



Setup

Safety and General Information

This section contains important information on the safe and efficient operation of your mobile device. Read this information before using your mobile device.

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate using your mobile device, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits.

Your Motorola mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

For optimal mobile device performance and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions.

External Antenna Care

If your mobile device has an external antenna, use only a Motorola-supplied or approved replacement antenna. Use of antennas, modifications or attachments could damage the mobile device and/or may result in your device not complying with local regulatory requirements in your country.

DO NOT hold the external antenna when the mobile device is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the mobile device to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Product Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.

If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a Motorola-supplied or approved lip, holder, holster, case or body harness. If you do not use a body-worn accessory supplied or approved by Motorola - or if you hang your mobile device from a lanyard around your neck - keep the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body when transmitting. When using any data feature of the mobile device, with or without an accessory cable, position the mobile device and its antenna at least 2.5 centimetres (1 inch) from your body.

Using accessories not supplied or approved by Motorola may cause your mobile device to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of Motorola-supplied or approved accessories, visit our web site at: www.motorola.com.

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is subject to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your mobile device may cause interference with other devices.

Follow Instructions to Avoid Interference Problems

Turn off your mobile device in any location where posted notices instruct you to do so.

In an aircraft, turn off your mobile device whenever instructed to do so by airline staff. If your mobile device offers an airplane mode or similar feature, consult airline staff about using it in-flight.

Implantable Medical Devices

If you have an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or defibrillator, consult your doctor before using this mobile device. Persons with implantable medical devices should observe the following precautions:

- ALWAYS keep the mobile device more than 20 centimetres (8 inches) from the implantable medical device when the mobile device is turned ON.
- DO NOT carry the mobile device in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the mobile device immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. If you have any questions about using your mobile device with your implantable medical device, consult your health care provider.

Driving Precautions

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your mobile device while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road. Using a mobile device may be distracting. Discontinue use if you cannot concentrate on driving.
- Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.
- Do not place a mobile device in the airbag deployment area. Responsible driving practices can be found in the "Smart Practices While Driving" section at the end of this guide and/or at the Motorola web site: www.motorola.com/callsmart.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

Operational Warnings

Obey all posted signs when using mobile devices in public areas.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted and can include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities or areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders. When you are in such an area, turn off your mobile device and do not remove, install or charge batteries. In such areas, sparks can occur and cause an explosion or fire.

Batteries and Chargers

Choking Hazards

Your mobile device or its accessories may include detachable parts, which may present a choking hazard to small children. Keep your mobile device and its accessories away from small children.

Glass Parts

Some parts of your mobile device may be made of glass. This glass could break if the product is dropped on a hard surface or receives a substantial impact. If glass breaks, do not touch or attempt to remove. Stop using your mobile device until the glass is replaced by a qualified service centre.

Seizures/Blackouts

Some people may be susceptible to epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, such as when playing video games. These may occur even if a person has never had a previous seizure or blackout.

If you have experienced seizures or blackouts or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games or enabling a flashing-lights feature (if available) on your mobile device.

Discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements or disorientation. It is always a good idea to hold the screen away from your eyes, leave the lights on in the room, take a 15-minute break every hour and stop use if you are very tired.

Caution About High Volume Usage



Listening at full volume to music or voice through a headset may damage your hearing.

Repetitive Motion

When you repetitively perform actions such as pressing keys or entering finger-written characters, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck or other parts of your body. If you continue to have discomfort during or after such use, stop use and see a doctor.

This guide shows how to locate a menu feature as follows:

Find it: • > \clubsuit Recent calls > Received calls

This means that, from the home screen:

- 1 Press the *centre key* to open the main menu.
- Scroll to Recent calls and press the centre key .
- 3 Scroll to Received calls and press the centre key .

Tip: Press the centre key • or **Select** to select a highlighted option.

This means a feature requires an optional accessory.


SIM card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains personal information like your phone number and contacts. It can also contain your voicemail and text message settings.

If you put your SIM card in another phone, that phone uses your phone number.

Caution: Don't bend or scratch your SIM card. Keep it away from static electricity, water and dirt.

Tip: Make sure your SIM card is fully inserted into the phone before installing the battery.







Tip: There is a small hole at the side of the battery door that you can use to help remove the battery door.

memory card

You can use a removable microSD memory card (up to 2 GB) with your phone to store and retrieve multimedia objects, such as music and pictures.



Note: Your phone supports up to 2 GB microSD memory cards (greater than 1 GB capacity is guaranteed for SanDisk microSD cards only). We recommend that you use Motorola approved memory cards only, such as SanDisk memory cards. Other

memory cards may not be compatible with your phone.

To install the memory card, make sure the memory card's metal contacts are facing down.

Slide the top of the memory card under the metal band and into the holder. To remove the memory card, slide the card back out of the holder.

Tip: You do not need to remove the battery to install or remove the memory card.

battery

battery use and safety

IMPORTANT: HANDLE AND STORE BATTERIES
PROPERLY TO AVOID INJURY OR DAMAGE. Most

battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries and particularly from the continued use of damaged batteries.

DON'Ts

- Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the phone or battery come in contact with water. Water can get into the phone's circuits, leading to corrosion. If the phone and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your service provider or contact Motorola even if they appear to be working properly.
- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as jewellery, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot

- Don't place your battery near a heat source. Excessive heat can damage the phone or the battery. High temperatures can cause the battery to swell, leak or malfunction. Therefore:
 - Do **not** dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
 - Avoid leaving your phone in your car in high temperatures.

- Do avoid dropping the battery or phone.
 Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.
- Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your phone or battery has been damaged from dropping or high temperatures.

mobile devices are designed to work with Motorola

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it has a "Motorola Original" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a Motorola battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;

 If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorised Service Centre.

Important: Motorola's warranty does not cover damage to the phone caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.

Note: Your battery is intentionally tight fitting to ensure consistent connection.

charge the battery

New batteries are not fully charged. Plug the battery charger into your phone and an electrical outlet. Your phone might take



several seconds to start charging the battery. When the battery starts charging the battery charging indicator (see page 2) comes on. The phone shows Charge complete when finished.

Tip: You can also use a PC USB port to charge your phone battery. Before connecting your phone to your PC, download and install the charging software driver from www.motorola.com/support.


Notes for charging your phone's battery:

 When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging.

- · New batteries are not fully charged.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold of for a few seconds or until the display turns on.



If prompted, enter your four-digit unlock code. Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234**

or the last four digits of your phone number (see page 28).

To turn off your phone, press and hold **to** for a few seconds

make a call

Enter a phone number and press ① to make a call. See page 37 for more calling features.

To hang up, press 💿.

Tip: Is your caller saying they can't hear you? Make sure your finger is not covering the microphone (see page 2).

answer a call

When your phone rings and/or vibrates, press **1** to answer. See page 32 for answer options.

To hang up, press .

adjust volume

You can adjust the volume during a call by pressing the up or down volume keys on the side of the phone (see page 2) or by pressing •�• up or down. To mute a call, press Options > Mute.

change ring alert

Find it: • > • Settings > Ring style

Available options are **Loud ring**, **Soft ring**, **Vibrate**, **Vibrate & ring**, **Vibrate then ring** or **Silent** (see page 31).

store a number

You can store up to 1000 phone numbers in **Contacts** (see page 61 for more contact features):

- Enter a phone number in the home screen and press Store.
- 2 Enter a name and other details for the phone number, press **OK**. To select a highlighted item, press the centre key ...

3 Press Done to store the number.

To store an email address for a new contact, press $\stackrel{.}{•}$ > $\stackrel{.}{•}$ > New > Email. Enter the name and email address, then press 0K > Done.

call a stored number

Find it: •• > Contacts

- Scroll to the entry.
- 2 Press to call the entry.

Shortcut: In **Contacts**, enter the letters of an entry to get to it quickly.

Tip: Set the **Contacts** icon as a **Home Screen** navigation key for even faster access (see page 31).



home screen

When you turn on your phone, the *home screen* displays.



Note: Your home screen might look a little different from this example.

Soft key labels show the current soft key functions. For soft key locations, see page 2.

Press the *navigation key* • up, down, left or right to select shortcut items in the home screen.

volume keys

Press the volume keys on the side of the phone to:

- Turn off an incoming call alert
- Change earpiece or speakerphone volume during a call
- Change volume for a song.

music/smart key

The external *music key* gives you a way to access your music with the phone closed.

Note: With your phone closed, the smart key locks and unlocks your external keys.

Tip: Press **To** to access your music with the phone open.

hands-free

You can use your phone's hands-free speaker to make calls without holding the phone to your ear. To turn the speaker on, during a call, press •• Spkr on. To turn the speaker off, press Spkr off.

Note: The hands-free speaker won't work when your phone is connected to a hands-free car kit or headset or if your phone is closed.

You can also use an optional 3.5 mm wired headset to go hands-free.

Note: Mini USB headsets are not supported.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or to the last four digits of your phone number. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**.

Your service provider may reset these codes. If not, you should change them to protect your personal information. The unlock code must contain four digits. The security code must contain six digits.

To change a code or password:

Find it: (♠) > **** Settings > Security > New passwords

Note: If you forget your security code, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone with a four-digit code to keep others from using it.

Note: You can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see page 39). A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you need to unlock it to answer**.

To lock your phone:

Find it: ♠ > ❤ Settings > Security > Phone lock > Lock now or Automatic lock

Enter the four-digit unlock code and press **OK**. Your phone first displays **Phone locked** and then shows **Enter unlock code**: until the next time you unlock your phone. **To unlock your phone**, enter your four-digit code and press **OK**.

To change your unlock code:

Find it: ♠ > ❤ Settings > Security > New passwords

memory card

You can store multimedia content, such as songs and pictures, on your phone's internal memory or on an optional memory card.

Note: If you download a file or copyrighted file and store it on your memory card, you can use the file only while your memory card is inserted in your phone. You cannot send, copy or change copyrighted files.

format memory card

You will need to format the memory card (using the phone) before using it for the first time. This essential procedure creates the picture, video, java and music

folders and ensures your phone can read the contents of the card

Caution: Formatting the memory card erases all content on the card.

Find it: •• > ***** Settings > Initial setup

- 1 Scroll to Format additional storage device and press Select.
- When prompted, press Yes to continue or No to cancel formatting.

Tip: To access data stored on your microSD memory card, with your phone in the home screen, press • • > ₹ Multimedia > Pictures or Sounds or Music or Videos and then press • • > Switch storage devices. If there are no files stored on your memory card then your phone will automatically switch to its internal memory.

Shortcut: When your phone's Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically connect to a hands-free device you have used before. Just turn on the device or move it near the phone. If the device doesn't connect, turn it off and back on.

send files to another device

You can send a media file, contacts entry, agenda event and more from your phone to a computer or other device.



Note: You can't copy some copyrighted objects.

- On your phone, scroll to the object that you want to copy to the other device.
- 2 Press Options > Send > To Bluetooth.

3 Select a recognised device name or [Look for device] to search for the device where you want to copy the file.

If your phone could not send the file to the other device, make sure the device is on and ready in discoverable mode (see the user guide for the device). Also, make sure the device is not busy with another similar Bluetooth connection.

Note: Once you connect your phone to a Bluetooth device, that device can start similar Bluetooth connections with your phone. When your phone is connected, the Bluetooth indicator 3 is highlighted in the status bar and displayed on the top of the phone.

indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to reach the network

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the quidelines.

Drive Safe, Call Smart SM

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile devices and their accessories in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. The use of these devices may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Go to www.motorola.com/callsmart for more information.

Your mobile device lets you communicate by voice and data, almost anywhere, anytime, wherever wireless service is available and safe conditions allow. When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. If you choose to use your mobile device while driving, remember the following tips:

- Get to know your Motorola mobile device and its features such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience to your mobile device with one of the many Motorola Original hands-free accessories available today.

- Position your mobile device within easy reach. Be able to access your mobile device without removing your eyes from the road. If you receive an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice, and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.

- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.
 Jotting down a "to do" list or going through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility—driving safely.

- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that can divert your attention away from the road.
- Use your mobile device to call for help. Dial 999 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, or medical emergencies.¹
- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see a road accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 999 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.¹
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.¹
- Wherever wireless phone service is available.

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
