Setting up your system



Chapter 1: Hardware Setup

Getting to know your PC

Front view





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Hard disk drive (HDD) LED

The hard disk LED blinks when data is being written into or read from the hard disk drive.

Power switch

The power switch allows powering ON and OFF the system.



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Slot-in drive

Your PC's slot-in drive supports DVDs (read and write capabilities) and Blu-ray (read capability only) disc formats.

Eject button

Press to eject the disc from the slot-in drive.



Microphone jack

The microphone jack is designed to connect the microphone used for video conferencing, voice narrations, or simple audio recordings.



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Headphone/Audio Out jack

The stereo headphone jack (3.5mm) is used to connect the system's audio out signal to amplified speakers or headphones.



USB 3.0 ports

These USB (Universal Serial Bus) ports provide a transfer rate of up to 5Gbit/s and are backward compatible with USB2.0.



Memory card slot

The built-in memory card reader enables your PC to read and write data to and from MMC/SD/SDHC/SDXC cards.



Built-in IR receiver


Your PC's built-in IR receiver receives signal from your remote control to remotely access and manage your PC.



BIOS key

Before booting up the system, insert a straightened paper clip into this hole to enter the BIOS.

Wireless antenna jack

The jack is used to connect the supplied wireless antenna to enhance wireless signal reception.



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USB 2.0 ports

The USB (Universal Serial Bus) 2.0 ports are compatible with USB 2.0/1.1 devices such as keyboards, mouse devices, cameras, and hard disk drives. USB allows many devices to run simultaneously on a single computer, with some peripheral acting as additional plug-in sites or hubs.



Display (Monitor) Output

The 15-pin D-sub monitor port supports a standard VGAcompatible device such as a monitor or projector to allow viewing on a larger external display.



HDMI HDMI port

The HDMI (High Definition Multimedia Interface) port supports a Full-HD device such as an LCD TV or monitor to allow viewing on a larger external display.



E-SATA e-SATA Port

External SATA or eSATA allows external connection of Serial-ATA devices originally designed for use inside the computer. It is up to six times faster than existing USB 2.0, & 1394 for external storage solutions and is also hot pluggable using shielded cables and connectors up to two meters.



Headphone/Audio Out jack

The stereo headphone jack (3.5mm) is used to connect the system's audio out signal to amplified speakers or headphones.



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LAN port

The eight-pin RJ-45 LAN port supports a standard Ethernet cable for connection to a local network.



Power input (DC 19V)

The supplied power adapter converts AC power to DC power for use with this jack. Power supplied through this jack supplies power to the PC. To prevent damage to the PC, always use the supplied power adapter.

WARNING! The power adapter may become warm to hot when in use. Do not cover the adapter and keep it away from your body.




Kensington[®] lock port

The Kensington[®] lock port allows you to secure your PC using Kensington[®] compatible PC security products.

Remote control (on selected models)

Use the remote to launch the Windows[®] MCE (Media Center) or control the PowerDVD to play media files.

NOTE: The remote control type and MCE functions may vary depending on models.





Power on/off

Press to turn your PC on/off.



Stop

Press to stop the playback.



Forward

Press to fast-forward the playback.



Next

Press to go the next track.



Information

Press to display program information under the Windows® MCE or other menu options.



Four-way navigation buttons

Press to scroll through the menu options.



OK

Press to confirm an action.

8 Channel up/down

Press to change TV channels.*

NOTE: * This function is available in certain areas only.



Music

Press to launch the Music menu in Windows® MCE.



Video

Press to launch the Videos menu in Windows® MCE.

Numeric buttons

Press to enter numbers or select a channel.*

NOTE: * This function is available in certain areas only.

Colored buttons

Press to access menu options in Windows® MCE or in Teletext mode.

NOTE: The button functions may vary with areas.



Teletext on/off

Press to turn on/off Teletext mode.

NOTE: This function is available in certain areas only.



Clear

TV

Press to clear the input information.



Press to launch the TV menu in Windows® MCE.



Press to launch the Photos menu in Windows® MCE.



Volume down

Press to decrease the volume.



Volume up

Press to increase the volume.



Windows[®] MCE

Press to open the Windows® MCE.*

NOTE: *To be able to use this function, you must purchase the Windows Media pack separately.



Return

Press to return to the previous page.



Previous track

Press to go back to the previous track.



Rewind

Press to rewind a media file.



Record

Press to record TV programs.*

NOTE: * This function is available in certain areas only.



Play

Press to play a media file.



Pause

Press to pause a playback.


Chapter 2: Using your PC

Positioning your PC

Mounting your PC on the stand


To mount your PC on the stand:


- 1. Locate the mounting hole at the bottom of your PC.
- 2. Align the stand's mounting hole with the mounting hole on your PC, then secure it in place with the stand screw.



NOTE: You can lay down your PC on a flat surface without the stand.




Installing your PC to a monitor


To install your PC to a monitor:

1. Secure the VESA mount to your monitor with four screws bundled with your VESA mount kit.


NOTE: Your monitor must comply with VESA75 or VESA100 standard.



2. At the rear your PC, remove the screw from the middle-right section. Keep the screw for future use.




3. Place your PC on the VESA mount noting the correct alignment, and then secure your PC to the VESA mount with the bundled screws. The stand screw (the same one used for securing the stand to the PC) goes to the bottom hole. The flat-head screw goes to the hole on the right.



Using your PC

Connecting to an external display


Connect one end of an HDMI or a VGA cable to an external display, and the other end of the cable to your PC's HDMI or VGA port.



Connecting to a USB device


Connect USB devices like wired/wireless keyboards, mouse devices, and printers to the USB ports on your PC.

NOTE: The keyboard varies with country or region.




Connecting the wireless antenna

Connect the wireless antenna to your PC to enhance the wireless signal. Ensure that the wireless antenna is in an upright position (90° angle) to get the best wireless reception.



Turning your PC on



NOTES:

- When your PC is not in use, unplug the power adapter or switch off the power button to save on power consumption.
- Adjust the power management settings in the Window[®] Control Panel. This is to ensure that your PC is set to a low power consumption mode and is fully operational at the same time.

Configuring the audio output via an HDMI device

If you want to use a high-definition TV as an audio output device, connect it to the Home Theater PC and follow the steps below to configure the audio settings.

To configure the audio output via an HDMI device:

1. Do any of the following based on your PC's operating system.

On Windows® 7

Right-click the **Volume Mixer** icon on the Windows[®] notification area and click **Playback devices**.

On Windows® 8

a) From the Start screen, click **Desktop** to launch the Desktop Mode.

NOTE: For more details, refer to the section *Start screen* under *Working with Windows*[®] 8.




b) Right-click the Volume Mixer icon on the Windows® taskbar and click **Playback devices**.





- From the Playback screen, select Digital Audio (HDMI).
- Click Configure and the Speaker Setup window pops up.



4. Select **Stereo** and click **Next**.




- 5. Tick the Front left and right option, and click Next.
- 6. Click **Finish** to exit the speaker setup.



Using the slot-in DVD player

Insert your disc into the slot-in DVD player with the disc's printed side facing left.



Chapter 3: Working with Windows[®] 8

System requirements

Starting for the first time

When you start your computer for the first time, a series of screens appear to guide you in configuring the basic settings of your Windows[®] 8 operating system.

To start for the first time:

- 1. Turn your computer on. Wait for a few minutes until the setup screen appears.
- 2. Carefully read the license terms. Tick I accept the license terms for using Windows and click Accept.
- 3. Follow the next onscreen instructions to configure the following basic items:
 - Personalize
 - Settings
- 4. Once you are done configuring the basic items, the Windows[®] 8 video tutorial appears. Watch this tutorial to learn more about Windows[®] 8 functionalities.
- 5. The Start screen appears after successfully signing in to your user account.

Windows[®] 8 lock screen


The Windows[®]8 lock screen may appear when your PC enters the Windows[®]8 operating system. To proceed, tap on the lock screen or press any key on your PC 's keyboard.

Windows[®] UI

The Windows[®] User interface (UI) is the tile-based display used in Windows[®] 8. It includes the following features you can use while working on your PC.

Start Screen

The Start Screen appears after successfully signing in to your user account. It helps organize all the programs and applications you need in just one place.



Windows[®] apps

These are apps pinned on the Start screen and displayed on tiled-format for easy access.

IMPORTANT! A screen resolution of 1024 x 768 pixels or higher is required to run Windows[®] apps.

NOTE: Some apps require signing in to your Microsoft account before they are fully launched.


Hotspots

Onscreen hotspots allow you to launch programs and access the settings of your PC. The functions in these hotspots can be activated using your mouse.

Working with Windows[®] apps

Use your PC's keyboard or mouse to launch and customize your apps.

Launching apps

- Position your mouse pointer on an app then left-click once to launch it.
- Press twice then use the arrow keys to browse through

the apps. Press to launch your selected app.

Customizing apps from the Start screen

You can move, resize, or unpin apps from the Start screen using the following steps.

Moving apps

To move an app, point and drag it to a new location.

Resizing apps

Right-click the app to activate its settings bar then tap



Unpinning apps

To unpin an app from the Start screen, right-click on the app to

activate its settings bar then tap



Closing apps

From the running app's screen, press



Accessing the Apps screen

Aside from the apps already pinned on your Start screen, you can also open other applications through the Apps screen.

Charm bar

The Charm bar is a toolbar that can be triggered on the right side of your screen. It consists of several tools that allow you to share applications and provide quick access for customizing the settings of your PC.





NOTE: When called out, the Charm bar initially appears as a set of white icons. The image above shows how the Charm bar looks like once activated.

Use your PC's mouse or keyboard to launch the Charm bar:

Settings

This tool allows you to access the PC settings of your PC.

Snap feature

The Snap feature displays two apps side-by-side, allowing you to work or switch between apps.

IMPORTANT! Ensure that your PC's screen resolution is set to 1366 x 768 pixels or higher before using the Snap feature.



Snap bar

Using Snap

Perform the following steps to activate Snap using your PC's mouse or keyboard.

Using your mouse

- 1. Launch the app you wish to snap.
- 2. Hover the mouse point on the top side of your screen.
- 3. Once the pointer changes to a hand icon, drag then drop the app to the left or right side of the display panel.
- 4. Launch another app.


Using your keyboard

- 1. Launch the app you wish to snap.
- 2. Press +
- 3. To switch between apps, press


Other keyboard shortcuts

Turning your PC off

You can shut down your PC in the following scenarios:

- Tap from the Charm bar then tap to do a normal shutdown.
- From the log-in screen, tap
- If your PC is unresponsive, press and hold the power button for at least four (4) seconds until your PC turns off.

Putting your PC to sleep

To put your PC on Sleep mode, press the Power button once.

Entering the BIOS Setup

BIOS (Basic Input and Output System) stores system hardware settings that are needed for system startup in the PC.

In normal circumstances, the default BIOS settings apply to most conditions to ensure optimal performance. Do not change the default BIOS settings except in the following circumstances:


- An error message appears on the screen during the system bootup and requests you to run the BIOS Setup.
- You have installed a new system component that requires further BIOS settings or update.

WARNING! Inappropriate BIOS settings may result to instability or boot failure. We strongly recommend that you change the BIOS settings only with the help of a trained service personnel.

Quickly enter the BIOS

Windows[®] 8 boot time is quite fast, so we developed the following three ways for you to quickly access the BIOS:

• Before booting up the system, insert a straightened paper clip into the BIOS key.



- Press the power button for at least four seconds to shut down your PC, then press the power button again to turn your PC back on, and press <F2> during POST.
- When your PC is off, disconnect the power cord from your PC's power connector. Reconnect the power cord and press the power button to turn on your PC. Press <F2> during POST.

NOTE: POST (Power-On Self Test) is a series of software controlled diagnostic tests that run when you turn on your PC.

Chapter 4: Connecting to the Internet

Access emails, surf the Internet, and share applications via social networking sites on or from your PC using wireless/Wi-Fi or wired connection.

Connecting on Windows® 7

Wireless connection

1. Click the wireless network icon *in the Windows® notification area.*

WARNING! For security concerns, DO NOT connect to an unsecured network.

 Select the wireless access point you want to connect to from the list and click Connect to build the connection.

NOTES: If you cannot find the desired access point, click the **Refresh** icon **5** on the upper right corner to refresh and search in the list again.




- 4. When connecting, you may have to enter a password.
- 5. After a connection has been established, the connection is shown on the list.
- 6. You can see the wireless network icon 📶 in the Notification area.

Wired connection

1. Use a network (RJ-45) cable to connect your PC to a DSL/cable modem or a local area network (LAN).

2. Configure a dynamic IP/PPPoE or static IP network connection.

NOTE: For more details, refer to the next sections.

Configuring a dynamic IP / PPPoE network connection

To configure a dynamic IP/PPPoE network connection:

- Click the network icon III in the Windows® Notification area and select Open Network and Sharing Center.
- 2. Click **Change adapter settings** in the left blue pane.
- 3. Right-click Local Area Connection and select Properties.







4. Click Internet Protocol Version 4(TCP/IPv4) and click Properties.

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5. Click Obtain an IP address automatically and click OK.



NOTE: Continue to the next steps if you are using PPPoE connection.

6. Return to the **Network** and Sharing Center and then click Set up a new connection or network.

7. Select **Connect to the Internet** and click **Next**.

8. Select **Broadband (PPPoE)** and click **Next.**

9. Enter your User name and, Password, and Connection name. Click **Connect**. C = 20

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10. Click **Close** to finish the configuration.

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11. Click the network icon in the taskbar and click the connection you just created.

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12. Enter your user name and password. Click **Connect** to connect to the Internet.

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Configuring a static IP network connection

To configure a static IP network connection:

- 1. Repeat steps 1 to 4 of the previous section **Configuring** a dynamic IP/PPPoE network connection.
- 2 Click Use the following IP address.
- 3. Enter the IP address, Subnet mask and Gateway from your service provider.
- 4. If needed, enter the preferred DNS Server address and alternative address.
- 5. When done, click **OK**.

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Connecting on Windows® 8

Wi-Fi connection

1. Launch the Charm bar from the Start screen or from any application mode.

NOTE: For details, refer to the section *Charm bar* under *Working with Windows® apps*.



Charm Bar

2. From the Charm bar, select **Settings** and click the network icon

3. Select the wireless network that you want to connect to from the list.




4. Click Connect.

NOTE: You may be prompted to enter a security key to connect to a secured wireless network.

Wired connection

1. Use a network (RJ-45) cable to connect your PC to a DSL/cable modem or a local area network (LAN).

DSL/Cable Modem



- 2. Configure a dynamic IP/PPPoE or static IP network connection. To do this, follow these steps:
- a) From the Start screen, click **Desktop** to launch the Desktop Mode.
- b) From the Windows[®] taskbar, right-click the network icon and click **Open Network and Sharing Center**.
- 3. From the Open Network and Sharing Center screen, click **Change Adapter settings**.
- 4. Right-click on your LAN and select **Properties**.
- 5. Follow steps 4 to 12 on the section *Configuring a dynamic IP/PPPoE network connection* or *Configuring a static IP network connection* under *Connecting on Windows 7*.

Chapter 5: Recovering your system

Recovery options on Windows®7

Using the Recovery Partition

The Recovery Partition quickly restores your PC's software to its original working state. Before using the Recovery Partition, copy your data files (such as Outlook PST files) to USB storage devices or to a network drive and make note of any customized configuration settings (such as network settings).

The Recovery Partition is a reserved space on your hard disk drive used to restore the operating system, drivers, and utilities installed on your PC at the factory.

Recovering the OS to the factory default partition (F9 Recovery)

WARNING! DO NOT delete the partition named "RECOVERY." The recovery partition is created at the factory and cannot be restored by the user if deleted. Take your system to an authorized ASUS service center if you have problems with the recovery process.

To recover the OS to the factory default partition (F9 Recovery):

- 1. Press **<F9>** during bootup.
- 2. Select Windows setup [EMS Enabled] when this item appears and press [Enter].
- 3. Select the language and click **Next**.
- 4. Select Recover the OS to the Default Partition and click Next.
- 5. The factory default partition will be displayed. Click **Next**.

6. Data on the default partition will be cleared. Click **Recover** to start the system recovery.

NOTE: You will lose all your data on the selected partition. Ensure that you back up your important data.

7. When the recovery is completed successfully, click **Reboot** to restart the system.

Backing up the factory default environment data to a USB drive (F9 Backup)

To back up the factory default environment data to a USB drive (F9 Backup):

- 1. Repeat steps 1–4 from the previous section.
- 2. Select **Backup the Factory Environment to a USB Drive** and click **Next**.
- 3. Connect a USB storage device to your PC to start the Factory Default Environment backup.

NOTE: The required size of the connected USB storage device should be larger than 15GB. The actual size may vary with your PC model.

 Select a desired USB storage device if more than one USB storage device is connected to your EeeTop PC/EeeBox PC and click Next.

NOTE: If there is already a partition with proper size in the selected USB storage device (for example, a partition that has been used as the backup partition), the system will show this partiton automatically and reuse it for backup.

5. Based on the different situations in the previous step, data on the selected USB storage device or on the selected partition will be cleared. Click **Backup** to start backup.

You will lose all your data on the selected USB storage device or on the selected partition. Ensure that you back up your important data.

6. When backing up the factory default environment is completed successfully, click **Reboot** to restart the system.

Recovery options on Windows®8

Resetting your PC

This option restores your PC to its factory default settings.

IMPORTANT! Back up all your data before using this option.

To reset your PC:

1. Press <**F9**> during POST.

IMPORTANT! To go through POST, follow any of the ways described in the section *Quickly enter the BIOS* in Chapter 3.

- 2. From the screen, click **Troubleshoot**.
- 3. Select Reset your PC.
- 4. Click Next.
- 5. Select Only the drive where the Windows is installed.
- 6. Select Just remove my files.
- 7. Click **Reset**.

Recovering from a system image file

You can create a USB recovery drive and use this to recover your PC's settings.

Creating a USB recovery drive

IMPORTANT! Your USB storage device must have at least 8GB available space or as stated on your setup screen.

WARNING! All files on your USB storage device will be permanently deleted during the process. Before you proceed, ensure that you back up all your important data.

To create a USB recovery drive:

1. Launch the Control Panel from the All Apps screen.

NOTE: For details, refer to *Launching the All Apps screen* under *Working with Windows® apps*.

- 2. From the Control Panel's System and Security, click **Find and fix** problems.
- 3. Click **Recovery** > **Create** a recovery drive.
- 4. Click Next.



- 5. Select the USB storage device where you want to copy the recovery files.
- 6. Click Next.

- 7. Click **Create**. Wait for a while for the process to complete.
- 8. When the process is completed, click **Finish**.

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
Removing everything and reinstalling Windows
