Installation Instructions

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS

INTRODUCTION

This instruction covers installation of replacement electronic control modules on all variable speed fan coils, variable speed gas furnaces, and variable speed small packaged products.

DESCRIPTION AND USAGE

This kit is to be used for products which have an ICM2 or 2.3 motor with a round control module attached to the motor end bell.

If servicing an earlier vintage motor, a complete motor which includes this module must be used instead of this kit. See Tables 2, 3, and 4 to match the product model with the replacement module kit part number.

INSTALLATION FOR FAN COILS AND SMALL **PACKAGED PRODUCTS**

Step 1—Check Equipment

Compare contents of kit with Table 1.

^{*} Replacement control modules are factory programmed for specific products and model sizes. Even though they look alike, different modules will have completely different functionality.

Step 2—Disconnect Line Voltage

Disconnect power from fan coil or small packaged unit being serviced. There may be more than one disconnect switch. Do not work on motor with line voltage applied.

NOTE: Failure of replacement controller will also occur if power is applied to unit during replacement.

A WARNING

Wait at least 5 minutes after disconnecting line voltage from equipment before opening motor to prevent electric shock which can cause personal injury or death.

Step 3—Disconnect Existing Control Module

1. Remove blower compartment access panel.

NOTE: For gas packaged products unplug 3 wires from induced draft motor capacitor and move them aside.

- 2. If necessary, clip wire tie holding wires running from control module to motor mounting arms.
- 3. Remove screw holding green ground wire to blower housing.
- 4. Disconnect both multi-pin connectors from control module attached to motor. Be sure to depress release latches on connectors or they may be damaged.
- 5. Remove blower housing and place it on its side with motor control module up. It is not necessary to remove motor from housing. Control module unplugs according to the following instructions. (See Fig. 1.)

- Remove two 1/4-in. hex head bolts from old control module and discard. DO NOT REMOVE TORX HEAD SCREWS located next to 1/4-in. hex head bolts.
- Carefully lift control module off motor. Depress latch on connector to disconnect wire connector that attaches control module to motor. Latch must be depressed to remove or connector and/or motor may be damaged. DO NOT PULL ON WIRES. GRIP PLUG ONLY.

→ Step 4—Motor Check-Out Procedure

1. When control module is completely detached from motor, verify with standard ohmmeter that the resistance from each motor lead in motor plug to unpainted motor end plate is greater than 100k ohms. Use standard ohmmeter to verify that motor windings are not shorted or open by measuring resistance between each combination of pins in motor plug (there are 3 different combinations, pin 1-2, pin 2-3, and pin 1-3). Resistance should be approximately equal across each combination of any two of the three pins in plug.


If any motor fails these tests, do not install control module.
 The motor is defective and must be replaced. Installing new control module will cause it to fail also. Spin wheel to be sure motor turns freely.

Step 5—Install New Control Module

 Remove new controller from box and place it on a working surface with all electrical components facing up. Find plastic locator pin (in bag of fasteners included with kit). Locate deep slot along upper edge of new control module. (See Fig. 2.) Slide plastic locator pin with pin facing away from control into slot.


NOTE: This pin is needed on older ICM2 motors, recognizable by gray control module housing. On newer ICM2.3 motors with the black housing this pin is not needed.

 Position new control module over motor/housing assembly such that locator pin is aligned with mating hole on motor. Attach connector coming from motor to new control module. Be sure connector latches. It will click when properly inserted. Place controller on motor with plastic locator pin in mating hole on motor.

- 3. Find two 3 1/2-in. bolts supplied and slip them into 2 holes on back of new controller. Use 1/4-in. hex head driver to bolt new control module to back of blower motor. (See Fig. 2.) Tighten bolts 1/4 turn past finger tight. Do not over tighten.
- 4. Before replacing blower/motor assembly check installation to see if some application fault has caused motor to fail. Is there any evidence of water damage to failed control module (corrosion on inside or outside of casing)? If yes, check that equipment is properly leveled and drains are unplugged, with functioning 'P' traps, as required. Verify the correct motor mounting orientation and a suitable drip loop in the cables. (See Fig. 3.)
- 5. Slide blower housing back into fan coil/small packaged unit and remount it.
- 6. Reconnect both multi-pin connectors to control module being careful to insert connector in correct orientation (connectors are keyed to install only one way). Reconnect ground wire, if used, to housing as originally connected.


A CAUTION

INSTALLING CONNECTORS INCORRECTLY WILL RESULT IN IMMEDIATE FAILURE OF CONTROL MODULE.

- 7. Secure wires from control module to motor mounting arm with wire tie. (See Fig. 3.)
- 8. Reconnect any other wiring connections which apply.

Step 6—Make Final Installation Check

- 1. Is motor control secured to motor? Is there appropriate drip loop in motor cables?
- 2. Determine that blower housing is correctly secured to blower

Step 7—Replace Fan Coil/Air Handler Blower Compartment Access Panel

Step 8—Reconnect Line Voltage to Unit

Reconnect line voltage to unit and verify that new motor control module is working properly.

INSTALLATION FOR GAS FURNACES

Step 1—Check Equipment

Compare contents of kit with Table 1.

Step 2—Disconnect Line Voltage

Turn off 115vac power to unit. Do not work on motor with line voltage applied.

A WARNING

Wait at least 5 minutes after disconnecting line voltage from equipment before opening motor to prevent electric shock which can cause personal injury or death.

Step 3—Disconnect Existing Control Module

- 1. Remove blower compartment access panel
- 2. Remove blower assembly from furnace as directed in unit's Service and Maintenance Instructions for Blower Motor and Wheel Maintenance.
- Disconnect both mult-pin connectors from control module attached to motor. Be sure to depress releasee latches on connectors or they may be damaged.
- 4. Remove motor mounting leg bolts and rotate motor clockwise 90 degrees, then reinstall leg bolts. This step is necessary for proper control module plug orientation.
- Remove two 1/4-in. hex head bolts from old control module and discard. DO NOT REMOVE TORX HEAD SCREWS located next to 1/4-in. hex head bolts.
- Carefully lift control module off motor. Depress latch on connector to disconnect wire connector that attaches control module to motor. Latch must be depressed to remove or connector and/or motor may be damaged. DO NOT PULL ON WIRES. GRIP PLUG ONLY.

7. When control module is completely detached from motor, verify with standard ohmmeter that the resistance from each motor lead in motor plug to unpainted motor end plate is greater than 100k ohms. Use standard ohmmeter to verify that motor windings are not shorted or open by measuring resistance between each combination of pins in motor plug (there are three different combinations, pin 1-2, pin 2-3, and pin 1-3). Step 4—Install New Control Module

Step 5—Reconnect Furnace Piping and Wiring

Reinstall vent piping, condensate trap, condensate tubes, and any wiring connections which apply. See unit's Service and Maintenance Instructions for Blower Motor and Wheel Maintenance.

Step 6—Make Final Installation Check

- 1. Is motor control secured to motor? Is there appropriate drip loop in motor cables?
- 2. Determine that blower housing is correctly secured to blower shelf
- 3. Determine that all venting and condensate connections are

Step 7—Replace Furnace Blower Compartment Access Panel

Step 8—Reconnect Line Voltage

Turn 115vac power to unit back on and verify that new motor control module is working properly.

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
