Installation, Care, and Service

Installation

- 18) Never place or store the TV in direct sunlight; hot, humid areas; areas subject to excessive dust or vibration; or locations with temperatures at or below 41°F (5°C).
- Always place the TV on the floor or a sturdy, level, stable surface that can support the weight of the unit.



20) Never place items such as vases, aquariums, or candles on top of the TV.



- Never block or cover the slots or openings in the TV cabinet back, bottom, and sides. Never place the TV:
 - on a bed, sofa, rug, or similar surface;
 - too close to drapes, curtains, or walls; or
 - in a confined space such as a bookcase, built-in cabinet, or any other place with poor ventilation.

25) Always make sure the antenna system is properly grounded to provide adequate protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges (see Section 810 of the National Electric Code).

Care

For better performance and safer operation of your TOSHIBA TV, follow these recommendations and precautions:

- 27) Always sit approximately 10–25 feet away from the TV and as directly in front of it as possible. The picture can appear dull if you sit too far to the left or right of the TV, or if sunlight or room lights reflect on the screen. Turn the TV off to check for reflections on the screen, and then remove the source of reflections while viewing the TV.
- Always unplug the TV before cleaning. Never use liquid or aerosol cleaners.



WARNING: RISK OF ELECTRIC SHOCK!

Never spill liquids or push objects of any kind into the TV cabinet slots.

- 30) [*This item applies to projection TVs only*.] If the air temperature rises suddenly (for example, when the TV is first delivered), condensation may form on the lenses. This can make the picture appear distorted or the color appear faded. If this happens, turn off the TV for 6 to 7 hours to allow the condensation to evaporate.
- 31) For added protection of your TV from lightning and power surges, always unplug the power cord and disconnect the antenna from the TV if you leave the TV unattended or unused for long periods of time.
- 32) During normal use, the TV may make occasional snapping or popping sounds. This is normal, especially when the unit is being turned on or off. If these sounds become frequent or continuous, unplug the power cord and contact a Toshiba Authorized Service Center.
- 33) Possible Adverse Effects on TV Picture Tube: If a fixed (non-moving) pattern remains on the TV screen for long periods of time, the image can become permanently engrained in the picture tube and cause subtle but permanent ghost images. This type of damage is NOT COVERED BY YOUR WARRANTY. Never leave your TV on for long periods of time while it is displaying the following formats or images:
 - **Fixed Images**, such as PIP/POP windows, stock tickers, video game patterns, TV station logos, and websites.
 - **Special Formats** that do not use the entire screen. For example, viewing letterbox style (16:9) media on a normal (4:3) display (gray bars at top and bottom of screen); or viewing normal style (4:3) media on a widescreen (16:9) display (gray bars on left and right sides of screen).

Introduction

Welcome to Toshiba

Congratulations! You have purchased one of the finest projection TVs on the market. The goal of this manual is to guide you through setting up and operating your Toshiba TV as quickly as possible.

Instructions in this manual are based on using the remote control. You also can use the controls on the TV if they have the same name as those on the remote control.

Please read all the safety and operating instructions carefully, and keep the manual for future reference.

Exploring your new TV

You can operate your TV using the buttons on the front panel or the remote control. The back panel and front panel (behind the door) provide all the terminal connections you will need to connect other equipment to your TV. See "Connecting your TV" on page 7.

Note regarding Quick Connect Guide

The Quick Connect Guide

automatically appears on-screen the first time the TV is turned on. This feature provides on-screen instructions to guide you through initial setup of your TV.

To stop the **Quick Connect Guide**, either press EXIT or turn off the TV.

Connecting vour TV

Connecting your TV

Note: Cables are not supplied with your TV.

- **Coaxial cable** is the cable that comes in from your antenna, cable TV service, or cable converter box. Coaxial cable uses "F" connectors.
- Standard A/V (audio/video) cables usually come in sets of three, and are typically color-coded according to use: yellow for video, red for stereo right audio, and white for stereo left (or mono) audio. On your TV's back panel, the standard A/V inputs are color-coded in the same manner as the cables.
- S-Video cable is for use with video equipment that has an S-Video input.
- **Component video cables** come in sets of three, and are for use with video equipment that has component video inputs. (ColorStream[®] is Toshiba's brand of component video.)
- **DVI-D digital single-link cable** is for use with video equipment that has a DVI-D digital single-link connector (see page 13).

NOTE REGARDING PICTURE QUALITY

When connecting video equipment to your Toshiba TV:

- For GOOD picture quality: Use a standard yellow video cable.
- For BETTER picture quality: If your equipment has an S-video input, use an S-video cable **instead of** a standard yellow video cable. (You still must connect the standard red and white audio cables for full system connection, but *do not connect the standard yellow video cable at the same time*, or the picture performance will be unacceptable.)
- For BEST picture quality: If your equipment has component video (or DVI) inputs, use either component video cables (or a DVI cable) instead of a standard video or S-video cable. (You still must connect the standard red and white audio cables for full system connection, but *do not connect the standard yellow video cable or an S-Video cable at the same time.*)

Connecting a VCR

This connection allows you to watch local channels and video programs, play or record on the VCR while watching TV, and record from one channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- two coaxial cables
- one set of standard A/V cables





CAUTION:

Do not plug in any power cords until you have finished connecting all equipment.

Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable.

If you have a VCR with S-video, use an S-video cable instead of a standard video cable.

Do not connect a standard video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time, or the picture performance will be unacceptable.

Connecting a cable converter box

This connection allows you to watch basic and premium cable channels.

To view basic channels and use the TV's features, select ANT-1. To view premium channels, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels.

• three coaxial cables

Connecting a cable converter box and VCR

This connection allows you to watch and record basic and premium cable channels, watch videotapes, and record one channel while watching another channel. To view basic channels and use the TV's features, select ANT-1.

To view premium channels or record with the VCR, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels.

You will need:

- four coaxial cables
- one set of standard A/V cables

Note:

When you use a converter box with your TV, the remote control will not operate some features, such as programming your favorite channels, labeling channels, and locking channels.

Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable.

If you have a VCR with S-video, use an S-video cable instead of a standard video cable. Do not connect a standard video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time, or the picture performance will be unacceptable.

Connecting a DVD player or satellite receiver and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD/satellite, VCR, and TV programs, and record one TV channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- two (or three, if satellite receiver is used) coaxial cables
- one set of standard A/V cables
- one pair of audio cables

- To record a TV program while watching a DVD, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and select ColorStream HD1 on the TV (see "Selecting the antenna input" on page 21).

- two coaxial cables
- one set of standard A/V cables
- one pair of audio cables
- one set of component video cables

- To record and watch a DTV program, select LINE IN on the VCR, and select ColorStream HD2 (or VIDEO 1 for a non-ColorStream connection) on the TV (see "Selecting the antenna input" on page 21).
- To record a TV program while watching a DTV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and select ColorStream HD2 on the TV.
- To record and watch the same TV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and select VIDEO 1 on the TV.
- To record one TV program while watching another TV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and tune the TV to the channel to watch.

- two sets of standard A/V cables
- one pair of audio cables

For DVI/HDCP connection, see page 13.

If your DTV receiver or set-top box is not compatible with component video or DVI/HDCP, use the S-video connections (plus the standard audio connections) instead (see page 9).

Connecting a camcorder

This connection allows you to watch video materials recorded on a camcorder.

You will need:

• one set of standard A/V cables

Note:

If you have VCRs with S-video, use S-video cables instead of standard video cables for better picture performance. Do not connect a standard video cable and an S-video cable to Video-1 (or Video-2) at the same time, or the picture performance will be unacceptable.

Do not connect the same VCR to the output and input jacks on the TV at the same time.

To dub or edit, VCR 2 must select Line IN, and the TV must select VIDEO 1 (see "Selecting the antenna input" on page 21).

Connecting your TV

The DVI/HDCP¹ input on your TV is designed to accept HDCP program material in digital form from EIA/CEA-861–compliant² consumer electronic devices, such as a set-top box or DVD player equipped with a DVI-D digital single-link output connection.³

The DVI/HDCP input is designed for best performance with 1080i high-definition video signals. The DVI/HDCP input also will accept and display 480p, 720p, and 480i picture signals.

Note: This TV is not intended for connection to and should not be used with a PC (personal computer).

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- one DVI-D digital single-link cable **Note:** For proper operation, the DVI-D cable length should not exceed 3m (9.8 ft). The recommended length is 2m (6.6 ft).
- one pair of standard audio cables

Notes:

Caution:

To ensure that the DVI/HDCP device is reset properly, it is recommended that you follow these procedures:

- When turning on your electronic components, turn on the TV first, and then the DVI/HDCP device.
- When turning off your electronic components, turn off the DVI/HDCP device first, and then the TV.

Connecting an audio system

This connection allows you to use an audio amplifier to adjust the audio level. This also allows you to use external speakers.

To control the audio, turn on the TV and the stereo amplifier, and turn off the built-in speakers (see "Turning off the built-in speakers" on page 51).

You will need:

• one pair of audio cables

Note:

To hear sound when using an external audio amplifier, the volume of both the TV and the amplifier must be set above 0 (zero).

Connecting an A/V receiver

This connection allows you to use an audio/video (A/V) receiver to enhance your TV's sound.

If you have a system with Dolby Pro Logic[®] surround sound, you can add to the realism of the sound by using the TV's internal speakers as center channel speakers.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- one set of standard A/V cables
- one single audio cable for the audio center channel

A/V Receiver



Caution:

To avoid damaging the TV speakers:

- Turn off the TV before connecting or disconnecting the Audio Center Channel cable.
- Do not connect from the A/V receiver's Center Speaker OUT (amplified signal) to the TV's Audio Center Channel IN.

Refer to the instructions provided with your A/V receiver for details about your surround sound system.

When the Audio Center Channel ON/OFF switch is in the ON position, the TV speakers will function only as center channel speakers. At this time, the SBS feature should be set to OFF. See page 50.

Adjust the volume for the center channel speakers using the center level control on your A/V receiver.

To use the TV speakers as normal speakers, set the Audio Center Channel ON/OFF switch to the OFF position.

Preparing the remote control for use

With the remote control, you can operate your TV, most VCR models, and cable TV converters together, even if they are different brands. If you will be using your TV with a Toshiba VCR, your remote control is already programmed and ready to use. If you own different brands of VCRs and/or converters, you first have to program your remote control. (See "Programming the remote control for use with a non-Toshiba VCR or cable TV converter" on page 16.)

Installing the remote control batteries

To install the batteries:

1. Slide the battery cover off the back of the remote control.



2. Install two "AA" size alkaline batteries. Match the + and - signs on the batteries to the signs on the battery compartment.



3. Slide the battery cover back on to the remote control until the lock snaps.

Using the remote control with a VCR or cable TV converter

If you own a non-Toshiba device or a Toshiba device that the remote control is not preprogrammed to operate, you must program the remote control to recognize your device. See page 16.

To control a VCR:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the VCR position. The buttons shown at right will then control the VCR. The unshaded buttons will operate the TV as usual.

Note:

Your TV's remote control may not operate certain features on your VCR, cable TV converter, or other electronic device.

Refer to the owner's manuals for your other devices to determine their available features.

If your TV's remote control does not operate a specific feature on a device, use the remote control that came with the device.

Caution:

- Dispose of batteries in a designated disposal area. Do not throw batteries into a fire.
- Do not mix battery types or combine used batteries with new ones.
- If the remote control does not operate correctly, or if the operating range becomes reduced, replace both batteries with new ones.
- If the batteries are dead or if you will not use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries to prevent battery acid from leaking into the battery compartment.

To control a cable TV converter:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the CABLE position.

The shaded buttons shown at right will control the cable TV converter.

Programming the remote control

The remote control is preprogrammed to operate most Toshiba devices. To program the remote control to operate a non-Toshiba device or a Toshiba device that the remote control is not preprogrammed to operate:

1. Refer to the "VCR code table" or "Cable TV converter code table" on pages 17–18 to find the code for your VCR or converter.

If more than one code is listed, try each one separately until you find one that works.

- 2. If you are programming the remote control to operate your:
 - VCR, set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to VCR.
 - Cable converter, set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to CABLE.
- 3. While holding down the RECALL button, press the Number buttons (0–9) to enter the three-digit code for your brand of VCR or converter.
- 4. Point the remote control at the VCR or converter and press POWER to test the code.

If the VCR or converter turns on, you have entered the correct code.

Note: In addition to POWER, confirm that all necessary keys on the TV remote control operate your device. If some keys are not operational, repeat the device code setup using another code (if other codes are listed for your device). If, after trying all listed codes, the necessary keys do not operate your device, use the device's original remote control.

If the VCR or converter does not respond to the remote control, you may have entered the wrong code. Repeat steps 1–4 with another code.

5. Reset the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to TV to control the TV.

Note:

- Each time you replace the batteries, you must reprogram the remote control.
- Some newer VCRs are capable of working on either of two remote codes. These VCRs have a switch labeled "VCR1/VCR2."

If your VCR has this kind of switch, and does not respond to any of the codes for your VCR brand, set the switch to the other position (VCR1 or VCR2) and reprogram the remote control.

Adding channels to the TV's memory

When you press Channel \blacktriangle or \bigtriangledown , your TV will stop only on the channels stored in the TV's channel memory.

Follow the steps below and on the next page to program all active channels into the TV's memory.

Programming channels automatically

Your TV can automatically detect all active channels in your area and store them in its memory. After the channels are stored automatically, you can manually add or erase individual channels (see below).

To program channels automatically:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the SET UP menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown until the TV/CABLE is highlighted.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to highlight either TV or CABLE, depending on which you use. If you use an antenna, highlight TV; if you use cable, highlight CABLE.

Changing channels

- To change to a specific channel (programmed or unprogrammed): Press the Channel Number buttons (0–9 and 100). For channels 100 and higher, press the 100 button, and then the next two numbers. For example, to select channel 125, press 100, 2, 5.
- To change to the next programmed channel: Press Channel ▲ or ▼ on the TV or remote control.

Changing channels using SpeedSurf

To use SpeedSurf to change to a specific programmed channel:

Press and hold Channel ▲ or ▼ for about one second. The TV will enter the SpeedSurf mode.

Adjusting the color convergence

This projection TV uses three separate TV tubes: red, green, and blue. The red, green, and blue images are projected onto the screen where they converge to form a full-color picture. You can see a clear picture only when the three images converge correctly. Convergence may drift over time or if you move the TV. If you can see clear images on your TV screen, skip this procedure.

It is recommended that the adjustment is made only after the TV has been on for at least 30 minutes.

Automatically adjusting the color convergence using TouchFocus™

Press TOUCHFOCUS on the TV once. The TV will enter auto-convergence mode and adjust the convergence automatically.



When the adjustment is complete, the normal picture appears. If the error message "TouchFocus Error" appears, retry the TouchFocus adjustment, or adjust the convergence manually, as described on the next page.

If you see separate red, blue, or green crossed lines (or red or blue shadows next to white lines), you need to adjust the convergence.

- 4. Press ENTER to highlight RED or BLUE, depending on which color needs adjusting. If both red and blue need adjusting, you will need to perform steps 4 and 5 twice.
- Press ▲ (up), ▼ (down), ◄ (left), or ▶ (right) on the remote control to converge the red or blue line into the green line, which will turn completely white when correctly adjusted. When color convergence is correctly adjusted, you will see two single crossed white lines.
- 6. Press EXIT to display the Circumference Convergence menu.
- 7. Press the corresponding Number button (1–4 and 6–9) to select the area you want to adjust.



8. Press ENTER to highlight RED or BLUE, depending on which color needs adjusting. If both red and blue need adjusting, you will need to perform steps 8 and 9 twice for the selected area.



- Press ▲▼◀▶ to converge the red or blue line into the green line, which will turn completely white when correctly adjusted. Repeat steps 8 and 9 until you see two single crossed white lines.
- 10. Press EXIT once to select another area to adjust, and then repeat steps 7–9.
- 11. Press EXIT twice to close the Convergence menu.



Using the TV's features

Adjusting the channel settings

Switching between two channels using Channel Return

The Channel Return feature allows you to switch between two channels without entering an actual channel number each time.

- 1. Select the first channel (or video mode) you want to view.
- 2. Select a second channel using the Channel Number buttons (0–9, 100).
- 3. Press CH RTN. The previous channel will display.

Each time you press CH RTN, the TV will switch back and forth between the last two channels that were selected.

Switching between two channels using SurfLock™

The SurfLock[™] feature temporarily "memorizes" one channel in the CH RTN button, so you can return to that channel quickly from any other channel by pressing CH RTN.

To memorize a channel in the CH RTN button:

- 1. Select the channel you want to program into the CH RTN button.
- 2. Press and hold CH RTN for about 2 seconds until the message "Channel Memorized" appears (flashing) on the screen. The channel has been programmed into the CH RTN button.



- 3. Continue to change channels.
- 4. Press CH RTN. The memorized channel will be selected.

The TV will return to the memorized channel one time only. Once you press CH RTN and then change channels again, the CH RTN button memory will be cleared and the button will function as Channel Return, by switching back and forth between the last two channels that were selected.

Programming your favorite channels

You can preset up to nine of your favorite channels each for FAVORITE CH1 and FAVORITE CH2 modes using the Favorite Channel Programming feature. Because this feature scans through only your favorite channels, it allows you to skip other channels you do not normally watch.

To program your favorite channels:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight FAVORITE CH1 or FAVORITE CH2.







3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to display the FAVORITE CH1 menu, for example. CH INPUT will be highlighted.



- 4. Press the Channel Number buttons to enter one of your favorite channels.
- 5. Press ENTER.
- 6. Repeat steps 4 and 5 for other channels.

To select your favorite channels:

Press FAV \checkmark or \blacktriangle .

To quickly scan through your favorite channels in a 9-picture multiwindow:

Press FAVORITE (see page 34).

To clear a favorite channel:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight FAVORITE CH2, for example.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to display the FAVORITE CH2 menu.



4. Press $yz \blacktriangleleft b$ to highlight the channel you want to clear, and then press ENTER.



5. Repeat step 4 for other channels.

To clear all favorite channels at once:

Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight CLEAR ALL in step 4 above, and then press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to clear all favorite channels at once.



Notes:

- The FAV ▼▲ buttons operate as MENU <> buttons when a menu is onscreen.
- The favorite channel feature is not available in ANT2 mode.





Features

Labeling channels

Channel labels appear above the on-screen channel number display each time you turn on the TV, change a channel, or press RECALL. You can choose any four characters to identify a channel.

To create a channel label:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight CH LABELING.
- Press ◀ or ► to display the CH LABELING menu. CH INPUT will be highlighted.





4. Press the Channel Number buttons to select a channel you want to label.



- 5. Press ▼ to highlight LABEL.
- 6. Press ◀ or ► repeatedly to select a character for the first space, and then press ENTER.



7. Repeat step 6 to enter the rest of the characters.

If you would like a blank space in the label name, you must choose an empty space from the list of characters. Otherwise, a dash "–" will appear in that space.

8. Repeat steps 4–7 for other channels. You can assign labels to a maximum of 32 channels.

To erase a channel label:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight CH LABELING.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to display the CH LABELING menu.
- 4. Press ▼ to highlight CH INPUT, then select the channel you want to clear with the Channel Number buttons.

- 5. Press $\mathbf{\nabla}$ to highlight CLEAR.
- 6. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to erase the channel label.
- 7. Repeat steps 4–6 to erase other channel labels.



Viewing the wide-screen picture formats

You can view programs that have the conventional TV picture format (4:3 aspect ratio) and the wide-screen format (16:9 aspect ratio) in a variety of picture sizes.

Selecting the picture size

Repeatedly press PIC SIZE to select either Natural, Theater Wide 1, Theater Wide 2, Theater Wide 3, or Full picture size, as described below.



While the above menu is on-screen, you can select the desired picture size by pressing the corresponding number button.

Connecting

The POP (picture-out-picture) feature splits the screen into a double window that allows you to watch two programs at the same time. The POP program can come from a TV broadcast or an external source, such as a VCR.

To display a TV broadcast in the POP window:

1. Press POP to display the POP window.



2. Press POP CH ▲▼ to change the channel of the POP window. If the V-CHIP feature is active and you try to watch a TV program that exceeds your set rating limits, the program will be blocked (see "Using the V-CHIP menu" on page 36).



To display a picture from an external source in the POP window:

- 1. Connect the external source equipment (see "Connecting your TV" on page 7).
- 2. Select the TV program you want to watch in the main window.
- 3. Press POP to display the POP window.
- 4. Repeatedly press SOURCE to select the signal source for the POP window (TV, VIDEO 1, VIDEO 2, or VIDEO 3 only; you cannot select ColorStream in POP mode). The current source will display in purple.



While the above menu is on the screen, you can select the desired signal source by pressing the corresponding number button (0–3). To close the POP window:

Press POP again.

Unlocking programs temporarily

1. If you try to watch a TV program that exceeds the rating limits you set, the TV enters program lock mode. After 4 seconds, the TV starts the favorite channel search function (see page 34). You can either unlock the program temporarily (see steps 2–4) or select an unlocked program to watch.



- 2. To temporarily unlock the program, press MUTE.
- 3. Press the Number buttons (0-9) to enter your 4-digit PIN code.



4. Press ENTER.

If the correct code is entered, the program lock mode is released and the normal picture appears.

All locking is disabled until the TV is turned off, and will be enabled when the TV is turned on again.

Locking channels

With the CH LOCK feature, you can lock specific channels. The TV will not be able to tune locked channels with the Channel $\blacktriangle \nabla$ buttons or Channel Number buttons, unless you clear the setting.

You can lock a maximum of nine channels.

To lock channels:

- 1. From the LOCKS menu, select CH LOCK.
- Press ◀ or ▶ to display the CH LOCK menu. CH INPUT will be highlighted.

 - VIDEO+ : Locks Video 1, Video 2, Video 3, ColorStream, HD1/HD2, and channels 3 and 4. This option should be used if you use the antenna terminal to play a video tape.

Note: Make sure the POP is not on channel 3 or 4.

OFF : Unlocks all video input sources.



Using the front panel lock feature

You can lock the front panel buttons to prevent your settings from being changed accidentally (by children, for example). When the front panel lock is ON, all control buttons on the TV front panel (except POWER) do not operate.

To lock the front panel:

- 1. From the LOCKS menu, select FRONT PANEL LOCK.
- 2. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to highlight ON.



If a button on the front panel is pressed, the message "Not Available" appears.

To unlock the front panel:

Highlight OFF in step 2 above, or press and hold the VOL button on the TV for about 10 seconds until the message "Front Panel Lock: Off" appears on-screen.

*(see "Saving your new preferences" on page 42.)

To select the picture mode:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press $\mathbf{\nabla}$ or $\mathbf{\Delta}$ to select MODE.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight the mode you prefer.



Note:

If you select one of the factory-set picture modes (SPORTS, STANDARDS, or MOVIE) and then change a picture quality setting (for example, increase the contrast), the picture mode automatically changes to PREFERENCE in the Picture menu.

To save your new picture quality settings, you must select SAVE NEW PREFERENCE (see page 42) before closing the Picture menu or the TV will return to the previous picture mode.

To adjust the picture quality:

- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to adjust the level.



The PICTURE quality adjustments you made can be saved in the TV's memory with the SAVE NEW PREFERENCE feature (see page 42). You can keep these settings or choose factory set options, as described under "Selecting the picture mode" above.



Saving your new preferences

You can save the PICTURE qualities you adjusted (contrast, brightness, color, tint, and sharpness) in the picture PREFERENCE mode.

To save your new preferences:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight SAVE NEW PREFERENCE.
- 3. Press ◀ or ►. When complete, the menu displays "DONE."



The mode automatically changes to PREFERENCE. You can choose your saved preferences any time by selecting PREFERENCE mode in the PICTURE menu (see "Selecting the picture mode" on page 41).

Using the ALS (Automatic Light Sensor) feature

The ALS automatically adjusts the picture contrast according to the room's lighting conditions. For example, when the room is dark, the ALS will automatically reduce the contrast (which reduces eye strain). The ALS is activated when the ALS menu is set to ON.

To activate the ALS:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight ALS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to highlight ON. The CONTRAST setting changes to AUTO, and is not adjustable while the ALS feature is on.



To deactivate the ALS:

Highlight OFF in step 3 above.



Note:

The CONTRAST adjustment in the PICTURE menu is not available when ALS is ON. Do not cover the ALS sensor on the TV front panel.

Using the flesh tone feature

This feature automatically adjusts the tint to display more natural flesh tones.

To turn on the flesh tone feature:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.

- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight ON.



Using the CableClear[™] DNR (digital noise reduction) feature

This feature allows you to reduce visible interference in your TV picture. This is useful when receiving a broadcast with a weak signal (especially cable channels) or playing back a video cassette or disc damaged by repeated use.

To turn on the CableClear[™] DNR feature:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight CableClear DNR.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight AUTO.



To turn off the CableClear[™] DNR feature: Highlight OFF in step 3 above.

Selecting the color temperature

You can change the quality of the picture by selecting from three preset color temperatures: cool, medium, and warm.

To select the color temperature:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight COLOR TEMPERATURE.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight the mode you prefer.

Selecting the cinema mode

When you view a DVD movie (3:2 pulldown processed) from a DVD player connected to the ColorStream (component video) inputs on the TV, smoother and more natural motion can be obtained by setting the CINEMA MODE to FILM.

Using the closed caption feature

The closed caption feature has two options:

- Captions—An on-screen display of the dialogue, narration, and sound effects of TV programs and videos that are closed captioned (usually marked as "CC" in TV listings).
- Text—An on-screen display of information not related to the current program, such as weather or stock data (when provided by individual stations).

To view captions or text:

- 1. Tune the TV to the desired program.
- Press C.CAPT (or MENU then ▲▼) to display CUSTOM menu. CC will be highlighted.

Note: Each time you press C.CAPT, the closed caption mode will change.



- 3. Press C.CAPT (or ◀►) to highlight the desired closed caption mode, as follows:
- To view captions, highlight C1, C2, C3, or C4 (C1 displays translation of the primary language in your area).



Note: If the program or video you selected is not closed captioned, no captions will display on the screen.

To view text, highlight T1, T2, T3, or T4.
 Note: If text is not available in your area, a black rectangle may appear on your screen. If this happens, turn the Closed Caption feature OFF.



To turn off the Closed Caption feature: Highlight OFF in step 3.



Note:

A closed caption signal may not display in the following situations:

- when a videotape has been dubbed
- when the signal reception is weak
- when the signal reception is nonstandard

Connecting

To set the sleep timer to turn off the TV automatically:

1. Repeatedly press TIMER to set the length of time until the TV turns off.

Muting the sound

Press MUTE to temporarily reduce (1/2 MUTE) or turn off (MUTE) the sound. While the sound is off, the screen will display "1/2 MUTE" or "MUTE" in the lower right corner. Each time you press MUTE, the mute mode will change in the following order:

 \rightarrow Normal \rightarrow 1/2 MUTE \rightarrow MUTE -

When you press MUTE, the closed caption feature is automatically activated. To deactivate this feature, press MUTE again. This feature works only when the closed caption mode is set to OFF. See "Using the closed caption feature" on page 46 for more information.

Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts

The multi-channel TV sound (MTS) feature allows you to listen to high-fidelity stereo sound while watching TV. MTS can also transmit a second audio program (SAP) containing a second language, music, or other audio information (when provided by individual stations).

When the TV receives a stereo or SAP broadcast, the word STEREO or SAP appears on-screen every time the TV is turned on, the channel is changed, or the RECALL button is pressed.

The MTS feature is not available when the TV is in VIDEO mode. To listen to stereo sound:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight STEREO.



You can leave your TV in STEREO mode because it will automatically output the type of sound being broadcast (stereo or monaural). The word "STEREO" or "SAP" displays in yellow in the menu when the TV receives the signal.

If the stereo sound is noisy, select MONO to reduce the noise. To listen to SAP (if available):

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to highlight SAP. You will hear the station's second audio program (if available) from the speakers, while viewing the original program's picture (see note at right).





Note :

A second audio program (SAP) can be heard only on those TV stations that offer it.

For example, a station might broadcast music as a second audio program. If you have SAP on, you will see the current program on the screen but hear music instead of the program's normal audio.

However, if you have SAP on, and the station you are watching is not currently broadcasting a second audio program, the station's normal audio will be output. However, occasionally there is no sound at all. If this happens, set the MTS feature to STEREO mode.

Using the TV's Features

Using the SRS 3D surround sound feature

The SRS 3D surround sound feature expands the audio listening field wider and deeper to create exceptional sound quality from the TV's speakers. The feature uses stereo signals from a TV broadcast or video input.

To turn on the SRS 3D surround:

- 1. Select STEREO mode (See "Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts" on page 48).
- 2. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ► until the THEATER menu appears.
- 3. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight SRS 3D.
- 4. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight ON.



To turn off the SRS 3D surround:

Highlight OFF in step 4 above.

In general, you can leave SRS 3D in the ON mode because it will automatically produce the type of sound being broadcast (surround stereo or monaural).

Adjusting the sound quality

You can change the quality of your TV's sound by adjusting the bass, treble, and balance.

To adjust the sound quality:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight the item you want to adjust.



- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to adjust the level.
- < makes the sound quality weaker or decreases the balance in the right channel, depending on the item selected.
- The makes the sound quality stronger or decreases the balance in the left channel, depending on the item selected.

If the broadcast is monaural, the SRS 3D effect does not work.

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight RESET.
- 3. Press ◀ or ►. The menu displays "DONE."



Using the sub-bass system (SBS)

The sub-bass system enhances bass performance, even when the volume is low.

To turn on the SBS and adjust the SBS level:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight SBS.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight ON.



- 4. Press \blacktriangle or \blacktriangledown to highlight SBS LEVEL.
- 5. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to adjust the SBS level.



To turn off the SBS: Highlight OFF in step 3 above.



Note:

- The SBS signal does not pass through the "Variable Audio OUT" jacks (See "Connecting an audio system" on page 13); however, the AUDIO menu will appear when the buttons are pressed.
- While SBS is OFF, if the SBS level is adjusted, SBS is automatically set to ON.

Turning off the built-in speakers

Use this feature to turn off the TV speakers when you connect an audio system (See "Connecting an audio system" on page 14).

To turn off the built-in speakers:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight SPEAKERS.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to highlight OFF.



To turn on the built-in speakers:

Highlight ON in step 3 above.

Selecting the Audio OUT sound

This feature allows you to select the sound source (MAIN or POP) that is output from the Audio OUT jacks.

This is useful when amplifying or recording the POP sound with external equipment while hearing the sound of the main picture through the built-in speakers. Also see "Connecting two VCRs" on page 12.

To select the Audio OUT sound:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \triangledown to highlight AUDIO OUT.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \triangleright to select MAIN or POP.



- MAIN: Outputs the sound of the main program from the audio OUT jacks.
- POP: Outputs the sound of the POP program from the audio OUT jacks.

Note:

Make sure the volume control of your audio amplifier is set to a moderate level.



Note:

When the POP window is on-screen, the sond of the main program is output to the AUDIO OUT jacks, even if POP is selected in the AUDIO OUT menu.

The sound of the main program is always output from the TV's speakers, regardless of the AUDIO OUT setting.

Using the StableSound® feature

When the signal source is changed, the StableSound feature limits the highest volume level to prevent extreme changes in volume (for example, to prevent the sudden increase in volume that often happens when a TV program switches to a commercial).

To turn on the StableSound feature:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press \blacktriangle or \blacksquare to highlight STABLE SOUND.
- 3. Press \blacktriangleleft or \blacktriangleright to select ON.





To turn off the StableSound feature:

Highlight OFF in step 3 above.

Selecting the background of the menu display

You can change the background of the menu display by selecting from two preset types: shaded and solid (gray).

To select the background:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the CUSTOM menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight BACKGROUND.
- 3. Press ◀ or ► to select either a SHADED or SOLID background.



Displaying on-screen information

Press RECALL to display the following information on-screen:

- Antenna mode (when in TV mode)
- Channel number or VIDEO mode selected
- Time (if set)
- Channel label (if set)
- Stereo or SAP audio status
- V-CHIP rating status
- Picture size (when in ColorStream mode)





Viewing the demo mode

The demo mode automatically demonstrates several of your TV's features.

To start the demo:

Press and hold MENU on the TV front panel for 4 seconds.

To stop the demo:

Press RECALL, EXIT, or POWER.

Understanding the auto power off feature

The TV will automatically turn itself off after approximately 15 minutes if it is tuned to a vacant channel or a station that completes its broadcast for the day. This feature does not work in VIDEO mode.

Understanding the last mode memory feature

If the power is cut off while you are viewing the TV, the Last Mode Memory feature automatically turns on the TV when the power is resupplied.

If the power is going to be off for a long time and you are going to be away from your TV, unplug the power cord to prevent the TV from turning on in your absence.
