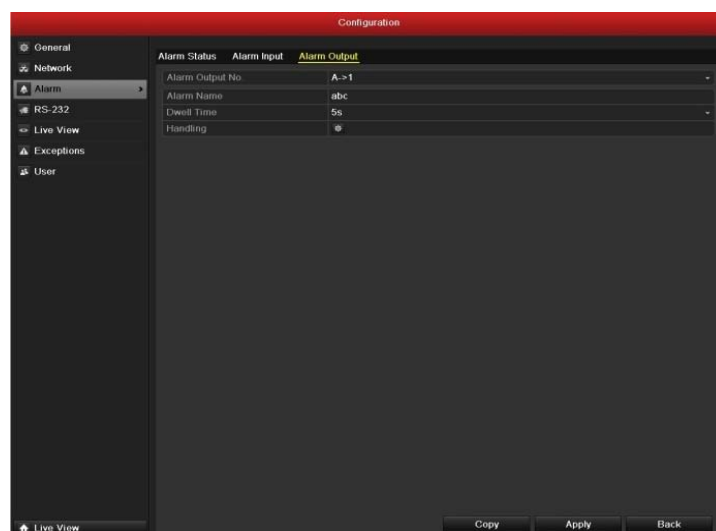


Figure 8.20 Alarm Output Setup Interface

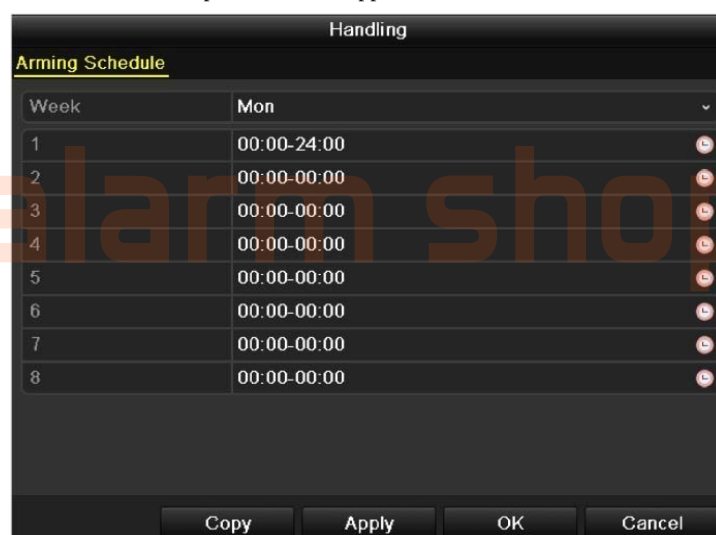


Figure 8.21 Set Arming Schedule of Alarm Output

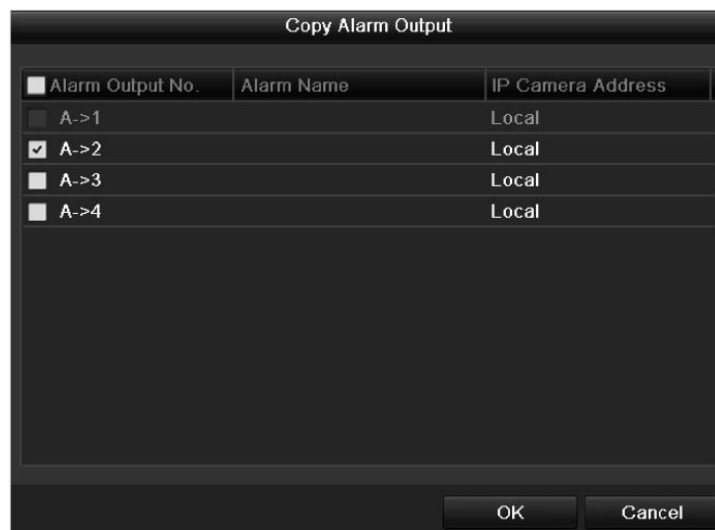


Figure 8.22 Copy Settings of Alarm Output

8.7 Triggering or Clearing Alarm Output Manually

Press **Clear All** button if you want to clear all alarm output.

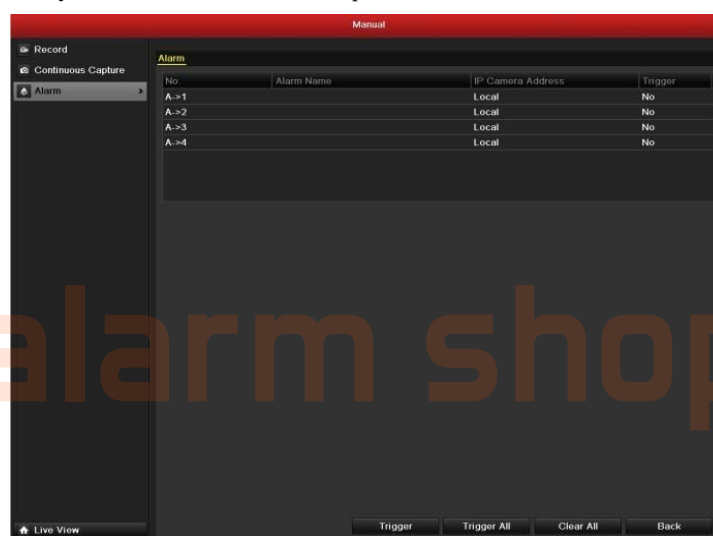


Figure 8.23 Clear or Trigger Alarm Output Manually

Network Settings

alarm shop

9.1 Configuring General Settings

Purpose:

Network settings must be properly configured before you operate DVR over network.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.

Menu > Configuration > Network

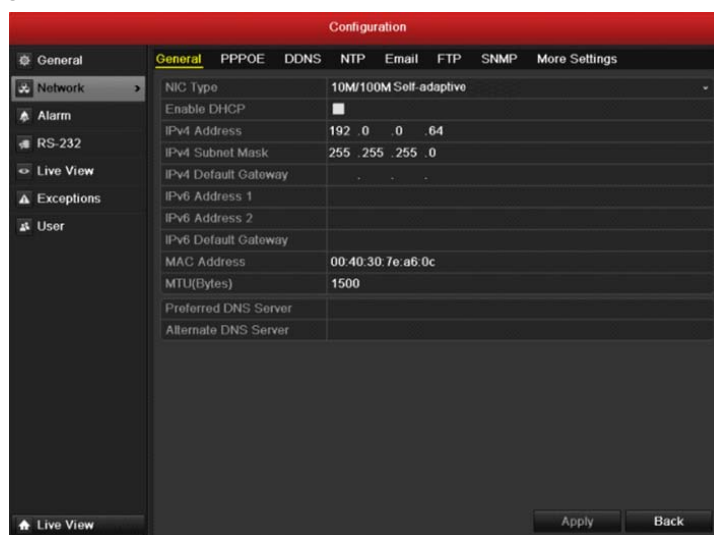


Figure 9.1 Network Settings Interface

2. Select the **General** tab.
3. In the **General Settings** interface, you can configure the following settings: NIC Type, IPv4 Address, IPv4 Gateway, MTU and DNS Server.

If the DHCP server is available, you can check the checkbox of **DHCP** to automatically obtain an IP address and other network settings from that server.

Note: The valid value range of MTU is 500 ~ 1500.

4. After having configured the general settings, click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

9.2 Configuring Advanced Settings

9.2.1 Configuring PPPoE Settings

Purpose:

Your DVR also allows access by Point-to-Point Protocol over Ethernet (PPPoE).

Steps:

1. Enter the **Network Settings** interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network

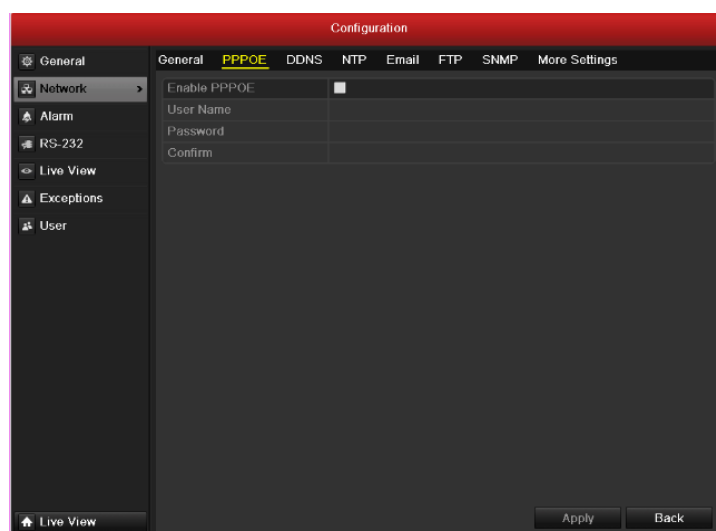


Figure 9.2 PPPoE Settings Interface

2. Select the **PPPoE** tab to enter the PPPoE Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.2.

3. Check the **PPPoE** checkbox to enable this feature.
4. Enter **User Name**, **Password**, and **Confirm Password** for PPPoE access.

Note: The User Name and Password should be assigned by your ISP.

5. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.
6. After successful settings, the system will ask you to reboot the device to enable the settings, and the PPPoE dial-up will be automatically connected after reboot.

You can go to Menu > Maintenance > System Info > Network interface to view the status of PPPoE connection.

Please refer to *Chapter 12.1 Viewing System Information* for PPPoE status.

9.2.2 Configuring DDNS

Purpose:

If your DVR is set to use PPPoE as its default network connection, you may set Dynamic DNS (DDNS) to be used for network access.

Prior registration with your ISP is required before configuring the system to use DDNS.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Select the **DDNS** tab to enter the DDNS Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.4.

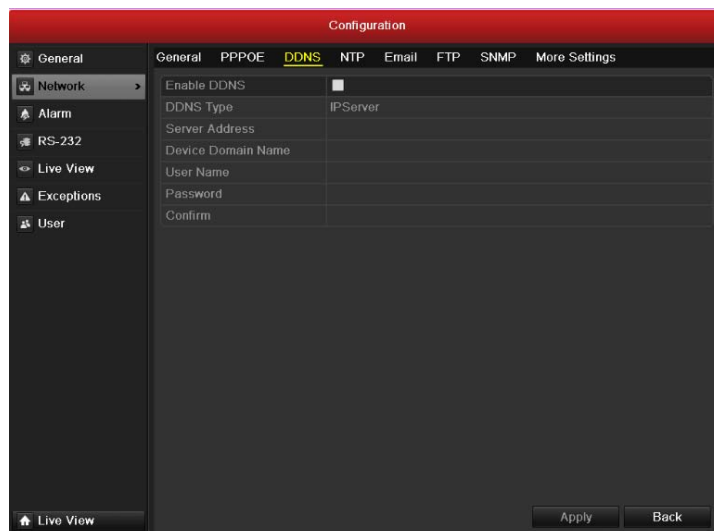


Figure 9.3 DDNS Settings Interface

3. Check the **DDNS** checkbox to enable this feature.
4. Select **DDNS Type**. Four different DDNS types are selectable: IPServer, DynDNS, PeanutHull and NO-IP.
 - **IPServer:** Enter **Server Address** for IPServer.

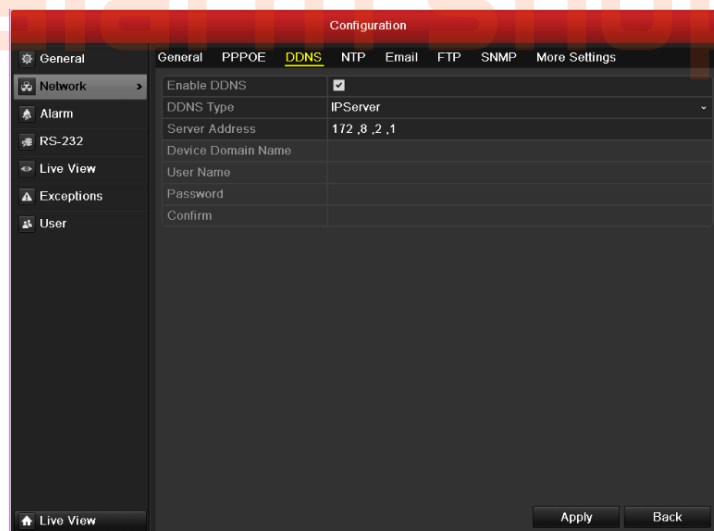


Figure 9.4 IPServer Settings Interface

- **DynDNS:**
 - 1) Enter **Server Address** for DynDNS (i.e. members.dyndns.org).
 - 2) In the DVR Domain Name text field, enter the domain obtained from the DynDNS website.
 - 3) Enter the **User Name** and **Password** registered in the DynDNS website.

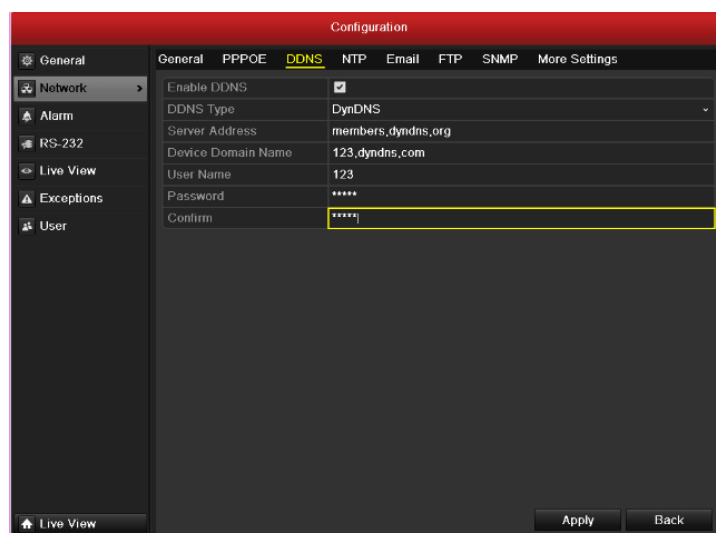


Figure 9.5 DynDNS Settings Interface

- **PeanutHull:** Enter User Name and Password obtained from the PeanutHull website.

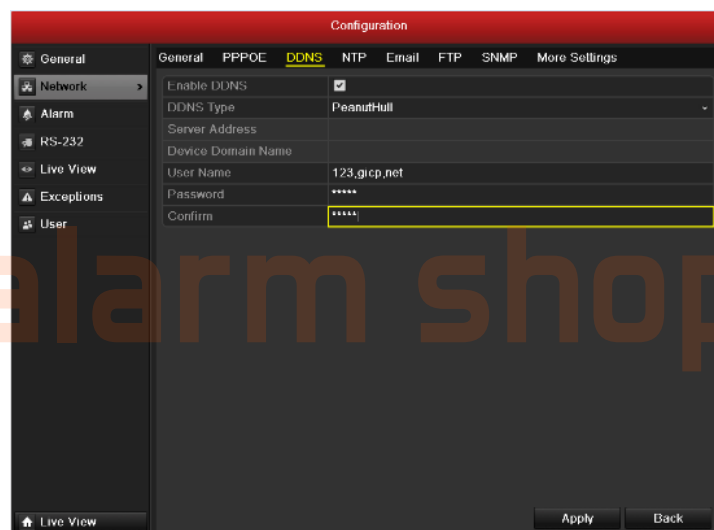


Figure 9.6 Peanut Hull Settings Interface

- **NO-IP:**

Enter the account information in the corresponding fields. Refer to the DynDNS settings.

- 1) Enter **Server Address** for NO-IP.
- 2) In the DVR Domain Name text field, enter the domain obtained from the NO-IP website (www.no-ip.com).
- 3) Enter the **User Name** and **Password** registered in the NO-IP website.

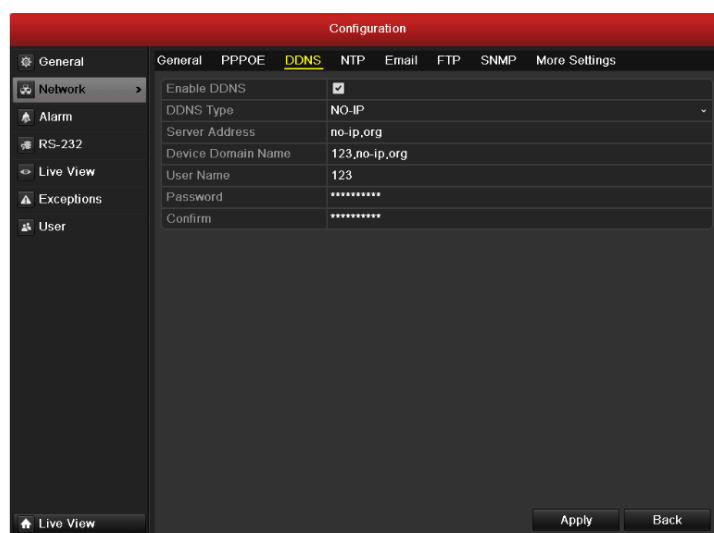


Figure 9.7 NO-IP Settings Interface

5. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

9.2.3 Configuring NTP Server

Purpose:

A Network Time Protocol (NTP) Server can be configured on the DVR to ensure the accuracy of system date/time.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Select the **NTP** tab to enter the NTP Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.9.

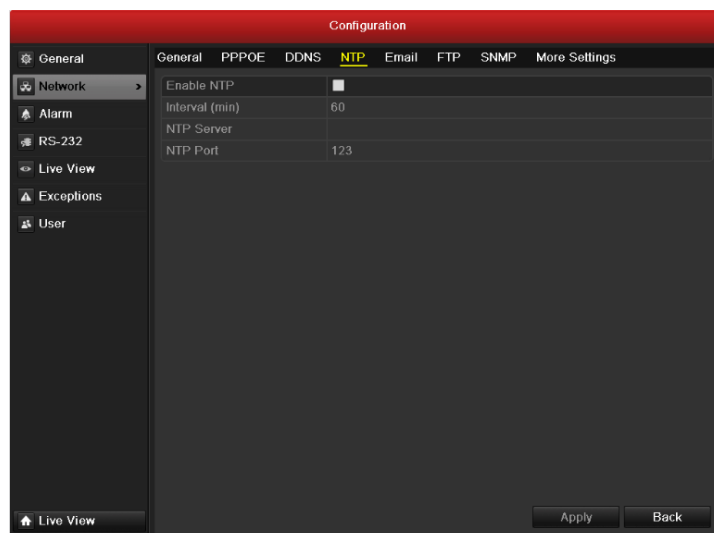


Figure 9.8 NTP Settings Interface

3. Check the **Enable NTP** checkbox to enable this feature.
4. Configure the following NTP settings:
 - **Interval:** Time interval between the two synchronizing actions with NTP server. The unit is minute.
 - **NTP Server:** IP address of NTP server.

- **NTP Port:** Port of NTP server.

5. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

Note: The time synchronization interval can be set from 1 to 10080min, and the default value is 60min. If the DVR is connected to a public network, you should use a NTP server that has a time synchronization function, such as the server at the National Time Center (IP Address: 210.72.145.44). If the DVR is setup in a more customized network, NTP software can be used to establish a NTP server used for time synchronization.

9.2.4 Configuring FTP Server

Purpose:

The FTP can be configured on your DVR to realize dual-directional transmission of control files over Internet. And the captured pictures of DVR can be uploaded to FTP server as well.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network

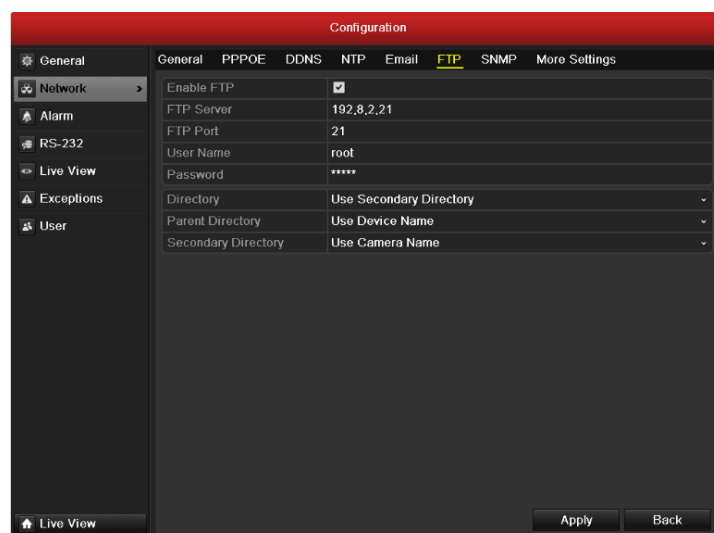


Figure 9.10 Configure FTP Settings

2. Select the **FTP** tab to enter the FTP Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.10.

3. Check the **Enable NTP** checkbox to enable this feature.
4. Configure the FTP settings, including FTP server, port, user name, password and the directory.

Directory: In the **Directory** field, you can select the Root Directory, Parent directory and secondary directory. When the Parent Directory is selected, you have the option to use the Device Name, Device No or Device IP used for the name of the directory; and the when the Secondary Directory is selected, you can use the Camera Name or Camera No. as the name of the directory.

5. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

Note: Please make sure the remote FTP server has been started up before setting the FTP parameters.

9.2.5 Configuring SNMP

Purpose:

You can use SNMP protocol to get device status and parameters related information.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Select the **SNMP** tab to enter the SNMP Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.12.

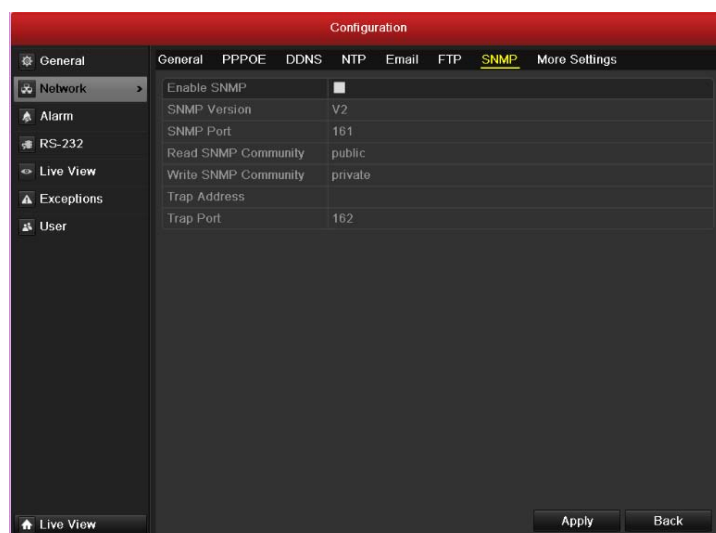


Figure 9.11 SNMP Settings Interface

3. Check the **SNMP** checkbox to enable this feature.
4. Configure the SNMP settings.

5. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

Note: Before setting the SNMP, please download SNMP software and manage to receive the device information via SNMP port. By setting the Trap Address, the DVR is allowed to send the alarm event and exception message to the surveillance center.

9.2.6 Configuring Remote Alarm Host

Purpose:

With a remote alarm host configured, the DVR will send the alarm event or exception message to the host when an alarm is triggered. The remote alarm host must have the Network Video Surveillance software installed.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Select the **More Settings** tab to enter the More Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.14.

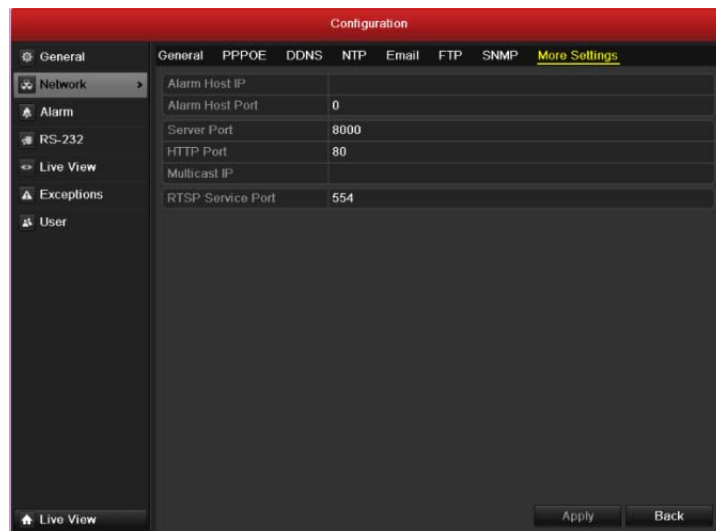


Figure 9.13 More Settings Interface

3. Enter **Alarm Host IP** and **Alarm Host Port** in the text fields.

The **Alarm Host IP** refers to the IP address of the remote PC on which the Network Video Surveillance Software (e.g., iVMS-4000) is installed, and the **Alarm Host Port** must be the same as the alarm monitoring port configured in the software (default port is 0).

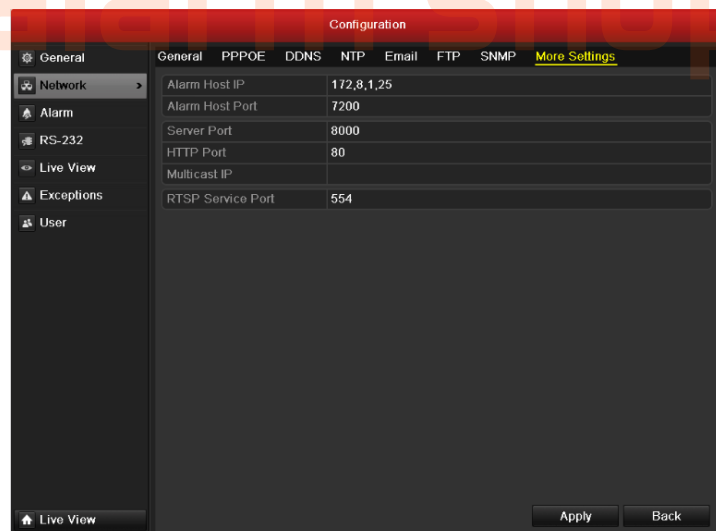


Figure 9.14 Configure Alarm Host

4. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

9.2.7 Configuring Multicast

Purpose:

The multicast can be configured to realize live view for more than 64 cameras through network.

A multicast address spans the Class-D IP range of 224.0.0.0 to 239.255.255.255. It is recommended to use the IP address ranging from 239.252.0.0 to 239.255.255.255.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Select the **More Settings** tab to enter the More Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.14.
3. Set **Multicast IP**, as shown in Figure 9.19. When adding a device to the Network Video Surveillance Software, the multicast address must be the same as the DVR's multicast IP.

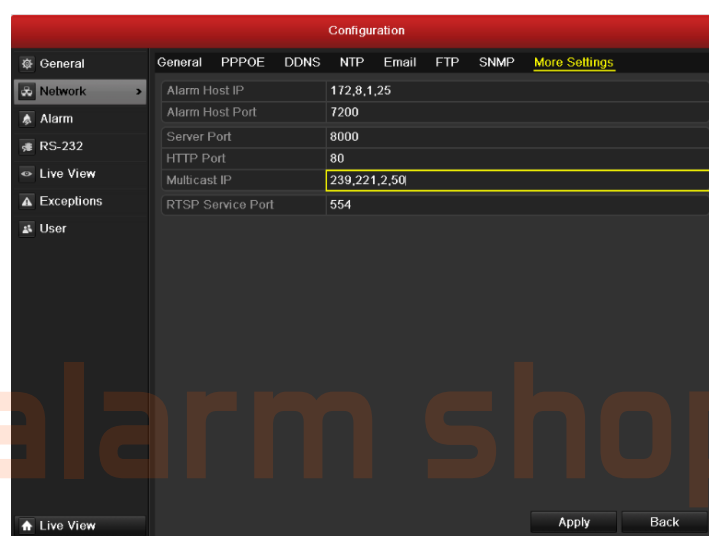


Figure 9.15 Configure Multicast

4. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

9.2.8 Configuring RTSP

Purpose:

The RTSP (Real Time Streaming Protocol) is a network control protocol designed for use in entertainment and communications systems to control streaming media servers.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings menu by clicking Menu > Configuration > Network.
2. Select the **More Settings** tab to enter the More Settings menu, as shown in Figure 9.14.

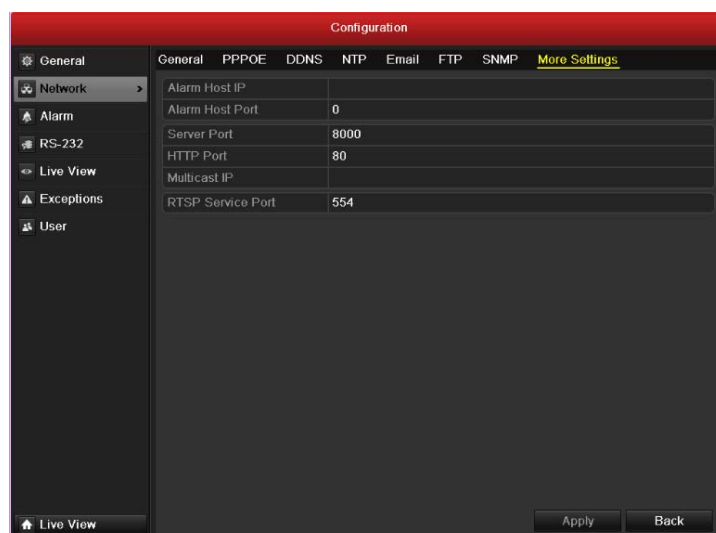


Figure 9.16 RTSP Settings Interface

3. Enter the RTSP port in the text field of **RTSP Service Port**. The default RTSP port is 554, and you can change it according to different requirements.
4. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the menu.

9.2.9 Configuring Server and HTTP Ports

Purpose:

You can change the server and HTTP ports in the Network Settings menu. The default server port is 8000 and the default HTTP port is 80.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Select the **More Settings** tab to enter the More Settings interface, as shown in Figure 9.14.
3. Enter new **Server Port** and **HTTP Port**, as shown in Figure 9.18.

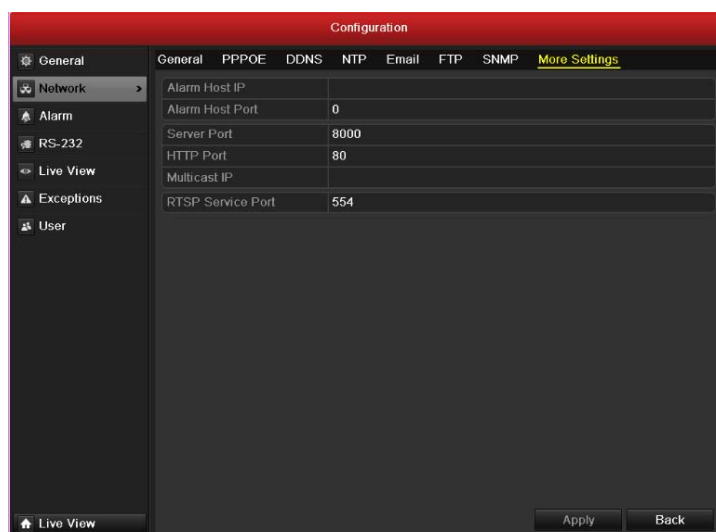


Figure 9.17 Host/Others Settings Menu

4. Enter the Server Port and HTTP Port in the text fields. The default Server Port is 8000 and the HTTP Port is 80, and you can change them according to different requirements.
5. Click the **Apply** button to save and exit the interface.

Note: The Server Port should be set to the range of 2000-65535 and it is used for remote client software access. The HTTP port is used for remote IE access.

9.2.10 Configuring Email

Purpose:

The system can be configured to send an Email notification to all designated users if an alarm event is detected, etc., an alarm or motion event is detected.

Before configuring the Email settings, the DVR must be connected to a local area network (LAN) that maintains an SMTP mail server. The network must also be connected to either an intranet or the Internet depending on the location of the e-mail accounts to which you want to send notification.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > Network
2. Set the IPv4 Address, IPv4 Subnet Mask, IPv4 Gateway and the Preferred DNS Server in the Network Settings menu, as shown in Figure 9.19.

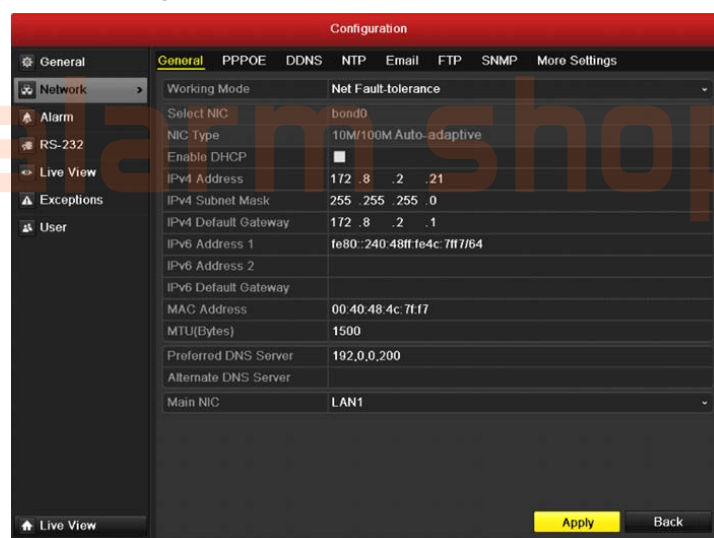


Figure 9.18 Network Settings Interface

3. Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.
4. Select the **Email** tab to enter the Email Settings interface.

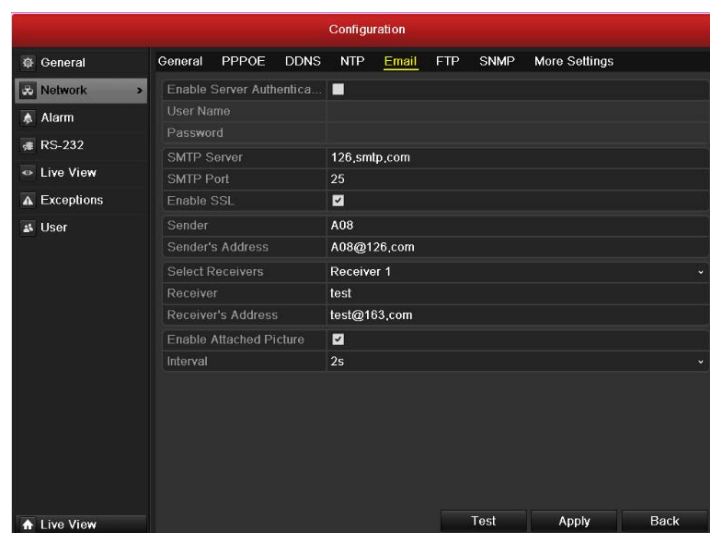


Figure 9.19 Email Settings Interface

5. Configure the following Email settings:

Enable Server Authentication (optional): Check the checkbox to enable the server authentication feature.

User Name: The user account of sender's Email for SMTP server authentication.

Password: The password of sender's Email for SMTP server authentication.

SMTP Server: The SMTP Server IP address or host name (e.g., smtp.263xmail.com).

SMTP Port No.: The SMTP port. The default TCP/IP port used for SMTP is 25.

Enable SSL(optional): Click the checkbox to enable SSL if required by the SMTP server.

Sender: The name of sender.

Sender's Address: The Email address of sender.

Select Receivers: Select the receiver. Up to 3 receivers can be configured.

Receiver: The name of user to be notified.

Receiver's Address: The Email address of user to be notified.

Enable Attached Picture: Check the checkbox of **Enable Attached Picture** if you want to send email with attached alarm images. The interval is the time of two adjacent alarm images.

Interval: The interval refers to the time between two actions of sending attached pictures.

E-mail Test: Sends a test message to verify that the SMTP server can be reached.

6. Click the **Apply** button to save the Email settings.

7. You can click the **Test** button to test whether your Email settings work. The corresponding Attention message box pops up. Refer to Figure 9.21.

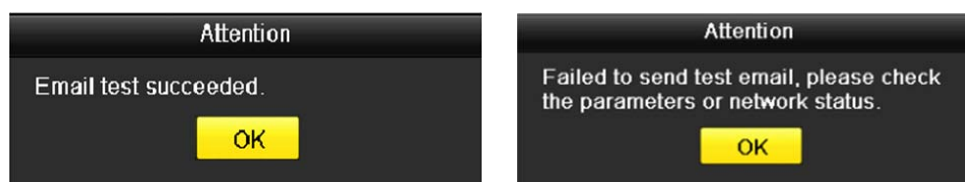


Figure 9.20 Email Testing Attention

9.3 Checking Network Traffic

Purpose:

You can check the network traffic to obtain real-time information of DVR such as linking status, MTU, sending/receiving rate, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Traffic interface.

Menu > Maintenance > Net Detect

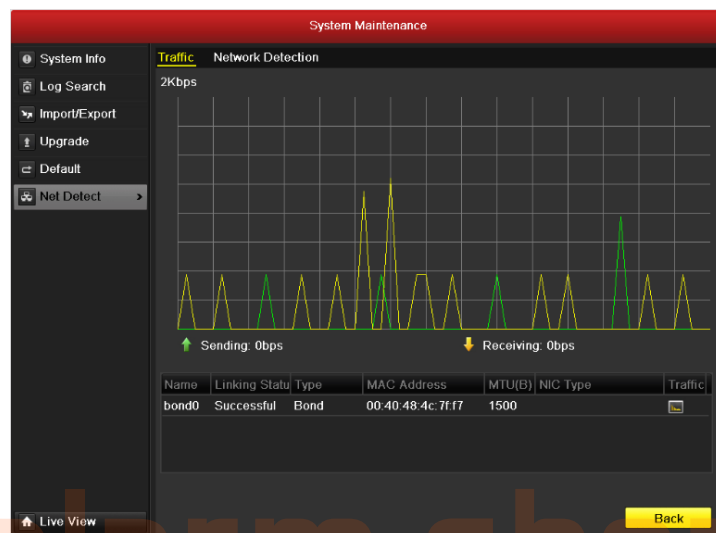


Figure 9.21 Network Traffic Interface

2. You can view the sending rate and receiving rate information on the interface. The traffic data is refreshed every 1 second.

9.4 Configuring Network Detection

Purpose:

You can obtain network connecting status of DVR through the network detection function, including network delay, packet loss, etc.

9.4.1 Testing Network Delay and Packet Loss

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Traffic interface.
Menu > Maintenance > Net Detect
2. Click the **Network Detection** tab to enter the Network Detection menu, as shown in Figure 9.23.

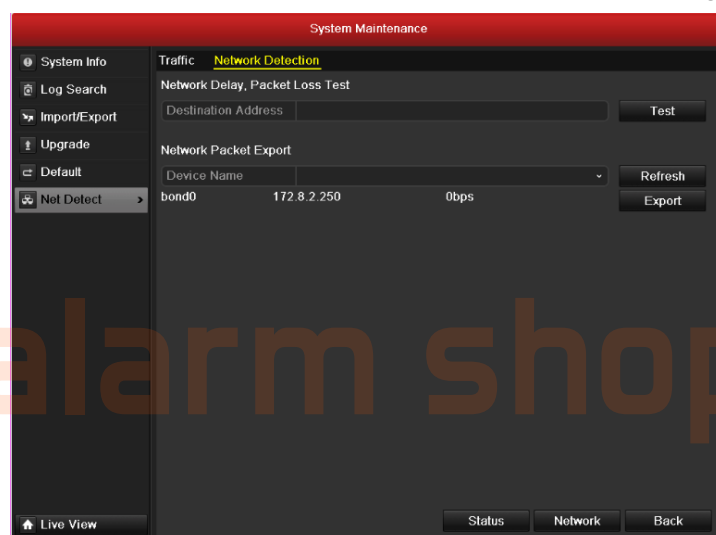


Figure 9.22 Network Detection Interface

3. Enter the destination address in the text field of **Destination Address**.
4. Click the **Test** button to start testing network delay and packet loss. The testing result pops up on the window.
If the testing is failed, the error message box will pop up as well. Refer to Figure 9.24.

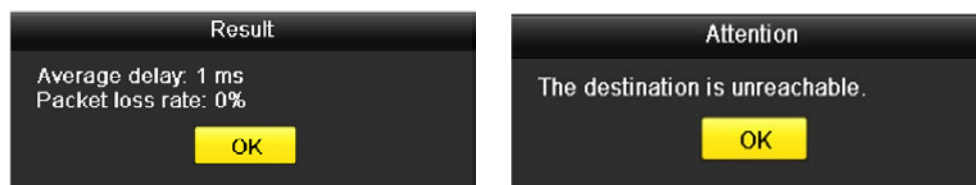


Figure 9.23 Testing Result of Network Delay and Packet Loss

9.4.2 Exporting Network Packet

Purpose:

By connecting the DVR to network, the captured network data packet can be exported to USB-flash disk, SATA/eSATA disk and other local backup devices.

Steps:

1. Enter the Network Traffic interface.
Menu > Maintenance > Net Detect
2. Click the **Network Detection** tab to enter the Network Detection interface.
3. Select the backup device from the dropdown list of Device Name, as shown in Figure 9.25.

Note: Click the **Refresh** button if the connected local backup device cannot be displayed. When it fails to detect the backup device, please check whether it is compatible with the DVR. You can format the backup device if the format is incorrect.

5. After the exporting is complete, click **OK** to finish the packet export, as shown in Figure 9.26.

CHAPTER 10

HDD Management

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10.1 Initializing HDDs

Purpose:

A newly installed hard disk drive (HDD) must be initialized before it can be used with your DVR.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.

Menu > HDD>General.

2. Select HDD to be initialized.
3. Click the **Init** button.

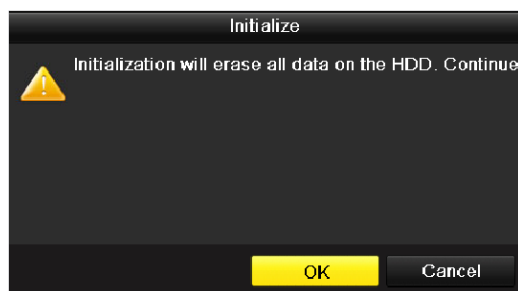


Figure 10.2 Confirm Initialization

4. Select the **OK** button to start initialization.

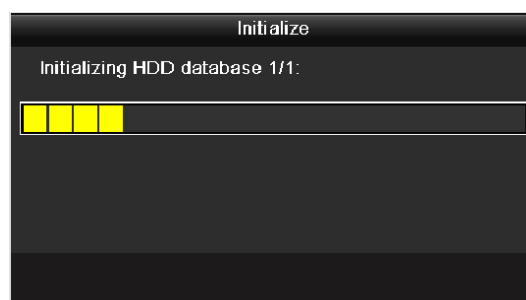


Figure 10.3 Start Initialization

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10.2 Managing Network HDD

Purpose:

You can add the allocated NAS or disk of IP SAN to DVR, and use it as network HDD.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.

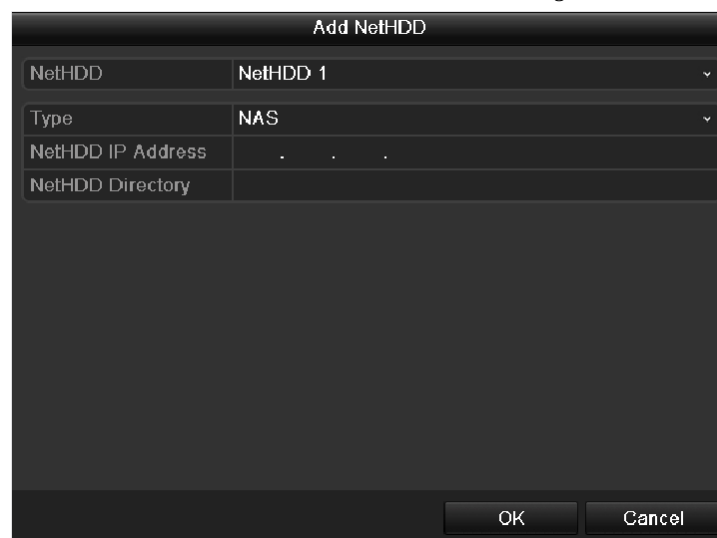


Figure 10.6 HDD Information Interface

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10.3 Managing eSATA

Purpose:

When there is an external eSATA device connected to DVR, you can configure the eSATA for the use of Record/Capture or Export, and you can also manage the eSATA in the DVR.

Steps:

1. Enter the Advanced Record Settings interface.

Menu > Record>Advanced

2. Select the eSATA type to Export or Record/Capture from the dropdown list of **eSATA**.

Export: use the eSATA for backup. Refer to *Backup using eSATA HDDs in Chapter 7.1.2 Backing up by Normal Video Search* for operating instructions.

Record/Capture: use the eSATA for record/capture. Refer to the following steps for operating instructions.

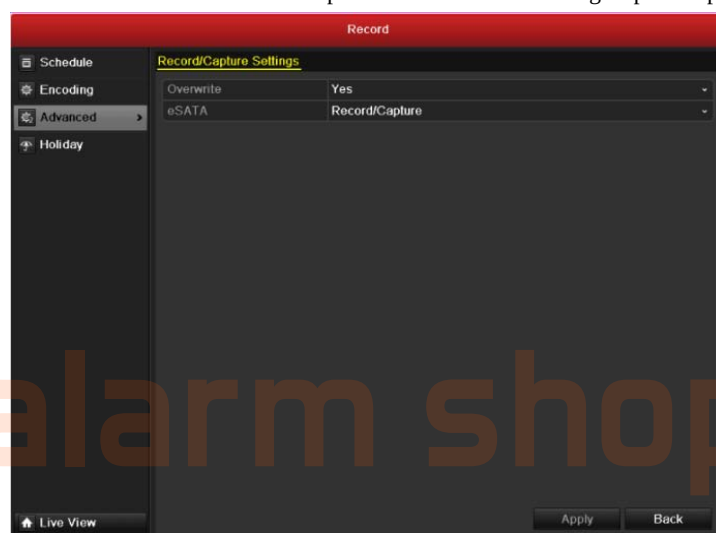


Figure 10.10 Set eSATA Mode

3. When the eSATA type is selected to Record/Capture, enter the HDD Information interface.

Menu > HDD>General

4. Edit the property of the selected eSATA, or initialize it is required.

Note: Two storage modes can be configured for the eSATA when it is used for Record/Capture. Please refer to *Chapter 10.4* and *Chapter 10.5* for details.

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10.4 Managing HDD Group

10.4.1 Setting HDD Groups

Purpose:

Multiple HDDs can be managed in groups. Video from specified channels can be recorded onto a particular HDD group through HDD settings.

Steps:

1. Enter the Storage Mode interface.
Menu > HDD > Advanced
2. Set the **Mode** to Group, as shown in Figure 10.12.

3. Click the **Apply** button and the following Attention box will pop up.

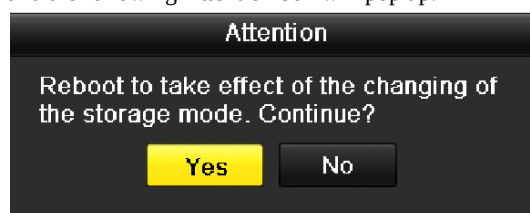


Figure 10.13 Attention for Reboot

4. Click the **Yes** button to reboot the device to activate the changes.
5. After reboot of device, enter the HDD Information interface.

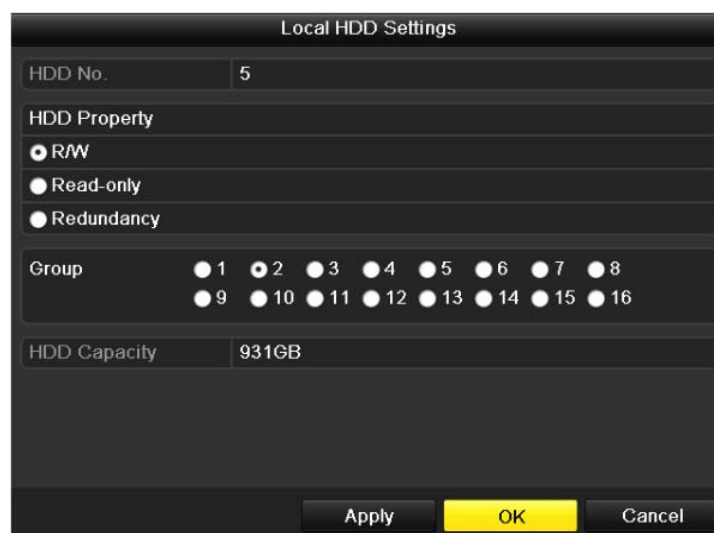


Figure 10.14 Local HDD Settings Interface

6. Select HDD from the list and click the  icon to enter the Local HDD Settings interface, as shown in Figure 10.14.

7. Select the Group number for the current HDD.

Note: The default group No. for each HDD is 1.

8. Click the **OK** button to confirm the settings.

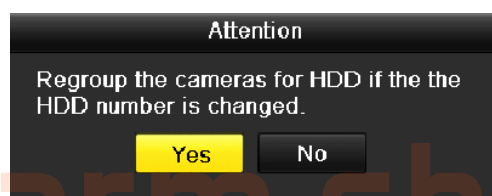


Figure 10.15 Confirm HDD Group Settings

9. In the pop-up Attention box, click the **Yes** button to finish the settings.

10.4.2 Setting HDD Property

Purpose:

The HDD property can be set to redundancy, read-only or read/write (R/W). Before setting the HDD property, please set the storage mode to Group (refer to step1-4 of Chapter 10.4.1 Setting HDD Groups).

A HDD can be set to read-only to prevent important recorded files from being overwritten when the HDD becomes full in overwrite recording mode.

When the HDD property is set to redundancy, the video can be recorded both onto the redundancy HDD and the R/W HDD simultaneously so as to ensure high security and reliability of video data.

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.
Menu > HDD > General
2. Select HDD from the list and click the  icon to enter the Local HDD Settings interface, as shown in Figure 10.16.

3. Set the HDD property to R/W, Read-only or Redundancy.
4. Click the **OK** button to save the settings and exit the interface.
5. In the HDD Information menu, the HDD property will be displayed in the list.

Note: At least 2 hard disks must be installed on your DVR when you want to set a HDD to Redundancy, and there is one HDD with R/W property.

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10.5 Configuring Quota Mode

Purpose

Each camera can be configured with allocated quota for the storage of recorded files or captured pictures.

Steps

1. Enter the Storage Mode interface.
Menu > HDD > Advanced

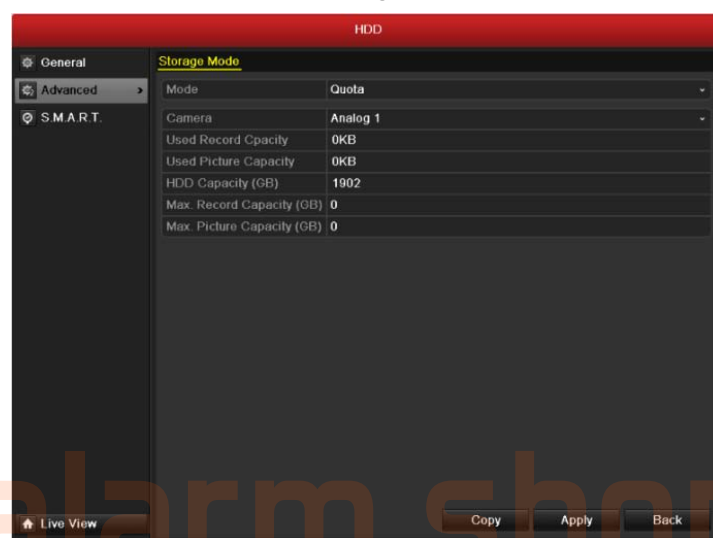


Figure 10.17 Storage Mode Settings Interface

2. Set the **Mode** to Quota, as shown in Figure 10.17.

Note: The DVR must be rebooted to enable the changes to take effect.

3. Select a camera for which you want to configure quota.
4. Enter the storage capacity in the text fields of **Max. Record Capacity (GB)** and **Max. Picture Capacity (GB)**, as shown in Figure 10.18.

5. You can copy the quota settings of the current camera to other cameras if required. Click the **Copy** button to

enter the Copy Camera menu, as shown in Figure 10.19.

7. Click the **OK** button to finish the Copy settings and back to the Storage Mode interface.
8. Click the **Apply** button to apply the settings.

Note: If the quota capacity is set to 0, then all cameras will use the total capacity of HDD for record and picture capture.

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10.6 Checking HDD Status

Purpose:

You may check the status of the installed HDDs on DVR so as to take immediate check and maintenance in case of HDD failure.

Checking HDD Status in HDD Information Interface

Steps:

1. Enter the HDD Information interface.
Menu > HDD>General
2. Check the status of each HDD which is displayed on the list, as shown in Figure 10.20.

Note: If the status of HDD is *Normal* or *Sleeping*, it works normally. If the status is *Uninitialized* or *Abnormal*, please initialize the HDD before use. And if the HDD initialization is failed, please replace it with a new one.

Steps:

1. Enter the System Information interface.
Menu > Maintenance > System Info
2. Click the **HDD** tab to view the status of each HDD displayed on the list, as shown in Figure 10.21.

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10.7 Checking S.M.A.R.T Information

Purpose:

The S.M.A.R.T. (Self-Monitoring, Analysis and Reporting Technology) is a monitoring system for HDD to detect and report on various indicators of reliability in the hopes of anticipating failures.

Steps:

1. Enter the S.M.A.R.T Settings interface.
Menu > HDD > S.M.A.R.T.
2. Check the checkbox of **Enable S.M.A.R.T.**

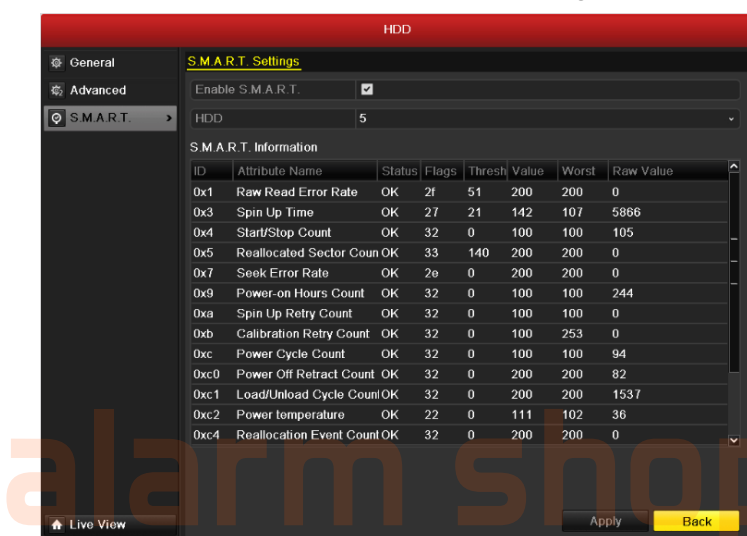


Figure 10.22 S.M.A.R.T Settings Interface

3. Select the HDD to view its S.M.A.R.T information list, as shown in Figure 10.22.

10.8 Configuring HDD Error Alarms

Purpose:

You can configure the HDD error alarms when the HDD status is *Uninitialized* or *Abnormal*.

Steps:

1. Enter the Exception interface.
Menu > Configuration > Exceptions
2. Select the Exception Type to **HDD Error** from the dropdown list.
3. Click the checkbox(s) below to select the HDD error alarm type (s), as shown in Figure 10.23.

Note: The alarm type can be selected to: Audio Warning, Notify Surveillance Center, Send Email and Trigger Alarm Output. Please refer to *Chapter 8.6 Follow-up Actions of Alarms*.

CHAPTER 11

Camera Settings

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11.1 Configuring OSD Settings

Purpose:

You can configure the OSD (On-screen Display) settings for the camera, including date /time, camera name, etc.

Steps:

1. Enter the OSD Configuration interface.
Menu > Camera > OSD
2. Select the camera to configure OSD settings.
3. Edit the Camera Name in the text field.
4. Configure the Display Name, Display Date and Display Week by clicking the checkbox.
5. Select the Date Format, Time Format and Display Mode.

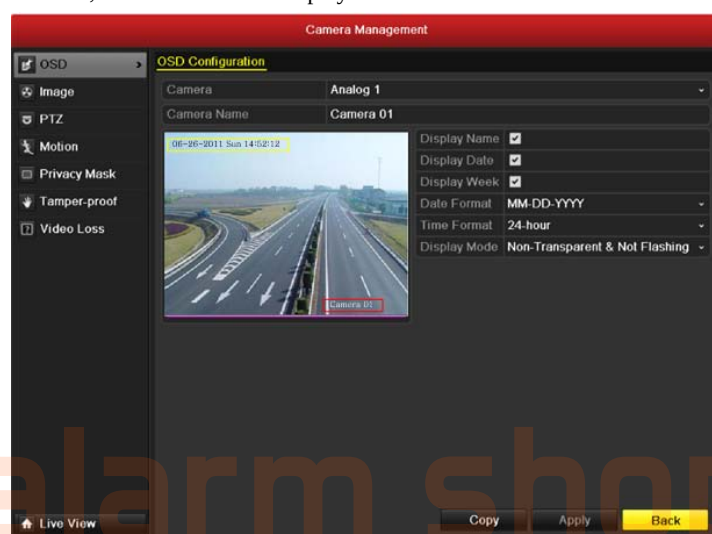


Figure 11. 1 OSD Configuration Interface

6. You can use the mouse to click and drag the text frame on the live view window to adjust the OSD position.
7. Copy Camera Settings
 - 1) If you want to copy the OSD settings of the current camera to other cameras, click the **Copy** button to enter the Copy Camera interface, as shown in Figure 11.2.

11.2 Configuring Privacy Mask

Purpose:

You are allowed to configure the four-sided privacy mask zones that cannot be viewed by the operator.

Steps:

1. Enter the Privacy Mask Settings interface.
Menu > Camera > Privacy Mask
2. Select the camera to set privacy mask.
3. Click the checkbox of **Enable Privacy Mask** to enable this feature.

4. Use the mouse to draw a zone on the window. The zones will be marked with different frame colors.
- Note:** Up to 4 privacy mask zones can be configured, and the size of each area can be adjusted.
5. The configured privacy mask zones on the window can be cleared by clicking the corresponding Clear Zone1-4 icons on the right side of the window, or click **Clear All** to clear all zones.

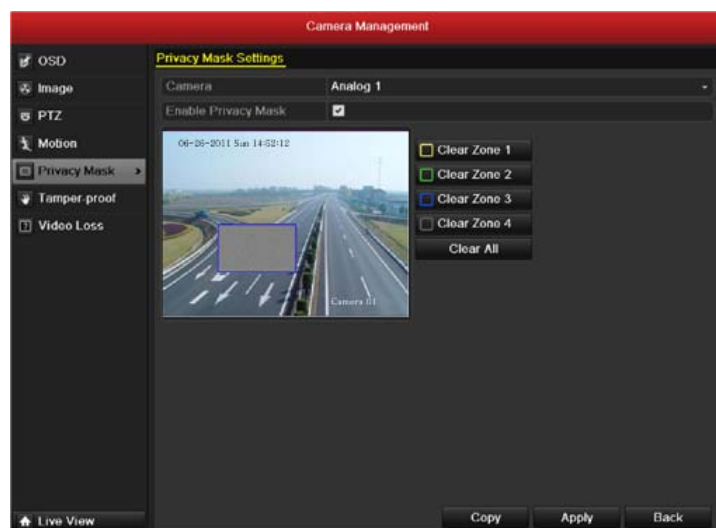


Figure 11.4 Set Privacy Mask Area

11.3 Configuring Video Parameters

Steps:

1. Enter the Image Settings interface.
Menu > Camera > Image

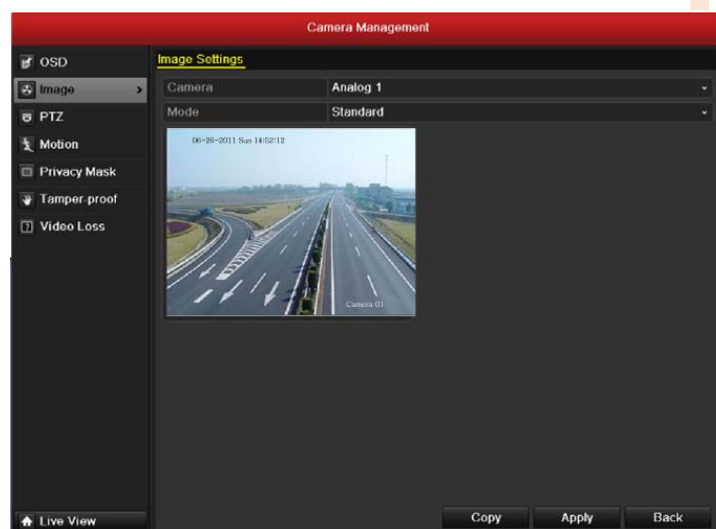


Figure 11.5 Image Settings Interface

2. Select the camera to set image parameters.
3. Select the mode from the dropdown list of **Mode**. Five modes are selectable: Standard, Indoor, Dim Light, Outdoor and Customize.

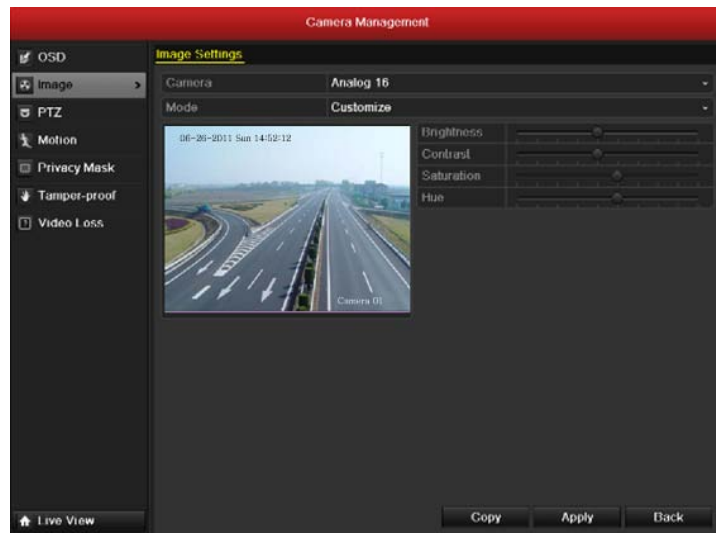


Figure 11.6 Configure Customized Image Settings

4. When the mode is selected to Customize, you can adjust the video parameters, including Brightness, Contrast, Saturation and Hue, as shown in Figure 11.6.

5. You can click the **Copy** button to copy the image settings of the current camera to other cameras. Please refer to step 7 of *Chapter 11.1 Configuring OSD Settings*.
6. Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

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CHAPTER 12

DVR Management and Maintenance

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12.1 Viewing System Information

12.1.1 Viewing Device Information

Steps:

1. Enter the System Information interface.
Menu > Maintenance > System Info

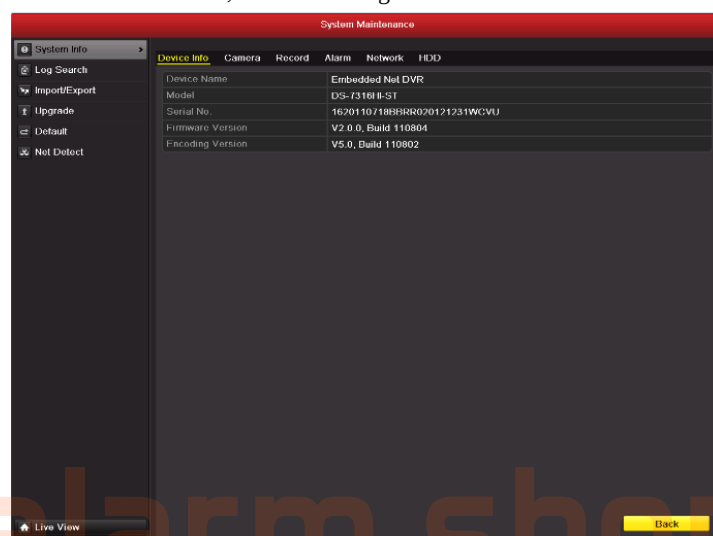


Figure 12.1 Device Information Interface

2. Click the **Device Info** tab to enter the Device Information menu to view the device name, model, serial No. , firmware version and encode version, as shown in Figure 12.1.

12.1.2 Viewing Camera Information

Steps:

1. Enter the System Information interface.
Menu > Maintenance > System Info
2. Click the **Camera** tab to enter the Camera Information menu to view the status of each camera, as shown in Figure 12.2.

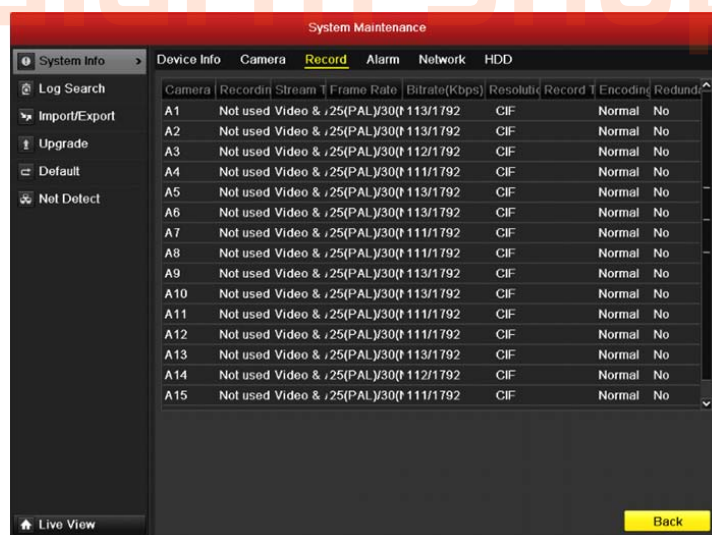


Figure 12.3 Record Information Interface

2. Click the **Record** tab to enter the Record Information menu to view the recording status encoding parameters of each camera, as shown in Figure 12.3.

12.2 Searching & Export Log Files

Purpose:

The operation, alarm, exception and information of the DVR can be stored in log files, which can be viewed and exported at any time.

Steps:

1. Enter the Log Search interface.

2. Set the log search conditions to refine your search, including the Start Time, End Time, Major Type and Minor Type.
3. Click the **Search** button to start search log files.
4. The matched log files will be displayed on the list shown below.

Note: Up to 2000 log files can be displayed each time.

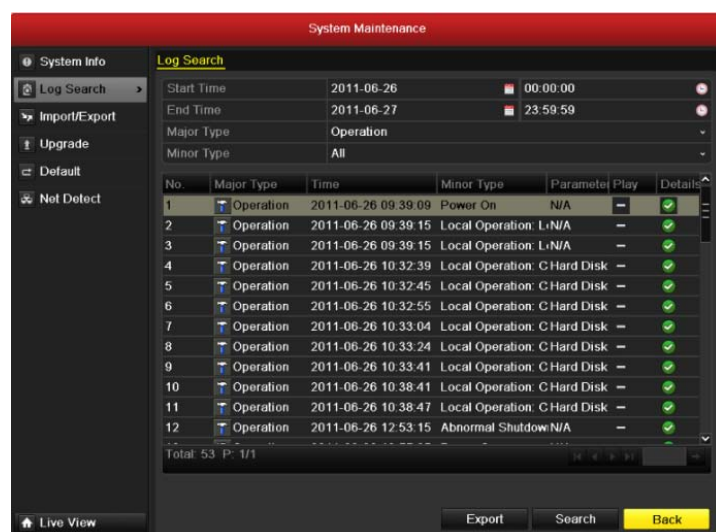


Figure 12.8 Log Search Results

5. You can click the  button of each log or double click it to view its detailed information, as shown in Figure 9. And you can also click the  button to view the related video files if available.

6. If you want to export the log files, click the **Export** button to enter the Export menu, as shown in Figure 12.10.

7. Select the backup device from the dropdown list of **Device Name**.
8. Click the **Export** to export the log files to the selected backup device.
- You can click the **New Folder** button to create new folder in the backup device, or click the **Format** button to format the backup device before log export.

Note:

- 1) Please connect the backup device to DVR before operating log export.
- 2) The log files exported to the backup device are named by exporting time, e.g., 20110514124841logBack.txt.

12.3 Importing/Exporting Configuration Files

Purpose:

The configuration files of the DVR can be exported to local device for backup; and the configuration files of one DVR can be imported to multiple DVR devices if they are to be configured with the same parameters.

Steps:

1. Enter the Import/Export Configuration File interface.

Menu > Maintenance > Import/Export

2. Click the **Export** button to export configuration files to the selected local backup device.
3. To import a configuration file, select the file from the selected backup device and click the **Import** button.
After the import process is completed, you must reboot the DVR.

Note: After having finished the import of configuration files, the device will reboot automatically.

12.4 Upgrading System

Purpose:

The firmware on your DVR can be upgraded by local backup device or remote FTP server.

12.4.1 Upgrading by Local Backup Device

Steps:

1. Connect your DVR with a local backup device where the update firmware file is located.
2. Enter the Upgrade interface.
Menu > Maintenance > Upgrade

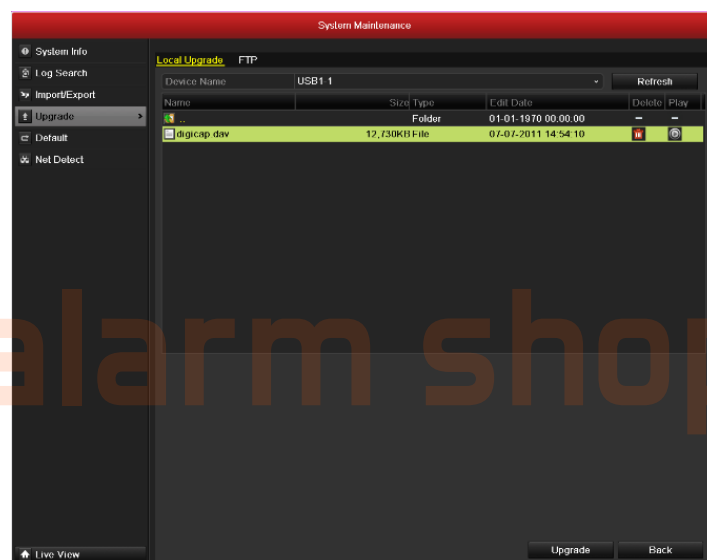


Figure 12.12 Local Upgrade Interface

3. Click the **Local Upgrade** tab to enter the local upgrade menu, as shown in Figure 12.12.

4. Select the update file from the backup device.
5. Click the **Upgrade** button to start upgrading.
6. After the upgrading is complete, reboot the DVR to activate the new firmware.

12.4.2 Upgrading by FTP

Before you start:

Configure PC (running FTP server) and DVR to the same Local Area Network. Run the third-party TFTP software on the PC and copy the firmware into the root directory of FTP.

Steps:

1. Enter the Upgrade interface.
Menu > Maintenance > Upgrade
2. Click the **FTP** tab to enter the local upgrade interface, as shown in Figure 12.13.

3. Enter the FTP Server Address in the text field.
4. Click the **Upgrade** button to start upgrading.
5. After the upgrading is complete, reboot the DVR to activate the new firmware.

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12.5 Restoring Default Settings

Steps:

1. Enter the Default interface.

Menu > Maintenance > Default

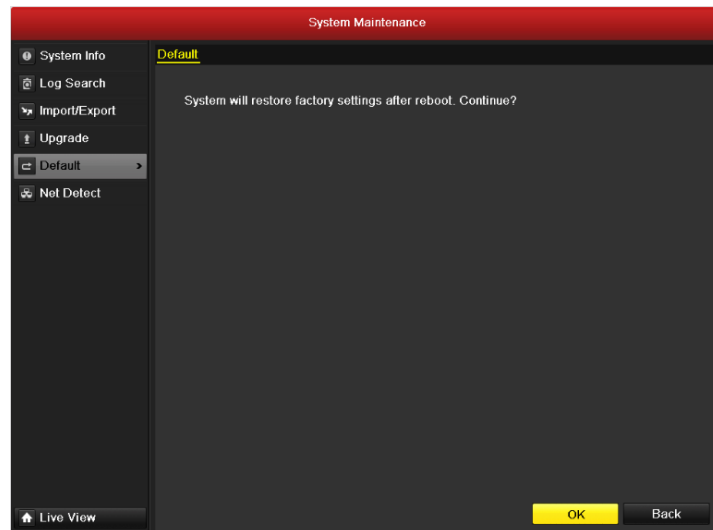


Figure 12.14 Restore Factory Default

2. Click the **OK** button to restore the default settings.

Note: Except the network parameters (including IP address, subnet mask, gateway, default route and server port), all other parameters of the device will be restored to factory default settings.

CHAPTER 13

Others

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13.1 Configuring RS-232 Serial Port

Purpose:

The RS-232 port can be used in two ways:

- **Parameters Configuration:** Connect a PC to the DVR through the PC serial port. Device parameters can be configured by using software such as HyperTerminal. The serial port parameters must be the same as the DVR's when connecting with the PC serial port.
- **Transparent Channel:** Connect a serial device directly to the DVR. The serial device will be controlled remotely by the PC through the network and the protocol of the serial device.

Steps:

1. Enter the RS-232 Settings interface.

Menu > Configuration > RS-232

2. Configure RS-232 parameters, including baud rate, data bit, stop bit, parity, flow control and usage.
3. Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

13.2 Configuring General Settings

Purpose:

You can configure the BNC output standard, VGA output resolution, mouse pointer speed in Menu > Configuration > General interface.

Steps:

1. Enter the General Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > General
2. Select the **General** tab.

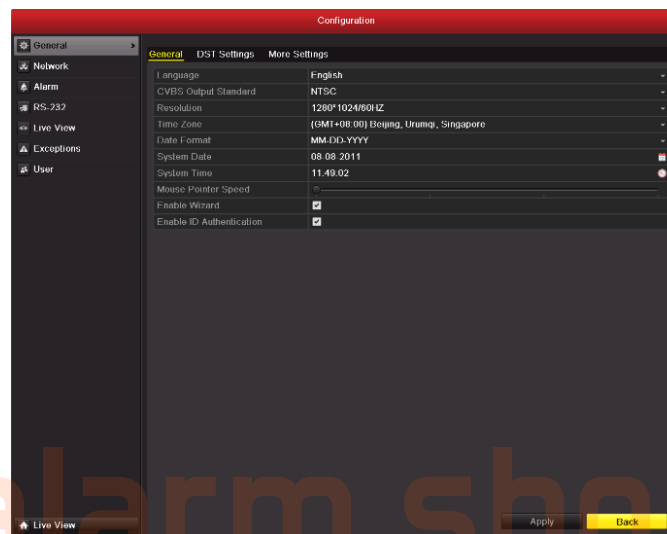


Figure 13.2 General Settings Interface

3. Configure the following settings:
 - **Language:** The default language used is *English*.
 - **CVBS Output Standard:** Select the CVBS output standard to NTSC or PAL, which must be the same with the video input standard.
 - **Resolution:** Select the output resolution, which must be the same with the resolution of the monitor screen.
 - **Time Zone:** Select the time zone.
 - **Date Format:** Select the date format.
 - **System Date:** Select the system date.
 - **System Time:** Select the system time.
 - **Mouse Pointer Speed:** Set the speed of mouse pointer; 4 levels are configurable.
 - **Enable Wizard:** Enable/disable the Wizard when the device starts up.
 - **Enable Password:** Enable/disable the use of the login password.
4. Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

13.3 Configuring More Settings

Steps:

1. Enter the General Settings interface.
Menu > Configuration > General

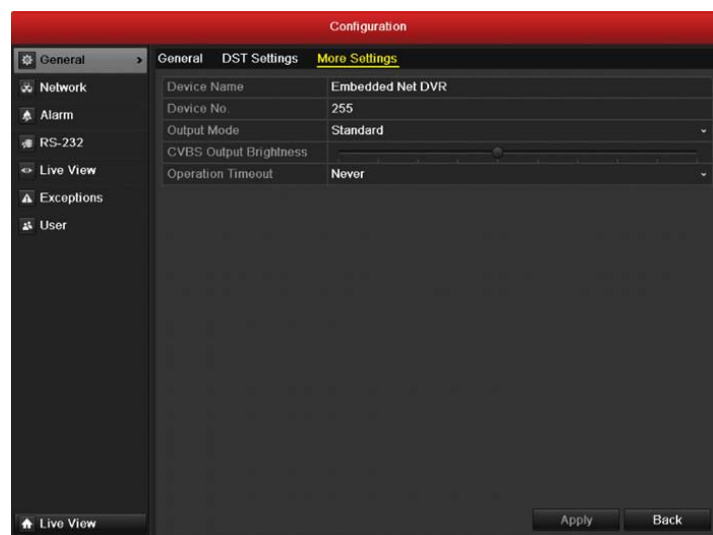


Figure 13.3 More Settings Interface

2. Click the **More Settings** tab to enter the More Settings interface, as shown in Figure 13.3.

3. Configure the following settings:
 - **Device Name:** Edit the name of DVR.
 - **Device No.:** Edit the serial number of DVR. The Device No. can be set in the range of 1~255, and the default No. is 255.
 - **Output Mode:** Select the output mode to: Standard, Bright, Gentle or Vivid.
 - **CVBS Output Brightness:** Adjust the video output brightness.
 - **Operation Timeout:** Set timeout time for menu inactivity. E.g., when the timeout time is set to 5 *Minutes*, then the system will exit from the current operation menu to live view screen after 5 minutes of menu inactivity.
4. Click the **Apply** button to save the settings.

13.4 Managing User Accounts

Purpose:

There is a default account in the DVR: *Administrator*. The *Administrator* user name is *admin* and the password is *12345*. The *Administrator* has the permission to add and delete user and configure user parameters.

13.4.1 Adding a User

Steps:

1. Enter the User Management interface.

Menu > Configuration > User

2. Click the **Add** button to enter the Add User interface.

3. Enter the information for new user, including **User Name**, **Password**, **Level** and **User's MAC Address**.

Level: Set the user level to Operator or Guest. Different user levels have different operating permission.

- **Operator:** The Operator user level has permission of Two-way Audio in Remote Configuration and all operating permission in Camera Configuration.
- **Guest:** The Guest user has no permission of two-way audio in Remote Configuration and only has the local/remote playback in the Camera Configuration and local/remote log search.
- **User's MAC Address:** The MAC address of the remote PC which logs onto the DVR. If it is configured and enabled, it only allows the remote user with this MAC address to access the DVR.

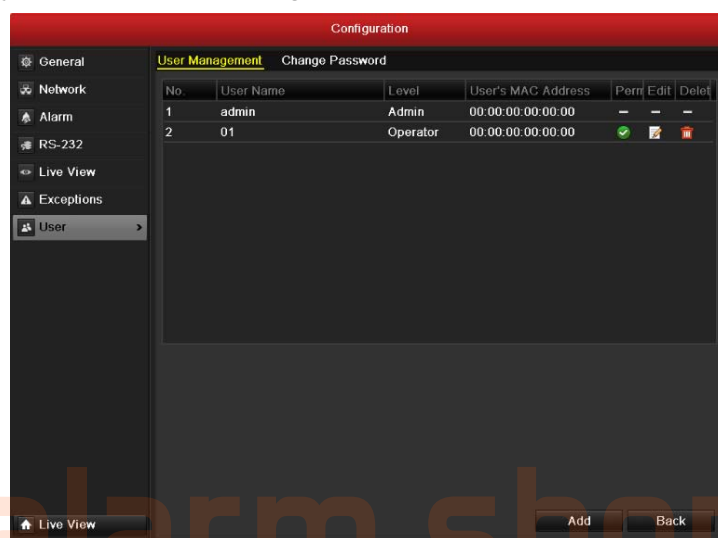


Figure 13.6 Added User Listed in User Management Interface

4. Click the **OK** button to save the settings and go back to the User Management interface. The added new user will be displayed on the list, as shown in Figure 13.6.

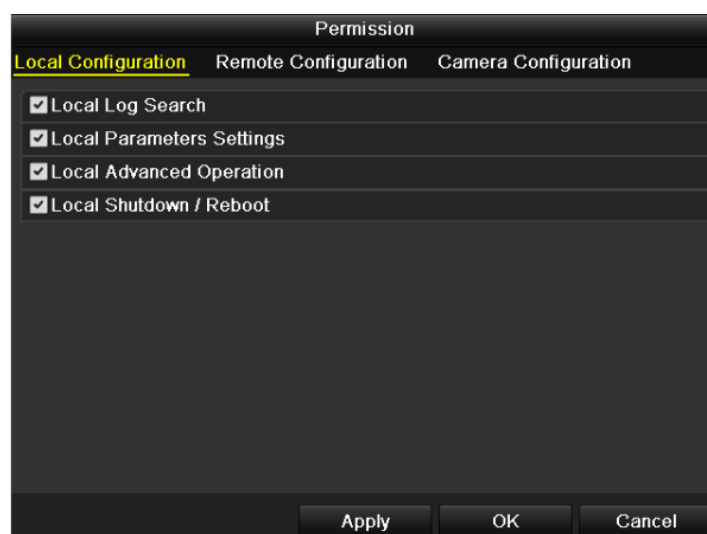


Figure 13.7 User Permission Settings Interface

5. Select the user from the list and then click the button to enter the Permission settings interface, as shown in Figure 13.7.

6. Set the operating permission of Local Configuration, Remote Configuration and Camera Configuration for

the user.

Local Configuration

- Local Log Search: Searching and viewing logs and system information of DVR.
- Local Parameters Settings: Configuring parameters, restoring factory default parameters and importing/exporting configuration files.
- Local Advanced Operation: Operating HDD management (initializing HDD, setting HDD property), upgrading system firmware, clearing I/O alarm output.
- Local Shutdown Reboot: Shutting down or rebooting the DVR.

Remote Configuration

- Remote Log Search: Remotely viewing logs that are saved on the DVR.
- Remote Parameters Settings: Remotely configuring parameters, restoring factory default parameters and importing/exporting configuration files.
- Remote Serial Port Control: Configuring settings for RS-232 and RS-485 ports.
- Remote Video Output Control: Sending remote button control signal.
- Two-Way Audio: Realizing two-way radio between the remote client and the DVR.
- Remote Alarm Control: Remotely arming (notify alarm and exception message to the remote client) and controlling the alarm output.
- Remote Advanced Operation: Remotely operating HDD management (initializing HDD, setting HDD property), upgrading system firmware, clearing I/O alarm output.
- Remote Shutdown/Reboot: Remotely shutting down or rebooting the DVR.

Camera Configuration

- Remote Live View: Remotely viewing live video of the selected camera (s).
- Local Manual Operation: Locally starting/stopping manual recording, picture capturing and alarm output of the selected camera (s).
- Remote Manual Operation: Remotely starting/stopping manual recording, picture capturing of the selected camera (s).
- Local Playback: Locally playing back recorded files of the selected camera (s).
- Remote Playback: Remotely playing back recorded files of the selected camera (s).
- Local PTZ Control: Locally controlling PTZ movement of the selected camera (s).
- Remote PTZ Control: Remotely controlling PTZ movement of the selected camera (s).
- Local Video Export: Locally exporting recorded files of the selected camera (s).

7. Click the **OK** button to save the settings and exit interface.

Note: Only the *admin* user account has the permission of restoring factory default parameters.

13.4.2 Deleting a User

Steps:

1. Enter the User Management interface.
Menu > Configuration > User

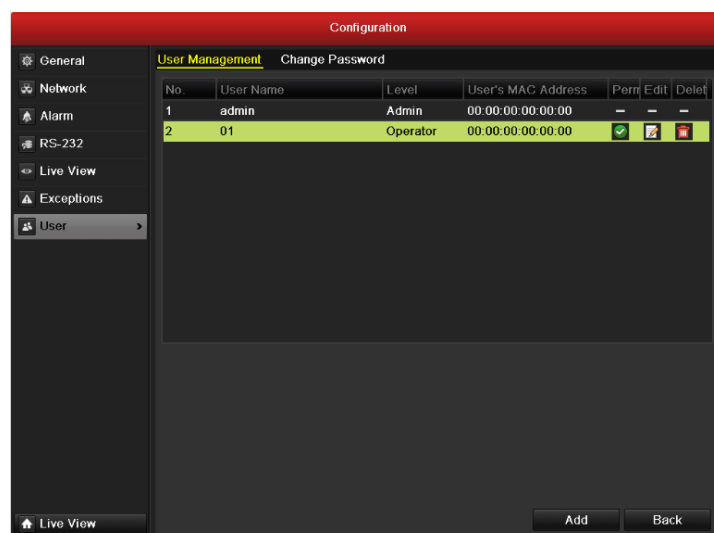


Figure 13.8 Delete a User

2. Select the user to be deleted from the list, as shown in Figure 13.8.

13.4.3 Editing a User

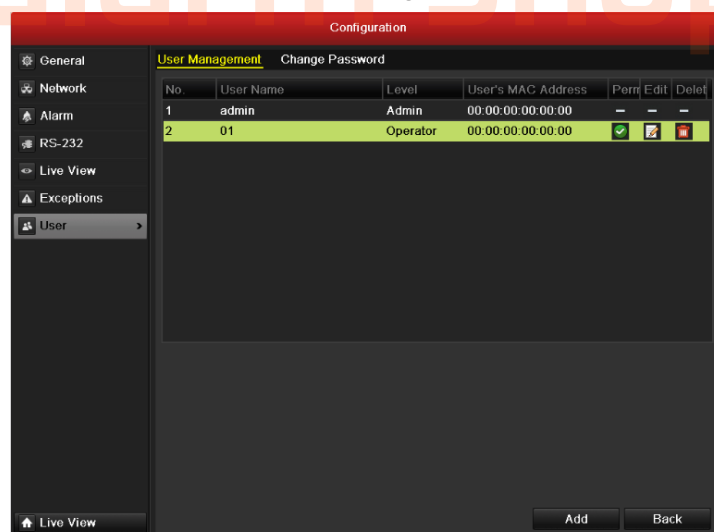
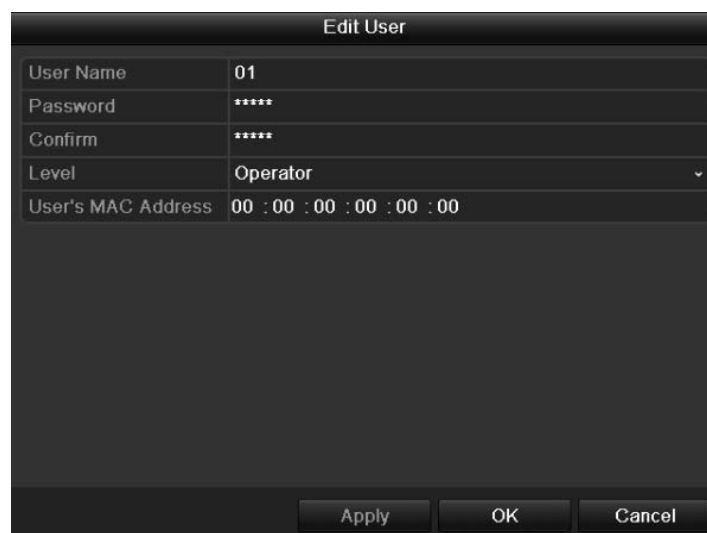


Figure 13.9 Edit a User

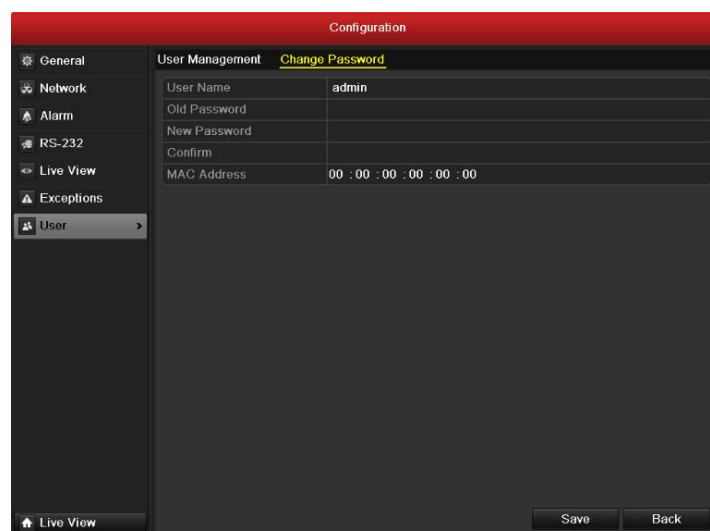

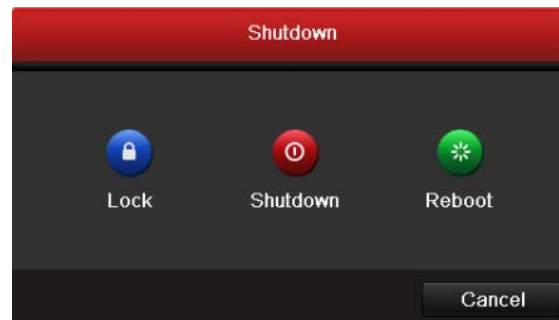


Figure 13.12 Shutdown Menu

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CHAPTER 14

Appendix

Glossary

- **Dual Stream:** Dual stream is a technology used to record high resolution video locally while transmitting a lower resolution stream over the network. The two streams are generated by the DVR, with the main stream having a maximum resolution of 4CIF and the sub-stream having a maximum resolution of CIF.
- **DVR:** Acronym for Digital Video Recorder. A DVR is device that is able to accept video signals from analog cameras, compress the signal and store it on its hard drives.
- **HDD:** Acronym for Hard Disk Drive. A storage medium which stores digitally encoded data on platters with magnetic surfaces.
- **DHCP:** Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) is a network application protocol used by devices (DHCP clients) to obtain configuration information for operation in an Internet Protocol network.
- **HTTP:** Acronym for Hypertext Transfer Protocol. A protocol to transfer hypertext request and information between servers and browsers over a network
- **PPPoE:** PPPoE, Point-to-Point Protocol over Ethernet, is a network protocol for encapsulating Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP) frames inside Ethernet frames. It is used mainly with ADSL services where individual users connect to the ADSL transceiver (modem) over Ethernet and in plain Metro Ethernet networks.
- **DDNS:** Dynamic DNS is a method, protocol, or network service that provides the capability for a networked device, such as a router or computer system using the Internet Protocol Suite, to notify a domain name server to change, in real time (ad-hoc) the active DNS configuration of its configured hostnames, addresses or other information stored in DNS.
- **Hybrid DVR:** A hybrid DVR is a combination of a DVR and NVR.
- **NTP:** Acronym for Network Time Protocol. A protocol designed to synchronize the clocks of computers over a network.
- **NTSC:** Acronym for National Television System Committee. NTSC is an analog television standard used in such countries as the United States and Japan. Each frame of an NTSC signal contains 525 scan lines at 60Hz.
- **NVR:** Acronym for Network Video Recorder. An NVR can be a PC-based or embedded system used for centralized management and storage for IP cameras, IP Domes and other DVRs.
- **PAL:** Acronym for Phase Alternating Line. PAL is also another video standard used in broadcast televisions systems in large parts of the world. PAL signal contains 625 scan lines at 50Hz.
- **PTZ:** Acronym for Pan, Tilt, Zoom. PTZ cameras are motor driven systems that allow the camera to pan left and right, tilt up and down and zoom in and out.
- **USB:** Acronym for Universal Serial Bus. USB is a plug-and-play serial bus standard to interface devices to a host computer.

FAQ

- **Why does my DVR make a beeping sound after booting?**

The possible reasons for the warning beep on the DVR are as follows:

- a) There is no HDD installed in the DVR.
- b) The HDD is not initialized.
- c) HDD error

To cancel the beeping sound and use the DVR without HDD, enter the Exception Settings interface. For detailed information, see Chapter Handling Exception..

- **Why does the DVR seem unresponsive when operating with the IR remote control?**

Please read through the section *Using the IR Remote Control*, and check:

- a) The batteries are installed correctly in the remote, making sure that the polarities of the batteries are not reversed.
- b) The batteries are fresh and are not out of power.
- c) The remote has not been tampered with.
- d) there are no fluorescent lamps in use nearby.

- **Why does the PTZ seem unresponsive?**

If the PTZ seem unresponsive, please check:

- a) The RS-485 cable is properly connected.
- b) The dome decoder type is correct.
- c) The dome decoder speed configuration is correct.
- d) The dome decoder address bit configuration is correct.
- e) That the main board RS-485 interface is not broken.

- **Why is there no video recorded after setting the motion detection?**

If there are no recorded video after setting the motion detection, please check:

- a) The recording schedule is setup correctly by following the steps listed in *Configuring Record/Capture Schedule*.
- b) The motion detection area is configured correctly (See *Configuring Motion Detection*).
- c) The channels are being triggered for motion detection (See *Configuring Motion Detection*).

- **Why doesn't the DVR detect my USB export device for exporting recorded files?**

There's a chance that the DVR and your USB device is not compatible. Please refer to our company's website to view a list of compatible devices.

- **My DVR is in Live View mode and the menu does not show up. It does not respond to the mouse, the front panel, the remote or keyboard.**

Your DVR may be in auxiliary mode. This occurs when the F1 button is pressed on the front panel. To return to the previous mode of operation, press the F1 button again.
