Your new phone does its part to reduce its climate impact by minimizing its carbon footprint through more efficient energy, transportation, and material use. Here are other ways you can do your part:


- Carpool—sharing a ride just once a week reduces your carbon emissions by 20%.

Use and Care

To care for your Motorola phone, please keep it away from:



liquids of any kind

Don't expose your phone to water, rain, extreme humidity, sweat, or other moisture. If it does get wet, don't try to accelerate drying with the use of an oven or dryer, as this may damage the phone.



dust and dirt

Don't expose your phone to dust, dirt, sand, food, or other inappropriate materials.



extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below $0^{\circ}\text{C}/32^{\circ}\text{F}$ or above $45^{\circ}\text{C}/113^{\circ}\text{F}$.



cleaning solutions

To clean your phone, use only a dry soft cloth. Don't use alcohol or other cleaning solutions.



microwaves

Don't try to dry your phone in a microwave oven.

Tip: Press the *center key* • or **Select** to select a highlighted option.


SIM card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and contacts. It can also contain your voicemail and text message settings.

If you put your SIM card in another phone, that phone uses your phone number.

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.

Tip: Ensure your SIM card is fully inserted into the phone before fitting the battery.




Note: While the battery cover is removed you might want to change your phone front cover (see page 26).

memory card

You can use a removable microSD memory card up to 2 GB (greater than 1 GB capacity is guaranteed only for SanDisk microSD cards) to store multimedia objects, such as pictures and music. We recommend that you only use Motorola approved memory cards, such as SanDisk memory cards. Other memory cards may not be compatible with your phone.

To install the memory card, make sure the memory card's metal contacts are facing down. Slide the top of the memory card



under the metal band and into the holder. Make sure

to **format new memory cards**, as described on page 21. To remove the memory card, slide the card back out of the holder.

battery

battery use & safety IMPORTANT: HANDLE AND STORE BATTERIES PROPERLY TO AVOID INJURY OR DAMAGE.

Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries, and particularly from the continued use of damaged batteries.

DON'Ts

- Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the phone or battery come in contact with water. Water can get into the

- phone's circuits, leading to corrosion. If the phone and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your carrier or contact Motorola even if they appear to be working properly.
- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as jewelry, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot.
- Don't place your battery near a heat source. Excessive heat can damage the phone or the battery. High temperatures can cause the battery to swell, leak, or malfunction. Therefore:
 - Do **not** dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
 - Avoid leaving your phone in your car in high temperatures.

DOs

- Do avoid dropping the battery or phone.
 Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.
- Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your phone or battery has been damaged from dropping or high temperatures.

batteries. If you see a message on your display such as **Invalid Battery** or **Unable to Charge**, take the following steps:

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it has a "Motorola Original" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a Motorola battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.



install the battery




remove the battery



Note: Your battery is intentionally tight fitting to ensure consistent connection.

charge the battery

Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several seconds to start charging the



battery. The phone shows Charge Complete when finished.

Tip: You can also use a PC USB port to charge your phone battery. Before connecting your phone to your PC, download and install the charging software driver from www.motorola.com/support/W233.

Notes for charging your phone's battery:

- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging.
- New batteries are not fully charged.

- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold of for a few seconds or until the display turns on.



If prompted, enter your four-digit unlock code. Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or the last four digits of your phone number (see page 20).

To turn off your phone, press and hold **1** for a few seconds.

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press to answer.

To hang up, press ①.

make a call

Enter a phone number and press ① to make a call.

To hang up, press ②.

Tip: Is your caller saying they can't hear you? Make sure your finger is not covering the microphone (see page 2).

adjust volume

You can adjust the volume, during a call, by pressing $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot \mathbf{r}$ right to increase and left to decrease the earpiece volume. To mute a call, press $\cdot \hat{\mathbf{Q}} \cdot \mathbf{r}$ and select **Mute**.

change ring alert

Find it: ♠ > B♥ Settings > Ring Style

Select Loud Ring, Soft Ring, Vibrate, Vibrate & Ring, Vibrate then Ring or Silent (see page 24).

store a phone number

You can store up to 500 phone numbers in Phonebook:

- Enter a phone number in the home screen, and press Store.
- 2 Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item, press the center key .

To store an email address for a new contact, press •• > •• Phonebook > [New Entry] > New > Email. Enter the name and email address and then press Done.

call a stored phone number

Find it: • > • Phonebook

- 1 Scroll to the entry.
- 2 Press (to call the entry.

Shortcut: In Phonebook, enter the first letters of an entry to get to it quickly.

Note: you can change the search method to **Find** so that you can search for a contact name by typing it in:



basics

home screen

When you turn on your phone, it displays the *home* screen. To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and ①.



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

Soft key labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 2.

Press the *navigation key* • up, down, left, or right to select items in the home screen.

Status indicators can appear at the top of the home screen:

You can also use an optional 2.5 mm wired headset to go handsfree. Mini USB headsets are not supported.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear. To turn the speaker on, during a call, press **SPKR ON**. To turn the speaker off, press **SPKR OFF**.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or to the last four digits of your phone number. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**.

Your service provider may reset these codes. If not, you should change them to protect your personal information. The unlock code must contain four digits. The security code must contain six digits.

To change a code or password:

Find it: ♠ > ₩ Settings > Security > New Passwords

Note: If you forget your security code, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone with a four-digit code to keep others from using it. (to lock and unlock keys see page 22).

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 32). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

To lock your phone:

Find it: •• > #\$\text{Settings} > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now or Automatic Lock

Enter the four-digit unlock code and press **OK**. Your phone first displays **Phone Locked**, and then shows **Enter Unlock Code** until the next time you unlock your phone.

To unlock your phone, enter your four-digit code and press **OK**.

memory card setup

You can store multimedia content, such as songs and pictures, on your phone's internal memory or on an optional memory card.

Note: Your phone supports microSD memory cards with up to 2 GB capacity (greater than 1 GB capacity is guaranteed only for SanDisk microSD cards).

format memory card

You will need to format the memory card before using it for the first time. This essential procedure creates the **Music** and **Pictures** directories. If you do not format a memory card before using it for the first time, your phone may not be able to read the contents of the card.

Caution: Formatting the memory card **erases all content** on the card.

Find it: • > By Settings > Initial Setup

- 1 Scroll to Format Additional Storage Device and press Select.
- When prompted, press Yes to continue or No to cancel formatting.

To copy files from a computer to your memory card, see page 46. You cannot copy files between your phone's memory and your memory card.

Tip: To access data stored on your microSD memory card, with your phone in the home screen, press ••• > •• Multimedia > Pictures or Music Library, then <math>••• > •• Switch Storage Devices. If there are no files stored on your memory card then your phone will automatically switch to its internal memory.

tips & tricks

From the home screen (page 18), you can use shortcuts:

play music	Press the left soft key to activate the music library.

main menu appearance

To change your main menu appearance to either icons or a text-based list, press $\dot{\Phi} > 3\%$ Settings > Personalize > Main Menu > View.

MyMenu

Create a custom menu of your favorite phone features and tools.

assign features to MyMenu

 Press then scroll to a desired menu or submenu item.

For example if you want to assign the Messages menu to MyMenu, scroll to the messages icon (\square)

on the main menu. If you want to assign the Calculator function to MyMenu, scroll to and select Office Tools (on the main menu) then scroll to Calculator.

- With the desired option highlighted, press and hold •• until the MyMenu confirmation appears, then press OK.
- 3 Press Done to accept the assigned key number, or scroll to Key and press Change to assign a different one

use MyMenu

Find it: ♠ > ₩ Organizer > MyMenu

Scroll to the MyMenu item you want and press Enter.

ring styles & alerts

Your phone rings and/or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or to signal certain other events.

set styles

Find it: ♠ > B Settings > Ring Style

- Select Style by pressing •.
- 2 Scroll to a ring style and press .

set alerts

Set alerts for different events, such as getting a message in your inbox or receiving a call.

Find it: • > \$ Settings > Ring Style

- 1 Scroll to Style Detail and press .
- 2 Scroll to an alert type and press .
- 3 Scroll to the desired detail setting and press .

Note: Your phone plays a sample of each highlighted setting. Ringtones play through the speakerphone, unless you're using a headset.

answer options

Set your phone to either Multi-key On to answer by pressing any key or Multi-key Off to answer by pressing the send key only.

Find it: •• > By Settings > In Call Setup > Answer Options

wallpaper

Set a picture as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Find it: •• > # Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

To select a wallpaper image:

- 1 Scroll to Picture and press ••.
- 2 Scroll to Preloaded and downloaded media files or Additional Storage Device to browse your memory card and press *.
- 3 Scroll to the picture you want and press .

or

Select (None) to turn off wallpaper.

To adjust wallpaper image layout:

- 1 Scroll to Set Layout and press .
- 2 Scroll to Tile, center or Fit-to-screen, and press .

screen saver

Set a picture as a screen saver image. The screen saver displays when the phone is being charged and there is no activity.

Find it: •• > By Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

To select a screen saver:

- 1 Scroll to Type and select Animation.
- 2 Scroll to Animation and press .
- 3 Scroll to the animation you want and press .

To specify how long your phone must be inactive before it displays the screen saver:

- 1 Scroll to Idle Time and press .
- 2 Select a time period or **Off** and press •.

Note: To conserve battery life, turn off the screen saver.

color settings

To choose a **Color Setting** (or skin) that sets the look and feel of your phone's display: Press • > 8% **Settings** > **Personalize** > **Color Setting**.

display settings

Select a time period the display light remains on.

Find it: • > B Settings > Initial Setup > Display Settings

backlight

Select a time period the display backlight remains on.

Find it: ♠ > 🖔 Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight

change front cover

Your phone has a removable cover that you can replace to change its appearance.

Caution: To avoid risk of personal injury or equipment damage, and maintain compliance with international RF exposure guidelines, do not use or charge your phone with either cover removed.

Caution: The covers are made of plastic and can be broken. Take care when removing or replacing any part of your phone. When changing covers, you are removing some of the phone's outer protection. Therefore, take extra care with your phone and avoid exposure to dirt, dust, liquids (including condensation),

and static electricity. Replace all covers as quickly as possible. Always use Motorola approved covers.

- Remove battery cover and battery. then carefully but firmly ease the locating tabs from the phone to release the top of the cover.
- Working down the phone, release the cover and slide it off the end of the phone.
- Swap the keypad to the new cover. ensuring the top and bottom tabs





- are located securely.
- To apply the new cover, insert the tab at the bottom of the new cover into the bottom of the phone, then use your thumbs to press along the sides of the cover as you fix it into place.
- 5 Replace the battery and cover.

Reset all options except unlock code, security code, and lifetime timer, and clear all user settings and entries.

This option erases all user-entered information stored in your phone memory, including Phonebook entries and downloaded files. **Once you erase the information, it cannot be recovered.** It resets all options to their factory settings except for the unlock code, security code, and lifetime timer.

•• > 🖁 Settings > Initial Setup > Master Clear

To reset all options, you need to enter the **Security Code** (**000000**).

calls

To make and answer calls, see page 16.

redial a number

- 1 From the home screen, press (to see a list of dialed calls.
- 2 Scroll to the entry you want to call and press .

recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialed, even if the calls didn't connect. The lists are sorted from newest to oldest calls. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

Find it: ♠ > ♠ Call Log > Received Calls or Dialed Calls

Scroll to an entry.

Note: A \checkmark next to a call means the call connected.

2 Press (to call the number.

To see call details (such as time and date), press **View**.

Press the center key • while viewing a list of recent calls to see these options:

option	
Store	Store the entry in your phonebook.







This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

- Position your mobile device within easy reach. Be able to access your mobile device without removing your eyes from the road. If you receive an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voicemail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice, and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.

- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when your car is not moving or before pulling into traffic. If you must make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that can divert your attention away from the road
- Use your mobile device to call for help. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, or medical emergencies.*
- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.*
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.*
