Your new phone does its part to reduce its climate impact by minimizing its carbon footprint through more efficient energy, transportation, and material use. Here are other ways you can do your part:


- Carpool—sharing a ride just once a week reduces your carbon emissions by 20%.

Use and Care

To care for your Motorola phone, please keep it away from:



liquids of any kind

Don't expose your phone to water, rain, extreme humidity, sweat, or other moisture. If it does get wet, don't try to accelerate drying with the use of an oven or dryer, as this may damage the phone.



dust and dirt

Don't expose your phone to dust, dirt, sand, food, or other inappropriate materials.



extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below $0^{\circ}\text{C}/32^{\circ}\text{F}$ or above $45^{\circ}\text{C}/113^{\circ}\text{F}$.



cleaning solutions

To clean your phone, use only a dry soft cloth. Don't use alcohol or other cleaning solutions.



microwaves

Don't try to dry your phone in a microwave oven.

Don't drop your phone.

- Press to scroll to Received Calls, and press to select it.


SIM card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and contacts. It can also contain your voicemail and text message settings.

If you put your SIM card in another phone, that phone uses your phone number.

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water, and dirt.


Tip: Ensure your SIM card is fully inserted into the phone before fitting the battery.



memory card

You can use a removable microSD memory card up to 2 GB (greater than 1 GB capacity is guaranteed only for SanDisk microSD cards) to store multimedia objects, such as pictures and music. We recommend that you only use Motorola approved memory cards, such as SanDisk memory cards. Other memory cards may not be compatible with your phone.

To install the memory card, make sure the memory card's metal contacts are facing down. Slide the top of the memory card



under the metal band and into the holder. Make sure to **format new memory cards**, as described on page 20. To remove the memory card, slide the card back out of the holder.

battery

battery use & safety

IMPORTANT: HANDLE AND STORE BATTERIES PROPERLY TO AVOID INJURY OR DAMAGE.

Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries, and particularly from the continued use of damaged batteries.

DON'Ts

- Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the phone or battery come in contact with water. Water can get into the phone's circuits, leading to corrosion. If the phone and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your carrier or contact Motorola even if they appear to be working properly.

- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as jewelry, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot.
 - Don't place your battery near a heat source.
 Excessive heat can damage the phone or the battery. High temperatures can cause the battery to swell, leak, or malfunction.
 Therefore:
 - Do **not** dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
 - Avoid leaving your phone in your car in high temperatures.

Do avoid dropping the battery or phone.
 Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.

 Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your phone or battery has been damaged from dropping or high temperatures.

IMPORTANT: USE MOTOROLA ORIGINAL PRODUCTS FOR QUALITY ASSURANCE AND

SAFEGUARDS. To aid consumers in identifying authentic Motorola batteries from non-original or counterfeit batteries (that may not have adequate safety protection), Motorola provides holograms on its batteries. Consumers should confirm that any battery they purchase has a "Motorola Original" hologram.

Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers. Motorola mobile devices are designed to work with Motorola batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge, take the following steps:

 Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it has a "Motorola Original" hologram;

- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a Motorola battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.

Important: Motorola's warranty does not cover damage to the phone caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.

Warning: Use of a non-Motorola battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

PROPER AND SAFE BATTERY DISPOSAL AND RECYCLING





install the battery




remove the battery



Note: Your battery is intentionally tight fitting to ensure consistent connection.

charge the battery

Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take several seconds to start charging the battery. The



phone shows Charge Complete when finished.

Tip: You can also use a PC USB port to charge your phone battery. Before connecting your phone to your PC, download and install the charging software driver from www.motorola.com/support/W233.


Notes for charging your phone's battery:

- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging.
- New batteries are not fully charged.

- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold ① for a few seconds or until the display turns on.



If prompted, enter your

four-digit unlock code. Your phone's four-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number (see page 19).

To turn off your phone, press and hold **for a** few seconds.

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press to answer.

To hang up, press ①.

make a call

Enter a phone number and press (to make a call.

To hang up, press ①.

Tip: Is your caller saying they can't hear you? Make sure your finger is not covering the microphone (see page 2).

adjust volume

During a call, you can adjust the volume by pressing •• right to increase or left to decrease the earpiece volume. To mute the call, press Mute (right soft key).

change ring alert

Find it: • > Settings > Ring Style > Style

Select Loud Ring, Soft Ring, Vibrate, Vibrate & Ring, Vibrate then Ring or Silent (see page 23).

store a phone number

You can store up to 500 phone numbers in your list of Contacts:

- Enter a phone number in the home screen, and press Store.
- Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item, press .
- 3 Press Done to store the number.

To store an email address for a new contact, press •• > •• Contacts > [New Entry] > New > Email. Enter the name and email address and then press Done.

call a stored phone number

Find it: • > Proceed Contacts

- 1 Scroll to the entry.
- 2 Press to call the entry.

Shortcut: In the contact list, enter the first letters of an entry to get to it quickly.

Note: you can change the search method to **Find** so that you can search for a contact name by typing it in:

basics

home screen

The home screen appears when you turn on the phone.



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

To dial a number from the home screen, press number keys and .

Soft key labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 2.

Press the *navigation key* •**Q**• up, down, left, or right to select items in the home screen.

Status indicators can appear at the top of the home screen:

You can also use an optional 2.5 mm wired headset to go handsfree. Mini USB headsets are not supported.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

handsfree speaker

You can use your phone's handsfree speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear. To turn the speaker on, during a call, press $\cdot \hat{\phi} \cdot > \text{Hands Free}$. To turn the speaker off, press $\cdot \hat{\phi} \cdot > \text{Hand Held}$.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or the last four digits of your phone number. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**.

Your service provider may reset these codes. If not, you should change them to protect your personal information. The unlock code must contain four digits. The security code must contain six digits.

To change a code or password:

Find it: •• > ₩ Settings > Security > New Passwords

Note: If you forget your security code, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone with a four-digit code to keep others from using it. (to lock and unlock keys see page 21).

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 30). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

To lock your phone:

Find it: • > Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now or Automatic Lock

Enter the four-digit unlock code and press **Ok**. Your phone first displays **Phone Locked**, and then shows **Enter Unlock Code** until the next time you unlock your phone.

To unlock your phone, enter your four-digit code and press **O**k.

memory card setup

You can store multimedia content, such as songs and pictures, on your phone's internal memory or on an optional memory card.

Note: Your phone supports microSD memory cards with up to 2 GB capacity (greater than 1 GB capacity is guaranteed only for SanDisk microSD cards).

format memory card

You will need to format the memory card before using it for the first time. This essential procedure creates the **Music** and **Pictures** directories. If you do not format a memory card before using it for the first time, your phone may not be able to read the contents of the card.

Caution: Formatting the memory card **erases all content** on the card.

Find it: •• > ₹ Settings > Initial Setup

1 Scroll to Format MicroSD Card and press Select.

When prompted, press Yes to continue or No to cancel formatting.

To copy files from a computer to your memory card, see page 44. You cannot copy files between your phone's memory and your memory card.

Tip: To access data stored on your microSD memory card, from the home screen press • • ► Media > Pictures or Music Library, then • ► Switch Storage Devices. If there are no files stored on your memory card then your phone will automatically switch to its internal memory.

From the home screen (page 17), you can use shortcuts:

Create a custom menu of your favorite phone features and tools.

assign features to MyMenu

 Press then scroll to a desired menu or submenu item.

For example if you want to assign the Messages menu to MyMenu, scroll to Messages on the main menu. If you want to assign the Calculator function to

MyMenu, scroll to and select Tools on the main menu, then scroll to Calculator.

- 2 With the desired option highlighted, press and hold until the MyMenu confirmation appears, then press 0k.
- 3 Press Done to accept the assigned key number, or scroll to Key and press Change to assign a different one.

Find it: •• > © Tools > MyMenu

Scroll to the MyMenu item you want and press Enter.

ring styles & alerts

Your phone rings and/or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or to signal certain other events.

set styles

Find it: • > Settings > Ring Style

- 1 Select Style by pressing .
- 2 Scroll to a ring style and press .

set alerts

Set alerts for different events, such as getting a message in your inbox or receiving a call.

Find it: • > * Settings > Ring Style

- 1 Scroll to Style Detail and press .
- 2 Scroll to an alert type and press .
- 3 Scroll to the desired detail setting and press .

Note: Your phone plays a sample of each highlighted setting. Ringtones play through the speakerphone, unless you're using a headset.

answer options

Set your phone to either **Multi-key On** to answer by pressing any key or **Multi-key Off** to answer by pressing the send key only.

Find it: • > & Settings > In Call Setup > Answer Options

wallpaper

Set a picture as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen.

Find it: • > * Settings > Personalize > Wallpaper

To select a wallpaper image:

- 1 Scroll to **Picture** and press ••.
- 2 Scroll to Preloaded and downloaded media files or Additional Storage Device to browse your memory card, and press .

Scroll to the picture you want and press .

or

Select (None) to turn off wallpaper.

To adjust wallpaper image layout:

- 1 Scroll to Set Layout and press .
- 2 Scroll to Tile, center or Fit-to-screen, and press .

screen saver

Set a picture as a screen saver image. The screen saver displays when the phone is being charged and there is no activity.

Find it: • > * Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

To select a screen saver:

- 1 Scroll to Type and press ••.
- Scroll to Animation and press .

3 Scroll to the animation you want and press ••.

or

Select (None) to turn off the screen saver.

To specify how long your phone must be inactive before it displays the screen saver:

- 1 Scroll to Idle Time and press ••.
- Select a time period or Off, and press .

Note: To conserve battery life, turn off the screen saver.

colour settings

To choose a **Colour Setting** (or skin) that sets the look and feel of your phone's display: Press • > Personalize > Colour Setting.

display settings

Select a time period the display light remains on.

Find it: • > Settings > Initial Setup > Display Settings

backlight

Select a time period the display backlight remains on.

This option erases all user-entered information stored in your phone memory, including contact entries and downloaded files. **Once you erase the information, it cannot be recovered.** It resets all options to their factory settings except for the unlock code, security code, and lifetime timer.

redial a number

- 1 From the home screen, press (to see a list of dialed calls.

recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of the calls you recently received and dialed, even if the calls didn't connect. The lists are sorted from newest to oldest calls. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added.

Find it: • > **2** Call History > Received Calls or Dialed Calls

Scroll to an entry.

Note: A \checkmark next to a call means the call connected.

2 Press (to call the number.

To see call details (such as time and date), press **View**.

Press • while viewing a list of recent calls to see these options:

option	
Store	Store the entry in your phonebook.
Delete	Delete the entry.
Delete All	Delete all entries in the list.

option	
Show ID / Hide ID	Show or hide your phone number when making a call.
Send Message	Create a new text message with the number in the To field.
Add Digits	Add digits after the number.
Attach Number	Attach a number from Contacts or the recent calls lists.

return a missed call

When you miss a call, your phone plays an alert and displays the (missed call) indicator and a missed call notification. Press **View** to see the details and press to call the number.

To view your missed calls at any time:

Find it: • >
Call History > Received Calls or Dialed Calls

call waiting



If you **receive a second call** while you are already on a call:

- To answer the second call and put the first call on hold, press ②. To switch between the calls, press Switch.
- To send the second call to your voicemail, press Ignore.

speed dial

Each entry you store in the **Contacts** list is assigned a unique speed dial number.

Find it: $\hat{\phi}$ > \mathbb{R} Contacts > [Entry], press $\hat{\phi}$ > Edit

To speed dial a number, simply enter the speed dial number and press #, then .

Note: Your service provider may have already assigned speed dial number \square as voicemail.

call forward



Set up or cancel call forward:

Find it: $\bullet > \bigotimes$ Settings > Call Forward

Choose Voice Calls, then select which type of calls to forward and the phone number to forward the calls to. Choose Forward Status to review your settings, or Cancel All to cancel call forward

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, on your phone. Provided that the phone is switched on and in network coverage, you can make emergency calls using the programmed numbers, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted (where allowed by the network operator).

Note: Check with your service provider, as emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues. Do not solely rely on your wireless phone for essential communications, such as medical emergencies.

- 1 Press keypad keys to dial the emergency number.
- 2 Press to call the emergency number.

Your phone can send *Dual Tone Multi Frequency* (DTMF) tones for calling card calls or other automated touch-tone calls.

Note: A teletypewriter (TTY) is a communication device used by people who are hard of hearing or have a speech impairment. TTY does not work from mobile phone to mobile phone.

Set up your phone for use with an optional TTY device.

call times

Network connection time is the elapsed time from the moment you connect to your service provider's network to the moment you end the call by pressing ①. This time includes busy signals and ringing.

The amount of network connection time you track on your resettable timer may not equal the amount of time for which you are billed by your service provider. For billing information, please contact your service provider directly.

features

view call times

• > **2** Call History > Call Times

Scroll to Last Call, Dialed Calls, Received Calls, All Calls, or Life Time, and press Select.

headset

auto answer incoming calls





Note: Both mono and stereo headsets are supported for voice only.

change volume

Press • • right to increase and left to decrease the earpiece volume during a call.

text entry

Some screens allow you to use the keypad to enter text, such as when you compose a message.

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages:

Specific Absorption Rate

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed for the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health, and to account for any variations in measurements.

The exposure standard for mobile devices employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 watts per kilogram (W/kg), averaged over one gram of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using procedures accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the mobile device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequencies. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the mobile device while operating can be below the maximum value. This is because the mobile device is designed to operate at multiple

power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a mobile device is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) submitted to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this mobile device when tested for use at the ear is 1.26 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this guide, is 1.58 W/kg. The SAR value for this mobile device in its data transmission mode (body-worn use) is 0.70 W/kg. Body-worn measurements can differ, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements. The SAR information includes the Motorola testing protocol, assessment procedure, and measurement uncertainty range for this product.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various mobile devices and at various positions, they meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health

professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Information from the World Health Organization

Present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile phones. If you are concerned, you may want to limit your own or your children's RF exposure by limiting the

length of calls or by using handsfree devices to keep mobile phones away from your head and body.
