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Safety and General Information

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorised antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.

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Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline telephone.

Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch (2.5 centimetres) from your body.

Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries and antenna, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.Motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimetres) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches (15 centimetres) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your GP may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, unless it is a phone type especially qualified for use in such areas and certified as "Intrinsically Safe." Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.






Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

Batteries

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. Exercise care in handling any charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, bag, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola original batteries and chargers.**

Your battery or phone may contain symbols, defined as follows:

Symbol	Definition
	Important safety information will follow.
	Your battery or phone should not be disposed of in a fire.
	Your battery or phone may require recycling in accordance with local laws. Contact your local regulatory authorities for more information.
	Your battery or phone should not be thrown in the trash.
	Your phone contains an internal lithium ion battery.

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to blinking lights, such as when watching television

or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a blinking-lights feature on your phone. (The blinking-light feature is not available on all products.)

Parents should monitor their children's use of video game or other features that incorporate blinking lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a blinking-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

Repetitive Motion Injuries

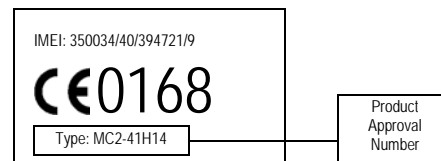
When you play games on your phone, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.
- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.

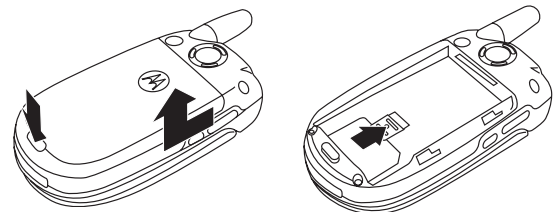

Installing the SIM Card

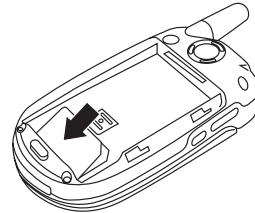
Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.



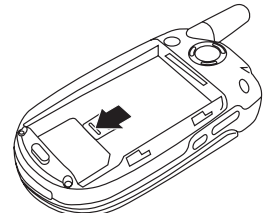

Battery Use

Battery performance depends on many factors, including your wireless carrier's network configuration; signal strength; the temperature at which you operate your phone; the features and/or settings you select and use; items attached to your phone's accessory connector; and your voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Caution: To prevent injuries or burns, do not allow metal objects to contact or short-circuit the battery terminals.

To maximise your battery's performance:

- Always use Motorola Original™ batteries and battery chargers. The phone warranty does not cover damage caused from using non-Motorola batteries and/or battery chargers.
- New batteries or batteries that have been stored for a long time may require a longer charge time.
- Maintain the battery at or near room temperature when charging.
- Do not expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When you do not intend to use a battery for a while, store it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Batteries gradually wear down and require longer charging times. This is normal. If you charge your battery regularly and notice a decrease in talk time or an increase in charging time, then it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



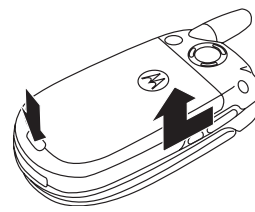
The rechargeable batteries that power this phone must be disposed of properly and may need to be recycled. Refer to your battery's label for battery type. Contact your local recycling centre for proper disposal methods.

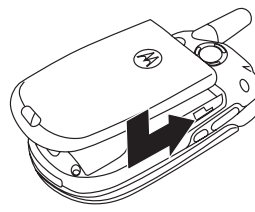
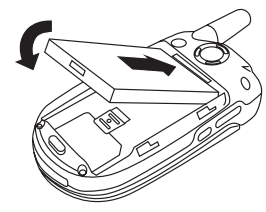

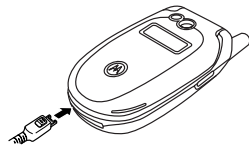

Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Action

- 1 Plug the travel charger into the bottom of your phone.




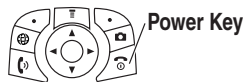
- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, remove the travel charger.


Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

Turning Your Phone On


Action

- 1 Press and hold  for 2 seconds to turn on the phone.



- 2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the  key to unlock the SIM card.

Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**.

- 3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press the  key to unlock the phone.

Adjusting Volume



Press up or down on volume keys to:



- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible



Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

Making a Call



Press	To
1 keypad keys	dial the phone number
2 	make the call
3 	end the call and "hang up" the phone when you are finished


Answering a Call

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

Press	To
1 	answer the call
2 	end the call and "hang up" the phone when you are finished

Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press  .

While you are on a call, press  > **My Tel. Numbers**.

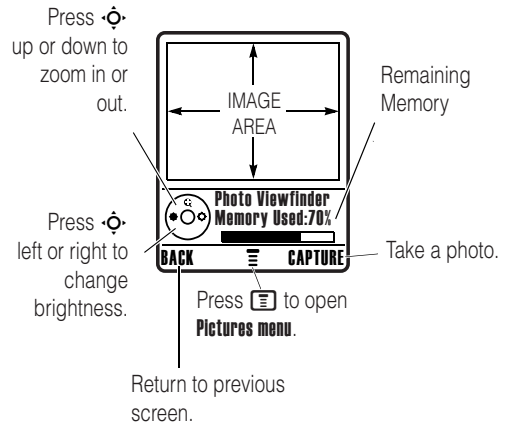

Highlight Features

Taking and Sending a Photo

Press **Ⓜ** to display the camera viewfinder:

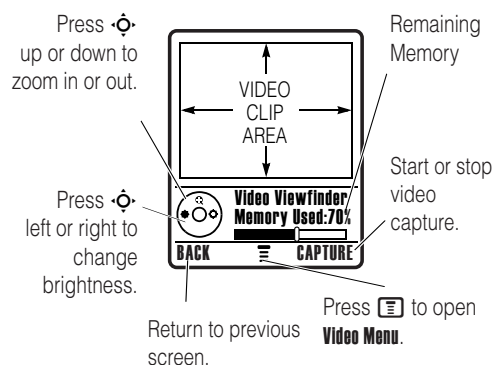

Recording Video Clips

To record a video on your phone:

Find the Feature **Ⓜ** > **Multimedia** > **Videos**
> **New Video**

The active viewfinder image displays.



Note: You can only zoom before you start recording.

Press **MENU** to open the **Videos Menu** when the camera is active. The menu can include the following options:

Option	Description
Go To Videos	View videos stored on your phone.
Videos Setup	Open the setup menu to adjust picture and video settings. If you want to send MMS messages with videos, you might need to set a shorter video length. If necessary, ask your service provider about the network limitations for video messages.
View Free Space	See how much memory remains.

Sending a Multimedia Message



A *Multimedia Messaging Service (MMS)* message contains one or more slides with text and media objects (including photos, pictures, animations, sounds, voice records, and/or video clips). You can send the multimedia message to other wireless phone users, and to email addresses.

Press	To
15 UP key	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Highlight (One Time Entry) to enter one or more phone numbers and/or email addresses. Highlight (New Phonebook Entry) to enter a number/address and add it to the phonebook. Or highlight an existing phonebook entry.
16 SELECT key	select (One Time Entry) or (New Phonebook Entry) and enter a number/address
or	
ADD key	add a phonebook entry to the list of recipients
17 DONE key	store the numbers/addresses
18 UP key	scroll to Subject
19 CHANGE key	select Subject

22 SEND key	send the message



Receiving a Multimedia Message



When you receive a multimedia message or letter, your phone displays the **Message Waiting** indicator and a **New Message** notification, and sounds an alert.

Multimedia messages that you receive can contain different media objects:

- Photos, pictures, and animations are displayed as you read the message.
- A sound file or video clip begins playing when its slide is displayed. Use the volume keys to adjust the volume as the sound file or video clip plays.
Note: In a multimedia letter, you may have to highlight an indicator in the text to play a sound file or video clip.
- Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/filename and press the **VIEW** key (image file type), **PLAY** key (sound file or video clip), or **OPEN** key (object such as phonebook or datebook entry, or unknown file type).

Using the Phonebook

This section briefly describes basic phonebook operations. For more information about using the phonebook, see page 71.

Storing a Phone Number

Enter a phone number in the home screen, then press the **STORE** key to create a phonebook entry with that number. Fill in the other fields to complete the entry.

Select **MORE** to store another number (for example, a work number) under the same Name.

Recording a Voice Name

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Voice Name** and press the **RECORD** key. Press and release the voice key and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds). When prompted, press and release the voice key and repeat the name. Press the **DONE** key to store the voice name.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

Storing a Picture for Caller ID

You can store a picture for a phonebook entry. The picture appears when you receive calls from the entry.

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Picture** and press the **CHANGE** key. Press **⓪** to select a picture, and press the **SELECT** key to store it for the entry.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

Dialling a Number

Press **☰** > **Phonebook** > *entry to call* **☎**.

Tip: To quickly highlight entries in your **Phonebook** list: If your entries are sorted by **Speed No.**, press an entry's speed number to highlight it. For example, press **1** **5** for entry number 15. If your entries are sorted by **Name**, **Voice Name**, or **Email**, enter the first letter of the entry's name to highlight it. For example, press **3** **5** for the first entry that starts with "K".

Voice Dialling a Number

Press and release the voice key, and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds).

Note: To voice dial a phonebook entry you must first record a voice name for the entry (see page 28).

Sorting Phonebook Entries

Press **☰** > **Phonebook**, press **☰** > **Setup** > **Sort by**, then select whether you want to sort the phonebook list by **Name**, **Speed No.**, **Voice Name**, or **Email**.

When sorting by name, you can view **All** numbers or just the **Primary** number for each name. To set the primary number for a name, see page 73.

Viewing Entries By Category

Press **☰** > **Phonebook**, press **☰** > **Categories**, then select whether you want to view **All** entries, entries in a predefined category (**Business**, **Personal**, **General**, **VIPs**), or entries in a category you created.

To set the category for a phonebook entry, see page 72.

Setting Picture ID View

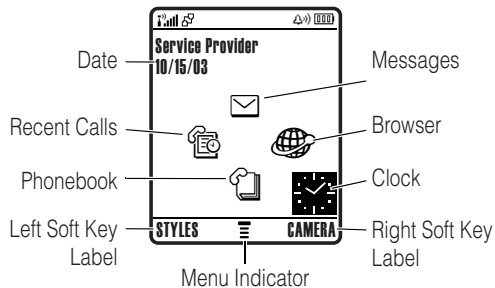
Press **☰** > **Phonebook**, press **☰** > **Setup** > **View by** > **Picture**.

Using the Display

The *home screen* displays when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Press the 5-way navigation key (⬇️) left, right, up, or down to select one of the menu feature icons. If you select a menu icon by mistake, press (⏪) to return to the home screen.

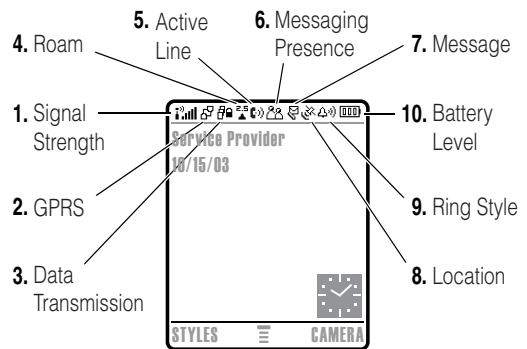
Note: Your home screen may look different from the display shown above. For example, your service provider may hide the menu feature icons to allow a better view of the wallpaper image. You can still select the menu icons when they are hidden from view. To show or hide the menu icons, see page 74.

The (☰) (menu) indicator indicates that you can press the menu key (⏪) to enter the main menu.

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left or right soft key to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

Your phone can display an analogue or digital clock in the home screen (see page 74).

The following status indicators can display:



1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the (no signal) indicator or (no transmit) indicator displays.

2. GPRS Indicator



Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:

(GPRS icon) = GPRS PDP context active

(GPRS icon) = GPRS packet data available

3. Data Transmission Indicator

Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:

(Secure icon) = secure packet data transfer

(Insecure icon) = insecure packet data transfer

(Secure app icon) = secure application connection

(Insecure app icon) = insecure application connection

(CSD icon) = secure Circuit Switch Data (CSD) call

(Insecure CSD icon) = insecure CSD call

(Bluetooth icon) = Bluetooth® connection

4. Roam Indicator



Shows when your phone is seeking or using another network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

(2.5G home icon) = 2.5G home

(2.5G roam icon) = 2.5G roam

(2G home icon) = 2G home

(2G roam icon) = 2G roam

5. Active Line Indicator



Shows (L1) to indicate an active call, or (L1) to indicate when call diverting is on. Icons for dual-line-enabled SIM cards can include:

(L1 icon) = line 1 active

(L2 icon) = line 2 active

(L1 icon) = line 1 active, call divert on

(L2 icon) = line 2 active, call divert on

6. Messaging Presence Indicator



Shows when Instant Messaging (IM) is active. Indicators can include:

(IM active icon) = IM active

(Busy icon) = busy

(Invisible icon) = invisible to IM

When a Java™ application is active, a (Java midlet) indicator can display in this location.

7. Message Indicator



Displays when you receive a new message. Indicators can include:

(Text icon) = text message

(Voicemail icon) = voicemail message

(IM icon) = IM message

(Chat icon) = active chat session

(Voicemail and text icon) = voicemail and text message

8. Location Indicator



Your phone may be able to send location information to the network during an emergency call. Indicators show when your phone is sending location information:

(Location on icon) = location on

(Location off icon) = location off

9. Ring Style Indicator

Shows the ring style setting.

🔊 = loud ring

🔊 = soft ring

🔊 = vibrate

🔊 = vibrate and ring

🔊 = silent

10. Battery Level Indicator

Vertical bars show the battery charge level. Recharge the battery when **Low Battery** displays and the battery alert sounds.

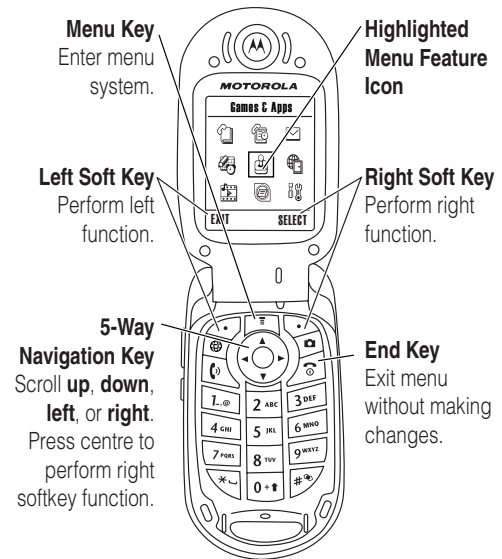
Using the 5-Way Navigation Key

Use the 5-way navigation key (⬆️) to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system, highlight menu items, change feature settings, and play games. Press the centre select button to select a highlighted menu item.



Using Menus

From the home screen, press **Menu** to enter the main menu.



Press **5-Way Navigation Key** to scroll to and highlight a menu feature icon in the main menu. The following icons represent features that may display in the main menu, depending on your service provider and service subscription options.

Selecting a Menu Feature

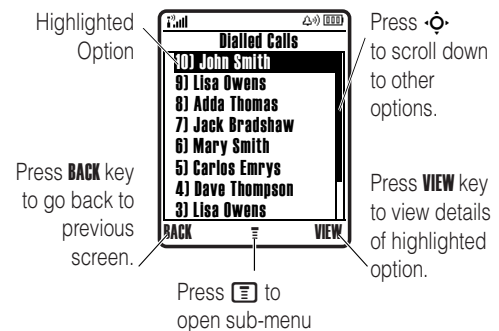
To select a menu feature, starting from the home screen:

Find the Feature **Menu** > Recent Calls > Dialed Calls

This example shows that from the home screen, you must press **Menu**, scroll to and select **Recent Calls** from the main menu, then scroll to and select **Dialed Calls**. Press **5-Way Navigation Key** to scroll, and the left/right soft keys to select the functions displayed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



Press **5-Way Navigation Key** to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.

In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.

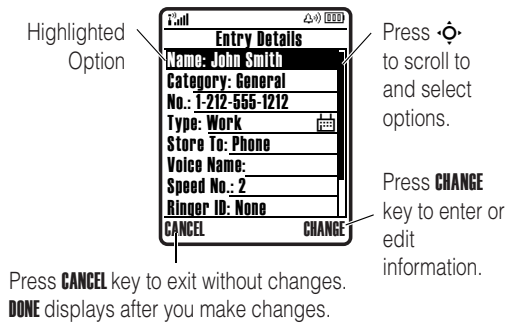
In an alphabetised list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.

When an option has a list of possible values, press **5-Way Navigation Key** left or right to scroll through and select a value.

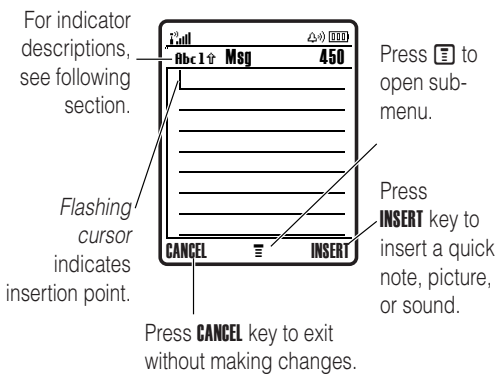
When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text

Some features require you to enter information.



The message centre lets you compose and send text messages. A *Character Counter* indicates how many more characters will fit in the message.



Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

Press [#] in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

Primary	The primary text entry mode (see below to set).
Numeric	Enter numbers only (see page 45).
Symbol	Enter symbols only (see page 45).
Secondary	The secondary text entry mode (see below to set).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry mode in any text entry screen by pressing [≡] > **Entry Mode**.

Setting Up a Text Entry Mode

Press [≡] > **Entry Setup** from any text entry screen. Select **Primary Setup** or **Secondary Setup**, and choose:

iTAP	Let the phone predict each word as you press keys (see page 43).
Tap	Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key one or more times.
Tap Extended	Enter letters, numbers, and symbols by pressing a key one or more times.
None	Hide the Secondary setting (only available for Secondary Setup).

Using Capitalisation

Press [Q] in any text entry screen to change text case. The following indicators show capitalisation status:

abc = no capital letters Abc = capitalise next letter only
 ABC = all capital letters

When you select the **Primary** or **Secondary** text entry mode, the following indicators identify the text entry setting:

Using Tap Mode

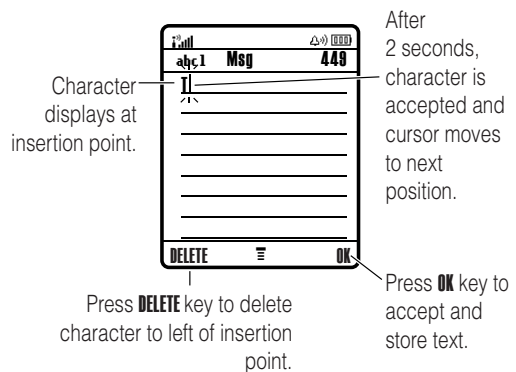
This is the standard mode for entering text on your phone.

Tap mode cycles through the letters and number of the key you press. Tap Extended mode also cycles through additional symbols as shown in the chart on page 42.

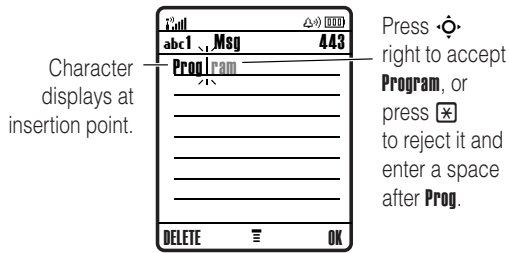
Press	To
1 A keypad key one or more times	select a letter, number, or symbol
2 keypad keys	enter remaining characters. Tip: Press ⌵ right to accept a word completion, or [X] to insert a space.
3 OK key	store the text

In a text entry screen, you can press [#] to switch entry modes. If **Tap** or **Tap Extended** is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 39.

When you enter text with **Tap** or **Tap Extended** mode, the soft key functions change.



When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **prog** you might see:



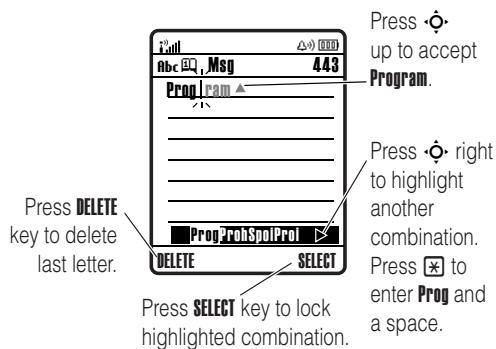

Tap Mode Text Entry Rules

- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press [arrow left/right] to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press [arrow down] to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press [X] to exit without saving.

Using iTAP™ Mode

iTAP software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **Tap** mode, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.

Press	To
3 SELECT key	lock a highlighted combination You can press keypad keys to add more letters to the end of the combination.
or [X]	enter the highlighted combination when it spells a word A space is automatically inserted after the word.

If you enter a word your phone does not recognise, the phone stores it to use as one of your word options. When you fill memory space for unrecognised words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

Using Numeric Mode

In a text entry screen, press **[#]** to switch entry modes until the **123** (numeric) indicator displays.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press **[#]** to switch to another entry mode.

Using Symbol Mode

In a text entry screen, press **[#]** to switch entry modes until the **@** (symbol) indicator displays.

Deleting Letters and Words

Place the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete, and then:

Action

Press the **DELETE** key to delete one letter at a time.

Hold the **DELETE** key to delete all the text.

Using the Smart Key

The smart key (see the diagram on page 1) gives you another way to perform many basic phone functions. It anticipates the next action you are likely to perform. For example, when you highlight a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it. You can use the smart key to make and end calls, turn features on and off, and open your phonebook. The smart key usually performs the same function as the right soft key.

Using the External Display

When the flip is closed, the external display shows time and phone status information. It also displays messages to notify you of incoming calls and other events. See page 30 for descriptions of the status indicators that may appear in the external display.

Note: You cannot make or receive calls when the phone is closed unless you attach a headset.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's built-in handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **SPEAKER** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **SPEAKER** key again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, or PIN2 code if necessary.

To change a code or password:

Find the Feature > **Settings** > **Security**
> **New Passwords**

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 58).

Locking Your Phone Manually

> **Phone Lock** > **Lock Now**

Unlocking Your Phone

If you forget your unlock code, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that does not work, at the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt:

If you forget your security code, SIM card PIN code, or PIN2 code, contact your service provider.

Storing Your Name and Phone Number



To store or edit your name and phone number information on your SIM card:

Setting the Time and Date

Your phone uses the time and date for the **Datebook**. To change the time or date on your phone.

Setting a Ring Style


Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

You can select one of five different ring styles. The ring style indicator in the display shows the current ring style (see page 34).




Setting a Screen Saver Image

Set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver image.

The screen saver image displays when the phone is on and no activity is detected for a specified time. The image shrinks to fill the display, if necessary. An animation repeats for one minute, then the first frame of the animation displays.

Calling an Emergency Number

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 999, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

Press	To
1 keypad keys	dial the emergency number
2 	call the emergency number

To redial the phone number:

Press	To
 or RETRY key	activate automatic redial

Your phone automatically redials the number. When the call goes through, your phone rings or vibrates one time, displays **Redial Successful**, and then connects the call.

Using Caller ID

Incoming Calls



Calling line identification (Caller ID) displays the phone number for incoming calls in your phone's display.


The phone displays the caller's name (and picture, if available) when the name is stored in your phonebook, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information is not available.

Outgoing Calls




You can show or hide your phone number as an ID for the calls that you make.

Find the Feature  > **Settings** > **In-Call Setup**
> **My Caller ID**


Shortcut: While dialling (with digits visible in the display), press  > **Hide ID/Show ID**.

Dialling International Numbers






Press and hold  to insert the local international access code (+) for the country from which you are calling.

Viewing Recent Calls

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialled, even if the calls did not connect. The lists are sorted from newest to oldest entries. The oldest entries are deleted as new entries are added.

Returning an Unanswered Call

Your phone keeps a record of your unanswered calls, and displays:

Using the Notepad

The most recent set of digits entered on the keypad are stored in your phone's notepad memory. This can be a phone number that you called, or a number that you entered but did not call. To retrieve the number stored in the notepad:

Voicemail messages that you receive are stored on the network. To listen to your messages, you must call your voicemail phone number.

Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.

Listening to Voicemail Messages

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number.

Receiving a Voicemail Message

When you receive a voicemail message, your phone displays the **☎** (voicemail message) indicator and a **New Voicemail** notification.

CALL key	listen to the message

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number.

Storing Your Voicemail Number

If necessary, use the following procedure to store your voicemail phone number on your phone. Usually, your service provider has already done this for you.

☎ > **Voicemail Setup**

Press	To
1 keypad keys	enter your voicemail number
2 OK key	store the number

You cannot store a **⏸** (pause), **⏴** (wait), or **⏵** (number) character in this number. If you want to store a voicemail number with these characters, create a phonebook entry for it. Then, you can use the entry to call your voicemail.

When you are on a call, an alert tone sounds to indicate that you have received a second call.




