# Set up & go

The first time you turn on your phone, a setup wizard guides you through signing in to your Google  $^{\text{TM}}$  account. If you don't have one, don't worry, the wizard will help you create one.

**Note:** This phone supports data-intensive apps and services. It is strongly recommended that you purchase a data plan that meets your needs. Contact your service provider for details.

- 1 Press and hold Power ① on top of your phone to turn it on.
- 2 Select a language.
- 3 Follow the setup wizard to create or log in to your Google account.



#### Lock & unlock

To lock the screen/phone:

- Press Power
- · Let the screen time out (don't press anything).

To unlock the screen/phone:

Press Power (1), then drag (1) to the right.
 If you've set a lock pattern or passcode, you'll be asked to enter it.

For more security features, see "Security" on page 38.

#### Wi-Fi™ connect

If you want to use a Wi-Fi network for even faster Internet access, touch Menu 📳 > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings. There's more in "Wi-Fi™" on page 24.

#### Cool content & more

Browse and download thousands of the coolest apps on the planet from Android Market  $^{\text{TM}}$  (see "Apps for all" on page 21).

Your phone comes with a microSD memory card installed—you can load it up with photos, videos, and music from your computer using "USB drag & drop" on page 35.

# Touchscreen & keys

a few essentials

#### Touch tips


· Touch: Choose an icon or option.

· Touch & Hold: Open options.

Drag: Scroll or move slowly.

· Flick: Scroll or move quickly.

Pinch: Zoom in on maps, web pages, or photos.



**Tip:** When you flick a list, touch again to stop scrolling. If your screen goes to sleep, press Power **O**.

#### BACKTRACK™ touchpad

To navigate without obstructing the touchscreen, you can use the rear touchpad to swipe between panels, lists and websites.



To activate **glow mode**, touch and hold on the touch pad. Then, use

the touchpad to navigate the glow on the display. Touch the touchpad to select an item.

# Key tips

#### Menu, home, back, & search

Touch Home (a) to close any menu or app and return to the home screen.

In the home screen, touch and hold Home  $\widehat{\mbox{\ a}}$  to show the last few apps you used, then touch an app to open it.

Touch Menu 📳 to open menu options, or touch Back 🕥 to go back.

Touch Search Q for text search.

#### Sleep & wake up

To save your battery, prevent accidental touches, or when you want to wipe smudges off your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by pressing Power ①. To wake up the touchscreen, press Power ② again and drag ① to the right, or open the phone.

To change how long your phone waits before the screen goes to sleep automatically, touch Menu 💽 > Settings > Sound & display > Screen timeout.

Tip: To make the screen lock when it goes to sleep, use "Screen lock" on page 38.

#### Power key menu

Press and hold Power ① to open the power key menu, where you can turn off the phone (Power off), or turn Airplane mode or Silent mode either ON or OFF.

#### Adjust volume

Press the volume keys (page 2) to change the ring volume (in the home screen), or the earpiece volume (during a call).

When playing music or video files, press the volume keys to adjust media volume.

#### Spin the screen

You can set the touchscreen to rotate 90 degrees in some apps, such as messaging and contacts, to stay right-side up when you rotate your phone:

Find it: Menu 📳 > Settings > Sound & display > Orientation

#### Home screen

quick access to the things you need most

#### Quick start: Home screen

The *home screen* gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or touch Home (a) from a menu. It's basically like this:



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

#### Use & change your home screen

On your home screen, *shortcuts* are icons that you open your favorite apps, web bookmarks, contacts, mail labels, or music playlists. *Widgets* show you weather, messages, and other updates.

Flick the home screen left or right to open other *panels* of shortcuts and widgets.

- To open something, touch it. Touch Home (a) to return to the home screen.
- To add something or change your wallpaper, touch and hold an empty spot until you see the Add to Home screen menu.

You can add a folder to organize your shortcuts.

 To move or delete something, touch and hold it until you feel a vibration, then drag it to another spot, another panel, or the trash at the bottom of the screen.

# Running multiple apps

No need to close an app before opening another one. Your phone runs multiple apps, all at once.

You can open a new app while already running another. Touch Home (a) to return to the home screen. Open the app menu and touch the app you want. To switch from one running app to another, touch and hold Home (a) to see what apps are already open, then

touch the one you want. You can view up to the last six apps you ran.

#### Search

Touch Search  $\bigcirc$  on the front of the phone, or touch Search  $\bigcirc$  on your phone's slide-out keypad.



To add a search bar in the home screen, touch and hold an empty spot, then touch **Android widgets** > **Search**.

# Notifications & phone status

At the top of the screen, icons on the left notify you about new messages or events (notifications). Icons on the right tell you about phone status. Flick the bar down to show notification details.

# App menu

The app menu shows you all of your applications. To open it from the home screen, touch . To close it, touch Home .

Note: Your app menu will vary.

Touch and hold Home (a) to see the last few apps you used, then touch the app you want. Touch Home (a) to return to the home screen.

#### In-call options



During a call, touch **Hold**, **Mute**, **Bluetooth**, or **Speaker**. Your touchscreen goes dark to avoid accidental touches. To wake it up, press Power ①.

Tip: You can touch Home (a) or Back (5) to hide the active call display. To reopen it, flick the status bar down and touch (5).

#### Make & answer calls

To make a call, touch **C** Phone, touch the Phone tab (if necessary), enter a number, then touch **C**.

Tip: To enter an international dialing code, touch and hold **O**. To add a pause or wait after numbers,

To answer a call, drag \_\_\_\_ to the right.

#### End calls

Touch 📻.

#### Voicemail

Find it: Phone > a

# Frequent calls

Find it: Phone > Call log

- · To call a number, touch it.
- To send a text message, view a contact, add the call to speed dial, or other options, touch and hold an entry.

- To use the speakerphone, touch Speaker.
- To use a Bluetooth<sup>™</sup> device, touch Bluetooth.

#### Mute & hold

During a call:

- · To mute the current call, touch Mute.
- · To put a call on hold, touch Hold.

# Enter numbers during a call

To enter numbers during a call, touch **Dialpad** and then touch the dial pad.

# Conference calls

To start a conference call, call the first number. After they answer, touch **Add call** and call the next number. When the next number answers, touch **Merge calls**.

# Your phone number

Find it: Menu 📳 > Settings > About phone > Status > My phone number

#### Your caller ID

To hide your number from the people you call, touch Menu  $\blacksquare$  > Settings > Call settings > Additional settings > Caller ID.

# **Emergency calls**

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Open the phone, then touch Phone (if your phone is locked, touch Emergency Call).
- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- 3 Touch \(\mathbb{\ceil}\) to call the emergency number.

Note: Your mobile device can use AGPS satellite signals to help emergency services find you (see "GPS & AGPS" on page 46).

#### Cool down

In very limited circumstances, such as where your phone has been exposed to extreme heat, "Cool Down" message screens will appear. To avoid possible damage to your battery and phone, you should follow these instructions until the phone is within its recommended temperature range. When your phone is in "Cool Down" mode, only emergency calls can be made.

# Call forwarding & waiting

You can forward calls all the time or only when your phone is busy, unanswered, or unreachable (not on the network):

When you're on a call and a second call comes in, **Call waiting** lets you answer it by touching **Answer**. You can turn off **Call waiting** to send second calls straight to your voicemail:

Find it: Menu 📳 > Settings > Call settings > Additional settings > Call waiting

# Restrict outgoing calls

To restrict your phone so that it can only dial a few numbers:

Find it: Menu (ℍ) > Settings > Call settings > Fixed dialing number

- To turn fixed dialing on, touch FDN disabled.
- To add or delete the allowed numbers, touch Manage FDN list.

#### Contacts

contacts like you've never had before

#### Quick start: Contacts

Find it: O > L Contacts



Tip: To search the list, touch Menu 📳 > Search, then type a name. When you flick or drag this list, a scroll bar appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list faster.

# Import contacts from your SIM

If you need to import the contacts from your SIM card, touch O > La Contacts, then touch Menu 
> Manage SIM > Import SIM card or Export contacts.

#### Call, text, or email contacts

To View contact, Call contact, Delete contact, touch and hold the contact.

#### View & use contacts

- To find a contact, just type the name.
  - Touch a contact to open their details. To start a call or message, just touch their phone number or other info.
- To text a contact, touch and hold the contact, then choose Text contact.

#### Edit or delete contacts

Touch the contact, then touch Menu 📳 > Edit contact or Delete contact. You can set a ringer, address, and other details.

#### Create contacts

Type the name and details.



When you're finished, touch **Done**.



# Quick start: Messaging

Find it: Messaging

Tip: You can also touch O > Messaging.



Tip: To see more messages, flick or drag up.

# Read & reply to messages

- To open a message and all of its replies, touch it.
- To respond to a message, just open it and enter your response in the text box at the bottom.
- To open options, touch and hold a message.

Tip: To add the Messaging shortcut to your homescreen, touch and hold an empty spot on the home screen, then touch **Shortcuts** > **Applications** > Messaging.

# Create messages

Find it: Messaging > New message

Enter the recipient and message. Touch Menu 🔠 to add files or choose other options.

# Change settings

To change your settings, touch Messaging, then touch Menu 🔠 > Settings:

- Text message limit to set the number of messages to save
- Notifications to display message notifications in the status bar
- **Delivery reports** to request a delivery report for each message you send.

# Send & receive attachments

To send a file in a message, open a new message, touch Menu 📳, and choose the file.

When you receive a message with an attachment, open the message and touch the file name to download it. Then, touch the name again to open it. Some file formats can be converted to HTML for faster. viewing, and your phone will show a button that says Get HTML version.

Tip: To send and receive large attachments faster, use a Wi-Fi connection, in "Wi-Fi™" on page 24.

# Set up email

To add email accounts, in the home screen touch > Fmail



Corporate Sync is for Exchange server work email accounts. Enter details from your IT administrator. Tip: You might need to enter your domain name with your user name (like domain/username)

**Email** is for most personal email accounts. For account details, contact the account provider.

# Instant messages

To send and receive instant messages, you can use an instant messaging app or your browser.

 To download and use an instant messaging app, touch Home 向 > 🔘 > 🗯 Market > Apps > Communication, then choose an app for your provider. Once you download the app, you'll see it in "App menu" on page 9.

 If you don't see an app for your IM provider, you can use your web browser. Touch Home A > 0 > **Browser**, enter your provider's website address, then touch Go. Once you're there, follow the link to sign in.

Note: Your IM options will depend on your IM provider. To browse instant messaging apps from your computer, go to www.android.com/market.

#### Voicemail

When you have a new voicemail, oo shows at the top of your screen. To hear the voicemail, drag down the notifications bar and touch oo.

If you need to change your voicemail number, in the home screen touch Menu 🔡 > Settings > Call settings > Voicemail settings.

Note: You might not have some features. For details, ask your service provider.

# Touchscreen keypad

When your phone is closed, you can open a touchscreen keypad by touching a text field, or touching and holding Menu . To close the keypad, touch Back .



#### Symbols/Numbers

Touch to open a keypad for symbols and numbers. Touch Alt on the phone keypad for more symbols.

To change your settings for this keypad, from the home screen, touch Menu  $\fbox{$ :$}$  > Settings > Language & keyboard > Android keyboard.

#### Text entry settings

When you use the touchscreen keypad, your phone suggests words from your dictionary and chosen language. Your phone also automatically enters apostrophes in some words, like "dont."

Find it: In the home screen touch Menu 🔠


- > Settings > Language & keyboard
- · To edit your dictionary, touch User dictionary.
- To change the language and the style for your touchscreen keypad, touch Select locale.
- To change the sounds, corrections, and other settings for your touchscreen keypad, touch Android keyboard.
- To change the automatic correction settings for your full keypad, touch Device keyboard.

#### Quick start: Browser

Find it: O > Browser



**Note:** If you can't connect, contact your service provider.

#### Connect

Your phone uses the mobile phone network (over the air) to automatically connect to the web.

**Note:** Your service provider may charge to surf the web or download data.

To use a wireless network, in the home screen touch Menu 🛃 > Settings > Wireless & networks. Touch Wi-Fi to turn it on, then touch Wi-Fi settings to search for nearby wireless networks. Touch a network to connect. There's more in "Wi-Fi<sup>TM</sup>" on page 24.

# Web touch tips

# Zoom & magnify

In web pages, double-touch to zoom in/out.



**Tip:** Use pinch-to-zoom to zoom in/out, see "Touch tips" on page 5.

#### Select links

When you touch a link, your phone outlines it. If you touch and hold the link, your



phone shows options, like **Open in new window** or **Bookmark link**.

# Browser options

Touch Menu 📳 to see browser options:

options	
New window	Add a new browser window to your list.
Bookmarks	Shows a list of your bookmarks. Touch <b>Add</b> to add the current page to your list.
Windows	View the browser windows that are currently open.
Refresh	Reloads the current page.
Forward	Navigate to a previously viewed page.
More	Shows browser options, like Find on page, Select text, Page info, Share page, Downloads, and Settings.

# Download apps

Warning: Apps downloaded from the web can be from unknown sources. To protect your phone and personal data, only download apps from sources you trust, like "Apps for all" on page 21.

**Note:** All apps downloaded are stored in your phone memory.

To download apps:

- 1 If you want to download apps from any web page, touch Menu Settings > Applications > Unknown sources.
- 2 To launch the browser, touch O > Browser.
- 3 Find the app you want to download and touch the download link.

#### Browse & install apps

Scroll to and touch the app you want to install. Then, touch **Install** (if app is free) or **Buy**.

Warning: If an app you are downloading requires access to your data or control of functions on your phone, you'll be asked to give your permission. After selecting Install, the app will download. After selecting Buy, you may be asked to sign in to an additional Google account. Sign in and select Purchase now to proceed. Follow the on-screen instructions. To

see the download progress, open the notifications window.

After you download an app, the icon for that app appears on your app menu.

#### Manage & restore apps

To manage your apps, in the home screen touch Menu Settings > Applications > Manage applications.

Touch the app to open the details screen—from here you can review, uninstall, and more.

To reinstall any downloaded items, touch Home (a) > (a) Market > Download. All previously installed apps are listed and available for download.

# Turn Bluetooth power on or off

Find it: Home ♠ > Menu ♣ > Settings > Wireless & networks > Bluetooth

Note: To extend battery life, turn Bluetooth power off when not in use.

#### Connect new devices

Note: This feature requires an optional accessory.

To connect with a new device, you need to pair with it. You only need to do this once for each device—to connect again, just turn on the device.

1 Make sure the device you are pairing with is in discoverable mode.

**Note:** Refer to the guide that came with the device for details.

- 2 In the home screen touch Menu > Settings > Wireless & networks > Bluetooth settings.
- 3 Touch **Bluetooth** to turn on and scan. If Bluetooth power is already on, touch **Scan for devices**.
- 4 Touch a device to connect.
- 5 If necessary, touch OK, or enter the device passkey (like 0000) to connect to the device. When the device is connected, the Bluetooth indicator (§) appears in the status bar.

**Note:** Using a mobile device or accessory while driving may cause distraction and may be illegal. Always obey the laws and drive safely.

#### Reconnect devices

To automatically reconnect your phone with a paired device, simply turn on the device.

To manually reconnect your phone with a paired device, touch the device name in the **Bluetooth devices** list.

#### Disconnect devices

To automatically disconnect your phone from a paired device, simply turn off the device.

To manually disconnect your phone from a paired device, touch the device name in the devices list, then touch Menu 📳 > Disconnect.

# Edit properties

In the home screen touch Menu 📳 > Settings > Wireless & networks > Bluetooth settings > Device name. Enter a name and touch OK.



# Quick start: Wi-Fi

Find it: Home ♠, touch Menu ♠ > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings

**Note:** Your phone's Wi-Fi features and power levels are not allowed for outdoor operation in France. To avoid unlawful interference with radio signals, do not use the Wi-Fi features in France unless you are indoors.

Use a wireless network for fast Internet access and to download data.



#### Turn Wi-Fi on or off

Find it: Home (a), touch Menu (b) > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi

Note: To extend battery life, turn off Wi-Fi power when not in use.

#### Wi-Fi search & connect

To find networks in your range:

- 1 In the home screen touch Menu ♠ > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings.
- 2 Touch Wi-Fi to turn on and scan. If Wi-Fi is already on, touch Menu > Scan. Your phone lists the networks it finds within range.

**Tip:** To see your phone's MAC address or other Wi-Fi details, touch Menu ■ > **Advanced**.

- 3 Touch a network to connect.
- 4 If necessary, enter Network SSID, Security, and Wireless password, and touch Connect. When your phone is connected to the network, the wireless indicator appears in the status bar.

**Tip:** When you are in range and Wi-Fi power is on, you will automatically reconnect to available networks you've connected to before.

### Battery tips

Your phone is like a small computer, giving you a lot of information and apps, at 3G speed, with a touch display! Depending on what you use, that can take a lot of power.

To start getting the most out of your battery, touch Menu 📳 > Settings > Battery Manager > Battery Profile. Choose Performance mode for constant data transfer and battery use, Battery Saver Mode when your battery is low, or Smart mode if you want to set Battery Profile Options that limit your data and wireless connections during off-peak hours.

To save even more battery life between charges, you could reduce:

- recording or watching videos, listening to music, or taking pictures.
- widgets that stream information to your home screen, like news or weather ("Use & change your home screen" on page 7).







# Battery Use & Safety

Important: Handle and store batteries properly to avoid injury or damage.

Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries, and particularly from the continued use of damaged batteries.

#### DON'Ts

- Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the mobile device or battery come in contact with water.\* Water
  can get into the mobile devices circuits, leading to corrosion. If the mobile device
  and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your service provider or contact
  Motorola, even if they appear to be working properly.\*
- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as jewelry, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot.
- Don't place you'r mobile device or battery near a heat source.\* Excessive
  heat can damage the mobile device or the battery. High temperatures can cause
  the battery to swell, leak, or malfunction. Therefore:
- Don't dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.

#### D0s

- Do avoid leaving your mobile device in your car in high temperatures.\*
- Do avoid dropping the battery or mobile device.\* Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.\*
- Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your mobile device or battery has been damaged from dropping or high temperatures.

- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

# Specific Absorption Rate (IEEE)

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.
