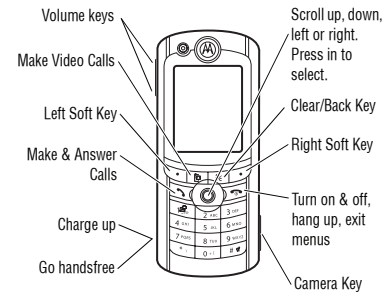

If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body when transmitting.

3.2.4 Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body.

3.2.5 Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries, antennas, and convertible covers, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www.motorola.com.

3.3 RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: *Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.*

Note: *This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.*

3.3.1 Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

3.1 Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

3.2 Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following instructions.

3.2.1 External Antenna Care

If your phone has an external antenna, use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and/or may result in non-compliance with local regulatory requirements in your country.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed.

3.2.2 Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a fixed line phone.

3.2.3 Body-Worn Operation: Voice Communication

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting voice communications, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines.

3.3.2 Aircraft

Turn off your wireless device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your device offers a flight mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about use in flight. If your device offers a feature that automatically turns on the phone, then turn off this feature before boarding an aeroplane or entering an area where the use of wireless devices is restricted.

3.3.3 Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 15 centimetres (6 inches) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 15 centimetres (6 inches) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.

- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

3.4 Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a phone may be distracting in certain circumstances. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving.

- Always use handsfree operation.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

3.5 Operational Warnings

3.5.1 For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

3.5.2 Gas or Petrol Stations

Obey all posted signs with respect to the use of radio equipment in gas or petrol stations. Turn off your wireless device if instructed by authorised staff.

3.5.3 Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

3.5.4 Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

3.5.5 Damaged Products






If your phone or battery has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you take it to a Motorola Authorised Service Centre to determine if it has been damaged. Do not attempt to dry it with an external heat source, such as a microwave oven.

3.5.6 Batteries and Chargers

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become hot. Take care when handling a charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects. **Use only Motorola Original™ batteries and chargers.**

Caution: To avoid risk of personal injury, do not dispose of your battery in a fire.

3.6 Choking Hazards

Your phone or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking hazard to small children. Keep your phone and its accessories away from small children.

3.7 Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when watching television or playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone. (The flashing-light feature is not available on all products.)

Parents should monitor their children's use of video games or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.

- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.

3.8 Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. 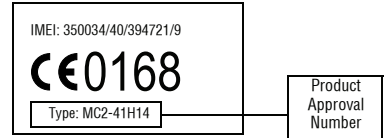
- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.

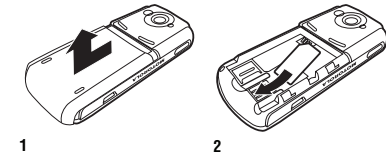

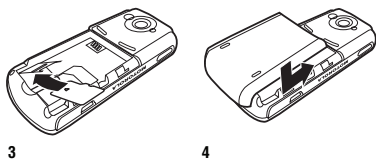
6.2 Installing the USIM, SIM, or Memory Cards

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your card. Avoid exposing your card to static electricity, water, or dirt.
 Your 3G USIM (Universal IC Card) contains your phone number, service details, and contacts list/message memory. Your phone can use GSM SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) cards, but not all features will be available.



6.3 Memory Card

Insert the Memory Card next to the SIM card (see above) underneath the phone battery.



The Memory Card provides you with a larger storage capacity than the Phone Memory. When you download for example pictures, sounds, video clips or Java applications, they will be saved to the Memory Card.

Note: If you download a copyrighted file and store it on your memory card, you can use the file only while your memory card is inserted in your phone. You cannot send, copy, or change copyrighted files.

To show the amount of free space on the Memory Card:

When you look at a list of files in **My Files**, the icon next to it shows whether it is stored on your memory card or your internal memory.

 If you have a TransFlash removable memory card, the use of an SD adapter allows you to use it in other devices that are compatible with SD cards (for example, digital cameras, laptops, mp3-players).

6.4 User Memory

Your phone stores any content that you add, like ringtones or games, in *user memory*. Your service provider may store some content in user memory before you receive the phone.

6.5 Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

- Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.



- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling centre for proper battery disposal.

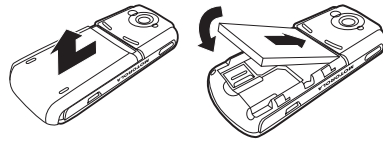

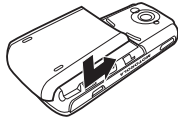

6.7 Using Your Charger

The battery charger shipped with this device is specifically designed for use with Motorola 3G mobile phones. Other chargers might take longer to charge your battery or cause your calls to fail during charging.


For best performance, please use the following charger kits with this device:

 - With SYN7455A UK Plug or SYN7456A Euro Plug
- SYN0847 V700 EMU Vehicle Power Adapter

6.8 Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before using your phone, please install and **fully charge the battery as described below**. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.


Action

- 1 Plug the charger into your phone.
- 
- 2 Plug the other end of the charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
 - 3 When your phone indicates **Charge complete**, remove the charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

6.9 Turning Your Phone On

Action

- 1 Press and hold for 2 seconds or until the display turns on.
- 
- 2 If necessary, select whether to start in **Flight Mode** or not. See "Flight Mode" on page 89 for more details.
 - 3 If necessary, press to scroll to the User Account you want. Then press the **Select** key to select the account from the list (stored on the SIM card).
 - 4 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the **OK** key to unlock the SIM card.
- Caution:** If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**.
- 5 If necessary, enter your four-digit unlock code and press **OK** key to unlock the phone.

Tip: The unlock code is originally set to 1234. Your service provider may change this number before you receive your phone.

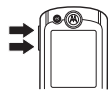

6.10 Adjusting Volume

Press the up or down volume keys to:

- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease speakerphone volume during a call
- turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible



Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

6.12 Answering a Call

6.13 Changing the Call Alert

To set your **Ring Style**, press > **Ring Styles** or **Settings** > **Ring Styles** (see page 60).

Shortcut: In the home screen, press the down volume key to switch the alert for incoming calls and other events to vibrate alert, then silent alert. Press the up volume key to reset ring alert.

Shortcut: Press and hold to quickly change to silent style. Press and hold again to change back to previous ring style.

6.14 Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press .

While you are on a call, press **Options** > **My Tel. Numbers**.

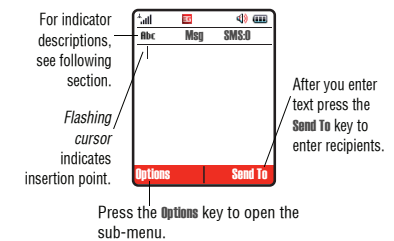

Some features require you to enter information. The message centre lets you compose and send text messages.

6.15.1 Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

Press **[123]** in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

- [1]** or **[1]** Your **Primary** text entry mode can be set to any iTAP **[1]** or tap **1** mode.
- [2]** or **[2]** Your **Secondary** text entry mode can be set to any iTAP **[2]** or tap **2** mode, or set to **None** if you don't want a secondary entry mode.
- 123** **Numeric** mode enters numbers only.
- &** **Symbol** mode enters symbols only.

6.15.2 Setting Up a Text Entry Mode

To set your primary and secondary text entry modes, press **Options > Text Setup** in a text entry view and select **Primary Text** or **Secondary Text**, and choose:

- iTAP** Let the phone predict each word as you press keys (see page 23).
- TAP** Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key one or more times.
- Tap Extended** Enter letters, numbers, and symbols by pressing a key one or more times.
- None** Hide the Secondary setting (only available for Secondary Setup).

Using Capitalisation

Press **[ABC]** in any text entry screen to change text case. The following indicators show capitalisation status:

- abc** = no capital letters
- Abc** = capitalise next letter only
- ABC** = all capital letters

Text Entry Mode Indicators

When you select the **Primary** or **Secondary** text entry mode, the following indicators identify the text entry setting:

Primary	Second.	
1	2	Tap, no capital letters
1↑	2↑	Tap, capitalise next letter only
1↑	2↑	Tap, all capital letters
[1]	[2]	iTAP, no capital letters
[1↑]	[2↑]	iTAP, capitalise next letter only
[1↑]	[2↑]	iTAP, all capital letters

Two other indicators identify **Numeric (123)** or **Symbol (&)** entry modes.

6.15.3 Using Tap Mode

This is the standard mode for entering text on your phone.

Regular **TAP** mode cycles through the letters and number of the key you press. **Tap Extended** also cycles through additional symbols as shown in the chart on page 23.

Press	To
1 A keypad key one or more times	select a letter, number, or symbol
2 keypad keys	enter remaining characters

Tip: Press **⌵** right to accept a word completion, or **[X]** to insert a space.

In a text entry screen, you can press **[123]** to switch entry mode. If you don't see **Abc1** or **Abc2** then press **Options > Text Setup** to set tap mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

Block cursor indicates highlighted character. After 2 seconds, character is accepted and cursor moves to next position.

Press **[X]** to delete character to left of insertion point.

Press the **Send To** key to enter the recipient.

Press the **Options** key to open the sub-menu.

To enter text in tap mode, press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and number on the key. Repeat this step to enter each letter.

When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **prog** you might see:

Flashing cursor indicates insertion point.

Press **⌵** right to accept **program**, or press **[X]** to reject it and enter a space after **prog**.

If you want a different word (such as **progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

- Press **⌵** left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalised. If necessary, press **⌵** down to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press **[Back]** to exit without saving.

6.15.4 Using iTAP™ Mode

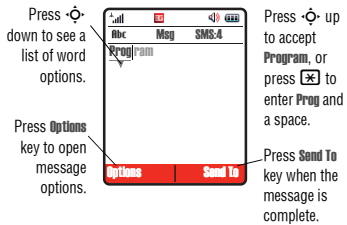
Press **[123]** in a text entry view to switch to iTAP mode. If you don't see **[1]** or **[2]**, press **Options > Text Setup** to set iTAP mode as your primary or secondary text entry mode.

iTAP™ software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **TAP**, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.

Tip: Your phone has a text tutorial which should help you with any problems..

Find the Feature **Options > Text Setup > Text Tutorial**

For example, if you press [7][7][6][4], letter combinations that match your key presses display:



- If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.
- To enter numbers quickly, press and hold a number key to temporarily switch to numeric mode. Press the number keys to enter the numbers you want. Enter a space to change back to iTAP mode.
- Press [] to enter punctuation or other characters.

Entering Words

If you see an  (in-call) indicator during a Vodafone live! session, your phone is using a standard voice connection. The type of network connection your phone uses depends on your service provider's network. Your network connection charges may vary depending on the type of connection used.

Note: Some features on your phone might open Vodafone live! automatically.

9.1.4 Running Vodafone live! in the Background

Note:

- The files that you download or receive as attachments might have a copyright lock that keeps you from forwarding them.
- If you receive a call during the download, press the **More Apps** key to answer the call without ending the download.
- To end a download in progress, press .

9.1.4 Running Vodafone live! in the Background

Some phones are set up to run Vodafone live! in the background when the phone registers with a network. This lets your phone display information services messages sent by your service provider (such as stock updates, news headlines, or sports scores). These types of services typically are available through subscription from your service provider.




Live Cast sends news headlines to your phone. If you are interested in the item, you can click on the headline to view the full article with the browser.

If there are no new messages then the headlines are hidden. You can press the **Live Cast** key to make them appear. They automatically reappear when a new headline is received.




6. Messaging Presence Indicator









7. Message Indicator

Displays when you receive a new message. Indicators can include:

8. Ring Style Indicator

Shows the ring style setting.

-  = vibrate
-  = silent

9. Battery Level Indicator

Vertical bars show the battery charge level. Recharge the battery when **Low Battery** displays and the battery alert sounds.





2. GPRS Indicator

Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:

-  = GPRS PDP context activate
-  = GPRS attach available
-  = GPRS packet data available

3. Data Transmission Indicator






Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:

-  = secure packet data transfer
-  = unsecure packet data transfer
-  = secure application connection
-  = unsecure application connection




4. Roam Indicator

Shows when your phone is seeking or using another network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

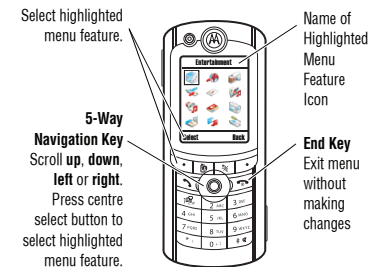



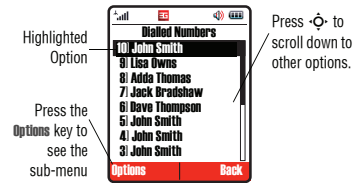

This example shows that from the home screen, you must press to open the menu, highlight and select Call Log, then highlight and select **Dialed Numbers**.

Press the navigation key () up, down, left or right to highlight items, and press it () to select items. Press the left/right soft keys to select the functions listed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

10.3.2 Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



- Press to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.
- In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.
- In an alphabetised list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.
- When an option has a list of possible values, press left or right to scroll through and select a value.

- When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

10.4 Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's integrated handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **Speaker** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speakerphone On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **Speaker** key again or turn the phone off.

Note: *The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.*

10.5 Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code or PIN2 code, if necessary. Your *Personal Identification Number* (PIN) code protects the information stored on your SIM card.

To change a code or password:

Find the Feature > Settings > Security > New Passwords

10.6 Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 68).

10.6.1 Locking Your Phone Manually

Find the Feature > Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now

Press	To
1 keypad keys	enter your unlock code
2 key	lock the phone

10.6.2 Unlocking Your Phone

Your phone's unlock code is originally set to 1234. Many service providers reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number.

At the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt:

2 key	unlock your phone

10.6.3 Setting Your Phone to Lock Automatically

You can set your phone to lock every time you turn it off:

10.7 If You Forget a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Many service providers reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number before you receive your phone.

If you forget your unlock code, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that does not work, at the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt:

If you forget your security code, SIM card PIN code or PIN2 code, contact your service provider.

10.8 Locking and Unlocking Your Keypad



You can lock your keypad to prevent accidental key presses. To lock your keypad, hold for two seconds. To unlock it, press the **Unlock** key (right soft key) then .


Note: *Incoming calls and messages unlock the keypad.*

11.1 Storing Your Name and Phone Number

To store or edit your name and phone number information on your SIM card:

Find the Feature  > Settings > Phone Status > My Tel. Numbers

Shortcut: Press   from the home screen to view or edit your name and phone number.

Tip: If you want to see your phone number while you are on a call press  > My Tel. Numbers.

If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.

11.2 Setting the Time and Date

Your phone uses the time and date for the Calendar.

Find the Feature  > Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date

To synchronise the time and date with the network, press  > Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date > Autoupdate > On.

To manually set the time and date, turn off Autoupdate, then, press  > Settings > Initial Setup > Time and Date > time or date.

To choose an analogue or digital clock for your home screen, press  > Settings > Personalise > Home Screen > Clock.

To turn the date on or off on your home screen, press  > Settings > Personalise > Home Screen > Date.

11.3 Setting a Ring Style

Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

You can select one of five different ring styles. The ring style indicator in the display shows the current ring style (see page 54).

To set a ring style:

Find the Feature  > Settings > Ring Styles > Style: *style name*

Setting a Theme

Tip: This feature helps save your screen, but not your battery. To extend battery life, turn off the screen saver.

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a screen saver image. The image shrinks to fill the display, if necessary. An animation repeats for one minute, then the first frame of the animation displays.


Find the Feature  > Settings > Personalise > Screen Saver

Setting	Description
Picture	Select the picture or animation for your screen saver or None for no screen saver.
Delay	Select how long your phone must be inactive before the screen saver picture displays. Note: If this setting is longer than your Display Timeout setting, then your display will turn off before you see the screen saver.

11.6 Setting a Theme

A *theme* is a group of image and sound files that you can apply to your phone. Most themes include a wallpaper image, screen saver image, and ringtone. Your phone may come with some themes, and you can download or create more.

To apply a theme, press  > My Files > Themes > *theme*.

To create a theme, press  > My Files > Themes, then press Options > Create New.



To edit a theme, press  > My Files > Themes, highlight the theme, then press Options > Edit.

Note: You cannot edit themes with (custom) after their names. The (custom) means that you changed a theme element (such as wallpaper) in another phone menu.



To delete a theme, press  > My Files > Themes, scroll to the theme, and press Options > Delete or Delete All.

Note: You can delete only the themes you created or downloaded.

Setting a Wallpaper Image

Each ring style contains settings for specific event alerts, ringer ID, and ringer and keypad volume. To change these settings, press  > Settings > Ring Styles > *style* Details.

- If you select the Silent ring style, your phone will not use Auto Answer (see page 84).
- Java™ applications can make your phone vibrate or light up. You can turn off App Vibration and App Backlight under  > Settings > Java Settings.
- To turn off alerts for messages that arrive during a call, select  > Settings > In-Call Setup > MSG Alert > Not in Call.

11.4 Setting a Wallpaper Image

You can set a photo, picture, or animation as a wallpaper (background) image in your phone's home screen. The wallpaper image displays as a faint watermark in text and menu displays.

Your theme can set your wallpaper, see page 62.

When you set an animation as a wallpaper image, only the first frame of the animation displays.

Find the Feature  > Settings > Personalise > Wallpaper

Setting	Description
Picture	Select the picture or animation for the background image in your home screen, or None for no wallpaper.
Layout	Select: Centre to centre the image on the display Tile to repeat the image across the display Fit-to-screen to stretch the image across the display.

11.5 Setting a Screen Saver Image

The screen saver image displays when the phone is on and no activity is detected for a specified time period.

Your theme can set your screen saver, see page 62.

11.7 Setting Display Appearance

To choose a phone *skin* that sets the look and feel of your phone's display.

Find the Feature  > Settings > Personalise > Skins Menu

Your theme can set your phone's skin see page 62.

To set your display brightness

Find the Feature  > Settings > Initial Setup > Brightness

You can set the amount of time that the display and keypad backlights remain on, or turn off backlights to extend battery life.

Caution: The Continuous setting can decrease battery life.

Find the Feature  > Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight

Note: To turn the backlight on or off for Java applications, press  > Settings > Java Settings > App Backlight.

You can set the display to turn itself off when no activity is detected for a specified time period.

Find the Feature  > Settings > Initial Setup > Display Timeout

11.8 Setting Answer Options

The Multi-Key option lets you answer incoming calls by pressing any key.

Find the Feature  > Settings > In-Call Setup > Answer Options > MultiKey

For basic instructions on how to make and answer calls, see page 18.

12.1 Turning Off a Call Alert

You can turn off your phone's incoming call alert before answering the call.

12.2 Changing the Active Line



Change the active phone line to make and receive calls from your other phone number.

Note: This feature is available only for dual-line-enabled SIM cards and is operator dependent.

The active line indicator in the display shows the currently active phone line (see page 54).

12.3 Viewing Call Log

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialled, even if the calls did not connect. The lists are sorted from newest to oldest entries. The oldest entries are deleted as new entries are added.

When you are on a call or downloading a file, an alert tone sounds to indicate that you have received a second call.

2 Switch key	switch between calls
or Link key	connect the 2 calls
or Options > End Call on Hold	end the call on hold

You must turn on call waiting to use the feature. To turn call waiting on or off:

Find the Feature	To
> Settings > In-Call Setup > Call Waiting	

12.10 Using Caller ID

12.10.1 Incoming Calls

Calling line identification (Caller ID) displays the phone number for incoming calls.

The phone displays the caller's name (and picture, if available) if the name is stored in your contacts, or **Incoming Call** when caller ID information is not available.

You can also set your phone to play a distinctive **Ringer ID** for specific entries stored in your contacts. For more information, see page 78.

12.10.2 Outgoing Calls

You can show or hide your phone number as an ID for the calls that you make.


While dialling (with digits visible in the display), press **Options > Hide Caller ID/Show Caller ID**.

12.11 Calling an Emergency Number

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 999, that you can call under any

circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted. Your service provider can program additional emergency numbers into your SIM card. *However, your SIM card must be inserted in your phone in order to use the numbers stored on it.* See your service provider for additional information on this issue.

Note: *Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.*

Press	To
1 keypad keys	dial the emergency number
2 	call the emergency number

12.12 Dialling International Numbers

Press and hold **[0]** to insert the local international access code (+) from which you are calling. Then press the keypad keys to enter the country code and number.

12.13 Using Voicemail

Voicemail messages that you receive are stored on the network. To listen to your messages, you must call your voicemail phone number.


Note: *Your service provider may include additional information about using this feature.*

12.13.1 Listening to Voicemail Messages

Find the Feature  > **Messaging > Call Voicemail**

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number, see page 69. If you don't know your voicemail number, contact your service provider.

12.13.2 Receiving a Voicemail Message

When you receive a voicemail message, your phone displays  (voicemail message indicator) and **New Voicemail**.

Note: *The icon may vary depending on your service provider.*


Press	To
Call key	listen to the message

The phone calls your voicemail phone number. If no voicemail number is stored, your phone prompts you to store a number.

12.13.3 Storing Your Voicemail Number

If necessary, use the following procedure to store your voicemail phone number on your phone. Usually, your service provider has already done this for you.
